AS YOU WILL BE able to tell by reading this issue, the year 1984 is a political year, not only on the national level, but also on the state and local scene.

Several political announcements are being printed in this issue, and there will doubtless be others before the filing deadline has passed.

Voters registration cards were mailed out this week by Hugh Moseley, the county's voter registrar. Those who have voted in recent elections should have received one of the voting cards, but if you are new to the area, or are just eligible to vote, you may need to contact Moseley and see about getting your card.

It will be necessary to have your voter registration card in order to vote in the 1984 elections, so in the event that you do not receive yours in the mail, it might behoove you to check and be sure you are registered to vote.

A VISITOR in our office at the Star this week was Don Richards, who is a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives--the office being vacated by Congressman Kent Hance, who is running for the senate.

We have known Richards for some time. He at one time was the editor of the Hereford Brand, and has quite a background in the news and communications business.

Richards says he feels that the farm economy will be a big issue in the political races in this area. He says he knows and realizes that the farmers have been up against it in recent years, and knows that in an agricultural community the farmer's success is vital to the community's survival.

GROWING UP AS we did in West Texas, we have always heard about "Texas Tall Tales." But we have decided in recent years that the state of Texas doesn't have the corner on the market when it comes to tall stories.

For example, ye editor has an uncle in Tennessee, Austin Ellis, who has a story for almost every occasion. Recently, Uncle Austin sent us this one:

No wonder Texans have become known as tellers of tall tales. It begins to appear that they have to spin their yarns a little larger than the average, just to stay in the ball park with everyone else.

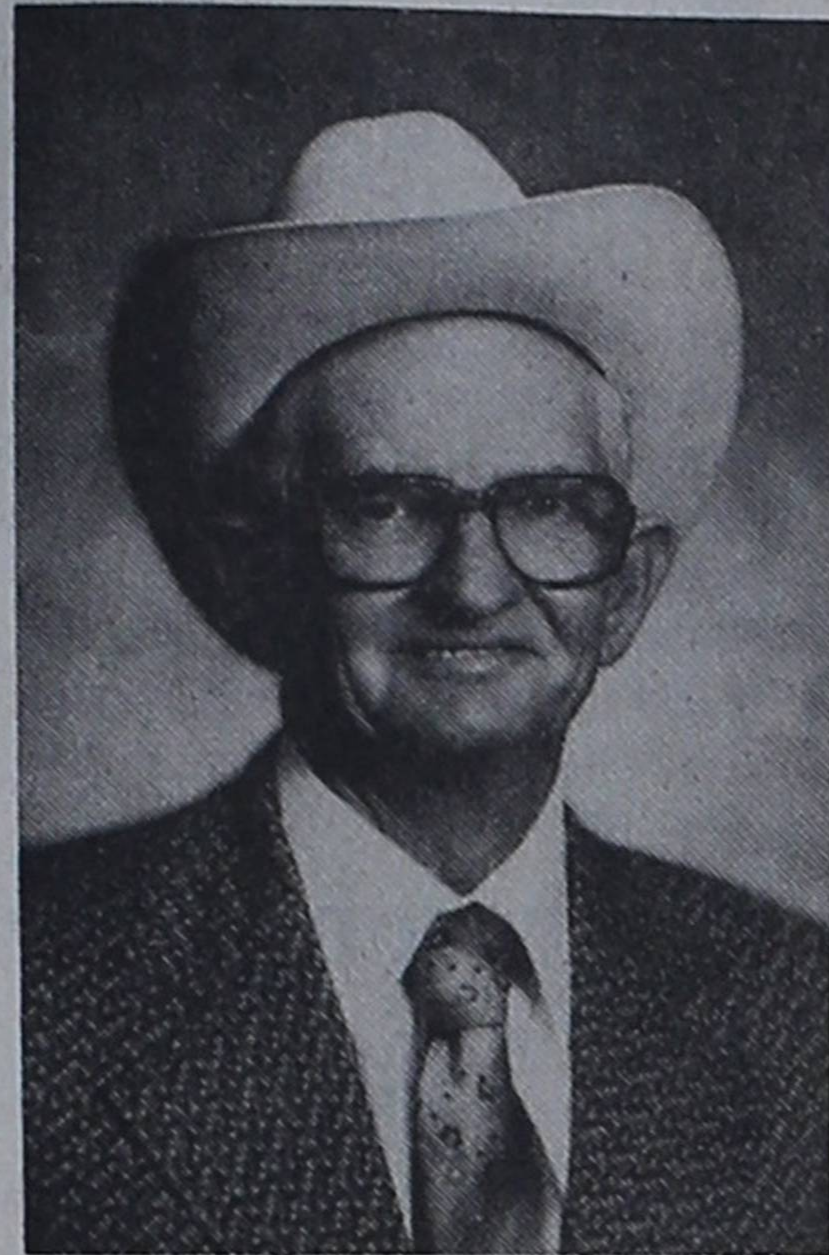
Blood Drive Is Success

Melvin Chisum, vocational agriculture instructor at Springlake-Earth, will serve as judge.



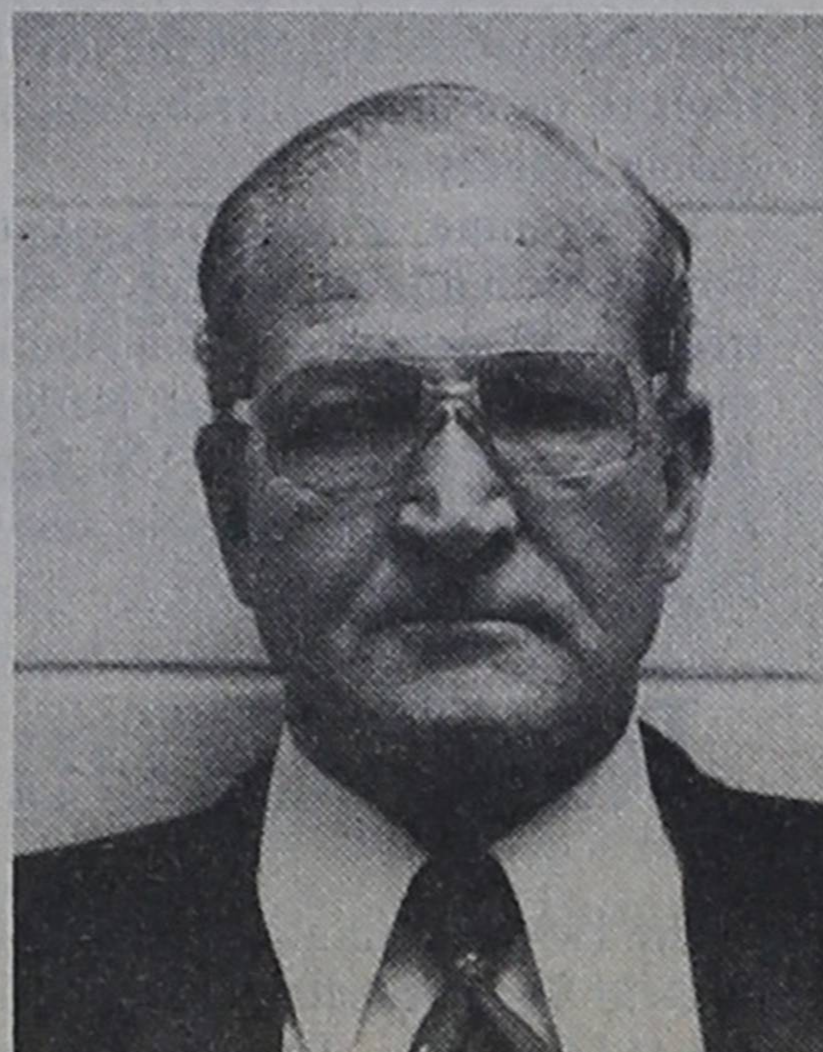

Board Sets Date For '84 Election

A resolution was adopted by the Friona School Board at its meeting January 9 to call a school trustee election for April 7. The election will be held jointly with the City of Friona election.

Terms of board members Pat Fleming and Philip Weatherly will be expiring.

Principals Freeman Melton, Cecil Maddox and Hal Ratcliff, and counselor Baker Duggins made presentations to the board on the State Board of Education's proposed changes in state curriculum and graduation requirements, and what the proposal's impact would be on our school district.

Morgan In Re-Election Statement

M.C. (Bill) Morgan this week authorized the Friona Star to announce his candidacy for re-election as Sheriff of Parmer County, subject to the Democratic primary.

"With over 25 years experience in law enforcement, 12 years with the Parmer County Sheriff's Department, including the last three years as your sheriff, I feel that I have shown the citizens of Parmer County that I am qualified, willing and capable of serving them," Morgan said.

Morgan said that for the last three years, the Parmer County Sheriff's Department has continually had a higher clearance rate, of all crimes, than the state average. "I feel this shows that we are qualified and capable," he added.

"While serving as your sheriff, I have continued to keep the Parmer County Jail certified with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards at a minimum cost to the taxpayers and actually cut the cost of the daily operation of the jail," Morgan continued.

"I want to continue to be your sheriff and if re-elected I will continue to serve the citizens of Parmer County to the best of my ability and I ask your support in the Democratic primary," he concluded.

The final reading and passage of the new requirements will not be official until the state board's March meeting. The administration will continue to study this and make final recommendations at a later date.

The performance of Superintendent Tom Jarboe was evaluated, and Jarboe was extended a new three-year contract by the board.

The board discussed the problem that school employees face in regard to health insurance. The securing of bids is a problem since the employer does not participate in the cost. Superintendent Jarboe was asked to collect more information in this regard to present at the February meeting.

The board approved the purchase of an IBM computer for the administrative office, and amended the budget \$9,000 for this expense.

The board granted a release from contract to Carolyn Carson, LLD teacher, pending the employment of a suitable replacement.

Supt. Jarboe presented the tax collection report. Current taxes collected through December amounted to \$189,796. This represents 32 per cent of the total tax roll. It was noted that the tax levy figure is down by \$20,267 since the August certification, due to corrections to the tax roll.

Reports were given on the various school funds. December bills were paid.

Hillock Is Candidate For Sheriff

Steven K. Hillock, a resident of the Oklahoma Lane area, has announced that he will be a candidate for Parmer County Sheriff, subject to the Democratic primary in May.

Hillock, 38, served 12½ years in the U.S. Navy and Army, including a tour in Vietnam. While in the service, Hillock served as a Military Policeman. He completed courses in psychology and sociology while in the service.

Born and raised in Parmer County, he is the son of Vernon and Julia Symcox.

In 1977 he was hired by then Sheriff Charles Lovelace as a jailer and night dispatcher. Since then he has worked as a police officer, city marshal deputy sheriff and undercover officer at Tulia, Dumas and Walnut Springs.

He received a number of medals while in the service, including the Vietnam Campaign medal and purple heart medal.

While in Vietnam, he served as guard commander, caring for 86 guards and approximately 380 prisoners.

District Judge James E. Morgan of the 220th Judicial District, says, "Based on my personal experience and observations of Mr. Hillock, I can give my wholehearted recommendation as to his ability as a peace officer and his dedication to his job. Additionally, I would advise that I have a great deal of respect for him as a person and based upon communications I have had with other people who have known him longer, I feel that he generally enjoys a good reputation."

Bill Sarpalius Makes Re-Election Statement

State Senator Bill Sarpalius, the Panhandle lawmaker from Canyon, said Tuesday he would seek re-election and officially became a candidate in the Democratic Primary set for May 1. He also said he has some new objectives to pursue.

Sarpalius has achieved state-wide recognition for his efforts to pass strong driving while intoxicated legislation. That legislation is now in effect and the Department of Public Safety says it is already helping to lower the state's accident rate.

"I am proud to have had the opportunity to lead the fight for stiffer penalties for intoxicated drivers. The very awareness of the problem has helped to save lives. The future of our children is a little safer because of it," Sarpalius said.

Sarpalius noted that it was on the same date in 1980 that he first announced his candidacy to the Texas Senate.

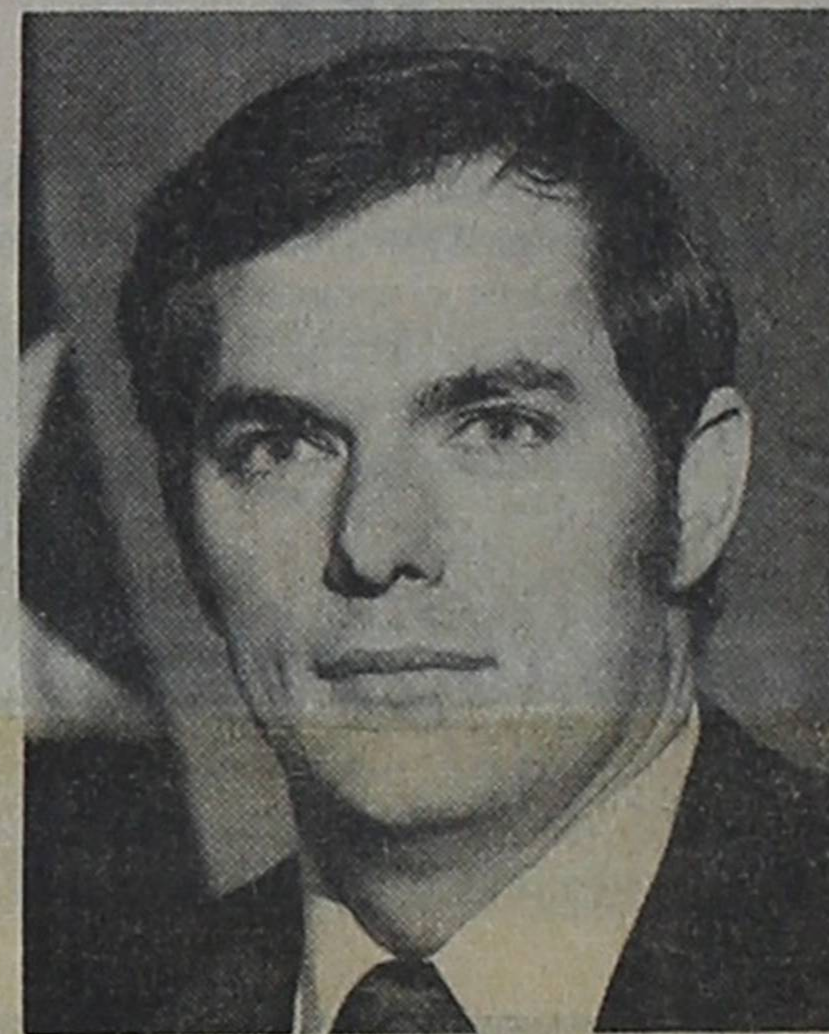
When we announced our candidacy four years ago, we promised to work hard and to try our best to represent the people on a local level. He put a mobile office on the road to make sure the people had an opportunity to speak at the local level. The mobile office travels regularly throughout most of the towns in the 29 counties on a monthly basis, visiting almost every town once a month. To know the needs of our constituents we need to keep in touch with them on a grass-roots level.

"We have worked hard to represent the people by passing legislation the people of the Texas Panhandle and South Plains strongly supported such as the DWI bill, raising the legal drinking age, establishing the gasohol industry, outlawing dogfighting, establishing a work release program to help with our overcrowded prisons, establishing state standards for emergency medical services, strengthening criminal trespass laws, establishing a commodity assessment program for agriculture, and legislation to help stop the storage of high level nuclear waste in the Panhandle.

In the past four years, Sarpalius has served on the Senate Committees of Natural Resources, State Affairs, Education, Economic Development, Human Resources, the Sunset Commission, and as Chairman of the Agriculture Subcommittee.

Lt. Governor Bill Hobby was impressed with Sarpalius' efforts at conservation and protection of the environment and named him as one of two Texas legislators on a national legislative committee to monitor the disposal of high level nuclear waste. Sarpalius is also a member of the National Committee on Agriculture.

Sarpalius said, "We have tried our best to be an effective State Senator for the past four years but there is still much work to be done." Sarpalius pledged to continue to work on water legislation, such as the establishment of the Buffalo Lake Water District, to conserve the water that we have as well as a long-range water importation program.

Sarpalius also promised to continue to help business and industries throughout the 31st District. Without a strong surge from our businesses, the security that comes from jobs will evaporate.

I can think of no two subjects that need more attention than water and the economy. There are things that can be done, and I will dedicate my efforts to making positive proposals that will help the Panhandle and the whole of Texas," Sarpalius said.

Sarpalius was joined at the news conference by his wife, Donna.

The National Arbor Day Foundation is giving ten free trees to people who become Foundation Members during January, 1984.

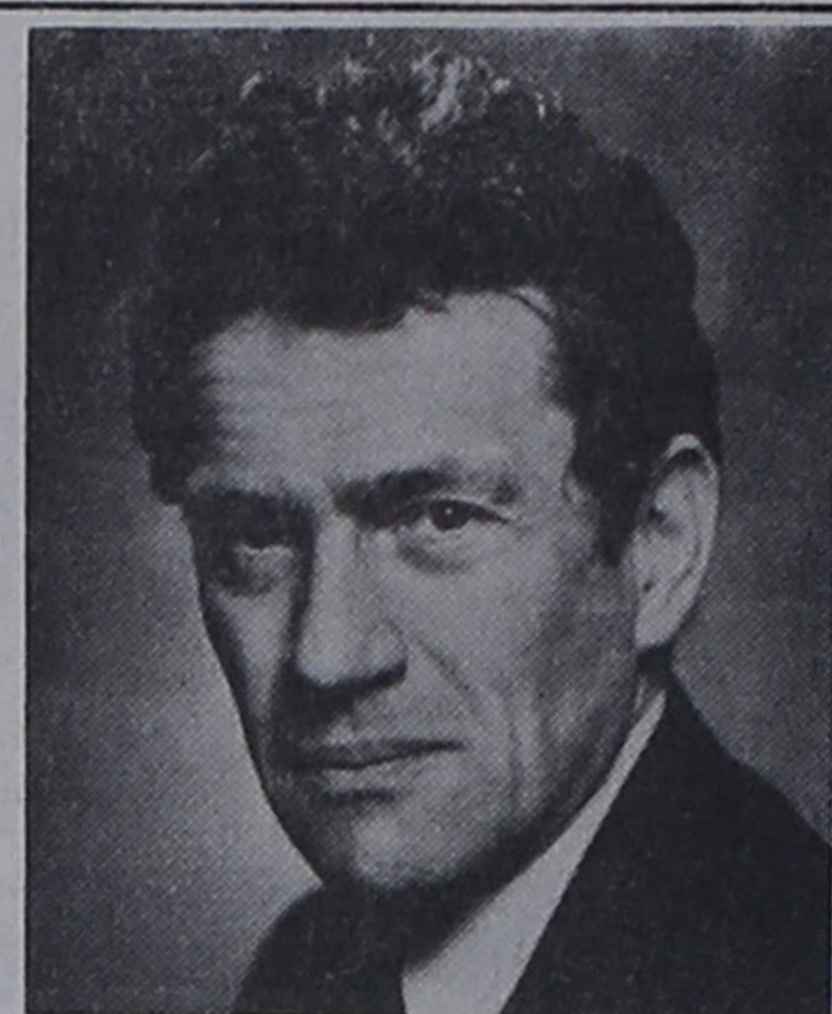
The free trees are part of the Foundation's effort to promote tree planting throughout America.

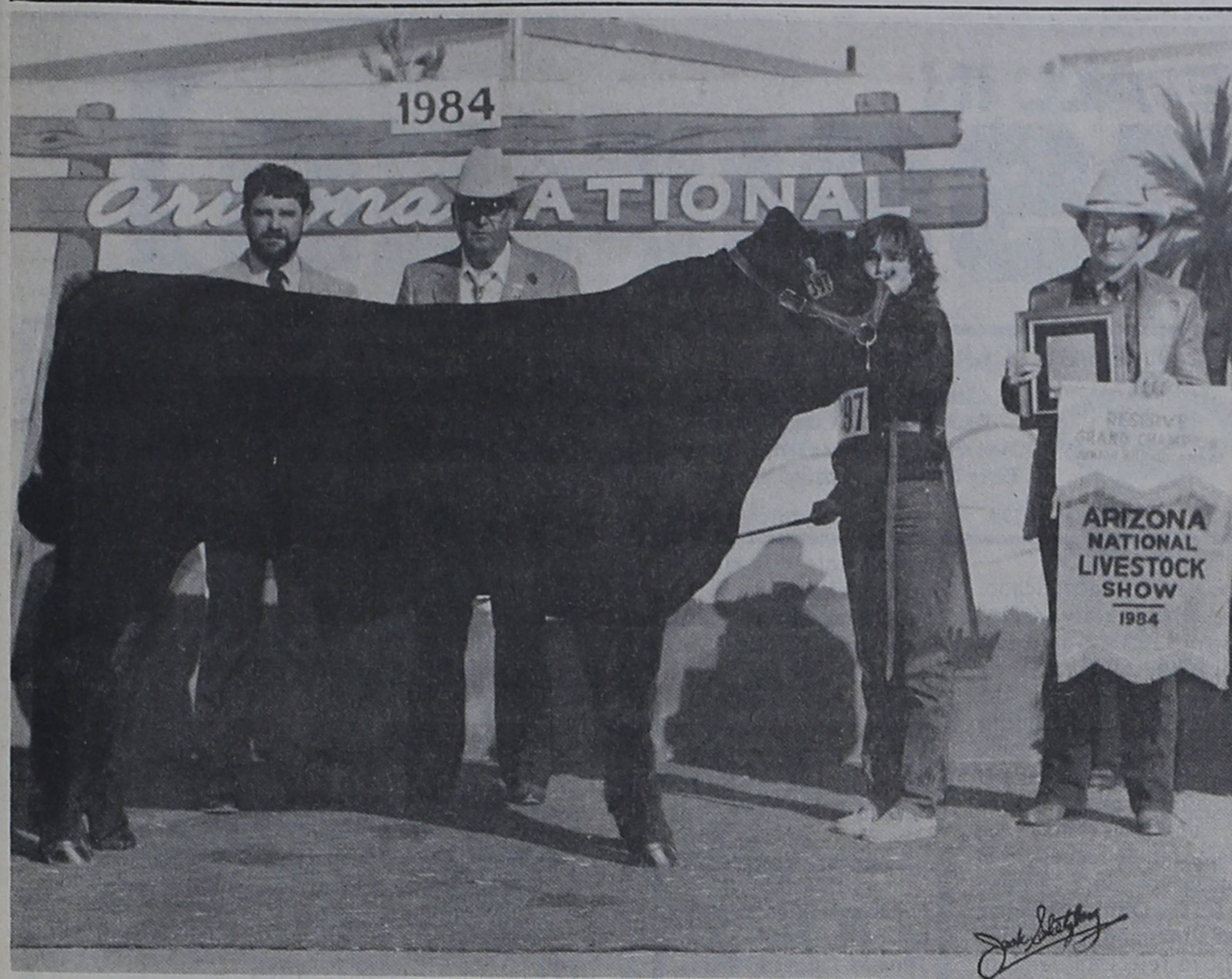

judge, the president of the show and a representative of the Arizona National Bank. Rickie Vogel of Hereford took the honors of Grand Champion with his steer "Flash."

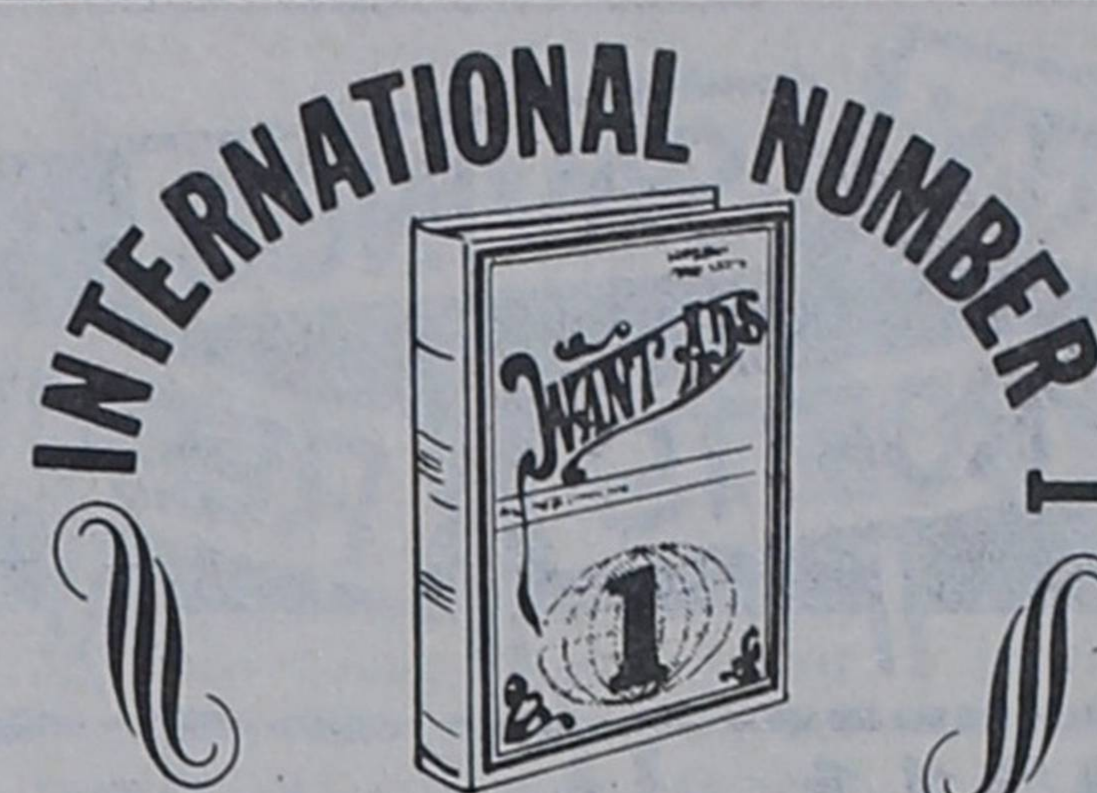
Weather Halts Road Work In County

Due to inclement weather, very little progress has been made this month in construction work on FM 3333 from U.S. Highway 60, five miles northeast of Farwell, east to FM Highway 1731, according to Rhea E. Bradley, Supervising Resident Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation of Littlefield.

Work of constructing grading and installing culverts is being done at present.

Other work will include flexible base and two course surface treatment. The finished travel surface will be 28 ft. wide, which will include two 10 ft. driving lanes and two 4 ft. shoulders.

The public is urged to obey laws, watch for warning signs, barricades and speed limits through construction.

Around The House In Parmer County

With several types of contact lenses now available, more people than ever are able to wear them successfully. Before buying, however, shop around to find an eyecare specialist who best fits your needs and your budget.

Only ophthalmologists and optometrists may prescribe contact lenses.

Ophthalmologists have medical degrees (M.D.) and specialize in eye diseases and eye surgery. They can also prescribe and sell eyewear.

Optometrists, or doctors of optometry (O.D.) are trained to detect eye diseases. They also prescribe and sell eyewear.

A third type of eye specialist, the optician, can fill eyewear prescriptions, but cannot examine eyes or prescribe lenses.

Under the "Eyeglass Rule" set by the Federal Trade Commission, an eye doctor must provide you with a copy of your eyeglass prescription after an exam. This gives you the choice of where to have the prescription filled.

Eye doctors are not required to provide you with a copy of your contact lens prescription. So you may have to pay for another lens fitting exam if you wish to buy your lenses from a different specialist.

Before you decide on an eyecare specialist, you should ask him or her the following questions:

1. "What do you charge for lenses, fitting, adjustments, a lens care kit, and follow-up visits?"

These services may be priced individually or sold as part of a special package. In some cases, the individual charges may add up to less than the "bargain package."

Make sure you know if the actual eye exam is included in the charge.

If later visits are necessary, you may want to select a reasonably-priced package which includes an unlimited number of visits.

2. "What is your refund policy?" Not everyone can adapt to wearing contact lenses. With a good refund policy, you won't lose your entire investment if you are unable to wear them.

3. "How many types and brands of contacts do you sell?" A large selection of contact lenses can increase the chances of finding the kind of contact lens that fit and is best for you.

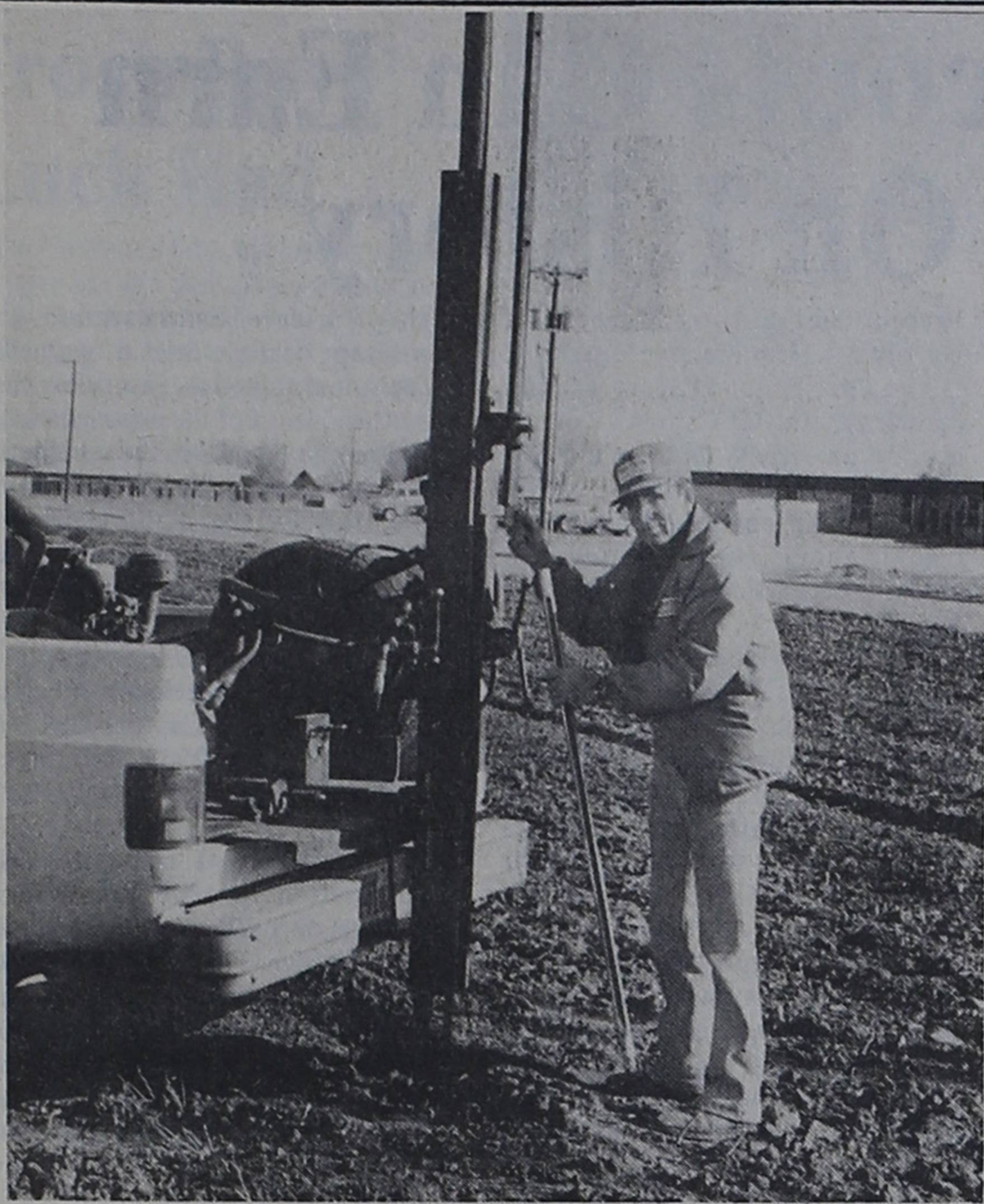
4. "How much do you charge for replacement lenses?" Contact lenses are easily lost or damaged. Find out how much you will be charged and how long you will have to wait if you need a lens replaced. Ask about replacement insurance, which will cut the cost of a replacement lens considerably.

5. "Will you give me a copy of my complete prescription for eyeglasses and contact lenses?"

Comparison shopping is extremely difficult without a copy of your complete prescription. If you plan on shopping elsewhere for initial or replacement lenses, ask about the doctor's policy in advance.

Investigate thoroughly to find the eye care specialist who offers the products, services, and policies that are best for you. This will require some time, but may save you money and eliminate difficulties.

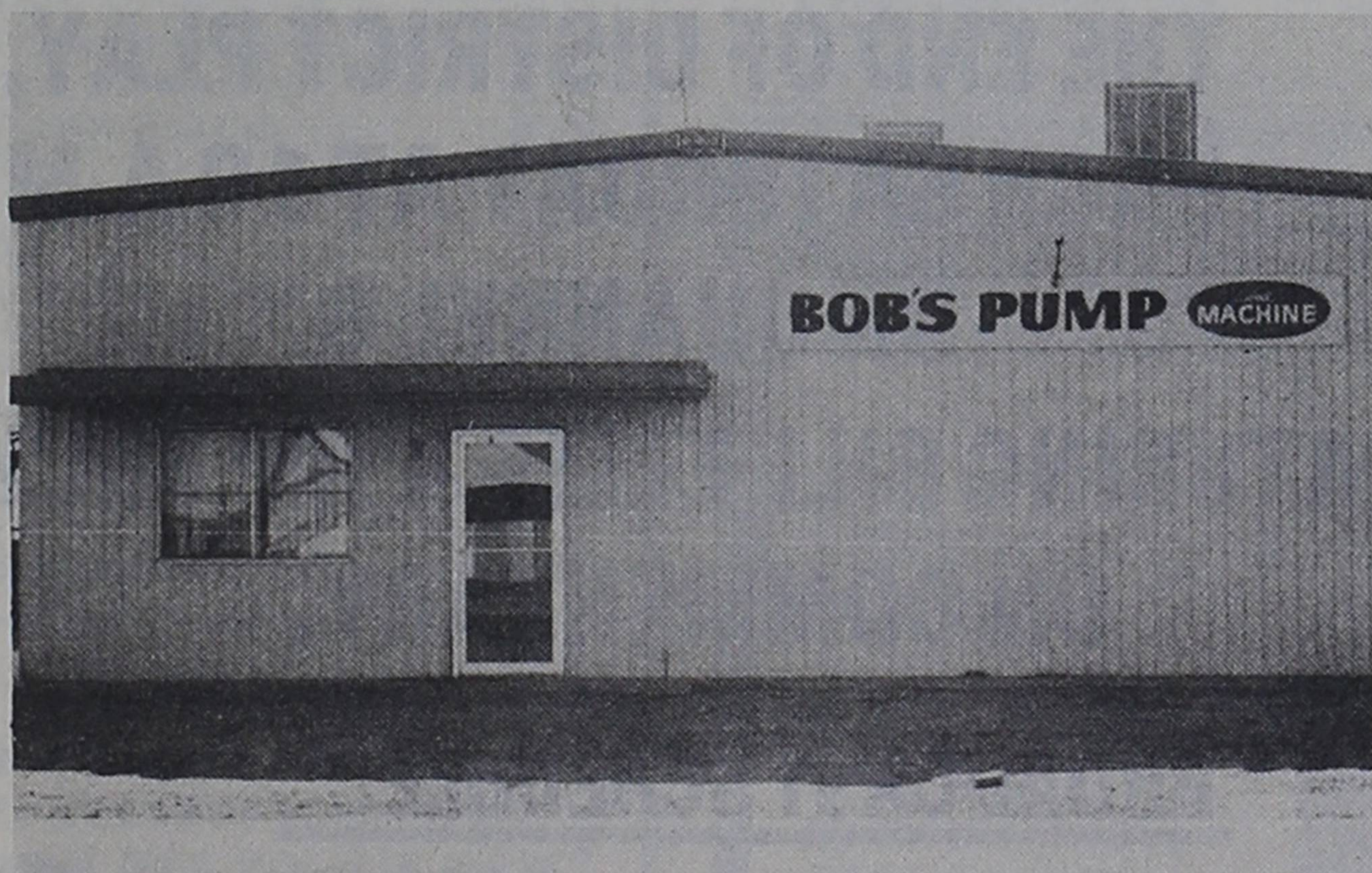

Lead-Line Show Set In Hereford

In conjunction with the 1984 Hereford Young Farmers Junior Livestock Show, the third annual Lady's Lead-Line Show has been scheduled for Friday, January 27 at 7 p.m.

This contest is open to any female 4-H, FFA, or FHA member, age 8 to 19, residing in either Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer or Oldham counties. The participants will enter by divisions of age: Juniors (8-10), Intermediates (11-13) and Seniors (14-19).

With one of the main objectives in the Lady's Lead-Line competition being the promotion of wool in the making of garments, contestants are required to construct and model a woolen garment, preferably of 100 per cent wool (minimum 60 per cent wool blend). They also must show a ewe or wether lamb, trained to lead with halter. The lamb must be show blocked and not sheared like a club lamb. Participants need not own the animal they intend to show, however, they must be responsible for its fitting and grooming prior to the show that evening. The sheep may be colored, costumed or trimmed as the exhibitor desires, and Seniors are discouraged to use costumes. Accessories for the show may be purchased (i.e.: gloves, hats, boots), but the garment must be homemade since November 19, 1983.

Participants in the show need to provide their own male escort, who will show the lamb as they model for the Fashion Show portion of the contest.

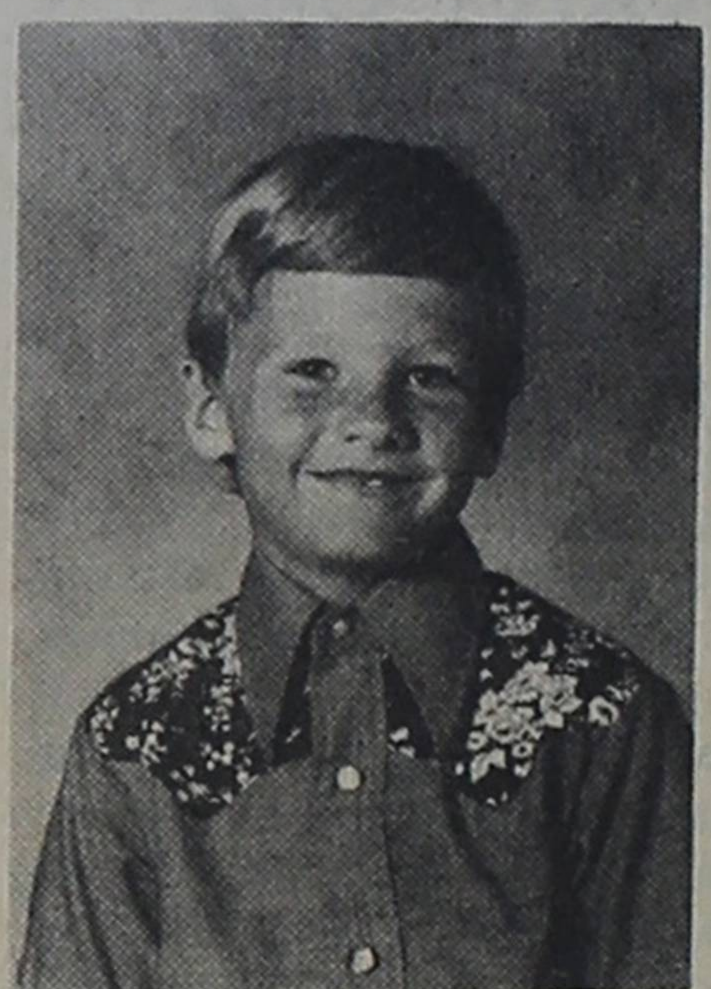

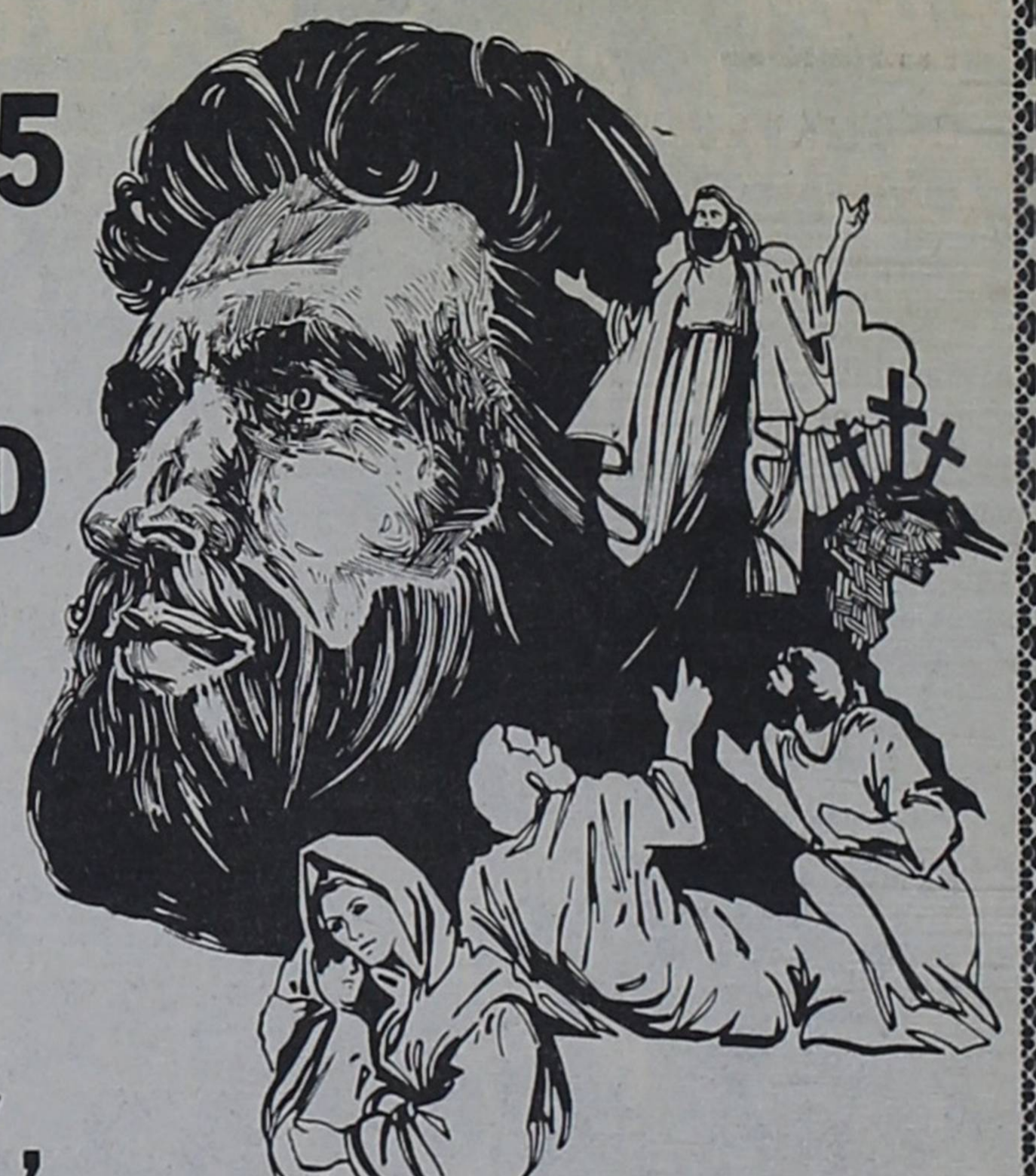

Girl Scouts Can Earn Patch On History

Girl Scouts in Caprock Council will have an opportunity to earn a Women Are History patch, now available through the council service center for girls who complete the requirements.

Developed by Field Director Kathy Hunt, the requirements are designed to help the girls of today discover the scope and contributions of women's everchanging roles. It is intended to encourage the exploration and preservation of the past, enhance the present, and add awareness for the future.

The Southwest Collection at Texas Tech University has agreed to work with troops on research in various areas. Contact person at the Southwest Collection is Rebecca J. Herring, assistant archivist.

Brownie Girl Scouts are required to complete six activities: Juniors, eight; Cadettes and Seniors, ten. They should include at least one activity in each of the four sections: Girl Scout History; Women's Life Styles-Past,

Present and Future; Keepers of History and Help Preserve History.

The Girl Scout History section includes a study of Caprock Council history, an activity from an old Girl Scout handbook, making a troop quilt, making a history display, and reading about Juliette Gordon Low or Olave Baden-Powell.

The Life Styles section has eight possible requirements, including comparing old and new ads for women's products, experiencing part of a woman's life in the past by learning old crafts and procedures such as making soap or candles or learning to knit, crochet or embroider.

In the Keepers of History section, the girls must listen to oral history tapes, read through old manuscripts, research some of the early activities of women and their clubs in the area, or research how children's lives have changed.

To complete requirements in the

Help Preserve History section, girls will tape oral histories of women in their communities, interview their mothers, learn of the experiences of a "pioneer woman" in the community by interviewing her, by tracing her own family tree, or by visiting an historical site in the community and learning about the women who lived there.

A list of resources is given with the details of the requirements which can be obtained at the Caprock Girl Scout service center, 2567-74th Street, Lubbock.

The design of the patch is a silhouetted profile of Wonder Woman on a yellow background with a red border. The patch project was inspired by the Wonder Woman Foundation which has funded Girl Scout conferences on Women's history. The Wonder Woman Foundation was formed by Warner Communication and D.C. Comics, Inc.

The team fell to Levelland, 59-31 in the opening round, and to Tulia, 48-36 on Friday.

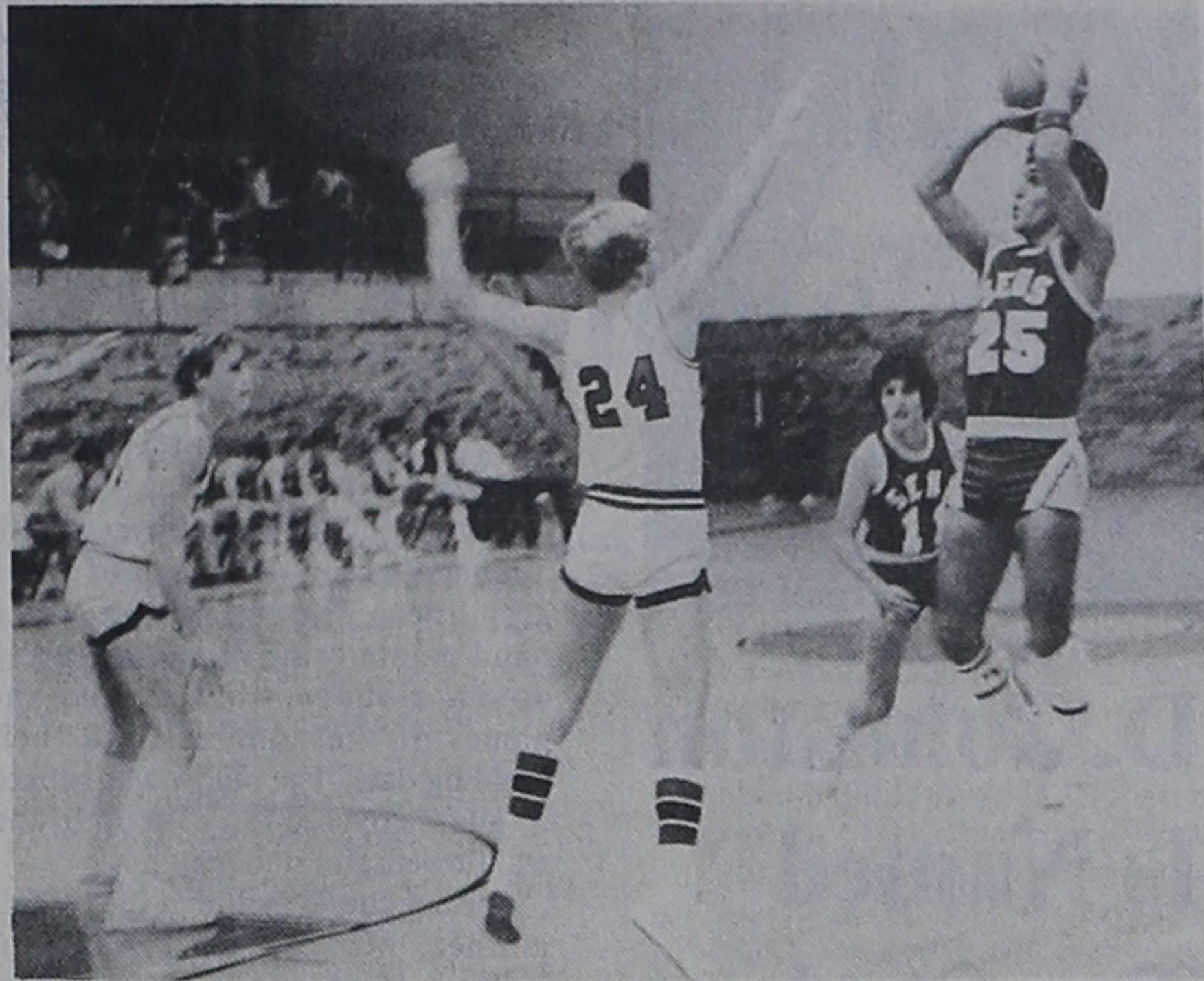
Shy Burney scored 12 points to lead the team's scoring against Levelland, and Jeff Dickson scored nine against Tulia.
