Floyd County folks attending this year's God's Country production will see quite a few familiar faces on the

The popular and original prairie drama, held in the beautiful Blanco Canyon amphitheater, features the alents of many local Thespians including: Connie Bertrand, Jaynette Harrison, Gary Brown, Jon Jones, Jurahee Jones, Linda Jones and Mabry Greenhaw.

Bertrand had landed the lead, playing the part of Elizabeth Smith (Aunt Hank). Jaynette Harrison is Mrs. Dumont, a traveling seamstress who repairs the uniform of Texas Rangers.

Jon Jones has multiple roles, including singing in two duets and in a group sing. He plays a Quaker and is an outlaw in another scene.

Gary Brown just recently joined the ranks (after only a couple of nights of rehearsal) as Judge George Swink.

Jurahee Jones is the Lavender cowgirl, a Quaker child in a school scene and also a stand-in for the dizzy woman in the revival scene.

Linda Jones plays the wife of Captain Roberts, of the Texas Rangers.

Until a illness this week Mabry Greenhaw played the part of Capt. Roberts.

"The cast and crew has had several obstacles to overcome this year," said Connie Bearden.

"First the character of Mr. Murry fell of his old timey bicycle and sprained his ankle. Then during a technical rehearsal, Mark Teel and Jon Jones fell off of a horse galloping away in a robbery scene. Jon was shaken up but Mark broke his cheek, and ended up having to have reconstructive surgery.

"We made a banner for him which said, "Mark-we said 'break a leg'. not your face!"

The cast has been further shaken with the recent illness of Mabry Greenhaw, the local manager of Production Credit. Greenhaw, who has a major part in the play, suffered a heart

But the show must go on. Once again the cast and crew went into local playing more than one role or with actors who have performed in the Continued On Page 7

Morales attorney seeks hearing in federal court

misdemeanor cases filed against eration to the Grand Jury. Morales in Floyd County Court moved to federal court.

Holloway contends in his motion that Morales cannot receive a fair trial in Floydada because the defendant believes his rights under the "First, Fifth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments.... will be violated" by this prosecution.

Holloway further contends Morales' rights could not be enforced in Floyd County because, "the State of Texas by statute, custom, practice and usage supports and maintains a policy of racial discrimination."

Amado Morales, 42, a trustee with the Floydada ISD, and a former city councilman, was indicted June 21, by Floyd County Grand Jurors, for violations of the Election Code, Class B and Class C misdemeanors.

The case was presented to Grand Jurors by Adrienne M. McFarland, Assistant Attorney General and a Prosecutor Assistant in the Special Investigations Division.


> The Grand Jury probe resulted in the Class B misdemeanor charge of "Unlawfully Acting as Agent", and a Class C misdemeanor or "Purportedly Acting as a Volunteer Deputy Registrar", both violations of the Election Code.

> Although Grand Jurers normally return only felony indictments, they can, as was done in this case, order the District Clerk to transfer indictments to the County Court.

According to McFarland, "the election law states that an agent has to be either the applicant's spouse, parent or child. The agent can then complete and sign voter registration applications and submit them.

"To act as a deputy registrar you must have an application on file. The actual duties of the registrar are to distribute voter registration cards, and/or to receive actual registration applications and return them to the

Holloway's petition lays the groundwork for what he and his client perceive as a history of civil rights Continued On Page 2

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

Federal hearing sought in Morales election fraud case

Continued From Page 1 violations against Amado Morales,

Holloway states that Morales' father, Francisco Morales, headed the movement to desegregate Floydada schools in the 1960's and was also the plaintiff in the redistricting lawsuit in

Floydada. The petition outlines several encounters Morales has had with the Floydada Police Department including the June 1989 proposal (while he was a City Councilman) to eliminate the Floydada Police Department; an investigation concerning a charge of assault by Morales (which was later determined to be false); and a 1989 criminal investigation of alleged violations of the election code (which was no-billed by the Grand Jury).

Morales was elected City Councilman in 1988. In January 1994 he announced his intentions to seek the position of County Commissioner

He defeated incumbent Howard Gene Bishop in the March 8, 1994 Democratic Primary.

With no Republican contender to face in the November election, Morales resigned his position on the city council, May 1994. However, a successful write-in campaign, by Jon Jones, defeated Morales in the November general election.

It was during the 1994 campaign that these election code violations were allegedly made.

Holloway states in his petition that, 'a pattern of significant political gains by Hispanics followed by criminal investigations and prosecutions is clear: In 1988, investigations and a threatened prosecution followed the first election of Hispanics to City Council; and in 1994, the current prosecution was prompted by the possibility that Hispanic participation would be extended to the County Commissioner's Court."

Assistant Attorney General McFarland was out of her office and could not be reached for comment.

Court approves 1995 tax roll

The Floyd County Commissioners Court reviewed and approved the 1995 tax roll as presented by Chief Appraiser Shelia Faulkenberry. The total taxable value of the 1995 tax roll was placed at \$264,698,209.00.

Motion to accept the tax role as presented was made by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden. It was seconded by Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones. Voting in favor were Bearden, Jones, Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy, and Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor.

Based on the new tax appraisal figures, the county will have an effective tax rate of \$0.3786 per \$100.00 of valuation. This rate would generate the same tax revenue as the \$0.40 per \$100.00 did for the 1994 tax year. No action was taken concerning the tax rate at this time.

The commissioners also discussed the intersection where FM 378 and FM 97 cross. Several accidents involving personal injury and property damage have been investigated by the Lockney Police Department, the Floyd County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers. At least one fatality has occurred at the intersection according to Commissioner Gilroy.

He presented a resolution for approval by the court. The resolution asks that the current traffic control of two way stopping on FM 378 be changed to a four-way stop or fourway flashing lights. The resolution making the request will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Transportation for possible action based on the heavy traffic at the intersection and the high speed limits on the two highways at the west edge of Lockney.

Motion to approve the resolution was made by Gilroy and seconded by Taylor. The motion carried unanimously.







Council discusses possible improvements at airport

Dr. Charles Craig, a member of the Airport Board who was present at the meeting said, "We have a fine airport, but I think it would be wise to at least express an interest in the improvements and see if we could secure it. Otherwise they will just let somebody else have the money.

"These improvements could make a difference in the type of aircraft that could come in. A wider runway would help with cross wind landings and a longer runway would bring in larger aircraft."

"Very little money is generated for the city by the airport, but I still think we ought to try," said Carthel. "It might help later on in attracting some businesses. We are being considered now because we have been on the list for several years and we have finally worked our way up the ladder."

A vote was taken on the resolution and all councilmen present voted in favor of pursuing the project.

Brown also reviewed his ongoing discussions with the Floydada/Plainview Railroad. "I told the railroad representatives that I would have a deed prepared if they would just sign it," said Brown. "They have not re-

Brown has been acting on behalf of the city to urge the Floydada/Plainview Railroad to clean up the weeds and trash on the railroad property that comes through the city.

"I also want to make the same offer to Burlington-Northern Railroad," said Brown.

"I think we should send them strongly worded letters to begin with," said Schacht, "and get this ball rolling. I'm tired of this mess. They need to clean it up. It is dangerous."

After discussion the councilmen agreed to authorize City Attorney Karen Houchin to pursue any legal alternatives the city might have.

Kyle Minnix, representing the Floydada Baseball Association apsented them with a financial statement from the baseball association. The statement listed the associations budget this year compared to previous years and also listed the income and expenses.

Minnix showed the councilmen that the ending cash in the bank at the close of the season was \$5,125.53 in 1993 and a loss of \$55.59 in 1992. \$10.00.

The net income for the association was \$5,119.08 in 1995, a loss of \$196.31 in 1994, a profit of \$258.35 in 1993 and a loss of \$1,393.79 in

Minnix was also joined at the meeting with other association leaders, Bart Greer and Kevin Tipton. The three thanked the city for their contribution to the baseball association and then asked the city to consider doing something about the lack of restroom facilities at the field.

Brown told the association that the city was currently working with the school district to add on to the concession stand and open up bathrooms.

Minnix also stated that the association would like to have a uniformed officer walk through the grounds on game nights. "Parents turn their kids loose and expect the field to be a babysitter," said Minnix. "Maybe a uniform officer appearing occasionally would help keep fights from

The councilman asked Minnix to speak to Police Chief James Hale about the request.

Minnix also presented several other requests to the city asking for help in field maintenance. Brown and the councilmen agreed to use the city resources in whatever way was pos-

Brown reported to the councilmen that the cable company that services Floydada will be rebuilding and upgrading their service soon. He also told the council that he believed the cable company would be interested in a proposal that would allow the city to service the cable and collect the fees for service at the city office.

Brown also reported to the council about a visit with Carol McDonald, a representative from SPS, concerning Floydada Power and Light generating ability. Brown was told that FP&L was better able to meet our generating needs than other cities whom S.P.S. services.







LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (MULTI-CHILD)

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Parent/Guardian:

The Floydada School serves meals each school day. Elementary Children may buy lunch for \$1.25 and breakfast for .40 cents. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price. For Secondary, Children may buy lunch for \$1.35 and breakfast for .60 cents.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your child gets free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your child can get free meals or reduced-priced meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-priced meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is .40 cents for lunch and .30 cents for breakfast.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and

an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and the adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, becoming unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

Wasp tests on boll weevils set to begin in SRP cotton fields

fire," is being tested in the cotton boll weevil eradication program. More correctly, it's "fight insects with insects.'

The first large-scale tests of fighting the boll weevil with a small, parasitic wasp are under way in the Southern Rolling Plains. The wasp, Catolaccus Grandis, is a natural predator of the boll weevil.

"It has a life cycle somewhat similar to the boll weevil," said Randy Coleman, an entomologist with the United States Department of Agriculture Research Service. Coleman works in the Subtropical Agriculture Research Laboratory in Weslaco.

Coleman explained that the female adult wasp seeks out boll weevil larvae growing and feeding inside cotton squares (young cotton bolls, or fruit). The adult female wasp "stings" the boll weevil larvae through the wall of the square. She then lays an egg on or near the larvae. The egg hatches after about a day and the wasp larvae attaches itself to the boll weevil and feeds as it grows. After the wasp larvae pupates, it eats its way out of the cotton square and repeats the life

Coleman said the parasitic wasp has been effective on a smaller scale, but it remains to be seen how well it will do on the larger scale. The wasp will be released in the SRP on 134 acres of organic cotton. To keep its certification, the organic cotton can't be sprayed with chemicals, thus the wasp experiment.

The wasp study will take about 8-10 weeks with thousands of wasps being released. The study will release 250 female wasps per acre, per re-

The old saying, "Fight fire with lease. The wasps will be released on each acre twice a week, that's 67,000 wasps each week. But, don't worry, Coleman said the wasps are small and don't sting anything but boll weevils.

With this many wasps released over several weeks, where does the study get all the wasps?

The wasps are reared by the USDA Mission Biological Control Center in Mission. Leeda Wood, the entomologist who oversees the wasp rearing, said production of the insects has quadrupled in preparation for the releases

The center is rearing about 105,000 female wasps per week. The wasps are reared on boll weevil larvae shipped in from a lab in Starkville, Miss. The boll weevil larvae are placed in parafilm sheets where female wasps lay their eggs, much like a cotton boll.

Once the wasp larvae begin to pupate, they are removed and shipped to the Texas A&M center in San Angelo where they are prepared for

The overall field study will help show how effective the wasp is against the boll weevil compared to the program insecticide applications, which use ultra low volume

"These (organic) fields will be compared against regular program fields," Coleman said. "We'll monitor the weevil numbers in the release fields and an appropriate number of program fields.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation will provide boll weevil traps and staff to monitor the traps in the wasp release and regular program

Endangered Species Act next

Now that the state has guaranteed property rights protection, local farmers are turning their attention to the national scene and the Endangered Species Act.

"The interpretation and over zealous enforcement of the Endangered Species Act is a major threat to property rights," said Mark McCormick, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

McCormick said many farmers and ranchers have lost use and value of their land because it has been designated habitat for some endangered species.

"We need an Endangered Species Act that recognizes the rights of property owners and emphasizes voluntar species management,"McCormick said. "We do not want to repeal the Act, but reforming it is very important to us."

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Farmers and ranchers eligible for 1994 disaster emergency loans

Floyd County farmers (and ranchers) may be eligible for emergency loans to help cover losses they sustained as a result of the (drought/late freeze/flood, etc.) during 1994, according to Becky Rainer, Rural Economic and Community Development

Mrs. Rainer said that any farmer who denied an emergency loan or discouraged from applying for a loan because he or she did not have crop insurance for the 1994 crop might be eligible for a loan since the crop insurance requirement for 1994 has been waived by the agency.

"Any farmer (or rancher) in that category who is interested in a loan should visit the RECD county office as soon as possible," Mrs. Rainer said. "In any case, they must apply no later than August 25." However, no application may be accepted after the 8month termination date for the particular disaster.

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
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
