sects." The first large-scale tests of fight ing the boll weevil with a small, paraern Rolling Plains. The wasp Catolaccus Grandis, is a natural predator of the boll weevil. "It has a life cycle somewhat simi ar to the boll weevil," said Randy
Coleman, an entomologist with the United States Department of Agriculture Research Service. Coleman works in the Subtropical Agricultur Research Laboratory in Weslaco.
Coleman explained that the femal adult wasp seeks out boll weevil larvae growing and feeding inside cotlon squares (young cotton bolls, o
fruit). The adult female ruit). The adult female wasp "stings of the square. She then lays an egg on or near the larvae. The egg hatches after about a day and the wasp larvae
attaches itself to the boll weevil and feeds as it grows. After the wasp lar vae pupates, it eats its way out of the
cotton square and repeats the life

Coleman said the parasitic wasp
has been effective has been effective on a smaller scale,
but it remains to be seen how well will do on the larger scale. The wasp will be released in the SRP on 134 acres of organic cotton. To keep its
