Club Launches Annual Project

Modern Study Club will sponsor "Project Christmas Card" in Friona for the 28th consecutive year, it was announced this week.

The project benefits Parmer County Community Hospital during the Christmas season each year, and in the course of its previous 27 years has raised over \$56,000 to purchase equipment for the local hospital.

Equipment which cost over \$41,500 has been provided in the past twelve years by gifts to the project. Last year the project raised just over \$4,000, which was used to purchase a warming unit for the hospital's delivery room.

Laverne Burrow, chairman of Project Christmas Card for 1983, said that the money raised this year will go to provide heating and cooling for the hospital's X-Ray lab.

Residents of the area are requested each year by Modern Study Club to donate to the fund rather than mailing Christmas cards to local friends.

Names of those contributing are published on a full-page in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star, as a community-wide greeting to everyone in the area, as well as those outside the area who receive the paper. The Star donates the full page to the project each year.

Donations may be left at Friona State Bank. Club members were also placing containers and posters at a number of local businesses, where residents may leave their donations.

Deadline for donating to the fund and being a part of this year's project will be Friday, December 16.

There is no set amount for the donations, but families are requested to donate at least the amount of money they would normally spend on Christmas cards and postage, mailing to friends and relatives.

Mrs. Burrow, chairman of the 1983 project, has as members of her committee Sherri Taylor and Mary Moseley.

In recent years, the project fund has purchased a heart monitoring unit, automatic beds for the new hospital wing, heating and air conditioning for the emergency and surgery rooms, fire alarm system for the building and an anesthetic machine.

Also, a Coulter counter, a monitor for the surgery room, a spirometer (a device to measure pulmonary functions for lung patients), I. V. drip counters, a table and carts for the operating room and a new light for the emergency room.

Beginning in 1970, the project has selected a particular object or need for its funds, and in that time has purchased equipment costing roughly \$44,000.

Project Christmas Card has become a fine way for residents of the area, and even former residents, to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends, and at the same time assist Parmer County Community Hospital.

County Funds Invested By Commissioners

Funds were re-invested by Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting November 14.

At the suggestion of Benna Felts, County Treasurer, \$150,000 in general fund money was re-invested in a certificate of deposit to mature December 30, 1983, and \$160,000 of Farm to Market money was invested to mature on the same date.

Another CD, in the amount of \$165,000, from Right-of-Way funds, to be divided between Precincts 1, 2 and 4. This was done to make up for \$74,614.45 in funds expended to clear

right-of-way for paving of 5.2 miles of road in Precinct 3.

An additional \$25,000 in ROW funds was invested, to mature on December 30.

Discussion was held on bids received for a motorgrader for Precinct 4. The bid was awarded to Deckard Equipment Company of Amarillo, in the amount of \$87,438.

Dr. Catherine Crawford, area supervisor for the Extension Service, met with the court to discuss the replacement of County Agent Seth Ralston.

When the advertising time is completed, Dr. Crawford will present names to the court.

Boarding care bills were approved for the county's foster children in the amount of \$2,142.10, which amount will be re-imbursed the county.

Expenses of a visiting judge, in the amount of \$42.83, were approved.

A bill for the funeral of an indigent was approved from Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home, in the amount of \$200.

Payment of dues to the Texas Association of Counties, in the amount of \$820, was also approved.

Fund Drive Hits 78 Pct.

Friona's United Way drive had reached 78 per cent of its goal as of Wednesday, November 23.

A total of \$9764.95 had been deposited. "We are still lacking seven or eight residential areas, two rural areas and a couple of pace-setters," said Kathryn Goddard, co-chairman.

Bobby Davis Holds Slim Lead

Bobby Davis holds a slim, two-point lead over Ron Smiley going into the final week of the Friona Star football contest. Davis has a score of 169, and Smiley 167 prior to the final weekend of the annual event.

Two other contestants who have been in the running all along, Steve Williams and Patches Fleming, still have a shot at winning, but will have to pick some upsets to turn the trick.

Williams is five points back in third place at 164, and Fleming is fourth at 163.

Kevin Beavers, Tommy Moss and Tom Johnson are next at 162, and will really need a "miracle finish" to win the grand prize.

In case of a tie for the top spot, tie-breaker scores will be consulted for the contestants involved, and the contestant with the lowest cumulative score will be declared the winner.

Grand prize winner will receive

\$100 cash in the annual contest.

In last week's weekly contest, Smiley emerged the winner, being the only entrant to correctly pick 17 of the contest games. He was awarded \$10 cash for his efforts.

For the ump-teenth time this season, a tie game resulted among the games included on the contest, when a late field goal by Penn State tied Pittsburgh University in the college ranks. Thus, every contestant had a "wrong" game for number seven.

This was balanced off somewhat when contestants were given a "right" answer for game number 13, which was listed as LSU vs Tulane. This game was not played until Thanksgiving night, so was counted right on everyone's entry blank.

Two other contestants, Elizabeth McLellan and Doug Massey, correctly picked 16 games, and they took second and third place in the

weekly contest.

Mrs. McLellan, who was a weekly winner earlier in the season, took second by missing the Dallas-Kansas City tie-breaker score by 18 points. She picked the Cowboys, 30-14, missing Dallas' score by 11 and Kansas City's by seven. Massey had chosen an even lower score of 21-17, and was 24 points away from the actual score of 41-21.

Six contestants correctly picked 15 games in the contest, missing by one a possible cash prize. They were Bobby Davis, Eddie Gauna, Hal Ratcliff, Lewie Martin, Kenneth McLellan and Jim Pope of Quanah.

Besides the tie game, Smiley missed Notre Dame-Air Force, Green Bay-Detroit, Pittsburgh-Minnesota and San Francisco-Atlanta. All four of these games were upsets, with Detroit winning in overtime, and Atlanta beating the 49ers on a final play.

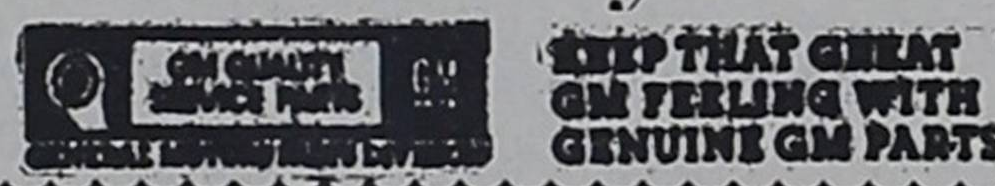

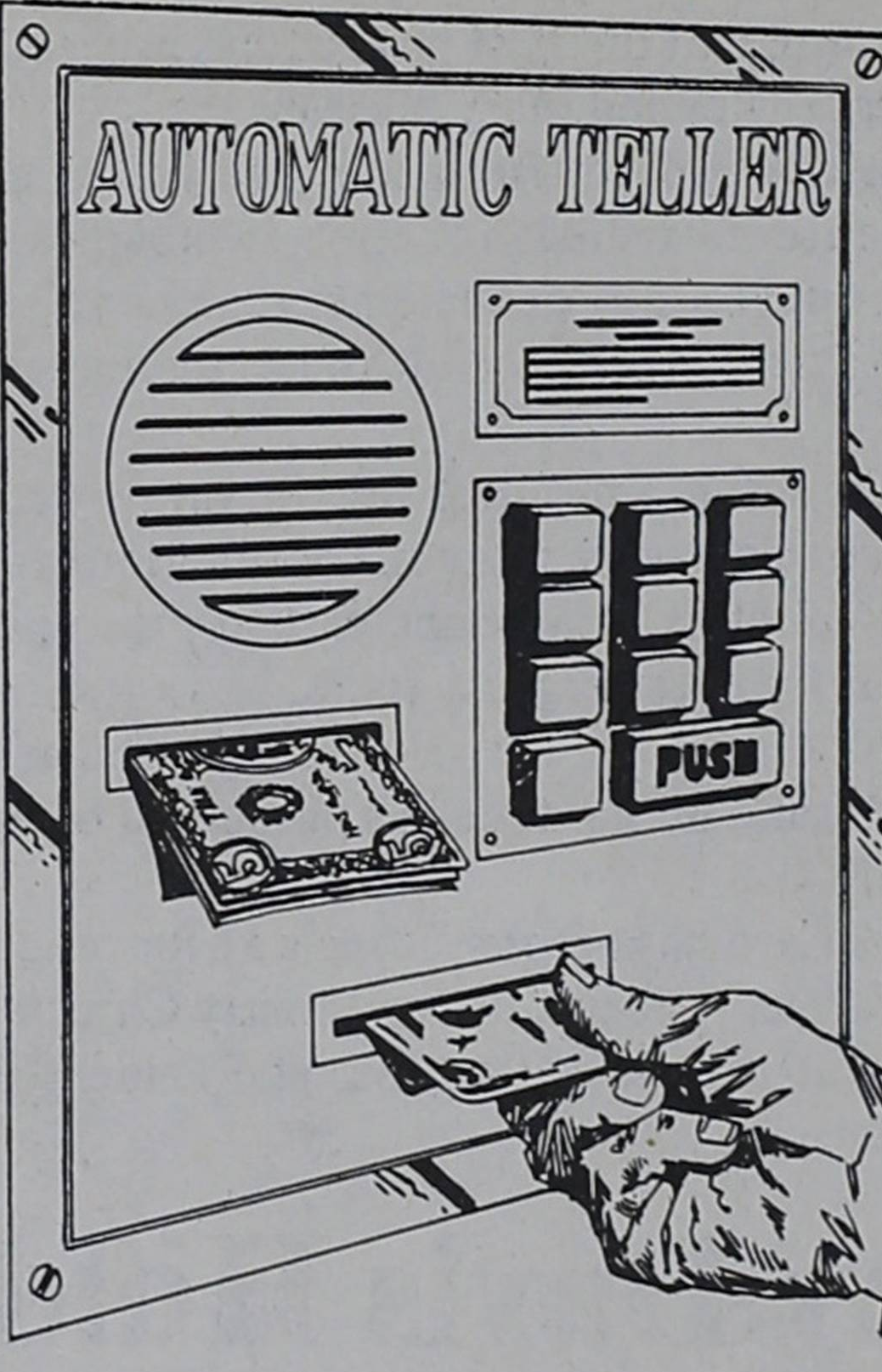

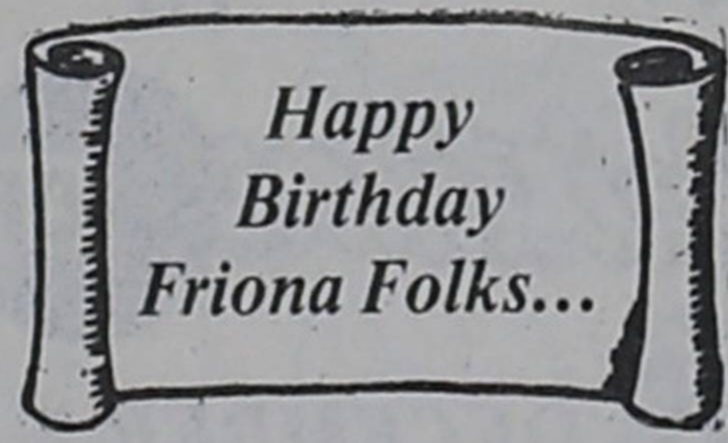

Price Hedging Slated As Meeting Topic

The second phase of the Bailey County Hedging Shortcourse will be held on the nights of December 5 and 6 at the Bailey County Coliseum starting at 7 p.m. each night. Dr. Roland Smith, marketing specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, will direct these two training sessions.

The objectives of hedging can be classified in three major categories: (1) to hedge at a price higher than the ultimate cash market price; (2) to reduce the risk of unfavorable price changes; and (3) to use hedged prices in making profitable management decisions. The success or failure of a hedge, as viewed by the hedger, will depend to a large extent on which of these objectives is most important.

The three steps to a successful hedge are: (1) estimating production costs and arrive at a target price to which the producers are willing to sell; (2) localizing the futures price to determine what the local price will be offering at time of sale; and (3) making the decision to hedge or not hedge at a given price level based on the hedger's pricing objective.

While the mechanics of hedging are fairly easy to understand, successful hedging is not a simple matter. This is the sole purpose of the training

provided at this educational program to help each producer better understand how to use hedging as a successful marketing tool. Dr. Smith is very knowledgeable of this subject matter and participants should benefit from this meeting.

The meeting is free and open to the public and everyone is invited to attend. This program is being sponsored by the following groups: Federal Land Bank, Production Credit Association, First National Bank, Muleshoe State Bank and Bailey County Extension Service.

Brent Hinkle Honored As Top FHS Student

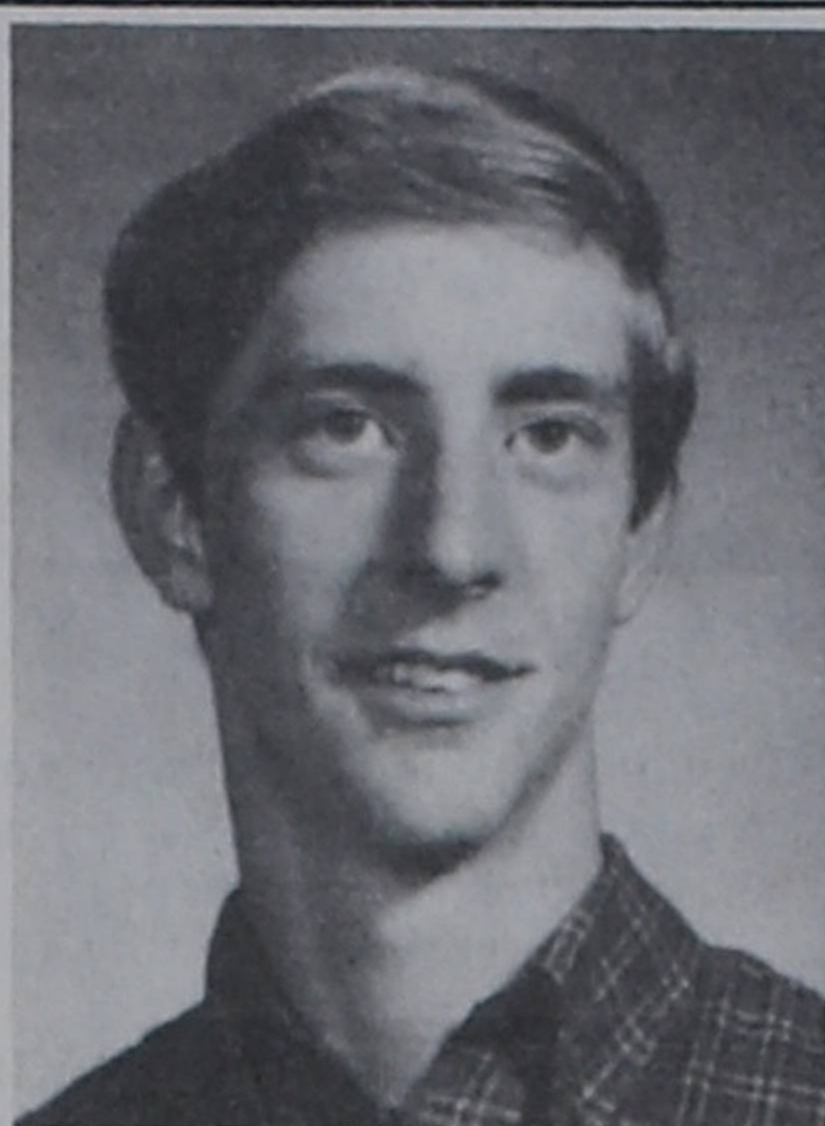
Brent Hinkle, Friona High School junior, has been named "Student of the Month" by the Friona Teachers' Organization.
