

Historical finds prove presence of Coronado

The dogged determination of local historians and amateur and professional archeologists has brought enough attention to archeological finds in Floyd County to warrant a shovel survey of Blanco Canyon this past weekend.

Approximately 35 archeologists and students from around Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and Kansas, converged in a part of Blanco Canyon for a four day dig. The archeologists had hopes of recovering more evidence that the 1541 expedition of Spanish explorer Francisco V. de Coronado came through Blanco Canyon, in Floyd County, and camped in this area. What they found convinced them to come back. The chain of events leading to this

current archeological dig began with a chain mail gauntlet (three fingered glove), which was found by Burl Daniel in the 1960's. The find was later recorded in a Feb. 17, 1966 story in the Floyd County Hesperian.

Daniel kept the gauntlet in his possession and moved from Floyd County taking the gauntlet with him. In 1963, another Floydadan, J.S. Hale Jr., found what was believed to be a piece of a chain mail vest in a gully feeding south to White River (Blanco Canyon). This vest was also possibly associated with the Coronado expedition. This vest was later stolen during a move to a new home in 1965 and has never been recovered.

After reading the story, Marble remembered the 1966 story of the chain mail glove in the Floyd County Hesperian. She began immediately trying to locate Mr. Daniel who was now living in New Mexico. On June 29, 1991 the gauntlet was in the possession of the Floyd County Historical Museum.

Later in 1991, a local archeology enthusiast, Jimmy Owens, found two other objects in the same area; both of them crossbow projectile points, one of iron and one of copper.

The copper point is of a material and construction which is identical to crossbow boltheads (dart points) recovered archeologically at Hawikuh, Santiago Pueblo, and Pecos Pueblo, all places visited by the Coronado expedition.

The gauntlet and other finds peeked the interest of archeologist Donald J. Blakeslee, who returned to the area later in 1991 and studied the items which had been found. He decided then that a shovel survey was in order and organized the group which arrived on the Labor Day weekend.

Blakeslee believes that the traditional view of Coronado's expedition making their "barranca", or summer home, in the Caprock Canyons (part of the Palo Duro Canyons) is wrong.

Occasional historical finds do not in and of themselves prove that Coronado's expedition camped in Blanco Canyon. It is possible that Indians, or someone else, dropped the pieces after they were stolen from another location.

It is up to the archeologist to prove that the finds are not isolated incidents. One way they do this is by locating more than one piece of the same time period and close to each other. On Sunday afternoon Blakeslee said, "I will be happy if we find one more copper point-in place.'

He was not disappointed.

Excitement built over the weekend dig as more and more evidence was surfaced. Besides a 9,000 year old spear point (also known as a Plainview point) other found pieces dating to the 1500's were pottery shards, a four bladed stone knife, and a metal trade awl (straight needle). Owens also found bits of Spanish horseshoe and Spanish nails.

However one of the biggest finds, and the one which Blakeslee was looking for, came from another archeology enthusiast, Ray Macha, of Providence.

Searching with Owens, in the same general location of other significant finds, Macha came across a copper arrow point from a bolt (the arrow fired from a crossbow). "Coronado was the only expedition known to be out here with crossbows," said Macha. "Jimmy Owens is the only other person who has ever found one of







Floydada Airport receives grants for improvements

The City of Floydada has been awarded a \$1 million state grant for improvements to the city's airport.

The money will be used to acquire property, improve paved surfaces and lighting.

Funding will be a combination of 90 percent state and 10 percent local funds.

The grant was approved by the Texas Transportation Commission at its meeting in San Angelo on Aug. 31.

The Floydada project was one of 49 projects at general aviation airports around the state receiving a total of \$34.9 million in grants approved by the state transportation commission.

"These projects will help us achieve our overall aviation goals; improving safety, preserving existing facilities and meeting existing and anticipated needs," said David Bernsen, commis-

sion member. "I'm pleased we could address the needs in Floydada."

To obtain the grant money, Floydada will have to match the grant with \$100,000 of local funds," said Floydada City Manager Gary Brown. The airport board is in the process of working with various entities for

matching grants. According to Brown, the matching grants can be from "in-kind services", such as labor, equipment, land and professional services.

TxDOT receives, disburses and administers federal and state funds for general aviation airports and is responsible for helping small communities build, maintain and upgrade airports. The projects are funded with varying combinations of Federal Aviation Administration, state and local money.



believed to be from the Pueblo period of the 1540's have also been located in the past seven years.

Word surmises that the pottery pieces can be explained by an account in one of Coronado's journals of a severe hail storm that occurred during an encampment.

"Apparently he spent the night and was hailed out down in the canyon," Word said. "That's why we find all the broken pottery and stuff. The horses stampeded but they couldn't get out of the canyon because there wasn't any easy way out, so they didn't lose them. But all the pottery they had accumulated from the

Flint concluded, "I think that Blanco Canyon may very well be Coronado's first barranca and the Montgomery location or the Extensive fragments of pottery Floydada Country Club Site or some other yet unknown nearby Garza Complex site may be the first Teyas village."

> "We are going to have to raise more money to pay for a more thorough excavation of this area," said Blakeslee. "A week-end summer dig is not enough. These people are all volunteering their time and they have to get back to work after the Labor Day holiday."

'See You At The Pole' GH THE HALLS See You At The Pole expected to draw crowd

"See You at the Pole," the world's largest simultaneous youth prayer event, is expected to draw more than 100,000 high school and junior high school students throughout Texas to pray around their schools' flagpoles, Sept. 20 at 7 a.m.

Launched by Texas Baptists in 1990, "See You at the Pole" has spread around the world and is expected to involve millions of students from all Christian denominations in 1995, according to Chuck Flowers, youth associate in the Texas Baptist Evangelism Division.

"We sought to pioneer a way for students to present a visible, bold witness of their faith on their school campuses within the boundaries of the nation's legal system," Flowers said.

"We did not know if there would be a lasting impact, but out of that first See You at the Pole came prayer groups continuing throughout the school year.

"Many students reported a renewed encouragement when they discovered there were other believers on the campuses they had not known about."

Last year more than 2 million students participated in the event in the U.S. and in Russia, Canada, Singapore, the Philippines, Guatemala, Taiwan, Saipan, Austria, Alba-

nia, Romania, Belgium and other countries on six continents.

Adults also participated, praying around the flagpoles at city halls and other public locations.

"More than 75 denominations and ministries help promote "See You at the Pole," but it is students who injtiate, organize and lead in prayer at the flagpole, said Flowers.

"Students will pray Sept. 20 for their fellow students and teachers. asking for God's power over the violence, depression, hopelessness and other problems faced by their classmates," said Flowers.

He said churches should encourage students to participate as a public witness of their belief in God's power and the importance of prayer.

Flowers also noted that under the U.S. Constitution, students are guaranteed the right to pray on campus, alone or with others, so long as it does not disrupt school activities and is not forced on others.

See You at the Pole must be student-led, before school hours and outside of any school building, he added.

"The prayers of our young people--missionaries to the neglected mission fields of our nation--are making a difference."







On or before September 25, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company will mail ballots to all customers in the Floydada exchange. After marking the ballot. customers should sign their name and return the ballot to the Public Utility Commission of Texas. A stamped self addressed envelope will be provided with the ballot.

If approved, all subscribers in the Floydada exchange will be charged an additional monthly per line charge up to \$3.50 for residence and \$7 for business, for five or fewer exchanges (not \$3.50 or \$7.00 for each of the first five exchanges). 

Ends 35 years of testing

Extension Service closes Soil Lab

After more than 35 years of providing scientifically and economically sound soil testing services to Texas High Plains producers, the South Plains Soil Testing Laboratory of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will close Sept. 1.

The laboratory handles from 8,000 to 12,000 soil and plant samples for crop producers and homeowners each year, said Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension Service soil chemist and director of the facility here. In addition to Hickey, the lab employs an office manager, two technicians and a part-time high school student from the cooperative agriculture program.

"Escalating costs of upgrading and replacing analytical equipment and operating the laboratory, coupled with reductions in state and federal funding, has not been offset by sufficient increase in the number of samples handled", said Dr. James R. Supak, associate head of the department of soil and crop sciences at Texas A&M University.

After Sept. 1, samples from the area now served by the Lubbock facility will be processed at the College Station laboratory. Supak said a 60-day phase down period at the Lubbock lab will allow completion of existing projects, transfer of equipment and closing of the facility. All operations at the facility will end Nov. 1.

Crop producers, ranchers and urban residents sending soil, water or forage samples to College Station will notice little difference in receipt of analyses and reports, Supak said. The College Station laboratory provides one-day turnaround upon receipt of soil samples; water and forage analyses take about a week.

"For almost four decades, the laboratory at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock has set the standards for sound soil testing services on the High Plains," Supak said. "But it is no longer feasible to equip, maintain and operate state-of-the-art facilities at both Lubbock and College Station."

The Lubbock facility was established in 1959 to serve an area that represents an estimated 43 percent of the state's total agricultural production and 54 percent of its total crop coverage,

Hickey said. The area it served produces 76 percent of the state's wheat, 75 percent of its cotton and 70 percent of its corn, he noted. It has had three directors during its continuous operation: James Valentine, Dr. Dale Pennington and Hickey.

The Lubbock lab was one of the first in the nation to recognize that nitrate nitrogen measurements in soil can be useful nitrogen fertilizer recommendations, and one of the first to incorporate that into sampling and analysis procedures, Hickey said.

"Soil testing techniques for phosphorous used by the A&M laboratories today were developed at Lubbock, in conjunction with scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station," he said.

The lab and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 evaluated area soil fertility and

identified that nitrogen and phosphorus were the nutrients which most limited cotton production on the Southern High Plains. A subsequent educational program initiated by the Lubbock soil chemist, the water district and county Extension agents improved crop fertilization. Together with improved irrigation management and variety selection this reversed the declining cotton production of the Southern High Plains, Hickey said.

For the past six years, Hickey and the Lubbock lab have been developing a cotton petiole monitoring program for area cotton producers, designed to improve the efficiency of nitrogen application.

"The bottom line is, it helps them get better use of their fertilizer and reduces environmental impact," Hickey said.

In conjunction with the Extension Service "Don't Bag It" lawn care program to reduce urban yard trash, Hickey and the Lubbock lab initiated a "Don't Bag It Soil Test Program" for urban residents. "It is designed to reduce the potential for urban environmental impact," Hickey said. The program has since been adopted by Oklahoma State University.

The lab has been working with irrigators to identify salinity problems in center pivot systems. It is involved in a cooperative program with the water district to quantify the extent and impact of that problem and find ways to alleviate it. For several years the lab has worked with the oil industry in reclaiming salt-affected soils.



Grain Sorghum Board seats open

Texas producers who grow grain sorghum have an opportunity this year to run for a seat on the Texas Grain Sorghum Board. Anyone who produces grain sorghum in Texas or who owns a farm in Texas on which grain sorghum is produced is eligible to vote in the election or to serve as a director on the board.

The fifteen member board administers the checkoff funds which are collected on grain sorghum grown in the state. An assessment of 16 cents per ton is collected and used to fund programs for research, insect and disease control, education and promotion of Texas grain sorghum.

Members of the Texas Grain Sor-

ghum Board represent every grain sorghum producing region in Texas. Under the assessment program, the state is divided into five districts having three representatives to the board. Directors are elected for terms of up to six years.

In this year's election, five directors will be elected to the board; one each from the West Texas district, the Central Texas district, the Panhandle district, the Coastal district and the Valley district.

To be listed on the ballot, a prospective director must submit a nomination form certifying that he or she resides in the district to be repre-
