Shurbet sues city and policeman

City council briefed on lawsuit

FLOYDADA — The City of Floydada recently received notification that a lawsuit has been filed against the city and a city police officer. City council members were briefed on the lawsuit during an executive session following the regular monthly meeting of the council on Thursday, November 16.

William R. Moss of Crenshaw, Dupree, & Milam law firm in Lubbock, has been retained by the city's insuring agency, Texas Municipal League, to handle the case on behalf of the city. A response to the law suit has not been filed by the city at this time.

According to public records, the suit was filed in the United States District Court, Northern District of Texas, Lubbock Division on October

25, 1995. The plaintiff is listed as Mendy Shurbet and defendants are listed as The City of Floydada, and Ernest Back.

The action against Back was brought for alleged false imprisonment and the city, as well as Back, is being sued for alleged violation of Shurbet's civil rights.

The litigation stems from the plaintiff's arrest on a charge of public intoxication May 14, 1994. The suit as filed states that Shurbet was taken to the Floyd County Jail, where "she was fingerprinted, photographed, strip-searched, and detained in a jail cell for approximately nine (9) hours."

Shurbet posted bail and was released, but according to the suit, "to date, criminal proceedings have not been pursued against the plaintiff."

The document alleges that the arrest and imprisonment violated Shurbet's civil rights without her consent and without probable cause. A fourth amendment violation was cited, alleging her right to be free of unreasonable arrest and failure to receive due process of law were violated.

Shurbet's suit requests compensation for out-of-pocket expenses of \$1,500.00 incurred as a result of her arrest and detention. In addition, the plaintiff is asking for compensation in the amount of \$250,000.00 in damages for "humiliation, public ridicule, loss of personal reputation, and emotional distress as a consequence of being arrested on the charge of public intoxication."

A jury trial has been requested as a

Inmates refurbish holiday lights

LOCKNEY—Refurbished Christmas decorations will soon be hanging from Lockney street lights, courtesy of Lockney Chamber of Commerce and inmates of the Wheeler Unit in Plainview.

The lights have been purchased over the years through citizen's donations and have deteriorated. After hearing about the inmates work in other communities in the South Plains, and wanting to restore the lights, the Chamber of Commerce approached Warden J.V. Young at the Wheeler Unit.

The lights were delivered to the prison and several inmates went to work on the project. The lights have now been transformed into a festive and lively decoration ready for the holiday season.

Grateful citizens are spreading the word and the Wheeler inmates are quickly gaining a good reputation for

the work they are performing throughout the surrounding communities.

According to Young, the inmates work daily with the City of Plainview Parks Department in the areas of park maintenance.

"They are currently redoing the ball parks for the Babe Ruth tournament the city will host next season," said Young.

"The inmates who work in the communities are the trustees," said Young. "They are hand selected and most volunteer for the projects. They have to be a certain type of inmate and they can't work in the community if they are from that community."

All inmates are under guard while working.

Trustees have also been responsible for assisting the City of Kress paint downtown buildings. They have scraped bleachers for the Bar None Rodeo in Plainview, put up

Cargill tents at Floydada's Punkin Days and cleaned the Fair Grounds for the Floyd County Fair in Lockney.

Hale County Commissioner Cantwell and Floyd County Commissioners Jon Jones and Lennie Gilroy, have all used the inmates for repairing roads and filling pot holes.

"We have had 90 trustees and it depends on their talents and skills on what jobs they will be given. Right now we do not have as many trustees because we are in the process of transferring inmates out."

By December 1, the Wheeler Unit will become a Substance Abuse Facility instead of a Transfer facility as it is now.

"Usually the trustees volunteer for the work because it is a change for them," said Young. "It makes them proud to offer something back and it provides skills that may take them somewhere else."

FISD board hears of school awards

FLOYDADA — The trustees of Floydada Independent School District learned of an award to Floydada High School during the regular board meeting on Tuesday, November 14. Superintendent Jerry Cannon presented the certificate acknowledging the school's improvement in performance on the Texas Assessment of

Academic Skills (TAAS) Test to FHS Principal Joe Christian during the session.

The school receives a \$1,534.10 cash award to be used as designated by the campus committee. The award is part of a state incentive plan for raising the number of students who successfully complete all sections of the TAAS tests each year.

Cannon also announced that the school will be receiving a certificate for successfully motivating migrant students to stay in school and to graduate. 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THE FIRST PRESIDENTIAL THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

A PROCLAMATION

Whereas, It is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favour: And whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me "To recommend to the people of the United States, a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favours of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of Government for their safety and happiness."

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these states, to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be: That we may then all united in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favourable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union and plenty, which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of Government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge, and, in general, for all the great and various favours which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also, that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our national Government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just and Constitutional laws, directly and faithfully obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness unto us); and to bless them with good Government, peace and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us, and generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

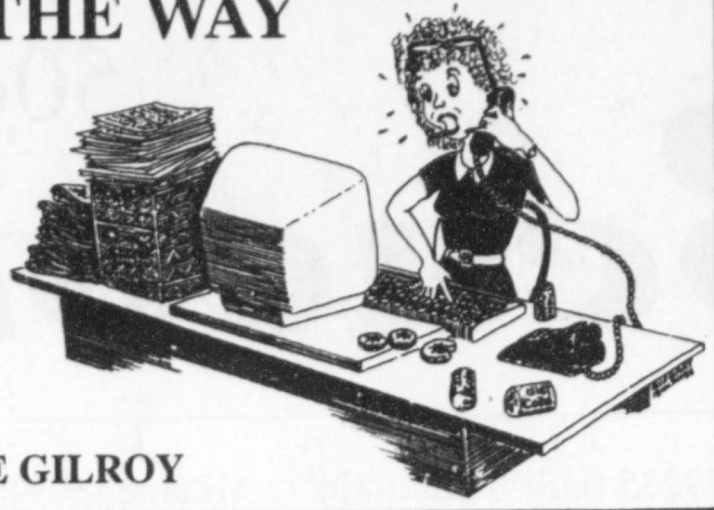

Rats. The latest word is that 800,000 "non-essential" federal workers are going back to work. Or at least back to their stations.

For several days now, the national media has been seized with the awful prospect of impending disaster, due entirely, of course, to Congressional insistence that Mr. Clinton agree to a time certain on balancing the federal budget. that problem out might require more "slickness" than even Mr. Clinton possessed. That might cause problems at the ballot box. So by all means the time curtain had to be opposed. And oppose it he did, right up to the last minute.

In the end, however, Mr. Clinton caved on the basic point. Now, we are told, he has agreed to the seven year time table, which means both sides can get down to working out the details. Now perhaps the Administration and the Congress can agree on some priorities for the good of the nation.

And perhaps our kids and grandkids will thank them. Not only that, perhaps those citizens who are alive today, and who worry about what kind of a country their progeny will inherit, will also thank them. I know I do. Particularly those who stood firm throughout this ordeal in the face of the predictable attack from the left, in politics and the media.

We are not at all sure, however, that those furloughed "non-essential" federal employees will thank them. After all, somebody up there has already deemed them "non-essential," so they went home. But they still got their pay.

If they are indeed "non-essential", if they are not needed, why are they on the payroll? And why pay them for not working?

Personally we noticed no disruption in our daily life. The sun came up. The sun went down. The rains didn't come. The harvesting continued. The price of gasoline in Austin was 97 cents a gallon. Sixty miles away, it was \$1.17, as it was in Brady, Snyder, and Post. It was \$1.05 in Floydada. It is good to be back.

part of the action. The suit also asks for "attorney fees for this action, prejudgment and post judgment interest, and such other relief as the Court may deem appropriate."

No action was taken by the council following the closed session.

The Floydada Police Department was granted permission to purchase a video camera with sound recording capabilities to be mounted in the police vehicles. The cost of the purchase was estimated at \$2,500.00. Additional purchase of three brackets for mounting will allow the department to place the camera in the on duty unit. It will be used to record all stops made by the unit.

According to Police Chief James Hale, "This will allow us to photograph probable cause before making a stop and to record the entire proceedings of the stop. There will be no question as to why a stop is made and the evidence will be on tape and usable for prosecuting the case."

Council members also voted unanimously to approve passage of an ordinance detailing areas of city property which will be posted as unauthorized areas for carrying legally permitted concealed firearms. The ordinance will be published as required and be effective upon publication and passage by the council.

Council members approved the minutes of the previous meeting, authorized payment of monthly bills, and considered several bids at the evening session. Ramon Granados was awarded the purchase of a 1983 Chevrolet being sold by the city. His was the highest of five bids received on the vehicle.

A bid was accepted for providing a new financial and administrative data processing system including both hardware and software. The new system will have a first year cost of \$67,143.00 to be paid out on a five year lease purchase. INCODE of Lubbock was the successful bidder out of three bids received.

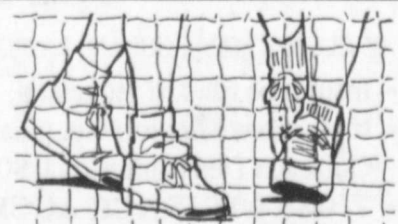
Bids for the proposed purchase of tax title lots owned by local taxing entities were also considered. J. R. Turner's offer of \$2,700.00 for 15 lots previously advertised for sale to the general public was accepted on a motion by Schacht, seconded by Hill. All voted for the motion.

A bid of \$600.00 for a lot and structure at 608 S. Wall was rejected by the council as being too low for the structure.

Darlene Williams bid \$1300 for the lot and structure and A. C. Carthel bid \$251 for the property. The Williams bid was accepted. All Taxing entities involved must approve bids before a sale is final.

FHS earns monetary award and high scores on report card

FLOYDADA—Monetary awards in the amount of \$1,534.10 were made to Floydada High School as part of the Texas Successful Schools Awards Program (TSSAS), Jerry Cannon, FISD Superintendent announced at the November 14 school board meeting.

The school is being recognized for gains in student performance in indicators that are part of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), more commonly known as the state's school report card.

Floydada High School is among 1,236 cash-winning schools statewide receiving awards for exemplary or recognized performance and 401 schools receiving awards for recording gains in their performance over last year.

The awards are based on school's spring 1995 performance on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, which measures performance in reading, writing, and mathematics. Schools also had to meet performance standards for dropout and attendance rates.

In the recognized category (which was given to Floydada High School), schools had at least 70 percent of all students and those in each student group passing each section of the TAAS, a dropout rate of 3.5 percent or less for all students and each stu-

dent group, and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent. The change in TAAS performance from 1994 to 1995 also had to be high enough so that the passing rate for all students and those in each student group would be at least 90 percent within five years.

In the exemplary category, schools had at least 90 percent of all students and students in each student population group (White, African-American, Hispanic and economically disadvantaged) passing each section of the TAAS, a 1993-94 percent or greater. These schools also had to have passing rates on the TAAS tests given at Grades 3 through 8 and 10 that exceeded the spring 1995 state average for all students and student groups.

Under law, the AEIS computes a demographic index based on campuses' percentages of minority, economically disadvantaged, limited English proficient, and highly mobile students and the wealth of the school's district. The index is used to array campuses and form 24 groups of roughly equal size. A school's performance is compared to other schools that are in the same demographic group.

A total of \$5 million is being awarded to schools this year under the TSSAS program.

County reviews employee retirement plan benefit

FLOYDADA—Truman Quinn of the Texas County & District Retirement System met with Floyd County Commissioners Court on Monday, November 20. He presented an overview of the current retirement plan utilized by the county and offered options the court could add to the plan or change in the plan.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy asked Quinn if Floyd County's retirement plan was consistent with other counties in Texas. Quinn replied that Floyd county is one of ten in the state that currently matches employee retirement contribution on a one-to-one basis. He added that all others have moved up to multiple matches beginning at 1.25 to 1 for each dollar contributed by the employee and up.

No action was taken on the matter. Any changes which might be considered would not become effective until January 1, 1996. Commissioner may consider the issue at a later meeting.

During the short morning session, the commissioners approved two farm work contracts on a motion by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. The motion was seconded by Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy and passed by unanimous vote.

A motion by Gilroy was seconded by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden authorizing advertising for bids for the possible purchase of a maintainer in Precinct 2. All voted in

favor.

The resignation of Cheryl Bradley was accepted by the court. She has asked to be relieved of duties as local registrar for births and deaths at Lockney. The resignation was accepted on a motion by Bearden with a second by Gilroy. Judge Bill Hardin told the court that the registering of those events will probably be done in the County Clerk's office in the future.

Two farm work contracts were approved. They included #1559 in Precinct 2 for Beth McLaughlin Reynolds by Jim Reynolds to have a pit dug and old improvements buried for soil conservation at a location 2 1/2 miles east of FM 2301 on FM 788 on the north side of the road; and #1574 for Nathan Johnson 4 miles north of South Plains to build a border to direct water for conservation.

Attending the session were Judge Hardin, Commissioners Bearden, Gilroy, Taylor and Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones, Mary Shurbet, Linda Turner, Margaret Herrera, James Williams, and the Hesperian-Beacon reporter.

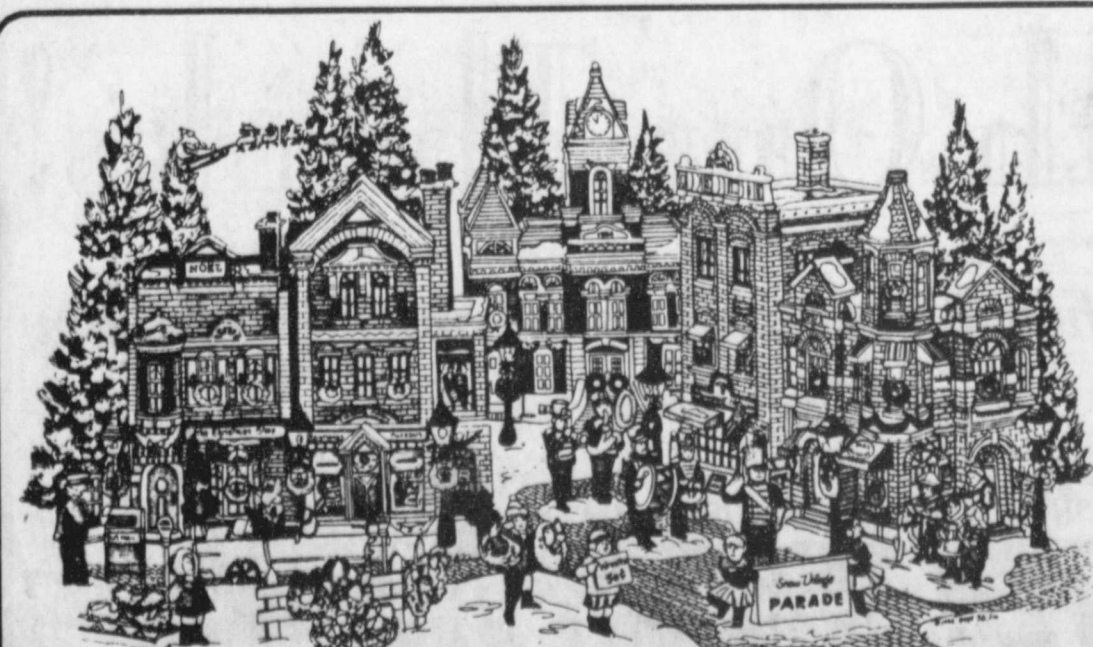

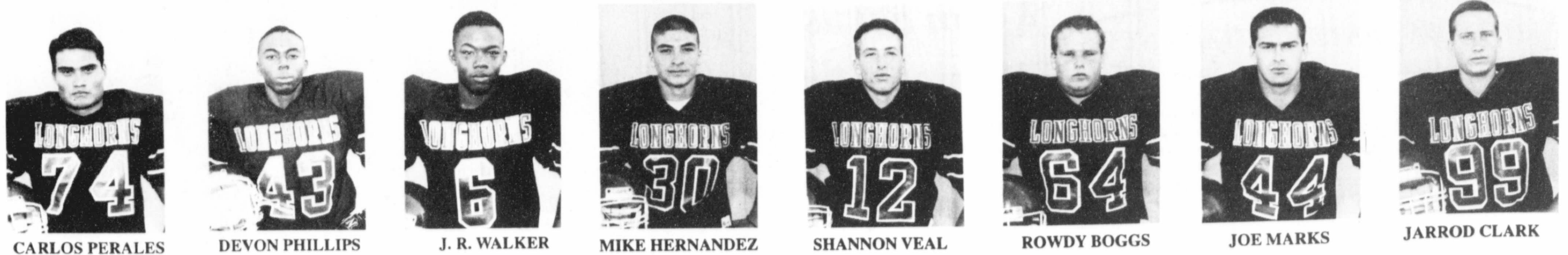

New coach has FHS off and running

FLOYDADA - A new coach and a new system has breathed instant success into the Floydada basketball program as the Whirlwinds pulled the curtain on the 1995-96 non-district portion of their schedule last week. A pair of impressive victories over Ralls and Lockney served notice that the "Winds are quickly on their way back

to respectability on the courts. Following the 71-59 win over the Ralls Jackrabbits in the season-opener on November 14, Floydada blew past county rival Lockney 72-52 last Friday in front of a packed house at Graves Gymnasium. First-year coach Jim Knight was pleased with his team's opening week outings. "I was very happy with our efforts in both games, but there's certainly room for improvement," stated Knight. "For one thing, those (players) coming out of football really had only a few days' practice. Add that to learning an entirely new system, and it's understandable why we're still ragged in a lot of areas."

Whirlwind senior Bobby Luna paced all scorers with 20 points against the Jackrabbits. He was 6-of-13 in his field goal attempts and 2-of-3 from the charity line. Vernon Cooper added 19 points, was 1-of-1 in 3-point attempts, and dished out 8 assists.

Zack Abshier, Floydada's returning All-District post, had a "double-double" by scoring 12 points and pulling down 11 rebounds (6 on the defensive boards). Jackrabbit Randy Johnson was the only other player on the floor to hit in double figures.

Floydada surged out to a 23-9 lead after the end of the initial period, but the visitors closed the gap by outscoring the "Winds 25-12 in the second quarter. The outcome was decided by Floydada's 24-14 run in the third stanza. The new 10-foul ruled helped Ralls in their 2nd period rally. Most of their come-back points in the second quarter were at the free-throw line as Floydada got into some foul trouble during the period.

Others contributing to the win over Ralls included Michael Palacios (9 points, 2-of-3 at the line), Rance Barnett (7 points, 3-of-4 field goals and a charity toss), J.J. Ysasaga (4 points) and Omar Eguia (2 points). Eguia also had 4 assists, as did Ysasaga. As a team, the Whirlwinds hit 50.8% of their field goal attempts.

Floydada used a balanced offensive attack to corral their long-time Floyd County rival, Lockney, as four Whirlwinds hit in double figures. Michael Palacios was the highpoint man for the "Winds with 18 points. Palacios was 5-of-7 from the field and was a big factor in Floydada's overall 43.5 % shooting percentage.

Vernon Cooper and Zack Abshier each had 17 points. Zack had foul trouble and had to sit out much of the third quarter. However, he caught fire for 10 big points in the final, and deciding period. Abshier also pulled down 10 rebounds for his second consecutive "double-double" of the young season.

Bobby Luna, off somewhat from his 20-point outing on in the Ralls opener, still managed double figures with 10 points. Omar Eguia and Rance Barnett each contributed 5 points. Although he was shut out in the scoring column, Chad Hinkle was

tough on defense and made five key rebounds off the defensive boards.

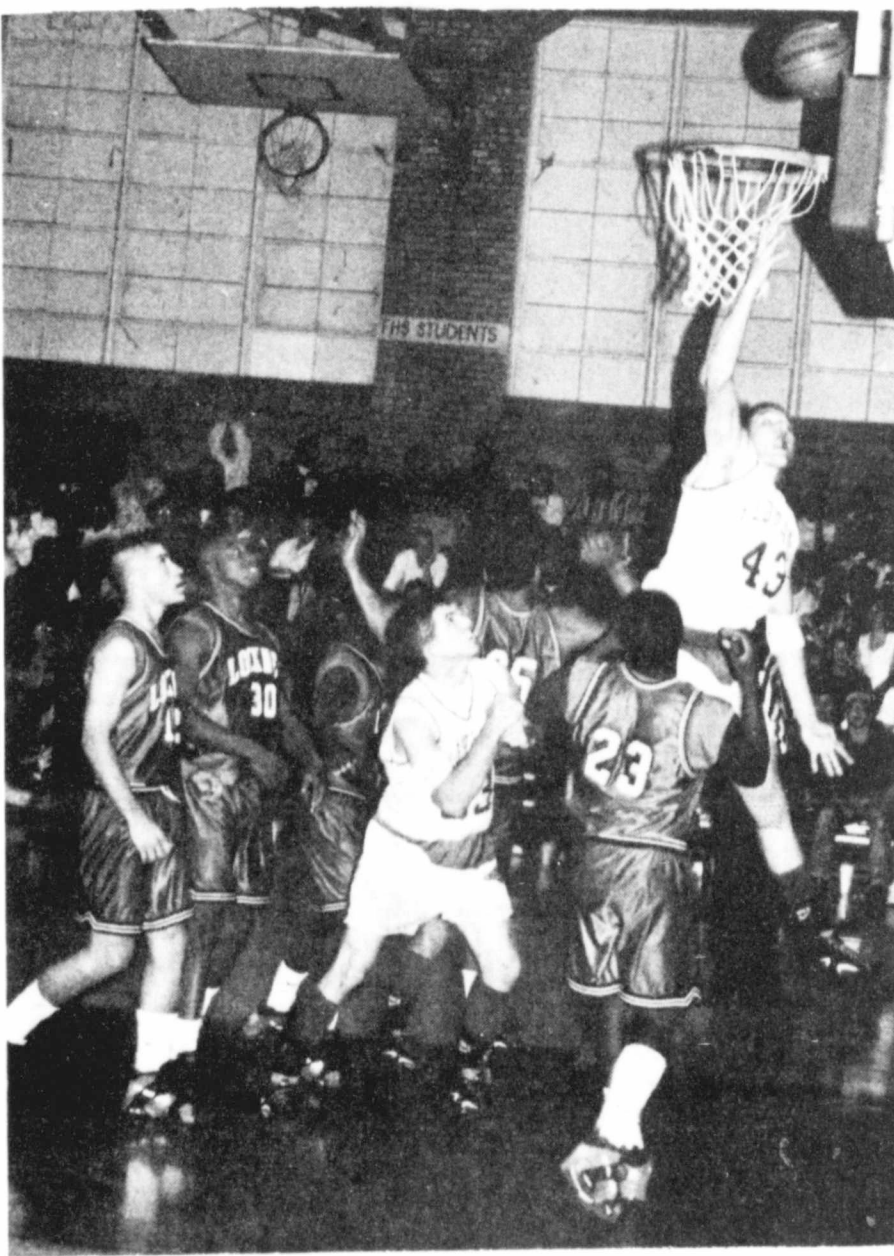
Lockney also had 4 players in double figures, with Mike Hernandez and J.R. Walker leading the way with 12 apiece. The Longhorns' talented sophomore duo of Devon Phillips and Charles Van Zandt had 11 and 10 points, respectively.

The Whirlwinds continue their non-district action this week at Lubbock Roosevelt. They return home after the Thanksgiving break to host the always-potent Hale Center Owls on November 28.

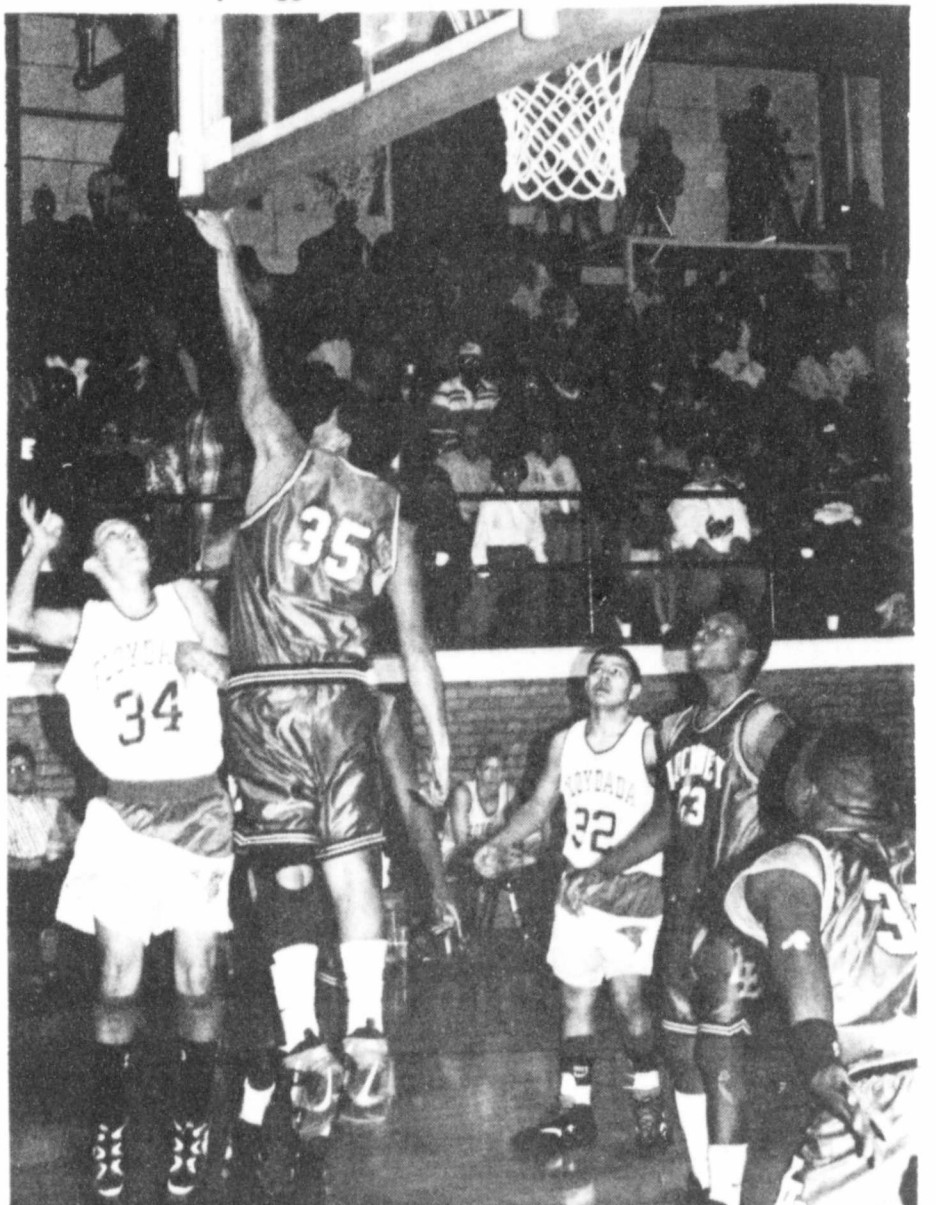
Bill's Notes

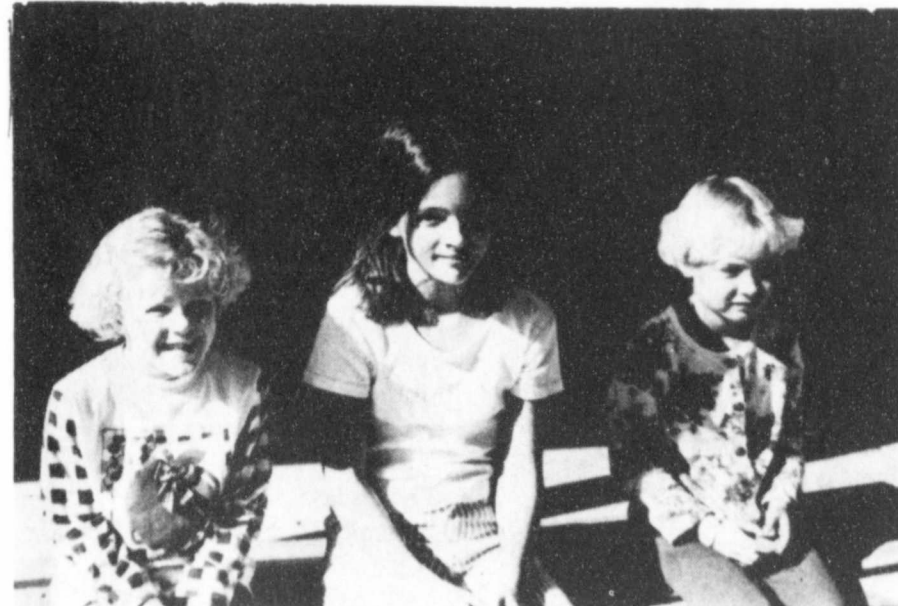

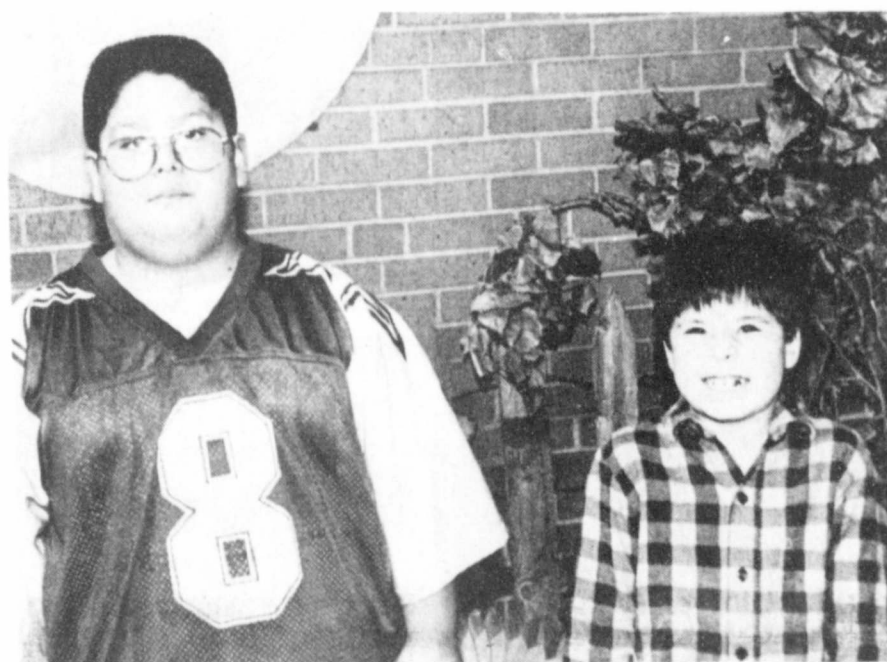

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'Focus on the Family' host's column begins this week

Beginning this week this newspaper will be running a syndicated column, by Dr. James C. Dobson. The column will be sponsored by the West College & Third Church of Christ in Lockney.

Dr. Dobson is a best selling author, psychologist and host of one of the nation's most listened to radio programs, "Focus on the Family." He is founder and president of Focus on the Family, which is a non-profit organization that produces the nationally syndicated radio program, heard daily on more than 2,500 radio facilities in North America and on over 3,000 facilities in over 40 other countries.

In the weekly column Dr. Dobson will answer questions concerning family issues. The questions and answers are excerpted from the book "Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions".

Dr. Dobson was an Associate Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Southern California School of Medicine for 14 years, and served 17 years on the Attending Staff of Children's Hospital of Los Angeles in the Division of Child Development and Medical Genetics. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of Southern California in the field of child development and has also earned 8 honorary doctorates from various Universities.

His first book for parents and teachers, Dare To Discipline, has now sold over two million copies and was selected as one of 50 books to be re-bound and placed in the White House Library. He has also written eleven other books for the family which are now best sellers.

Dr. Dobson has also been heavily involved in governmental activities related to the family. He served on the task force which summarized the White House Conference on the Family and received a special commendation from Pres. Jimmy Carter in 1980. He was appointed by President Ronald Reagan to the National Advisory Commission to the office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. He also served as co-chairman of the Citizens Advisory Panel for Tax Reform, in consultation with President Reagan, and served as a member and later chairman of the United States Army's Family Initiative.

Dr. Dobson is married, the father of two grown children, and resides in Colorado.

Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

QUESTION: My four-year-old frequently comes running home in tears because she has been hit by one of her little friends. I have taught her that it is not right to hit others, but now they are making life miserable for her. What should I tell her about defending herself?

DR. DOBSON: When youngsters play together, they each want to have the best toys and determine the ground rules to their advantage. If they find they can predominate by simply flinging a well-aimed fist at the nose of their playmate, someone is likely to get hurt.

I'm sure there are people who disagree with me on this issue, but I believe you should teach your child to defend himself or herself when attacked. Later, they can be taught to "turn the other cheek," which even mature adults find difficult to implement.

I recently consulted with a mother who was worried about her small daughter's inability to protect herself from aggression. There was one child in the neighborhood who would crack 3-year-old Ann in the face at the slightest provocation. This little bully, named Joan, was very small and feminine, but she never felt the sting of retaliation, because Ann had been taught not to fight back.

I recommended that Ann's mother tell her to return Joan's attack if Joan hit first. Several days later, the mother heard a loud altercation outside, followed by a brief scuffle. Then Joan began crying and went home.

Ann walked into the house with her hands in her pockets, and casually explained, "Joan socked me, so I had to help her remember not to hit me again." She and Joan have played much more peacefully since that time.

Generally speaking, a parent should emphasize the foolishness of fighting. But to force a child to stand passively while being clobbered is to

leave him at the mercy of his cold-blooded peers.

QUESTION: Do you think children between the ages of five and 10 should be allowed to listen to rock music on the radio?

DR. DOBSON: No. Rock music is an expression of an adolescent culture. The words of teenagers' songs deal with dating, broken hearts, drug usage and love-love-love. This is just what you don't want your 7-year-old thinking about.

Instead, his world of excitement should consist of adventure books, Disney-type productions and family activities—camping, fishing, sporting events, games, etc.

On the other hand, it is unwise to appear dictatorial and oppressive in such matters. I would suggest that you keep your preteen so involved with wholesome activities that he does not need to dream of the days to come.

rate of 80 percent or more and a drop-out rate of less than 6 percent to qualify for recognition.

The Academic Excellence Indicator System Report was presented during a public meeting prior to the FISD board meeting on Tuesday evening. The report covered the 1994-95 school year and is available to the public at the administration office.

Outstanding students for the month were recognized by the board, including FHS student Tara McCandless, daughter of Don and Lanell McCandless, and fellow tenth grader Mario Nunez, son of Herlinda Castenada. FJHS honorees were seventh grader Amanda Barnett, daughter of Larry and Kathy Ferguson, and eighth grader Kember Everett, daughter of Rob and LaShay Everett.

R. C. Andrews selected fifth grade students Amanda McHam, daughter of Dennis and Patty McHam, and Brady Rainwater, son of Andy and Kay Rainwater. Third grade students April Arevalo, daughter of Ismael

and Ernestina Arevalo, and Kristan Lackey, daughter of Jay and Julie Lackey, were selected for the distinction by A. B. Duncan Elementary.

Minutes of the October regular session were read by board secretary Trena Simpson and approved as presented. The payment of monthly bills was authorized on a motion by Charlene Brown, seconded by Simpson and approved by unanimous vote.

Administrative Assistant Jimmie Collins presented the first tax report of the fiscal year. He told the board that the tax role for 1995 anticipates collections of \$1,652,261.00 and that the collections for the month of October totaled \$416,768.97. This represents 25.3 percent of the total local tax revenue for the year. Collections at this time last year were running at about 34.04 percent according to Collins.

Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Policy Update #49 was approved by the board. Motion was made by Jack Robertson and seconded by Brown. All voted in

favor. The update provides recent changes in legislated policies and interpretation.

TASB options concerning the FISD School Board Employment Policy were approved on a motion by Amado Morales with a second by Charlene Brown. Collins told the board that the policy parallels the policy that FISD has used in the past for determining employment and dismissal procedures.

Cannon asked the board to change the staff development day scheduled for April 29 to May 6. The board approved the change to accommodate scheduling for TAAS testing.

FISD board meetings will be held the second Thursday of each month beginning with the December 14 session. Motion for the change was made by Brown and seconded by Simpson. All voted in favor.

A band trip to the Sandy Lake Band Festival in Dallas May 3, 4 & 5, was approved by the board. The school district will be furnishing two buses for the trip. No other cost is antici-

pated for the district. Band Boosters and the individual band members are to be responsible for raising the necessary funds for the trip. Students will leave after school on Friday and return home late Sunday evening, missing no school.

Demolition of a condemned property owned by the taxing entities, including FISD, was authorized by the board. The property to be cleared is at 402 E. Grover (Lot 7, Block 31, Original Town). Demolition must be approved by all taxing entities before being carried out. Motion was made by Steve Lloyd and seconded by Robertson. All voted in favor.

Board members also approved the sale of several taxing entity owned lots. A bid of \$2,700.00 from J. R. Turner was accepted for the purchase of advertised Lots 13, 14, 15, & 16, Block 2, Original Town, Lots 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, & 14, Block 1, Original Town, and Lots A, B, C, D, & F, Block C, Andrews Addition.

Also accepted on the motion by Lloyd, seconded by Robertson, was

the sale of a lot with structure at 608 S. Wall (Lot 3, Block 127, Original Town) to Miguel Alaniz. The bid must be approved by all other taxing entities involved before a sale will be final.

Employment of Dee Leatherman as a PEIMS and office aide at Junior High, Margaret Espanola as a Junior High Math Aide, Carol Lyons for Trainable at R. C. Andrews, and Oscar Garza Jr. as an aide at the Alternative School, was approved on a motion by Robertson with a second by Lloyd. The four are already at work in the system. The same motion approved the hiring of Doug Bawcom to begin as an additional Ag instructor during the spring semester.

One resignation was accepted by the board. Beth Stevens, special ed at R. C. Andrews for trainable students asked to be released from her contract immediately rather than at the end of the school year as previously requested. She will be moving to Oklahoma to look after her elderly mother

who recently suffered a fall according to Cannon.

Cannon told the board that a recent agreement with Southwestern Bell Telephone to combine some incoming lines and facilitate calls within the system would save the district about \$400 to \$450 per month on the telephone bill.

Prior to adjourning the meeting, the board went into executive session to hold a general discussion regarding personnel. No action followed the closed discussion.

Attending the session were Superintendent Jerry Cannon, board members Mitch Probasco, Steve Lloyd, Trena Simpson, Charlene Brown, Jack Robertson, and Amado Morales. Billy Joe Villarreal was not present. Farm News

Farmers to vote on FSA representatives

Floyd County Farmers will vote between November 24, 1995 and December 4, 1995, to elect their representatives for the Floyd County committee for the next term of office. Ballots for this election will be counted at 8:30 a.m. on December 7, 1995 at the Floyd County FSA Office.

Floyd County is divided into three LAA's (local administrative areas) this year. ALL THREE LAAs WILL HAVE AN ELECTION IN 1995. Boundaries of LAAs, a boundary map, and the number of farms within each LAA are available to the public at the Floyd County FSA.

The FSA farmer elected committee system has been a key factor in the successful administration of farm programs. The Secretary of Agriculture considers the committee member very important to the success of the farm programs Congress has provided. The committee members assist in carrying out programs assigned to the FSA committees. Their duties include:

1. Informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of FSA programs.
2. Keeping the Texas State FSA committee informed of Local Admin-

istrative Area (LAA) conditions.

3. Recommending needed changes in farm programs.

4. Participating in county meetings as necessary.

5. Performing other duties as assigned by the Texas State FSA Committee.

The county committee is responsible for the overall direction of the operations, the County FSA Office, and the Administration of the various farm programs at the county level.

Elected county committee members have an outstanding opportunity to serve both farmers and the public. The programs they help administer directly affects the welfare of our farmers.

A list of the names of known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming annual Floyd County Farm Service Agency, formerly ASC, committee election is available in the Floyd County FSA Office.

The LAA 1 nominees are: Paul Schacht, Boyd Jackson, John Quebe, and Beth Kropp. The LAA 2 nominees are: Adrain Helms, Craig Gilly, Mark Sanders, and Jane Bean. The LAA 3 Nominees are: Louis Pyle, Victor Smith, Joe Jones, Micky Dot

Hammonds, and Nancy Bishop.

Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in the Floyd County FSA Committee Election: Any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper or who is eligible to participate in any FSA program. The spouse of an eligible voter is also eligible to vote. A person under legal age can vote if he or she runs a farm and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, sex, age, color, religion, handicap or national origin.

A person can cast a ballot in any county in which he or she is an eligible voter, but a voter may not vote in more than one local administrative area in the same county, special care will be taken to see that only one ballot is issued to that voter.

The FSA county committee election will be conducted from November 24, to December 4 by mail ballot. FSA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, administers farm commodity, crop insurance, and conservation programs for farmers and makes farm ownership and operating loans.

Floyd County designated for disaster loans

Effective October 10, 1995, Floyd County, Texas, is hereby designated as a natural disaster area where eligible family farms may qualify for Farm Service Agency, (FSA) emergency (EM) loans due to damages and losses caused by flooding, hail, excessive rain, lightning, high winds, tornadoes, and below normal temperatures, which occurred from May 20, 1995 through June 7, 1995.


In addition to Floyd County, seven other Texas counties are named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance.

Those counties are: Briscoe, Crosby, Dickens, Hale, Lubbock, Motley, and Swisher.

EM loan applications will be received through June 10, 1996, for physical and production losses; and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed. EM loans will be made under Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) instruction 1945-D. To be eligible, producers must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of normal production, be able to repay the loan and any other loans, be unable to obtain credit elsewhere and have adequate security.

Food processed for safety
For many years scientists have looked for ways in which food can be processed that would result in increasing its safety without affecting its quality. Canning, pasteurization and deep freezing have been applied relatively successfully, although there is still room for improvement.
The most recent addition to food preservation technologies is the use of food irradiation. Worldwide scientific evidence on the safety of food for human consumption is far greater for foods processed by ionizing energy than for foods processed in any other way. Food is irradiated to make it safer and more resistant to spoilage, since irradiation destroys insects, fungi and bacteria that cause human disease or cause food spoilage. Irradiation makes it possible to keep food longer and in better condition.
Irradiation involves passing food through an irradiation field of either gamma rays, electron beams and X-rays. The energy used in food irradiation is not strong enough to cause food to become radioactive.

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Community mourns loss of Richard Wiley

LOCKNEY—Longtime Lockney businessman and church and civic leader, Richard W. Wiley, 65, died Wednesday, November 15, 1995, in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, November 18, at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Harold Abney officiated. He was assisted by Deacon Gary Marr.

Wiley was buried in the Lockney Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home in Lockney.

Besides his many years of active service to the First Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge in Lockney, Wiley was also known throughout the city as "the flat fixer."

He was born June 9, 1930 in Dexter, New Mexico and moved to Floyd County in 1936. He attended South Plains Schools and graduated from Floydada High School.

Wiley married Peggy Leota Whitaker on August 13, 1955 in Plainview. He served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War and was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, where he served as a Chaplain for many years.

In 1962 Wiley inherited one half interest in Jackson Tire Company from Dwight Jackson and in 1963 he purchased the other half interest from Keith Jackson.

Except for his time in the army, Wiley had worked at this station since 1950. The Jackson Tire Company has been located on the same Lockney corner, of Main and Locust, since 1925, when it was first opened as the Ozark Filling Station.

Jackson Tire sold gasoline, tires and oil from the downtown location and at one time had a warehouse located near the railroad tracks. In 1982 the gas pumps were closed and the business concentrated solely on tires.

In December of 1992, Wiley "retired" from the business and closed his store front. However, county residents continued to need his help and he soon began repairing a variety of tires from a family garage.

On Tuesday, November 14, while Wiley was working, he suffered an aneurysm in the brain causing a stroke and heart attack. He was found unconscious and taken to W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital. He was later flown to Methodist Hospital. Wiley never regained consciousness and died at Methodist on November 15.

Wiley was a member of the Lockney Masonic Lodge #867, where he was a 32nd degree Mason, Past District Deputy, and Past Master of Lodge #867. He was also a member of the Eastern Star #437, and the First Baptist Church in Lockney where he was a Chairman of the Deacons.

He was also a school bus driver for the Lockney Independent School District.

Survivors include his wife, Peggy, of Lockney; two sons, Donny of Muleshoe, and Buddy of Lockney; one daughter, Melody Lane of Lockney; three brothers, Frank, of Lubbock, Leon, of St. Louis MO., and James Bailey of Riverside, CA; one sister, Mary Cherry of Lubbock; and ten grandchildren.

Pallbearers were nephews: Tracy Kidd, Bill Whitaker, Bob Smith, Larry Wiley, Terry Wiley, Michael Wiley, Steven Wiley, Richard Dale Wiley, and Travis Cherry. Honorary pallbearers were the Deacons of the First Baptist Church.

The family suggests memorials to Lockney Masonic Lodge or the Masonic Children's Home of Ft. Worth.
