## Ground Broken For Millard Warehouse

A cold-storage warehouse containing
"We are looking forward to being in Friona. I
think we are as excited about locating our plant here as the folks in Friona appear to be in having us locate here," said Tim Jackes, executive vice president of the company, at Thursday's groundbreaking ceremonies.
The new plant will be located on a plot of ground just south of Friona Industries' main headquarters, off Highway 60 East. The western edge of the plant will be just off Walnut Avenue.

The executive vice president of
Millard indicated that the needs of lease tenants would determine how soon Phases II and III will be added
to the plant, but expected those phases to be completed within five years.
Of the original 70,000 square feet of space, 50,000 square feet will be for public storage and will be enoug
to hold 10 million pounds products. The other 20,000 squar feet of leased space will be for processor to be named in the nea future.
Taking part in the ground-breaking

worked as an aide in nursing homes for the elderly in her hometown of Friona, Texas and also in Amarillo
and Colorado and Colorado. to Sweetwater to enter Licensed Vocational Nurses training at TSTI. She had been working (training) on the floor at Rolling Plains Memorial Hospital since December On her way to class the morning of Monday, January 16 , her car skidded
on a patch of ice atop the Wes Broadway overpass and turned sideways in front of the on-coming traffic. Her car was hit on the passenger side immediately by an was hit again. was hit again. Tommie Jo was knocked practically out of the car on the driver's side hitting her head on the pavement even further around according to accident reports.
Needress to say, she was injured critically. At the hospital, the nurses who had previously worked with her do the trauma center at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by Sweetwater Ambulance. During this time she had been aided in breathing by EMT-Paramedic Fireman Ralph He scene and by doctors in the Hendrick Medical Center. Today, Tommie Jo, 20 , is sitting up in a chair in her hospital room and eating pureed food. She responds to many requests and tries to respond $t$ (Pauline) Nelson, of Friona, now residing in Abilene.
Mrs. Nelson and her husband set up residence in Abilene to be near must travel back and forth between Friona and Abilene often to keep his farming business going.

requiring students to identify a requiring students to identify a
campus concern and take their input to the responsible officials or elected student representatives.
"I was impressed," Ray said of the students' response. "It pushes them
beyond themselves beyond themselves and on to the
campus and to the city. It builds a sense of attachment to place; they see they've got a stake in it.
Although many students at firs turn up their noses at the class re quirements, they learn quickly that
involvement is not as hard or unpleasant as it seems. "Once they've done it the first time,", Ray said, "it's easy the second time." And fostering a positive attitude is important to him
because he wants the students to because he wants the students to
continue their interest and participation after school. His classes have had particular success at writing letters to the editor. The rate of publishing has been
extremely high, Ray said, and seeing extremely high, Ray said, and seeing
