monitors. Today's information tech nology has grown in leaps and
bounds, yet you cannot replace the boup
It is tempting to indulge in the end-

with the use of powerful computers on the internet or other ways on the information highway. Satellite links,
phone lines and phone lines and cable television
brings us world news as it happens brings us world news as it happens
around the globe, ideas unheard of a few years ago. The knowledge of all this news can be intriguing and stressful, as we are bombarded with ethi-
cal questions of involven cal questions of involvement in world
problems we cannot solve. New problems we cannot solve. News is
also available through fax machines and telephones.
Yet there is something special about the printed words on the page, the typeface, and the layout of our favor-
ite newspaper. It is comfortable, like home to us. There is a lingering factor of having a moment in history frozen within the text at presstime. Reading the news from the newspaper
