# Lockney petitions for extended calling

LOCKNEY—Petitions have been circulated in Lockney and will soon be sent to the Public Utilities Commission asking that Lockney be included in the new extended long distance calling plan.

The 93rd Texas Legislature passed a bill that lets local communities ask for extended calling within a fifty mile radius of their town. This would change calls to Floydada, Plainview and Lubbock from long distance calls to local calls.

Local telephone subscribers would pay a monthly fee of \$3.50 per household and \$7.00 for businesses if the plan goes into effect.

When the plan is approved by the PUC the local telephone company will mail a ballot to each phone number. It takes a "yes" vote on seventy percent of the ballots returned to approve the extended calling area.

After the application has been approved by the subscribers the local telephone company then has thirty days to file a petition as to how the plan will be implemented.

The stock show opened Saturday morning at 8:00 a.m. with the showing of seventy-four lambs, judged by Tommy Clevenger over a period of approximately 5 hours.

Hickerson's 128 lb. cross breed lamb was named the grand champion and the 142 lb. reserve breed champion cross shown by Desha Smith was named the reserve grand cham-

A fast paced swine show followed the lambs with 253 pigs being judged in approximately 6 1/2 hours, by John Chumbley

Stacey Lloyd's 254 lb. heavyweight York was named the grand

champion and the reserve grand was won by Will Warren's 251 lb. breed champion heavy-weight Duroc.

The Heifer show started Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m. Sixteen animals were shown and Bryan Bybee's British Champ Angus was named the supreme grand winner and Corbin Kellison's European Maine Anjou was named the reserve supreme grand by Judge Tracy Haymes.

### Extended calling effective March 6th for Floydada


FLOYDADA — City Manager Gary Brown says that Floydada residents can look forward to some welcome changes during the next few months in the places they can call tollfree. The extended calling area voted on last fall by local telephone customers will be available to local customers for use beginning March 6, 1996.

The extended calling area service will allow Floydada telephone users to call all Lockney, Plainview, and Lubbock exchanges with no long distance charges on each call. This is a more economical means of calling for most local residents.

The change will benefit people in Lockney as well. Lockney residents will be able to call Floydada at no extra charge. Lockney will not have the benefit of being able to call Plainview or Lubbock at this time. Lockney residents will have to petition for the extended calling area in order to be able to call Plainview or Lubbock

Callers from Plainview or Lubbock will also be able to call Floydada toll-free as of March 6 so the extended calling area will benefit people on both ends of the telephone lines.

# Multi-purpose building moves closer to grants

# Sheriff candidates Gilmore, McAnally and White profiled

Three Floyd County men have thrown their hat into the ring as candidates for Floyd County Sheriff.

Sheriff Royce Gilmore will face challenger Danny McAnally in the Democratic Primary, March 12.

The winner of the primary race will then face Republican Challenger Jon White in the November general elec-

Royce Gilmore, is the incumbent Sheriff, having been appointed to the position, August 11, 1995, by the Floyd County Commissioners. Gilmore was to fill the unexpired term of the current Sheriff Charles Overstreet, who resigned.

In 1986, White moved to Brownfield and worked at Allsups Continued on Page 11





clan in a state that didn't have much use for the Kennedys.

We were in Washington much of the time Yarborough was a Senator. Ouite frankly, he was not highly regarded by his fellow Democrats, who then exercised lop-sided control in the Senate. He was regarded, as best I could determine, as something of an embarrassment by all but a few fellow liberals. But I liked him, partly because he didn't like Lyndon. He and Johnson had an uneasy relationship, at best. Even after Johnson became Vice-President, and Yarborough became the State's senior senator, Yarborough felt Johnson tried to treat him as a subordinate. And he did.

We visited with Yarborough, in his home, a while back. He was getting somewhat frail, but still maintained an interest in current events, just as he maintained his skepticism of Lyndon. His battles with Lyndon, mostly over the politically potent issue of patronage, still seemed very

fresh in his mind. He got on the subject early, and stayed with it long. All of which, in our view, was consistent with a little-known, or seldom recognized side of Yarborough. He could be remarkably thin skinned and vain, obviously desirous that history take note of his battles for "the little man," and fearful that it might not.

Yarborough and John Tower, the state's Republican senator, got along quite well, despite the general distaste of each for the politics of the other. Each represented his constituency, quite honestly, I thought, and neither used his office to enrich himself personally. That alone is worthy of note.


Yarborough never became the "mover and shaker" in Texas politics that Allan Shivers did. But in the political development of Texas, Yarborough, or "Smiling Ralph" as he was known, certainly played a major role. He helped solidify, and define, not only the liberals, but the conservatives, as well.

# Paving project discussed at public hearing

Representatives of the Texas Department of Transportation held a public hearing at the Floyd County Courthouse last Thursday evening. The purpose of the hearing was to provide information concerning a proposed farm road in northeast Floyd County and to hear comments from Floyd County residents concerning the possible future project.

Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin introduced TxDOT representatives, including Plainview Area Engineer Mike Craig, Lubbock District Rightof-Way Agent William T. Nichols, Lubbock District Environmental Coordinator Davis Melton, and several other TxDot employees. Floyd County Commissioners George Taylor, Lennie Gilroy, and Jon Jones attended the session as did about fifty local residents and land owners.

The road being considered would connect State Highway 207 with FM 1065 in the northeast section of Floyd County. According to Craig, the proposed highway would be two lanes, approximately 26 foot wide paving on a 100 foot right-of-way. The road would be designed to carry 70 mile per hour traffic.

State highway offices emphasized that the county would be responsible for acquiring and clearing the rightof-way sometime after the summer of 1997 if preliminary state construction funds can be secured. State estimates for acquiring and clearing the rightof-way range from \$225,000.00 to \$278,436.00. These figures include federally mandated appraisers, review appraisers, compensating landowners, and relocating utilities. The amount of county funding required could be considerably less if land owners donate the right-of-way and accept responsibility for moving their own fences and utilities. Federal regulations require that the land to be utilized as a right-of-way must be appraised and the appraisal must be reviewed to ensure that no one is being unnecessarily displaced or improperly compensated for their land.

According to Craig, the timetable for proceeding on the proposed project has been set in motion by the January 25th public hearing. After hearing public comment, Craig stated that anyone wishing to make a written comment could do so. Letters of comment are to be directed to him at P. O. Box 148, Plainview, Tx. 79072. Comments should include the name,

address, and reason for involvement. Work on the proposed project will continue with the environmental impact review and statement which should be complete by the early winter of 1997. Another public hearing would then be held.

The study will cover a wide area, determining what impact the proposed road project would have on the primary impact area bounded by State Highway 86 on the north, FM 1065 on the east, FM 97 on the south, and State Highway 207 on the west.

At present, six alternative routes are being considered with costs estimated from zero (if no road is built) to more than \$6 million for the most expensive of the proposed routes. After determining the preferred roadway, a right-of-way map will be drawn. When that is approved, acquisition of right-of-way could begin, possibly in the summer of 1997.

When 75 percent of the right-ofway has been acquired, highway design plans could be drawn. Estimates for plan completion were placed at the fall of 1998 if right-ofway acquisition moves well. Requests for state funding could be

submitted in 1999 if all goes well. At that time, the project would have to compete on a statewide basis for funding. Texas now allots \$15 million per year for new farm road construction. The road project in Floyd County will have to compete for funds on the basis of cost vs. benefit against all projects requesting funding in the year the request is sub-







Bennie Mavat will be celebrating her 80th Birthday soon and her family (immediate and extended) wants you to be part of it.

Her story begin in Paris, Texas, January 31, 1916, where she lived until her family, with her younger sister, Martha, now of Texarkana, moved to Floyd County in 1928. "We enjoyed everything in Liberty Community. Mr. Robert Fisher was our teacher in that two room school."

In 1933, she graduated from Floydada High School. "I wanted to go to Searret Methodist College in Tennessee, but our country was in The Great Depression. We had no money and I had no job. So I took Post Graduate work for four more high school years. Taking every class I could get, I paid my tuition with library work at the school." During that time, she paid her room and board by doing housework for Dr. and Mrs. Andrews.

Mrs. Andrews, a speech teacher, had an impact on her life. Bennie Mavat studied speech with her after she had finished her daily private classes. She said she had never had a student so eager and willing to learn. During this time she met a Lockney boy, Delbur Rose, the son of pioneers, C. H. and Mary Ida (Casey) Rose. They were married April 25, 1937.

"We lived on a farm a couple miles east of Lockney. I taught private speech in the elementary school as Mrs. Andrews taught me." During those early years, they worked as "share croppers" and moved often from one farm to another. Both of their children were born during that time; Jerry, now an insurance man in Lubbock, and Johnny a computer man in Plainview

In the early '40s, they moved to Aiken to farm a place there.

"In the year 1946, I yielded to preach the gospel, and our family was in agreement."

She supplied for pastors in Olton, Canyon, and Muleshoe, but mostly in Floydada. She recalls preaching regularly at the school house in the Sandhill Community.



the question, "What do you most dislike about yourself?" Skin problems DR. DOBSON outranked every other reply by a wide Skin eruptions occur primarily as a result of an oily substance that is secreted during adolescence. The pores of the skin tend to fill up with this oil and become blocked. Since the oil can't escape, it hardens and causes pimples or blackheads.

When you get numerous pimples or between 115 and 120. blackheads regularly, the condition is called acne. If this happens, it will be important for you to keep your skin clean, minimizing the oil and dirt on your face.

If the problem is severe, as you obviously feel it is, you should ask your parents to take you to a dermatologist, who is a doctor specializing in skin problems. Acne can now be treated effectively in most cases.

Question: Do you favor removing a child from one school to transfer him to another?

Dr. Dobson: Yes, there are times when a change of schools-or even a change of teachers within a schoolcan be in the child's best interest.

Educators are reluctant to approve these transfers, for obvious reasons, although the possibility should be considered when the situation warrants.

For example, there are occasions when a young student runs into social

problems that can be resolved best by giving him a "clean start" someplace else. Furthermore, schools vary tremendously in their difficulty; some are located in higher socioeconomic areas when a majority of the children are much more intelligent than would ordinarily be expected. The mean IQ in schools of this nature may fall

What happens, then, to a child with average ability in such a setting? Although he might have competed successfully in an ordinary school, he is in the lower 15 percent at Einstein

My point is this: success is not absolute, it is relative. A child does not ask, "How am I doing?" but rather, "How am I doing compared to everyone else?" Little Johnny may grow up thinking he is a dummy when he would have been an intellectual

leader in a less competitive setting. Thus, if a child is floundering in one academic environment for whatever reason, the solution might involve a transfer to a more suitable






