## Lubbock Site Chosen As SPS Plant Location

pany announced today that its board of directors has approved future electrical generating plant northeast of Lubbock, near Idalou, Texas Berl M. Springer, SPS bo chairman and chief executive officer, said the board action authorizes preliminary engineering design and planning, along with other preparaestablishing a construction schedule.
Springer estimated it will be at least construction.
The plant will be needed to serve SPS customers throughout the South Plains during the decade of the 1990 s. Details on the size and cost of
facility have not been finalized In 1982, SPS obtained an op purchase 2,880 acres at the site near idalou, in anticipation of future power plant construction. The Company purchased the land in
September 1983. September 1983. coal-fired generating ensit sixth Company made a decision in the early 1970s to begin decreasing the utility's dependence on natural gas-and
fuel. the electricity generated by SPS for its customers is now produced at coalfired power plants, the Company still must rely substantially on natural gas
to fuel the older plants. Springer noted tha may be short-term fluctuations in natural gas prices, the long-run price trend is upward. For this reason, coal is a cheaper alternative to gas, and xpected 40 -year life of the generating
"Also," Springer pointed out, "coal can be burned--and is being environmental damage, We are confident that we are not harming the environment, especially because we use low-sulfur Western coal." ## Children Must Learn Skills For Self-Care

 means that more and more children will be involved in self-carehome economist Diane Welch "After school self-care beginning at age nine or ten is not necessarily a bad thing, if children are adequately prepared and ready to function on
their own," says Welch, a family life education specialist with Texas A\&M University's Agricultural Extension Service.
Many working parents feel guilty about having a "latch-key" child, ye fail to realize that all children need to learn coping skills at some point.
Even the children of full-time homemakers must sometimes stay by themselves while their mothers keep
appointments, do errands, or attend adults-only activities, she notes. Both employed parents and full-
time homemakers, should time homemakers, should ceach
coping skills to their children before allowing them to stay by themselves, says the specialist.
Welch suggests that parents
preparing a child for self-care do following:
Teach the child basic safety skills including how to use emergency minor home accidents, escape the house or apartment in case of fire,
and handle incoming phone calls strangers coming to the door. *Have your child emergency situations and test him or skills have not been forgotten. *Set clear-cut rules that will guide the child toward responsible what they can or cannot do when it comes to cooking, using appliances, playing outside or having friends over
to play. to play. Help your child fight boredom
