## Floydada School Board hires new head coach

**FLOYDADA** — After interviewing the candidate in executive session, the Floydada Independent School District Board of Trustees approved hiring Tim Daughtrey as the new head coach and athletic director for FISD.

Motion for the action came from Amado Morales with a second by Steve Lloyd. All voted in favor with Jack Robertson abstaining. Robertson stated, "You have my full support, but I will abstain because I was a member of the committee which recommended you."

Included in the motion was the employment of Denise Daughtrey as an elementary teacher and Kathy Turner as a math teacher at the alternative school.

Resignations were accepted from Coach Craig Cook, Allison Tipton (high school English), Rosa Villarreal (aide), Dana Pyle (RCA Special Ed), Valinda Wright (3rd grade), and Sandra Chavez (aide).

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as presented and payment of monthly bills was authorized. A budget amendment was approved authorizing band funds to be transferred from the band equipment account to the band instrument account.

Administrative assistant Jimmie Collins presented the monthly tax report stating that collections now total \$1,565,490.65 and are 95.28 percent complete. This compares with 95.91 percent at the same time in 1995. CED collections on delinquent taxes total \$658.00.

Board members Mitch Probasco and Billy Joe Villarreal were sworn in by Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin. The two did not have opponents at the end of the election sign up period and no election was necessary under new legislation.

Election of board officers followed. Mitch Probasco will serve as president for the coming year. Steve Lloyd will be vice president and Trena Simpson will be secretary.

## LISD votes canvassed

**LOCKNEY**—Votes from the trustee election were canvassed and certified at the Lockney Independent School District meeting held Thursday, May 9. Dan Smith and Mike Mathis were sworn in as duly elected trustees.

The election of officers for the board was held and Jim Bob Martin

a short program detailing some of the projects and activities the group participated in during the year.

Board members voted to change the regular meeting day from the second Thursday of each month to the second Tuesday of each month.

Sale of tax title lots was approved on a bid from Jose Pesina. Pesina bid \$500 for a lot at 332 W. Grover and \$800 for a lot at 615 W. Grover. A second bid was received on the Grover Street lot, Mattie and Margie Martinez offered \$200 for the lot. A bid from Dwight Lee Moore for 3 lots was also rejected. Moore bid \$50 per lot. The cost of the necessary paperwork to complete sale of one tax title lot is approximately \$100. Board members were reluctant to sell lots that will cost the district in transfer fees.

Board members were asked by Superintendent Jerry Cannon to authorize formation of a committee to study the current school policies concerning drugs on campus. The committee suggested was FHS principal Joe Christian, Junior High Principal Monty Hysinger, Grant Hambricht, Trena Simpson, Steve Lloyd, and Juvenile Probation Officer Bruce Ballou.

The committee will be responsible for writing a policy defining repercussions for specific situations or actions and for stating the maximum penalty available for those instances. The policy should be ready for review and adoption for the 1996-97 school year.

Cannon also reported that accreditation visits are being conducted and reports will be returned for the board's information. A comparison chart on sophomore TAAS scores was passed out, comparing FHS to school in the old UIL district and the new UIL district.

Cannon told the board an open house needs to be scheduled to allow the public to see the new gym after it is completed. He suggested a come and go reception on a Sunday afternoon. No date was set.

Registration for the Old Settler's Reunion will be at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, May 25, followed by the flag presentation and the business meeting. Anyone wishing to enter the Wildflower Show at the Museum must have their entries by 9:00 a.m. Children wishing to enter the Pedal Tractor Pull must register from 9:00-10:00 a.m. on the N.E. corner of the square.

During the business meeting, at 10:00 a.m., the traditional awards will be handed out to the Pioneer Woman, Man and Couple. The beard contest will follow the meeting and lunch will begin at 11:45 a.m.

### PARADE RULES FOR BIKES, 3-WHEELERS AND 4-WHEELERS

A parade will begin at 2:30 p.m. and participants should assemble on the First Baptist Church parking lot.

Anyone wishing to enter the parade on a bicycle, a 3-wheeler or a 4-wheeler, must register in order to ride in the parade. Anyone not registered will not be allowed in the parade.

The bike riders will be escorted by the police and anyone darting ahead of the police car will be taken out of the parade and will not be allowed to ride in any future parades. These rules are being implemented for the safety of the children on the bikes and people viewing the parade. The children on bikes have also become a concern to the people driving the large farm equipment.

The prize money has doubled this year in the hopes it will encourage more parade participation. All winning floats will earn \$100 for their first place winner. Riding clubs will earn \$100 for first place and any band

in the parade will receive \$50. The best team drawn vehicle will win \$50 and the best dressed cowboys and cowgirls will earn \$25.

Other special activities planned for the day will be a chuckwagon demonstration, displays of the Nifty-Fifty Auto Club, the Antique Car Club and the Roadrunner Car Club. Antique tractors will also be on display from the Texas Plains Chapter Two Cylinder Tractor Club.

At the Lamplighter Inn, after the parade, Billie Sol Estes will be on hand to autograph copies of his daughter's book about his life.

Musical entertainment on Saturday will begin at 3:30 p.m. with the Harmony singers, followed by Texas Thunder and other area entertainment.

At 6:00 p.m. the "Pickin' & Grinnin'" entertainment will be a sure crowd pleaser. The jamboree is open to area musicians and the audience is asked to bring your own chairs.

## JP collections reviewed

Justice of the Peace for Precincts 2 & 3 Dottie Stansell met with the Floyd County Commissioners Court to request extra help. Stansell told the court she has a tremendous load and just can't get all the paperwork done.

She requested permission to use funds from the supplies, travel, and equipment accounts in her budget to hire someone to work in her office two afternoons per week. A check of the budget balances revealed that the total of these funds is only \$700.00.

Tim Burge, JP for Precincts 1 & 4 has an extra labor item in his budget which allows him extra help two or three days a week.

Commissioners asked for an ac-

counting of the revenue produced by each Justice of the Peace in fines and fees collected.

Judge Bill Hardin informed the court that in 1990, Precincts 1 & 4 collected \$50,000 in fines and fees while Precincts 2 & 3 collected \$2,000. 1991 collections were \$46,000 for 1 & 4 and \$7,000 for 2 & 3. 1992 collections were \$32,000 in 1 & 4 and \$10,000 in 2 & 3. 1993 shows \$38,000 in 1 & 4 and \$16,000 in 2 & 3.

1994 collections from 1 & 4 totaled \$33,500 and from 2 & 3 were \$13,700. Collections in 1995 from 1 & 4 were \$20,023 and from 2 & 3 were \$10,000. Collections so far in 1996 total \$7,879 from JP 1 & 4, Tim

Burge. Precinct 2 & 3 collections by Stansell total \$6,434 thus far.

Commissioners authorized Stansell to use the designated funds to hire extra help 4 hours per week. She was reminded the extra help would have to stop when the \$700.00 ran out and that she should include extra help in her budget request for next year if she wants to continue to have assistance.

Commissioners agreed to participate in an interlocal agreement with the City of Floydada and the City of Lockney for purchasing a vehicle to transport prison probationers working on projects in Floyd County, Floydada, and Lockney. The county

## Council discuss pool hall rules

**LOCKNEY**—J.D. Copeland, Tina Graves and Richard Zavala repeated the oath of office and were sworn in as council members for the City of Lockney. The city was not required to hold an election as the incumbents had no opponents register to run for their positions.

Bil Anderson was elected to the position of Mayor Pro-Tem. Discussion was held on the appointing of department heads and they will be named at the next meeting.

Council members and Chief of Police Jerry Edwards discussed the current pool hall ordinance. Jerry stated that they had not had any problems at

the pool hall on Main Street.

He stated that the owner does not allow beverages to be brought into the establishment and sends the kids out so they can be home before the curfew.

Edwards stated that the hours for the establishment are from 2:00 p.m. until 12 midnight for adults and from 4:00 p.m. until 10:45 p.m. for students.

A complaint was received from the residents around the baseball park on the cars speeding up and down SE 6th street. Several options were discussed and it was decided to put up three way stop signs at three of the intersections in order to slow the traffic down.

Dickie McCarty brought a proposal to the council on the inspecting and cleaning of the water tower. He has a company who will video the inside of the tank and assess the need for cleaning. The board voted go ahead with the project.

Dickie also gave the specifications for two portable welders that he has looked at. The council voted to purchase a welder for city employees to use for jobs that cannot be brought to the shop.

The council voted to accept Kenny Hooten's bid for lots 1-5 and the N. 30' of lot 6, Block 2, in the Vineyard addition.

## Firemen set new record fighting fires

Floyd County Volunteer Fire Departments, which includes Lockney, Floydada and Dougherty, set a fire fighting record Tuesday night by answering 22 fire calls between the hours of 6:30 p.m. and midnight.

The fires were caused by lightning strikes preceding a thunderstorm that moved through the area. In one case the firemen were helped out by the rain and in others the volunteers battled the blazes with water hauled to the site.

Firemen were first called to assist in fighting a fire in Crosby County, seven miles south of Dougherty. Fires then broke out in several locations, including several fires northeast of Floydada, which broke up the fire teams and spread them very thin.

In the Dougherty area, fire trucks arrived from Roaring Springs, Dickens, McAdoo, Crosbyton, Lockney, Floydada, Dougherty and Motley County.

One Dougherty resident said, "I could see three different fires from my back door. After dark, the glow from the fires made it appear as if the earth was on fire."

Several people around the county witness lightning striking the ground. "You could see the lightning hit the ground and then you saw the smoke and fire," said one witness.

The City of Floydada and Lockney reported a trace of rainfall.

The staff of the Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon invites the public to their 100th birthday party, May 24.

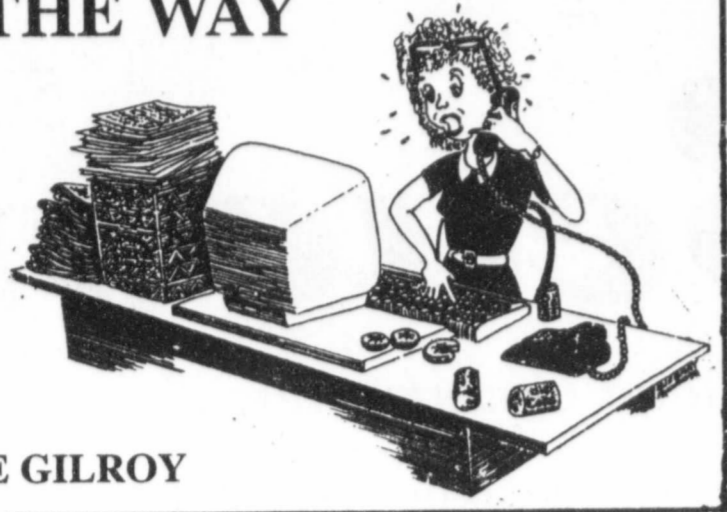
Refreshments will be served beginning at 2:00 p.m. and doors will close to guests at 7:00 p.m.

Republicans in the House, and the fights were between factions of the Democratic party.) He worked hard, absorbed politics like a sponge, and, as far as we are concerned, has served the state well.

Now, if it will just rain some more, and if the rains will become more general and widespread, and if a goodly number of our readers (and their friends) come by the share our birthday, our cup will runneth over.

On a completely different subject, but an interesting one nevertheless. Bill Sol is coming to town.

If you have to ask "Bill Sol who?", you're either quite young, or you weren't much involved in politics (and the courts) during the 50's and 60's.

Billy Sol is Billy Sol Estes, the boy wonder of Texas politics and finance (and master con man) during that period. His endorsement, and his campaign contributions, were much

sought after by people like Ralph Yarborough and Lyndon Johnson. It was not unusual for them to issue press releases bragging of such endorsements. Then a funny thing happened. Billy Sol's financial empire crumbled. He got in all sorts of trouble with the law. It was discovered (or alleged) that he had acquired a great deal of his wealth through the technique of borrowing money from various quarters by mortgaging items which had already been mortgaged. That is a legal no-no.

Very quickly those politicians who had sought his endorsements were saying "Billy Sol who? I never heard of him." Eventually Bill Sol went off to prison, got out, and had some unkind things to say about those same people. His daughter wrote a book about her dad, with his concurrence, and they will be in town, at the Lamplighter, during Old Settlers day, where Billy Sol will sign books. We intend to get one. It should be interesting reading.

approved an expenditure not to exceed \$3,000.00 for the purchase with further expenses to be paid on a pro rata basis.

Motion for the action was made by Precinct 1 Commissioner Connie Bearden and seconded by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy and Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones voted with the pair in approving the motion.

Also approved was recarpeting of the Jury Room upstairs in the courthouse. The Lockney Library will also receive new carpeting.

Keith Stansell and Gary Stansell and their families donated Lots 6, 8, and 9, in Block 73, Original Town (on the east side of the square) to the county for the future library. The donation carries the stipulation that if the lots are not utilized within fifteen years, they will be returned to the families or their heirs.

Ruben Ramon was approved as a new deputy for the Floyd County Sheriff's Office. He will replace Shane Dollar in Lockney.

Judge Hardin asked the court to consider renovation to an upstairs restroom in the courthouse converting it to meet ADA standards for handicapped individuals. Commissioners agreed to check into the cost of the conversion.

Commissioners adopted a resolution setting the standards for assigning road numbers and addresses for 911 identification in rural Floyd County. South Plains Area Governments (SPAG) will be handling the assigning and mapping for the 911 system.

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented her monthly financial report stating the county began the month of April with \$472,814.81 and took in receipts of \$270,416.20. Transfers in were \$231,862.68 and transfers out totaled \$230,862.68. Disbursements of \$265,256.82 were made, leaving a balance of \$478,974.19 in county accounts as of April 30.

Certificates of deposit reported included: undivided tax, \$300,000.00; Precinct 1, \$25,000.00; Precinct 2, \$20,000.00; Precinct 3, \$76,000.00; and Precinct 4, \$25,000.00. Interest earned to date on CD's and interest bearing accounts totals \$26,637.06.

Four farm work contracts were approved on a motion by Jones with a second from Gilroy. All voted in favor.

Contracts included: #1639 for Nelson Wofford in Precinct 1 to have

a pit filled up putting land back into cultivation 8 miles west and 2 miles north of Floydada; #1654 for James Cage in Precinct 4 to work a drainage ditch for conservation 15 miles east and 1 mile north of Floydada; #1624 for Angel Araujo in Precinct 2 for filling in a slush pit for soil erosion prevention 12 miles west of Lockney on FM 378 and 1/8 of a mile east; #1649 for Glen Wood in Precinct 3 to rework stock tank to catch tail water 1/4 mile north and 3 miles east of South Plains.

One agreement for donation of

materials to be used by the county was approved. Billy Don Colston is donating material to be spread on a county road.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as presented. Accounts were approved and payment of monthly bills was authorized.

13 budget amendments were approved transferring funds between accounts to allow for payment of approved bills. A transfer from Road & Bridge was made to each precinct in the amount of \$16,000.00, totaling \$64,000.

LOCKNEY—Main Street Pizza, in Lockney, has been serving up lunch and dinner for Lockney's kids and adults since they first opened April 6, 1991.

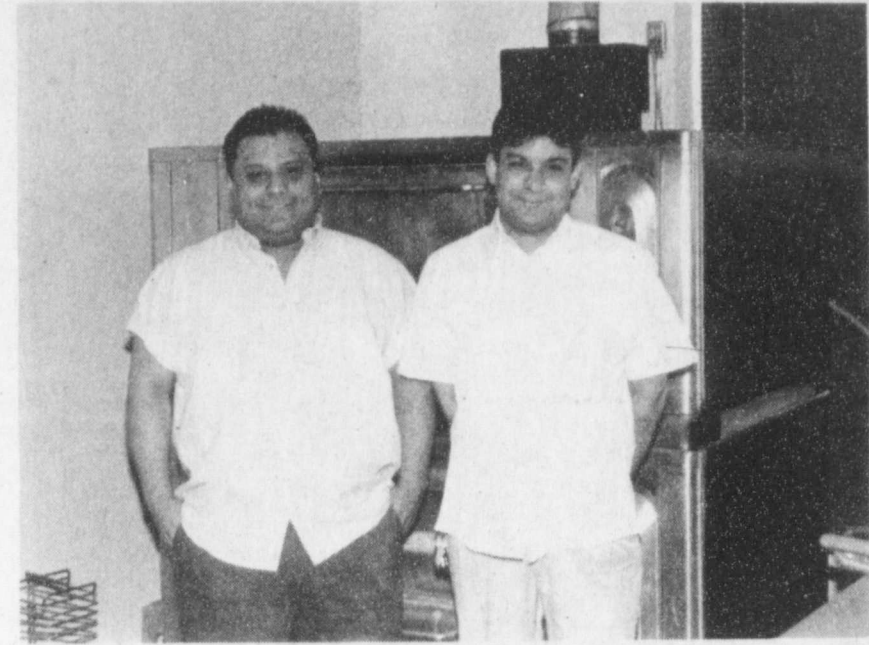
Brothers Michael DeLeon and David DeLeon have worked together as a team since they first learned their trade at Village Pizza in Plainview.

## Argentina study exchange group visits Lockney Rotary

LOCKNEY—The Lockney Rotary Club were hosts to a Rotary Exchange Group from Argentina at their last meeting. The five members of the group are visiting several places in Texas before returning to their homes. Julian Morley is the team leader and he brought greetings from the people of Argentina. He stated that his Rotary district borders on three countries.

"One of the things that we have missed while we have been here is the siesta. It is so hot in the middle of the day at home that everyone takes a short nap, or rest. It is not so hot here so you do not have the same need." He is a cattle and sheep rancher and has interests in cattle ranching, feed lots and such. "I feel nearly at home here. The farming and ranching in this area is similar to ours," he stated. Noemi Otazu is a Biochemist. She reported that she is interested in Infectology Research, hospitals, high school and university labs, movies, rodeos, rock and roll music and football.

She works to help the construction workers in her home area have a better health system. She comes from an area of Argentina has oil deposits. They raise cattle, cotton and rice.

Aldo Brambilla is a yarn mill manager. He is interested in textile technology and is impressed with the plants that he had visited and hoped to be able to share some ideas within the industry.

He studied engineering in England and has done plant research. Cotton is the main crop where he lives. They

are currently working on 600 different breeds of cotton. His area raises approximately 2 million acres of dry-land cotton. When asked how it is harvested he replied, "Mostly by hand. Machinery is just now beginning to come in and the workers are scared that it will take their jobs."

His spinning mill turns out 25 tons of cotton thread a day and it is mostly sold in Buenos Aires. Gabriella Tomasella is a Computer and English teacher. She teaches English as a second language to kindergarten students. "Spanish is our official language but almost everyone can speak two or more languages. We know that English is important in business so it is compulsory in high school. We have learned that it is easier to teach to the younger students so we start them in kindergarten," she related.

They told those present of their countries economy and the fact that it is improving. They reported that the unemployment rate is 15 to 20 percent but that it is beginning to get better. They reported that the railroad has been privatized and there is no government subsidy for cotton but there is for the forestry industry and the fishing industry.

Each year Rotary exchanges teams with a district in another country. The groups are led by Rotarians and include business and professional people. All expenses are paid by Rotary International.

In closing the group presented President Claude Brown with a Rotary banner from their district.

# Thornberry urges FSA to include Texas in pilot program for Crop Revenue Insurance

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry is urging the Farm Service Agency to include Texas in a pilot program that would provide a new form of insurance, called Crop Revenue Coverage (CRC), to farmers in the State.

The CRC pilot program would provide agricultural producers with coverage based on the amount of revenue, unlike the Multiple-Peril Insurance Program, which provides coverage based on the amount of production. Coverage would be provided to protect against lost revenue caused by low price, low yield, or any combination of the two. According to Thornberry, pilot projects for CRC have already been approved this year for corn and soybeans in Iowa and Nebraska.

"From what I've heard, CRC has

been fairly well-received in the states where pilot programs have been set up so far," he said. "This doesn't necessarily mean that what works elsewhere is going to work here in Texas, but at a time when the drought is making farmers' lives so difficult, it's probably not a bad idea to try something that could possibly make their lives easier."

Thornberry said he wrote the letter after receiving several calls from farmers in the 13th District expressing interest in participating in the program. U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (TX-19) also signed the letter, the text of which is below:

*We are writing to urge the inclusion of the state of Texas for participation in the Crop Revenue Coverage (CRC) pilot program. We believe that*

*agricultural producers in Texas need to be able to test the viability of this type of coverage for their farming operations. We also believe that it would be of great benefit to the crop insurance program to have CRC test marketed in such a large agricultural state as Texas.*

*While the number-one goal of agricultural producers remains to provide the American people with high quality and abundant food and fiber, they also must be able to make enough money to meet farming operation expenses and provide for the needs of their family. The current multi-peril crop insurance program often leaves producers short of the revenue expected and needed to remain profitable and sustain a healthy business operation. The type of coverage pro-*

*vided through CRC has been needed for a long time.*

*While we are concerned about the effect that the increased premium level could have on the attractiveness of this option, we are anxious to test market this coverage option and attempt to make it work for producers. If this coverage proves successful for wheat in Texas, then it should be examined for other crops.*

## May 1996 Sales Tax Rebates

May 1996 sales tax rebates made to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received. Lockney continue to display an increase over rebates received during the same period in 1995. Floydada showed a decrease for the month.

Total rebates received in Floyd County this month were \$18,108.62, an overall decrease of 4.35 percent when compared to the \$18,933.75 received in May of 1995. Year to date rebates now stand at \$76,700.56, an increase of 4.01 percent over the \$73,740.36 county total at this time in 1995.

Lockney displayed an increase of 10.57 percent from the same period for 1995 in over all receipts. The city's May check was in the amount of \$6,628.63 compared to \$5,994.50 received in May, 1995. Lockney has received a total of \$23,468.67 this year, compared to \$22,081.77 in 1995. This is an overall increase of 6.28 percent.

Floydada's check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$11,479.99 showing a decrease of 11.27 percent from the \$12,939.15 payment received in April of 1995. The total received in Floydada at this time now stands at \$53,231.89. The 1995 total at this time

was \$51,658.59. This displays an overall increase of 3.04 percent for the city.

May payments totaling \$196.8 million in local sales tax rebates went back to 1,079 Texas cities and 115 counties, according to the state comptroller's office. This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on sales in March and reported to the comptroller in April by businesses filing monthly returns. Also included are taxes on sales made in January, February, and March which were reported in April by quarterly filers.

Sales taxes are collected by merchants and forwarded to the state which retains a 6.25 percent share and returns the city sales tax portion to

each city, county, hospital district or transit system. Neither Floyd County nor Lockney General Hospital District and Caprock Hospital District levies a sales tax at this time.

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## Owens presents program to TSTA

 FLOYDADA - Texas State Teachers Association, Floydada local, met in the Floyd County Historical Museum, Tuesday evening, May 7. Guest speaker was Jim Owens. Mr. Owens recalled how his early interest in archaeology was stirred by accompanying Jim Word on digs as a teenager. Mr. Owens has been internationally recognized as the discoverer of the Coronado campsite, which was named for him by Dr. Don Blakesly, head of the Archaeology department of Wichita University in Wichita, Kansas. Dr. Blakesly announced the discovery last month at the Smithsonian Institute.

The Spanish Ambassador to the United States was present and welcomed American scholars to study the Spanish archives on Coronado.

Mr. Owens described to the group of teachers how he had first located

the campsite in Blanco Canyon and the resulting artifacts. During the discussion period he stated the Coronado Museum in Kansas has only reproductions of artifacts but attracted 68,000 visitors last year. Many tourists and visitors will come to Floydada to see the authentic relics from the Spanish explorer's camps, Owens speculated.

The teachers shared Mr. Owens enthusiasm for future development of the historical campsite and other related sites which may be discovered in Floyd County. The speaker told of the archaeologists appreciation of the local people's hospitality during the three digs held here so far. The program closed as members and guests looked at the collections in the museum.

The tables in the conference room were decorated with arrangements of Texas bluebonnets and Kansas sunflowers.

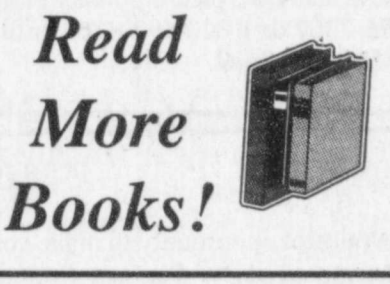

## Masons to make annual pilgrimage

On May 19, 1996, Texas Masons will make their annual pilgrimage to the Masonic Oak Park at Brazoria to celebrate the event which ultimately led to the formation of The Grand Masonic Lodge of Texas. The site is a plot of ground of 10 acres divided by a street named Pleasant, with the Masonic Oak near the street on one side and a pavilion and park on the other side.

It was under this tree that five Master Masons met at 10 a.m. on a day in March, 1835 to compose a petition to the Grand Lodge of Louisiana to form a Masonic Lodge in Texas. It was to be named Holland Lodge after the then Grand Master of Louisiana, John H. Holland. Anson Jones, first Grand Master of Masons in Texas and fourth Governor of the Republic of Texas was to be Master of the Lodge. The petition was granted.

That was the beginning of organized Masonry in Texas and the Grand Masonic Lodge of Texas, which now consist of 149,000 mem-

bers in 910 Constituent Lodges.

The practice of convening at the Masonic Oak Park in Brazoria began in 1949 when members of newly formed Anson Jones Lodge No. 1313 conceived the idea of a day of fellowship and picnic. The month of May was chosen because of the unpredictable weather in March. The idea caught on and became an annual pilgrimage, occurring now on the Sunday after Mother's Day.

It is the practice for the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas and his Grand Officers to attend. Activities start in the morning with a worship service, presentation of the Colors, and then awards for different categories such as "the oldest Mason there" or "who travelled the farthest" and so on, the latter all in fun. There are hayrides and games for children of all ages. The Grand Master is the principal speaker, and after his talk, a catered dinner concludes the program. ## "FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

**QUESTION:** I have observed that elementary school and junior high school students, even high schoolers, tend to admire teachers who are more strict. Is this your experience as well?



DR. DOBSON

**DR. DOBSON:** Yes, teachers who maintain order are often the most respected members of the faculty, provided they aren't mean and grouchy. A teacher who can control a class without being oppressive is almost always loved by his or her students. One reason is that there is safety and order. When a class is out of control, particularly at the elementary school level, the children are afraid of each other.

If the teacher can't make the class behave, how can he prevent a bully from doing his thing? How can he keep the students from ridiculing one of their less able members? Children are not very fair and understanding with each other, and they feel good about having a strong teacher who is. Second, children love justice. When someone has violated a rule, they want immediate retribution. They admire the teacher who can enforce an equitable system, and they find great comfort in reasonable social rules. By contract, the teacher who does not control his class inevitably allows crime to pay, violating something basic in the value system of children.

Third, children admire strict teach-

ers because chaos is nerve-racking. Screaming, hitting and wiggling are fun for about 10 minutes; then the confusion begins to get tiresome and irritating.

I have smiled in amusement many times as second- and third-grade children astutely evaluated the relative disciplinary skills of their teachers. They know how a class should be conducted. I only wish all of their teachers were equally aware of this important attribute.
