"Remember when you could get home from a summer driving trip and in cleaning the car throw away a collection of rumpled road maps, maybe coffee stained and folded every which way? And all of them bearing the name of some gasoline maker—Exxon, Diamond-Shamrock, Gulf, Texaco, etc.?"

The freebie road map was a handy item offered in most service stations in racks, with a selection usually covering several states in the area. And service station operators invited you to help yourself.

Not any more. Most service stations do not have road maps, free or otherwise, and those that are available have a price tag of \$1 or more on each one, and maybe have a coin machine that offers a choice of what you may need to get from where you are to places within a couple days driving distance.

With most gasoline today sold at self service pumps, the freebie map has gone the way of the windshield wash and the tire-pressure check. The philosophy, and I don't fault it seems to be: A fellow who will save a dollar or two by filling his own tank is handy enough to find his way on down the road without any special directions from the gasoline people. There is a logic to the new policy.

In the old days, maybe five or six years back, a road map might be used as a table cloth at a roadside park and might be casually rumpled and ripped, because there was a fresh, free one at the next stop.

The thing today is to gather up maps from your home supply before getting on the road for any distance. Our home supply increasingly has new generic maps bearing the name Rand McNally instead of Texaco, Mobil or Conoco.

For most of these we paid \$1, but one has price mark of \$1.25 on it. Probably bought it in New Mexico or Colorado, where Texans are fair game."

"I am real pleased with the opportunity to come here, and I'm looking forward to the challenges of the job. I don't mind saying that I am conservative, and will be doing all within my power to conduct the city's business as efficiently, economically and as effective as possible," Goodwin said.

Goodwin added that he was extremely impressed with the city's staff of personnel, and was looking forward to working with them.

The new city manager is a graduate of West Texas State University, with a major in journalism and minors in political science and English.

Following a stint as a sports editor and managing editor, Goodwin served two years in a public relations

capacity, and since January of 1981 had served as director of personnel at the City of Sweetwater.

"I believe in the open door policy. The city's books will always be open for inspection to anyone wanting to look at them," Goodwin said.

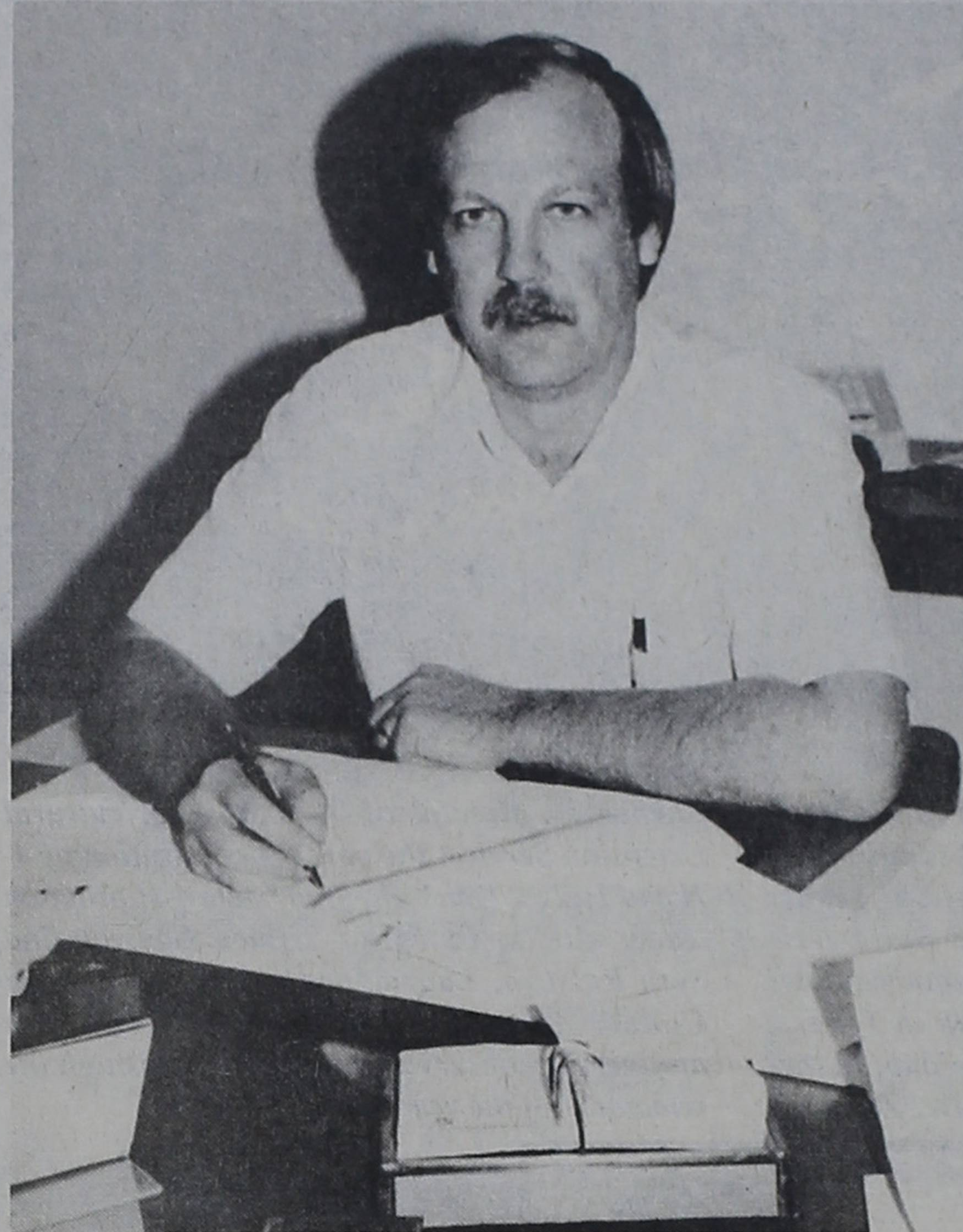
Friona 4-H Will Host Banquet

MHMR Center Aided By United Way Drive

(Editor's note: The Friona United Way kicks off November 7. Here is one place the money goes.)

For many human problems there are no easy answers or easy cures, but there is an alternative to coping with problems by yourself. For the past ten years, residents of Parmer County have found the hope and personal support they needed through services provided by Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center in Plainview, Texas. Since the Center's beginning, the staff has endeavored to help people handle their problems in the least amount of time, at the least cost. The staff stresses the importance of early attention and assistance because they often prevent small problems from becoming big ones.

Central Plains MHMR Center offers understanding and help to individuals experiencing an inability to handle distressing events such as divorce, unemployment, pressure to get into college or perform on the job, the "empty nest syndrome," pregnancy or death of a spouse or others. Also provided is professional, confidential services for marriage and family counseling, individual counseling, group therapy and parent/child relationship counseling ranging from minor communication problems to severe emotional trauma.

Your United Way contribution from Parmer County helps pay for the Center's Rural Infant Education Program (RIEP) provided by the

Children's Development Center, the special education unit of CPMHMR for developmentally disabled children. Teachers visit the homes of children in Parmer County and provide instruction to their parents. In essence, the parents become the teacher. RIEP is a program of individual treatment parents become the teacher. RIEP is a program of individual treatment for mentally and/or physically handicapped children and/or for developmentally disabled children in the following areas: daily living skills, gross motor skills, fine motor skills, language, cognitive skills, sensory training, and additional training according to the child's needs.

"When parents report back to us how pleased they are with how their child has benefitted from our programs, we know they are working," states Joyce Lacy, coordinator of the Children's Development Center. In addition to providing free education and rehabilitation to handicapped or high risk children, the Center provides a chance for these children to become individuals. Through hard work and careful guidance, they can grow and learn to be independent, to find strengths and knowledge that can help each one of them. The Children's Development Center does not charge for its services, instead making its budget from grants, contracts and the United Way.

Wilkins Is Grid Winner

Charles Wilkins won the weekly prize, while Patches Fleming was moving into first place in the standings, in the Friona Star's football contest.

Monday Is In-Service For School

The balance of the school calendar looks like this:

November: School dismisses at 2:45 p.m. November 23; students out November 24-25 and 28 (28th is in-service date); December: School dismisses at 2:45 December 21. School out December 22 through January 2 for Christmas-New Year's. (Classes resume Tuesday, January 3).

February: Classes dismiss 2:45 p.m. Thursday, February 23. Students out February 24, February 27-28 (February 24 is in-service day for teachers).

April: Classes dismiss at 2:45 Thursday, April 19. School out April 20, April 23-27 for Easter holidays.

May: May 25 is an in-service day for teachers, students do not attend classes.

Tax Statements Go Into Mail

Friona area residents are slated to receive their tax notices on city, school and county taxes in the mail within the next few days.

The tax rate for the Friona Independent School District is 97 cents per \$100 evaluation, which is no change from the 1982 rate.

The city's tax rate is 85 cents per \$100 evaluation, which is up from \$.786 per \$100 evaluation a year ago.

Chiefs, Hornets Open District

The Friona Chieftains were kicking off District 2-AAA play Friday night at Tulia, as the Panhandle area's toughest district gets down to the games that really count.

Friona Steer Wins Honors

Dana Berend, whose steer "Jumper" was earlier judged as grand champion at Amarillo's Tri-State Fair Junior Livestock Show, has added additional laurels in recent shows.

The steer was judged Reserve Champion of the show at the South Plains Fair at Lubbock, after earlier being named reserve champ of the "Exotic Steer" division.

Miss Berend, a Friona High School student, was awarded \$950 in prize money, plus a large, handsome trophy.

Earlier, the steer had won breed championship honors at Odessa and Big Spring, and Miss Berend was awarded the "showmanship" award at Odessa, in a larger than average show.

Having tasted the playoffs last season for the first time in 17 years, the Chiefs hope to get their district race off to a successful start, realizing that from here on in, each game is likely to be a bit tougher than the last.

And, although the Hornets' pre-district record may not have been imposing at 1-3-1, Chieftain coach Tommy Moss warned that records mean absolutely nothing.

"It's a new season for every team now, and those who had disappointing warm-up games are going to be out to do better. Plus, playing on the road, you never know just what is going to happen," Moss said.

Moss may have been referring to an earlier road game, which resulted in the team's only loss of the season, at Shallowater. However, last Friday in a road game at Farwell, the Chiefs played as tough as though they were the home team, while ruining Farwell's Homecoming game in the process.

This week, by the way, marks the third straight week for a Homecoming event, as the Hornets will be crowning their queen, etc. So far, the Chiefs are 2-0 in these games, and will be out to extend their streak.

Guard Mitch Reeve, who has been hobbled by a sprained ankle the past two weeks, remains questionable for the district opener. In addition, Alfredo Mata, who was a main-spring in the team's win at Farwell, has had the pink eye this week, and missed a couple days of practice. Otherwise, the team's physical condition is listed as good.

Thanks to the team's 448-yard achievement at Farwell, Friona went back into third place in the area for total offense. And runningback Charlie Morgan ranks sixth among class AAA players with his 621 yards gained.

But the Chiefs have a bevy of backfield Braves to throw at the Hornets. Morgan averages 6.8 yards a try, and is ably backed up by Reese Fleming, at 411 yards and 6.7 yards a try, and Mata, 392 yards and 5.9 average.

And the Chieftain defense is playing with pride, having registered their third shutout of the season last Friday, against one of the area's top-ranked offenses. "One area writer asked me 'What was wrong with Farwell?' I tried to hint that it just might have been our defense," said Coach Moss this week.



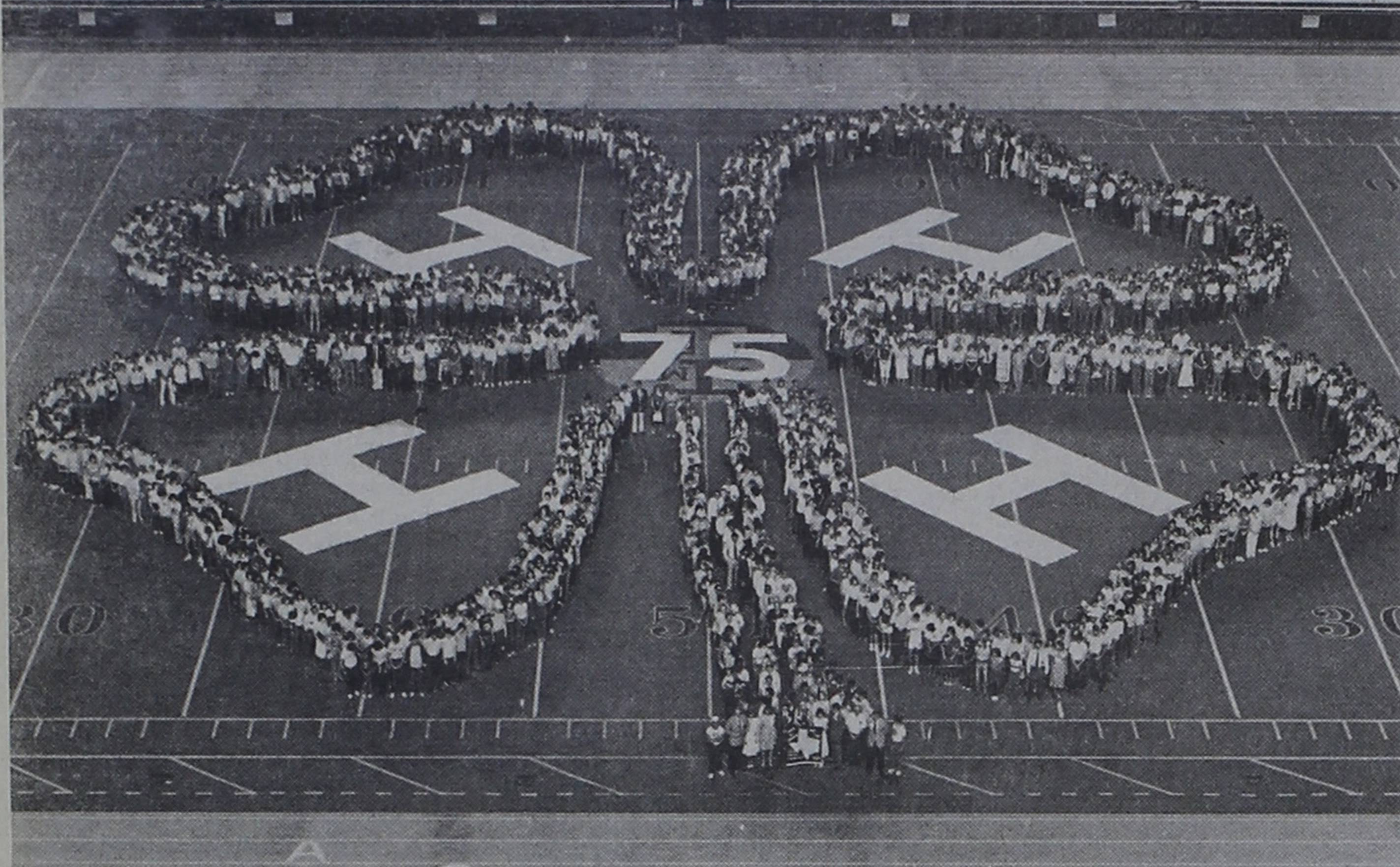

Chiefs Shut Out Rival Farwell By 34-0

When two of the area's highest-ranked offenses collided last Friday at Farwell, the question was: "Which team has the best defense?"

Before the night was over, the Friona Chieftains had more than provided the answer, in handing the Steers a 34-0 setback. It was the third shutout win for the Chiefs, who ran their season record to 4-1 with the win.

Farwell had entered the game as the top-ranked offensive team in the area for class AA teams, but could not move the ball consistently against the Chieftains' first-team defense.

The Chiefs, meanwhile, racked up their best night of the season in the ground-gaining department, finishing with a whopping 448 net yards.

Friona's running game was more than Farwell could handle, as Charlie Morgan ran for three touchdowns and 242 net yards in the process. For his performance, Morgan was named "Player of the Week" for class AAA by the Amarillo Globe-News this week.

Alfredo Mata scored a pair of touchdowns, and gained 120 yards, giving the Chieftains' top two rushers a total of 362 net yards. For his showing, Mata was cited as "honorable mention" in the "Player of the Week" feature.

Friona scored twice in the opening quarter, to take command of the game. Forced to punt for the only time in the contest, Ricky Barnett's kick backed Farwell into a hole at their own 14.

That set up a 45-yard Friona drive after the Chiefs allowed Farwell just a yard gained in their first offensive

series. Mata raced 15 yards, and Morgan got the TD from 14 yards out. Doug Carthel's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead with 5:38 left in the opening period.

Farwell again had to punt, and Friona came up with a dippy-doodle play, with Carthel taking the pitchout, then throwing a long pass to Eloy Caballero at about the Farwell six. However, Caballero fumbled as he was tackled, and the Steers claimed the ball.

But the long gain was not lost after all, since Friona covered a fumble, caused by Rudy Bermea, at the Farwell 19.

A pass interference penalty against the Steers in their end zone set the Chiefs up first and goal at the one. Morgan took the ball over on first down for his second TD, and Carthel's kick made it 14-0 with 1:06 left in the first quarter.

Farwell threatened in their next possession. The Steers completed a pass to get out of trouble, then speedy Santiago Lucio broke loose on a 48-yard run up the far sideline. But Caballero caught him from behind at the Friona 15.

This aroused the Friona defense, which caused another fumble on the next play, and the Chiefs took over on their own 12. The game became a little sloppy at this point, as Friona gave the ball back to Farwell on a fumble.

But a goal-line stand by the Chiefs gave Friona the ball back at their own two yard line. The team then set sail on a quick, 98-yard touchdown drive.

The last 77 yards came in rapid-fire succession. Morgan raced 22 yards,

Mata gained 26 yards, and then Morgan went the last 29 yards for the score. Carthel's kick gave Friona a 21-0 lead, which was the halftime score.

The Chiefs picked up right where they had left off in the third quarter, driving 80 yards for a touchdown. This drive was a meticulous, sustained drive, unlike the quick score prior to halftime.

Mata got the TD from a yard out, and although Carthel's kick sailed a bit wide, the 27-0 lead was insurmountable.

Caballero intercepted an Alan Eubank pass in the next series, setting up a 53-yard, eight-play drive. Mata again got the points from three yards out. Carthel's kick made the final margin of 34-0.

With Friona reserves taking over, Eubank began to pick the inexperienced defense apart, and drove the Steers from their 35 to the Friona 13. However, on a third down, Carthel blitzed through to tackle Lucio for a 15-yard loss and Friona took over.

The Chiefs almost had another TD, after Morgan made a pretty 50-yard broken-field run to the Steer 12. Joe Garza went to the Farwell one, but a clipping penalty set the team back.

Reserve quarterback Ricky Barnett's pass was intercepted at the Farwell two to end the threat.

Farwell again used the opportunity to make some yardage, trying desperately to get on the scoreboard. They drove to the Friona three for a first and goal, and seemed destined to score. However, the Chiefs came up with another goal-line stand.

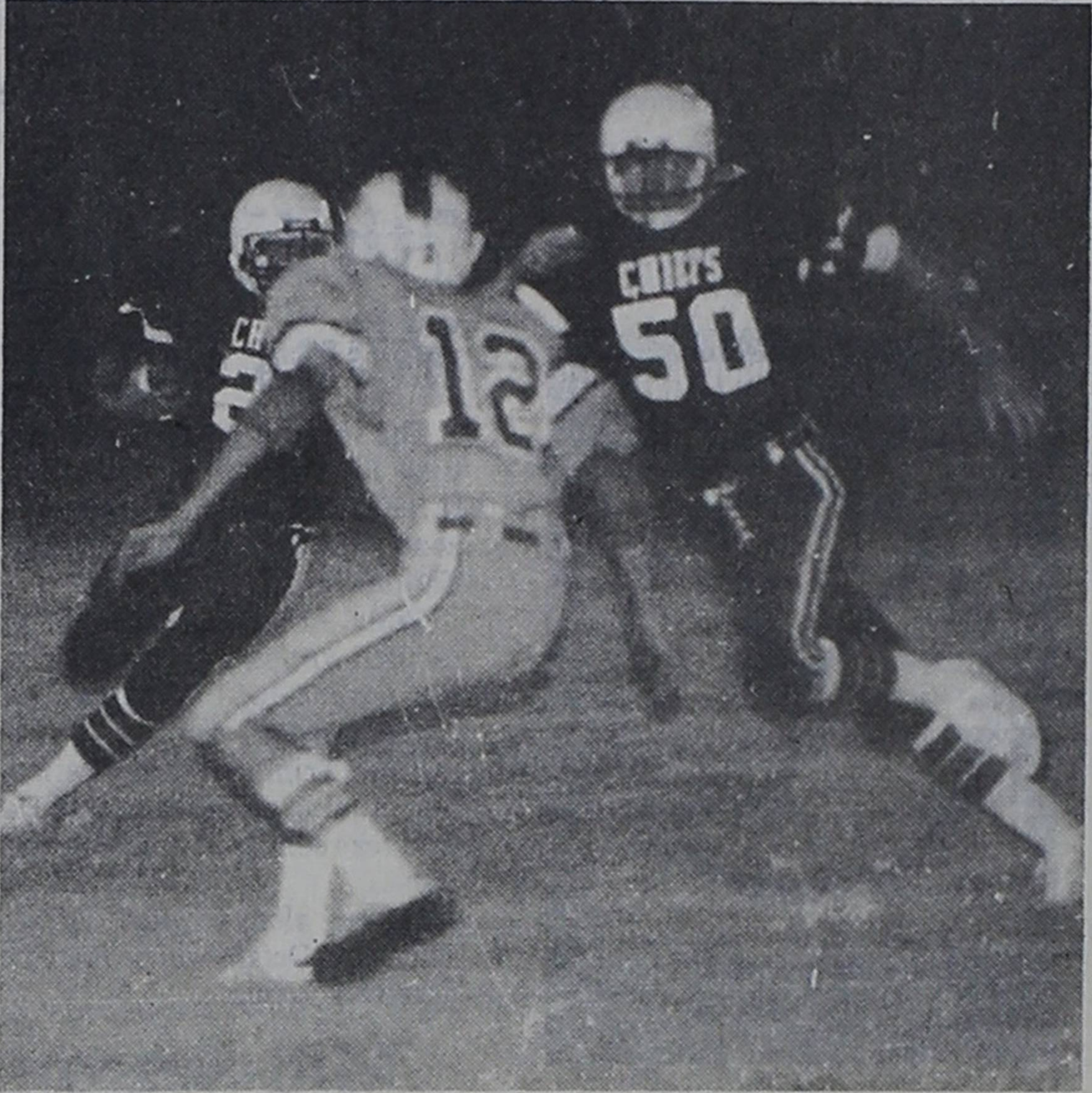
Coach Moss put his starters back in for this series, and Friona took over the ball four plays later at their own 16.

The 448-yard game was Friona's biggest of the season. Farwell, averaging 420 yards per game coming into the contest, was held to 274 yards, with over 100 of these coming against Friona reserves.

Friona upped its lead in the all-time series to 25-21-1. It was Friona's 15th shutout win in the rivalry. Farwell has ten, and one game ended in a 0-0 tie.

Blue Angels Set Show In Amarillo

The U.S. Navy Blue Angels will arrive in Amarillo, October 8-9, for the second professional air show in that city's history. The precision jet pilot team will appear on a bill including the Eagles Aerobatic Flight Team, the world's smallest jet "Silver Bullet" and the U.S. Army Golden Knights Parachute Team.

Amarillo Air Show '83 will be held Saturday and Sunday, October 8-9, at the city's International Airport on I-40 East. It's sponsored by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee. Free parking is available on the southeast side of the airport. Gates will open at 10 a.m., to allow visitors time to tour the ground displays.

The newest military aircraft, World War II aircraft, the latest business aircraft, experimental craft and a few ultra-light aircraft will be spread out on the 20-acre air show tract at the airport. Nearly 30 Amarillo community service organizations will run the concessions at the show.

Gate admission will be \$6 for adults, \$2 for children 6-12, and free for under six. Pre-ticket sales are being held at the Hastings Book Stores in Amarillo, Pampa and Borger. In Amarillo, ticket sales will also be at Sears, Sharp's Honda and the Amarillo International Airport Information/Insurance Counter.

In addition, a trip for four to Disneyworld will be drawn for at the Air Show on Saturday. The trip is sponsored by American Airlines and Coca-Cola. Contest forms are being distributed throughout the Panhandle in Coca-Cola six pack cartons. On Sunday, two trips to Nassau will be drawn for courtesy of Delta Airlines and McDonald's Restaurants. Application forms for that drawing are being distributed through McDonald's Restaurants in the area.

The Blue Angels demonstration consists of six A-4F Skyhawk II's performing a prescribed sequence of maneuvers. The aircraft are seen in three components: a diamond formation of four aircraft; two solo aircraft that oppose each other along the line of flight; and, finally, all six aircraft in a delta formation.

In combat, the tactics that the Blue Angels demonstrate might be flown from treetop level to 60,000 feet. However, for the aerospace enthusiasts who come to watch the Amarillo Air Show, the Blues bring all maneuvers down to eye level. Bringing it down involves performing at low altitudes, using skills taught to student pilots at high altitudes.

None of the maneuvers are stunts or "daring feats," for all are part of the stock-in-trade of any fighter or attack pilot in tactical maneuvers. They are done in extremely close formation rather than individually and are done at a lower altitude than is normally the case.

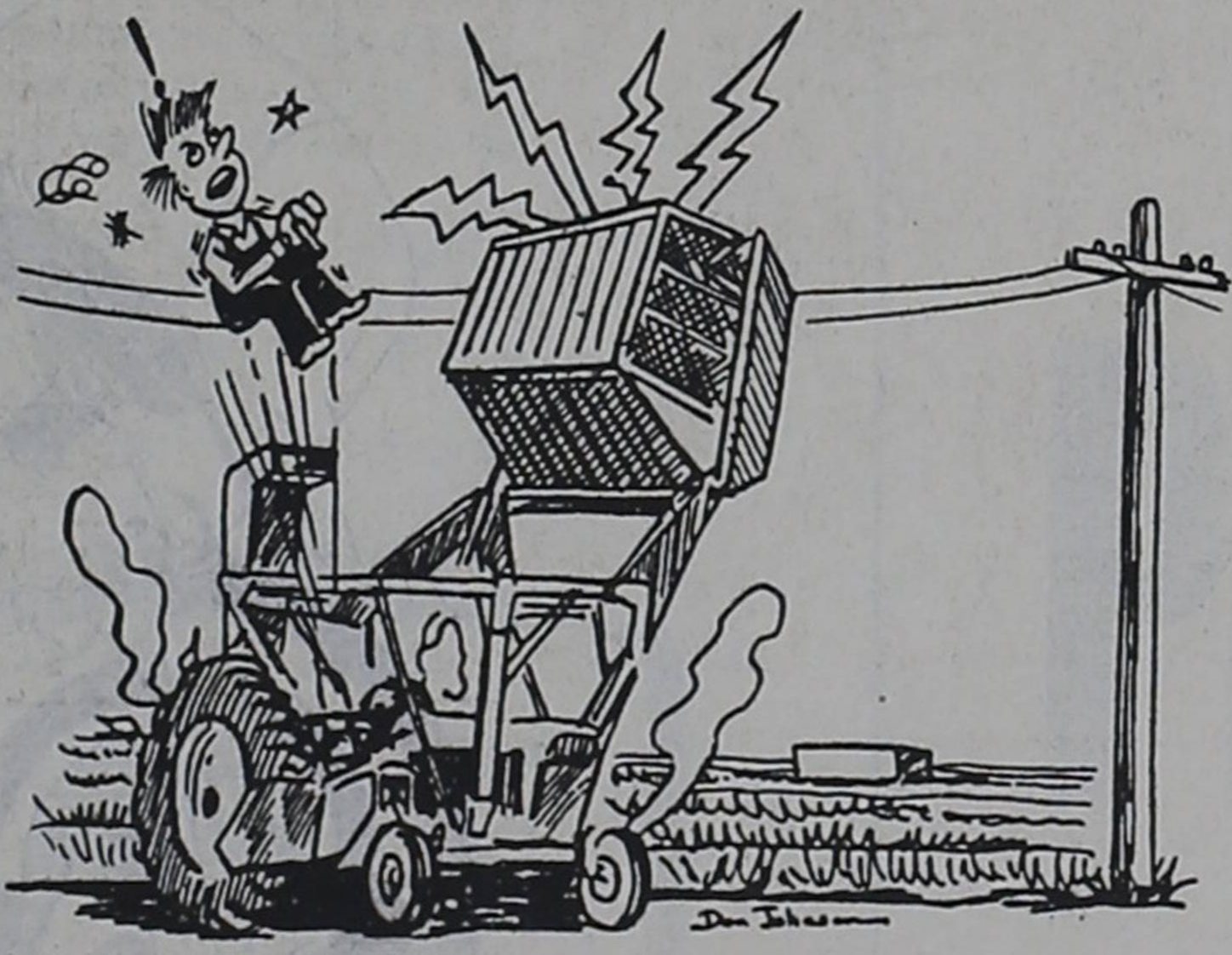

Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

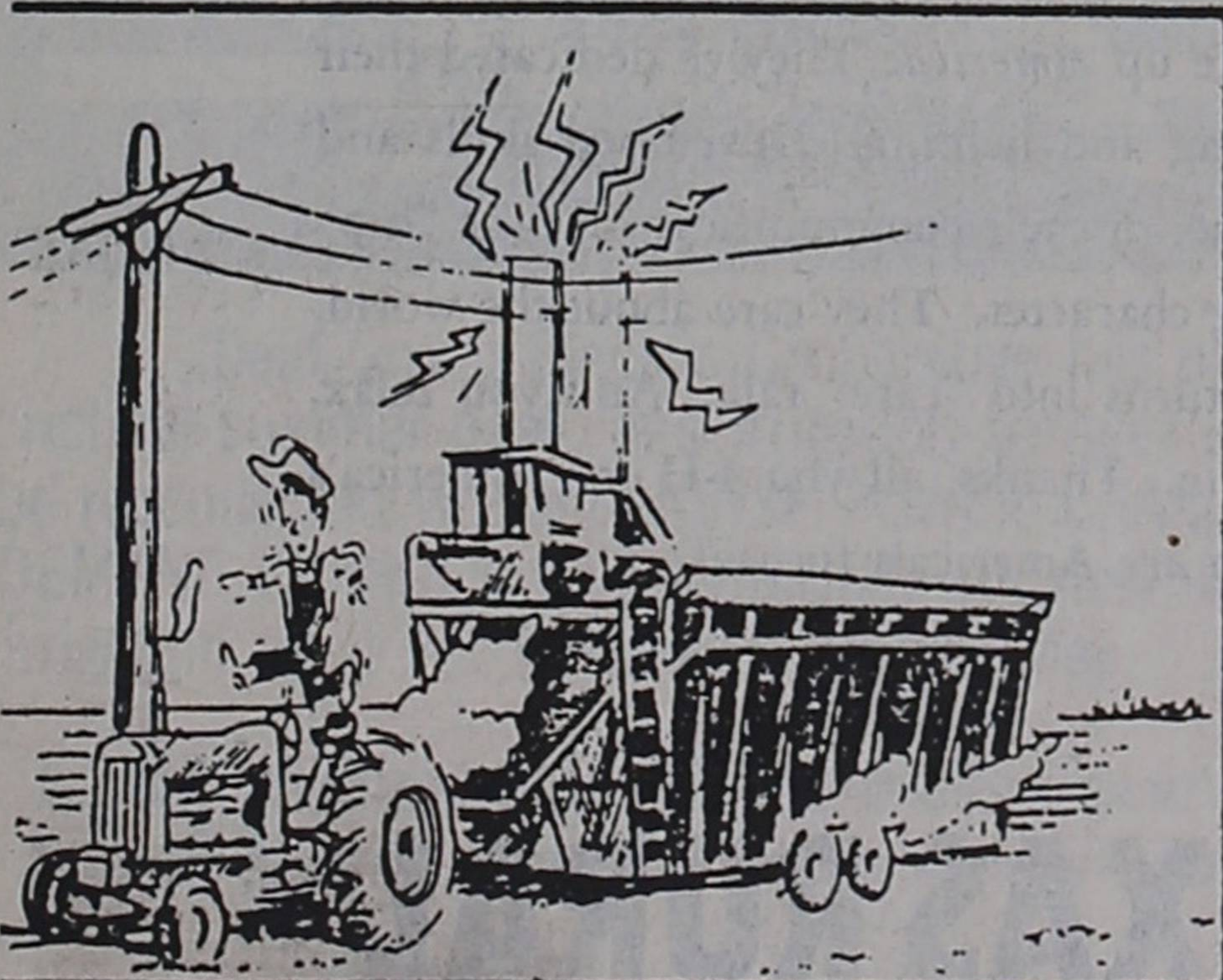
In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.



If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

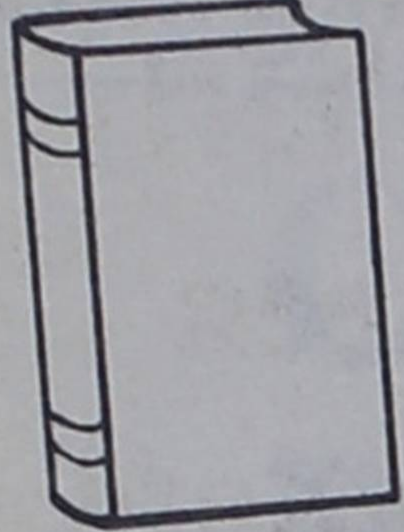

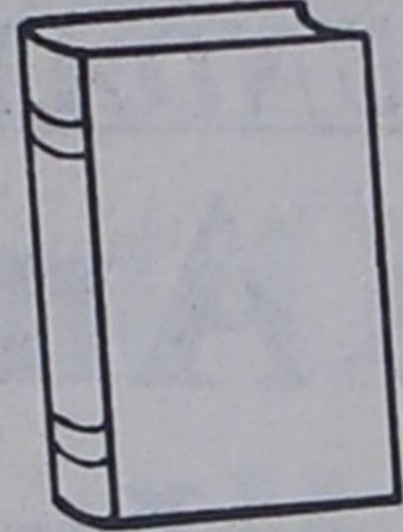

Library Corner

"We enjoy sharing our books as we do our friends, asking only that you treat them well and see them safely home." It seems a small thing to ask that books be treated well and seen safely home, but it's something that's not always done.

Library books are here for everyone to use and enjoy, but everything depends upon the books being returned promptly and in good condition. There are those who fail to return books on time (everyone can plead guilty to this occasionally) and then there are those who fail to return books at all.

To lose a book is not an unforgivable wrong, it is even a correctable one. The books can be paid for and replaced so that the collection doesn't suffer. There is no reason to simply not return library books. The books are for your benefit to be used anytime you desire as often as you desire; but when one person keeps a book--he deprives all others from the use of that book. If enough people do this, our service really suffers.

Failure to return library materials is, in effect, stealing. Loss of library materials in this manner is a very serious and unfortunately, a growing problem for libraries. The cost element of trying to retrieve the books and/or replacing the books alone is tremendous. Larger libraries have had to resort to using legal means of retrieving their materials

which adds even more expense and creates a sad state of affairs for libraries.

If you happen to have a library book that's long overdue or if you've lost one--do something about it--make it right. We don't want to prosecute you; we just want the books returned.

So many people are gracious enough to give us books, magazines, etc. for library use; our borrowers need to be gracious enough to return our materials on time.

Speaking of people being gracious--I contacted Lunell Horton about purchasing one of her cookbooks for the library, and she very generously made a special trip down to give us a copy of "Friends and Family Cookbook." Now available for checkout, it is indeed a very warm, personable book. It's almost as if we're looking over her shoulder as she prepares the different dishes. The personal stories and tips at the ends of the recipes really add to the book. Hope you caught her reviews in the Friona Star and the Amarillo Daily News, but if not, come by the library and read them at her display.

Also on display is a collection of algebra books dating from 1859 loaned to us by John Southall. The books show various teaching methods and approaches from 1859 to the present. One book was used at Friona High School in about 1916. There are even algebra books in French, German and Venezuelan to make things really complicated!

During a September that just seemed to whiz by we checked out 1176 items to 540 readers with 16 new readers. Story Hour began on September 15; total attendance 15. We seem to be off to a slow start this year; we do need more volunteer readers. Call 247-3200 if you're interested.

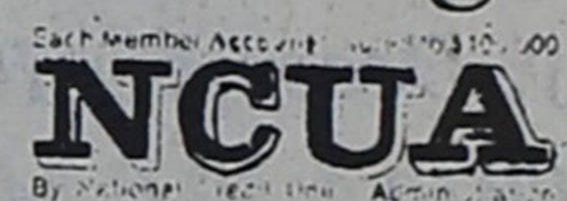

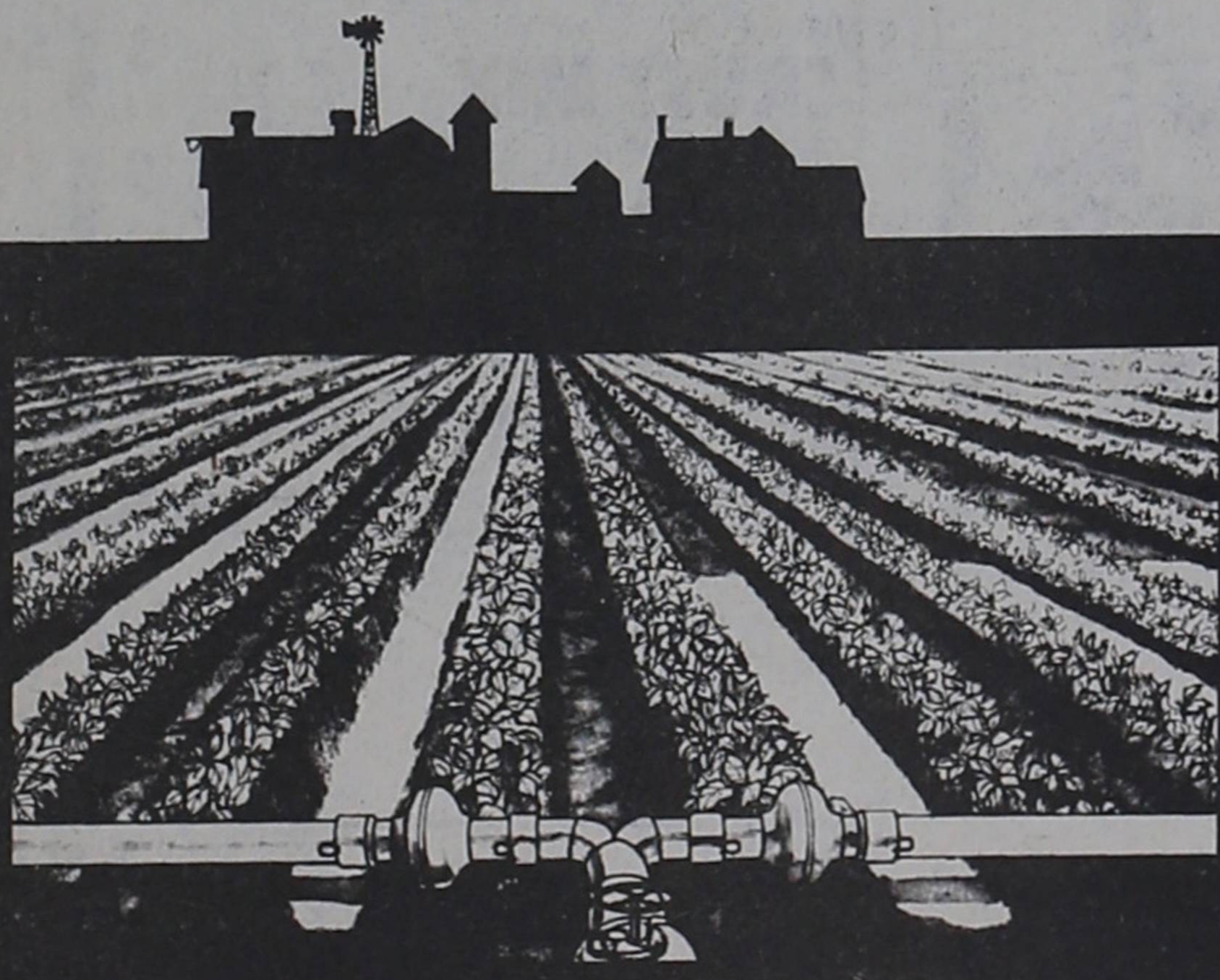
