## Hospital continues to grow

**LOCKNEY**—The walls continue to rise on the new emergency room and clinic wing at W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital.

Mangold Memorial is adding 3,385 feet on two different locations at the hospital and also remodeling 9,402 feet of existing areas.

The new clinic space is being added to accommodate the practice of Dr. Shayne White who will be joining the hospital in 1997, and the old Lockney General Hospital area is being remodeled for office space.

The new emergency room will be added to the east end of the new hospital addition. The ER will have a main trauma room and a lower level

trauma room. The addition will also include a waiting room, emergency lab, X-ray unit and will have a covered area in the parking lot for unloading patients.

"We are about one-third of the way through with the construction," said hospital administrator Robin Satterwhite. "As of now we are actually ahead of schedule and everything is going very well."

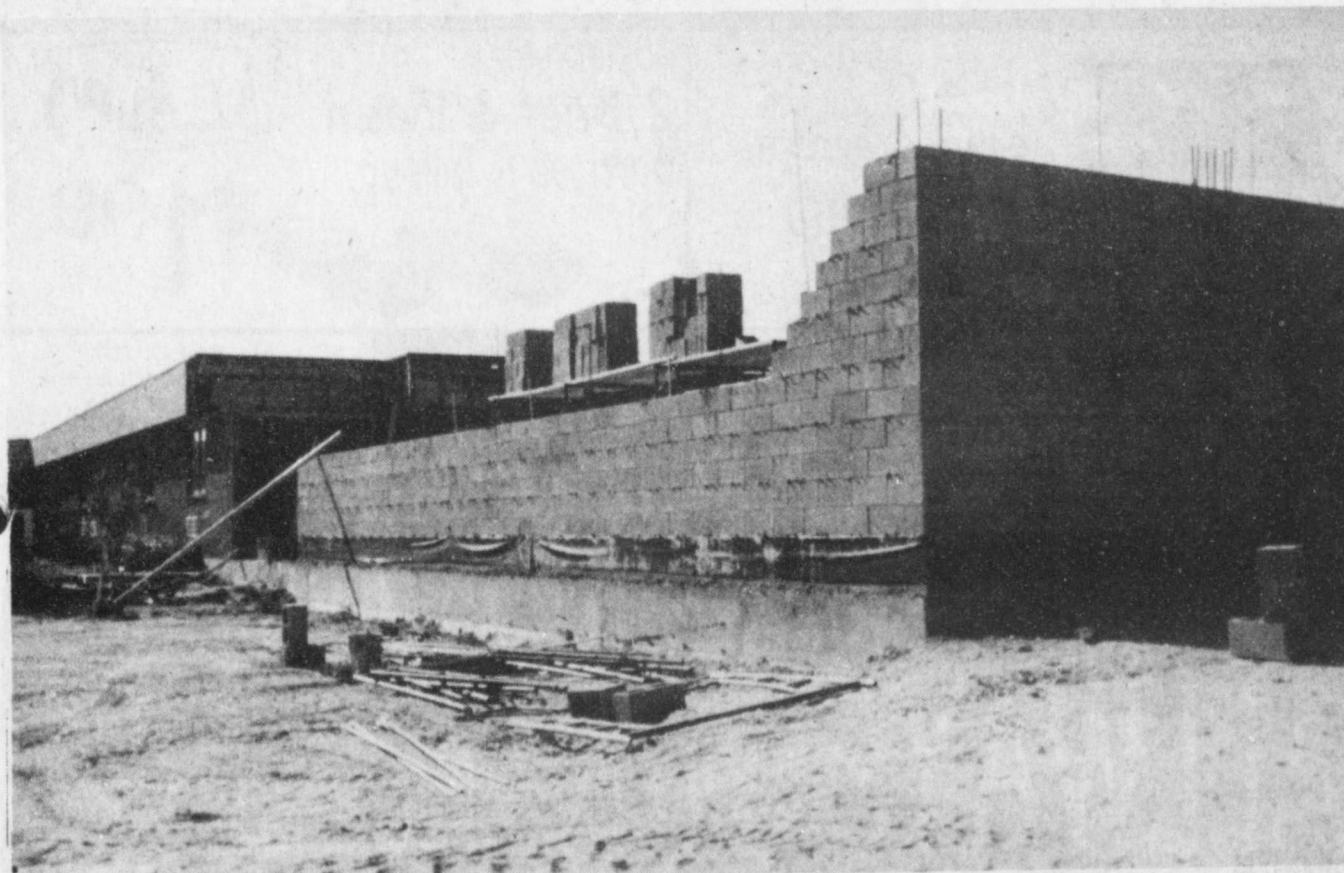
Mangold Memorial Hospital received a Trauma IV designation from the Texas Department of Health in 1995. The Trauma IV designation means that the hospital meets standards by Texas Department of Health for care, treatment, stabilization and

transport of trauma patients to a higher level trauma facility.

Mangold Memorial was constructed in 1993, replacing the older Lockney General Hospital. The older portion of the hospital remained a part of the newer building and is now being used for clinic and office space.

The new hospital is currently licensed for 27 beds including four birthing rooms. Seventy five people are employed at the hospital and approximately 1,800 people are seen in the clinic monthly.

Doctors on staff include Dr. Gary Mangold, Dr. Kevin Stennett and Dr. Kevin Stewart.

## TAAS scores announced

Scores up in some subjects and down in others

Efforts of administrators, staff and students have yielded mixed results according to scores on the Spring 1996 TAAS Test recently received by schools in Floydada and Lockney. The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills or TAAS test was given to students state wide in early May. Students in grades 3 through 8 and grade 10 were given tests in reading and math. Grades 4, 8, and 10 were also given a writing test.

Floydada and Lockney Independent School Districts received individual and group results the final week of school. Floydada student's individual results were sent home with report cards in grades 3 through 8. Lockney results will be released following the June LISD Board Meeting.

A.B. Duncan 1995-96 3rd graders scored 5 percentage points higher in reading than 1995-96 third graders, from 51% to 56%. Math scores remained constant at 51%. The percentage of Floydada 3rd grade students passing all tests taken rose by 6 percentage points this year.

Third graders in Lockney scored 77% in reading and 74% in math this year. Last year's 3rd grade results were 92% in reading and 95% in math. 64% of the students passed all tests this year compared to 86% last year.

Lockney fourth graders this year scored 80% in reading, 85% in math and 97% in writing. 1994-95 fourth graders scored 81% in reading, 83% in math, and 81% in writing. 70% of Lockney fourth graders passed all tests this year, compared to 65% last year.

R.C. Andrews 4th graders in Floydada scored 48% in reading, 51% in math, and 54% in writing on the 1996 tests. Results in 1994-95 for fourth

grade students were recorded at 61% in reading, 41% in Math, and 73% in writing. 4th grade students that passed all tests taken this spring went up 2 percentage points.

Floydada 5th grade results in reading were at 65%, and math was 56%. 5th graders last year in Floydada scored 80% in reading and 59% in math. Writing tests are not administered to fifth graders.

Lockney fifth graders scored 84% in reading this year, up a percent from the 83% last year. Math scores fell by a percent from 78% last year to 77% this year. 72% passed all tests, compared to 75% last year.

6th grade results in Floydada showed reading scores for this year are 84%, up from 78% last year. Math scores zoomed to 89% from 62% last year. 82% of all Floydada 6th graders passed all tests taken this year.

Lockney sixth graders increased in both areas tested this year. Reading scores rose from 79% to 80% and math scores were up to 78% from 70% last year. 67% of the Lockney 6th graders passed both tests this year. The percentage passing both tests in 1994-95 was 63.

Floydada Junior High School 7th graders scored at 74% in reading and 41% in math. Results from 1995 for seventh grade students were 75% in Reading and 69% in Math.

87% of the seventh graders in Lockney passed the reading tests this year, compared to 83% last year. Math results showed 78% passing, down from 80% last year. 71% of the Lockney seventh graders passed both tests this spring, with 78% passing both last year.

FJHS 8th graders boosted scores from 64% last year to 76% this year

in reading but decreased from 69% last year to 68% this year in math. 72% of this year's Floydada 8th graders passed the writing test this year, compared to 69% last year.

Eighth graders also took tests in science and social studies. Individual scores and results of these tests were given to the students. At this time, the state does not track these results for accountability purposes and results are not included in this article.

Lockney eighth grade students increased the number passing all tests from 52% last year to 66% this year. 75% demonstrated mastery on the reading section this time, compared to 79% last year. Math scores rose from 55% last year to 78% this year.

High school sophomores took exit level TAAS tests in mid-March. Students are tested in reading, math, and writing. Students must pass all three tests by the end of their senior year in order to be eligible to receive a high school diploma.

This year, Floydada sophomores scored 90% in reading and 90% in writing. Math scores were at 77%, with those passing all tests taken remaining constant at 70%. Results for the 1994-95 sophomores at FHS were 95% in writing, 86% in reading, and 77% in math.

Lockney sophomores increased their scores in reading from 89% to 91%. Their math scores increased from 72% last year to 81% this year. Writing scores went up from 96% last year to 98% this year. 74% of the Lockney tenth graders demonstrated mastery of all three test sections this year, compared to 71% last year.

Exit level students that did not pass TAAS this spring will be able to take the test again on July 16, 17, and 18.

## Up to 20,000 acres to be replanted

The figures are not all in for Floyd County but as of Monday, Trent Johnson, executive director for the Farm Service Agency, estimates that Floyd County farmers will be replanting between 17,000 and 20,000 acres of cotton.

The crop was lost in last week's hail and sand storm. "The sand was probably the most damaging," said Johnson. "It (sand) cut the cotton plants like glass."

Johnson also said some corn was

lost but most of the onion crop was saved. Reports on lost acreage could increase throughout the week and

Johnson said, "If the weather cooperates most of the cotton should be replanted."

The team from Lockney High was given a superior recognition as being selected as the Top Team.

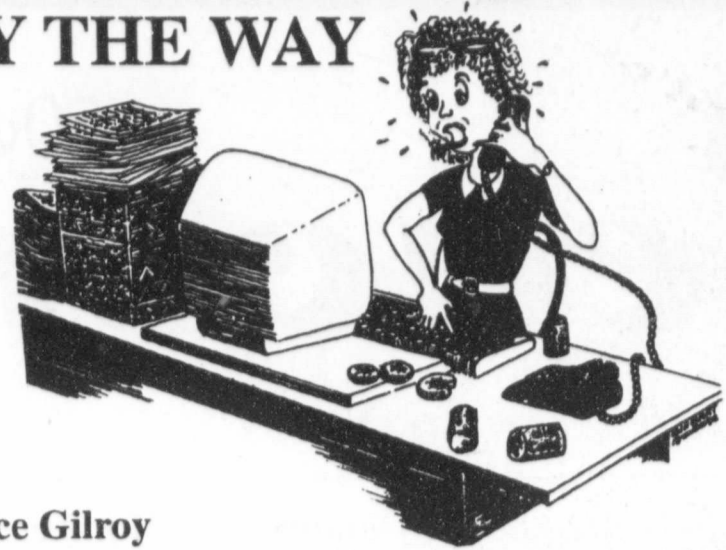
The team members also received another top recognition and will be given the chance to compete at the

## The Lamplighter

The rains finally came, for which we are most grateful, most thankful. Everyone knew, of course, that it would finally happen, but those old enough to have a long memory were getting a little worried.

For the second year in a row the dry-land wheat was a disaster. The rain, where it did fall, was too late to help this year's wheat crop, but otherwise it was of tremendous benefit. Even the birds are happier, as are the folks who put on the Old Settlers Reunion, and the people who hosted the Floyd County Museum's open house, and last but not least, the staff who put out that wonderful 100th anniversary edition of the Hesperian-Beacon.

One swallow may not make a Spring, nor one rain break a drought, but it sure helps. Some areas of the county got enough rain fill the plays. Some got less, but nearly everyone got enough to revive the spirit.

From what we read in various publications, and hear on various television "news" programs, Mr. Dole and a bunch of other Republicans seem to be upset over what they perceive as a liberal slant in current political reporting. They also profess to be surprised by this development.

Upset, we can understand. Surprised, we can't.

The Freedom Forum, a part of the Freedom Foundation founded and funded by the Gannett people (they own a vast media conglomerate in America, and are anything but right-wing conservative) recently did a survey to determine just how the Washington media establishment, those folks who set the tone for political reporting in America, feel about politics and political issues. They polled, as we understand it, the chiefs of something like 140 news bureaus in Washington. (All the biggies have bureaus in Washington...the Los Angeles Times, The New York Times, The Associated Press, ABC, NBC, CBS, the Chicago Tribune, people like that. You read, or see, their stuff every day.) Much to their obvious surprise they found that 89 percent of those surveyed had voted for Bill Clinton for President in 1992. Only 7 percent would admit they voted for Bush, the Republican who was President at the time, while 2 percent said they voted for Perot.

Much to the surprise of many others, however, and much to their own credit, Freedom Forum had the integrity to release its findings, despite its findings.

The reaction from the national press was immediate and predictable. "Yes, but." Yes, we may be overwhelmingly liberal, the line goes, but that does not influence the way we report politics. Yes, we voted to put him in office, but we have no vested philosophical interest in defending him or keeping him there.

In reacting in that manner, they merely add hypocrisy to their list of journalistic sins.

from that calling, even though the Party it was meant to serve has changed both its mind and its heart many times. Even in our own lifetime the national Democratic party has moved from right to left, and the Statesman has moved with it. Generally, they're in favor. How do they feel about cutting government programs? Generally, they're opposed. How do they feel about reducing the government's regulation of practically all aspects of a citizen's life? They're opposed. How do they feel about homosexual issues? Their religion editor, the man who determines how religion is covered by the paper, is an openly avowed homosexual. You can guess who fares best in his coverage, the red-necked, "right-wing extremist" pastors who do not approve of homosexuality, or the

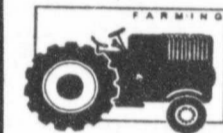
fuzzy minded "moderate" pastors who see nothing wrong with it. How does the paper feel about reporting on politics? Their political editor is a man who makes no bones about his total commitment to liberalism, and his desire to see it triumph in all aspects of America's social and economic life. The paper recently bounced its lone local token conservative columnist, John Knaggs, because he had the temerity to compare Whitewater to Watergate in political terms.

So it goes. Anyone who thinks conservative viewpoints will get a fair shake in situations like that (a situation that is becoming all too common in America's media) needs to go back and look at his hole card.

The presentation of the NCA "All-American Team" award came at the completion of training on cheerleading technique, cheers, chants, jumps, partner students and pyramids, as well as a leadership program for sportsmanship, responsibilities, organization, and dedication.

As an "All-American Team" members, the cheerleaders are eligible to travel with NCA and will be featured in the Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii and the Comp USA Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando, Florida.

The "Top Team" is chosen on the last day of camp. The teams compete with a cheer they have learned during the week. Technical skills as well as the ability to lead the crowd are judged to select the winner.

As a "Top Team" award winner, the Lockney Cheerleaders are eligible to travel nationally with NCA and will be featured in the Hula Bowl All-Star Football Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The National Cheerleaders Association selects teams at each of the 1,000 camps it administers around the world each summer. ## Local Troupe selected as Touring Artists

The NEW Musical Grays' Stock Company, a Floydada-based theatrical troupe, has received notification of its inclusion in the Texas Touring Artists program of the Texas Commission on the Arts. The program provides financial assistance to metropolitan and rural communities for presentations by outstanding Texas-based companies and artists who perform at least thirty miles outside their city of residence.

The Performing Arts Touring Advisory Panel of the Texas Commission on the Arts review applicants for this program every two years, and the NEW Musical Grays have been selected for 1996-1998. They will be listed in the Texas Touring Arts Program Company/Artist Roster, and

approved presenters (theatres, civic organizations, etc.) will receive up to 50% of the Grays' fees for engagements.

The NEW Musical Grays, organized by Bill and Dell Gray, was formed not only as a tribute to the Gray family's show business legacy, but also to revive repertoire theatre and vaudeville in the restored theatres and opera houses of the Southwest. The company features music, singers, dancers, magic, and authentic routines and comedy skits from the golden years of vaudeville and tent show eras.

The troupe has appeared twice at the Gem Theatre in Claude, Texas, and at the Flickenger Center for the Performing Arts in Alamogordo, New Mexico. They presented "Salute to 80

Years of Vaudeville" during a 6-performance engagement at Post's Garza Theatre in February and March.

Future appearances include The Opera House in Anson, Texas, on July 16, and Brownfield's Middle School Auditorium on July 13 (for the benefit of the restoration project at the Rialto Theatre).

The company will present "Salute to 80 Years of Vaudeville" at the Lockney Elementary Cafeterium on Saturday, August 17. Sponsored by Floyd County Friends, the show will benefit the proposed Multi-Purpose Center.

Several from the Grays' "cast pool" are involved in the Lubbock Community Theatre's production of the legendary Rogers and Hammerstein musical, "Oklahoma!", currently showing at the restored Cactus Theatre. Those include Jane Prince-Jones (director), Dell Gray (musical director/pianist), Bill Gray (percussion), Tonya Marr (percussion/keyboards), Jeremy Danial (stage manager/lights and sound), William Lyon (Andrew Carnes), Scott Timms (Will Parker), and Ashleigh Decker (dancer).

## Farris receives honors from Congressman

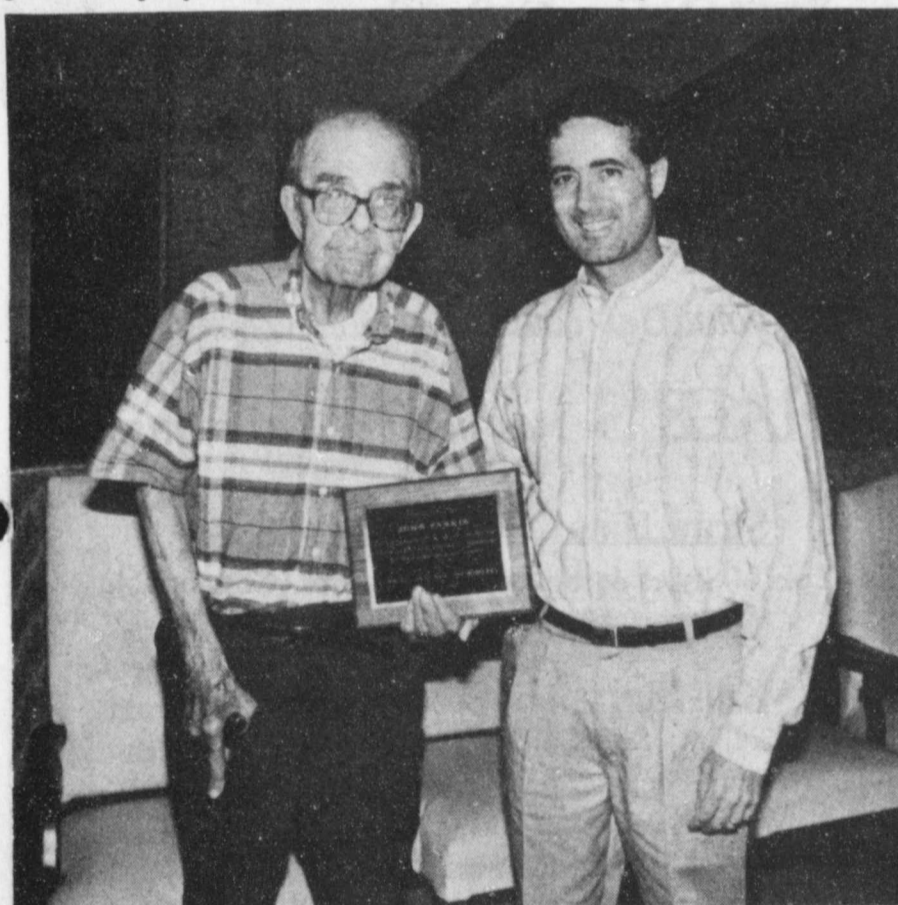
Congressman Mac Thornberry took time out of his busy campaign schedule Friday to visit Floydada Nursing Home where he presented a plaque to John Farris in recognition of his many years of dedicated and loyal service to the Republican Party.

Mr. Farris is a native of Floydada having been born here on March 31, 1912. His father, John Newton Farris Sr., came here from Missouri by horseback before the turn of the century, leading a pack mule and living off the land as he traveled. He married Laura Rucker in 1911 and made his home in Floydada where John and his siblings were born and raised.

John was drafted into the armed forces in July 1942 and served in the Pacific Theater during World War II. He saw duty in New Guinea, the Philippines and Okinawa.

John became a Republican while in the Air Force and upon return to Floydada he served as County Chairman for twenty-five years beginning in 1946. He attended several State Conventions and was a delegate to the Republican National Convention when Dwight D. Eisenhower was nominated.

Mr. Farris spent most of his life as a farmer and except for his tenure of service during WW II lived his entire life in Floyd County. He came to live at Floydada Nursing Home in March of this year.

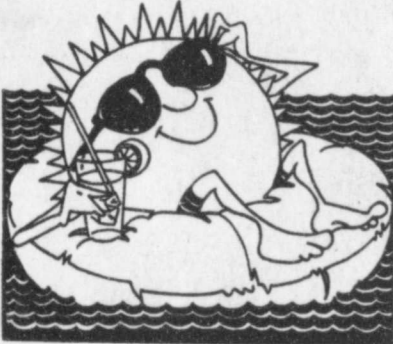

3/4 stick melted oleo

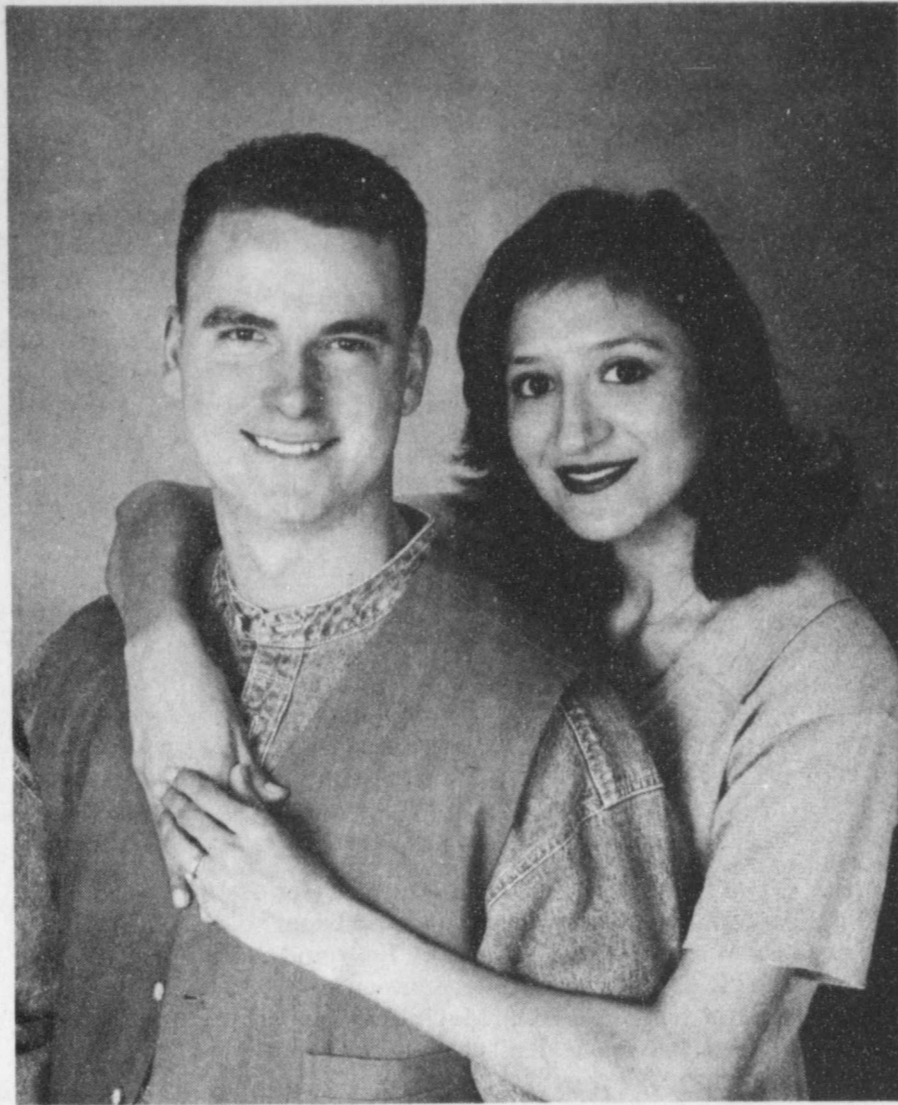

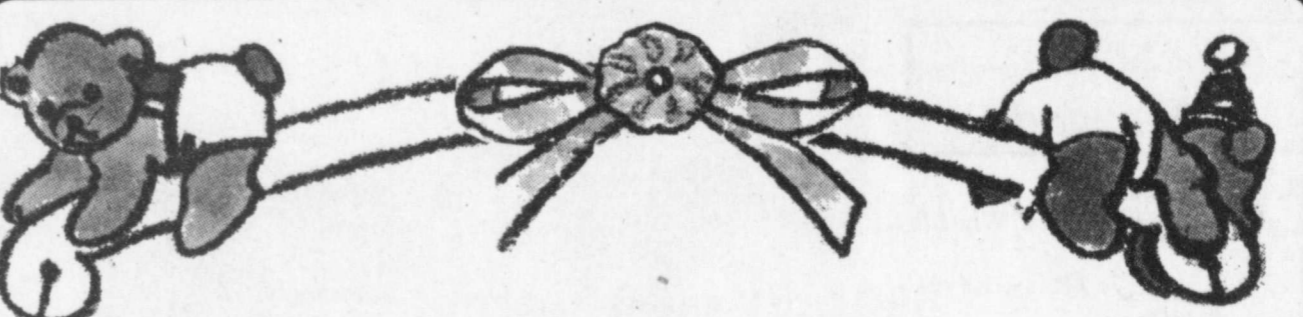

**NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE**

### "FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

**QUESTION: I don't think my husband understands the problems I experience during the menstrual cycle. Will you offer some advice to him about these physiological factors?**

**DR. DOBSON:** Having never had a period, it is difficult for a man to comprehend the bloated, sluggish feeling that motivates his wife's snappy remarks and irritability during the premenstrual period.

I am reminded of an incident related to me by my late friend Dr. David Hernandez, who was an obstetrician and gynecologist in private practice. The true story involves Latin men whose wives were given birth control pills by a pharmaceutical company. The Federal Drug Administration in America would not permit hormonal research to be conducted, so the company selected a small fishing village in South America, which agreed to cooperate.

All the women in the town were given the pill on the same date, and after three weeks, the prescription was terminated to permit menstruation. That meant, of course, that every adult female in the community was experiencing premenstrual tension at the same time. The men couldn't take it. They all headed for their boats each month and remained at sea until the crisis passed.

Going fishing is not the answer to monthly physiological stresses, of course. It is extremely important for a man to learn to anticipate his wife's menstrual period, recognizing the emotional change that will accompany it. Of particular importance is the need for affection and tenderness during this time, even though she may be rather unlovable for three or four days.

He should also avoid discussion of financial problems or other threatening topics until the internal storm has passed, and keep the home atmosphere as tranquil as possible.

Let me conclude by addressing a final comment directly to husbands. Because stress is such an influential

factor in this problem of premenstrual tension, anything you can do to reduce environmental pressure is sure to help her feel better. If you are aware of the times when she is going to be feeling the strain, you should lighten the family commitments.

Eating out can reduce the obligation to plan and cook meals. Do what you can to keep the kids out of her hair, especially the noisy, younger ones. Take them to the park for an afternoon. Read to them or engage them in a quiet game, leaving their mother free to relax as much as possible.

Because your wife's sexual desire is at low ebb that week, make fewer physical demands on her—but continue to be affectionate, reassuring and loving toward her. Remember that women often feel "ugly" when they are experiencing premenstrual tension, so let her know that you find her as attractive as ever.

In some ways, the husband's role during his wife's menstrual period should be that of an understanding, loving, gentle parent. Just as parents do more giving than receiving, this is a man's time to support his wife in every way possible.

# Floyd County Farm News

## Pest management program next on agenda for thrip, flea hoppers and over wintering boll weevil

Now that some of our cotton is in the ground and the rest will follow suit as soon as conditions permit, producers need to consider their pest management program. Regular field scouting is a vital part of any pest management program. It is the only reliable way to determine if and when pest numbers reach the economic threshold. The economic threshold is the point at which a pest population reaches a level at which further pest increases would result in excessive yield of quality losses.

Early season cotton pests occur during the 5-6 week period after emergence. Major pests during this period include thrips, flea hoppers and overwintering bollweevil. Thrips are slender, straw colored insects about 1/15

inch long with rasping and sucking mouth parts. Thrips attack leaves, leaf buds and very small squares; and may cause a silvering of the lower leaf surface, deformed or blackened leaves, terminal loss and square loss. Thrip damage is most evident during cool, wet periods when small cotton is growing slowly. Significant damage from thrips rarely occurs after the 4-6 true leaf stage. Control of thrips may be justified when an average of 1-5 thrips per plant is found.

Flea hoppers are about 1/8 inch long and pale green. Nymphs resemble adults, but lack wings and are light green. These pests move very rapidly when disturbed. Adults move from weed host to cotton fields when cotton begins to square. Pinhead size and smaller squares are most susceptible to damage. During the first three

weeks of squaring, the economic threshold is 25-30 flea hoppers per 100 terminals combined with less than 75 % square set.

Overwintering bollweevils usually move relatively short distances from hibernation sites and usually are confined to small areas in fields adjacent to good overwintering habitat. Overwintering emergence usually peaks during late May and early June. The adult weevil is about 1/4 inch long, grayish brown and has a prolonged snout with chewing moth parts at its tip. The need for insecticide applications to suppress overwintering weevils can be determined by 1) pheromone trapping or 2) field inspection. Using the trap method if 4 or more weevils per trap are caught per week, treatment may be justified. Using the

field inspection method if four weevils per 100 feet of row monitored (about 530 weevils per acre) in cotton which was planted after mid-May, apply insecticide just prior to or when first squares reach 1/3 grown stage. So far in Floyd County bollweevils trap counts in 1996 have been lower than 1995 trap counts with all trap activity being in the eastern portion of the county.

## Sunvue Fertilizer sells to Gold Kist, Inc. of Georgia

Sunvue Fertilizers, Inc. of Plainview, Lockney, Hart and Mayfield has been purchased by Gold Kist, Inc. a diversified farm cooperative headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia according to Sunvue owners Jim and Ed Stanford and Ed Vadder.

The purchase included Stanford and Vadder Entomology, a crop consulting business and fertilizer blending plants.

The Stanfords and Vadder will continue to manage the locations. Most of the 19 employees were also hired by Gold Kist and they will continue to serve farmers in Floyd, Castro, Hale, and Lamb counties.

The businesses will operate under the Gold Kist Inc. name and customers who join the cooperative will become eligible to share in future earnings of the cooperative, according to Stanley C. Rogers, vice president of the AgriServices Division.

Gold Kist, which was founded in 1933, serves approximately 27,000 farmer-members in the Southeast, Midsouth and Texas. Fiscal 1995 sales were \$1.7 billion. Its other operations include 100 farm supply stores, 80 fertilizer blend plants, 35 grain elevators and 18 peanut buying points. Subsidiaries are engaged in peanut and pecan processing and agriculture finance.

## New environmental program gaining exposure in target states

"Careful By Nature," a new program of The Cotton Foundation which encourages sound pesticide application practices, is up and running in the five states targeted for 1996.

Through a newsletter and other educational materials, the program offers cotton producers practical steps to enhance their efforts at managing their resources and protecting the environment. Steering committees have been formed in Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Mississippi and Texas to help disseminate the information. The committees are as follows:

Texas—Craig Shook, chair; Pat Miller, Chris Shields, Tommy Engelke, Dale Parr, Donnie Dippel, Bill Harris, Ray Frisbie, James Supak, Tony Williams, and John Fisher.

"One of the beauties of the Careful By Nature program is that it provides some common resources, such as a video and newsletter, then allows each state steering committee to tailor other elements to local needs," said Paul Dugger, the National Cotton Council's manager of special

technical projects. "The committees have come up with some dynamite ideas, and those ideas are being shared among the states. For example, Texas requested sample guest editorials that growers could place in local newspapers, and several other states are adopting that idea. Mississippi is producing public service announcements and has offered to share their scripts with the other states."

"That kind of cooperation generates a lot of synergism." Careful By Nature, which emphasizes the intimate relationship between farmers and the environment, is being supported by a grant to the Foundation from Ciba Crop Protection.

## Loan program offers help to Texans

Men and women from 18-39 who dream of operating their own home or ranch but don't have enough money to get started may find help from a state-backed loan guarantee program encouraging young people with practical experience in agriculture to go into business for themselves.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority's Young Farmer Loan Guarantee Program provides up to \$50,000 in financial assistance to Texans establishing their first farm or ranch. TAFA is administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, poultry and farm or ranch facilities. Loans may be applied to leasing-but not buying-farm or

ranch land. For example, TAFA awarded one guarantee to a dairy employee who used the loan to buy cattle to build his own dairy herd. Another guarantee was awarded a man who plans to use the funds to lease land to raise milo and corn.

A recent American Farm Bureau Federation survey found that the availability of agricultural financing ranks the third biggest challenge for young farmers and ranchers.

"It's not easy to start up a farm or ranch as it used to be," said Perry. "The guarantee program tries to make it a little easier by backing loans from lending institutions to qualified young people."

The maximum loan guarantee is \$50,000 or 90 percent of the loan amount, whichever is less.

The program also encourages younger people to become farmers and ranchers at a time when most agricultural producers are growing older. In Texas the average is 56.

Men and women with at least four years of practical agricultural experience are being sought to apply. These include salaried farm and ranch workers or individuals who earn no more than 50 percent of their adjusted gross income from their own agricultural operation. Up to years participation in 4-H or a vocational agriculture program count as practical experience.

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## Seven water and cost saving principles

### 1. Planning and Design

Developing a landscape is the first and most important step in a successful Xeriscape. A properly planned Xeriscape takes into account the regional and microclimatic conditions of the site, existing plant material, the needs and desires of the property owner, and the zoning or grouping of plant materials by their water needs. A landscape plan also allows landscaping to be done in phases.

### 2. Soil Analysis

Soils will vary from site and even with a given site. A soil analysis based on random sampling provides information that enables proper selection of plants and any soil amendments needed. When appropriate, soil amendments can enhance the health and growing capabilities of the landscape, by improving water drainage, moisture penetration and a soil's water-holding capacity.

### 3. Appropriate Plant Selection

Plant selection should be based on the plant's adaptability to the landscape area, the effect desired, and the ultimate size, color, and texture of the plants. Plants should be arranged to achieve the aesthetic effect desired and grouped in accordance with their

respective water needs. Most plants have a place in a Xeriscape. Maximum water conservation can be achieved by selecting those plants which require a minimal amount of supplemental watering.

### 4. Practical Turf Areas

Turf shouldn't be treated as a fill-in material, but rather as a planned element of the Xeriscape. While turf provides many practical benefits in a landscape, proper placement of turf areas can result in a significant reduction in water use. Most turf varieties require supplemental watering at frequencies that differ from other types of landscaping plants, and turf should be placed so it can be irrigated separately.

### 5. Efficient Irrigation

Watering only when plants need water and watering deeply encourages deeper root growth, resulting in a healthier, drought-tolerant landscape. If a landscape requires regular watering and/or if an irrigation system is desired, the system should be well planned and managed in order to conserve water.

### 6. Use of Mulches

Mulches applied and maintained at appropriate depths in planting beds will help soils retain moisture, reduce weed growth and prevent erosion. Mulch can also be used when conditions aren't adequate or conducive for growing quality turf or ground covers. Mulches are typically wood bark chips, pine straws, nut shells, small

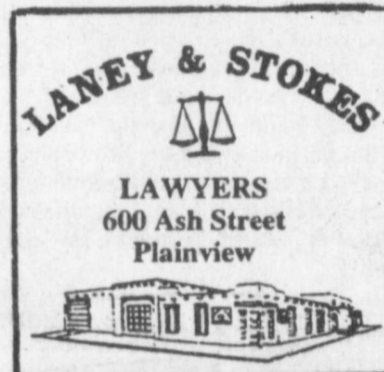
gravel or shredded landscape clippings.

### 7. Appropriate Maintenance

Proper landscape and irrigation maintenance will preserve and enhance a quality Xeriscape. When the first six principles have been followed, maintenance of a Xeriscape is easier and less expensive. Because a Xeriscape is more adapted and uses a minimal amount of water, less fertilizer and fewer pesticides and other chemicals are needed to maintain the landscape.

Water conservation must be a vital concern for everyone. The water used to irrigate lawns and landscapes is considered by many to be a luxury use of water. This "nonessential" use implies a special responsibility to use the water resource efficiently. By following the guidelines of Xeriscape, you can help preserve our water resources for future generations.

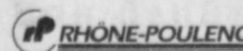
