Sudden notable decline in water well yields could be caused by well and casing

During most years, area producers
generally experience generally experience some decline in
their water well yields from the start to the finish of a typical 2,000 hour
irrigation season. However, when a irrigation season. However, when a
sudden notable decline in well yield occurs, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reminds producers to examine the well and its casing to determine the cause of the problem. ria, and/or blue green algae can clog casing perforations and restrict ground water movement from the Ogallala Formation into the well. Use generally provides good results in removing the obstruction.
For example, a chlorine solution of 100 parts per million will kill mos bacteria in well water. Increasing the
strength of the chlorine will result in a chemical "shock" causing the bacteria layers to slough off the casing so that they can be pumped from the well. Such a chlorine solution should
be left in the well for \(8-12\) hours be be lere it is pumped out. After this treatment, the well should be surged and pumped for about 30 minutes a day during the next several days until the
