Floyd County Friends receives \$10,000 grant

The Floyd County Friends will benefit from a grant of \$10,000 which has been awarded to them through Southwestern Bell's Economic Excellence program.

The grant money was divided with \$5,000 going to Floyd County Friends and the other \$5,000 going to the City of Lockney.

Lockney applied for the grant as a co-applicant on behalf of Floyd County Friends. All the money will be used for the Multi-Purpose Building.

Irasema Velasquez, regional manager of Southwestern Bell-Lubbock, made the official presentation of the grants Tuesday, October 1, at the 50-Yard Line Restaurant in Lubbock.

D'Lynn Morris gave a special Thank-you to Local State Representative and Texas Speaker of the House, Pete Laney, and his wife, Nelda. Both are described as very strong advocates of the project who have lent a great deal of guidance and personal time to pursuing grants for the Multi-purpose Center.

"I gave me great pleasure to be able to reward the communities of Floydada and Lockney who have worked so hard for one common goal--the Floyd County Friends Multi-Purpose Building," said Velasquez.

Accepting the grants were Nick Long, Floyd County Friends President, and Lockney Mayor Gary Marr.

"This is the first grant that our grant writing committee has been awarded," said Floyd County Friends President Nick Long.

"I think this will be a great confidence builder for this group and our organization. Hopefully it will also give confidence to our local community who are donating. They will see that we can get money for this project."

"There were over 100 applicants for these grants and we got two of them."

According to Long people reviewing grants have been impressed with the cooperation of Lockney and Floydada on this Multi-Purpose Building project.

"People are impressed that two towns are trying to work together," said Long. "There are lots of neigh-

bors with rivalries that can't work together.

This cooperation looks good on applications. In time we will find the right people to fund this project.

Floydada and Lockney have both been recipients of past Economic Excellence grants from Southwestern Bell--for Punkin Days and the Wall of Pride.

Southwestern Bell, with guidance from the Texas Rural Development Council and the Texas Economic Development Council, as well as other organizations interested in the economic development of the state of Texas, has provided approximately \$250,000 to 75 cities for economic development enhancement of individual communities this year.

"Southwestern Bell has in the past and will continue in the future to further economic development in the communities which it serves," said David Cole, Southwestern Bell Texas state president. "We hope these economic development grants will help build better communities and create a brighter future for the state of Texas."

Grant writer, Anne Carthel, thanked Southwestern Bell and particularly Velasquez, for their support of Floyd County Friends.

"Southwestern Bell has come to the aid of our county on several occasions in past years," said Carthel, "and on behalf of myself and the 10,000 people we represent here, want to thank them for their commitment to small rural communities of our area."

Carthel said of Irasema, "...her determination, efficiency, and intelligence have made her one of Lubbock's finest leaders, and the recipient of many outstanding community awards. She has continually gone to bat for the little towns in this region and works diligently to learn the needs of the people in each town she represents."

Dora Ross, president of the grant writing committee, gave a brief history of the building and reported on the progress being made.

According to Ross, "After tonight Floyd County Friends will have approximately \$87,000 in assets. Of that amount, \$77,000 has been raised through local donation and pledges. "We are continually working on grants to other companies and foundations, as well as local pledges and donations. We anticipate hiring a contractor in approximately 1-1 1/2 years, and begin construction shortly thereafter."

"The proposed 20,000 square foot arena can accommodate up to 1,500 people, host a vast array of events and serve 40,000-50,000 attendees annually."

"The completion of this multi-purpose building will be an enormous economic boost...Based on figures from similar buildings in other comparable sized communities in this region, a conservative estimate is that at least 1/3 of a million dollars will come into the county from outside visitors alone."

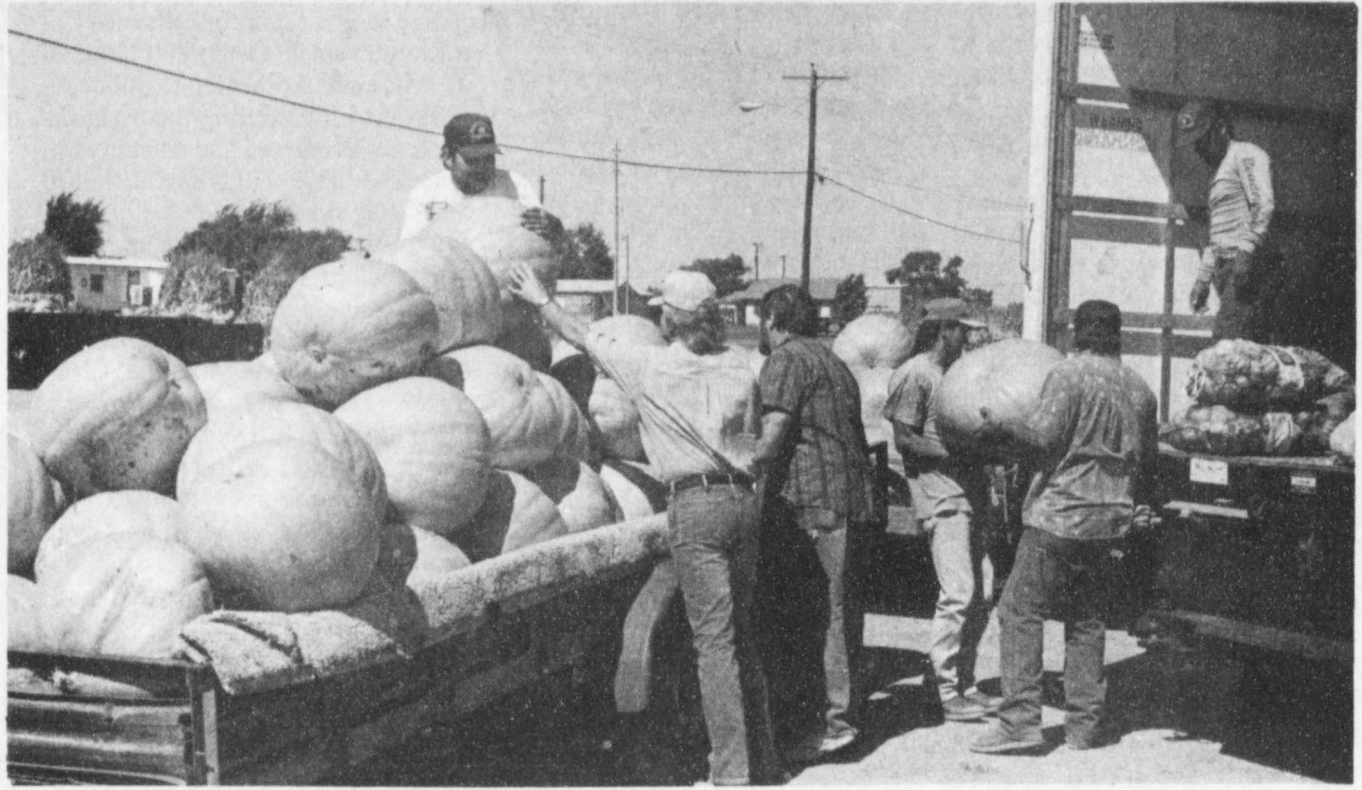
"Although this building will be built with steel and concrete," continued Ross, "it will be solidly reinforced by the fortitude, courage, and steadfastness of the people who have united to achieve this common goal."

"If any business has connections with any kind of corporation that has a giving program, just let us know," said Long, "and we will turn it over to the grant writing committee. They will chase down the lead."

The grant writing committee consists of: Chairman Dora Ross, Anne Carthel, Shawnda Foster, Ginger Mathis and D'Lynn Morris.

Approximately 28 members of the Floyd County Friends attended the dinner and grant presentation.

Other special guests to the event were Southwestern Bell Representatives Jeff Robinson and Andy Velasquez; Linda Marr; Floydada's KFLP representatives Tony and Pamela Ricketts and Todd and Trena Wayland; Kay Shurbet of the Plainview Daily Herald; reporters and camera technicians from Channel 13, Channel 28 and Channel 11.

ily in 1953 in memory of Martha Ann Cogdell who passed away at the age of 13.

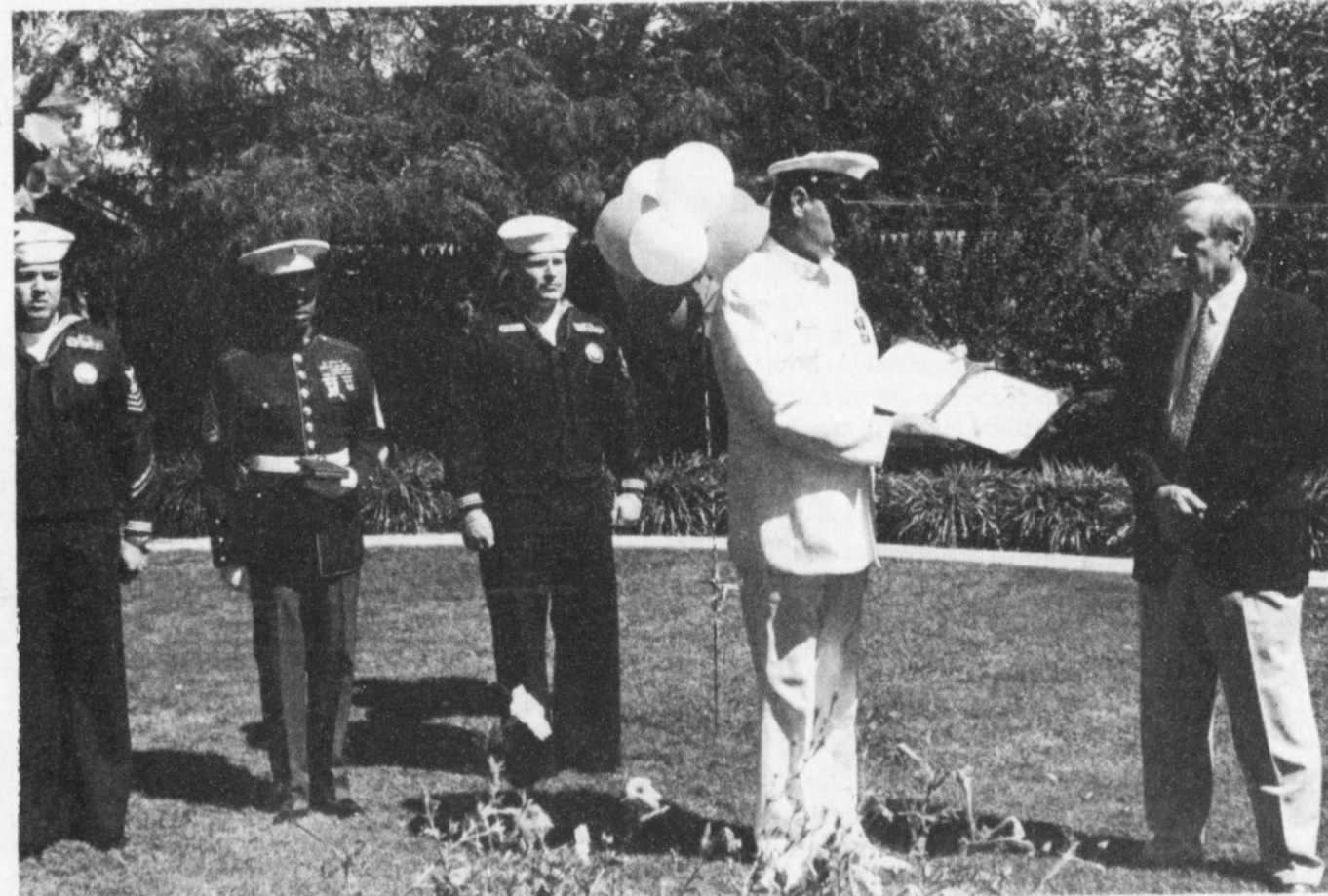
Since the trust was formed, all of the income from the trust has been used to make donations to religious, educational and charitable institutions in the State of Texas.

Donations have been made to institutions in various parts of the state including Scott and White Hospital in Temple and Cogdell Memorial Hos-

pital in Snyder.

For over 20 years most of the donations have been made in this immediate area. Funds from the trust were donated to build the Cogdell Clinic in Floydada, the Cogdell Clinic in Lockney and the Briscoe County Clinic in Silverton.

"This money is earmarked for the purchase of a future ambulance," said Farris.



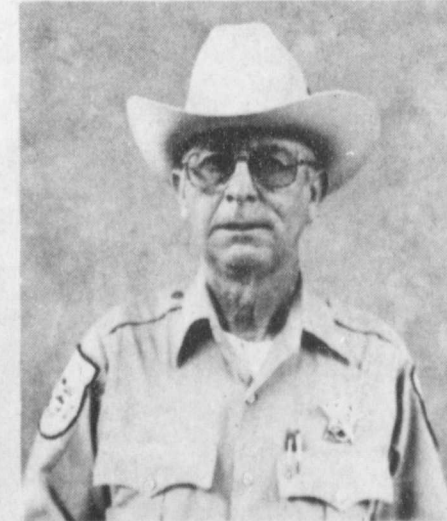

Early voting begins October 16 and ends November 1. The election will be held November 5.

Royce Gilmore, a Democrat, has served as Floyd County Sheriff since being appointed to that position by the county commissioners August 11,

1995.

Gilmore was appointed to fill the unexpired term of former Sheriff Charles Overstreet, who had resigned.

Gilmore has lived in Floyd County off and on since 1972.

He was born and raised in Clay County and joined the Army in 1954. After a tour of duty in Korea and Turkey he was Honorably Discharged in 1962.

He worked at farming and odd jobs for a few years after the service, and entered the law enforcement field in 1965 when he went to work for Henrietta Police Department for one year. He then went to work for the Bridgeport Police Department for 6 years.

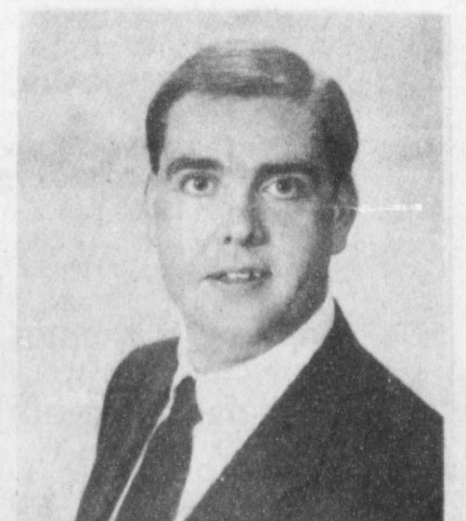
In 1972 Gilmore moved to Floydada and worked for the police department for 6 months until quitting to work for Sheriff Bud Rainey in 1973.

Jon White is the republican challenger to the position of Sheriff.

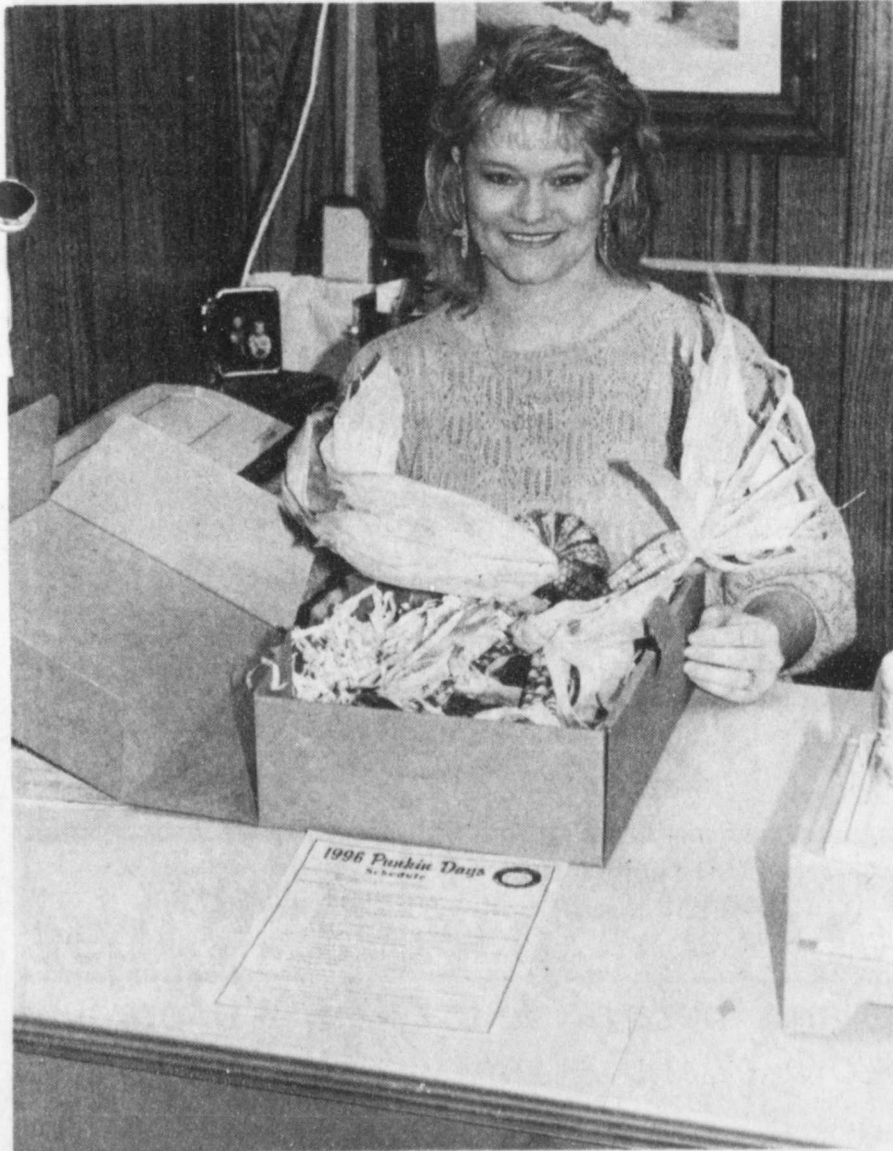
White is currently a deputy with the Floyd County Sheriff's office.

Our State Senator, Tom Haywood, is currently working on a plan which, if enacted, would return five percent of all lottery ticket sales revenues to the city or county where the tickets were sold.

The proposal is called the "Community Enrichment Act".

Haywood said local governments should be able to do whatever they want with the money. "I believe the closer government is to the people the better it can serve the needs of the people," said Haywood. "Houston might choose to build a new youth recreation center, Dallas may need the funds to improve elderly services and Floyd County may want to pave streets or fix potholes. Each community knows best what it needs most."

A check with the lottery commission showed that from Oct. 1995 until September 1996, Floyd County folks sent \$1,038,244.50 to the state in lottery sales.

Floydada bought \$765,370.50 in lottery tickets and Lockney spent \$272,874.00.

If we could have gotten back 5% of that, Floyd County could have been the recipient of \$51,912.23!

You think that may have helped with a new library or possibly the multi-purpose center. The possibilities are endless.

I'm so tired of money leaving Floyd County and nothing coming back.

Haywood said, "A large number of city and county officials across the state have told me that the Community Enrichment Act could be a 'god-send' in providing local matching funds for federal grants and to offset the need for higher local taxes."

Haywood says, "Many of our cities and counties are in dire need of supplemental funds that will help provide needed community services. Often times taxes have to be raised in order to meet those needs. However, if the Community Enrichment Act is enacted, local governments might look to lottery funds first, before deciding on a tax increase."

It sounds like a common-sense approach which is exactly why it will be hard for Haywood to get it passed.

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Two injured in accident

Billy Pat Frizzell, 62, of Lockney, and Lanetta Kay Christian, 48, of Lubbock, were both injured when their vehicles collided Monday, September 30, at approximately 12:30 p.m.

According to DPS Trooper Jesse Valdez, "Frizzell was driving a 1991 GMC pickup south on County Road #77 and Christian was traveling east on County Road #140 when the vehicles made contact in the intersection, 1.9 miles N.W. of Lockney."

Valdez said Frizzell's pickup was pushed into the east ditch and hit the rear tailgate which caused him to "do

a 180 degree turn and stop facing east."

Christian's vehicle, according to Valdez, continued in the S.E. direction, striking a ditch which also caused her car to turn 180 degrees. Her car stopped facing west."

Both drivers were taken to W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital by ambulance. Christian was released. As on Tuesday, October 2nd, Frizzell remains hospitalized with bruises.

"The investigation is continuing," said Valdez, "and charges are pending."

Yesterday I got my husband out of the hospital after a bout with a virus. Due to the fact that he has no immune system due to a heart transplant, we have to be very concerned because of rejection. This man's name is Wayne Huffaker. He happens to be my husband.

When I went through the naturalization process to become an American, I learned, among many things, about the freedoms we have in this country - one of them being freedom of speech.

Wayne has been involved in many organizations and has had a leader-

ship position in the cotton industry, as a spokesman to help his fellow farmers. This is not for his own glory, but a sincere desire to voice the opinions of area cotton producers to Washington and to help West Texas. Over twenty years the majority of time and travel has been a personal expense, but he didn't regret it as he felt it was important to help others.

One organization he is involved in is the Boll Weevil Foundation. His part in this is speaking out to eradicate the boll weevil. This insect could break the livelihood of all of us. The differences of opinion on the weevil issue brings me back to our freedom

of speech, and all of us can hopefully come to a solution by peacefully expressing our ideas.

Yesterday he received two boll weevil traps that had been shot through, and on the trap were the words "Hello Huffaker." You had trouble spelling his name but you got your point across nevertheless.

This brings me to the question - do we have our freedom of speech, and not in the process get down to a personal level of hate such as this? This act was immature to the point of being childish.

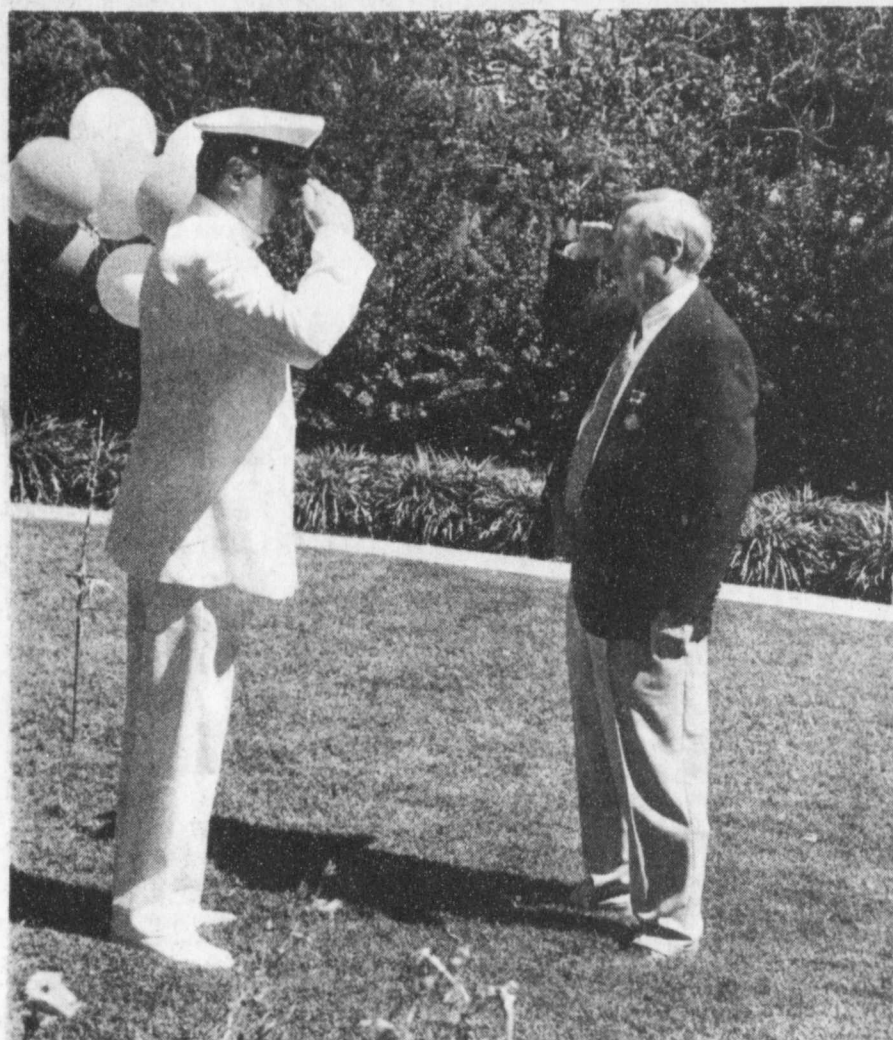
Gilmore has been married to his wife, Doris, for 15 years. He has five children from a previous marriage, one stepson and two stepdaughters.

In 1986, White moved to Brownfield and worked at Allsup's Convenience Store while he attended South Plains College in Levelland. 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Business Of The Week

LOCKNEY--Before Lockney had the First National Bank, Mr. J.A. Baker kept people's money in a safe in his post office.

In 1903, Mr. Walter Posey, Mr. Porum Posey and their father from Floydada and Mr. L.T. Lester came to Lockney and started the first bank.

The first bank was a private bank and it became a National Bank in 1906. The bank received its charter in 1908 with a capital stock of \$25,000.00.

The bank was first located about the middle of where Main Street is now and was on the west side of the street.

At one time the bank building was completely destroyed by fire. The new building was a frame building on the corner of College and Main.

In 1912 and 1913 a two story bank building was built on the same corner of College and Main. The bank remained on that corner until 1959.

In 1932 there were many bank failures, but the First National Bank of Lockney managed to stay open with the help of depositors and due to the Baker family borrowing money personally from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The bank is now owned by Jim Doucette, of Lockney. The bank also has branches in Floydada, Olton and Paducah. It also has a sister bank in Silvertown.

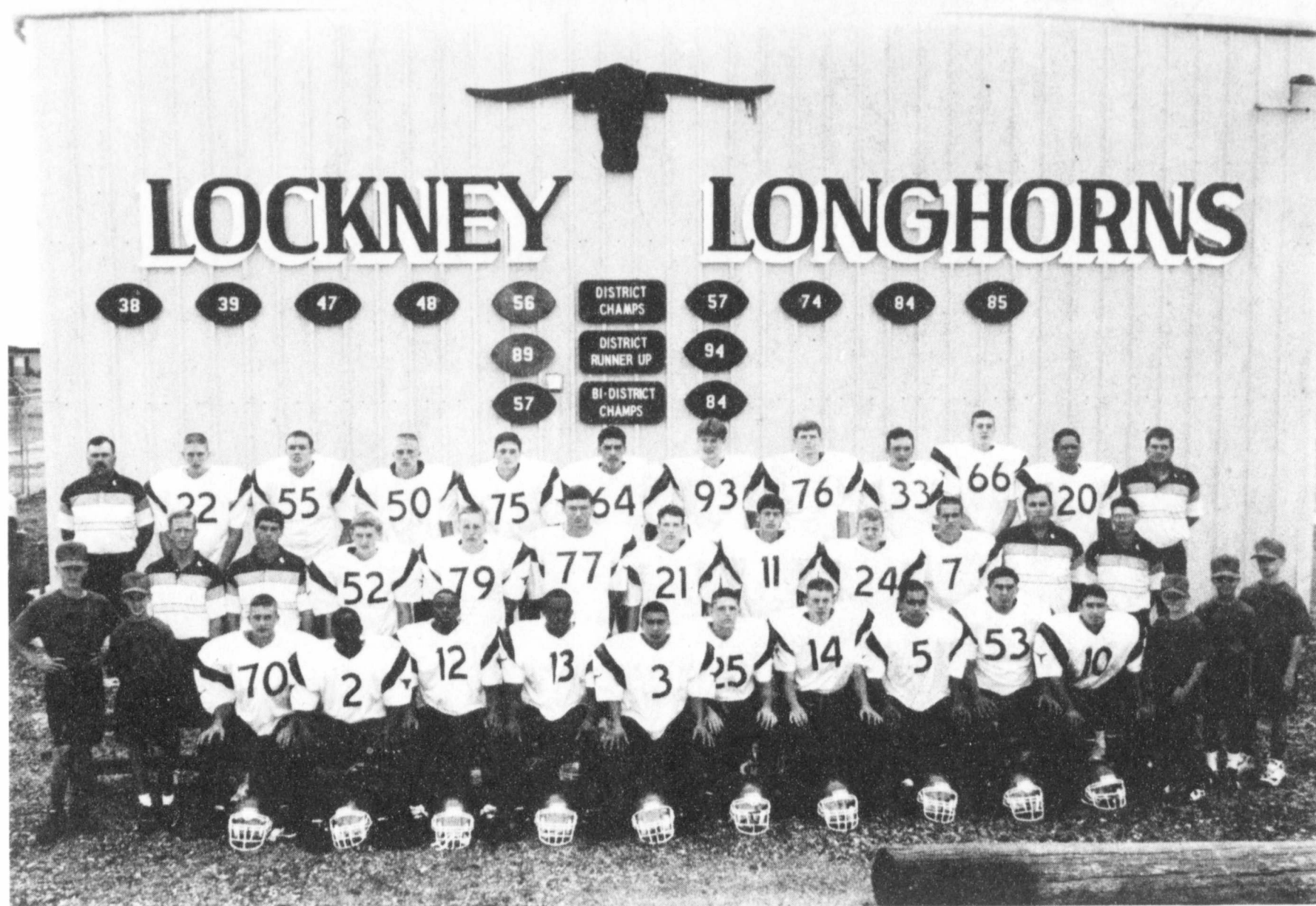

LOCKNEY -- In a match-up of two unbeaten teams, the Lockney Longhorns improved their record to 4-0 with a 26-13 victory over the Abernathy Antelopes.

Coming off a big homecoming win over the Post Antelopes, the Horns ruined Abernathy's own homecoming with a solid all-around effort. This marks the fifth victory in a row on an opponents homecoming for the Longhorns.

On third and one from the 11 yard line the offensive play of the game took place as Devon Phillips raced 89 yards to paydirt after fine blocking by the Longhorn line. The run for point after failed, but Lockney had upped its lead to 20-7.

The Lopes quickly answered, scoring another touchdown as they recovered their own fumble in the Longhorn end zone closing the Horns lead to 20-13.

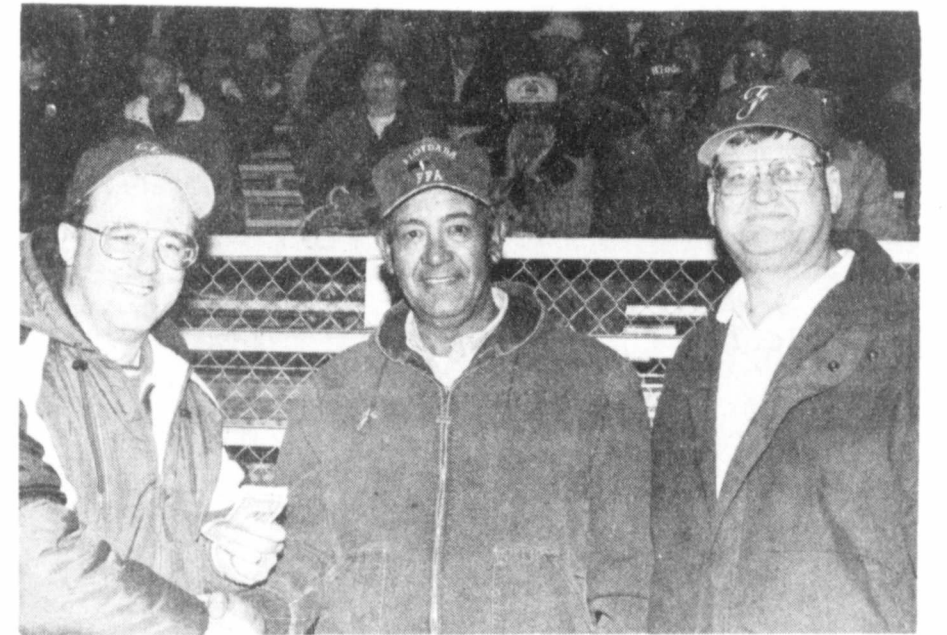

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Whirlwinds edge Pirates to open district play

FLOYDADA - Andy Young's 109 yards in twelve carries led the way as Floydada opened District 2-3A action with a come-from-behind 14-7 decision over Lubbock Cooper at Wester Field last Friday. The Whirlwinds overcame a week of adversities to give Tim Daughtrey his first victory as Floydada's head coach while snapping a five-game losing streak dating back to last season.

Due to suspensions and grades, it became necessary last week to cancel the junior varsity schedule and move those remaining players up to the varsity. Several of those newcomers played key roles in Floydada's first win of the year. More importantly, it put the 'Winds in the victory column in the district standings.

The way the game started out, it appeared that the outcome would be anything but a Whirlwind victory. The visitors completely dominated the first 24 minutes. The Pirates had the ball for 36 offensive plays in the first two quarters - compared to Floydada's 19 plays from scrimmage. Cooper's defense held the Whirlwinds to only three first downs and 68 total yards in the first half.

The Pirates mounted a 70-yard, 8 play drive following the opening kickoff. Eric Morrison accounted for 63 of those yards, capped by a 50-yard TD scamper. The conversion kick by Carl Pankratz at the 8:16 mark of the first quarter would be their final point of the contest.

Cy Cowart connected with Michael Palacios for an eleven yard gainer on the final play of the opening quarter. At the time the play had little significance, but it was Floydada's first pass completion of the year, and gave a hit of things to come later in the game.

Floydada's defense, led by Andy Young, Kyle Pierce and newcomer David Lightfoot (a freshman playing his first varsity game), turned up the intensity in the second period. Lightfoot and Young each had outstanding defensive plays in Cooper's initial offensive series of the quarter. At the midway point of the quarter, the Pirates started a 66-yard drive which took almost six minutes off the clock. Cooper moved as deep as Floydada's 4 yard line in the waning moments of the half, but was denied a score by the Whirlwind stopper unit. The 'Winds took possession at their own 7 yard line and moved out to the 34 as the half ended. This particular series was the turning point of the game. It was, perhaps, the turning point of Floydada's season.

Floydada's newly-found momentum was almost lost on the second half kickoff. A mistake on the return put the 'Winds deep in their own territory, but Young broke for a 33-yarder on the second snap to spearhead a 12-play, 88 yard scoring drive. Cowart ended the drive by hitting Michael Palacios with a TD pass on fourth down from the Pirate 18 yard line. A botched extra-point led to holder Michael Nunez tossing to Michael Black at the 3-yard line. Black carried in for the two-pointer to give the Whirlwinds their first lead in a game since the opening touchdown against Lockney.

The Pirates were three and out following the ensuing kickoff. Floydada held possession for the remainder of the period as Lubbock Cooper had only three snaps and a punt during the 12-minute period. The Whirlwinds held the ball for over ten minutes of the quarter.

Floydada's big defensive weapon in the final period was the foot of Michael Black. The sophomore nailed punts within the 5 yard line twice to keep Cooper backed deep in its own territory. Black's second punt (with only 3:39 remaining on the clock) set up Floydada's game-deciding touchdown. Mario Nunez stepped in front of Ryan Aycock's intended receiver, grabbed the key interception and raced untouched into the Pirate end zone to give the Whirlwinds a commanding 14-7 lead.

A stunning hit by Andy Young caused Eric Morrison to cough up the ball on the second play of the Pirates' ensuing possession. George Perez recovered the fumble to end any last-minute threats by the Pirates.

The Whirlwinds will be hard-pressed to duplicate their success over Lubbock Cooper when they travel to district favorite Littlefield this week. The only blemish on Littlefield's record this year is a loss to state 3A power Springtown. The Wildcats defeated Slaton 14-7 in the district opener. Likewise, Lubbock Cooper will be the decided underdog when the Pirates host the Denver City Mustangs tomorrow night.

Bill's Notes

The Defense came to life...the offense was vastly improved, and, with a few pass completions, showed it could be more than just one-dimensional. It was a great team victory. You might say, the varsity

won its first...the JV won its fourth. Help came in big ways from some of the younger folks. The necessary changes in the offense, which put the ball into Andy Young's hands, had great results. Young played a whale of a game on both offense and defense, and gets my nod for the offensive player of the game (although the offensive line deserves a lot of credit the way it was firing off against a physically-larger Cooper defense.

The offensive play of the game goes to Cy's TD toss to Palacios. I knew it was just a matter of time before some passing could be worked into the offense...but, it took some good blocking and execution to make it possible.

With Chad Hinkle joining Monty Anderson on the sidelines with injuries, someone or several some-ones had to come through to make the defense click. Young, David Lightfoot and Pierce all came through when they had to. However, my choice for defensive standout goes to Michael Black for his clutch punting...and his second one within the 5 yard line late in the game gets my nod for the defensive play of the game.

I guess I blew it when I predicted that Abernathy would take Lockney by a field goal. The 'Horns came through, spoiled the Antelopes homecoming, and may not be really tested again until the second or third round of the playoffs. I think I'll put all my eggs in one basket as far as predictions are concerned and go with the 'Winds over Littlefield.

If the 'Winds show the heart and determination they did last week, they may surprise a few people in these next weeks...and it might as well start with those mangy critters!

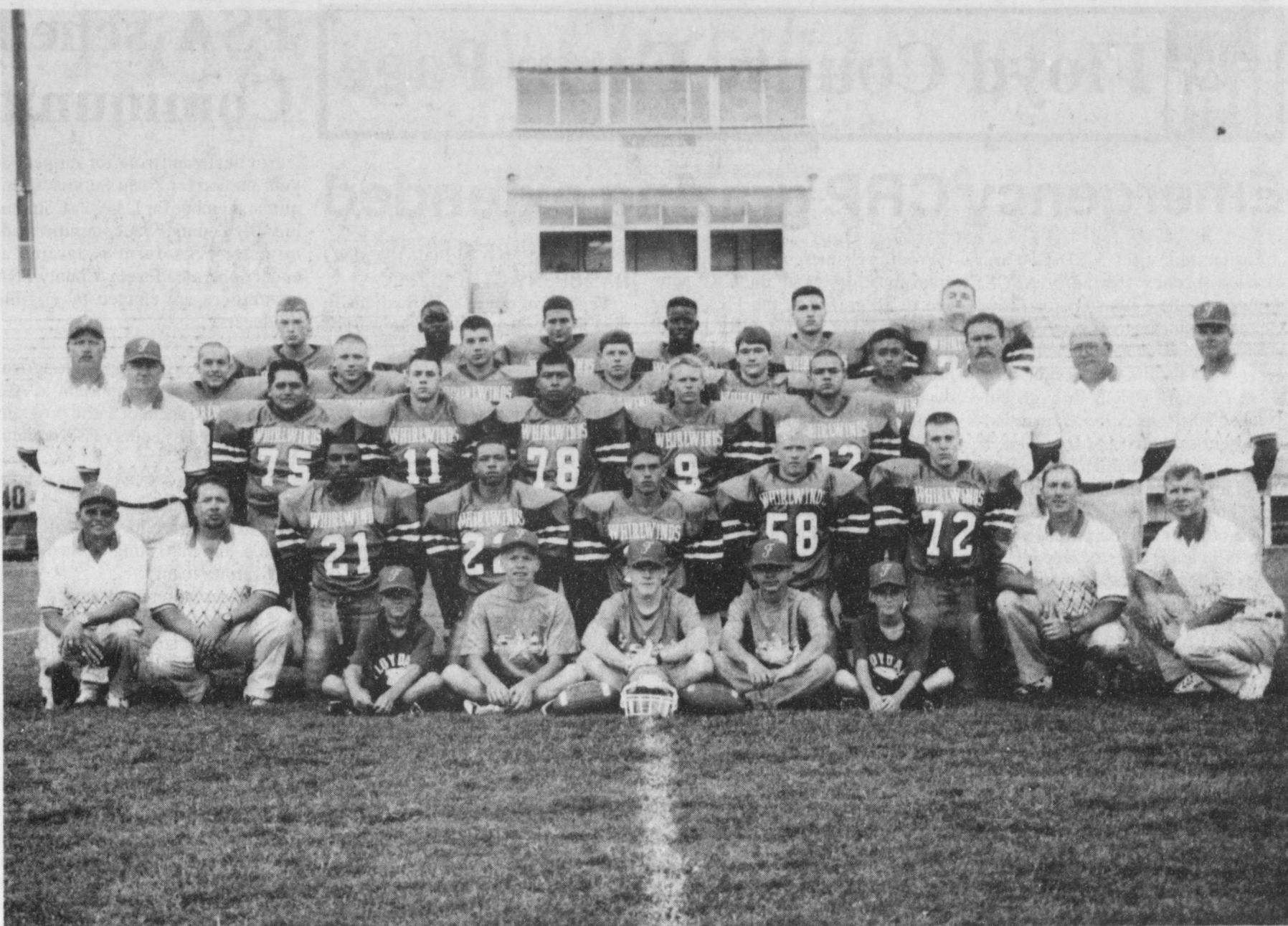
LOCKNEY -- The 8th grade Shorthorns traveled to Abernathy Thursday and played hard, but came up empty handed losing 28-20.

"This group of kids did not give up as they fought to the last second. In

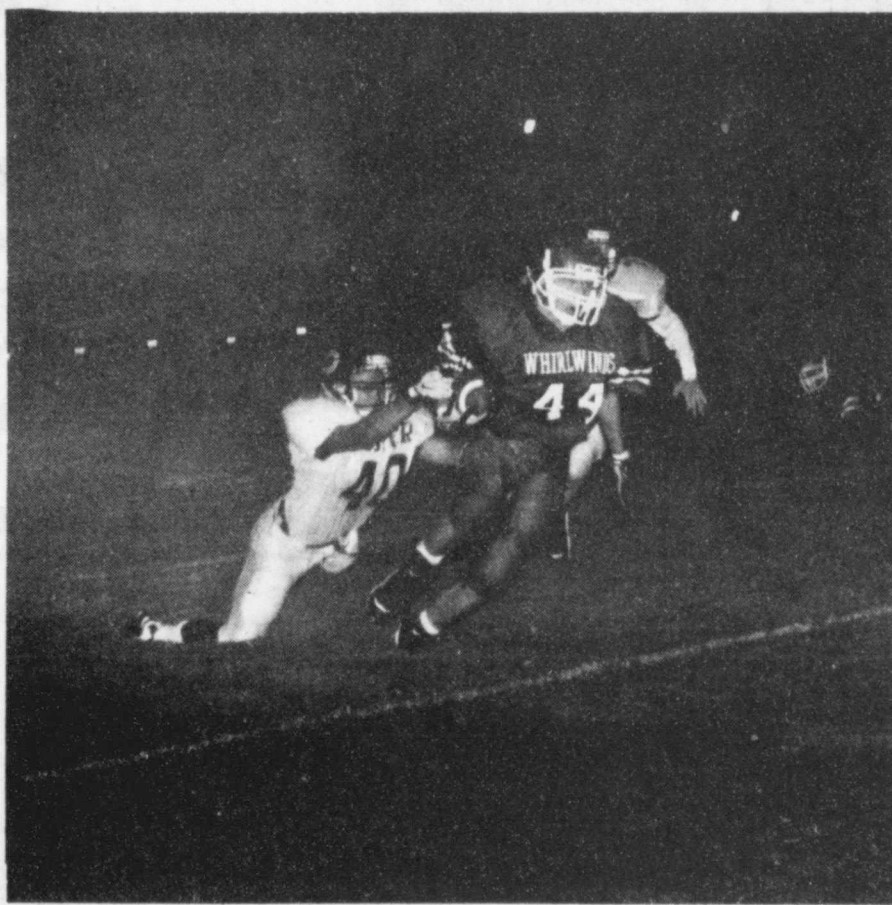

Emergency CRP grazing extended

Earlier this week USDA's Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS) authorized the extension for Floyd County producers to graze their livestock on the same acres or additional acres of land in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) through November 30, 1996. Several surrounding counties were also approved. If interested, the individual FSA county office may be contacted for information about that county.

The objective of this 60-day extension is to give livestock producers some additional time for native pastures, feed grains, and other forage supplies to recover properly before cold weather sets in and producers are forced to use inadequate hay supplies.

Producers interested in this program must designate the CRP acreage to be grazed at the FSA office before grazing begins. CRP participants who use this grazing option will have their current rental payment reduced by \$2 per month per acre for the 60-day extension. Use of designated acres for any part of a month will constitute the cost for the whole month.

Counties authorized for emergency grazing of CRP may limit the stocking rate to 75% of the rate recommended by NRCS in lieu of fencing off 25% of each field. Producers must designate the CRP acres to be grazed at the FSA office before grazing begins.

NO EXTENSION FOR HAYING HAS BEEN AUTHORIZED.

Vegetative cover specifications in the CRP contract will not be waived because of participation in this special authority, and any permanent destruction of CRP cover MUST BE RE-ESTABLISHED AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.

Producers who violate any of the conditions governing this sign-up will be subject to having their CRP contract terminated or to other penalties, such as refunding all payments made under the CRP contract.

To take advantage of these options, farmers and ranchers must apply in person at the Floyd county FSA office.

CRP Symposium set in Claude October 7

Holders of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) lands must soon decide what to do with their property once contracts expire. A symposium focused on CRP issues is set for Oct. 7 at the Armstrong County Activity Center in Claude. Registration starts at 9:30 a.m.

Representative Mac Thornberry will be the keynote speaker, who will brief participants on the CRP program's status.

Armstrong County is one of only seven such sites in the nation to host

the specialized conference on CRP land management and the future of the program. Coordinators are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, New Mexico State University, and the Cooperative Extension Services of the state universities in Colorado, Kansas, and Oklahoma. Cooperators are the Society of Range Management and USDA's Farm Service Agency and Natural Resource Conservation Service.

Registration is \$20 and includes the noon meal.

The CRP symposium's purpose is

to offer contract holders answers on what course to follow once the program is over. The major areas of interest for landholders will include policies, regulations, conservation compliance and post contract options such as haying, grazing and cropping.

Specific topics featured during the morning session include, CRP Transition to Today, Fair 96 Policies and Regulations Impacting CRP, The Role of Conservation Compliance in CRP, and Thornberry's Washington Report.

After lunch, the program will begin

FSA schedules election for LAA-2 Community B committee member

Nominate and vote for farmers of your choice for Farm Service Committee member for LAA-2 (Community B). County FSA committees administer FSA farm programs at county and area levels. County FSA committees are elected by eligible producers.

In addition, county FSA committees hire County Executive Directors. Any producer (farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers) of legal voting age, can vote if they are eligible to take part in any FSA program. Check with your FSA office for voting requirements.

The election of responsible agricultural producers is important to ALL farmers and ranchers. Farm programs administered by county FSA committees include:

- * commodity price support loans and payments;
- * establishment of allotments, yields, and marketing quotas;
- * farmer loans;
- * conservation programs;
- * incentive indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities;
- * other farm disaster assistance.

A petition form signed by the nominee is needed to nominate a farmer-candidate. A form includes a statement that the candidate agrees to serve if elected. Nomination forms may be picked up at Floyd County Farm Service Agency beginning October 3, 1996. These forms must be received by the county office no later than October 28. Almost anyone eligible to take part in a county FSA program may be a candidate for the

committee. DON'T MISS OUT ON VOTING. The 1996 election will end December 2. Ballots will be mailed to voters by November 18 and must be returned or postmarked by December 2.

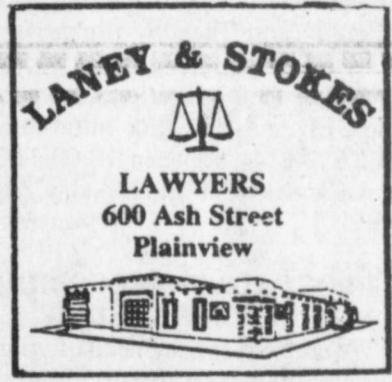

"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

QUESTION: We have a 1-year-old daughter, and we want to raise her right. I've heard that parents can increase the mental abilities of their own children if they stimulate them properly during the early years. Is this accurate, and if so, how can I accomplish this with my baby?

DR. DOBSON: Research indicates that parents can increase the intellectual capability of their children. This conclusion was one of the most important findings derived from a 10-year study of children between 8 and 18 months of age. This investigation, known as Harvard University's Pre-school Project, was guided by Dr. Burton L. White and a team of 15 researchers between 1965 and 1975. They studied young children intensely during this period, hoping to discover which experiences in the early years of life contribute to the development of a healthy, intelligent human being. The conclusions from this exhaustive effort are summarized below as reported originally in *APA Monitor*.

1. It is increasingly clear that the origins of human competence are to be found in a critical period of development between 8 and 18 months of age. The child's experiences during those brief months do more to influence future intellectual competence than anytime before or after.

2. The single most important environmental factor in the life of the child is his mother. "She is the hook," said Dr. White, and carries more influence on her child's experiences than any other person or circumstance.

3. The amount of live language directed to a child (not to be confused with television, radio or overheard conversations) is vital to the development of fundamental linguistic, intellectual and social skills.

4. Those children who are given free access to living areas of their

homes progress much faster than those whose movements are restricted.

5. The nuclear family is the most important educational delivery system. If we are going to produce capable, healthy children, it will be by strengthening family units and by improving the interactions that occur within them.

6. The best parents were those who excelled at three functions:

1. They were superb designers and organizers of their children's environments.

2. They permitted their children to interrupt them for a brief, 30-second episodes, during which personal consultation, comfort, information and enthusiasm were exchanged.

3. They corrected their children when necessary, while simultaneously showing great affection for their children.

These conclusions are exciting to me, for I find them an affirmation and validation of the concepts which I have devoted my entire professional career: the dedication of mothers during the early years; the value of raising children; the stability of the family, etc.

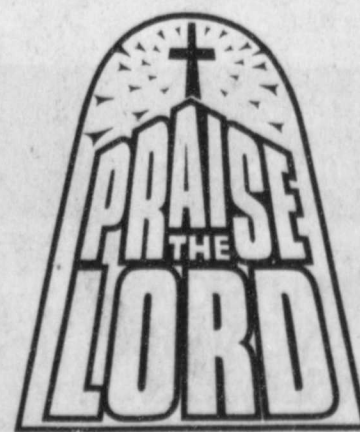

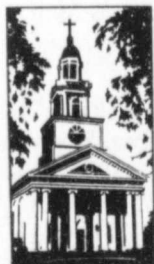
He served with the U.S. Army during World War II. He was a member of Parkview Baptist Church, the Rodeo Association and the Hale County Sheriff's Association.

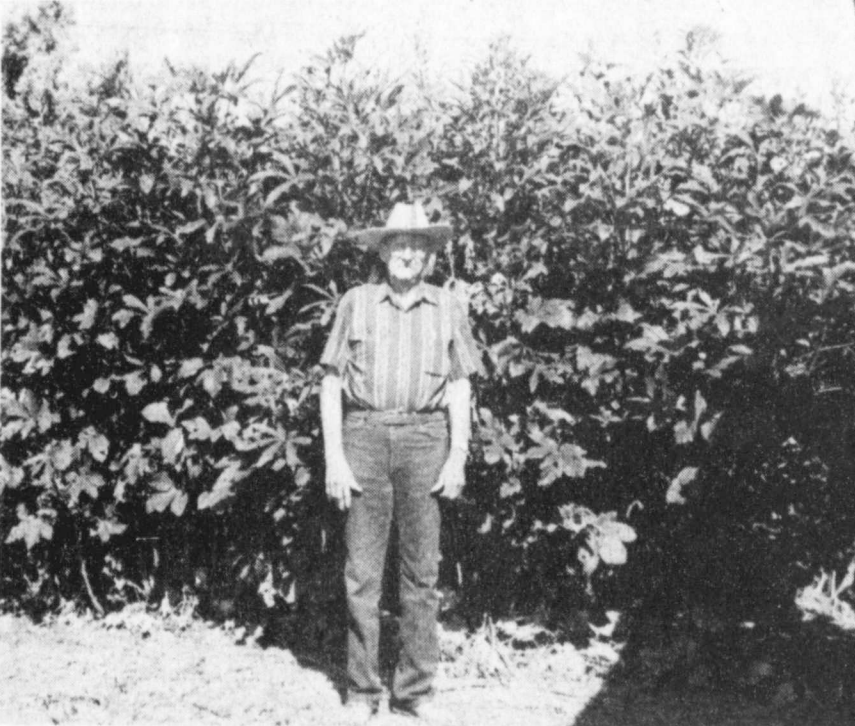

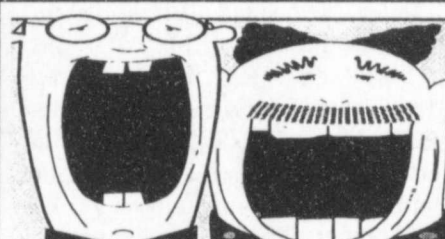

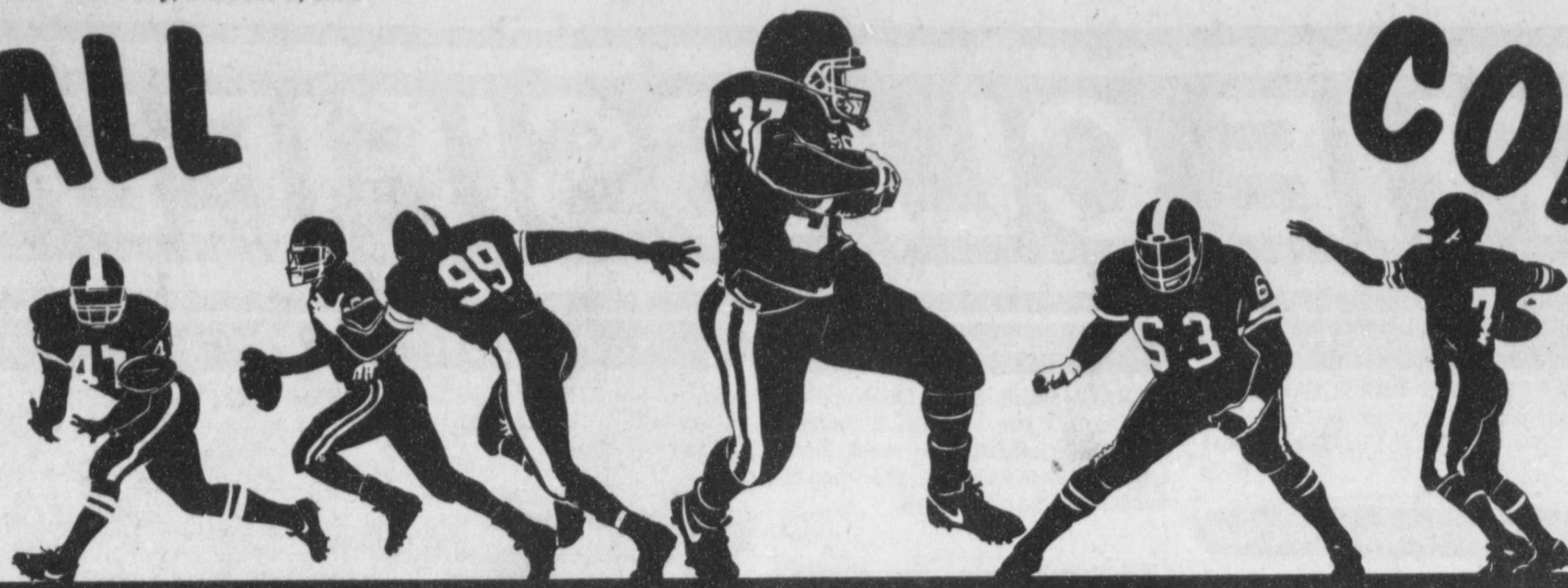
