

Board members agreed

## Longhorns win bi-district

### Team continues undefeated season

LOCKNEY - The Lockney Longhorns continued their unbeaten season Friday night, winning the AA bidistrict playoff game 13-7 over the Post Antelopes at windy Snyder Memorial Stadium.

In a rematch of an earlier season game won by the Longhorns 34-0, the two teams battled each other from the opening whistle for the night to continue their football season one more

It seemed early on as if Lockney would jump out to another quick start. After the Longhorn defense held Post without a first down on the Antelopes opening series, the Horns drove to the Antelope 3 yard line only to be held scoreless by the stingy Post defense led by linebacker Daniel Powers.

Following a scoreless first quarter, fense off the field. the Longhorns broke the deadlock with an impressive march into the 25 mile an hour wind. J. R. Walker put over of the night for the Longhorns, the first post-season points on the the Antelopes drove 66 yards in only Adam Cummings and darting 42 yard run on the quarterback keeper by

yards around left end on a reverse. Jaime Hernandez. Sam Woods' PAT Devon Phillips' extra point split the uprights for a 7-0 lead.

Following another defensive stand by the Longhorns led by defensive end Ryon Smith who had two quarterback sacks on the night, Lockney took over the ball at its own 28 with a little less than 2 minutes remaining. With no time left on the clock, Lockney hit pay dirt again as Walker out-leaped a Post defender in the end zone to complete a 27 yard scoring strike from Cummings which gave the Horns a 13-0 halftime lead.

Offense and defense together enabled the Longhorns to control the game while going into the wind in the third quarter. Key runs by Phillips, Miguel Guerrero and Anthony Poole ate up the clock and kept the Post of-

But early in the last stanza Post came to life. Following the only turnboard taking a pitch from quarterback 4 plays with the drive capped by an 8 cut the Horn lead t 13-7.

Lockney was unable to generate offense during its next possession, but Carson Johnson's first ever punt traveled 63 yards to the Antelope 2 yard line where it was downed by Charles Van Zandt.

With the game on the line Post impressively garnered 3 first downs before facing 4th and 5 at their own 47. But a key defensive stop by Longhorns' David Hernandez and John Lambert gave the ball back to the

Needing a first down to run out the clock, the Horns turned to the workhorse, Phillips, who popped through the right side for a 26 yard gain to salt away the victory.

Plainview is the site of this week's area tilt as the West Texas High Comanches come calling on the 11-0 Longhorns at 7:30 on Friday. Lockney is the visiting team and will be on the east sideline and stands.




Action concerning the requests to purchase equipment was tabled until Equipment in Floydada has been a later date when the completed inventory is available.



### Sen. Haywood files lottery bill

Senator Tom Haywood, State Legislator from District 30, has announced the official filing of the much talked about lottery bill.

designed to empower communities with the ability to keep a portion of lottery revenues. The Haywood proposal will allow city and county governments to retain 5% from every dollar spent on the lottery games. These additional funds could then be used at the discretion of local community leaders. The bill will be brought before the Texas legislator during the 75th session that begins in

'Millions of dollars of local wealth are leaving cities and counties all over Texas and being sent to the Lottery Commission in Austin every single day. Money that would normally be spent many times over within a community, creating local jobs and sus-

taining local business, instead end up in Austin." Haywood said, "My proposal, the Community Enrichment Act, will build a "funding pipeline" The Community Enrichment Act, the to return a modest portion of lottery official name of the lottery bill, is revenues directly to the local government in the jurisdiction where the ticket was sold."

"Today, many of our cities and counties are in dire need of supplemental funds that help provide needed community services. Often times taxes have to be raised in order to meet these needs," Haywood said. "If the Community Enrichment Act is enacted, local governments might look to lottery funds first, before deciding on tax increase. This would help to relieve some of these financial pressures...and restore some local control to these millions of dollars leaving our communities."

Haywood's entire legislative package will be announced in January, before the start of the 75th legislative ses-

## Business Of The Week

FLOYDADA--The building site which now houses the First National Bank in Floydada was first the home of the Exchange Saloon. In 1890, the saloon was the first building to be constructed in Floydada.

Out of necessity, the Johnson Bros. & Ainsworth Store, which was housed in the saloon, was probably one of the first firms to bank money in Floydada.

The store was bought out in 1896, by McMannis and Posey. Posey continued the banking tradition and in 1900 established the Floyd County Bank with L.T. Lester.

In 1903 the bank was nationalized and became the First National Bank of Floydada with a capital stock of \$30,000.

The first home of FNB was on Main Street between the Floydada Meat Market and J.T Morris & Sons' Cash

The bank moved to its current location in 1912 and over the years remodeled and expanded.

During the depression when deposits were lean and bank failures widespread, the stockholders and directors borrowed of their own resources and

### Ear infections in children

A common childhood illness is a billion-dollar problem.

"Otitis media or inflammation of the middle ear is the chief reason parents take children to the doctor," said Dr. Ellen Friedman, head of pediatric otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "And winter is the peak season for these visits, although otitis media can occur at any time."

Middle ear infections strike more than 80 percent of children by age 3 at an annual cost of more than \$1 billion, according to the National Center for Health Statistics. Children ages 6 months to 3 years are especially at

Friedman suggest parents watch for early indicators of this painful and potentially dangerous infection.

"At the first sign of fever, fussiness, tugging or rubbing of the ears, upper respiratory infection, nausea or vomiting, or any combination of these, parents should suspect middle ear infection," she said.

Middle ear infections occur when bacteria invades the middle ear causing inflammation. This results in a painful buildup of infected fluid behind the eardrum due to blockage of the eustachian tube leading from the

sinuses to the middle ear. Untreated middle ear infections can result in serious complications such brain abscess, or even hearing loss. concerned."

Early treatment may prevent such serious complications.

"Antibiotics are the main therapy although persistent cases may require special antibiotics or surgical drainage," Friedman said.

In more serious cases, ear tubes may be surgically inserted to help relieve fluid buildup and frequently occurring infections.

Although there is no fool-proof way to avoid middle ear infections. Friedman suggests that parents:

\*Avoid exposing children to passive smoke. Smoke can cause cilia, hair-like "fingers" in the inner ear that propel mucous, to stop working.

\*Choose breastfeeding over bottlefeeding.

\*Avoid exposing children to colds, flu or other viruses, although this is often not easy or realistic.

\*Place their child in a smaller daycare facility, or avoid daycare settings if possible.

\*Make sure their child receives the full course of antibiotics. It's important to be checked for complete ear healing within four weeks or sooner if any symptoms persist.

"Parents should understand that middle ear infections are very common," Friedman said. "Many times they will go away on their own. However, it's important to know the sympas a ruptured eardrum, meningitis, toms and seek treatment if you are

The dedication of the board members assures that these young men would receive a fair and effective classification process by able, trained, and objective individuals should the need for such a system arise.







If you are purchasing a gift and you aren't sure it will be suitable for the recipient, ask the clerk if it can be exchanged or substituted or can you get your money back. In other words, before you walk out with the item, are you certain that it can be brought back. Most South Plains stores have very lenient refund and exchange policies. Remember though, the store does not have to accept an item back unless it has been misrepresented or is defective and if that is the case, what is done about the item is up to the store, not the con-

The Federal Trade Commission 3day Cooling off rule is limited to only those contracts or transactions that take place in your home or place other than where the firm conducts their normal business. The rule gives you three business days to cancel purchases of \$25 or more. The purchase of a car at a car lot or retail establishment would not qualify, but a purchase made at a home party or in a hotel or motel would. The rule does not cover, among other things, sales that are commercial in nature. The seller must give the consumer a form



Since proof of cancellation is important, it should be sent to the seller via certified mail with a return receipt requested.



A "brown-bag biopsy" can help senior citizens avoid problems with

"People over the age of 65 consume one-third of all prescription medications sold each year in the United States," said Dr. George Taffet, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "The more prescriptions a person takes, the greater the chances of developing adverse drug reactions."

A simple brown paper bag is one good way for patients to bring all of their medications -- prescription and over-the-counter-- to the doctor's office, said Taffet.

This gives the physician a chance to sort through medications and check for duplicates, prescriptions that have expired and drugs that may not combine well with others. It is especially beneficial when patients see several

Maintaining a list of medications can also help avoid drug reactions, which occur in nearly one-third of the elderly and often develop from mixing prescriptions with over-the-



Dr. Dobson: I have been amazed by television personalities, politicians and millions of American young people who refer to astrology.

How ridiculous it is to think that Adolph Hiller, Queen Elizabeth, Harry Truman, William Shakespeare, Bing Crosby, Willie Mays, Ho Chi Minh, Golda Meir and I should have everything in common because all of us were born under the sign of Taurus! How stupid to suppose that the success of our business venture, our health and even our sex lives are predetermined by the position of the stars and planets on the day of our births!

Yet there are more than 10,000 astrologers currently working in the United States, offering advice on everything from business deals to the compatibility of a man and his dog.

There is not a scrap of scientific evidence to support the validity of such illogical notions. In fact, it was an allknowing astrologist who advised Hitler to attack Russia--his biggest mistake! Nevertheless, millions of believers consult their horoscopes to obtain daily truth and wisdom.

I was recently introduced to a famous Hollywood actor while we sat waiting to appear on a television talk program. My wife was with me to observe the interview, and the actor commented on her attractiveness. He said, "I bet you are a Sagittarius because most pretty girls are born under that sign." I was so appalled by the silliness of that statement that I felt obliged to challenge what he said.

Trying not to insult his intelligence, I asked him if he had made any effort to prove his hypothesis. I pointed out how simple it would be, for example, to check the birth date of every girl entered in next year's Miss America or Miss Universe contest. I soon learned that the best way to end a conversation with an astrologist is to begin talking about scientific evidence.

In 1960, the world's astrologers announced that the worst combination of planetary influences in 25,000 years would occur that year. Seven of nine planets were to appear in a line, which meant bad news for mother earth. Indian soothsayers were going crazy in sheer fright and American skygazers were predicting everything from the drowning of California to the cataclysmic end of the world.

But the fateful day came and went, of course, with no more disasters than on any other day.

When astrological advice is broadcast on radio or television stations, the announcers often repeat a disclaimer, saying they are not attempting to foster a serious belief in astrology and are providing the horoscopes for fun and entertainment.

How about it then? Is astrology just an amusing pastime for our enjoyment?

cans who depend on the stars to provide direction and meaning each day? Isn't it better that they believe in this myth than to believe in nothing at all? Should we foster a tolerant attitude toward astrology or should it be seen as an insidious philosophy to be opposed wherever possible?

A widely quoted psychiatrist recently professed that he urges his patients to depend on the astrologers, even though he admits that their predictions are scientifically worthless. I couldn't agree more! Astrology is not only mythical nonsense, but it is dangerous to those who accept its tenets.

One serious concern is that if offers a substitute for rational judgement and wisdom. A young man or woman, for example, may choose a marital partner on the basis of compatibility of their charts, without proper regard for the lifetime implications of their decision. Others postpone or disregard needed action because of the "do nothing" advice printed on their horo-

It is impossible to estimate how many important decisions are based on the stars each day, undoubtedly having a profound impact on family, business and even governmental affairs. How risky it is to determine one's destiny by the flip of a fickle coin!

The naive believer exchanges his understanding of facts, his common sense, his experience, and his better judgement for a "know all, tell all" pulp magazine of forecasts. He reminds me of a man confidently leaning against the wind while standing on top of a 10 story building. His body is seemingly held in check as he teeters precariously over the edge of the structure. But sooner, or later, the gusts will slaken and the man will suddenly plunge downward in panic.

Likewise, the astrology convert is leaning against an apparition which cannot possibly hold him securely in place. Sooner or later, when troubling and fearful circumstances beset him (as will come to everyone), he will reach frantically for something stable and firm to grasp. But he will find little support from the myth and superstition on which he has been leaning.

Please believe me when I say I am personally and professionally acquainted with individuals who have taken that frightening plunge. Some fun! Some entertainment!






### Sanchez brothers complete Marine basic training period

MINIMUM WAGE CONCERNS Administrative Assistant Jimmie Collins told the board the minimum wage increase on October 1st left six custodial employees making minimum wage of \$4.75 or a few cents above. "It has always been our policy to pay at a little above minimum wage," said Collins. "I would like to see all of these raised to at least \$5.00

Amado Morales made a motion to increase the six to \$5.25 per hour, but withdrew it in favor of Robertson's suggestion that a percent increase be given to preserve the senority factor in the current wages.

Board president Mitch Probasco pointed out that these employees had received raises at the time salaries were set for the current school year and any making less than \$4.75 had been increased to that level as of October 1 due to the federal minimum wage laws. He indicated that a raise now would be inappropriate when the board will be considering salaries for the next school year in March or

Board members approved a 6.2% raise from \$4.75 for five of the six employees, those who have worked for FISD more than a year. The remaining employee, new this year, will remain at minimum wage. The vote was split with Brown, Trena Simpson, Robertson and Morales voting in favor and Probasco and Steve Lloyd voting against.

**OTHER ITEMS** 

Board members set the Appraisal Calendar period from November 15, 1996 through May 16, 1997. All appraisals of teacher performance will be conducted during this period.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as presented. Monthly bills were approved for payment. Collins presented the tax report showing tax collections of \$376,023.94 at the present. This means collections are 22.05 percent complete, compared to 25.3 percent at this time a year ago.

Kathy Jahay presented the monthly report from the Site Based Decision Making Committees. She said Duncan Elementary teachers are pleased with the combined Excel and Michael Eaton Associates math programs and that all personnel are receiving training in effective communication practices. She went on to say the campus is investigating the Johnny Can Write program to combine with the current Johnny Can Spell program in use and the number of students reading in first grade has increased as has the number of kindergarten students engaging in prereading activities.

Jahay reported Andrews Elementary teachers are making extra efforts to have personal contact with parents to increase involvement in student education and teachers are conducting homework tutorials after school. Social studies teachers are participating with the Institute of Texan Cultures and AT&T in development of new materials and teacher training as part of a five school grant award in the

The Junior High Principal's Advisory Committee is reviewing campus technology needs and the Proud Crowd is in its second six weeks, allowing students other than those earning A's and B's to receive special recognition.

Following a very successful Homecoming, FHS has scheduled a career/college day November 26. Jahay also said FHS is being recognized for high levels of performance by migrant students on TAAS tests, attendance rates, promotion rates and graduation rates. Principal Joe Christian and Migrant Clerk Maria Vasquez will receive the award at the annual TME Conference. She added that the new Gym will host the first basketball tournament December 5 &

Holly Lee presented the Academic Excellence Indicator System report from the TEA. This report details district performance in all academic areas and compares the data with several averaged scenarios and a variety of breakdowns based on social, economic, and educational factors.


### Breezer Basketball Report

Beef checkoff programs conducted by the Texas Beef Council (TBC) in the coming year will achieve more measurable results than ever before, said Chaunce Thompson of Breckenridge, TBC Chairman.

"TBC will extend the national effort of promotion and education about beef into Texas in more focused ways during 1997," Thompson said. "We call our programs Intensified Partnership Initiatives (IPI) because TBC's staff works so closely with selected partners. To participate, the partners have to provide us with specific information on how these programs affect their beef sales.'

Thompson said the beef industry has used the beef checkoff program to grow into its new marketing role.

"In the first years of the checkoff, we had to promote our image and sell our benefits," he said. "Decades of underfunded marketing efforts had forced us to remind consumers that we had a healthy, wholesome product. Those years of effort now allow


