## FLOYDADA--The building site

 which now houses the First National Bank in Floydada was first the home of the Exchange Saloon. In 1890, thesaloon was the first building to be saloon was the first buil
constructed in Floydada.
Out of necessity, the Johnson Bros. \& Ainsworth Store, which was housed in the saloon, was probably one of the first firms to bank money in Floydada The store was bought out in 1896 by McMannis and Posey. Posey con inued the banking tradition and in Bank with L.T. Lester
Bank with L.T. Lester and became the First National Bank of Floydada with a capital stock of $\$ 30,000$.
The first home of FNB was on Main Street between the Floydada Mea Market and J.T Morris \& Sons' Cash
Store. Store.
The bank moved to its current lomodeled and expanded.
During the depression when deposits were lean and bank failures widespread, the stockholders and directors
borrowed of their own resources and

*Place their child in a smaller daycare facility, or avoid daycare set tings if possible
*Make sure their child receives the full course of antibiotics. It's imporhealing within four weeks or sooner if any symptoms persist. "Parents should understand tha middle ear infections are very com

A "brown-bag biopsy" can help senior citizens avoid problems with medications.
"People over the age of 65 consume one-third of all prescription medications sold each year in the United States," said Dr. George Taffet, an assistant professor or medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Housson takes, the greater the chances of Aeveloping adverse drug reactions. A simple brown paper bag is one good way for patients to bring all of their medications -- prescription and
over-the-counter-- to the doctor's office, said Taffet.
This gives the physician a chance
to sort through medications and for duplicates, prescrations and check Yor dupicates, prescriptions that have
expired and drugs that may not combine well with others. It is especially beneficial when patients see several
doctors.
Maintaining a list of medications can also help avoid drug reactions,
which occur in nearly one-third of the elderly and often develop from mix-
