

Archeologists continue Coronado digs in snow

Dr. Donald Blakeslee and his students from Wichita State University, Wichita, Kansas arrived in Floyd County on Saturday, January 4, and were joined by local and state archeologists to continue work on the Coronado site in Blanco Canyon.

Despite snow and freezing temperatures the group encamped in the canyon throughout the week until their departure on Saturday, January 11. Archeologists from Allen, Dallas and Canyon, Texas stayed in local motels.

Evening meals were served at the museum by local supporters. Floydada FHA students and their teacher, Janice Moss, cooked and served the Wednesday night meal. Tamales were donated by Pete Hale, owner of Pedro's Tamales in Lubbock, on Friday.

The next scheduled dig will be held

in March. Individuals, organizations and businesses who would like to provide food in March can contact the museum. The evening mealtime offers an opportunity to get acquainted with the visiting archeologists and learn more about the Coronado Project.

Local Boy Scouts have plans to assist with the canyon work. A large area of mesquite was cleared during the past week to allow a more complete survey of the canyon floor. The test pit yielded additional materials providing further evidence of the Spanish campsite.

The cost for 1-3 children in a frame is \$10.00. If there are four or more people in the picture the cost will be \$15.00 per frame.







Sometimes when my wife and I are together and something isn't turning out quite the way we planned for example, getting lost on a car trip, or having to do something we don't really enjoy), my wife will say, "well, at least we are together." Although this usually doesn't help the situation, for some reason it makes me feel better. guess it is just a good reminder that we are not alone an the two of us can better face the situation together. Even when we are alone and something unpleasant happens, we should try to remember that God said He would never leave us or forsake us. God knows His people, and He allows certain unpleasant things to happen to us so that we may grow and learn to trust in Him. It doesn't matter if we are alone or with someone; we are always together with God.

"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

QUESTION: What would you do if your 18-year-old son decided to become a social dropout and run away from home?

Dr. Dobson: It is difficult for anyone to know exactly how he would face a given crisis, but I can tell you what I think would be the best reaction under those circumstances.

Without nagging and whining, I would hope to influence the boy to change his mind before he made a mistake. If he could not be dissuaded, I would have to let him go.

It is not wise for parents to be too demanding and authoritative with an older teenager; they may force him to defy their authority just to prove his independence and adulthood. Besides this, if they pound on the table, wring their hands and scream at their wayward son, he will not feel the full responsibility for his own behavior.

When Mom and Dad are too emotionally involved with him, he can expect them to bail him out if he runs into trouble. I think it is much wiser to treat the late adolescent like an adult; he's more likely to act like one if he is given the status offered to other adults.

The appropriate parental reaction should be: "John, you know I feel you are making a choice that will haunt you for many years. I want you to sit down with me and we will analyze the pros and cons; then the final decision will be yours. I will not stand in your way." John then knows the responsibility is on his shoulders.

Beginning in middle adolescence, parents should give a child more and more responsibility each year, so that when he gets beyond their control he will no longer need it.

Perhaps we sometimes keep our children from coming to their senses by preventing them from feeling the consequences of their own mistakes. When a teenager gets a speeding citation, he should pay for it. When he wrecks his car, he should have it fixed. When he gets suspended from school. he should take the consequences without parental protests to the school. He will learn from these adversities. The

parent who is too quick to bail his child out of difficulty may be doing him a disservice.

QUESTION: I am hurt because my teen-ager seems to be ashamed to be seen with me. I gave birth to him and have nourished and devoted my entire life to him. Now, he's suddenly embarrassed to be seen with me, especially when his friends are around. Is this normal? Should I resist or accept it?

Dr. Dobson: You should understand that teen-agers are engulfed by a tremendous desire to be adults, and they resent anything which implies that they are children.

When they are seen with their "Mommy and Daddy" on a Friday night, for example, their humiliation is almost unbearable. They are not really ashamed of their parents; they are embarrassed by the adult-baby role that was more appropriate in prior

Though it is difficult for you now, you would do well to accept this healthy aspect of growing up without becoming defensive about it. Your love relationship with your child will be reestablished in a few years, although it will never be a parent-child phenomenon again.



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

The Whirlwinds managed to execute a long pass downcourt on their ensuing inbounds play, but it was deflected out of bounds with .2 seconds remaining. Floydada set up a lob under the basket for Michael Black, but the ball rolled in and out - denying the Whirlwinds their initial district victory.

Black led Floydada's scoring attack with 19 points (including a 2-for-3 effort from 3-point range). The 'Winds dominated the boards 38-26, with Black pulling down 18 rebounds (11 on the offensive end). It was Black's fourth double-double of the season.

Vernon Cooper also had another double-double with 17 points and 10 rebounds. Cooper hit two of eight attempts from 3-point range. No other Whirlwind scored in double figures, although Ticen Harper knocked down 8 points to go along with 7 rebounds (five on the offensive boards).

Seminole, ranked third in Texas among Class 3A clubs, improved to 18-4 and 4-0 in District 2-3A with its victory at Floydada last Friday. The Indians held a 33-16 lead at intermission to dominate every statistical category in the game.







By Shawn Wade Producers and Landowners across the High Plains are gravely concerned about the rapid spread of boll weevil into area cotton fields. Despite efforts to reverse this trend before the boll weevil establishes itself permanently, a campaign of misinformation has been mounted by a group to eliminate

the only program available with the ability to address the problem. Unfortunately, many producers in threatened areas have been led to believe that the High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program they voted on, and overwhelmingly approved, has somehow mu-

tated into a mindless machine that will do them more harm than good. That is simply not the case.

Instead of believing propaganda saying the program is broken beyond the point of salvation, High Plains cotton producers have an opportunity

Say NO to the recall petition effort. Many times information sent out has purposely misled producers with the promise of fixing problems to achieve its true objective - elimination of the High Plains' best defense against the boll weevil.

to make their own decision and to

protect themselves.

The winter of 1997 is shaping up to be one of the coldest experienced in this area in several years. Even though it will not be enough to totally eliminate the boll weevil from the best overwintering sites, it does promise to provide producers working together a chance to retake their fields and their furtures in 1997.

Building on the successful programs of 1995 and 1996 the High Plains can win the war against the boll weevil. The 1996 program, coupled with the cold winter temperatures felt so far, should position this area to deliver a devastating blow to boll weevil populations and further the process of pushing the boll weevil from the High Plains.

Assuming the Texas Supreme Court rules in favor of the existing program, outstanding 1996 assessments will be due and significantly increase the ability of the 1997 Program to take advantage of the cold winter temperatures currently being

experienced. Fortunately there is something else



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
