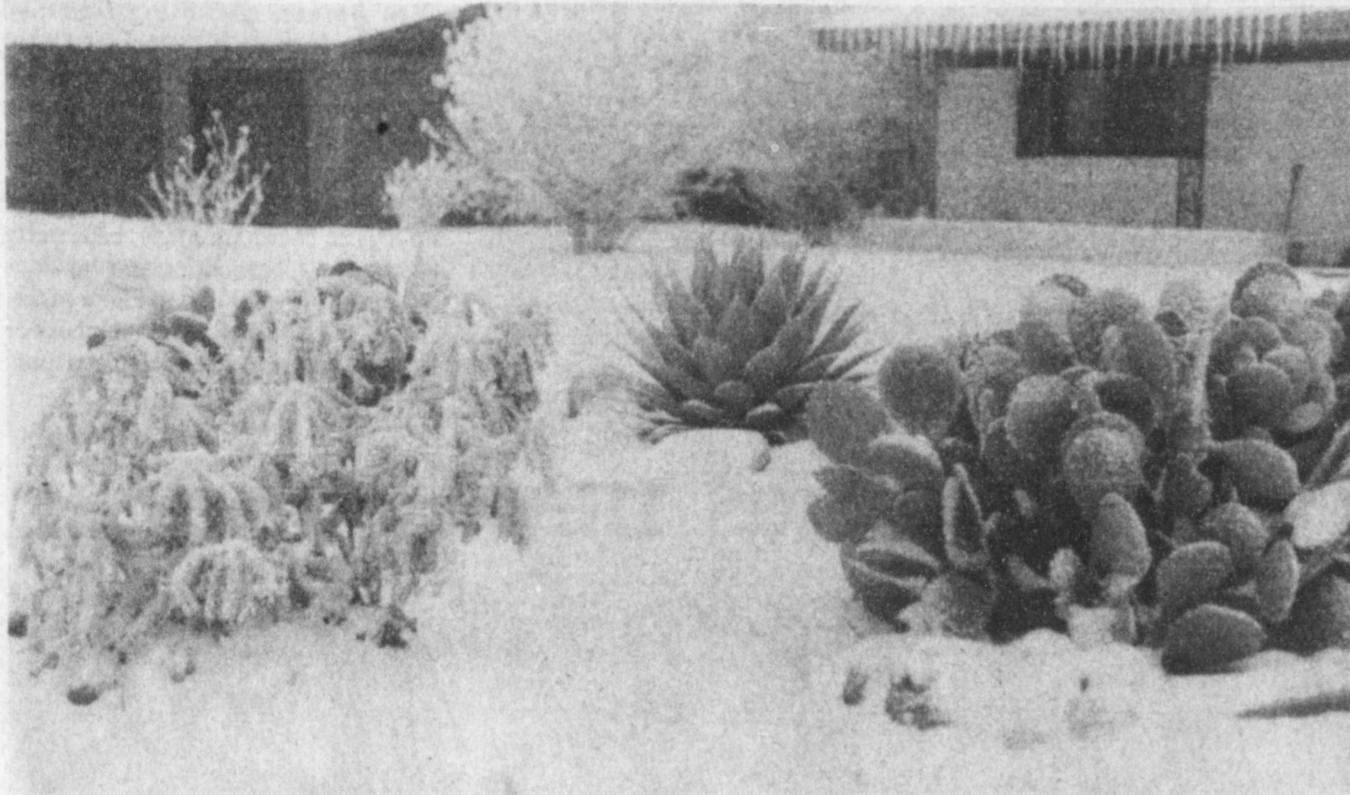

FLOYDADA — Three grand champions were selected from a field of 116 animals during the 1997 Floydada Junior Livestock Show on Saturday, January 11. The event was sponsored by the Floydada Chamber of Commerce and by the Coca Cola Company. Judging was by the Clarendon Junior College Livestock Judging Team.

Whitney Williams displayed the Grand Champion Lamb, Tana Holmes had the Grand Champion in

the Swine Division and Chase Mitchell Beedy showed the Grand Champion Steer. Reserve Grand Championships went to Scott Nixon in Swine, Whitney Williams in Sheep and Chase Mitchell Beedy in Steers.

Senior Showmanship awards were presented to Resa Mercado in the Sheep Division, Cody Stovall in the Swine Division and Todd Hinsley in the Steer Division. Junior Showmanship winners were Whitney Williams in Sheep, Cynthia Martinez in Swine

and Jurahee Jones in Steers.

Four sheep and 20 steers were shown. Ninety-two swine were exhibited.

## Whirlwind Gym named

FLOYDADA — FISD Trustees voted unanimously on Thursday, January 9, to name the new gymnasium at Floydada High School the Floydada Whirlwind Gym. Motion for the action was made by board member Amado Morales and seconded by board member Billy Joe Villarreal.

The board also agreed to designate the players entrance to the basketball court "The Wind Tunnel". This nickname appealed to board members who asked that a banner be hung inside the gym denoting the nickname.

Adoption of a school calendar for the 1997-98 school year was also approved at the evening session. School will begin for students on August 18, 1997 and end on Friday, May 22, 1998 with graduation that evening. Christmas vacation will be from December 22 thru January 2 and spring break will be March 16-20.

FHS Principal Joe Christian reported on efforts of the Drug Policy Development Committee. He stated

that a public meeting had been held, but was attended by only about 25 due to a mix up which resulted in not informing the public through the newspaper or radio station.

"We had some good input," said Christian, "but I would like to suggest that a second meeting for public input and questions be held on January 23 at the High School Auditorium." The board approved setting the meeting.

Christian told board members that the policy as it is developing would create three pools of students at the Junior High and four at the high school. Floydada Junior High would test students in Boys Athletics, students in Girls Athletics and others. Others would include band students and other organization members as well as those whose parents chose to volunteer them for testing.

High School would test those in Boys Athletics, Girls Athletics, Band and Other. Others at FHS would include organizational members and those volunteered for testing by their parents. All would be tested to begin the year and random tests would be

conducted at intervals during the year. Anyone coming into the district during the year would have an initial test prior to participation in any school program.

Christian stressed the importance of getting the public to attend the meeting on January 23. He said that this would allow everyone to hear what the policy included and what possible sanctions would be instituted. He invited all to come and hear what is being developed as well as to voice their views on the proposed drug policy.

Bids were opened and reviewed by the board for the proposed purchase of a new pickup for the Ag department. The bid was awarded to the low bidder, Oden Chevrolet, for a 1997 model 1-Ton pickup with automatic transmission and a gasoline engine. The cost of the new vehicle will be \$20,517.00.

## Construction of new water tower planned by council

LOCKNEY--The Lockney City Council met Thursday, January 9 in regular session and discussed the capacity of the water tower to be constructed, worked on amending the mobile home ordinance and passed a resolution for "Fair Housing Month".

Jamie Johnson, City Engineer, had worked up specifications for the water tower that is to be built with a grant and asked the city council to consider the standpipe capacity from three proposals he had sent. Utilities Supervisor Dickie McCarty told the council the water tower the council had selected earlier would be more than sufficient.

Council member Bil Anderson made the motion and Tina Graves the second to stay with the capacity tower they had agreed on earlier. All voted for.

Upon receiving notice from the

council, Johnson will advertise for bids for the construction of the water tower.

The council discussed passing an amendment to the mobile home ordinance currently on the books. Each time someone asks to move a mobile home into the city of Lockney a variance has to be requested and is only granted when all the conditions are met.

Work was begun on an amendment that, when met by the mobile home owners, would keep paperwork to a minimum. Included in the discussion was the condition of the mobile home, size of the lot, driveway, skirting, neighbors agreement and other items.

The item was tabled until the next meeting. Council members passed a resolution naming January as "Fair Housing Month".

## Archeologists continue Coronado digs in snow

Dr. Donald Blakeslee and his students from Wichita State University, Wichita, Kansas arrived in Floyd County on Saturday, January 4, and were joined by local and state archeologists to continue work on the Coronado site in Blanco Canyon.

Despite snow and freezing temperatures the group encamped in the canyon throughout the week until their departure on Saturday, January 11. Archeologists from Allen, Dallas and Canyon, Texas stayed in local motels.

Evening meals were served at the museum by local supporters. Floydada FHA students and their teacher, Janice Moss, cooked and served the Wednesday night meal. Tamales were donated by Pete Hale, owner of Pedro's Tamales in Lubbock, on Friday.

The next scheduled dig will be held

in March. Individuals, organizations and businesses who would like to provide food in March can contact the museum. The evening mealtime offers an opportunity to get acquainted with the visiting archeologists and learn more about the Coronado Project.

Local Boy Scouts have plans to assist with the canyon work. A large area of mesquite was cleared during the past week to allow a more complete survey of the canyon floor. The test pit yielded additional materials providing further evidence of the Spanish campsite.

Dr. Blakeslee flew to Corpus Christi on Wednesday where he spoke at the Society of historical Archeologists. His report on the Coronado site was received with much interest and was one of four presentations which included the LaSalle Shipwreck Project.

The cost for 1-3 children in a frame is \$10.00. If there are four or more people in the picture the cost will be \$15.00 per frame.

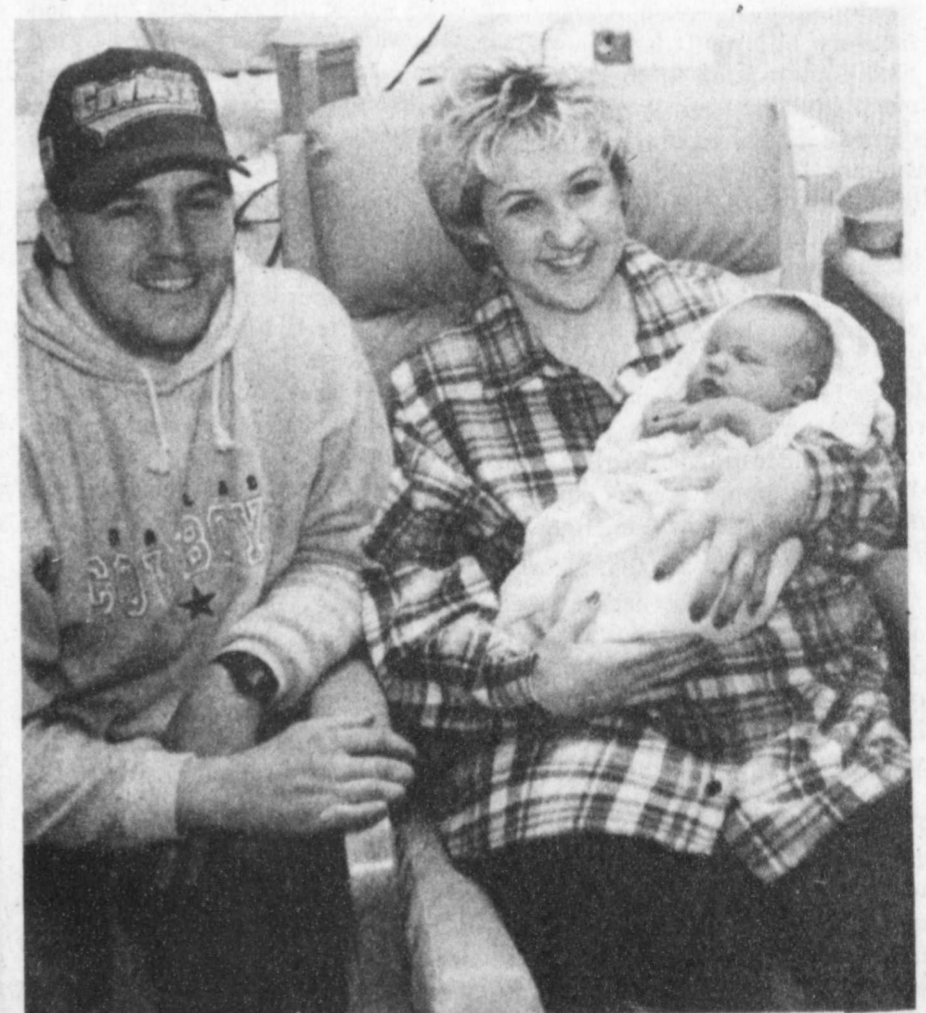

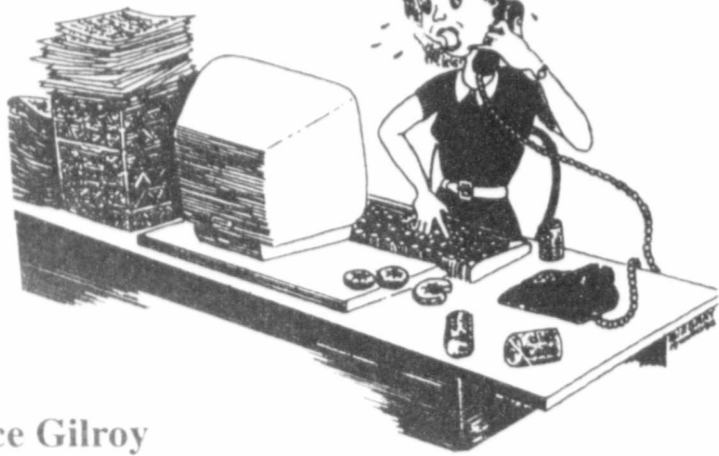

Dr. Orzeck told the man yes. "He didn't seem the least concerned that I was aware of the con job he was pulling on unsuspecting people," wrote Dr. Orzeck. "And since he didn't seem to mind, I asked him why he didn't have the cat yesterday when all the tourists were about."

"He said, 'My old lady had the cat yesterday up to the wharf (fisherman's wharf) cause she always does real good up there on the weekends.'"

"When I asked where she was working today, he said, 'Man, she only pans (panhandles) on weekends. She gotta go to classes during the week.'"

**County Commissioners approve farm contracts**

Floyd County Commissioners unanimously approved payment of monthly bills and the transfer of \$8,000.00 to each of the four precincts from the Road & Bridge Fund during a regular session on Monday, January 13. Three farm work contracts were also approved.

These included: #1686 for Steve McPherson in Precinct 2 to have a waterway cleared at a site 1 1/2 miles west of FM 378 and 3 miles north on FM 788; #1700 in Precinct 1 for James Jeffries to have a tailwater pit repaired south of Sandhill; and #1687 for Ray Gant in Precinct 2 to have a pit dug and old improvements buried 3 miles west of Lockney on Highway 70 then 1 mile south.

Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented quarterly investment reports including financial reports for the final quarter of 1996 and for the month of December. All were accepted as presented.

Shurbet reported the county began December with \$430,748.39 in county funds. Receipts for the month totaled \$165,944.86 and disbursements were \$131,904.42. Transfers in and out totaled \$60,275.08. Fund balances as of December 31, 1996 were \$464,788.83.

The county also had \$420,000.00 in undivided tax invested in certificates of deposit. Other CD's included: \$25,000.00 for Precinct 1, \$20,000.00 for Precinct 2, \$106,000.00 for Precinct 3 and \$25,000.00 for Precinct 4. According to Shurbet, CD's and interest bearing accounts have earned a total of \$4,836.33 between October 1 and

December 31, 1996.

Monthly reports from elected officials whose offices collect fines and fees were presented for review by the commissioners. Reports from the two Justices of the Peace, the county clerk and the district clerk were accepted as presented.

Commissioners approved official bonds for Constable Ray Macha, Commissioners George Taylor and Ray Nell Bearden, Deputy to the County Clerk Marilyn Holcomb, Deputy to the District Clerk Janie McAnally, and Tax Assessor/Collector Deputies Peggy Hill and Dorcus Williams. Approval was also given to advertise for bids from financial institutions for services as a county depository.

The grievance committee to hear disputes concerning county employee salaries during the coming year will be composed of nine public members. These were selected by random drawing from the names of the people who served on the 1996 grand jury panels. Those drawn will be notified and the names released after they have agreed to serve on the committee.

Jury fees paid to persons called to serve on a jury during the coming year were set at \$12.00 per day. This rate is the same as it has been for the past several years. Commissioners have the option to set jury pay at any amount between \$5.00 per day and \$30.00 per day.

Pesticide applicator Larry Ferguson met with the court to ask that he be given permission to spray for weeds in ditches on the county right-of-way. Ferguson stated that he was licensed to do so and was often

A new, different, and entirely unpredictable Texas Legislature is now in session.

We say new and different for all the obvious reasons, which have been much commented on in the press and politics. For the first time in more than 100 years the Texas Senate will be in the hands of Republicans, or those who call themselves Republicans. The election of Robert Duncan of Lubbock to replace John Montford put the Republicans over the top. Prior to Duncan's move to the Senate, he had represented a portion of Lubbock in the Texas House.

And we say unpredictable simply because the new personalities, and the new situation facing those personalities, will bear watching before we know where the dust settles. There will be more than one of the new Senators occupying his chair by virtue of the strength of his party. How they react will be interesting to watch. Some may very well resent the fact they were carried across the finish line

by their party, while others may glory in that fact. Time will tell.

There may be a couple more flies in the ointment, as well. How is the new Senate going to interact with its presiding officer, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock? And how is Bullock going to react with the new Senate? Bob has pretty much had his way in the Senate, and, for the most part the state hasn't suffered because of it. But he is known for, among other things, his ability to get his back up on occasions. We suspect there will be a few bumps along the road in the new Senate, but Bullock is nothing if not a good politician. He can read the tea leaves as well as anybody and better than most. While we won't go out on a limb and make a prediction, we will allow ourself the belief that this may be a very productive session of the Legislature.

One of the more interesting side shows in the new session may involve who done what for whom (and to whom) in the bureaucracy of our fa-

mous Texas Lottery. A variety of news stories indicate friends may have been helping friends get ahead in the world, a laudable undertaking if public money isn't involved. Evidently, the lady who ran the lottery until she was fired by the Commission that oversees the operation, a Ms. Nora Linares, is a "close" friend of a Mr. Mike Moeller, who used to be a close aide to former Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, and who got in all sorts of trouble with the feds for things he did while in Jim's office, and who got a \$6,000 per month contract with GTECH, the company that runs the lottery, (and who, in fact, is now serving time in a federal prison for his shenanigans while in Mr.

Hightower's employ). And they are both friends of Ms. Lena Guerrero, who used to be (and may still be) a close friend of former Gov. Ann Richards, and who somehow got to be a well paid lobbyist for the same company that hired Mr. Moeller.

Ms. Guerrero, whose memory of her academic achievements was a little faulty, got the contract with GTECH after she lost a bid for reelection to the Texas Railroad Commission, to which she had been appointed by Ms. Richards. Ms. Linares used to be with Comptroller John Sharp, who wants to be governor, and who has been running for Governor for 10 these many years. From there on it gets complicated. Lurking around in the background is former Lt. Gov.

Ben Barnes, also a big financial backer of selected Democratic candidates. (He can afford to be financially helpful. He receives 4 percent, according to news stories, of all GTECH income from their Texas lottery operation. And that's a lot of money.) There are those, especially the Lottery Commission and the Governor, who would like to know more. We would be surprised if members of the Legislature, for their own purposes, didn't try to help.

**Caprock Community Band looking for musical members**

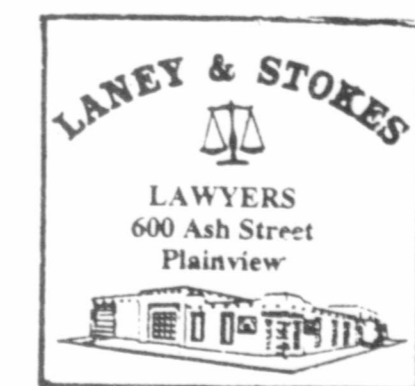

**AT LEAST WE ARE TOGETHER**

*Sometimes when my wife and I are together and something isn't turning out quite the way we planned (for example, getting lost on a car trip, or having to do something we don't really enjoy), my wife will say, "well, at least we are together." Although this usually doesn't help the situation, for some reason it makes me feel better. I guess it is just a good reminder that we are not alone and that the two of us can better face the situation together. Even when we are alone and something unpleasant happens, we should try to remember that God said He would never leave us or forsake us. God knows His people, and He allows certain unpleasant things to happen to us so that we may grow and learn to trust in Him. It doesn't matter if we are alone or with someone; we are always together with God.*

**"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson**

**QUESTION: What would you do if your 18-year-old son decided to become a social dropout and run away from home?**

**Dr. Dobson:** It is difficult for anyone to know exactly how he would face a given crisis, but I can tell you what I think would be the best reaction under those circumstances.

Without nagging and whining, I would hope to influence the boy to change his mind before he made a mistake. If he could not be dissuaded, I would have to let him go.

It is not wise for parents to be too demanding and authoritative with an older teenager; they may force him to defy their authority just to prove his independence and adulthood. Besides this, if they pound on the table, wring their hands and scream at their wayward son, he will not feel the full responsibility for his own behavior.

When Mom and Dad are too emotionally involved with him, he can expect them to bail him out if he runs into trouble. I think it is much wiser to treat the late adolescent like an adult; he's more likely to act like one if he is given the status offered to other adults.

The appropriate parental reaction should be: "John, you know I feel you are making a choice that will haunt you for many years. I want you to sit down with me and we will analyze the pros and cons; then the final decision will be yours. I will not stand in your way." John then knows the responsibility is on his shoulders.

Beginning in middle adolescence, parents should give a child more and more responsibility each year, so that when he gets beyond their control he will no longer need it.

Perhaps we sometimes keep our children from coming to their senses by preventing them from feeling the consequences of their own mistakes. When a teenager gets a speeding citation, he should pay for it. When he wrecks his car, he should have it fixed. When he gets suspended from school, he should take the consequences without parental protests to the school. He will learn from these adversities. The

parent who is too quick to bail his child out of difficulty may be doing him a disservice.

**QUESTION: I am hurt because my teen-ager seems to be ashamed to be seen with me. I gave birth to him and have nourished and devoted my entire life to him. Now, he's suddenly embarrassed to be seen with me, especially when his friends are around. Is this normal? Should I resist or accept it?**

**Dr. Dobson:** You should understand that teen-agers are engulfed by a tremendous desire to be adults, and they resent anything which implies that they are children.

When they are seen with their "Mommy and Daddy" on a Friday night, for example, their humiliation is almost unbearable. They are not really ashamed of their parents; they are embarrassed by the adult-baby role that was more appropriate in prior years.

Though it is difficult for you now, you would do well to accept this healthy aspect of growing up without becoming defensive about it. Your love relationship with your child will be reestablished in a few years, although it will never be a parent-child phenomenon again.

Martha Lotspeich, president, called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. and called on Edris Edwards for the opening prayer.

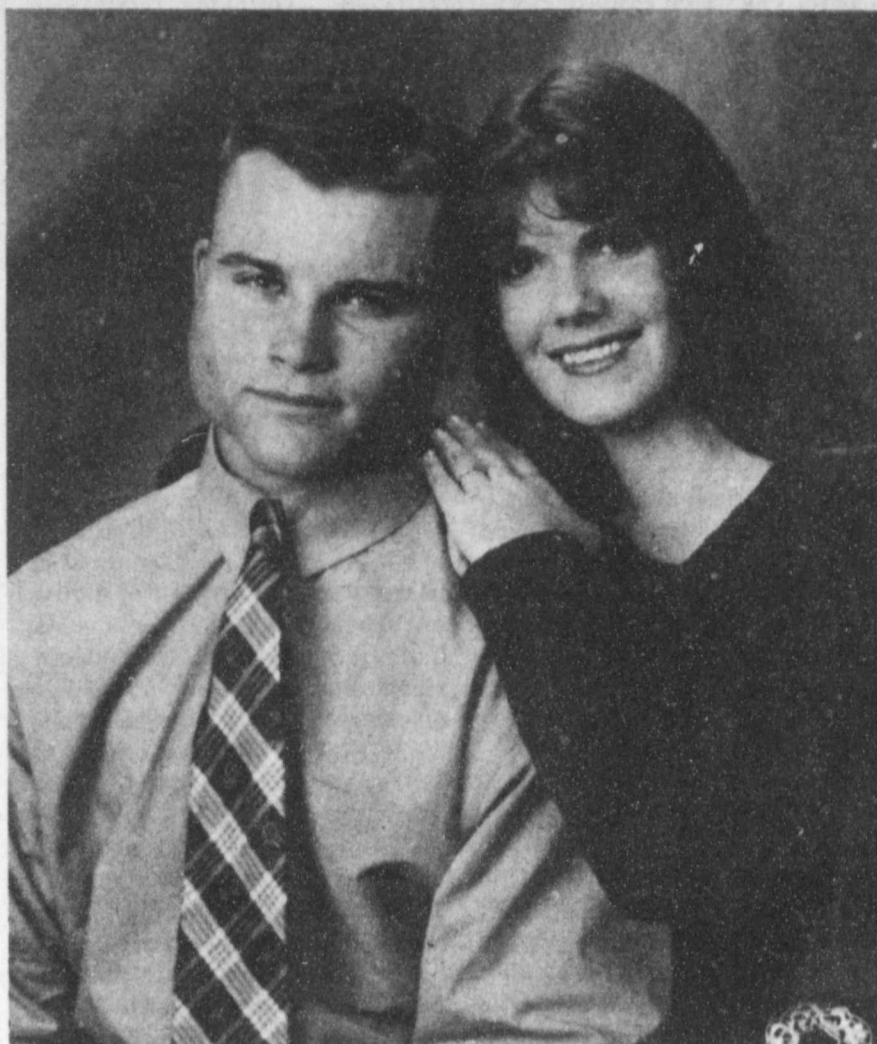

## Information on boll weevil program reported by PCG

**By Shawn Wade**  
Producers and Landowners across the High Plains are gravely concerned about the rapid spread of boll weevil into area cotton fields. Despite efforts to reverse this trend before the boll weevil establishes itself permanently, a campaign of misinformation has been mounted by a group to eliminate the only program available with the ability to address the problem. Unfortunately, many producers in threatened areas have been led to believe that the High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program they voted on, and overwhelmingly approved, has somehow mutated into a mindless machine that will do them more harm than good. That is simply not the case.

Instead of believing propaganda saying the program is broken beyond the point of salvation, High Plains cotton producers have an opportunity to make their own decision and to protect themselves. Say NO to the recall petition effort. Many times information sent out has purposely misled producers with the promise of fixing problems to achieve its true objective - elimination of the High Plains' best defense against the boll weevil.

The winter of 1997 is shaping up to be one of the coldest experienced in this area in several years. Even though it will not be enough to totally eliminate the boll weevil from the best overwintering sites, it does promise to provide producers working together a chance to retake their fields and their futures in 1997. Building on the successful programs of 1995 and 1996 the High Plains can win the war against the boll weevil. The 1996 program, coupled with the cold winter temperatures felt so far, should position this area to deliver a devastating blow to boll weevil populations and further the process of pushing the boll weevil from the High Plains.

Assuming the Texas Supreme Court rules in favor of the existing program, outstanding 1996 assessments will be due and significantly increase the ability of the 1997 Program to take advantage of the cold winter temperatures currently being experienced. Fortunately there is something else that can be done to guarantee all High Plains cotton producers benefit from the current situation. 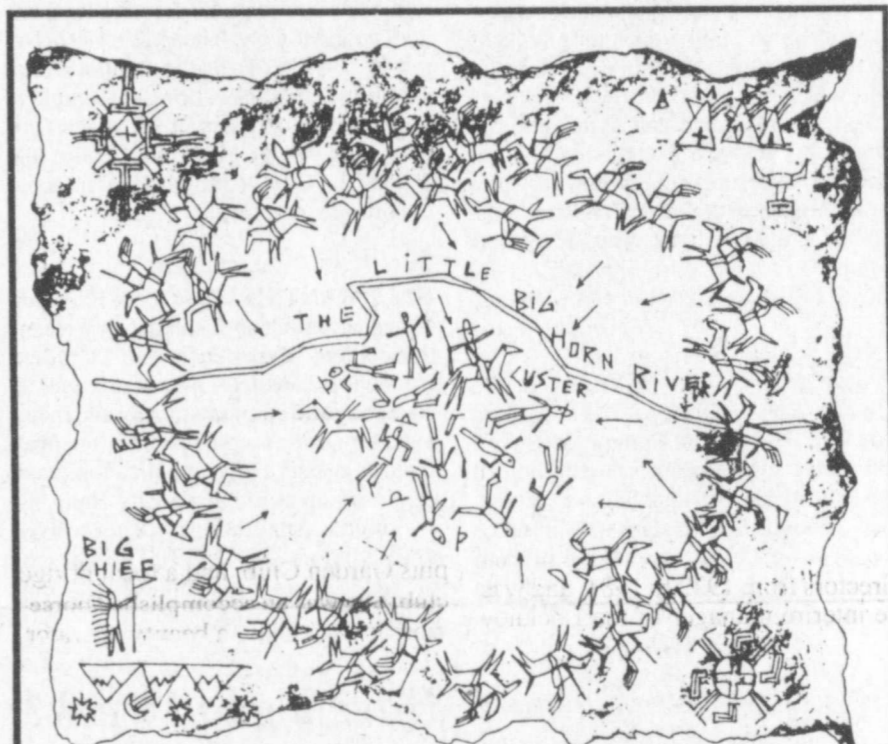

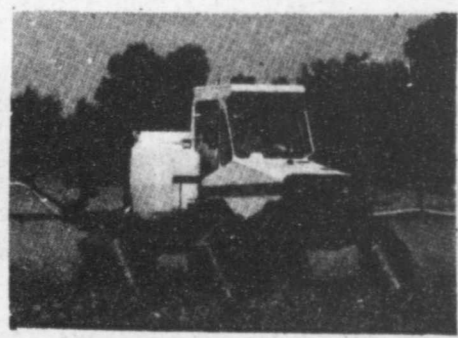
