overall increase of 3.60 percent when compared to the $13,370.59$ received
in March in March of 1996. Year to date rebates now stand at $\$ 44,483.57$, a decrease
of .53 percent over the $44,723.27$ of .53 percent over the $44,723.27$
county total at this time in 1996. Lockney displayed a decrease of 8
percent from the same period for 1996 in overall receipts. The city 's March check was in the amount of $\$ 4,043.56$
compared to $\$ 4,395.56$ received in March, 1996. Lockney has received a
total of $\$ 13,568.18$ this year, compared to $\$ 12,897.52$ in 1996. This is an overall increase of 5.19 percent.

Many old homesites, farms and ranches have unused or abandoned wells which are not properly capped or plugged. These wells serve as a
major risk to health of the water of the major risk to health of the water of the
Ogallala Aquifer and to those who draw their drinking water from the Ogalalla. It remains unclear how many un-
used or abandoned wells dot the Texas used or abandoned wells dot the Texas
landscape but estimates put the number above the terl thousand range. These wells provide a direct conduit for surface water and other contami-
nants to enter the Ogalalla Aquifer and nants to enter the Ogalalla Aquifer and
contaminate millions of gallons of precious drinking water. One contaminatly well on your property can not only ruin your drinking water but the
water of others for miles around These open abandened or unused wells also pose a physical threat to wemall children, livestock, and wildlife. Small children and animals can fall down the shaft of an open, abandoned well and result in serious injury and
even death. Everyone remembers the Baby Jessica saga in Midland. Fortunately thanks to the efforts of trained rescuers, she was safely rescued. Others are not always so lucky. Plugging of the well is the only sure way to prevent contaminants, children,
mals from entering the well. When plugging an abandoned well, the owner must meet the minimum well code requirements for well plug.

Dr. Dobson: Crude language never
does anyone any good. As a matter of fact, it's usually intended to hurt or offend. So quite apart from the sup-
posed meanings of the words--sexual or otherwise--there are very good reasons to stop using them.
ing is a sign of weakness, and that kids who use bad language are prot kads trying to cover up feelings of inferiority and fears about themselves
They're attempting to sound "tough" and to impress their friends. They may be acting this way in order to gain
acceptance with their peers. I think it's crucial to talk openly with your children about pressure to conform,
especially as they approach adolescence. They're going to encounter
more of it as the years more of it as the years go by.
After you have offered this ratio nale, you may find that your children
continue to use bad language and pro fanity. If so, I would stop explaining and take some action.

QUESTION: How can I help my child withstand the adolescent pres-
sure to conform on important matters such as drug use and sexual im-
