## Floydada retains tax rate

FLOYDADA -. City council members voted unanimously to set a 1997
ad valorem tax rate of 36 ad valorem tax rate of 36 cents per
$\$ 100$ of assessed valuation on the taxable real property in the city. This represents no increase over the rate last year, although it does represent an in-
crease from the effective tax rate recrease from the effective tax rate re-
quired to raise the same tax revenue as last year. This is due to an increase in the adjusted tax base as calculated
by the Floyd County Central Appraisal

District.

A group of Floydada citizens were on hand at the August 21 regular ses-
sion of the Floydada City Council to register protests concerning situations they are concerned about. Two sepa-
rate items were discussed. rate items were discussed.
Tommy Collins came council first to register a complaint concerning what he termed unfair treatment by a city police officer.
Collins said that he was Collins said that he was not being
treated the same as other people in treated the same as other people in
town in relation to the enforcement of the city's junk car ordinance and ordinances concerning pets.
Mayor Hulon Carthel told Collins the city would make every effort to see
that all residents are treated fairly. He instructed Interim Police Chief Darrell Gooch to check into the matter and
determine if there is any masis determine if there is any basis to the
complaint. If so, Carthel asked that Gooch try to resolve the issue to everyone's satisfaction. The second concern voiced was Leonard Street neighborhoood. Several representatives were present to ask that
the city find a way to deal with the disruption and unsafe conditions cre-
ated by a residence in the 1000 block of South Leonard Street.
Neightors say that large gatherings
of 35 to 50 poople at the residence vir of 35 to 50 people at the residence vir tually every weekend creates a nui-
sance as well as a problem with noise sance as well as a problem with noise
and traffic. Problems also occur due to the prof anity and vulgarity exhibited by those involved in the weekend
gatherings. They also voiced comgatherings. They also voiced com-
plaints about trash and open sewer plaints about trash and open sewer
lines in the yard and dogs running loose in the street. City manager Gary Brown told
complainants and the council that the city is trying to deal with the situation city is trying to deal with the situation

 Question: What can I do to helpmy middle child figure out who she

Dr. Dobson: Parents should take
