Lockney General Hospital District tax rate decreases

LOCKNEY--The Lockney Hospital District Board of Directors met Tuesday at their regular board meeting and set the tax rate for the 1997-98 fiscal year.

The effective tax rate was set at .37065 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The rate is a decrease from the 1996-97 rate of .38390 cents.

The 1997 adjusted tax base, as reported by the Floyd County Appraisal District, is \$103,562,047 an increase of \$3,572,781 over the 1996 adjusted tax base of \$99,989,266.

The effective tax rate decreased but the amount of money received by the hospital district will remain approximately the same as last year.

Total tax revenue collected by the hospital district for 1997-98 will be \$383,858.

Floydada retains tax rate

FLOYDADA -- City council members voted unanimously to set a 1997 ad valorem tax rate of 36 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation on the taxable real property in the city. This represents no increase over the rate last year, although it does represent an increase from the effective tax rate required to raise the same tax revenue as last year. This is due to an increase in the adjusted tax base as calculated by the Floyd County Central Appraisal

District.

Motion to set the tax rate came from Councilman Clar Schacht and was seconded by Councilman Albert Hill. All

voted in favor of the motion.

The council also adopted the budget for the 1997-98 fiscal year which begins October 1, 1997 and ends September 30, 1998. Three special workshop sessions during the past month hammered out the details of the budget. Motion to adopt was made by Councilman Albert Hill and seconded

by Councilman Sheldon Sue. Voting in favor were Hill, Sue, Schacht, Dale Lawson, and Eric Cornelius. Councilman Jon Nielson indicated he was opposed, but cited no reason.

In the city manager's report, Brown told the council that applications had been narrowed down to six for the police chief position. Three were being investigated by Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards and three by Floyd County Sheriff Royce Gilmore.

For a \$20.00 donation you were given \$10,000 in chips. By the end of the night my family had \$6,600


My son was excited. He said,




County High School students. "We want juniors and seniors to get interested in business. I am looking forward to doing anything I can to help young people get started in their

Lockney Police investigate shots In J.P. Court, Pct. #1 & #4, June fired in Allsups lot

LOCKNEY--Lockney Police were dispatched to Allsups, at 200 Main Street, August 24, in response to a report of shots fired in the parking lot.

According to Police Chief Jerry Edwards, "Witnesses stated a man allegedly discharged a firearm in the direction of a group of people standing near the gas pumps.

A suspect was identified and police arrested Arturo Martinez Jr., 22, of Lockney. The charges are pending on Martinez until the investigation is complete.

While investigating the incident, and as a result of this incident, police report that two men were later arrested for attempting to incite a riot.

According to police Ricardo Rosas, 19, of Plainview, and Jessie Ceniceros, 18, of Plainview, "attempted to incite other parties that may have been involved in the incident." Rosas and Ceniceros were both arrested and taken to the Floyd County Jail.

In other police activity, on August 12, Lockney Police received a report of four forged checks that had been presented to Pay-n-Save and one that had been passed at Dairy Queen. The checks totaled \$507.56.

Council hears citizen complaints

"The field has now narrowed to five," said Brown, one of Royce's has withdrawn his name from consideration after getting a job in another city as a police chief."

He indicated that he would like to see the council name a new chief by October 1. After the background investigations are complete, the selection committee will meet to decide on three finalists. Brown told the council they would then be provided with all the information gathered for review before interviews are conducted on the final three. Council members will interview and select the new chief at that

A group of Floydada citizens were on hand at the August 21 regular session of the Floydada City Council to register protests concerning situations they are concerned about. Two separate items were discussed.

Tommy Collins came before the council first to register a complaint concerning what he termed unfair treatment by a city police officer. Collins said that he was not being treated the same as other people in town in relation to the enforcement of the city's junk car ordinance and ordinances concerning pets.

Mayor Hulon Carthel told Collins the city would make every effort to see that all residents are treated fairly. He instructed Interim Police Chief Darrell Gooch to check into the matter and determine if there is any basis to the complaint. If so, Carthel asked that Gooch try to resolve the issue to everyone's satisfaction.

The second concern voiced was from a group of citizens in the South Leonard Street neighborhood. Several representatives were present to ask that the city find a way to deal with the disruption and unsafe conditions created by a residence in the 1000 block of South Leonard Street.

Neighbors say that large gatherings of 35 to 50 people at the residence virtually every weekend creates a nuisance as well as a problem with noise and traffic. Problems also occur due to the profanity and vulgarity exhibited by those involved in the weekend gatherings. They also voiced complaints about trash and open sewer lines in the yard and dogs running loose in the street.

City manager Gary Brown told complainants and the council that the city is trying to deal with the situation but has to tread lightly. He stated that in the United States, no government entity has the right to dictate what liv-

"All we can do," said Brown, "is to monitor the situation and issue citations for code violations. The residents have a specified amount of time to correct the violation or be fined. Utility services can also be cut off to residences which do not meet code.

"It may be possible to get the owner of the property to allow the city to conduct a health and safety inspection of the premises. If we can do this, we may be able to resolve the situation, by declaring the structure unsafe and a health hazard," said Brown.

Brown also commented that residents of the dwelling had been cited and fined several times in the past months for the problem with the dogs. "As long as they are willing to pay the fines and retrieve the animals, the City can only keep picking them up," he

Gail White representing Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, met with the council to present the water authorities budget for the coming fiscal year. The budget is pretty much unchanged said White. She did inform the council that the monthly payment required from the City of Floydada for the next year would drop from \$22,102.00 per month to \$22,086.00 per month.

White also told council members that the lake now stands at 80.7 feet, up about 5 feet from last year at this time. She estimated that water allotments from the lake would increase when the water level reached 85 to 90

The council granted a zoning variance to Billie Campbell for operating a one-chair beauty shop in her garage at 529 W. Virginia. Motion to grant the variance was made by Schacht and seconded by Cornelius. Voting in favor were Schacht, Cornelius, Lawson and Sue. Hill and Nielson abstained from the vote.

A discussion concerning the possibility of beginning a tax on personal property, such as cars, pickups, recreational vehicles, etc., ended in a split vote. The proposal was to levy the tax beginning with the 1999 taxing year The tax would generate revenues of about \$33,000 based on current vehicle registrations and the current tax

It was pointed out that the City of Floydada is the only taxing entity in the county that does not levy the personal property tax at this time. Councilman Lawson ventured the opinion that this type of tax is the only tax paid by people who do not own a house. "It is not a lot, but it would help ease the tax burden on the local real property owners," said Lawson.

Schacht made a motion to levy the tax in 1999. Lawson seconded after it became apparent that no other council member would. The pair were the only votes in favor of the motion. Voting against were Hill, Sue, Nielson and

City employees will be joining the county employees in long weekends for Thanksgiving and Christmas. According to Brown, the county will shut down at noon on Wednesday before both holidays and return to work on Monday following each holiday. He asked that city employees be given the Thursday holidays and the Friday after making a four day weekend for them. Employees will be on call throughout the weekend as they are at all times said Brown.

Business of the Week

Cargill Hybrid Seed, located in Aiken, opened its doors in 1928 as a joint venture between the Lockney Chamber of Commerce and Plainview Chamber of Commerce. The headquarters were known as Lockview Farms.

In the early 1930's the support from the chamber of commerce was no longer available and Anderson-Clayton assumed responsibility. The farm was renamed Paymaster Farm and busied itself with finding the best variety of cotton suitable to this region.

In 1980 the farm was sold to Cargill Hybrid Seeds, a division of Cargill, Inc. and the Paymaster name was retained. In 1987 the Paymaster brand name was replaced with Cargill Hybrid Seeds on the seed bags with the exception of cottonseed. They continued to carry the Paymaster or Lankart brands.

In 1994 the Aiken plant was purchased by Delta and Pine. The Aiken operations of Cargill were moved 3 miles north of Aiken. There they have their administra-

tion offices, sunflower and sorghum production, seed conditioning plants, a quality control lab, and research facilities for both sorghum and sun-

According to current state regulations, the district is required to adopt an operating budget for the current school year no later than August 31.

A tax rate to support the budget adopted will be discussed at a special called session on Tuesday, September 2, 1997 at the administrative offices. The meeting is an open session and the public is invited to attend.

Under the budget as adopted, the district expects to expend more than \$250,000.00 in excess of the anticipated revenues this year, based on current income estimates and past spending patterns. Approximately 80 percent of the expenses for the coming year will be paid out in salaries to district personnel. The remaining 20 percent will be needed for fixed operating costs and classroom operations.

Expenditures for the coming year are estimated at \$6,979,028.00, up from \$6,750,776.00 last year. They include: High School - \$1,440,439.00 (up from \$1,386,986.00); Junior High \$734,303.00 (up from \$669,213.00); Duncan - \$1,176,905.00 (up from \$1,038,279.00); R.C. Andrews -\$802,072.00 (up from \$754,900.00); all schools - \$271,148.00 (down from \$290,463.00); transfers - \$287,000.00 (up from \$167,000.00); transportation \$265,903.00 (up from \$250,940.00); building maintenance - \$672,646.00 (down from \$678,064.00); administrative office - \$293,640.00 (down from \$305,904.00); Chapter I Regular program - \$388,574.00 (down from \$439,103.00); Chapter I Migrant program - \$140,675.00 (down from \$196,587.00); and special education departments - \$505,723.00 (down from \$573,337.00).


Revenues estimates were placed at \$6,729,028.00 and include: local tax collections - \$1,662,831.00 (up from \$1,560,817.00 in 1996-97); state funding - \$4,511,258.00 (up from \$4,415,668.00); federal funds, Chapter I Regular - \$388,574.00 (down from \$439,103.00); federal revenue, Chapter I Migrant - \$140,675.00 (down from \$196,587.00); and \$25,690.00 from other sources (down from \$28,139.00). Total budget expenditures for the 1996-97 school year were \$6,640,314.00, indicating an estimated increase of about \$88,714.00 in the overall expenses for the 1997-98 school year.

Based on the budget as adopted, FISD will use the carry over from the 1996-97 school year to meet part of the added budget expenses, but additional funds will be needed to fund school operations for the 1997-98 school year. These funds will have to come from local tax revenues.

The tax rate needed to raise the same amount of money as last year's \$1.0985 did would be \$1.16565 per \$100 of assessed valuation. This is the



Dr. Dobson: Parents should take steps to ensure the identity of all their children, not just as members of the family--which can be accomplished in other ways--but as unique individuals. This is especially needed on behalf of middle children. Let me offer a couple of suggestions that will illustrate what I mean.

1. It is meaningful for Dad to "date" each child, one at a time, periodically. The other kids should not be told where they are going until it is revealed by the boy or girl in retrospect. They can play miniature golf, go bowling, play basketball, eat tacos or pizza, or visit a skating rink. The choice or activities should be made by the child whose turn has arrived.

2. Ask each offspring to design his or her own flag, which can be sewn in canvas or cloth. That flag is then flown in the front yard on the child's "special" days, including birthdays, after she has received an A in school, when he scores a goal in soccer or hits a homerun in baseball, and so

There are other ways to accomplish the same purpose. The target, again is to plan activities that emphasize one child's individuality apart from his identity within the group.

QUESTION: My marriage has been a very unsatisfying thing for me. I would divorce my husband if it were not for my concern for our three children. What does the research say about the impact of divorce on kids?

Dr. Dobson: It's now known that emotional development in children is directly related to the presence of warm, nurturing, sustained and continuous interaction with both parents. Anything that interferes with the vital relationship with either mother or father can have lasting consequences for the child.

One landmark study revealed that 90 percent of children from divorced homes suffered from an acute sense of shock when the separation oc- copyright secured.

curred, including profound grieving and irrational fears. Fifty percent reported feeling rejected and abandoned, and indeed half of the fathers never came to see their children three years after the divorce. One-third of the boys and girls feared abandonment by the remaining parent, and 66 percent experienced yearning for the absent parent with an intensity that researchers

described as overwhelming. Most significant, 37 percent of the children were even more unhappy and dissatisfied five years after the divorce than they had been at 18 months. In other words, time did not heal their

That's the real meaning of divorce. It is certainly what I think about, with righteous indignation, when I see infidelity and marital deceit portrayed on television as some kind of exciting game or two.

The bottom line is that you are right to consider the welfare of your children in deciding whether or not to seek a divorce. As empty as the marital relationship continues to be for you, it is likely, from what I know of your circumstances, that your kids will fare better if you choose to stick it out.







Sorghum fungus 'Ergot' is found on High Plains

LUBBOCK--Sorghum ergot, a fungal disease which attacks grain sorghum, has arrived on the Texas High Plains, one of the state's major areas of the crop's production.

Since Friday, three infestations have been identified and a fourth suspected site has been reported, said Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here.

Friday, August 15, ergot was identified in a forage sorghum field on the Crosby-Floyd County line by Ron Graves, Extension Service integrated pest management agent. On Saturday, August 16, Kaufman identified another site southwest of Lubbock. That same day, a crop consultant verified the disease in a site west of Plains in Yoakum County. A fourth site was reported Monday near Tulia, but hasn't been verified, Kaufman said.

The disease first appeared in Texas in March near Progresso, in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Dr. Thomas Isakeit, Extension Service plant pathologist at Weslaco, said the fields there apparently had been infected in late February or early March. By last month it had been identified in fields around Hillsboro and Uvalde.

Sorghum ergot produces spores which are airborne and can be quickly carried great distances by wind and rain.

"Right now it is in the honeydew tible. stage," Kaufman said of the infestations found on the High Plains. "In this stage it has sticky spores, but these spores will dry down and the next shower that comes across it will pany if those fields haven't been turn it into the airborne stage and it sprayed." will go everywhere."

Weather forecasts for the Lubbock and Amarillo areas were calling for one percent of the crop is flowering. probable thunderstorms and cooler temperatures Monday and Tuesday.

The disease reduces grain yields, damages the quality of seed and is a threat to lucrative export markets. Quarantine restrictions are imposed against it by many countries.

"This will probably not be a problem for regular commercial growers, unless they planted late," Kaufman said. "This fungus attacks (sorghum) flowers that aren't pollinated. The

commercial sorghums pollinate them-

The problem will be with growers of seed used for planting the commercial crops, he said. "They are dealing with male-sterile female lines where you have strips of pollinators in the fields with bays of female lines between them." In the middle of the bays where the pollen hasn't gotten to the flowers very well is where the major problem will be, he said.

The Texas South Plains and Panhandle has an estimated 135,000 acres in sorghum seed production and probably another 500,000 acres in commercial sorghum production, said Dr. Darrell Rosenow, sorghum breeder with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock. He said the ergot hasn't yet appeared in breeding or research plots at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Re-

search and Extension Center here. Sorghum ergot can be treated with the fungicide Tilt, under a crisis exemption granted earlier by the Texas Department of Agriculture, Kaufman

"Some seed companies have been waiting to treat, because treatment is expensive and the sorghum ergot hadn't been reported very close to us. They need to quit waiting, because it's here. If the predictions of rain and cooler weather materialize, sorghum that is flowering will be very suscep-

"It is of great concern that seed production fields be sprayed," Kaufman stressed. "Growers with seed production fields should contact their com-

He recommended that a four-ounce application of Tilt be applied when "Ground application with directed spray at the (sorghum) heads, using a mix of 15 gallons per acre works well," he said. If ground application isn't possible, he recommended aerial application using 10 gallons of mix per acre. Mix the material at half-rate and double-fly the field, applying five gallons on each pass, he said.

The limit for Tilt application is 12 ounces per acre each season to control both sorghum ergot and sorghum leaf blight, he cautioned.
