Three escape serious injury in car accident

LOCKNEY--Three women were hospitalized, after a major accident on Hwy. 70, in Lockney, Saturday afternoon, October 25.

According to Lockney Police Office Chuck Martin, ambulances were called to the accident scene at 12:02

Beth Kropp, 73, of Lockney was southbound from Shubert Street headed toward FM 378. "Kropp was crossing Hwy. 70 and did not see an eastbound red Pontiac Sunbird, driven by Meredith Leigh Miller, 18, of Plainview," said Martin.

Miller's vehicle hit Kropp's Lincoln Towne Car throwing the Towne Car several hundred feet.

Kropp was not wearing a seat belt but the air bag inflated in her vehicle. A passenger in Miller's vehicle, Christa Miller, 23, of Plainview, was

also not wearing a seat belt and was thrown into the windshield. "When I came to my senses I noticed my car was still moving," said Kropp. "I tried to find my brakes but I

Council votes to impose fee for disposal of tires at city landfill

FLOYDADA -- Fees to be imposed on people bringing old tires to the the second required reading prior to Floydada Municipal Landfill were final approval. The ordinance details discussed at the regular session of the descriptions of types of trash and rub-Floydada City Council on October 16. bish and cites penalties for improper Effective January 1, 1998, the State of Texas will no longer handle recycling tires. This will be left to private contractors and businesses.

Currently, dealers collect a disposal fee for each old tire. This is added to the cost of a new tire. The state has opted to discontinue this practice at the end of this year. After January 1, the city will collect a disposal fee for each tire brought to the landfill. This money will be used to pay the recycler who collects the tires.

Council members voted unanimously to charge \$2.00 for tires 16 inches and under, \$7.50 for tires over 16 inches, and \$10.00 for oversized tires such as tractor tires. Motion was made by Councilman Clar Schacht and seconded by Councilman Albert

City authorities unanimously agreed to designate Saturday, October 25, as Trick-or-Treat night. This has been scheduled to coincide with the annual Punkin'Day celebration and the Trunk-or-Treat festivities which take place at the end of the day. Parents are encouraged to take advantage of this safe and fun way to handle the Halloween activity.

Appointments to three city boards were made by the council during the evening session. Appointed for two year terms on the Airport Board were Cory Robertson (replacing Jim Crawford), Mark Lee, and Bill

Sonny Holmes was appointed as the tenant commissioner for the Floydada Housing Authority Board. His term will begin January 1, 1998 and end December 31, 1998.

Board reappointments to the Planning and Zoning Commission included Mike Muniz, Glenda Wilson, and Kyle Smith.

Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper was ratified as the holder of the engineering services contract for the 1996 TCDP grant program on a motion by Schacht with a second by Hill. All voted in favor.

Ordinance #803 was presented for handling or disposal of those items. Motion to approve was made by Councilman Sheldon Sue and seconded by Councilman Eric Cornelius.

The vote was unanimous in favor Hill made a motion to offer council support to the literacy program being set up by the local IMPACT organization. He suggested a contribution of \$250.00 towards costs of educational materials to be used for the program. The motion was seconded by Cornelius and approved with a unani-

Following a review of financial statements, city councilmen authorized the payment of monthly bills for September. Minutes of the regular meeting held September 18 were also approved as presented.

Council meeting night for the month of November was changed to Tuesday, November 18 due to scheduling conflicts created by other committments. The change is for the month of November only.

The council entered an executive session to discuss personnel. Upon reconvening, a motion was made to table the item until a special meeting on Tuesday, October 21.

The council then entered an executive session to consult with their attorney. No action was taken upon reconvening in regular session.

During a special called session on Tuesday, October 21, council members approved adjusting salaries in the police department upward to bring them in line with other area cities. It is hoped this will enable the city to attract qualified applicants for the patrolman position which is now vacant.

The city manager was given the goahead to hire former cityemployee Jim Green as a part-time interim director for the streets and sanitation department. He will serve in this capacity until a decision is made for a permanent employee in the position.

Council members also agreed to looking at the possibility of trading for a different track loader at the landfill.

LISD approves voluntary drug testing

special session Tuesday night and after much discussion passed a resolution to offer students and parents the opportunity for voluntary drug testing.

Members of the board have discussed ways to control drug use among school students at each of two regular board meetings and two special meetings before passing this reso-

Board members had expressed their concerns many times during the meetings. The main concerns expressed by the trustees were not to "catch and punish" the students who are using drugs but to help those students get off whatever they are using.

John Quebe stated that he had tried to keep an open mind. "I don't feel that I have heard anything to make us jump out and do mandatory testing for everyone," said Quebe. "I don't have anything against the voluntary testing what we want it to."

The times we are living in are pushing schools towards taking more responsibilities for things that should be the responsibility of the parents," commented Jim Bob Martin.

Superintendent Raymond Lusk said there is a movement for federal legislation to allow schools to drug test students, "and this is something we will watch closely."

Bernie Ford stated he had worried over this since the community meeting. "In my mind I have gone over and over all the possibilities. I think we are missing something and I'm not sure what it is."

Jesse Garza voiced the concern, "If we don't do the mandatory testing we may see a rise in drug use. It has seemed quieter since we started this." "I think we all agree with you but the board is as follows: there is nothing to keep us from com-




In 1997, more than 400 events were held in the Bailey County Coliseum, with only 19 days out of the year the building was not used.

According to the Floyd County Friends, based on figures from similar buildings in other comparable sized communities in the region, the multi-purpose life enrichment center has the potential of raising \$330,000 per year from outside visitors, which would stimulate Floyd County economy by \$2,310,000.

After the first year of the building completion, they estimated a five to ten percent usage growth per year in the number of attendees and events in the building each year for the first five

"I believe the multi-purpose/life enrichment center will not only help the local businesses but also will give Floyd County a facility to be creative and establish new events." said Long.

"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

Question: My husband drinks excessively. Aside from getting help from my family, what should I do specifically for him? How on earth am I going to get him to go to Alcoholics Anonymous or some similar treatment program? He is deep in denial, and I'm not even sure he's thinking straight right now. He couldn't make a rational decision to save his life. How am I going to get him to cooperate?

Dr. Dobson: You're right about the difficulties you face. Begging won't accomplish anything, and your husband may be dead before he admits he has a problem. Indeed, thousands die each year while denying that they are alcoholics.

That's why Al-Anon teaches family members how to confront in love. They learn how to remove the support systems that prop up the disease and permit it to thrive. They are shown how and when to impose ultimatums that force the alcoholic to admit his or her need for help. And sometimes they recommend separation until the victim is so miserable that his or her denial will no longer hold up. In essence, Al-Anon teaches its own version of the love-must-betough philosophy to family members who must implement it.

I asked Bob, a recovered alcoholic, if he was forced to attend Alcoholics Anonymous, the program that put him on the road to recovery. He answered:

"Let me put it this way. No one goes to AA just because they've nothing better to do that evening. Everyone there has been forced to attend initially. You just don't say, 'On Monday night we watched a football game and on Tuesday we went to the movies. So what will we do on Wednesday? How about going over to an AA meeting? It doesn't work that way.

"Yes, I was forced-forced by my own misery. Pauline allowed me to be miserable for my own good. It was loving duress that moved me to attend.'

Though it may sound easy to achieve, the loving confrontation that brought Bob to his senses was a delicate maneuver. I must re-emphasize that families should not attempt to implement it on their own initiative. Without the training and assistance of professional support groups, the encounter could degenerate into a hateful, vindictive name-calling battle that would serve only to solidify the drinker's position.

Al-Anon Family Groups and Alcoholics Anonymous are both listed in local phone books. Also to be

found there is a number for the National Council on Alcoholism, which can provide further guidance (call tollfree at 1-800-622-2255).

For teen-agers of an alcoholic parent there is Alateen. Teens can go there and share without their parent's permission or knowledge, and it's free.

Question: If a man and woman really love each other, won't that hold their marriage steady when the storms come?

Dr. Dobson: Not necessarily--and certainly not if you are thinking of love as a romantic feeling. Feeling wonderful about each other does not make two people compatible over the long haul.

Many couples assume the excitement of their courtship will continue for the rest of their lives. That never occurs! It is naive to expect two unique individuals to mesh together like a couple of machines and to remain exhilarated throughout life. Even gears have multiple cogs with rough edges to be honed before they

will work in concert. That honing process usually occurs in the first year or two of marriage. The foundation for all that is to follow is laid in critical months. What often happens at this time is a dramatic struggle for power in the relationship. Who will lead? Who will follow? Who will determine how the money is spent? Who will get his or her way in times of disagreement? Everything is up for grabs in the beginning, and the way these early decisions are made will set the stage for the future.





Inhalant use goes hand in hand with disciplinary problems, academic problems, learning disabilities and skipping school. The level of use of inhalants reported by students on TCADA surveys gradually declines in grades nine through twelve, partly because inhalant users may wind up dropping out.





Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. However, Wendell Wilbanks, Lubbock Area Director, USDA Cotton Division, has concern over the lowerthan-normal leaf grades he is seeing. "In the first 100,000 or so bales classed this season, we are getting a lot of 5 and 6 leaf grades that otherwise is high quality and good color," said Wilbanks

A leaf grade of 6 can decrease the value or sale price of that cotton by as much as 900 points, or 9 cents a pound, in the pricing system.

Wilbanks commented he expects associated with plant regrowth that will discontinue after a frost or freeze finally terminates the crop.

Wilbanks expressed greater concern that 30 percent of the crop classed so far can be described as "Light Spot. This is considerably higher than in past years," commented Wilbanks. "Much of it is green from the regrowth leaf grades to improve overall after area cotton is exposed to a freeze. He considers some of the problem to be now, but I am afraid we may see an increasing color and staining problem as more cotton gets classed that has been exposed to boll weevil damage."

Wilbanks has been Area Director at the Lubbock Classing Office since 1986 and has been classing cotton since 1962.

EPA DISALLOWS USE OF **FURADAN ON COTTON**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has disapproved the Section 24(c) special local need registration that allowed Texas cotton producers to use flowable carbofuran (Furadan 4F insecticide) on cotton to control aphids. Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry issued a Section 24(c) on August 15th when cotton farmers were facing potential losses of \$40 million because of the devastating aphid problems across much of Texas' cotton growing region.

EPA notified TDA October 16th in it's five-page disapproval letter stating the action of TDA in issuing a SLN registration was invalid and "procedurally defective in its issuance." The letter contained a strong warning to the Department that EPA may find it necessary to suspend Texas' authority to issue 24 (c) registrations in its entirety if the state should pursue a similar course in the

Texas Farmers Union says meat safety concerns prove need for market reform

"American livestock producers dedicated to providing consumers with the best products available are extremely frustrated by the events surrounding the Hudson Beef situation," said Mike Callicrate, a Kansas feedyard owner and chairman of the Market Reform Coalition. "The current market system virtually robs consumers of the ability to select our products in the retail marketplace."

Callicrate and other industry representatives in the coalition noted that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has so far been unable to specifically locate the source of slaughter for the tainted beef processed at the Hudson facility. Meat currently sold in the United States is not required to list the country-of-origin.

Legislative and regulatory issues continue to remain the focus of Plains Cotton Growers officials as harvesting activity picks up across the area.

Progress is being made toward final implementation of proposed changes to the Step 2 and 3 provisions of the current cotton program. The Agriculture Appropriations Bill containing the changes was sent to Presi-

dent Clinton for review and approval. Details of the proposed changes include cutting off issuance of Step 2 certificates when the Adjusted World Price exceeds 134% of the Loan and allowing issuance of Step 2 certificates when a Step 3 import quota is in effect. The window on open import quotas is closing rapidly and no new imports have been reported under these quotas during the month of Sep-


