LISD approves voluntary drug testing

| The LISD Board of Trustees met in special session Tuesday night and after much discussion passed a resolution to offer students and parents the opportunity for voluntary drug testing. Members of the board have dis- cussed ways to control drug use among school students at each of two regular board meetings and two special meetings before passing this reso- <br> lution. <br> Board members had expressed their concerns many times during the meetthe trustees were not to "catch and punish" the students who are using drugs but to help those students get off whatever they are using. <br> John Quebe stated that he had tried to keep an open mind. "I don't feel that I have heard anything to make us jump out and do mandatory testing for ev- eryone," said Quebe. "I don't have | but I don't think it will accomplish what we want it to." <br> "The times we are living in are pushing schools towards taking more responsibilities for things that should be the responsibility of the parents," commented Jim Bob Martin. <br> Superintendent Raymond Lusk said there is a movement for federal legislation to allow schools to drug test students, "and this is something we will watch closely." <br> Bernie Ford stated he had worried over this since the community meeting. "In my mind I have gone over and over all the possibilities. I think we are missing something and I'm not sure what it is." <br> Jesse Garza voiced the concern, "If we don't do the mandatory testing we may see a rise in drug use.
