Proclamation

The First National Observance of Thanksgiving

(Written in the midst of the Civil War by Abraham Lincoln)

"It is the duty of nations as well as of men to owe their dependence upon the overruling power of God. To confess their sins and transgressions in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that with genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon. And to recognize the sublime truth announced in the Holy Scriptures, and proven by all history that those nations are blessed whose God is the Lord.


"We know that by His divine law, nations like individuals are subject to punishments and chastisements in this world. May we not justify fear that the awful calamity of Civil War, which now desolates our land, may be a punishment inflicted upon us for our presumptuous sins to the needful end of our national reformation as a whole people.

"We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven. We have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity. We have grown in numbers, wealth and power as no other nation has ever grown.

"But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us, and we have vainly imagined in the deceitfulness of our hearts that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too selfsufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace-too proud to pray to the God that made us.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that God should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people.

"I do, therefore, invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our benevolent Father who dwelleth in the heavens."



'Horns still in game after Area win

The Lockney Longhorns continued their advance through the 2A State Playoffs with a hard fought 38-21 victory over the White Deer Bucks, Friday night, at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium in Canyon. It was an area round contest full of big plays, momentum changes, and exciting action from start to finish.

While the Longhorns did not play their most impressive game of the year, the effort was enough to earn them a Thanksgiving weekend matchup with the Winters Blizzards. The regional semi-final game will be played Friday night, November 28, in Snyder.

Winters has defeated Stamford, 13-12, and defending State Champion Iraan, 24-3, in play-off action this year. Winters record is 10-1.

After both teams were held scoreless, on their opening offensive possessions of the game, the Horns opened scoring at the 4:48 mark of the first quarter with a 19 yard run and touchdown by Devon Phillips. Thad Lusk's conversion kick made it 7-0.

The Longhorns defense set up the Horns next score of the game. Following a White Deer touchdown, which was nullified by an illegal block, Carson Johnson intercepted a Jeremy Cook pass and returned it to near mid

Six plays later the Longhorns were nullified the score and kept the Bucks

in the end zone again as a 35 yard pass from Adam Cummings to J.R. Walker set up Walker's 3 yard run on an option pitch around left end. But the Bucks fought back as Craig Urbanczyk ended a 58 yard drive with a touchdown run of 6 yards on 4th and goal. The extra point was good and

the score stood at 13-7. But it remained 13-7 for only one play. On the ensuing kickoff, Phillips broke tackles and used several crunching blocks by his teammates on his way to an 87 yard touch down return. The 2 point conversion failed and Lockney's lead remained 19-7.

Following a kick-off coverage tackle deep in White Deer territory by Lockney's Jordan Lambert, the Horns Ryon Smith stripped the ball from QB Crook and pounced on the pigskin at the White Deer 26 yard line. The Longhorns moved inside the 5 yard line before a fumble turned the ball back to White Deer. But a Smith sack led a defensive effort that forced a punt by the Bucks with a little over 2 minutes remaining in the half.

Running the 2 minute drill to perfection the Horns used all but 10 seconds of the clock before a Phillips 9 yard run gave the Horns a 25-7 half-

Both defenses settled down in the third quarter. Lockney did manage a touchdown but a block in the back

West returned a blocked punt 23 yards from a score with 6:17 left in the third quarter. Crook's pass to Andy Phillips brought the score to 25-15. The wildly exciting 4th quarter

scoring began with 6 minutes left when Walker sprinted 77 yards down the west sideline, from his position in the Longhorns wishbone attack, and left the Buck defenders in his wake. Lusk's kick raised the score to 32-15.

But White Deer stormed back going 90 yards before Urbanczyk galloped into the end zone from 11 yards out. The extra point failed but the Bucks had cut the Longhorns lead to 11 points, at 32-21.

After an unsuccessful onside kick. Phillips ended scoring with a 49 yard run on the first play of the drive.

With the score at 38-21, the neversay-die Bucks marched deep into Lockney's territory again. But a Willie Luna deflection of a Crook pass which was intercepted by teammate Phillips salted away the victory.

Lockney raised its record to 11 and as the 3AA Champions won their 11th game in a row following an opening night loss. The Bucks of District 2AA finish at 10-2. The Longhorns are now one of only 16 teams in the state remaining alive in the AA play-

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

Council approves bids on water project

Continued From Page 1 Service, Inc. for \$289,461.00.

The final water improvement bid awarded was for waterline adjustments under the state highway through Floydada. All waterlines under the highway will be lowered and cased in pipe which will allow repair work without disturbing the highway after it is rebuilt. This bid went to Rhode Construction for \$227,132.50.

\$500,000 of the funding necessary for this project is slated to come from grant already in the works said City Manager Gary Brown.

Along with approving the bids, council members authorized signatures of the mayor, city manager and city secretary as those who will sign checks and request release of funds upon completion of each phase of the

A procedure for local citizen complaints was also established in relation to the waterline relocation under the highway. Water Superintendent Bobby Welborn was authorized to act as the contact person concerning such complaints.

It was pointed out that Welborn will be the person to whom complaints concerning problems incurred by local residents as the waterline adjustments take place will be forwarded. Any complaints regarding the actual rebuilding of the highway will need to be addressed to Mike Anderson at the Texas Highway Department said

Brown reported to the council that several problems have been discovered in the water tower behind City Hall. These need to be fixed as soon as possible in order to maintain the integrity of the water delivery system in Floydada said Brown. Improper welds and deficiencies in the original construction of the tower are at fault according to the city manager and need to be fixed now or risk losing the use of the tower altogether in the next couple of years.

Brown was authorized to proceed with the necessary repairs as an emergency measure.

Action on the WTMPA project and assuming a partial ownership was postponed at this time. The council did pass a resolution of support for the project. Brown assured the council that expressing support for the project did not obligate the city to take an active part in the project. He also said that the decision to play a role could be made until construction begins

Water district applies for permit

filed an application with the Texas Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Natural Resource Conservation Commission in Austin for a state permit to conduct a precipitation enhancement program within a specified target and operational area for the years 1998-

The Water District contracted with Weather Modification Inc. (WMI) of Fargo, North Dakota to conduct a precipitation enhancement program within the 15-county Water District service area and southeastern New Mexico from May 30 to September 30, 1997. During this time, WMI personnel flew 86 missions in which 1,514 silver iodide flares were dropped into developing thunderstorms to increase rainfall.

Following the first year of the program, Water District officials felt it would be in the taxpayers' best interest if the District applied for its own weather modification permit.

"Under our current contract, WMI is the sole contractor who holds the license and permit for the precipitation enhancement program," said Water District Manager A. Wayne bock, Texas 79405-1499, (806)762-Wyatt. "If they were to increase their 0181. fees substantially, the Water District would have no choice but to pay or cancel the program. 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


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

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 submitted an application for a Texas weather modification license on November 6,

The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall. The period of the permit is for January 1 through December 31 in each of the years of 1998, 1999, 2000, and 2001.

The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, a political subdivision of the State, 2930 Avenue Q, Lubbock,

The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area including Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Terry, and Yoakum Counties, which is the target area and those portions of the following counties within 30 mile of ~the outer boundary of the target area: Gaines, Dawson, Borden, Garza, Dickens, Motley, Moore, Briscoe, Swishier, Hartley, Carson, and Kent Counties and Quay, Roosevelt, Curry, and Lea Counties in New Mexico.

The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as the southwestern part of Armstrong County and all of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Terry, and Yoakum Counties.

The methods and material to be used in conducting this operation are summarized here: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuloform clouds or other appropriate clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecasting techniques, surface weather observations, and pilot reports to initiate the release of the seeding particles, such silver iodide crystals, from airplanes equipped with flare racks and/or generators.

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

What History Can Teach Us About Thanksgiving and Giving Thanks

Even such an eminent historian as Samuel Eliot Morison apparently misunderstood the truth about Thanksgiving and the Plymouth Colony, if we are to believe his account of it in The Oxford History of the American People. Morison writes: "Several times the colony was at the point of starvation; it would have perished but for food bought trom a Virginia shipmaster who was fishing off

But Sir Antony Fisher ot Eton and Cambridge looks at Thanksgiving and the Plymouth Colony quite differently. Using materials recorded by William Bradford, one of Plymouth's first settlers and its second governor, Fisher makes a strong case that the Plymouth Colony, as we now know it, "marked the first 'socialist' experiment in America" that failed completely "within three years when the settlers discovered that, for their very survival, they had to turn to what we now know as the free-market system.

Bradtord's Of Plimoth Plantation offers a written record of what happened when the effect of the Mayflower Compact became fully known. Under the terms of the agreement, everything produced went into a common storehouse. Common ownership, according to Bradford's journal, "... was found to breed much confusion and discontent. The strong . . . had no more in devision of victials and cloaths than he that was weake."

The effects were immediate and severe; 'from the desperate first winter of 1620-1621 until the hungry spring of 1623," there was no Thanksgiving as we know it until radical changes were made in the way the Plymouth Colony was

"So they begane to thinke how they might raise as much corne as they could," Bradford writes. "At last, after much debate of things . . . (they) assigned to every family a parcell of land....This had very good success for it made all hands very industrious."

After the success of this "privatization," Bradford again documented the error of their earlier decisions: "that the taking away of propertie and bringing in communitie into a commone wealth would make them happy and flourishing; as if they were wiser than God."

According to Fisher, the first true Thanksgiving feast actually took place in 1623, three years after the frigid first landing in December of 1620, and only after the colonists learned their invaluable lesson of allowing individuals to enjoy the direct and indirect benefits of their own labor.

"FOCUS ON THE FAMILY" with Dr. James Dobson

Question: My wife has been severely depressed for nearly three months. What kind of treatment or therapy would you recommend for her?

Dr. Dobson: Get her to a physician, perhaps an internist, as soon as possible. This kind of prolonged depression can have serious medical and psychological consequences, yet it is usually very responsive to treatment. Anti-depressant drugs are effective in controlling most cases of depression. She could also be entering menopause and may need estrogen replacement therapy or some other hormone treatment.

Of course, medication will not correct an emotional problem, if that is what underlies her depression. She may need to talk to a psychologist or psychiatrist after you have approached the problem from a medical perspective. The important thing is to get going. Depression should not be permitted to continue unchecked.


"trapped" feeling that causes their spouses. I think that applies to my wife, who has been strangely distant from me in recent years. Can you tell me more about what such a person might be thinking?

Dr. Dobson: The feeling of entrapment begins with disrespect for a partner. For example, a man may think these kinds of thoughts about his wife:

"Look at Joan. She used to be rather pretty. Now with those 15 extra pounds, she doesn't even attract me anymore. Her lack of discipline bothers me in other areas, too--the house is always a mess and she seems totally disorganized. I made an enormous mistake back there in my youth when I decided to marry her. Now I have to spend the rest of my life, all the years I have left-can you believe it?--tied up with someone I'm not interested in. Oh, I know Joanie is a good woman, and I wouldn't hurt her for anything, but man! Is this what they call living?"

Or Joanie may be doing some thinking of her own:

"Michael, Michael, how different you are from what I first thought you to be. You seemed so exciting and energetic in those early days. How did you get to be such a bore? You work far too much and are so tired when you come home. I can't even get you to talk to me, much less sweep me into ecstasy.

"Look at him, sleeping on the couch with his mouth hanging open. I wish his hair wasn't falling out. Am I really going to invest my entire lifetime in this aging man? Our friends don't respect him anymore, and he hasn't received a promotion at the plant for more than five years. He's going nowhere, and he's taking me with him!"

If Joanie and Michael are both thinking these entrapment thoughts, it is obvious that their future together is in serious jeopardy. But the typical situation is unilateral, as in your mar-Question: You described the riage. One partner begins to chafe at the bit without revealing to the other some people to withdraw from how his or her attitude has changed. A reasonably compassionate person simply does not disclose these disturbing rumblings to someone who loves him or her. Instead, a person's behavior begins to evolve in inexplicable ways.

He may increase the frequency of his evening business meetings--anything to be away from home more often. He may become irritable or 'deep in thought" or otherwise noncommunicative. He may retreat into televised sports or fishing trips or poker with the boys. He may provoke continual fights over insignificant issues. And, of course, he may move out to find someone younger to play with. A woman who feels trapped will reveal her disenchantment in

similar indirect ways. To summarize, the trapped feeling is a consequence of two factors: disrespect for the spouse and the wish for an excuse to get away.


