Buffaloes stop the Longhorn's stampede

Time finally ran out on the Lockney Longhorns in their journey through the class 2A state playoffs. Stanton withstood a furious 4th quarter Longhorn rally and held on to a 21-20 victory in a quarter-final matchup at Abilene's Shotwell stadium.

The Horns took the opening kickoff and marched deep into Buffalo territory. But a fumble inside the 10 yard line turned the ball over to Stanton and the Buffs quickly took advantage by marching their first touchdown of the game and with 6:21 to go took a 7-0

Lockney answered quickly with a touchdown to pull within 7-6. A Calvin Collins kickoff return set the Longhorns at their own 41 yard line. Nine plays and 59 yards later, Devon Phillips took an option pitch from QB Adam Cummings, dashed 4 yards into the end zone. The key play on the drive was a 38 yard pass from Cummings to J.R. Walker on 3rd and 20 which moved the ball inside the 10 yard line.

Stanton took control of the second quarter and with two more touchdowns increased its lead to 21-6. A late-quarter Horn drive fell short deep

in Buffalo territory as time ran out to send the teams to the halftime dressing room with the Horns down by 15 points.

Stanton took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove deep into Longhorn territory again. But the Lockney defense stiffened and forced an incomplete pass in the end zone on 4th and goal. Both defenses held tough in the remainder of the quarter and the score remained 21-6 entering the final quarter.

But the gallant, never-say-die-Black attack fought back. A fumble recovery by the Longhorns Miguel Guerrero following a hard hit by Devon Phillips gave the ball back to the Longhorns. Although the ensuing drive stalled, the momentum had shifted and the Longhorns explosive offense drew the team to within a touchdown following a Stanton punt. With just over 6 minutes remaining, Cummings fired a bullet to J.R. Walker and the senior wide receiver outraced the defenders to the end zone to complete the 80 yard play. Thad Lusk caught Cummings two-point conversion pass and the score was 21-





My husband went to Gretchen and I went to see about the occupants of the pickup. They both seemed to be all right and managed to climb out of the pickup from the passenger side. We brought everyone into the house and made sure no one was severely in-

The driver of the pickup did not stop at the stop sign and hit Gretchen on the passenger side back quarter panel. Gretchen was wearing her seat belt, which may have saved her from any serious injuries. The pickup hit her with enough impact that her airbag deployed. Gretchen was upset about the damage done to her car, but the

One week after the accident, Gretchen called me in tears saying she had almost been hit again at our intersection. She noticed a pickup truck were somewhat relieved when she traveling east toward the stop sign. Being concerned that the pickup truck might not stop, she came to a complete stop, even though she had the right of way. The pickup truck did slow down, but did not come to a complete stop and went on through the intersection.

A few days later, my son was pulling out of our driveway one morning jured. Luckily, all three seemed to be on his way to school, and a different pickup truck traveling east ran the stop sign in front of him.

The very next day, I was coming home from work and was almost hit by a motorist who had to slam on their brakes and skid into the intersection because they were not going to stop. I am sending out a plea to all the motorists that travel east/west on FM 2286. Stop means STOP!

When you are traveling east/west on FM 2286, please stop every time you come to that intersection. Several motorists have commented to me that they usually stop, but they need to think about how they would feel if they were to cause a fatal wreck at this intersection by usually stopping.

In 1967, seven people were killed at this intersection. I just hope history does not repeat itself.





wearing a battle dress uniform instead of the UN uniform he was taken up the chain of command and ultimately court martialed.

New states in the video that he volunteered to be transferred to another unit but it was the Army's decision to make an example of New and to pursue disciplinary bad conduct dis-

According to the tape an Iraq diplomat is the senior UN official in the

"I'm not going to fight for a foreign country that does not have our ideals at heart. That is disrespectful to all veterans who have died for this county."

According to Daniel New the military court would only consider if Michael did or did not obey an order. "Of course he disobeyed an order.

However we believe that order to have been unlawful. "There is no legal basis for forcing an American to serve as a mercenary under a foreign power. The U.N. by

definition is a foreign power." "If we don't stop this trend," said New, "it is inevitable that the day will come when our sons and daughters will be drafted to serve in the United Nations.

"The question is not whether one soldier can be forced to wear an illegal uniform, but whether the President of the United States can be forced to obey the Constitution of the United

The News believe the Army's position concerning Michael New was not based on law but "driven by raw political power, constitutional manipulation and sheer intimidation."

Daniel New also spoke to the gathering about the American Constitution Party, the state affiliate of the U.S. Taxpayer's Party.



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Tree packages offered for habitat Floyd County Farm News

Managing land for wildlife is gaining interest with Texas landowners. And whether it's deer in central Texas or quail and pheasant on the Plains, wildlife seedling packets produced by the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery in Lubbock are available to assist landowners in creating habitat.

Now is the time for landowners in Floyd County to order wildlife packets from the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) before preferred species are sold out, says Ray Cragar, Texas Forest Service

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been growing high-quality, adaptable seedlings for two-thirds of the state aromatic sumac and mulberry to be planted as conservation windbreaks and wildlife habitat.

Four wildlife packets are available: Quail/Pheasant, Deer, Turkey and Squirrel. Each packet contains 100 bare-root deciduous trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of their labeled species. The packets include the following species:

· Quail/Pheasant: Russian olive, aromatic sumac, nanking cherry and

· Deer: shumard oak, flameleaf Since 1978, West Texas Nursery has sumac, bur oak and fourwing saltbush · Turkey: hackberry, shumard oak,

· Squirrel: little walnut, shumard oak, osage orange and bur oak

Texas Forest Service recommends planting wildlife packets in blocks on grassland, at right angles on dry corners, in "motts" along playas, or parallel to irrigated crop land.

For example, on a dry corner five wildlife packets can be used to produce a four-row, right-angle wildlife planting. The outside angle, that farthest from the circular cropland, would contain 1,250 feet (625 feet on each "leg") of plum trees; the second angle, Russian olive; the third inside angle, aromatic sumac; and the fourth angle, that closest to the circular crop ground, nanking cherry.

For best results, Cragar recommends 10- to 25-foot spacing between each deciduous tree within a tree row: 6-foot spacing between each shrub with a shrub row; and 20-foot spacing between each row of trees.

The proposed United Nations Climate Change Treaty has the potential of devastating the United States agricultural industry, according to Monty Teeter, president of Floyd County Farm Bureau.

"Few issues have galvanized agriculture like this one has," Teeter said, adding that several agricultural groups, led by the American Farm Bureau Federation, have launched 'FACT: Farmers Against the Climate Treaty.'

Citing an analysis by AFBF economists, the climate treaty, as it now stands, would cause at least a 24 percent loss in net farm income. That projection, he explained, assumes the imposition of a 25-cent tax on fuels to bring the U.S. in compliance with the treaty's goals for greenhouse gas emissions. An industry estimate of a 50cent per gallon tax increase is more likely, which would cause a 50 percent plunge in net farm income.

Economic impacts of this magnitude will hurt smaller, family farms the most," Teeter said. "Younger farmers, with proportionately higher debt, could be forced to sell to large-scale

ardized and land values could fall. The potential harm in store for the agricultural sector from the proposed treaty should signal "a wake up call" for America's rural population. Given farmers and ranchers intensive use of fuel and energy, devastating economic consequences are in store for rural families if this treaty is signed and ratified.'

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
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1998 Caprock Cotton Conference to be held **January 20 at Plains Baptist Assembly**

Another step towards evicting the boll weevil from High Plains cotton fields has been taken with the proposed formation of a Permian Basin Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

According to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., cotton producers from counties located in the southern region of the Southern High Plains/Caprock Boll Weevil Eradication Zone petitioned Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry requesting further reorganization of the Southern High Plains/Caprock Zone. The result is the proposed formation of the Permian Basin Zone.

This proposed rule follows the recent move by TDA to reorganize the Southern High Plains/Caprock Eradication Zone through the creation of the Southern High Plains Zone from land located in the counties of Andrews, Gaines, Lynn, Terry and

The proposed rule establishing the Permian Basin Zone was published in the Texas Register December 5 and will be subject to a 30 day comment period prior to implementation.

Boundaries for the proposed Permian Basin Zone contained in the Texas Register notice are as follows:

> How many times have you seen the word "FREE" in advertising or been approached with a 'free' offer? If receipt of the "free" merchandise or service is conditional on a purchase, the advertiser must disclose this condition clearly and conspicuously together

with the "free" offer (NOT by placing an asterisk or symbol next to "free" and referring to the condition(s) in a footnote); the normal price of the

merchandise or service to be purchased must not have been increased nor its quantity or quality reduced; and the "free" offer must be temporary; otherwise, it would become a continuous combination offer, no part of which is free. An unconditional gift has absolutely no strings attached -

you don't have to make a phone call, you don't have to pay money, you don't have to listen to a sales presentation - there is no obligation on your part. And, remember, your time is worth something! If you have been approached with a "free" offer, give you BBB a call to check it out.


