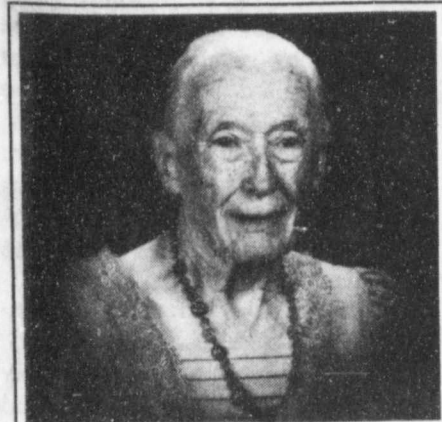

## Mary Lou Bollman dies from accident in home County historian dies

Mary Louise Hammonds Bollman, a Lockney native known mostly for her genealogy research in Floyd County, died at home Thursday Feb. 5, 1998, from burns she received in an accident at her home in Lockney. She was 88 years old.

Funeral services for Bollman were at 3:00 p.m., Monday, February 9, 1998, at the First United Methodist Church in Lockney. Rev. Tommie Beck, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, officiated. Burial was in the Lockney Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home in Lockney.

Mrs. Bollman was found dead at home on Friday, Feb. 6, 1998, at 11:50 a.m., by a family friend.

According to Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards, "We have compiled statements from people who talked to her the day before and we believe Mrs. Bollman died after 10:25 a.m. Thursday, and before 4:40 p.m. Thursday."

According to family members Mrs. Bollman had just had a new gas stove top installed. The stove had an electronic spark that would light the stove.

"We know the Energas man talked to Mrs. Bollman at 10:25 a.m. when he installed the stove," said Edwards. "It appears that at some point after he left she attempted to start the stove and somehow her robe caught on fire. The evidence seems to suggest she was able to put the fire out in her bathtub but evidently was burned pretty bad. She was found laying in the living room floor where she succumbed to the burns."

According to the preliminary autopsy reports Mrs. Bollman died from "inhalation of products of combustion and soot", and burns to "80% of her body". The report also states the condition of her heart was also a contributing factor.

"There was no evidence of foul play," said Edwards.

Mrs. Bollman was born September 9, 1909 in Lockney to the late James William Hammonds and Nancy Rebecca Farnsworth Hammonds, where she remained as a life long resident. She graduated from Lockney High School in 1929. She then went on to graduate from Texas Womans University (now Texas Wesleyan University) in Fort Worth in 1934 with a degree in Home Economics. She married Henry A. Bollman on December 16, 1939 in Floydada. He preceded her in death on February 13, 1981. She is also preceded in death by a daughter, Nancy Graham, on November 11, 1992. Mrs. Bollman was named "Lockney's Women of the Year" in 1986 and "Floyd County Pioneer Woman" at the Floyd County Pioneer Reunion Day celebration in 1989. She was a Charter Member of the Buffalo Grass Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. Bollman was a homemaker, a mother of four and a dedicated volunteer.

Mrs. Bollman was an institution of sorts in Floyd County. She had a love for history and was an avid genealogist making her a valuable resource in the community. Mrs. Bollman went all over Texas and the country doing genealogical work for the Floyd County Historical Museum and anyone who might request her assistance. It is said of Mrs. Bollman's extensive work that if she was able to help you find the resting place of a deceased relative or find any information about unknown family history then she felt amply repaid for her time, labor, expenses and research. She spent several hours mapping the Lockney Cemetery to identify unmarked graves after cemetery records for the older part of the cemetery were lost in a fire. She also identified all of the unmarked graves in the South Plains area.

Mrs. Bollman took a personal interest in local archeological digs at Blanco Canyon. Even up until a dig just last month, she would go on site to collect information and offer any help and information she could. Mrs. Bollman was a member of several Genealogical Societies throughout the state.

Mrs. Bollman's historical and genealogical work became so well known that in February of 1991 Bob Phillips, the "Texas Country Reporter," featured her and her work on his program. He titled the program "The Cemetery Lady" and focused on her cemetery, genealogical and his-

torical work.

Mrs. Bollman was an avid supporter of the Floyd County Historical Museum and a member of the board of directors. She was very aware of the need to search out and record historical facts and constantly did research and assembled information for the museum. In 1989, The Floyd County Historical Museum created "The Mary Lou Bollman History and Genealogy Center" in honor of Mrs. Bollman, her knowledge of genealogy and her dedicated efforts in research of historical facts.

While in college, Mrs. Bollman became very involved with quilting. In 1930 she made her first quilt, an eight points star set together with blue fabric. Since then quilts and quilting became a life long interest, winning recognition at local quilt shows and exhibits. In 1985, at the age of 76, Mrs. Bollman's interest in quilting, took her traveling on hundreds of miles of West Texas Roads to attend various Quilt Day activities during the "Texas Quilt Search." She was an active member in three quilting guilds: Lubbock, Lockney and Plainview.

Mrs. Bollman was an amazing woman who, in her journeys, became an ambassador for Lockney and Floyd County. In 1986, Mrs. Bollman, at the age of 77, followed the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train. Over a two month period, she visited the wagon train more than fifteen times, sometimes sleeping in her car so that she could get an early start the next day. She was present as the Wagon Train came to the end of the trail at the Fort Worth Stock Yards to cheer them on and congratulate them. Mrs. Bollman was also a Floyd County representative to many other local, county and state functions and celebrations over the years. A fellow member of the Floyd County Historical Museum said of Mrs. Bollman, "She was a respected genealogist and historian, a generous benefactor of worthy causes, a loving member of her family, friends and community and she will be greatly missed."

She is survived by two sons, Wiley Bollman of Lubbock and Bill Bollman of Katy; one daughter, Louise Burton of Claymont, Delaware; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

The family suggest memorials be made to the Floyd County Historical Museum's Mary Lou Bollman Genealogy and Historical Center at 105 E. Missouri, Floydada, Texas 79235.

## County Commissioners to help fund new district court position

During a regular session of the Commissioners Court on Monday, February 9, Floyd County Commissioners addressed updating the personnel policy and considered a resolution for the employment of a district court coordinator.

A resolution agreeing to the employment of a 110th District Court Coordinator to be 75 percent funded by grant money and 25 percent funded by the four counties in the district. The total package is more than \$32,000.00. This includes a salary of \$22,000.00 per year plus benefits, computer software, internet/e-mail expense, training and travel. Floyd County will pay an annual amount of \$4,773.93 towards the salary for the duration of the grant. Since the position will begin in the middle of a county budget

year, the first year cost to Floyd County will be \$2,042.66.

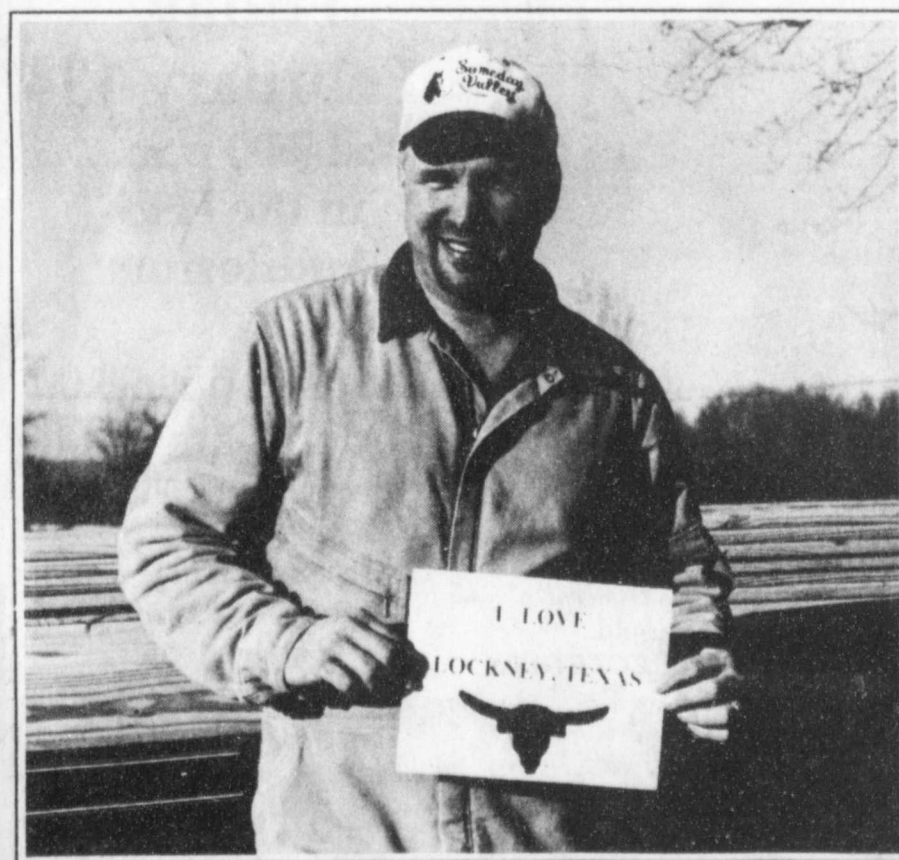
Motion to approve the resolution was made by Judge Bill Hardin and seconded by Precinct 3 Commissioner George Taylor. Voting in favor were Hardin, Taylor, Precinct 1 Commissioner RayNell Bearden and Precinct 4 Commissioner Jon Jones.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy voted against the motion stating that he felt the local taxpayers should not have to fund 55 percent (Floyd County's share of district court expenses based on population of the four counties in the district) of the 25 percent to add a position in the district court staff. He also indicated that when the grant is no longer available, the four counties will be asked to pay the full salary for the position at the taxpayers expense.

Commissioners added a section detailing county policy for employees who might be HIV positive or have AIDS. Judge Bill Hardin stated that the county did not have anyone employed at this time who would come under the policy, but indicated that it is a prudent measure to be prepared for the possibility should it arise.

Calculating the weekly work period of county employees under the Road and Bridge Department only was altered. At the request of Precinct 2 and Precinct 4 Commissioners, the road workers will begin their week on Mondays at 12:01 a.m. and end the week at 12:00 midnight on Sunday.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy stated that this would make it easier to schedule the workers if the weather was bad and they had to work on Saturday or

## Volunteers build motel at encampment

The dawn is chilly as the brilliant sun rises, spreading its warmth across the land. Three magnificent crosses overlook a sleeping community. The peaceful silence is broken as an array of people stir to begin another day of work. Although this may seem like an average job scenario in Floyd County, the workers are unlike most in that they volunteer their time to the Plains Baptist Assembly in Floydada.

The Plains Baptist Assembly will be the site of a new Conference/Worship, Motel/Dormitory facility constructed completely by volunteers. In a recent interview, Stephen Dean, director of the Plains Baptist Assembly said, "We couldn't be more excited about it."

Mr. and Mrs. Bill Arrant, Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Burriss, Mr. and Mrs. Lovell Jackson, Mr. and Mrs. Buck Welty and Ed Musser, have devoted an enormous amount of service in the initial stages of the building's construction. Presently, these volunteers are constructing 28 new RV spaces and making preparations to house a larger group of mostly retired volunteers known as the Texas Baptist Men's Camp-builders.

The Texas Baptist Men's Camp-builders have traveled almost everywhere in the United States (mainly in

Texas) and as far as Japan, helping build camps where they are needed. They are scheduled to arrive at the Plains Baptist Assembly later in April.

According to Dean, "Most camps could not get by without them."

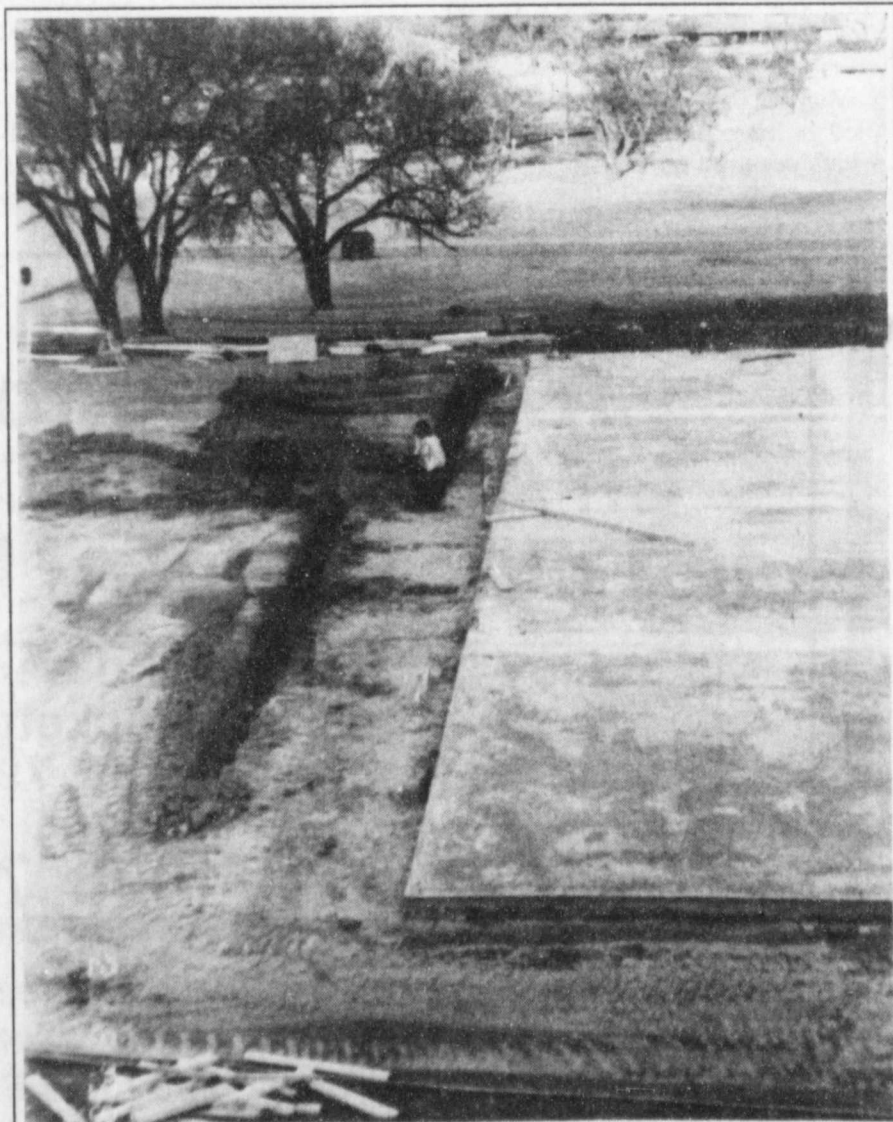
The new facility will be a 12,000-square-foot metal building complete with brick veneer and finished wood interior. The wood comes direct from a sawmill in Livingston and is delivered by Scott Graham of Graham Trucking in Floydada. The nine volunteers currently working at the Baptist assembly will be responsible for completing the woodwork in the building.

The facility will provide 10 more hotel rooms, dormitory lodging for 98 people, eight separate conference areas and a worship center for up to 250 people.

"We are not trying to get bigger, we're trying to get better," exclaimed Dean.

"The expected cost of the building is \$350,000. If we did not have these volunteers now and the others coming later, then the building construction with labor would be an estimated \$500,000," Dean said. "Our goal is to raise \$450,000. The rest of the funds will be used for the enhancement of the assembly."

The funds for the improvements will be used toward better lighting, heating, and air conditioning in the existing Worship Center. Additionally, a ropes/challenge course as well as

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I recently got a news release from the American Family Association in Texas (AFA).

They were letting people know of their success, after 6 months of work, at getting the Texas Permanent School Fund to dump all its stock in the Walt Disney Corporation--worth \$30 million dollars.

The news release said, "The action follows a statewide effort led by AFA aimed at divesting all state agencies, including the Permanent School Fund (which is managed by the State Board of Education), of all Disney Stock.

"In testimony presented to the SBOE in July of last year, Wyatt Roberts, executive director of AFA/Texas, read lyrics from groups produced by Disney's music label, Hollywood

Records, which advocate everything from suicide to setting people on fire."

Will Davis (D-Austin), chairman of the SBOE Finance Committee said, "Wyatt Roberts presented us some very compelling evidence that Disney is not the family channel people think they are. And it is very disgusting to me that somebody like Disney that was founded by Walt Disney and made all the money on families and children have now a very smutty subsidiary that is putting out very smutty music."

Roberts also cited a new state law which will go into effect in September which prohibits state agencies from investing in companies that produce music that glamorizes violence against women, assault of police officers or gang activity.

Roberts said he and his group intend to make sure the law is upheld in other state agencies.

According to the release, other Texas agencies and entities which invest in Disney include: "the Teachers Retirement System and Texas Employment Retirement System, whose stock portfolios include \$212 million and \$78 million of Disney stock, respectively."

"Disney is the corporate equivalent of Jekyll and Hyde," Roberts said. "The Disney corporation is doing some very nasty things through their lesser-known subsidiaries. Once people understand that, they become very reluctant to associate themselves with Disney."

The saving grace of politics, if there is one, is that the fat lady never sings. The process is never over. There's always another day, a day to repair the damage.

In our own view there will come a day when much damage to our Republic will have to be repaired. In a strange, contorted sort of way, the recent election may make that task not only possible, but probable. In short, it may have been a blessing in disguise.

At the moment, there is room for a degree of joy, and sorrow, all across the political spectrum. Those of us on the right can rejoice in that we kept the House of Representatives, and the Senate, that we did reasonably well across the nation and particularly well here in Texas. The Left can rejoice in that it is still alive, even if barely, and that it has found a political leader so perfectly adapted to the times we live in.

Bill Clinton will be our President for the next four years, or as long as he can escape the manifold scandals that surround his administration. We will have to gird our loins and put up with him (and Hillary). Adding insult to injury, we will also have to tolerate the blank blathering of Al Gore, as he prepares for his own run for the presidency, while explaining away the Asian connection. Surely it should not be too difficult for Mr. Gore, considering the tutelage he has had in his present position, to explain to us how it is not all that unusual for Buddhist monks and nuns, sworn to poverty, to have thousands of dollars hidden away

for use in dire emergencies, or how Indonesian businessmen and Hong Kong bankers might consider it their patriotic duty (when asked) to become financially involved in American elections, despite our laws to the contrary.

So, one could reasonably ask, how can this possibly be a blessing in disguise? Perhaps it won't be, but we will try to explain how it could be.

For as long as most of us can remember America's children have been taught to keep their nose clean, to answer the call to duty, to be truthful, to be honest, to work hard, and perhaps some day, by virtue of following those rules, be rewarded with an office of public trust. It was the cultural glue that held us together. Certainly the public would never reward anyone who did not measure up to those simple principles. Or, so we were taught.

But then strange things happen. The public was hit with revelations indicating that people who had not followed those rules, who had not been truthful, who had not answered the call to duty in their country's hour of need, who had not followed those simple verities that normally lead to public trust, had done very well indeed. Some had even risen to great heights. Not because they publicly repudiated those rules, but because they were successful in obscuring their role in avoiding those rules. A goodly portion of the electorate was somewhat shocked, and even a little outraged, as things like the House banking scandal, and the House Post Office scandal, came to light.

Then the process of weeding began. Sensing, finally, that many of the problems were the result of decades of arrogant, entrenched one-party rule, the electorate sent in a new congressional team in 1994, one of which was our own Mac Thornberry. By and large, they kept that team in place during this election. And therein lies

the tale. Therein, we believe, is the reason this presidential election may turn out to be a blessing in disguise.

Jefferson, the author of our Declaration of Independence, and one of this nation's Founding Fathers, observed that "the tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants..." Were he alive today, and if he had uttered those same thoughts, he probably would be charged with high treason, or at least ridden out of town on a rail for being politically incorrect.

We hasten to say we are not calling for a bloody revolution. But our society benefits in the long run when it can be demonstrated that misdeeds in high places do not go unpunished, just as it suffers when citizens see misdeeds in high places go unpunished. Our society would benefit if it could be demonstrated that misdeeds by Democratic presidents would be treated in the same manner as misdeeds by Republican presidents.

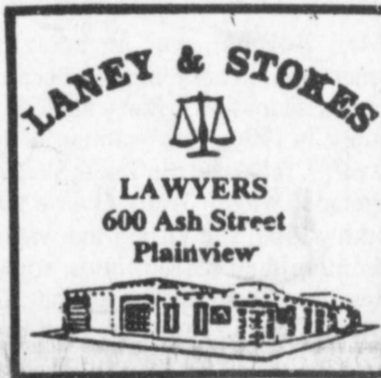
That is surely not what would have happened, had the electorate returned a Democratic majority to the U.S. House and Senate. Nor are we even sure it would have happened had the electorate opted for a Republican majority in both houses, plus a Republican president. Then the pressure would have been, or could well have been, to "let bygones be bygones." Any extended, and intensive, probe into the nefarious ways of this Administration would have been criticized as a political witch hunt, particularly if both Congress and the Administration were in the hands of Republicans.

But what assurance do we have that

Congress will fulfill its constitutional responsibilities of oversight in these matters? What assurances do we have that an electorate already so cynical that less than half the potential voters even bothered going to the polls, (and less than half of that half reelected our president) will not end up even more cynical at the end of the next four years?

None, really. But the opportunity for corrective action will be there. And we think it will be taken. We hope so. Senator Al D'Amato, the flaky New York Republican who heads the Senate's Banking Committee, now says he will conduct no more hearings into the Whitewater matter, and he seemed to suggest that other areas of White House conduct be left alone by Congress, as well. Perhaps this is wise, concerning Whitewater, since the special prosecutor seems to be moving along nicely, if slowly. But one suspects the senator has an eye on his next election in New York, which went heavily for Mr. Clinton. After all, both he and Clinton share many of the same financial benefactors in New York. We suspect the Senator was talked to.

But Al D'Amato is not the U.S. Senator, and the Senate is not the U.S. House. And Whitewater is not the only avenue of approach to the political sins and legal transgressions of this Administration. It was, and is, merely one symptom of the moral sickness that afflicts Mr. Clinton's approach to governing. If the Congress does its job, a blow will have been struck for liberty, and little kids can again be taught the value of virtue.

## Business Of The Week

FLOYDADA-- Don Hardy first began business in Floydada with Don Hardy Race Cars Inc., in July 1965, before expanding and then concentrating on building fuel efficient irrigation engines.

Already a success as a race car builder and mechanic for his friend Kelly Chadwick (a teacher and coach in Floydada), Hardy decided to put his talents to work building race cars for other people.

"I would build them and Kelly would race them," said Hardy. "We were pretty good at it."

Don graduated Olton High School and was drafted into the Army. After 18 months in Alaska, Don moved to Floydada and met his wife, Sue--a native of Clarendon. Sue was employed at Farm Bureau and married Don in 1969. The two then have formed not only a partnership in marriage but Sue is also Don's partner in the business.

From the time he opened his race car shop until June of 1968, Don built race cars in three different locations.

In 1968 the business was moved to its present location at 202 W. Missouri. Race cars continued to be built for customers from all the United States and Puerto Rico.

In March 1973 the first catalog was published and UPS began picking up race car parts as well as street car parts for delivery throughout the U.S. and Canada.

in Dumas and Dalhart. "Everything is manufactured and assembled here in Floydada," said Hardy. "We sell 800-900 irrigation engines a year."

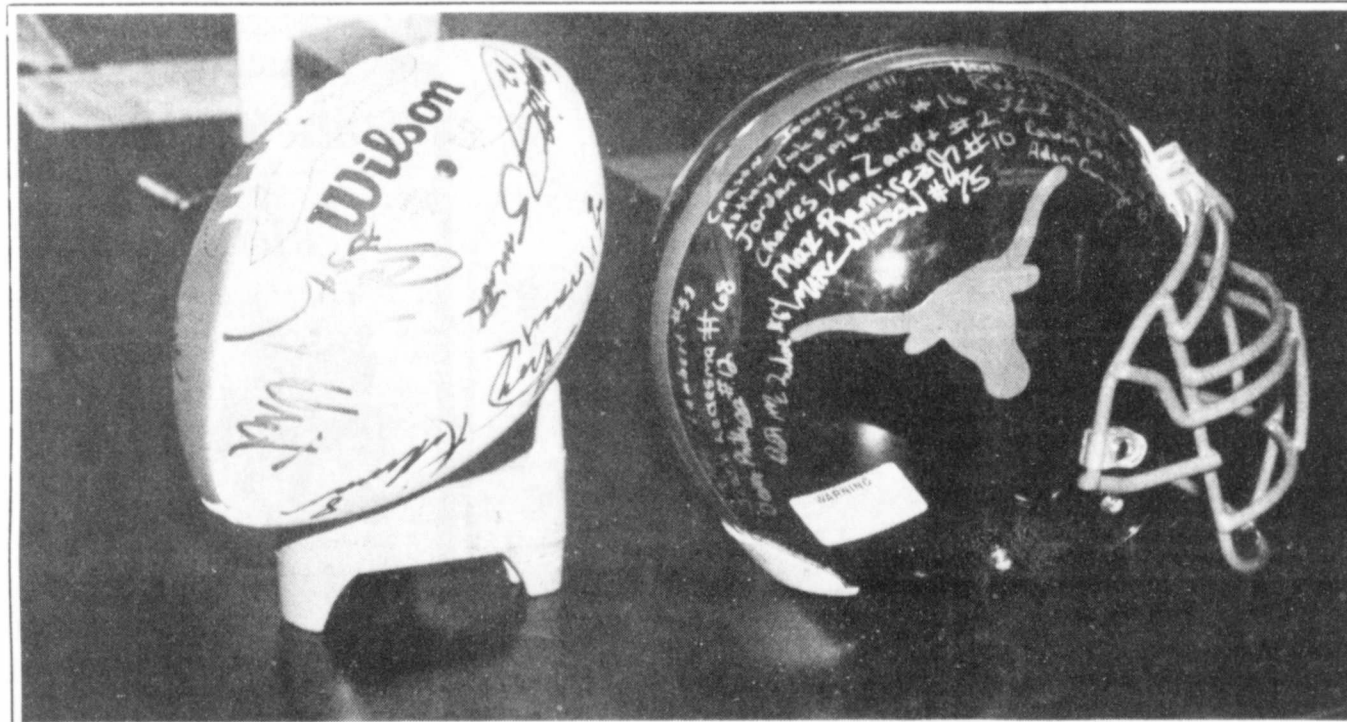
### Letter to the Editor

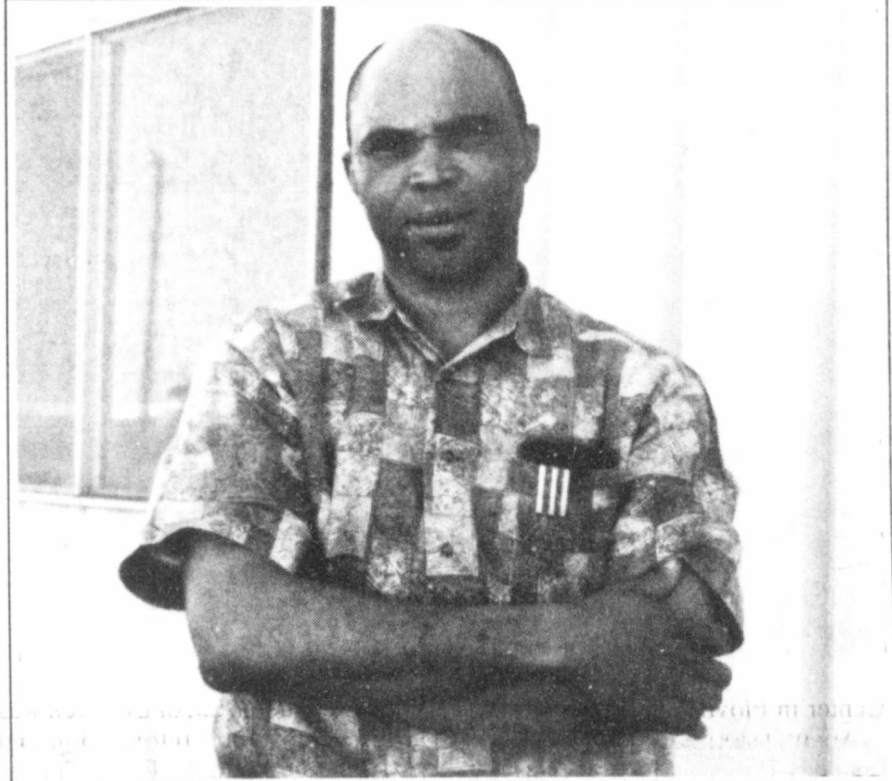
"I'm temporary with the possibility of being full time," said Harris.

Harris is assisted in the office by a secretary, Peggy Carthel, and a technician, Larry Benjamin.



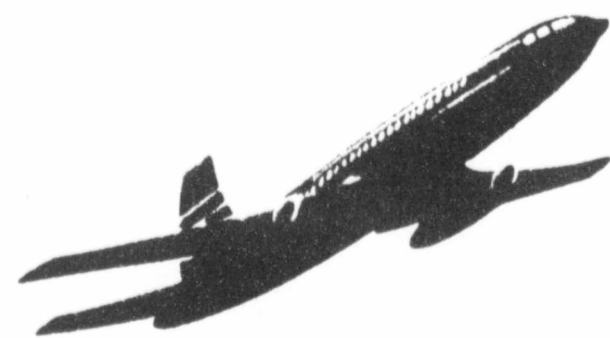

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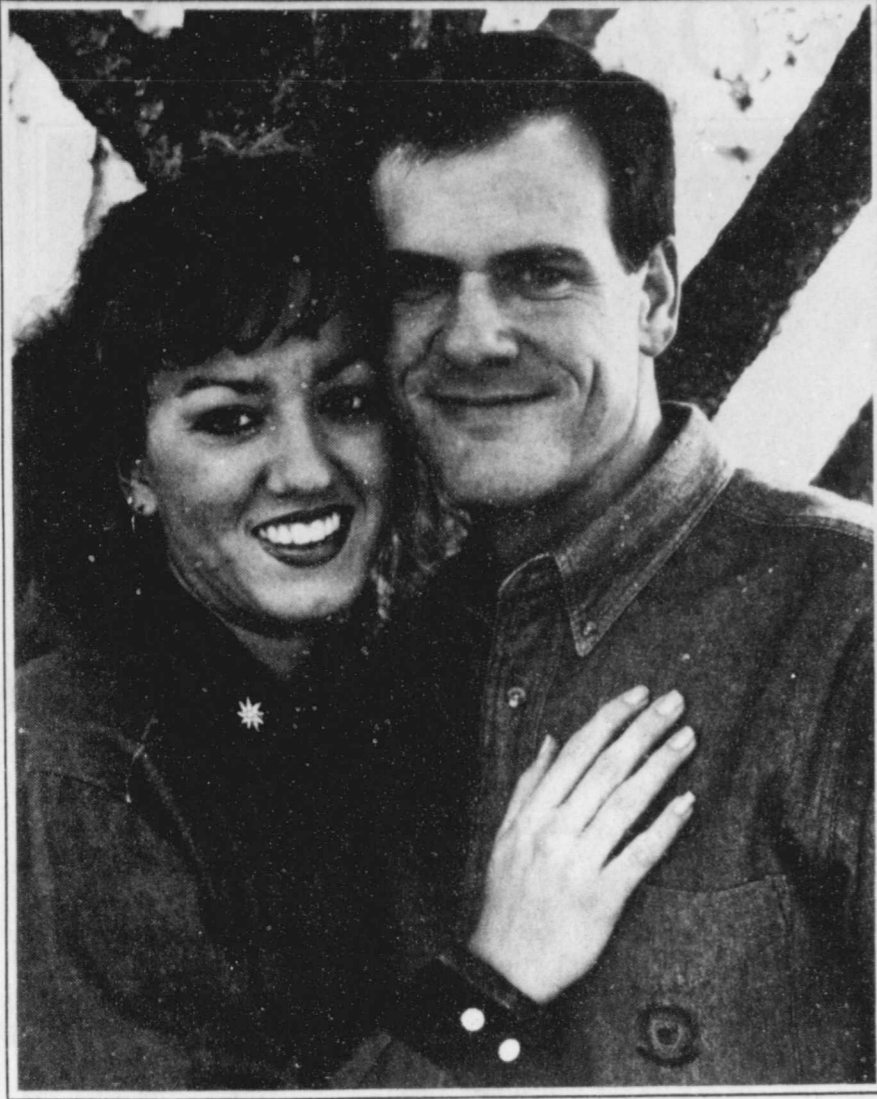

### Do We Really Have "the Smallest Government in 35 Years" as the President Suggests?

Is the era of big government really over?

President Clinton made that claim last week, when he said in his State of the Union Address that "we have the smallest government in 35 years." But is this really true? Is big government really a thing of the past? After looking at the President's budget proposal for next year, I'd have to say it is not.

If we look at how much of our national output the federal government consumes, it is now at the highest level since 1945, and the third highest ever.

If we look at the tax burden being placed on the American people, it is now at the highest level it's ever been, with nearly 40 percent of the typical family's income going to pay taxes.

If we look at how much the government will spend, it is now at the highest level ever, and will grow even more if the President's proposal to cre-

ate 89 new federal programs at a cost of \$150 billion dollars goes through.

The truth is, the only part of the federal government that's getting any smaller is our national defense. Defense spending has been going down for 13 straight years and when measured as part of our Gross National Product-is at its lowest level since before World War II.

Now, what does all this mean for you and me? In a nutshell, it means we're less free and less secure, because the federal government is too big and exercising too much control over our lives.

It also means that the era of big government is far from over, and that we've got to keep working for a smaller and smarter government that trusts the American people more than federal bureaucrats to solve the problems which face us as a Nation.

## Hodges visits Thailand

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Jeffrey T. Hodges, son of Phyllis A. Harris, of Floydada recently visited Phuket, Thailand, while on a six-month deployment to the Arabian Sea and Persian Gulf aboard the destroyer USS John Young.

During the port visit, crewmembers from Hodges' ship participated in Project Handclasp. The project resulted in the donation of toys to more than 100 local children during the Christmas holiday.

Destroyers, like Hodges' ship, have

traditionally been the workhorses of the U.S. Navy, defending battle groups against threats from land, air, above and below the sea. Equipped with Tomahawk cruise missiles, Harpoon anti-ship missiles and Sea Sparrow Missiles, USS John Young is capable of hitting enemy targets hundreds of miles away. In addition, Hodges' ship carries two helicopters with sonar and torpedo capabilities, expanding the ship's reach.

The 1988 graduate of Iraan High School joined the Navy in August 1988.

## Master Gardener training classes to begin in March

The 1998 Master Gardener training class will begin on March 24, 1998 and will meet twice weekly for seven (7) weeks plus one field trip for a total of 50 hours of classroom time. The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Class will be held at the Texas A&M Research & Extension Center located north of Lubbock, 1/2 mile east of I-27 on farm road 1294 (Shallowater Exit 11 on the interstate).

Topics covered will include basic Botany, soils, lawn culture, vegetables, fruits, landscape materials, and various other horticulture related subjects. The classes will be taught by Extension faculty and research specialists, faculty from Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University as well as area horticulture business representatives and garden club members.

Cost of the program will be \$75.00 per person or \$100.00 per couple (1 copy of the handbook). Class size will be limited to 50 individuals. Registration will be first come, first served

Once an individual completes the classroom training and becomes a Master Gardener intern, he may begin completing his volunteer community service hours in order to become a Certified Master Gardener. ## County approves position

Sunday. "This will give us the option to work on a weekend after bad weather during the week rather than working weekends before a regular week and having to send the workers home on good days to avoid going to overtime pay," said Gilroy.

The commissioners discussed the current policy for paying an injured county employee who is drawing worker's comp. The policy allows the injured worker to turn the worker's comp check over to the county and continue to receive his regular salary from the county for up to 180 calendar days. The workers comp turned over is 80 percent of his salary. Following discussion, no change was made in the current policy.

The court also examined all accounts and reports relating to the finances of the county and approved payment of all properly submitted bills at the morning session.

J. D. Ragland and Melissa Long of the Floyd County Extension Service presented reports concerning the activities of their departments in the last month. Long introduced her new program assistant, Josie Martinez. Monthly reports from elected officials whose offices collect fines and/or fees were also reviewed by the commissioners.

Farmwork contracts were approved for 14 individuals and two previously approved contracts were voided. Work was approved for James Jeffress, Kendall Cummings, Angel Araujo, John T. Boedeker by John Quebe, Keith D. Marble, James Doucette, A. E. Guthrie Trust by Joe Jones, Bart Greer, Bobbie Kellison by Aaron Wilson, Paul Willis by Leon Williams, L. B. Brandes by Tom Johnson, Kenneth Pitts, and Martha Taylor. The voided contracts were for Dwight Teple and Bruce Ballou.

Budget amendments were approved to fund the Temporary Justice of the Peace for Precincts 2 & 3 (\$1,454.96 from general surplus), pay the salary of the lawyer acting as county attorney (\$11,700.00 from Co. Attorney Operating Expense), and to fund DA equipment (\$103.86 from DA Supply). \$26,000.00 was transferred from Road & Bridge funds into the four precincts with each receiving \$6,500.00.

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet made her report on county finances for the month of January. She said the county began the month with \$575,854.10 in various funds. Receipts for the month were \$277,226.63 and transfers in totaled \$60,058.33. Disbursements for the month were \$383,071.56 and transfers out totaled

\$60,058.33, leaving the county with accounts totaling \$470,009.17.

Shurbet also reported certificates of deposit in the amounts of: \$530,000.00 in undivided taxes; \$30,000.00 for Precinct #1; \$30,000.00 for Precinct #2; \$155,000.00 for Precinct #3; and \$35,000.00 for Precinct #4. CD's and interest bearing accounts have earned \$10,213.36 in interest since the fiscal year began October 1, 1998, according to Shurbet.

Commissioners also approved renewal of the agreement with Allied Compliance for required drug testing of county employees who hold a Commercial Drivers License.

Permission for a water line to cross two county roads in Precinct 1 was also approved. The City of Floydada will cross County Road 91 and County Road 129, both in Block 2500, with a 16 inch steel casing water transmission line connecting a well on the city farm with the city water system. There will be no cost to the county and the line will be buried at least 24 inches below the bottom of the ditches beside the roads.

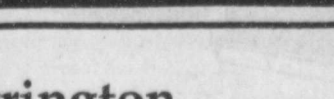

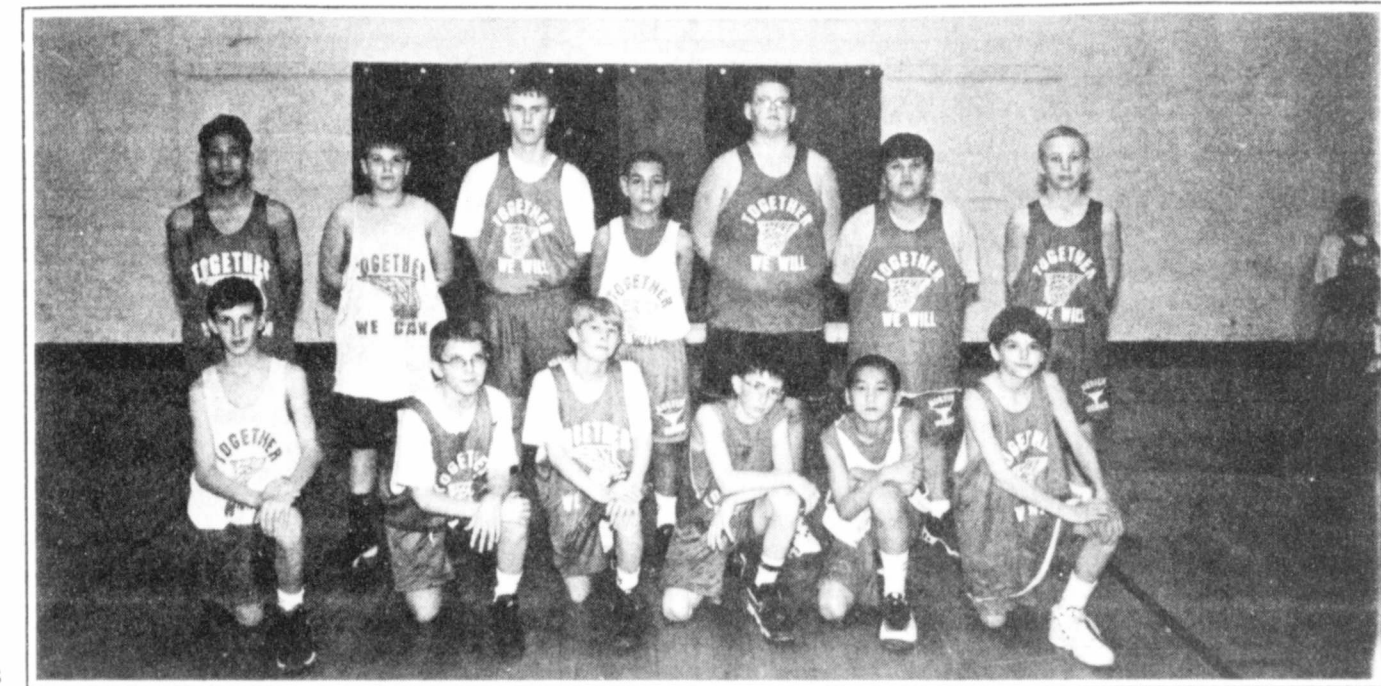

"Our influence in Austin and Washington has grown tremendously during the last 10 years. Through AgFund farmers and ranchers are players in the political arena," he said.

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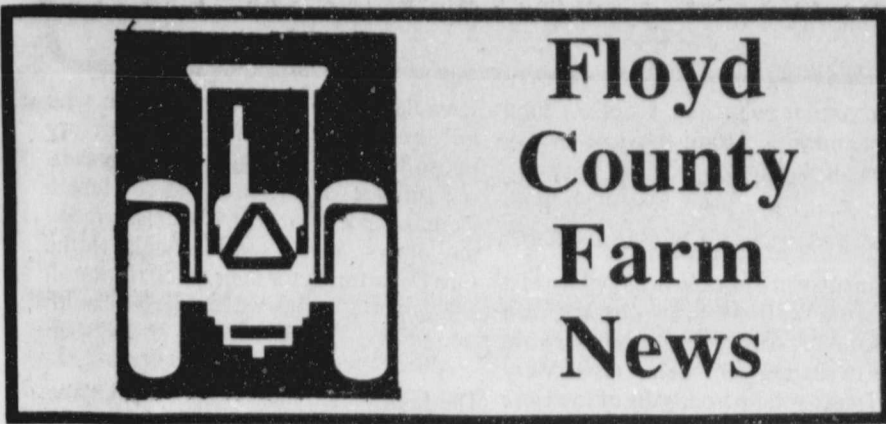

Producers with cotton in the Commodity Credit Corporation Loan program are approaching the point where CCC will start covering some of the interest and storage charges accrued on the cotton put forth as collateral for the loan.

With the Adjusted World Price (AWP) continuing to drift downward, U.S. growers will soon be able to redeem their cotton at the AWP, provided it is below the amount of the loan principal+interest+storage. Cotton put into the loan in October is approaching this level.

If the AWP continues to drop growers with cotton in the loan will get a break. This scenario will change on a daily basis as cotton under loan accrues storage and interest charges. It will also be different for each producer since cotton is typically given a value above or below the Base Loan rate based in its unique combination of quality characteristics.

This will not affect Loan Deficiency Payments, however, LDP's are not triggered until the AWP drops below the Base Loan rate of 51.92 cents per pound. If this were to occur growers could then apply for the LDP in exchange for a promise not to put their cotton into the CCC loan program.

**FORECAST CALLS FOR HIGH BOLL WEEVIL INFESTATIONS FOR 1998 COTTON CROP**

Winter weevil watchers have some worrying news for High Plains cotton growers as we approach the end of January. Those in the know say they are finding plenty of boll weevils and practically no winter weather.

This forecast means the 1998 cotton crop could see some of the worst boll weevil infestations year, at least initially.

With current survival figures hovering around the 70 percent mark Lubbock County Integrated Pest management agent Brant Baugh says producers who had weevil problems in 1997 will see them again and producers who really did not have much trouble in 1997 will also have plenty in 1998.

In order to help producers get a handle on the issue before it becomes a problem the Texas Ag Extension Service, Texas Tech University, PCG and the High Plains Association of Crop Consultants have begun the process of putting together a workshop titled "Adjusting Cotton Production Systems for Boll Weevil Management".

The program, which will offer pesticide applicator continuing education credit for producers, will focus on integrating boll weevil management techniques with traditional High Plains crop production systems.

The workshop is scheduled for Friday, April 17, 1998 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. The workshop will be held in Room 107 of the Civic Center.

Additional information will be put forth in the days leading up to the Texas Cotton Ginners' Convention and Trade Show.

**IMPROVEMENT IN DRYLAND COTTON PRODUCTION SYSTEMS CONTINUES**

Improvement in dryland cotton production systems continues to command a significant level of interest among High Plains cotton growers.

With about one-half of all cotton fields in the area considered dryland even the smallest improvement in overall profitability can mean a significant boost on farm incomes. Research conducted at Texas Tech University and the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock is focusing in on the issue of profitability and how it can be improved through adoption of different tillage and production systems.

Most of the dryland cotton grown on the High Plains has been subject to a monocultural-type tillage system. This system, which is tillage intensive, is both expensive and dangerous since it leaves the soil vulnerable to both wind and water erosion.

Research from TTU and TAES at the AG-CARES research farm in Lamesa indicates that growers who switch to a conservation tillage system can significantly increase both yields and profitability.

A good example is the effect from the use of a minimum-tillage production system. Under this system cotton yields were increased 50 percent and increased net returns above variable costs were increased 100 percent as compared to conventional tillage systems.

The study also found that adoption of the conservation-tillage and minimum-tillage systems did not increase risk compared to conventional production systems.

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**TFU takes strong position on farm prices, market concentration, and private property rights**

Delegates to Texas Farmers Union's (TFU) 94th annual convention here January 30-31, voted to support removal of federal government commodity loan rate caps, which were frozen at 1995 levels under the 1996 farm bill. Delegates also reinforced their support for a floor price for milk.

"The 1996 farm bill severely limited the safety net that family farmers and ranchers so desperately need,"

said TFU President Wes Sims of Sweetwater. "The result is that processors can widen their profit margin by buying low from the farmers and selling high to the consumer."

In addition, delegates passed a resolution calling for a change in the state law which prohibits land owners from hunting on their own property without a hunting license. While the provision is largely ignored for farmers

who kill varmints on their own farms, recent arrests of land owner-hunters led the TFU delegation to call for legislation granting land owners the right to protect their own property without being licensed.

Texas Farmers Union's (TFU) board of directors Friday voted unanimously to support a lawsuit by individual beef producers which calls on the U.S. Packers and Stockyards Administra-

tion to enforce its antitrust laws. TFU believes sagging cattle prices are attributable to the lack of competition in the market. As of 1996, four firms controlled the processing of 87 percent of the nation's red meat.

"The nation's beef processing companies have increasingly used captive supplies of cattle to drive down the market price for fed cattle," said Sims. "These practices are driving down producer prices, while consumers receive no benefit from the lower prices paid by the processors."

Sweetwater farmer, Wes Sims was reelected president to lead the Texas Farmers Union. Joe Rankin, a cotton farmer from Ralls, was reelected vice-president.

Also elected district directors were Robert Green of Hartley, Connie Mack Seymore of Merkel, Terry Priesmeyer of El Campo, Charles Lindsey of China Spring, and Robert Smith of Austin.

Delegates elected to represent the Texas organization at the National Farmers Union Convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, March 6-8 were Billy Arpe of Roscoe, A.J. Priesmeyer of El Campo and Patrick Cox of Buda.

**Stenholm, Sharp and Swenson address Texas Farmers Union Convention**

More than a dozen local, state and national leaders, including U.S. Representative Charlie Stenholm, D-Texas, Texas lieutenant governor candidate John Sharp and National Farmers Union President Leland Swenson, addressed Texas Farmers Union's (TFU) 94th annual convention here, January 30-31, 1998. More than 100 delegates, members and guests attended.

Stenholm defended federal programs that assist low income Americans provide education and health care to their families, noting that such programs are necessary if U.S. wages are to remain at a level that enables U.S. products to compete with those from less developed countries. At the same time, he said it is doubtful that Washington will support additional programs that support production agriculture.

"We've got to look at cooperative and other marketing options if rural America is to be sustained for our children and grandchildren," Stenholm said.

Sharp shared with the standing-room-only audience the state of Texas' success in saving billions of dollars by cracking down on food stamp and Medicaid fraud. He also stated that the best economic development move

Texans can make at this time is to invest in education of its children.

"As prospective investors come to visit our state the first thing they ask is about the projected availability of an educated work force," Sharp said. "Something is wrong when we put our school kids in old buildings while prisoners are housed in new buildings. We can't afford to have poor education in Texas."

Swenson reviewed the accomplishments of the organization over the past year and also outlined the challenges facing family producers in the coming year. Among the challenges that National Farmers Union will be working, Swenson told TFU members, is

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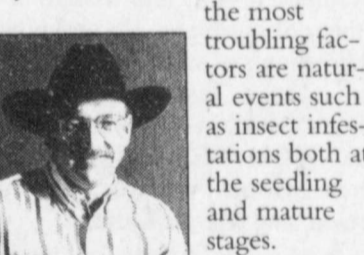

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge.

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does not approve it.

The PUC assigned Docket Number 18513 to this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this matter is March 31, 1998.
