## Star Lites

ONE OF THE MOST controversial shows which will have been aired on television is scheduled for Sunday at 7 p.m., when ABC Television airs "The Day After."

Educators and psychologists have expressed concern about the harmful impact that the program may have on young viewers, especially children.

One psychologist says the program, which deals with nuclear war "Shows an extremely frightening reality. The consensus of psychiatrists who have seen the film is that children under 12 should definitely not view it."

Unfortunately (or fortunately, depending on how the program turns out), many Friona viewers will be spared the decision of watching the media event, since it airs at the same time as the local Community Thanksgiving service Sunday evening. Attending the service will settle the argument for many residents.

Our experience, in regard to all of the hoopla which has preceded the airing of the program, is that the more warnings which are put out as to why certain brackets of viewers should not watch a film (or program), the more many of these viewers will make a special attempt to watch it.

Naturally, parents will have a final say (in most, or some instances, at least) in whether or not their children under age 12 watch the program.

But all of the publicity is likely to cause more people to watch the program, just to see why it has been termed controversial.

The program has been seen as making a big political statement, in regards to nuclear weapons. But it will not help viewers decide which policies can bring us closer to or take us farther from, nuclear confrontation with the Russians.

Political activist Phyllis Schaffly has charged that "This film was made by people who want to disarm the country and are willing to make a \$7 million contribution to that campaign."

Another critic has said that the program violates two of the television networks' laws: never leave viewers politically aroused or emotionally depressed.

Well, I guess we'll find out Sunday...or should I attend the community service. Decisions, decisions.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 17 was observed as the seventh annual "Great American Smokeout" in Texas.

The Smokeout is sponsored by the American Cancer Society nationwide, in order to encourage smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day, if only to prove to themselves that they can.

A survey conducted by the Gallup poll last year indicated that more than 19 million Americans tried to quit smoking for the day. Only about five million people made it the whole day, and 2.3 million of these were still not smoking 11 days after, the survey showed.

A feature of the current year's campaign is called "adopt a smoker," whereby non-smokers are encouraged to adopt their smoker friends and family members for the day in order to offer them support and encouragement. In Maryland, where this concept originated, "adoption" papers are available.

Many Texas communities are participating in the event in various ways, from rallies to parades and school assemblies, and balloon lift-offs and kissing booths.

The campaign should also have received a shot in the arm from the San Francisco area, which last week voted to make it illegal for people to smoke in offices and other work areas.

Of course, non-smoking areas have long been available to airline customers, as well as customers of certain restaurants. In addition, a "Non-Smokers Inn" has opened in certain metropolitan areas.

## Community-Wide Service Sunday

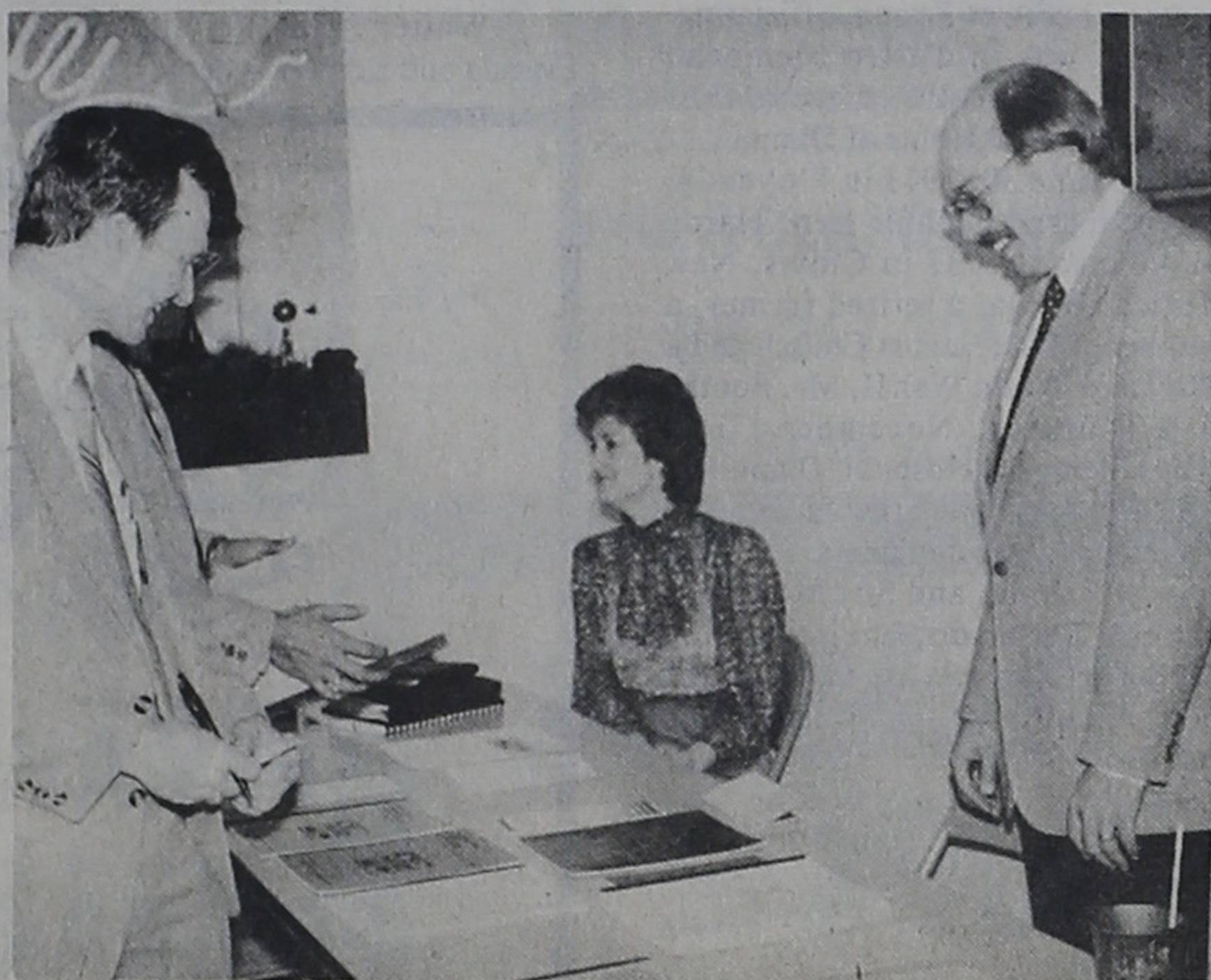
Friona's annual Community Thanksgiving service will be held on Sunday, November 20, at the First United Methodist Church of Friona.

Do some Christmas shopping, visit with friends or learn something new from the demonstrations. You'll be glad you came. Don't miss it!

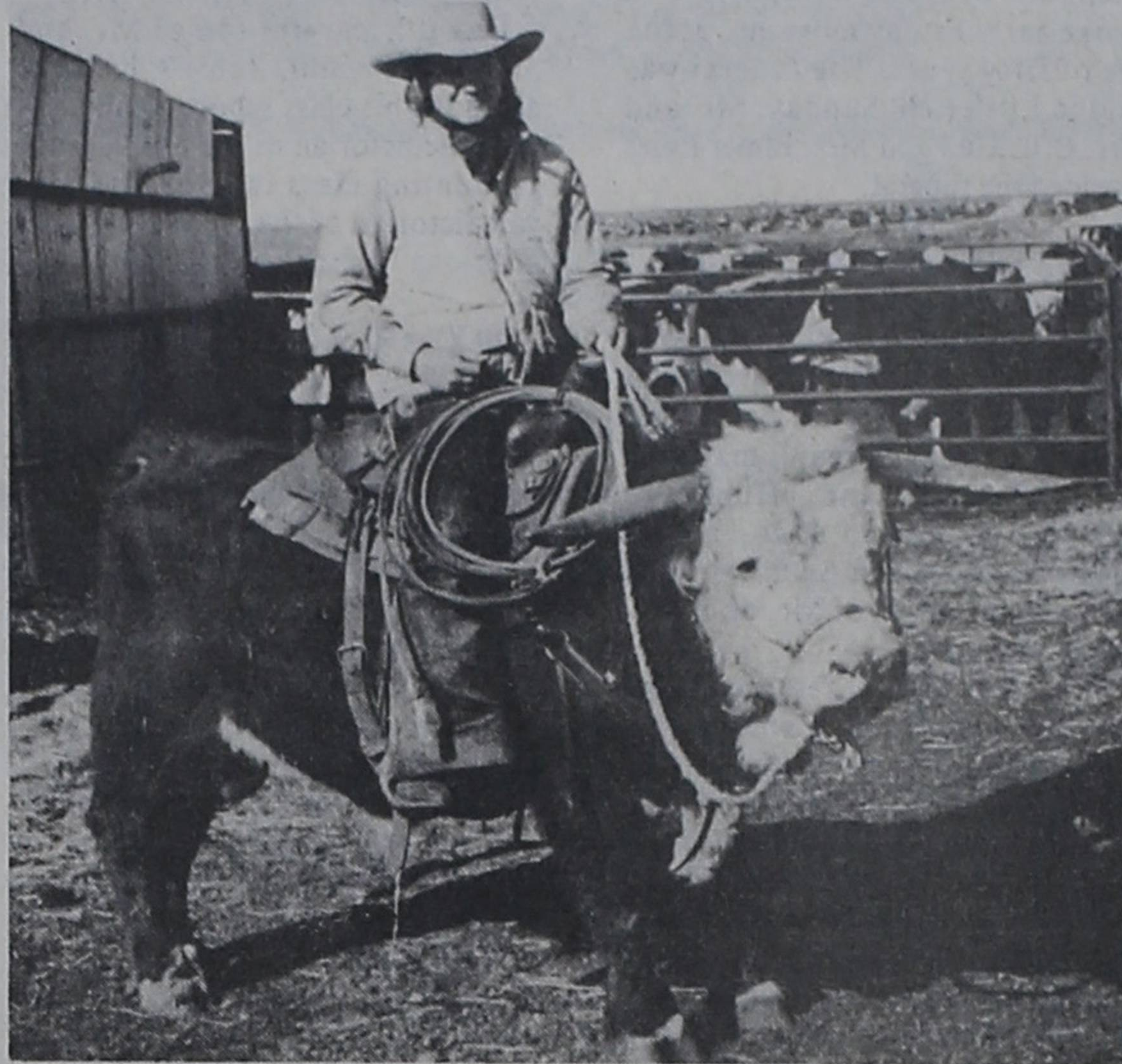
## Instructors' Course Set

## Davis Takes Lead In Grid Event

With just two weekends remaining in the annual contest, a change in leadership has occurred in the Friona Star's Football contest.

Patches Fleming, who had led the contest for the past several weeks, fell five points off the pace after his score dropped to eleven for the week.

Bobby Davis, who had been hot on Fleming's trail the past few weeks, came up with a score of 18 and charged into the lead in the standings

with 154 points.

Steve Williams posted a score of 17 for the week, and took over second place with an overall score of 151. Ron Smiley, who correctly picked 16 for the past week, is third at 150.

Fleming fell into a four-way tie for fourth place with Kevin Beavers, Tom Johnson and Eddie Mann at 149.

With his score of 18, Davis tied with Mike Leonard of Canadian as the only two contestants to pick that many games.

Leonard claimed the weekly first-place and \$10.00 in cash, on the basis of his tie-breaker prediction on the Dallas-San Diego game. He missed the score by 12 points, picking the Cowboys to win, 28-17.

Davis had to settle for second place, missing the score by 18 points. He picked Dallas to win, 34-17.

Joe Tongate was one of six contestants to correctly pick 17 games, and he claimed third place money for the week, after missing the Dallas-Charger score by only eight points. Tongate picked the Cowboys to win, 31-24, hitting San Diego's score on the head.

Davis missed Borger-Pampa, Cincinnati-Kansas City, Buffalo-New York and San Francisco-New Orleans. Leonard's misses were Perryton-Muleshoe, Arkansas-Texas A&M, UCLA-Arizona and the Jets-Buffalo.

## Board Has Report On \$ Matters

Bernie Gowens, auditor, and Ron Procter, Parmer County Tax appraiser, appeared before the Friona School Board this week to discuss an error in collection of the 1982 tax rolls which resulted in the school receiving some tax monies which should have gone to the City of Friona.

Procter told the board that steps are being taken to guard against this happening in the future.

It was reported that of the 1983 tax roll, a total of \$128,838 has been collected, or about ten per cent of the total.

Jim Parker and Zane Polson, band directors, displayed a proposed new band uniform to the board. The present uniforms range in age up to 20 years old. The board has requested bids for new uniforms, for their consideration.

The board approved a request from Friona State Bank to release pledged securities and receive additional securities in lieu thereof.

The board approved a request to release Evelyn Fulks from her contract in January, since her husband has accepted employment in Sallisaw, Oklahoma.

A resolution was approved casting 729 votes for David Grimsley and 728 votes for David Goddard for the Parmer County Appraisal District's board of directors for 1984 and 1985.

A report on school enrollment was given. As of November 14, the total enrollment is 1312 students, which is an increase of 29 over the approximate date a year earlier.

The promotion is designed to promote the purchase of Christmas gifts and services from Friona Chamber of Commerce members.

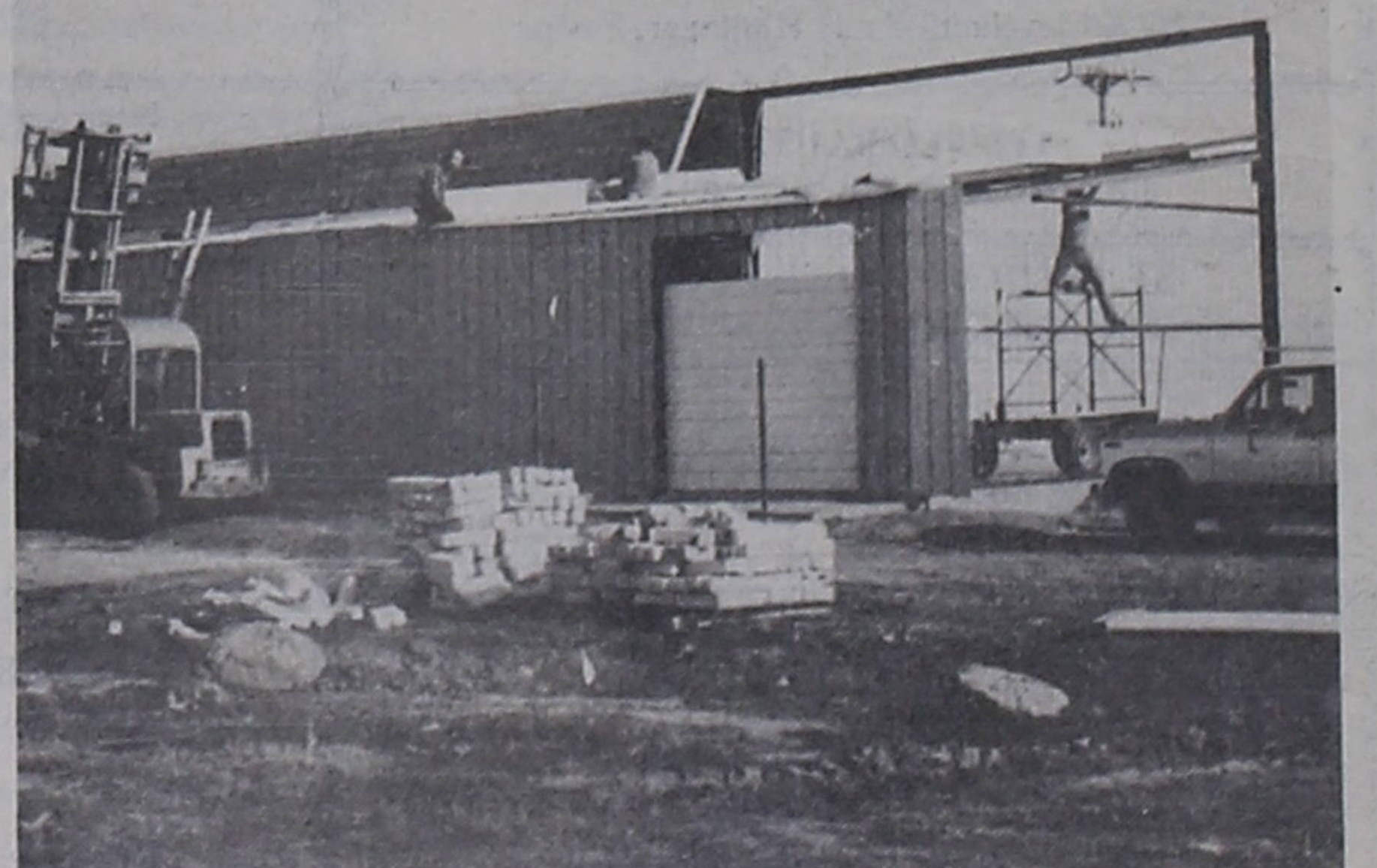

Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

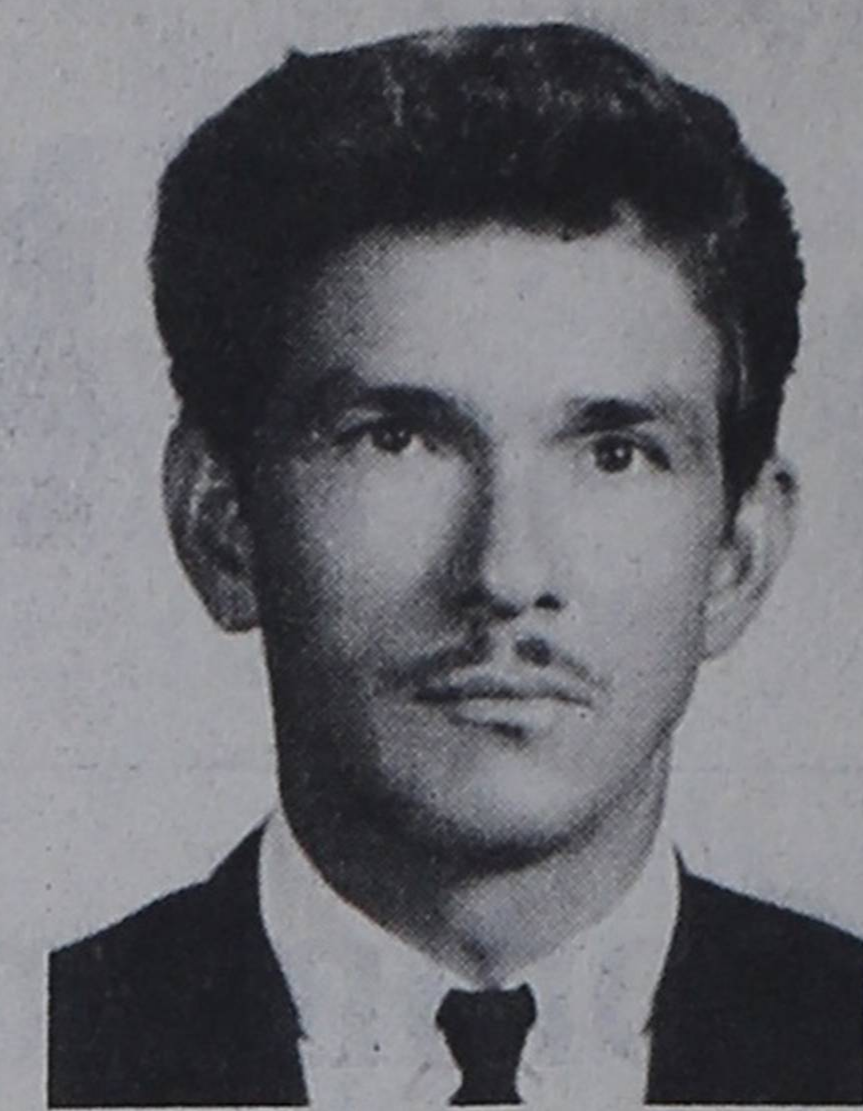





Malouf scored two TDs in a row, one from 32 yards out and one on a five-yard burst. Burney closed the scoring with a 42-yard run.

On November 3, the freshmen closed their season at Littlefield with an exciting 14-12 win over Littlefield. It was the Littlefield team's first loss in three years (seventh, eighth and ninth).

Jimmy Williams ran 26 yards for one Friona score and Shy Burney scored from three yards out. Sam Montoya's two PAT kicks made the difference in the game.

Malouf carried 11 times for 56 yards; Williams 13 times for 92 and Lonnie Phillips eight times for 26 yards.

"This was a super win for us, and it took an outstanding effort on everyone's part. Beating Littlefield at Littlefield was a good way to end a very successful season for these young men," said Coach Steve Williams.

The team finished its season with a 6-2 record.

The Chieftains outdid their season opponents in first downs by an average of 14.3 to 11.2, in net yards rushing, 217 to 121, and in total yards, 249.4 to 216.7.

Friona's big-play defense led in take-aways for the season, 27-16. The Chiefs intercepted 14 opponent passes and recovered 13 fumbles, while Friona was losing only six passes and ten fumbles.

Eloy Caballero was the sparkplug for the defense. The Chieftain safety intercepted 11 passes for the season, and had one interception in each of the team's district games.

On offense, although the 1983 Chieftains were not a high-scoring team (averaging 14.8 points per game), they didn't give up many points either, only 8.1 points per outing.

District champion Littlefield, which averaged around 40 points per game, scored only 13 against the Chieftains; and Littlefield and Muleshoe together managed only 22 points.

It may come as a surprise for fans to learn that in district games, the Chieftains had more offensive plays (58) against the two teams making the playoffs, Littlefield and Muleshoe, while Littlefield was held to just 49 plays, the least of any 2-AAA opponent.

The Chieftains had a balanced offensive attack. Runningback Charlie Morgan was the leading rusher for the second year in a row, but this time he had a better "supporting cast."

Morgan gained 904 yards for the season, or 90.4 per game and 5.3 yards per carry. Fullback Reese Fleming added 702 yards, or 70.2 per game and 6.3 yards per carry.

In his last two years as a runningback for the Chieftains, Morgan gained 2,089 yards. With most Friona opponents stacking their defense to stop him, his total for 1983 is even more impressive.

Alfredo Mata gained 595 yards, 59.5 yards per game and 5.2 yards per carry.

Morgan was also the team's leading scorer, with 54 points on nine touchdowns. Mata added 30, and

Doug Carthel scored 22 points, on two field goals and 16 extra points.

Caballero also led the team in pass receiving, with nine catches good for 211 yards (23.4 per catch) and three touchdowns.

Reese Fleming and Charlie Morgan each had three pass receptions for the year.

Punter Ricky Barnett punted 36 times for 1180 yards, averaging 32.7 yards per kick. Many of Barnett's kicks were for accuracy, inside the opponents' 10-yard line, rather than for distance.
