Voter turnout shows lack of enthusiasm

Fith no locally contested races,
Foyd County voters were less than
enthusiastic with their turnout for the enthusiastic with their turnout for the
primary election, Tuesday, March 10 . Only 340 votes were cast from a County-or less than $10 \%$ of the registered voters.
A total of 192 Democrats voted on
election day in election day in 11 boxes in the county, and 148 election day Republicans cast their ballots at 7 boxes. Democratic primary and 8 early voters in the Republican primary. County Democrats joined the rest of the Texas Democrats in choosing sentative Mac Thomberry.
The Attorney General choice for local Democrats was Jim Mattox, and L.P. Patuerson was chosen to face off

room a doctor informed Arney's hus band that she was "fixing to have a stroke." "They did a spinal tap and the pressure was relieved a little," said Arney, them to an MRI.
The MRI showed a fungus around Arney's brain and spinal fluid. The
