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Gen. Dempsey to lead Old Settlers parade

Retired Maj. Gen. Robert E Dempsey, a 1960 graduate of Floydada High School, will be Grand Marshall of the Old Settler's Parade, on Saturday, and one of many veterans honored throughout the day.

The theme of the parade, as well as the whole Old Settlers Reunion, is "Honoring Veterans Today For Service Yesterday".

Gen. Dempsey is the son of Mrs. Betsy Dempsey of Fioydada, and brother to Mrs. Jan Wilson; of Floydada.

Maj. Gen. Dempsey retired in 1994 as a 2 star General and as vice commander of the 8th Air Force. The "Mighty Eighth" was responsible for Strategic Air Command training and operations in the eastern half of the United States, Europe, the Mediterra- planning matters. nean, Africa and Southwest Asia.

Upon graduation from the Air Force Academy in 1964, General Dempsey received his commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force. He completed pilot training at Webb Air Force Base, Texas, and in October 1965 was in April 1979. General Dempsey then assigned to the 9th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron at Shaw AFB, S.C., where he flew RF-4C Phantoms. While at Shaw, he also served as wing executive office for the 363rd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing.

In May 1967 the general transferred to Bergstrom AFB, Texas, where he upgraded to aircraft commander in the RF-4C en route to Tanson Nhut Air Base, Republic of Vietnam. From November 1967 to November 1968 he flew 201 combat missions, 55 of them

General Dempsey then was assigned to the 38th TRS, Ramstein AB, West Germany, where he was the top American pilot in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's Royal Flush competition in both 1970 and 1971. He upgraded to instructor and standardization and evaluation flight examiner and served with the inspector general, Headquarters U.S. Air Forces in Europe at Lindsey Air Station, West Germany, flying all models of the F-4 from June 1971-June 1973.

The general then was assigned to the Directorate of Plans, Europe/ NATO Plans and Policy, at Headquarters U.S. Air Force in Washington D.C. Serving there until July 1977, he specialized in United Kingdom, German and Spanish issues, and European

In May 1978, after completing Air War College at Maxwell AFB, Ala., he was assigned to the 69th Bombardment Squadron, Loring AFB, Maine, where he flew B-52 Stratofortresses.


For those who want a closer look of the WWI horse drawn cannon, the group will have a demonstration at 10:30 a.m. on the west side of the square.

We do not claim to speak on all issues for all veterans everywhere, nor do we claim to speak for those left on various battlefields around the world, but we feel they would forgive us for presuming to speak on their behalf when we say "thank you" for remembering what they did, or tried to do.

Not that he would have gotten much of it anyway, since about 90 percent of that vote, small as it is in Texas, traditionally goes to the Democratic candidate, whoever he or she is.

Those sorts of stories rarely happen without a great deal of advance preparation. A certain "spin" is necessary if the desired results are to be achieved. stand it, and practice it, usually do well example, but not the only example.

This was one of those stories where everybody involved had their own particular ax to grind, and their own particular benefit to receive. Mr. Sharp, a shrewd politician if there ever was one, is a Catholic and has endeavored to make that fact well known among Catholics, but he has not limited his "outreach" to members of his own faith. (Nor should he). In this "news" conference, he was flanked by the Rev. John Hagee, a Protestant television preacher and fund raiser (is there any difference?), and Israel's Ambassador to the United States, Eliahu Ben-Ilissar; plus Erving Pozmantier, chairman of the Jewish Federation of Houston's United Jewish Campaign. Clearly this was going to be important, with such heavyweights in attendance.

The Rev. Hagee presented a check for \$1 million to the Jewish fund raisers to help settle Jews, ostensibly from Russia, in Israel. Hagee said he got the money from his listeners after being apprised of the need by John Sharp, who had himself raised and donated \$50,000 after hearing a Jewish rabbi's appeal for funds. He also pointed out that "the phones literally melted off the walls" when he made his television appeal for funds to help foreign Jews settle in settle in Israel.

Mr. Sharp spike of his deep commitment to Israel, and his feeling, during a recent trip to that state, on witnessing the emotion of "returning" Jews to Israel. He did not speak of his emotion, if he had any, on seeing Palestinian Christians and Muslims being driven from their homes, and the homes bulldozed, to make way for arriving Jews. Nor did the news report say whether Mr. Sharp paid his own way to Israel, or if he benefited from one of many programs provided aspiring American politicians by Israel's lobby in the United States.

Mr. Hagee used the occasion, with biblical quotes, to explain his support of Israel and Israel's policies.

"God's foreign policy statement toward Israel is made clear in Genesis 12:3. 'I will bless those that bless you and I will curse those wno curse you," said Hagee.

(Actually, as I read the scripture, that particular blessing said nothing about Israel. In fact, there was no Israel at the time. It was given to a worried individual named Abram as he was preparing to leave his people in Mesopotamia, take his family and go live among the Canaanites-who spoke

rael. It is recorded in the book of Genesis, which many Biblical scholars attribute primarily to Moses, and it should be remembered that Moses lived hundreds of years after Abram, or Abraham, as he became known

Hagee also noted, no doubt much to the delight of Ambassador Ben-Ilissar and Mr. Pozmantier, that in his opinion "Israel has a Bible mandate to occupy that land to build, to develop and grow without question from other


Benjamin Netanyahu couldn't have said it better himself. Mr. Netanyahu told American television audiences, during his buildup to running for Prime Minister of Israel, that "the world owes Israel." He won the elec-

Whether the world owes Israel or not, a goodly part of the world has surely paid, and is still paying. The taxpayers of the United States, courtesy of the United States Congress, have provided Israel with \$84,854,827 (that's billions, not millions) in various forms of aid, grants, interest free loans, what have you, since that state's founding in 1948. That amounts to \$14,346 for every man, woman and child in Israel.

That largest cost the American taxpayers an additional \$49,936,680,000 (billions, not millions) in interest, since all the money had to be borrowed by our benevolent government. And that brings the total, as far as U.S. taxpayers are concerned, to \$134,791,507,200. And that, gentle reader, is to a "country' with a Jewish population less than one-third the population of Texas. With that kind of money, the government of the United States could have built a concrete-lined canal from the Great lakes ers remember when, in the late 60's or early 70's, a plan, well researched and engineered, to move water from the Mississippi to the Plains foundered and was killed because the cost was considered excessive? That cost was on the order of \$4 billion. Compare that with the \$134 billion is has cost the American taxpayers for our government to keep the Israelis happy.

Other nations have given somewhat smaller amounts. Germany, for instance, has given Israel some \$31 billion, or more than \$5,000 for each Israeli man, woman and child.

Still, it's not enough. The end is nowhere in sight. While our Congress argues into the wee hours over whether it is going to provide a few million here or a few million there for its own citizens from their own taxes, or what to do, if anything, to save the nation's medicare program, or its social security system, it automatically funnels billions upon billions into the tiny state of Israel, no questions asked and no answers given. That goes on even as the per capita income of the average Israeli is on a par with the average Briton, and Israel's capacity to produce nuclear weapons puts it on a par with many of the world's major powers. And it goes on even as the homes of Palestine citizens, both Christians and Muslims, are confiscated and bulldozed to make room for Jews arriving, or "returning", from

Burning The Candle At Both Ends By Ron Trusler

Job burnout is more common than we would like to admit. It comes from high stress, long hours, frantic work behavior with low productivity. All the things I've just mentioned seem to be a badge-of-honor with some peopleto the point of feeling guilty if they have just a regular work day. I get amused at some who carry beepers, cell phones, talk about their busy schedule and travel requirements as if that makes them productive and important. Activity does not always produce equal productivity.

We are familiar with cramming in school. We've all done it and gotten away with it. However, consider the farmer. He can't do it. For example he can't play golf all spring and summer and expect to produce a crop in the fall. He is guided by certain laws or principles of nature. The farmer has to go with or align himself to those

principles in order to produce. If he goes against them he will be ineffec-

The same is true for those who are burning the candle at both ends. If we operate in such a state that everything is a crisis, we go against certain principles of nature and we will burn out and become ineffective. Some of those principles are:

*getting proper rest

*having adequate diet *appropriate physical exercise

*take time to play (some of us need to learn how) *have interests in other areas be-

sides work. One final note-we do not burn out because of a heavy workload but due to working outside our strength.

Steps needed to reduce seedling diseases

seedling disease. These include using rotation, quality seed, timely planting, and the use of fungicides. Producers can expect increased disease control as they increase the number of control practices used.

Rotation is the first line of defense against seedling disease. Following cotton with cotton will increase populations of seedling disease fungi in the soil. Ideally fields should be rotated out of cotton for at least two years; however this often is not feasible.

The second line of defense is seed quality. Quality seed will emerge from the soil quickly and develop secondary roots faster, therefore being vulnerable to fungal infection for a shorter period of time. Seed should be tested using the Cool-Warm vigor Index (CWVI). This test is available at the TDA Seed Laboratory in Lubbock. Earliest plantings which have the greatest potential for seedling disease infection should be planted with seed rated "excellent" or at least "good" on the CWVI.

Timely planting is the third step in reducing seedling disease loss. Planting should be delayed until the 10-day average soil temperature at the eightinch depth is 65 degrees F or greater and the 5-day weather forecast is fa-







Supplemental Security Income recipients urged to report changes

By Mary Jane Shanes Social Security Manager in Plainview, Tx.

People who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments should be sure to report any changes in circumstances that take place once they start receiving payments. Such changes could result in increased or decreased payments for them.

SSI payments are based on conditions that exist when a person applies for SSI. The amount of the payment as well as the eligibility for payments are based on those conditions.

Failure to report changes could result in overpayments--payments to which the beneficiary is not entitled. Overpayments must be repaid, either in a lump sum, or as a deduction from future checks. If the overpayments result from willful failure to report, or fraud, fines and other penalties could result.
