


John C. Anderson of Plainview is chairman of the celebration and has chairmen in each of District 85's 12 counties assisting him.





daily to use the indoor swimming pool for exercise. They could do this here at home in a recreation center." The suggestion was also made that people from area towns could also benefit from the services a recreation center could offer.

City attorney Karen Houchin also told the council the facility could be the source of rental income if it were available. "Our eighth grade class just paid \$300.00 to rent the YMCA in Plainview for an end of school party," said Houchin.

The council unanimously approved a motion allowing the mayor to appoint a committee comprised of two council members, two members from the school district, four members from the local citizenry, a member of the Floydada Police Department, a representative from the Parent Adolescent Center, the city manager, a member appointed by the Ministerial Alliance to represent area churches and one student from FHS.

Councilmembers Albert Hill, Jon Nielson and Clar Schacht took their oaths of office for two year terms during the meeting. Councilman Eric Cornelius, who was unable to attend the meeting, took his oath of office on Wednesday, May 20.

City Manager Gary Brown discussed sealing cracks in the runway at the Floydada Municipal Airport. The project was approved on a motion by Councilman Sue with a second by Hill and all voting in favor.

The council approved a motion to pass an ordinance closing the north/ south alley between Lots 4 & 5, Block 24, Original Town, between Ollie Street and Hallie Street. The move was made on the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission following a request by Don Rainer. Motion was made by Nielson with a second by Sheldon Sue. All voted in

Councilmember Sue made a motion to pass Ordinance #809 which would

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concerning water metering. The motion was seconded by Dale Lawson and passed by unanimous vote.

The council also passed Ordinance #810 allowing only one residence per building site. The motion was seconded by Lawson and passed by unanimous vote.

Councilmember Hill made a motion to accept and pass Resolution #243 accepting the construction of water system improvements under TCDP Contract #717269 and authorizing fi-


alter the wording of Ordinance #721 nal payment for the work done by Rhodes Construction Company. The motion was seconded by Schacht and passed with all voting in favor.







Social Security recognizes changes in older Americans

to spend 7 percent of his or her adult life in retirement. Today that figure is test. The increased earnings limits rec-26 percent, and a long retirement has become commonplace. The highest growing segment of the population are people age 85 and above.

These facts drive the Older Ameri-Growing Stronger in American." During the month of May, Social Security joins other agencies and organizations in focusing public attention on issues related to the expanding horizons for older Americans.

Social Security changes over the years generally recognize the increased vitality and longevity of older Americans. For example, the retirement test, the earnings limit designed as a measure of whether a person is actually retired from the workforce, 35 percent. has increased over the years. This means people may earn more while still receiving Social Security benefits.

Today's beneficiary age 65 and older may earn up to \$14,500 before benefits are affected. Earnings over the limit reduce benefits \$1 for every \$3 in excess earnings. For those un-

Benefits are increased each month after age 65 the person delays retirement, up to age 70. In 1998, benefits increase 5.5 percent a year; the figure rises gradually until it reaches 8 percent in 2007.

This means that older people who want to continue working today can do so with the knowledge that they are increasing the benefits they can count on as much as 25 percent. And, for people who retire in 2008, as much as

You should note also that the age at which a person retires with a full benefit is scheduled to gradually increase from 65 to 67 by 2022. This change recognizes that people will be drawing Social Security longer. The age for early retirement will remain at age 62 for those who prefer it.

Microsurgery techniques are making it possible to repair herniated disks through day surgery.

The surgery, called microdiskectomy, takes about an hour, and four hours after surgery the patient can walk out of the hospital. Recovery requires about two-to-four weeks at home.

"Compared to the standard surgical procedure called laminectomy, microdiskectomy has a shorter healing time, a quicker back-to-work time and is less costly," said Dr. David S. Baskin, a professor of neurosurgery at Baylor college of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

A herniated disk occurs when the disk, or cushion, between the spine's vertebrae becomes damaged and pushes out from between the verte-

When part of a disk herniates or pushes out, it presses against the nerves going to the legs and causes

"The pain begins in the back and radiates down the leg causing numbness, tingling or weakness," Baskin said. "The degree of severity ranges from mild pain to excruciating pain with partial paralysis of the leg.

The surgical microscope allows the surgeon to make a small, one-inch incision and about a millimeter of bone is removed above and below the injured disk. The bony structure of the spine is not altered. "With the microscope, the herniated

piece of disk is located and removed," Baskin said. "The degenerated part of the disk is cleaned out and enough disk is left in place to provide the necessary cushion between the verte-

Microdiskectomy allows patients to avoid the five-to-six day hospital stay associated with the standard laminectomy.

"The savings due to the decreased hospital stay are almost 50 percent," Baskin said. "As long as the degenerated disk area is removed, the recurrence rates are the same as the laminectomy.

Baskin says the technique also can be used for bone spurs caused by disk

Since the technique requires familiarity with the surgical microscope, people interested in microdiskectomy should contact orthopedic surgeons or neurosurgeons specifically trained in this technique," he said.




