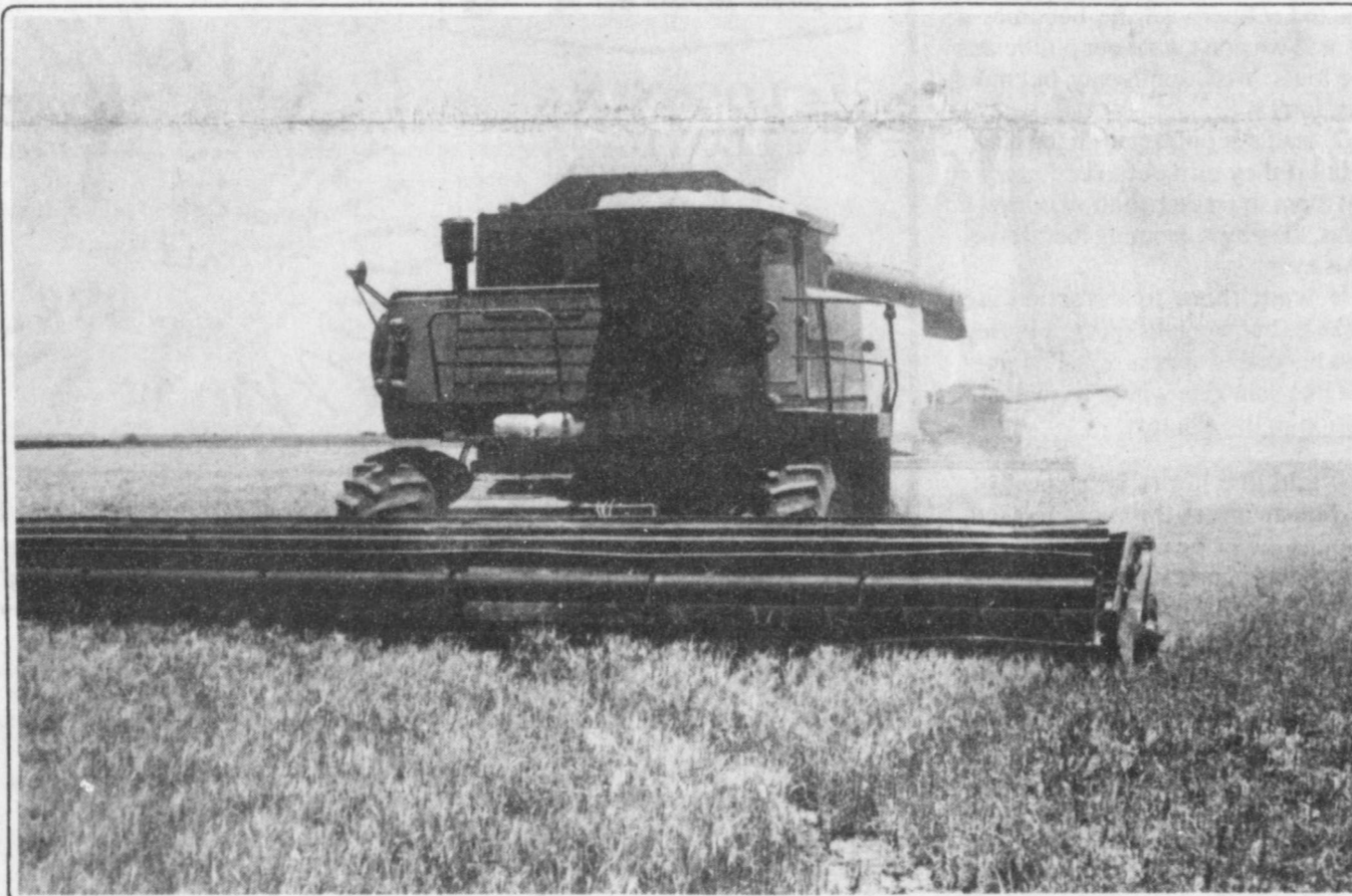

Extreme heat adds to drought misery

No rain and record breaking heat across the South Plains is not only creating large cracks in the ground, it is also cracking the spirit of cotton producers in the area.

With a year to date rainfall total, in Floydada, of 3.65 inches compared to last year's 14.02 inches, dryland cotton plants have not even broken ground in some areas.

Late germination of plants will also make cotton more susceptible to boll weevils.

Vegetable producers also worry over the state of gardens--many planted for the second time.

CRP acreage is also sitting idle waiting for rain to bring up the grass to compete with the weeds which are thriving happily in the drought.

As of Tuesday, the area had endured five straight days of record breaking temperatures, over 100 degrees.

Monday's high in Floydada reached 108-109 degrees. The high Tuesday was also 109 degrees.

A rainfall breakdown, courtesy of TCA Cablevision in Floydada, showed a vast difference in the monthly rainfall amounts since January.

Rainfall, by months, in 1997 was: January, .40; February, 2.07; March, .09; April, 5.08; May, 6.38; and in June, 3.92.

A June 19, 1997 Hesperian-Beacon front page story told of rain saturating the county and high winds damaging property, blowing down electric poles and overturning sprinkler systems.

This year, Cablevision records the following monthly rainfall total: January, 0; February, 1.65; March, 1.40; April, .40; and May, .20.

The consumption of water and electricity is putting a drain on the water supply and also on companies supplying electricity to city and county homes.

The electric consumption registered at Floydada Power & Light, April 15-May 15 was 1,222,099 kilowatts in 1998 compared to 1,092,197 in 1997.

In Floydada for the month of April 15-May 15, water consumption was 18,003,000 gallons of water compared to 10,688,000 gallons at the same time last year. The city will read meters again June 15 and the number is expected to rise even more.

In Lockney, for the same time period, residents used 8,371,000 gallons in 1998 compared to 5,684,000 gallons of water last year.

"Next month will be even worse," said Lockney City Secretary Charlotte Hooten. We won't know what kind of water we've been using these past two weeks in Lockney until we read the meters again June 15th.

Lockney Library looking to expand and improve

Membership drive begins for Library

LOCKNEY--The Lockney Library Associates have started a membership drive in order to make more space in the library and add much needed books and equipment.

The Lockney Library Associates were selected in September and a steering committee formed in October. To kick off the membership drive a letter was mailed to everyone in the Lockney area.

Dues for annual memberships are as follows: Student: \$2; Individual: \$10; Family: \$15; Sustaining: \$25; Life: \$100; Life Option: \$25 annually for 4 years; Contributor: \$500; Patron: \$1,000; Benefactor: \$5,000/\$10,000; Angel: Over \$10,000.

The library has some specific needs. Library books need updating and a

wider selection of children's books added to those on hand.

Also needed are computer tables and desks, shelving for books; tables and a current set of reference books.

Work is underway on the building in order to create an area for the children's summer reading program and a space for computers and tables.

The library is equipped with books and a computer in order for elementary students to work on the accelerated reading program.

The library is open Monday through Friday from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. except for Wednesday. The hours on Wednesday are from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Doylene Dipprey is the librarian.

The Library Associates meet on the 3rd Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at the library and anyone who is interested in seeing the library grow may join the group.

Grant money brings new surface for county road

LOCKNEY--The high amount of truck traffic to and from the Caprock Industries feed yard will now benefit from a new caliche road, courtesy of the Texas Highway Department.

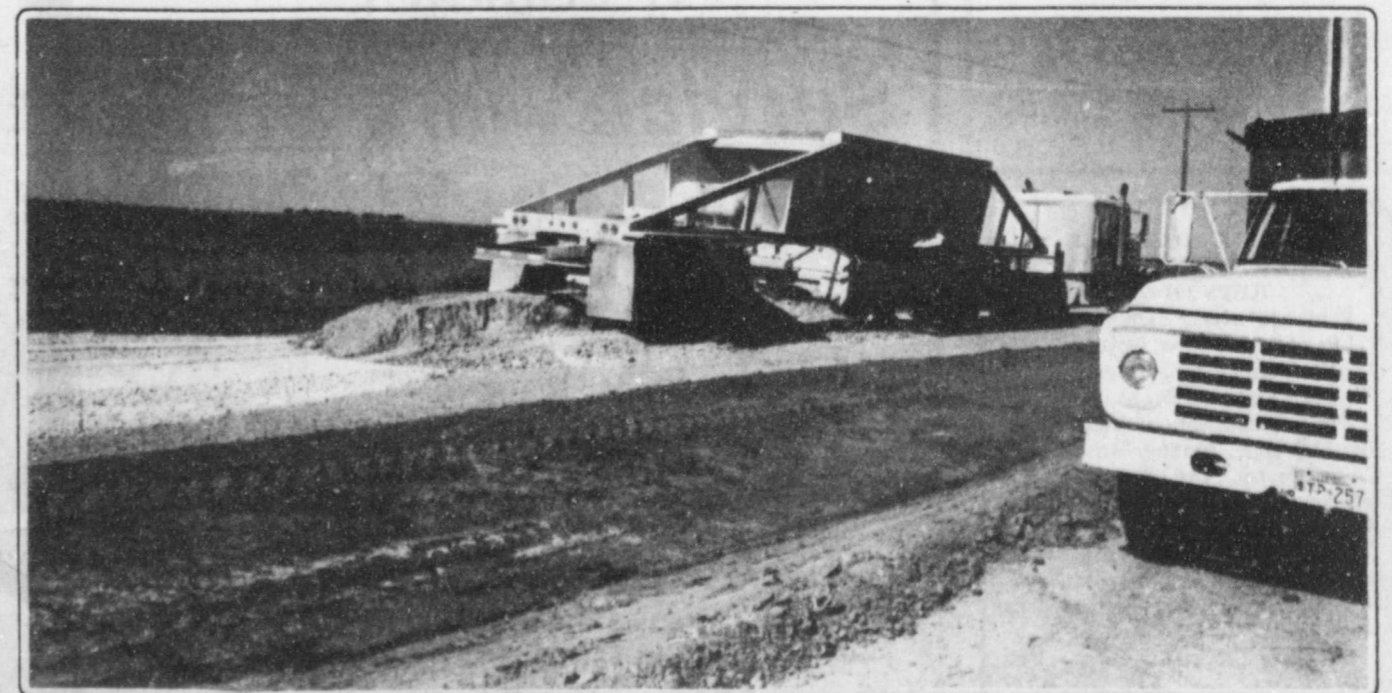
According to Pct. #2 Commissioner Lennie Gilroy, "The Texas Legislature required the Highway Department to

donate 14 million dollars worth of surplus road materials to be given to Texas counties for road improvement. I applied for the grant and received approximately \$40,000 worth of surplus materials."

According to Gilroy the majority of the material will be caliche which will

be placed on County Road 120 leading to Caprock Feed Yard off Hwy. 378.

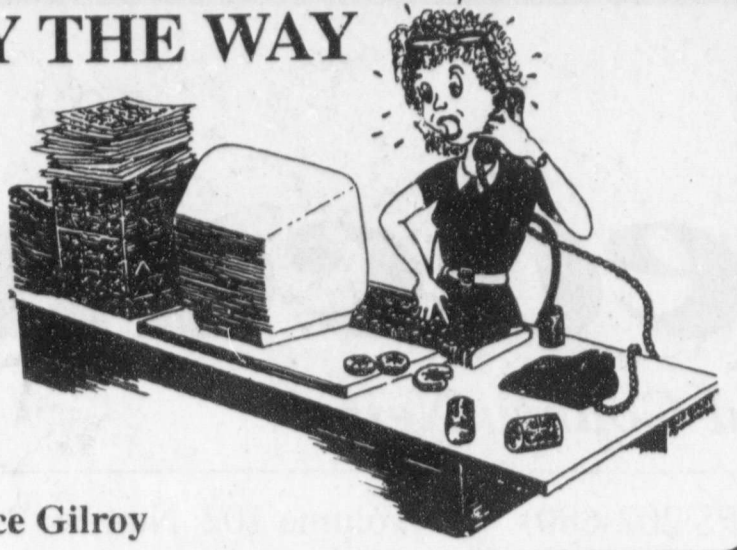
The remainder of the materials will be \$1,000 worth of black top patch which will be used to patch county roads in Pct. #2 not maintained by the State Highway Department.

Letter To The Editor

You have some serious problems that need to be corrected before the next annual Old Settlers Reunion. I would like to point out these problems so your Old Settlers Reunion can be enjoyed by the handicapped and elderly. After all the elderly are the ones that really enjoy this annual event.

1. When registering, a person in a wheelchair can not enter this office by themselves due to the fact that the front door has steps and the back door drop that one can not get out or in. This needs to be corrected.

2. The ramp on the east end of the covered concrete slab goes up on one side to go around the covered concrete slab and steps on the other side therefore you can not use the other side.

3. There are no bathrooms for the handicapped. The bathrooms on the east side of the court house can not be used by a handicapped person in a wheelchair.

4. The sidewalk on the east side of the court house can not be used by the handicapped or a person in a wheelchair because the Cedar Trees stick out so far.

5. The vendors were taking up the Handicapped Areas that were open to the south side of the court house. In fact I observed one lady that nearly

fell from trying to lift her leg high enough to cross the curb. St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church Vendor parked over the entire Handicapped opening. I was in a wheelchair and my husband could not get me over the curb due to the blocking of this area, this area was the area that opened to the buffet style serving. The second opening was blocked by the bleachers, then on the very southeast corner of the court house two dumpsters and cars blocked these openings therefore you had to go around the jail house to get on the sidewalk.

After all of these problems my husband was so tired from hunting an area to push the wheelchair thru and after nearly being dumped from my wheelchair when trying to cross the curb that St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church Vendor had blocked, we left as soon as we ate where we usually stay for all of the events. A little planning to show more consideration for the elderly and handicapped would be greatly appreciated.

I was born and raised in Floydada and my husband is also a native of Floyd County.

A view from **The Lamplighter**

How many times have we heard tv's talking heads puzzle, along with many of us, over how is it possible for the polls to indicate that a majority of Americans believe President Clinton is untruthful, not to be trusted, that they don't believe he is a proper "role model" for their children, yet continue to rate him highly in the "job approval" department.

Quite frankly, we don't think most of those responding to the "job approval" question have any idea exactly what the President's job is. Nevertheless, it is a more or less generic question used by pollsters in recent years, and is at least a standard for comparison from one month to the next. When broken down into specifics, the question usually elicits different answers.

America's judgement of its politicians, it seems to us, is about as confused and varied as our judgement of ourselves. This seems more noticeable during times when there is no overriding national danger, or potential danger, such as there was during those times, out people seem to have an instinct toward choosing national leaders who will rise to the task. When danger is past, we feel we can relax and play around with politics and government. Other considerations come to the fore.

Some want to look up to their politicians, but they don't want to look too far up, for that would place their politician in a position, they fear, of looking down on them. We've had a lot of that.

Some really want to look down on their politicians gaining a certain amount of satisfaction in the process. Indeed, given the way our electorate sometimes makes its decision, we are led to the belief that a goodly part of that particular electorate deliberately votes for the worst guy in the lot, simply to have at least one somebody in high position they can look down on.

We want our politicians to have been born in log cabins, but we don't want them to stay there.

We want them to be attractive to women, not *too* attractive. We want him (if it's a "he") attracted to women, rather than other "he's", but not too attracted. Otherwise, he becomes a lout, and we don't want our politicians to be louts. Well, some may, but most of us don't.

We want our politicians to be truthful, but if they turn out to be liars, we want them to lie on behalf of our own causes, thereby redeeming themselves in our eyes.

We want them to be articulate speakers, but we get skeptical if they are so good as to appear "slick," somewhat like someone whom we will not mention in this context.

All told, the life of an elected office holder is not the most relaxed, sanguine job in the country, considering the cross currents that bear upon the position. But, in Texas, once you get above the county level, at least the

pay is good, exceedingly good.

Speaking of county level office holders: We notice a small item tucked inside the Austin American-Statesman that says our Attorney General has delivered an opinion holding that members of the Texas Legislature may legally employ locally elected officials as members of their own staff. Unless the opinion is contested in the courts, it becomes law. Or, put another way, it becomes law until it is contested, if it is, and is overturned.

The opinion was requested by State Senator Rodney Ellis, of Houston, who is black, and who hired as a member of his staff, City Council member Shelly Davis, of Georgetown, some 175 miles west of Houston. We don't know, nor have we asked, nor do we care, how or why a City Council member in Georgetown, a rather small town, might have certain qualifications that make her appropriate choice to work with a Senator's constituents 175 miles away. Certainly she must have some unusual qualifications.

The AG says that's alright, but he notes that most locally elected officials will have to give up their local salary, if hired by a state legislator. But not elected county level officers, such as County Commissioners, who, a

court has held, don't fall in the category of "other local governmental districts" alluded to in the state Constitution. The Attorney General says the determining decision involving county officials was handed down in the case of *Maverick v. Ruiz*, 897 S.W. 2d 843, 847 (Tex App--San Antonio 1995, no writ)--in case any of our readers want to look it up.

Just out of curiosity, we checked with the association of county officials in Austin, and they don't know of any elected county official, either commissioner or judge, who's on the payroll of a state legislator. They don't keep those records, but it would be news to them.. (Still, even the AG's opinion was news to them.)

Perhaps nothing out of the ordinary will happen. But it seems to us like this ruling could open up a whole can of worms. Take South Texas, where county political machines are the norm, and political scruples have historically matched those of Old

Mexico. Some County Judge might decide he could use a little extra legal income, and the legislator might decide he could benefit from having someone on his staff who could influence the way local citizens vote. And have it all paid for by taxpayers. Stranger things have happened.

We don't know if it's a good law or a bad law. We have an uneasy feeling about it, since bad men can administer even good laws badly, just as good people can administer bad laws in such a way as to mitigate their most egregious aspects. The ideal route, according to the concept imbedded in our Constitution, is to have good people enact and administer good laws, but failing that, to have those who administer our laws bound down by the chains of the Constitution.

We would feel better about this if our Legislators looked it over the next chance they get. The subject needs a good deal of thought.

First Officers were Mrs. Ella B. Starks, Worthy Matron, Mrs. Opal

This group was set to work by R.W. Lemond of Hale Center, Texas.

The first petitioners were as follows: Mrs. D.E. Young, Mrs. E.E. Arnold, Mrs. L.P. McCleskey, Mrs. Ella Jenkins, Mrs. Belle Crabtree, Mrs. S.F. Huckabay, Mrs. Ella Williams, and Master Masons E.C. Henry, R.C. Andrews, R.C. Scott, James Bryant, S.A. McManis, John R. Kamer, J.Q. Johnson, C.H. Johnson and S.B. McCleskey.

November 9, 1933, the Grand Chapter granted the name change from Floyd City Chapter to Floydada Chapter No. 31 Order of the Eastern Star.

Sales tax rebates decrease in county

May 1998 sales tax rebates made to Floyd County cities from the state comptroller's office have been received, with both Floydada and Lockney showing a decrease for the month when compared to rebates for the same period in 1997.

Total rebates received in Floyd County this month were \$17,431.20, a decrease of 8.04 percent overall when compared to the \$18,955.79 received in May of 1997. The year to date total rebates received in Floyd County are \$77,513.29, an overall increase of 3.93 percent from the \$74,581.54 received to date in 1997.

Lockney displayed a decrease of 20.87 percent over the same period for 1997 in over all receipts. The city's May check was in the amount of \$4,854.08 compared to \$6,134.93 received in 1997. Total Lockney rebates to date in 1998 are \$23,244.61 or 3.11 percent more than total rebates of \$22,542.54 at this time in 1997.

Floydada's check from the state comptroller's office was in the amount of \$12,577.14 showing a decrease of 1.90 percent from the \$12,820.86 payment received in May 1997. Total re-

bates for the year now stand at \$54,268.68 compared to \$52,038.92 received at this time last year. This represents an overall 4.28 percent increase.

Current Situation**

Weather conditions have remained hot and dry with record breaking highs the last four days. Temperatures reached 107 degrees on Monday June 1st.

Field Scouts

We have hired three field scouts for this summer. They are Brandon Covington of Lockney, Zack McGaughy of McAdoo, and Nathan Hindman of Crosbyton. These young men are all new to field scouting, but are learning quickly. The good news is that they came back to work this morning after walking all day yesterday in the heat.

Thrips

Thrips are still of concern in young cotton that has less than 4 true leaves. While older cotton may experience some feeding damage, it should grow out of it with the warm days we are experiencing, provided there is sufficient moisture. If however thrips are exceeding one per true leaf, and cotton is moisture stressed or has received sand and wind injury, treatment may be justified.

Boll Weevil

Boll weevil activity has dropped off in most areas over the past week. However, Crosby County Grid traps and Calgary traps are up this week. Slowed cotton growth and late planted dryland acreage will delay available food sources and may help alleviate problems caused by overwintered boll weevils.

Boll Weevil colonization in cotton is closely related to the fruiting of cotton and some of our early cotton is nearing that stage. So we will go over early-season boll weevil control again.

The need for insecticide applications to suppress overwintered boll weevils can be determined by 1) Pheromone trap collections and the Trap Index; 2) Field Inspection Method; or 3) a combination of both methods.

Boll weevil pheromone traps should already be in place along field margins. For fields up to 100 acres in size use a minimum of 3 to 4 traps. Pheromone traps should be in operation several weeks before the first squares appear in cotton. The treatment decision is based on the "Trap Index" (Table 1) and scouting information. Inspect traps weekly and determine the average number of weevils caught per trap each week that the first

squares (pinhead to matchhead size) appear. This will be the Trap Index. The number of weevils captured in traps prior to and during early squaring indicates the size of the overwintering population and the need for one or more insecticide application.

Pheromone trap data may not be reliable after 25% or more of the cotton in an area has begun to square or after 1/3 grown squares are present in a field around which the traps are located.

Field inspection method. Fields should be observed very closely when pinhead size squares begin to appear. Inspect at least 100 plants for adult boll weevils. If one or more weevils are found per 100 plants checked or four weevils per 100 feet of row monitored (about 530 weevils per acre) in cotton which was planted after mid-May, apply insecticide just prior to or when first squares reach 1/3 grown stage. If field or trap inspections indicate that weevils are still entering the field following the first insecticide application, an additional one or two applications may be needed at 5 day intervals. Application should be terminated as soon as possible after the first 1/3-grown square stage to allow beneficial insects and spiders time to

re-establish.

The selection of an insecticide and rate for overwintered boll weevil control can be important in minimizing both the reduction of developing populations of beneficial arthropods and the development of secondary pests. Vydate and Phasor/Thiodan are insecticides purportedly less harmful to beneficial arthropods and appear less likely to increase secondary pest problems. Other insecticides labeled for boll weevil control include: Guthion 2L, Methyl Parathion 4E, Malathion 91%, and Pennac M 2F.

Trap Index System for Determining Need for Overwintered Boll Weevil Control:

1. One or fewer weevils per trap per week.---Do not treat.

2. More than one but fewer than two weevils per trap per week.---Treatment may or may not be justified. Do not treat unless field inspection at pinhead to 1/3-grown square stage indicates presence of a damaging weevil infestation (see field inspection method) or unless trap catches the week prior to pinhead square exceeds 10.

3. More than two weevils per trap per week.---Treatment is probably justified.

Dryland cotton goes in the ground with no moisture

From the looks of things around the Texas High Plains it appears that the majority of the 1.5 million acres of dryland cotton normally planted in the area will go in the ground without the benefit of adequate planting moisture.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. notes that this opens the door to possibly

record abandonment in the area unless significant amounts of rainfall are received in short order.

Growers now must decide whether to go ahead and dry plant or wait for the 1.5 to 2 inches of rainfall necessary to adequately wet the upper 10-12 inches of the soil profile.

For growers with Federal Crop Insurance the difference between dry planting and exercising the 45 percent prevented planting provision in their insurance policies is not a hard one to make.

Cotton is still suffering from a tremendous inequity in prevented planting coverage compared to most other crops. PCG and other national and state organizations have been work-

ing to correct these inequities but the battle is far from over.

If a grower were to exercise the prevented planting provisions FCIC has in place for cotton, they would only receive 45 percent of the coverage they paid for in their insurance policy. Compared to the 60 percent prevented planting provision for most grain crops, the inequity for cotton is easy to spot.

In addition, cotton producers making a prevented planting claim are bound by the FCIC's "black dirt policy" and are prevented from planting a follow-up crop for the remainder of the crop year.

If cotton producers exercise the prevented planting option they are essen-

tially locked out of any opportunity to take advantage of later rains and produce a secondary crop that might allow them to salvage an otherwise unprofitable growing season.


