A STATEWIDE COMMITTEE has selected 41 nominees for a list of the most important Texans of all time, and those 41 will be trimmed to 25 by the Texas State Historical Association.

Nominees must have been residents of Texas, their effect on Texas had to come before 1970, and no living Texan could be nominated.

The 41 Texans nominated include Stephen F. Austin, Eugene C. Barker, Gail Borden, James Bowie, George W. Brackenridge, Rufus Burleson, Amon Carter, Will Clayton, Henry Cohen, Tom Connally, N.W. Cuney, J. Frank Dobie, Clara Driscoll, John Nance Garner, William Goyen, Karl Hoblitzelle, Ima Hogg, James S. Hogg, E.M. House, Sam Houston and Lyndon B. Johnson.

Also Anson Jones, Jesse Jones, Mirabeau B. Lamar, G.W. Littlefield, Jose A. Navarro, Elisabet Ney, Chester W. Nimitz, William Sydney Porter, Sam Rayburn, John M. Reagan, Sid Richardson, Thomas J. Rusk, Morris Sheppard, Ashbel Smith, Heman Sweatt, William B. Travis, Walter Prescott Webb, Gil Ybarbo, Lorenzo de Zavala and Babe Didrickson Zaharias.

The 25 most important Texans chosen by the historical association from the list of 41 will be announced June 1.

Dr. Lewis Gould, professor of American history at the University of Texas and chairman of the committee that chose the 41 nominees said: "We are trying to determine the most important Texans, not the brightest or the most beautiful."

Biographical sketches of the 25 Texans will be published in the 1986 edition of the Texas Almanac.

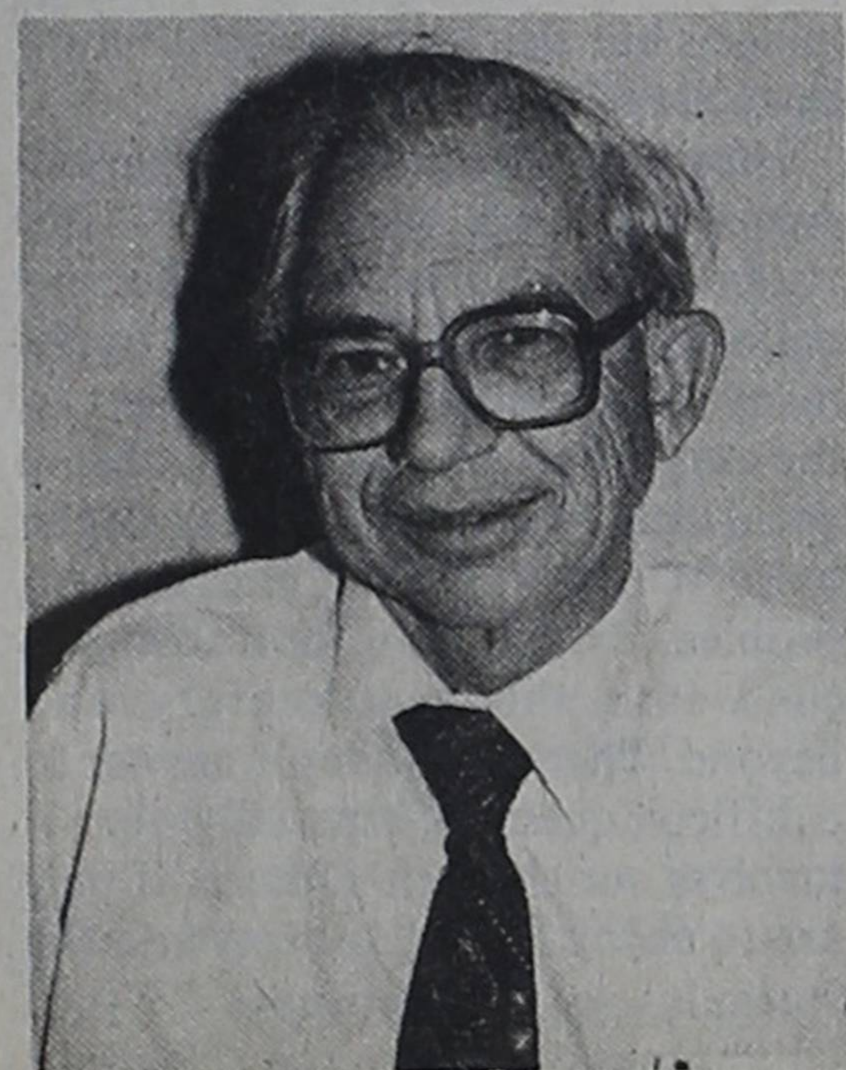

Hugh Moseley has authorized the Friona Star to announce his candidacy for re-election as Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector, subject to the Democratic Primary in May.

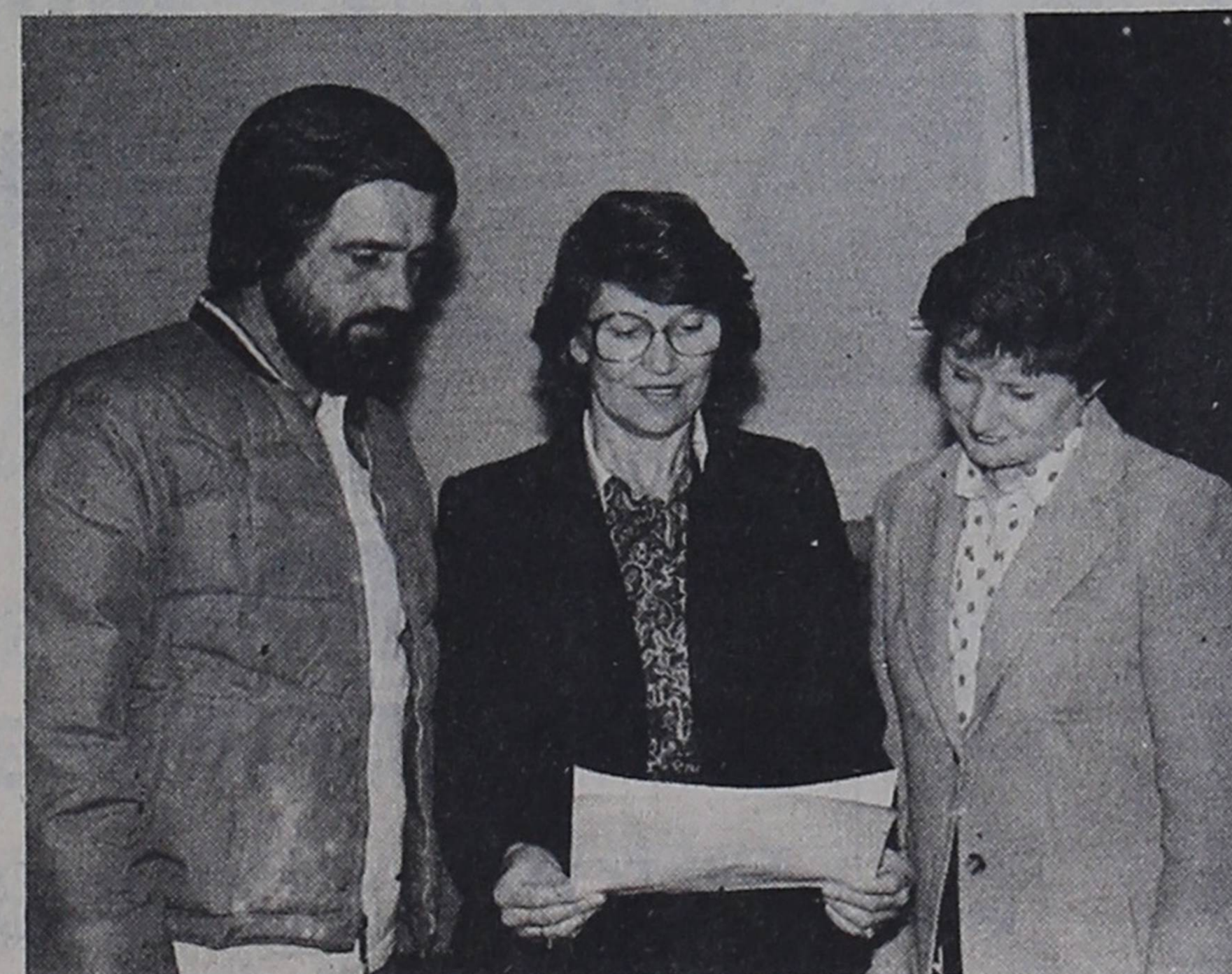
Moseley, a native of Parmer County, has served in that capacity since 1963.

He is a member of the Assessor-Collectors Association of Texas and also is a Registered Texas Assessor.

Moseley is a member of the Methodist Church, the Masonic Lodge and the Rotary Club. He is a graduate of Texas Tech, and is chairman of the Parmer County Historical Association. As a member of the historical group, Moseley has helped compile the two Parmer County history books.

He and his wife, Wilma are parents of a son, David, a junior high student at Farwell.

"If elected, I will be a full-time tax assessor-collector. I promise to give friendly, courteous service to everyone at all times. I will do my best to follow state laws and regulations pertaining to the property tax, and the automobile registration and title procedures," Moseley said.

Motion was approved for the county to subscribe to the update service for "Information Guide to County Government," in the amount of \$60.00.

A request had been received for right-of-way easement to run an electric line along the side of proposed Farm to Market Road 3333 to get power to the railroad to operate the gates and lights being installed. Request was unanimously approved.

Notation was made as to the inspection and approval of the county jail for temporary detention of juveniles.

At the suggestion of the county treasurer, a motion was approved to reinvest funds from certificates of deposit maturing February 14, 1984 as follows: \$200,000 in Farm to Market funds and \$150,000 of General Fund moneys to mature February 29, 1984.

These funds are reinvested every two weeks so they will earn interest and still be available if needed quickly without receiving an interest penalty.

The county is faced with buying the present telephone equipment now in place or replace it with new equipment. Since touch-tone telephones are thought to be much better 'phones, it was voted to replace the system with this type of equipment at a cost of \$1,700.00.

Soil Conservation work was approved, subject to availability of county machinery, at the farms of Jim Roy Wells, Rickey Rector, Dickie Steelman, Oakley Stevenson, Sheets & Sheets, Richard Haseloff, Bert Williams, Mitch Walling and Preston Cargile.

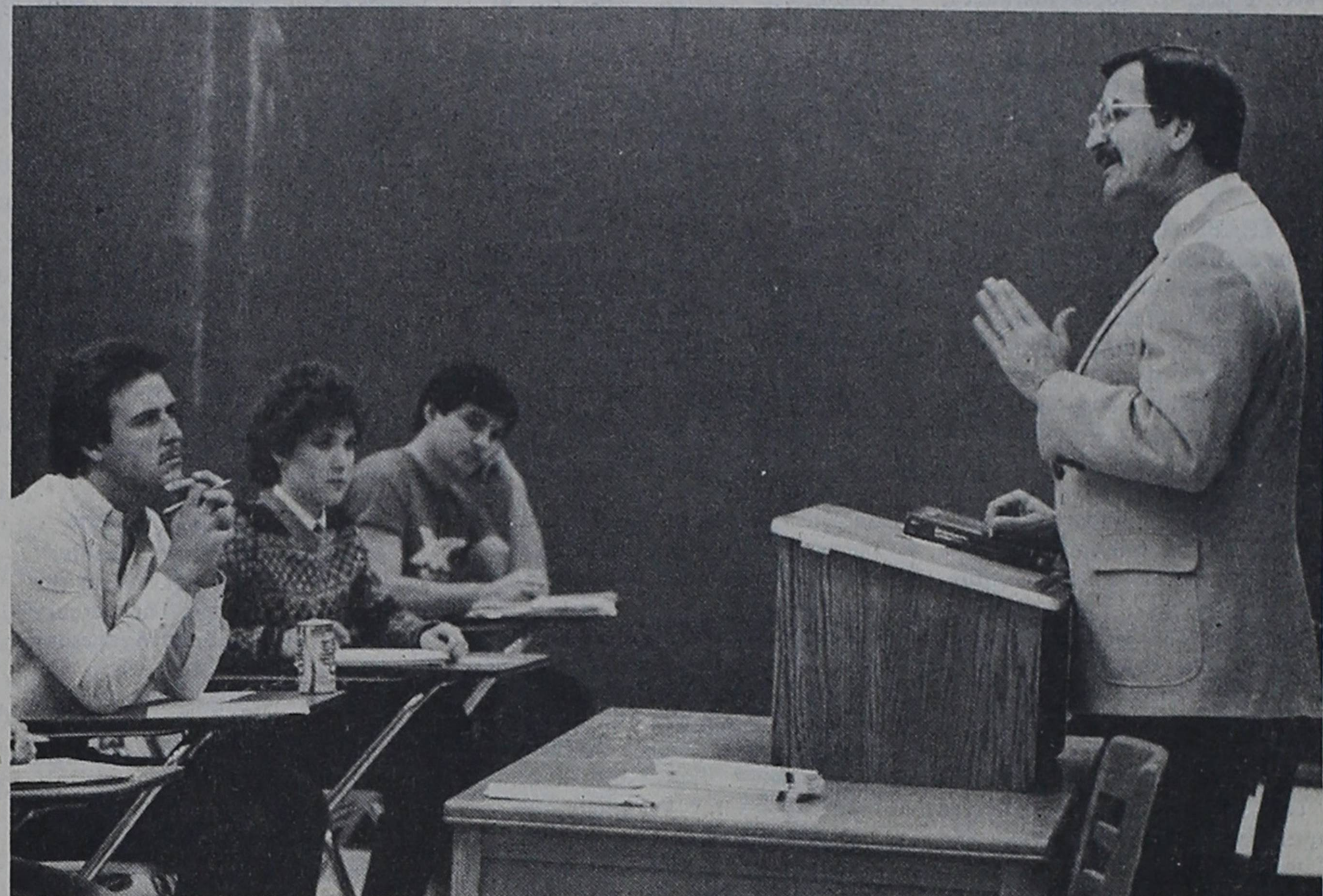
The county is reimbursed for the expenses involved in the work.

The board passed the official order and notice for the school trustee election, to be held on Saturday, April 7. Terms of Philip Weatherly and Pat Fleming are expiring.

As of Thursday, three people: Pat Fleming, Roger Wilcox and Becky Riethmayer have filed as candidates. Filing continues through March 7.

New two-year contracts were extended to James Warren, administrative assistant; Hal Ratcliff, high school principal; Cecil Maddox, junior high principal, Freeman Melton, elementary principal; B.E. Duggins, director of counseling and

Three Spots Expire On City Board

The filing period has begun for the Friona City Council positions. Terms expiring are those of the mayor, and two councilmen.

Clarence Monroe was appointed last year to fill out the unexpired term of Wright Williams as mayor. The two council seats expiring belong to Mike Chaney and Carl White. White was appointed to take Monroe's place on the council.

As of Thursday, no one has filed for any of the three positions.

Holdover members of the council will be Beth Thompson, Jack Hamill and Dr. Jon Mack Roden.

Deadline for filing will be Wednesday, February 23. Election will be held Saturday, April 7, in conjunction with the school board election.

United Way Makes Goal; Report Given

Friona's United Way board of directors met Thursday at Friona State Bank, for a wrap-up report on the 1983 campaign, and to disburse checks to the agencies which benefit from the drive.

Archie Echols and Kathryn Goddard reported that the drive raised 101 per cent of its 1983 goal.

"I want to thank everyone who worked on the drive. It could not be accomplished without everyone's help," Echols said.

In the final analysis, a total of \$12,596.41 was raised. While this was 1.1 per cent over the goal of \$12,460, there were \$485.00 in donations for designated agencies. All agencies received at least 97 per cent of their budget requests, while some received over 100 per cent, due to the special checks.

In the election of directors, Charles Allen, Raymond Cook, John Blackwell and Marca Lynn Herring were re-elected to the board. New members elected were the 1983 drive co-chairman, Echols and Mrs. Goddard.

Lois Norwood was re-elected as board president; Carl White was named vice president, and Larry Knowles was named treasurer.

55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 15, 1929

The recent cold snap has given grief to quite a number of Friona folks on account of freezing water in their water pipes. In some instances, families were cut off entirely from their water supply for a few days but without any serious expense, while in other cases considerable damage was done and expense incurred by the bursting of pipes.

50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1934

The corn and hog meeting held at the school building Tuesday night was well attended, under the supervision of county agent A.R. Bateman. Contracts were made available, providing hog raisers a sum of ready money on the number of hogs produced during 1932 and 1933. The Friona Chiefs won the Parmer County round-robin tournament last week in Bovina, downing Farwell in the finals in an extra period. Loflin, Mans, Livings, Boatman and Cummings were the Friona players. Three Crume brothers, Walling, Moore and Loveless represented Farwell.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1944

Carl Maurer has just received approval of the Army, Navy and Civil Aeronautics Authority for the designation of an airport at Friona. C.J. Dorris of Amarillo has been

secured as a flight instructor.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1954

A community auction has been announced by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for February 20, as the latest in the planned activities for 1954. A similar auction will be held each third Saturday in the month. A fund drive was officially launched on Monday evening to expand Parmer County Community Hospital. Dr. Paul Spring outlined the pressing expansion needs. Pete Buske, board chairman, presided at the meeting.

20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 13, 1964

A bookmobile from the Texas State Library will make stops in Parmer County for the first time on Saturday, giving residents a look at the new service which will be offered on a regular schedule beginning in the near future. The Friona High School Squaws have won 24 straight games this year but still must defeat Olton Friday night to clinch the district championship. A loss would give Olton a tie.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Among the many questions facing today's American citizens, two are paramount: the enormity of the proposed federal budget and the quality of education our children are receiving. Although the two are seldom mentioned in the same breath they are more closely linked than many realize.

The burden of the budget is too great for the present work force to erase; therefore, it must fall on coming generations to eliminate or reduce it. We must not confuse this single year budget with the national debt--the result of past generations of political mismanagement.

The mature American of today is probably better educated and, due to the excellence of the media, more informed than any preceding it; nevertheless we find ourselves bogged down in a financial swamp. This condition exists in spite of the fact that more dollars have been expended toward learning during the past forty years than ever before in our history. Authorities now agree that Daddy's taxes alone cannot be transfused into Jr's. head and result in his becoming educated. It takes more than money.

Still Jr. and his peers must be prepared to not only balance coming budgets but also learn to avoid future financial crises.

How well are they being prepared? According to a recent state-wide study--very poorly. Of course, the majority of politicians and, sad to say many school people, want to resort to the easy, short term solution--throw good money after bad. That might help if we faced a short term problem, but we must look down the road into the next century and beyond. There is no simple answer to a difficult question; especially when it involves our children's future. If they are to enjoy "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness" (not "happiness"--but the Pursuit thereof) then we must see that they are equipped to deal with their problems as well as the ones we bequeath them, a sad legacy indeed.

My personal knowledge of primary and secondary schools is limited to the Texas Panhandle. Of institutions of higher learning I have but a "speaking acquaintance," but will hazard a guess that similar problems exist in those modern buildings where no single leaf of ivy would dare to sprout.

The afore mentioned study suggested that parents become more involved in the student's welfare. Excellent, but there are many sincere parents who have been out of school a few years and who cannot be of much help with today's home work. There is an area wherein they can make a very valuable contribution. Discipline must be maintained if the teacher is to teach and the pupils learn. Good manners begin at home long before the child starts school. There is a related problem--too many parents belong to the "My Child Can Do No Wrong Club."

Enforced discipline can save each teacher at least ten minutes per class. Multiply that by six classes and you have that extra hour per day some short sighted "experts" advocate.

Teachers are hired to teach, not to be burdened with routine paperwork that could be done by a lesser paid clerk.

Time consuming programs, social, athletic or alleged study halls must be reviewed.

In many smaller towns, the school system represents the area's largest financial investment as well as being the county's biggest employer.

There are probably other areas where education can be improved without new buildings, more teachers or begging Uncle Sam to contribute more money and going deeper into debt.

Obtaining an education is neither cheap nor easy. Today, more than ever before, it is a vital necessity, our country's future well being hangs in the balance.

The debt we owe our children is far greater than anything we will ever owe to our government.

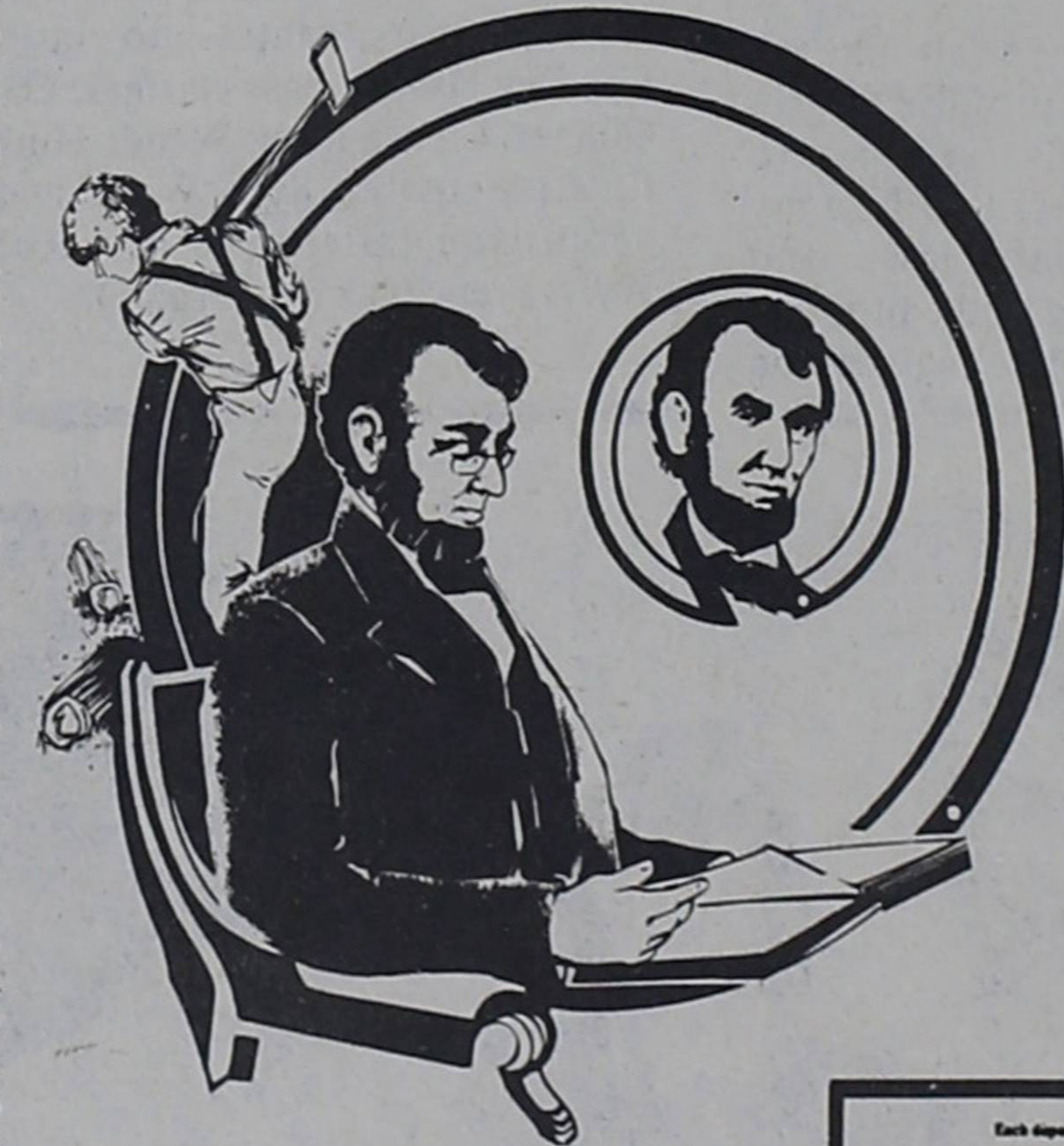

County Jail Is State Certified

The Parmer County Jail received its annual certification from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards this month, according to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Joe Slater of the Commission performed the inspection on February 8, and gave the approval.

The jail was first certified in 1980, when Morgan worked with Slater, to overcome shortcomings found in the inspection at that time.

When the Parmer County jail was certified in 1980, it was the first facility in this area to be approved, following the enforcement of new, tougher jail standards on the state level.

This makes the fifth consecutive

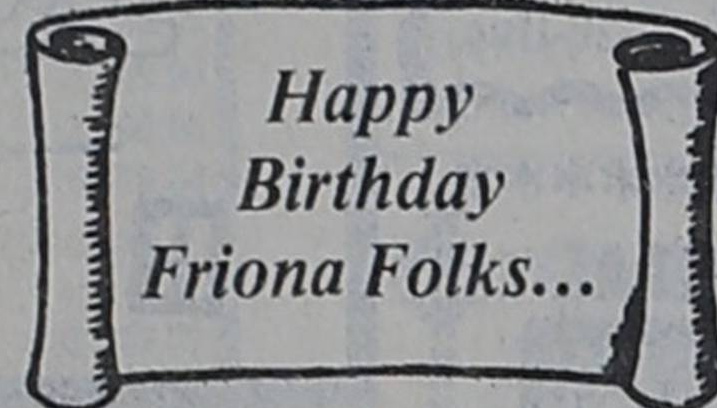
year for the jail to be certified. In the event that certification is denied, a jail can be closed.

With the completion of Randall County's new jail facility recently, the Parmer County jail lost some "boarders." The Parmer County jail has been one of the area institutions used by Randall county to house its prisoners while its jail was being completed.

This has been going on for about two years, with Randall County paying Parmer County a set fee of \$20 per day per inmate. There were five Randall County prisoners transferred to Canyon last weekend as their new jail was put into use.

Winter Maintenance

In most areas of the country, winter is NOT a fun time to work on a car. Often the only time an individual looks under the hood of their car is to find out what's gone wrong.

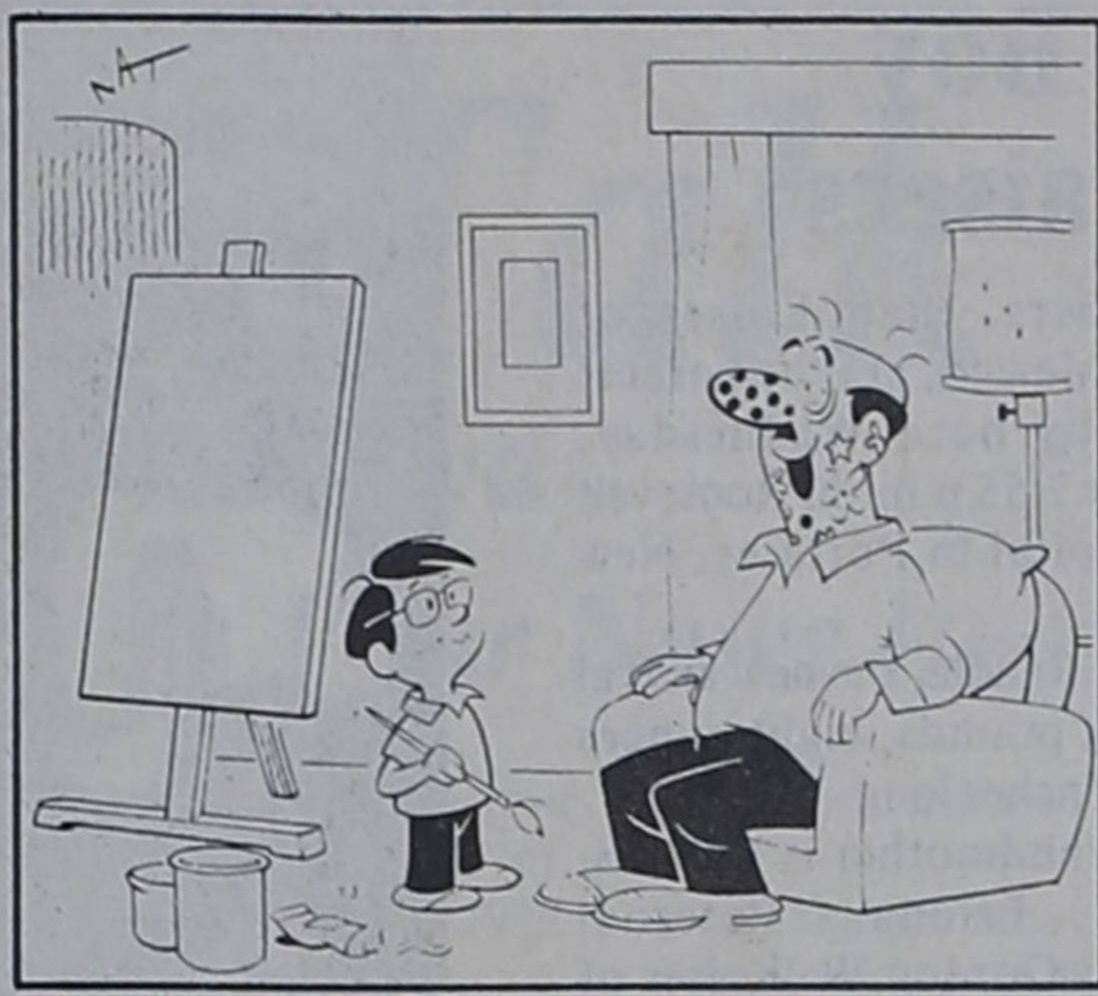

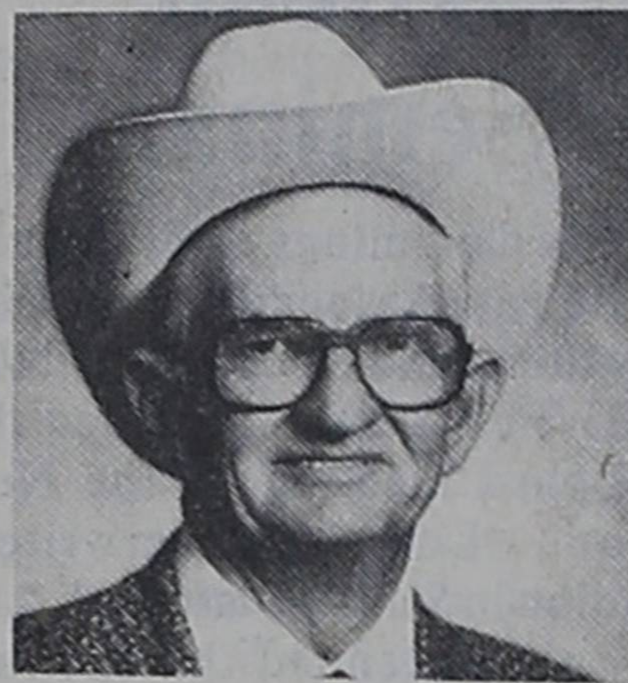

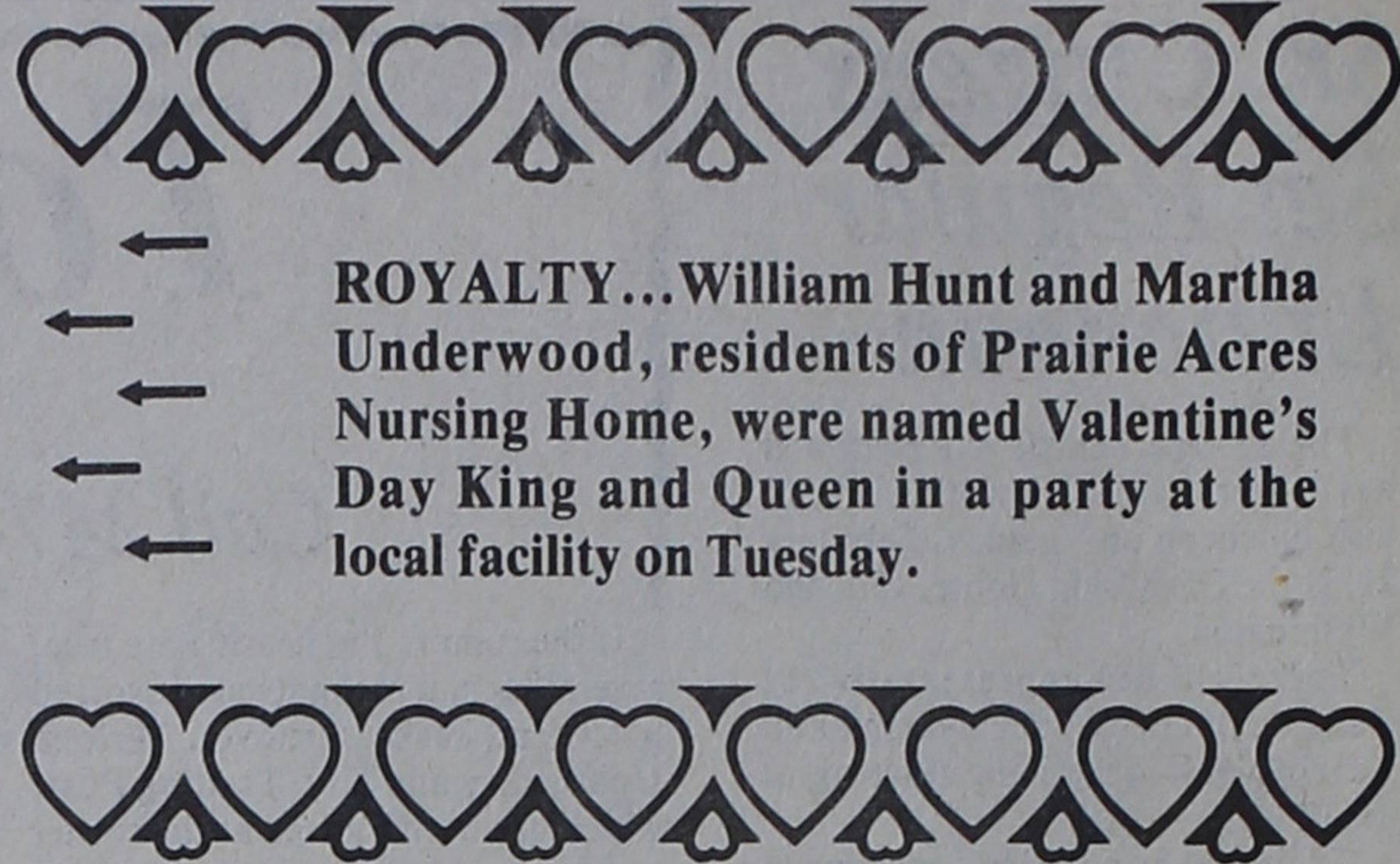
Burial was in Littlefield Memorial Park.

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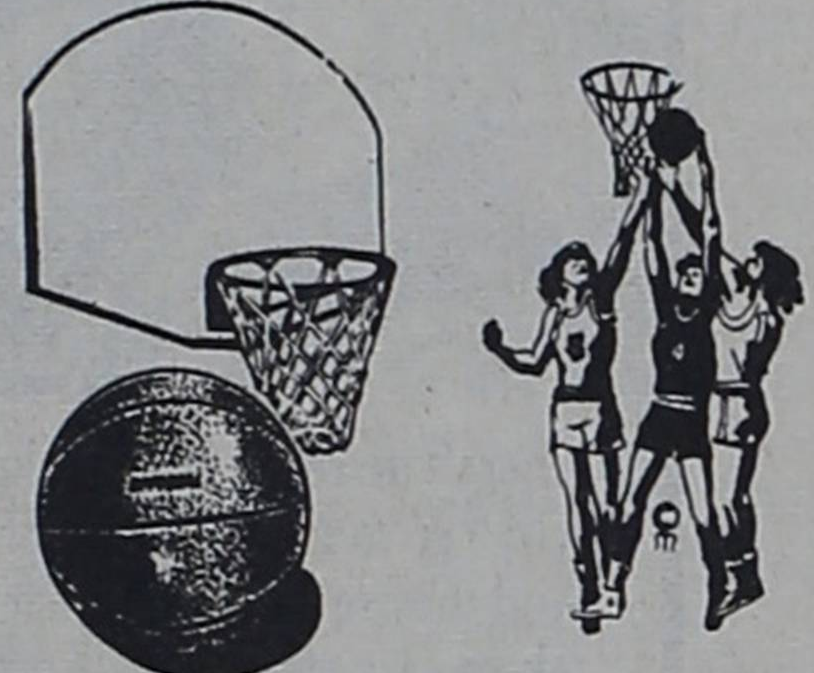
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Chiefs Tumble In Cage Games

Big Ed Teal (21) of the Antelopes scored 26 points.

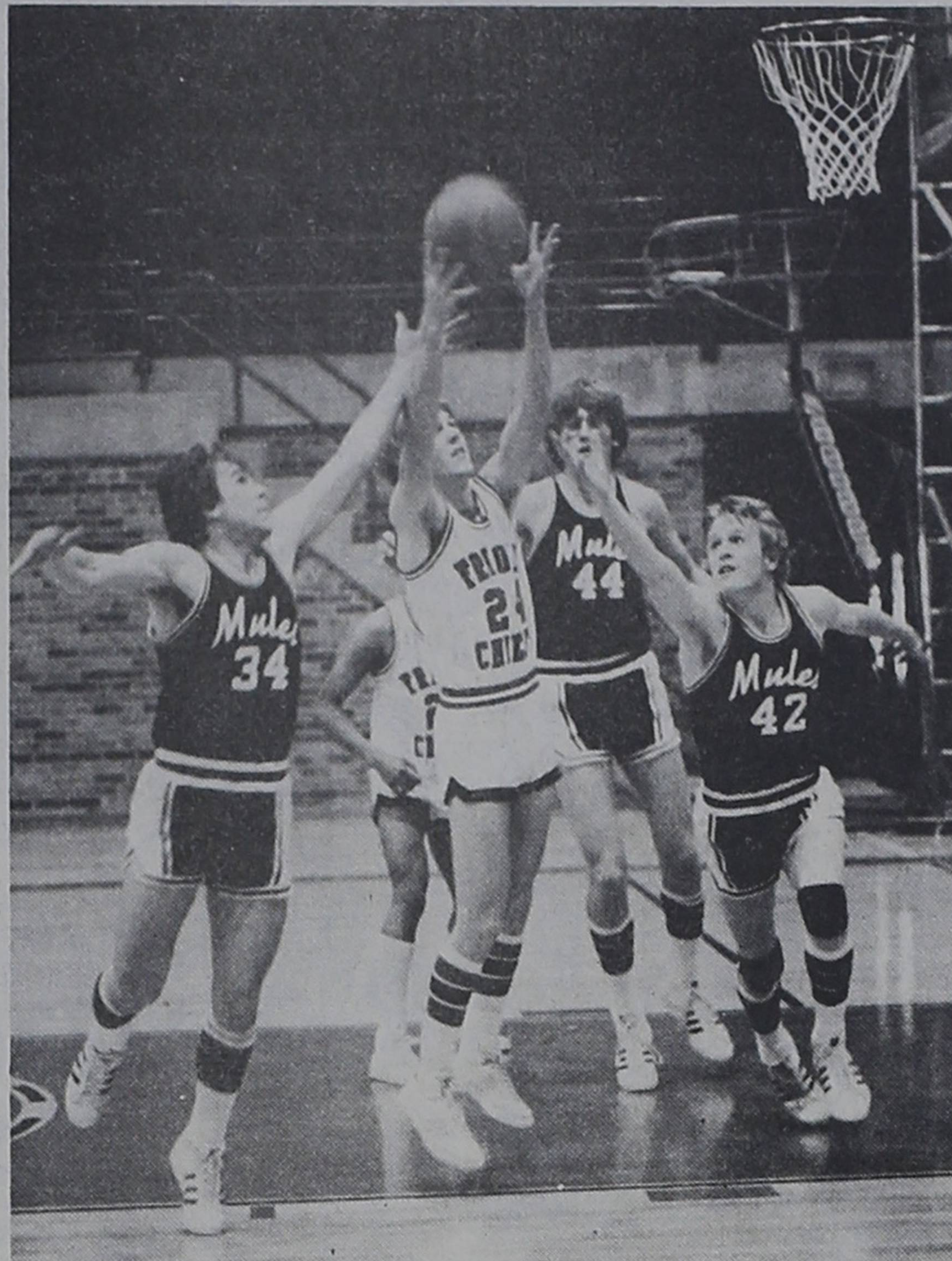
Final score was Abernathy 96, Friona 63. The Chiefs finished with nine wins against 19 losses for the season.
