Floyd County supports Republican candidates

of the State of Texas in lending the challenger Mark Harmon received majority of their support to Republican candidates.

Registered voters in the county number 4,625. Of those registered, only 1,763 voted--or 32%.

The only contested race in which a Democrat was elected by local voters Bush was reelected. Bush received was in the race for State Representative, District 85. Incumbent Democrat Pete Laney won easily in Floyd County with a final tally of 1,238 votes. His challenger, Hollis Cain received 433.

Uncontested Democrats elected locally were: District Judge Randy Hollums, 1273; County Judge Bill Hardin, 1282; District Clerk Barbara Edwards, 1333; County Clerk Marilyn Holcomb, 1309; County Treasurer Mary Shurbet, 1307; Justice of the Peace, Pct. #1 & #4 Tim Burge, 713; and Justice of the Peace, Pct. #2 & #3 Carolyn Jackson, 571.

Local Republicans running uncontested races were: Commissioner Pct. #2 Lennie Gilroy, 384 votes; and Commissioner Pct. #4 Jon Jones, 197

The top vote getter in the county was incumbent State Representative

Floyd County voters joined the rest Mac Thornberry, with 1,381 votes. His 380 votes.

Incumbent State Senator Tom Havwood was returned to office with 1,044 votes against Democrat challenger Greg Underwood's tally of 495. In the Governor's race, Gov. George 1,366 local votes, and his challenger Garry Mauro garnered only 342 votes.

County voters also gave their nod to Rick Perry for Lieutenant Governor. He received local votes of 973. against John Sharp's 710 votes.

Perry was elected statewide in a close race making him the first Republican Lt. Governor in a century.

Local voters picked John Cornyn for Attorney General with 880 votes against Jim Mattox's 754 votes.

Susan Combs was elected Agriculture Commissioner with 911 votes to Democrat Pete Patterson's 669 votes. The Land Commissioner race

showed Republican David Dewhurst with a solid win of 1,045 votes to challenger Richard Raymond's 501 votes.



Coping With the Holidays

Some of us dread the holidays because of negative experiences or memories of the past. Some of us cope by taking pills, drinking, eating or buying excessively. That may not be the best thing to do. I've listed some other things that may help with those holiday blues.

1. Find a place to belong: Get some support from someone or a group. It's easy to feel you are the only one until you get around to others. A church, a Sunday School class, civic clubs or organizations, etc.

2. Give your self-esteem a shot in the arm: It's easy to feel bad about the unpleasant experiences that you remember, especially if they have been pretty much out of control. That can give a helpless and often, worthless feeling. I heard of a guy who uses the departing statement, "Be good to your self." You can be good to yourself by recognizing that you are worth something, that you have things you can do and offer.

3. Plan something special: It may be easy to not do anything but you will be better off if something can be

done to make the holiday a little special. It may be something completely different than you've done in the past - a different food, decoration, or custom. That may help the bad memories and start some new, different

4. Do your best to not focus on "What used to be" - but on what is now!: Focusing on "what use to be" can bring back a great deal of pain and may cloud what good things are around you today. Focusing on "what is now", helps us be able to so something with what we have and gives us more control over things.

5. Do something for others: Find someone who may be in the same boat you are in. Things may be worse for them, in some way. Make a phone call, send a card, write them a quick note, do a good deed.
