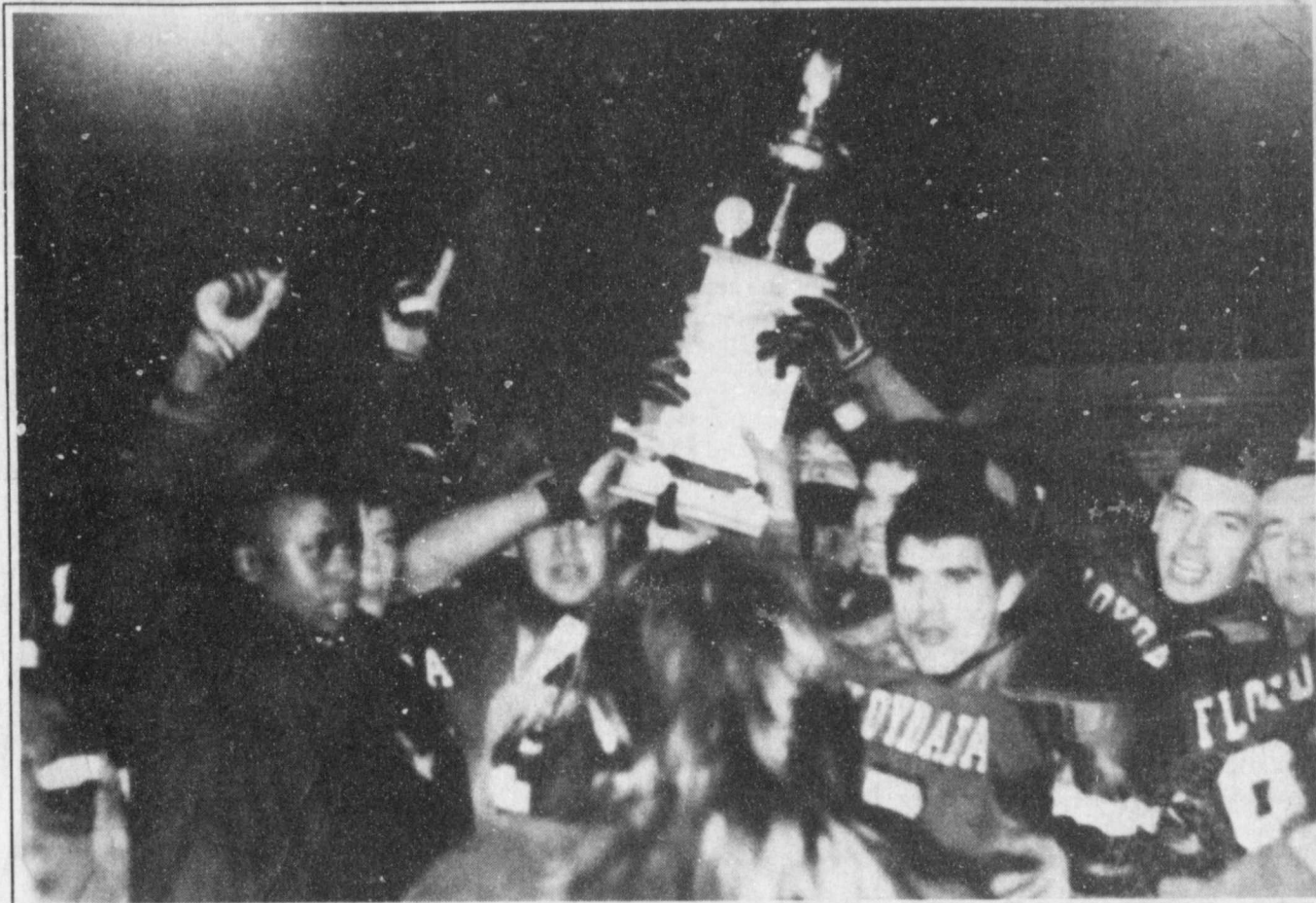

Whirlwinds regain county championship title



COUNTY CHAMPIONS--After a three year dry spell the Floydada Whirlwinds reclaimed their title as Floyd County Champions, Friday night, November 6, in a rival match against the Lockney Longhorns. The game, played at Wester Field in Floydada, ended with a score of 20-7. Both teams and fans battled rain and cold temperatures.

Floydada spotted Lockney a first-quarter touchdown before rallying for 20 unanswered points to defeat the Longhorns 20-7 at Wester Field last week. The Whirlwinds had already been assured a berth in the playoffs, but Lockney needed a victory to remain in post-season consideration. Appearing in the playoffs for the first time since 1993, the Whirlwinds (7-3 for the year and 4-1 in District 7-2A action) enter the 32-team, Class 2A Division I bracket, and will travel to Tuscola Jim Ned for a Bi-District clash tomorrow night. The Jim Ned Indians finished with a 6-4 mark for the season and a 3-2 record in District 8-2A. It will be the first head-to-head meeting between the two schools in any sport.

The annual Floyd County Championship, dating back to 1925, was anything but pleasant for players and fans alike. However, the steady, chilling drizzle did nothing to dampen the spirits of the 3000-plus hardy spectators as they were treated to another thrilling chapter of one of the oldest rivalries in Texas schoolboy football.

Although Floydada attempted to receive the opening kickoff, Josh Quebe alertly recovered the loose ball to put the Longhorns in command at

the outset. Lockney started their opening drive at the Whirlwinds' 36-yard line, but the Longhorns' early threat stalled and Floydada took over on downs at its own 15.

The Whirlwinds kept it on the ground during their initial offensive series, with Justin McGuire getting the call on six consecutive plays. Justin broke into the clear for an apparent 59-yard touchdown on the fifth snap, but the play was nullified by a holding penalty (one of three such penalties assessed against the 'Winds in the first half). Following a Floydada punt, the Longhorns mounted their only scoring drive of the evening.

Taurean McDonald, Calvin Collins and Jordan Lambert moved the ball consistently downfield for 70 yards in 7 plays. McDonald carried the final 43 yards to the Floydada endzone on a sweep down the east sidelines. Thad Lusk added the kick to put the Longhorns up 7-0 with 2:38 remaining in the opening period. Neither team was able to put together a sustained drive for most of the second quarter.

Late in the quarter, Floydada's Artemio Diaz spilled McDonald for a 10-yard loss. Following a major Longhorn penalty and a short punt, the Whirlwinds set up shop at their own 41 with 2:41 remaining before inter-

mission. A 42-yard Cody Stovall-to-Dusty Duke pass and a short McGuire run moved the 'Winds to Lockney's 12. Longhorn Jordan Lambert slipped through to upend Clay Horn on a reverse attempt. The 5-yard Floydada loss was not that significant as far as the Whirlwinds were concerned, but the play turned out to have a big impact on Lockney. Lambert, the Longhorns' starting quarterback, safety and punter, sustained a knee injury on the play and was lost for the remainder of the game.

Lockney's defense pushed Floydada back to a 3rd-and-long situation at the 18, but the Longhorns were flagged for pass interference on the next play to give the Whirlwinds new life at the Lockney 3. Following a sack by Longhorn Chris Ascencio and a fake field goal (in which Stovall was penalized for an illegal forward pass), Floydada was down to one play at Lockney's 13 with six seconds remaining in the half. McGuire took the option pitch from Stovall, broke at least three tackles and carried two Longhorns the final three yards with him into the endzone as the halftime horn sounded. Gabriel Rodriguez's conversion kick was ruled "wide right", and the Longhorns held the upper hand 7-6 at in-

LOCKNEY--The Lockney City Council met November 10 in regular session. A letter of resignation from Councilmember Connie Duenas was read.

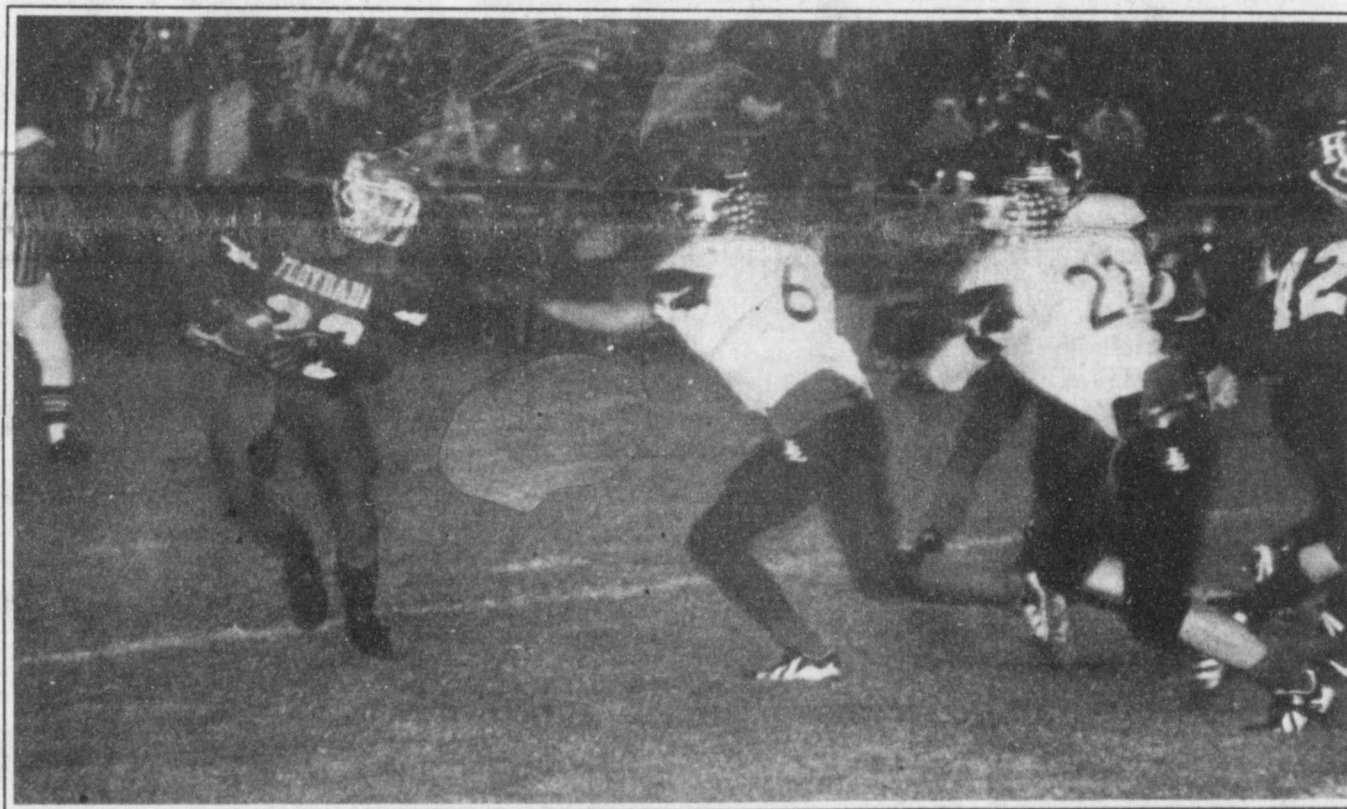
She was elected in May to the District 1 seat on the council. Duenas has accepted a job with the Texas Department of Corrections and is moving to Palestine.

Payne qualifies for state

FLOYDADA--Freshman Jenna Payne overcame a rocky rookie start Saturday with a finish worthy of a venerable veteran here at Mae Simmons Park to qualify for this week's Class 2A State Cross Country Championship.

Payne got caught in the middle of the 164-runner pack early in the 2-mile run of the Region I championships, but steadily worked her way into contention by the midway point. Running in 14th with 600 meters left, Payne steadily moved up to claim seventh overall in 12 minutes, 40 seconds - just 14 seconds behind first.

The top 10 individuals and top 3 teams qualified for state. The state meet will be run at the Old Settler's Park at Palm Valley in Round Rock. Payne's race is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. Saturday.

Payne paced the Lady Winds to 12th in the 23-team field. Fellow freshman Samantha Ibarra, Tara Williams and Jessica Castaneda finished 45th, 74th and 90th, respectively. Sophomore Lana McCandless was 103rd and junior Gracie DeLeFunte was 134th.

Commissioners discuss vacation pay

Sheriff's employees ask for back pay

The County Commissioners voted unanimously Monday morning to take bids on buying the Sheriff's office a new patrol car. Commissioner Lennie Gilroy suggested that maybe a program car might be an option to save the county money in lieu of a new car.

Specification sheets may be picked up at the court house for those dealerships interested in placing a bid.

In other business, that drew a split vote, was the back-pay owed to two jail employees, Deputy Brian Emert and Jailer Paul Raissez. The dollar amounts involved are \$1,331.44 for

vacation and holidays not taken during the year for Emert and \$679.00 vacation time not taken for Raissez. Commissioners Ray Nell Bearden and Gilroy voted against the measure, while commissioners Jon Jones, George Taylor and Judge William D. Hardin voted for it.

Bearden and Gilroy expressed they may be rewarding poor vacation management, while Jones, Taylor and Hardin believed it was just a schedule conflict.

However, it was mutually agreed that this would be a one time correction to a scheduling difficulty at the

jail.

County Agent J.D. Ragland gave a good report on the Ag Tour back in September. Some 47 producers attended and were shown three demonstration fields. Ragland said the tour was a big help to all and he thanked all those who were involved this year.

Ragland also stated this year's cotton harvest has been slowed due to the recent moisture. But he said, "the irrigated cotton was producing from 1 1/2 to 2 bales per acre so far this year, which is good. However, the farmers have had higher expenses this year."

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Robinson will cover local news

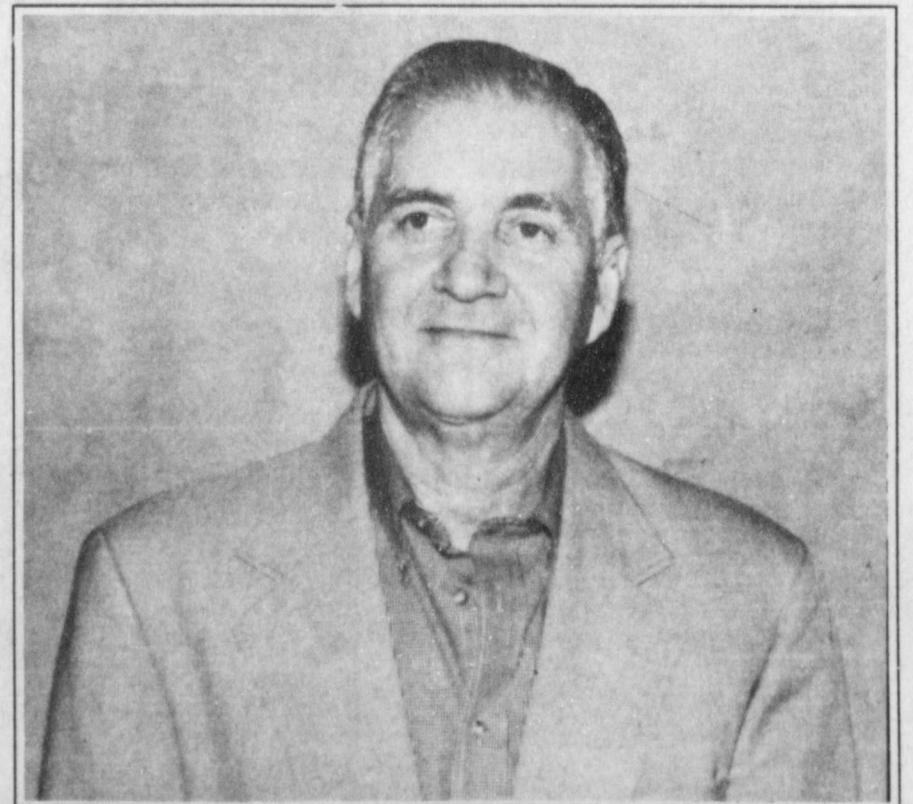
Darwin Robinson will become a familiar face in Floyd County in his new job as reporter/photographer for The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon.

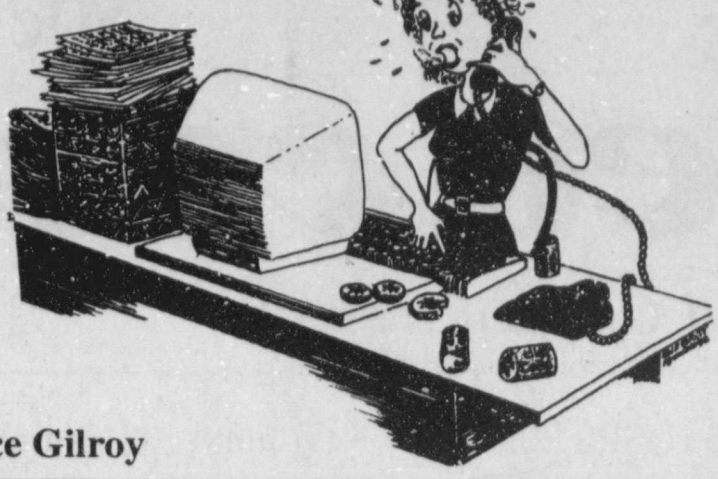
Robinson owned and operated his own printing company in Medina, Tennessee from 1986-1991.

A view from

The Lamplighter

Big doings up in our nation's Capitol, and down in our state's Capitol as well.

Quite naturally, we have some thoughts on the situation, or situations, and we suspect our readers do as well. We'll sound off first, and then welcome letters from our readers concerning their own thoughts.

First off, we were somewhat surprised by the outcome of some of our state races. Personally, I had thought Jim Mattox, the "junk-yard dog" of Texas politics, would probably win his race for Attorney General, narrowly, against John Cornyn. And I had thought John Sharp would make a better showing against Rick Perry, maybe even win the race for Lieutenant Governor. Too, to be honest about it, I thought Gary Mauro would collect more votes than he did against George W. Bush.

As it turned out, we were wrong on all three counts. Both Mattox and Mauro, despite, or perhaps because of, being well known to voters, fared

extremely poorly. Mauro, the poster child of Texas Democrats, got only 31.8 percent of the statewide vote, which must have been some sort of a record for any democrat running for Governor in a General Election. I had him figured at about 40 percent. Evidently a dozen or so visits to Texas by Bill and Hillary didn't help much. In fact, it might even have hurt.

Mattox got only 42 percent, and Sharp, 47 percent.

We suspect Sharp will go into the lobbying business, where the pay is good. Mattox will go back to his particular brand of lawyering, where the pay, we hear, is also good. The Clintons will probably find a place for Mauro, and future Democratic politics in Texas may well be dominated by Paul Hobby, the son of Bill Hobby. He ran a respectable race for Comptroller, losing to Carol Rylander, 51-47 percent. He has the name, the age, and the money, to be a player in the years ahead.

We were not surprised by the wins

of either Larry Combest, in the adjoining 19th Congressional District, or our own Mac Thornberry. But the size of their wins was somewhat unexpected, by me. Thornberry, in the geographically large and politically diverse 13th District got 64.8 percent of the vote. (He got 78 percent here in Floyd County, almost equalling George W. Bush's 80 percent.)

While the Texas voting results were unexpected by me, the developments in Washington were nothing short of astounding. The internal turmoil, within the GOP, finally came to a head with House Speaker Newt Gingrich bowing out, from both his Speakership and his seat in Congress.

The new Speaker, evidently, will be Rep. Bob Livingston, of Louisiana. Personally, I do not know him, but the whole shake-up ought to set the stage for a much more cohesive, more focused, effort on the part of those inclined to do the right thing by resurrecting and recognizing the 10th Amendment of the Constitution. We should be able to glean some sort of clue on the new House leadership by the time Summer rolls around.

When we first called for Newt's res-

ignation, back when he ran afoul of the House Ethics Committee, it was not because we thought he had done anything terribly wrong with his celebrated book deal, or his college course in government. When the day comes that it is a no-no for University professors in Government, or "Communications," or even English, for that matter, to present to their students anything but honest facts, the ranks of professors would be reduced considerably.

Our call for Newt to step aside was because, primarily, the situation made it probable that he would be demonized by people like Clinton, flacks like James Carville, Rep. Bonier, Rep. Maxine Waters, The Reverend Jesse Jackson, et. al., and in the process cause all those in his Party to suffer accordingly. That irritant, and that foil, will now be gone.

Still, it must be said that Gingrich deserves appreciation for recognizing that there are causes greater than one's own glorification. For a politician with Newt's mind-set, abdication is quite a sacrifice.

Would that Bill Clinton felt the same way.

The peanut harvest, Ragland said, is also in a slow down. "The peanut yields are down", he said, "by about 1500 pounds projected to only 2500 to 3500 pounds per acre so far this year."

Ragland reminded the commissioners of the upcoming Annual Cotton Conference, January 19, 1999 at the South Plains Baptist Assembly Camp grounds. Those attending the entire one day event can receive up to five hours of Agriculture Educational college credits.

The pumpkin harvest this year, he said, hit a forty year high in "quality", while the yields were down slightly due to the drought conditions this year. The average was around 20,000 to 25,000 pounds per acre. Ragland said the publicity this year on the Pumpkin Festival was just great. 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From 1982-85 he worked as a journalist/photographer and ad salesman for the Lamesa Press Reporter before moving to Tennessee. 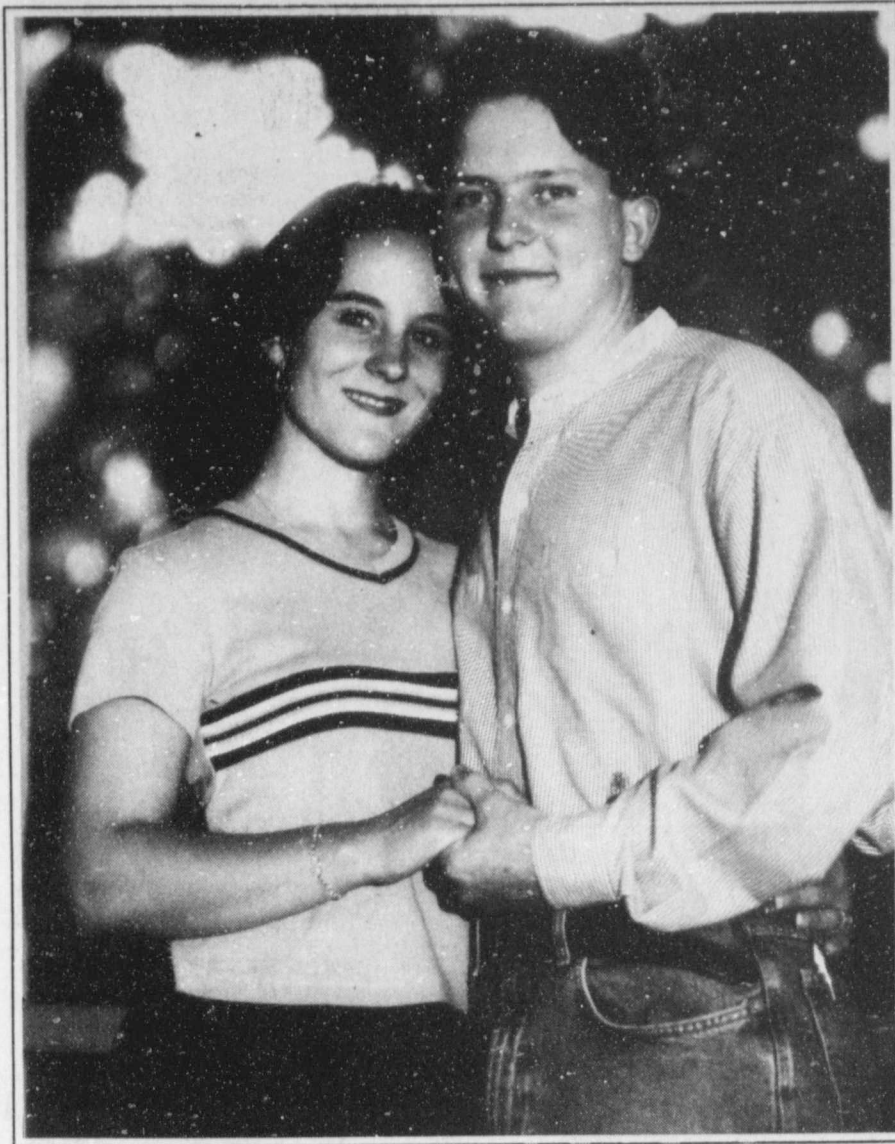

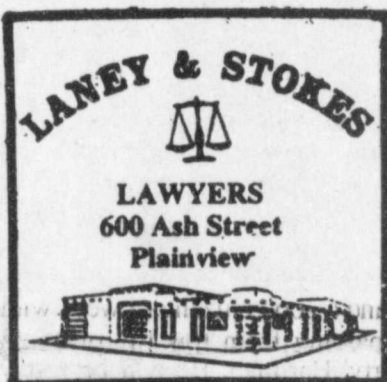

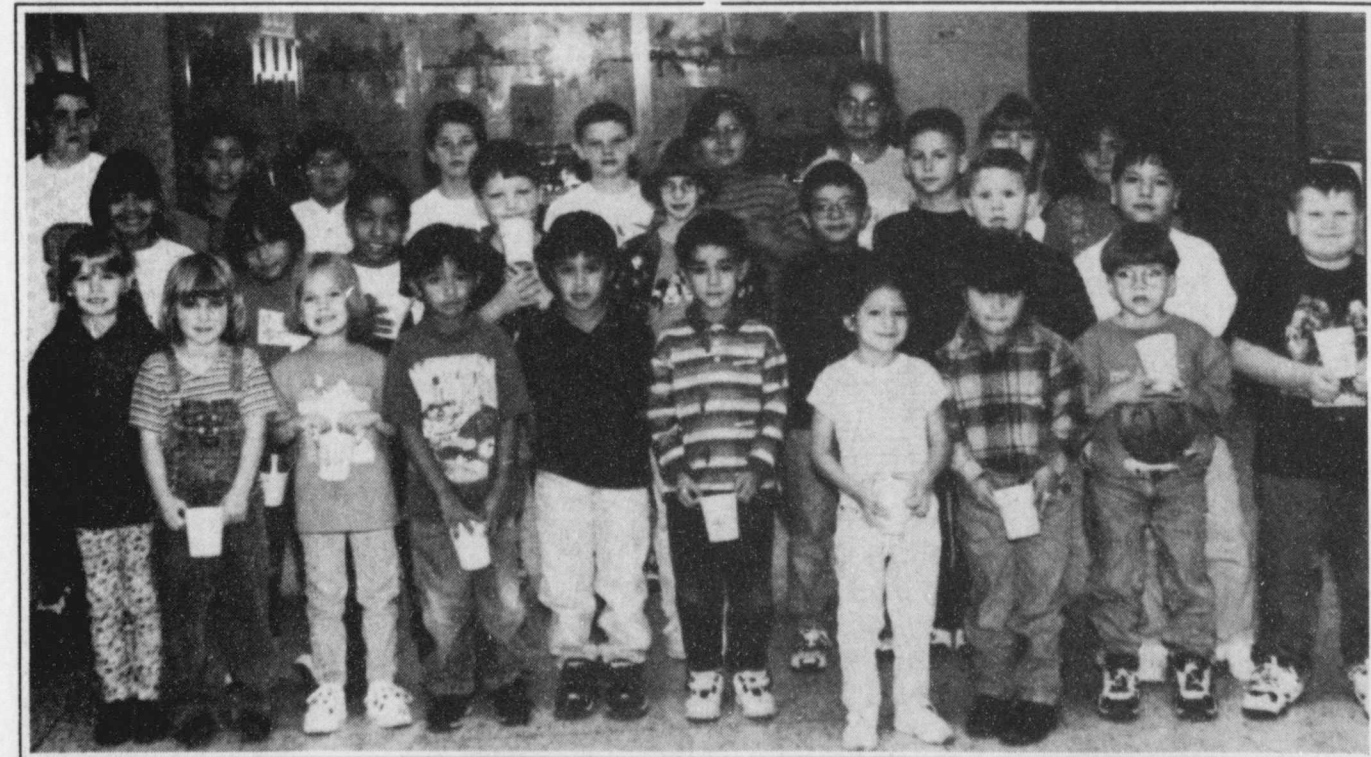

Darryl Henderson's 23-yard return of the kickoff gave Floydada good field position to start the second half, but Lockney's Frank Guerrero continued to be a nemesis in the Whirlwind backfield by sacking Stovall to force a McGuire punt in the first series. Dusty Anderson, David Lightfoot and Tyrel Fuller all had big defensive plays during Lockney's ensuing possession. The Whirlwinds partially blocked Ryan Graves' punt, but Floydada was flagged for offsides. Jeff Lyles crashed through to block Graves' second punt attempt. Dusty Duke scooped up the ball and roared in for a 20-yard touchdown. The try for a 2-pointer failed, but Floydada forged ahead 12-7.

Lonny Nelson sacked Josh Quebe, Lockney's backup quarterback, to stall the Longhorns' next drive. The Whirlwinds were unable to capitalize on midfield position, and gave the ball back after "three and out". McGuire's 46-yard punt carried barely into the endzone to give the 'Horns the ball at their own 20.

Lockney pickup up its initial first down of the second half on runs by Collins and McDonald, but David Lightfoot broke through to spoil a handoff between Quebe and Collins. The defensive gem by Lightfoot resulted in a 12-yard loss, pushing the Longhorns deeper into their territory. On fourth down from the 'Horns 21, the ball was snapped over the punter's head and carried into the endzone. Dusty Duke alertly pounced on the loose ball to give the Whirlwinds an insurance touchdown on the final play of the third quarter. Clay Horn hauled in the 2-point conversion pass from Stovall and the Whirlwinds entered the final quarter in command 20-7.

David Bishop added to the Longhorns' woes by recovering a fumble on the ensuing kickoff. Julian and Frank Guerrero and Thad Lusk made good defensive plays as Lockney fought hard to get back into the game. Cody Stovall was thrown for a 7-yard loss on a 4th-down attempt in Longhorn territory, but David Lightfoot recovered a Quebe fumble two plays later as the scoreboard clock began to work against a Lockney comeback.

Following an exchange of punts, Floydada's Green Wave Defense took control to preserve the hard-earned victory. Henderson, Lightfoot, Nelson and Brandon Wickware all helped

pressure Quebe into incomplete passes. Henderson applied a coup de grace with a "finishing touch" quarterback sack, and helped Lightfoot stop Calvin Collins' final first-down attempt. Stovall went down on one knee as the final seconds elapsed, thus ending Lockney's three-year dominance of Floyd County football.

Following the trophy presentation to Coach Tim Daughtrey, the jubilant coach agreed that Justin McGuire's 13-yard TD in the final seconds of the first half was the most important offensive play of the game. "We had a touchdown called back earlier, and that effort by Justin just before the half gave us that much-needed momentum going into the locker room. Then in the second half, our defense really stepped up...they were outstanding!"

All agreed that the Whirlwinds' Green Wave defense was a deciding factor in the final outcome. Floydada held Lockney's fine senior runningback, Calvin Collins, to a mere 22 yards on 13 carries. Collins came into the game averaging 108 yards per outing and 6.28 yards-per-carry. Against Floydada he averaged only 1.69 yards-per-attempt. Whirlwind senior lineman Patrick Odom, while relishing his first varsity win over the Longhorns, said, "We've got to give all the credit to Dusty Duke and the rest of the defense...they were awe-

some!" Duke was certainly one of the standouts for the Whirlwinds as he registered two defensive touchdowns (blocked punt return and fumble recovery) and caught a key pass from Stovall late in the second quarter to help sustain Floydada's important scoring drive. David Lightfoot had another outstanding defensive outing (broken wrist and all) and is credited with another headhunter hit (when he forced the 12-yard loss by Collins late in the third period). Jeff Lyles' punt block, which produced the go-ahead touchdown by Duke, gets the nod for the defensive play of the game.

The Whirlwinds have little time to celebrate the hard-earned victory. Floydada has not won a Bi-District playoff game since L.G. Wilson's 1981 district champs defeated Tahoka 17-0 and gained the right to advance to the Regional Semi-Final game at Lubbock's Lowrey Field against Littlefield. The Jim Ned game tomorrow night at Tuscola should prove to be a gauge as to just how far Coach Tim Daughtrey and his staff have turned around the Whirlwind football program.

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

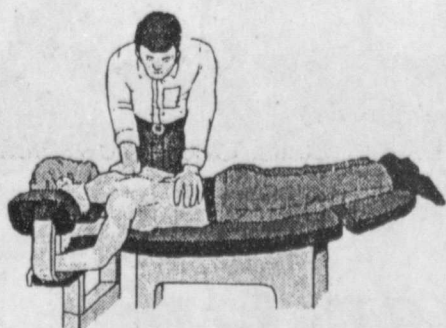

Draft plan to improve water quality and reduce health risks

As part of the Clinton Administration's Clean Water Action Plan, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman and Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Carol M. Browner on September 16th, announced a draft plan the administration feels will improve America's water quality and reduce public health risks associated with animal feeding operations. Glickman and Browner invited public comment on the proposed USDA-EPA Unified National Strategy for Animal Feeding Operations, comments should be received within 120 days of the September 16th announcement.

"This is a customer-driven strategy," said Glickman "Comments from the public are essential to shopping it. This comment period provides the public with an excellent opportunity to let us know how we can work with livestock producers to improve the quality of our Nation's water while keeping the livestock industry strong and protecting the quality of life in rural communities. We want to hear from owners and operators of animal feeding operations and the livestock industry on the draft strategy."

The proposed USDA-EPA Unified National Strategy for Animal Feeding Operations is one of more than 100 actions President Clinton directed as part of the Clean Water Action Plan.

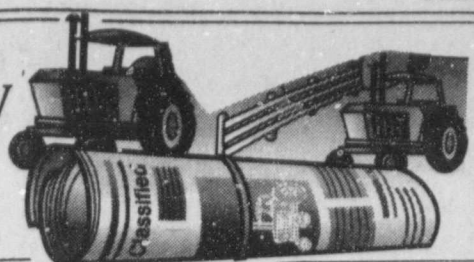
Animal feeding operations, or AFOs are livestock raising operations, such as hog, cattle, dairy, and poultry farms where animals are kept and raised in confined situations. When not properly managed, animal waste can runoff into nearby water bodies. The draft Strategy addresses the resulting water quality problems of runoff polluted by excess nitrogen, phosphorus, pathogens, and other compounds. Elevated concentrations of these pollutants have been associated with the contamination of drinking water, crops and animal feed and adverse impacts to fish and shellfish.

The strategy establishes a national expectation that all animal feeding operations develop and implement comprehensive nutrient management plans by the year 2008. These plans include manure handling and storage, application of manure to the land, record keeping, feed management, integration with other conservation measures, and other manure utilization options. USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service estimates 300,000 feeding operations will need to develop or revise comprehensive nutrient management plans to meet expectations of the strategy.

As part of the strategy, USDA and EPA estimate that 95 percent of the 450,000 animal feeding operations will be encouraged to implement voluntary comprehensive nutrient management plans. An estimated 15,000 to 20,000 livestock operations will be required to develop comprehensive nutrient management plans as part of permits under the Clean Water Act (currently about 2,000 permits have been issued). The regulatory program intends to focus permitting and enforcement activities on the largest concentrated AFOs (or CAFOs, those with 1,000 or more animal units), AFOs with unacceptable conditions such as direct discharge into water ways, and AFOs that are significant contributors to water quality impairment within a watershed.

EPA and states will expand efforts to ensure that all permits include comprehensive management requirements, including land application conditions, and will revise regulations to support this effort by December 2001. In addition, EPA will revise national environmental guidelines to limit discharge from poultry and swine facilities by December 2110 the national guidelines for cattle and dairy facilities by 2002.

Windbreak topics such as design, specie adaptability and insect and disease identification and control will be discussed. Guest Speakers will be Charles Coffman, biologist for the Natural Resource Conservation Service, Robert J. Fewin, forester for the Texas Forest Service and Dr. Carl Patrick, extension entomologist and Dr. Harold Kaufman, extension plant pathologist, of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Windbreak related displays will also be available to view before and during the seminar. One hour of continuing education credits (CEUs) may be obtained.

Windbreaks are multiple rows of trees systematically planted to protect livestock, homesteads/headquarters, soil and crops, and roads from the impact of damaging winds. Windbreaks establish habitat for wildlife, enhance aesthetics and increase land value.

Annually, low-cost windbreak seedlings are made available to landowners through West Texas Nursery and/or local Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD). West Texas Nursery has been producing high-quality, adaptable windbreak seedlings for the South Plains and the western two-thirds of Texas since 1978.

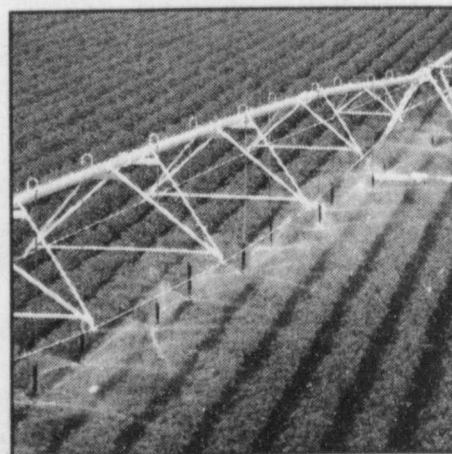

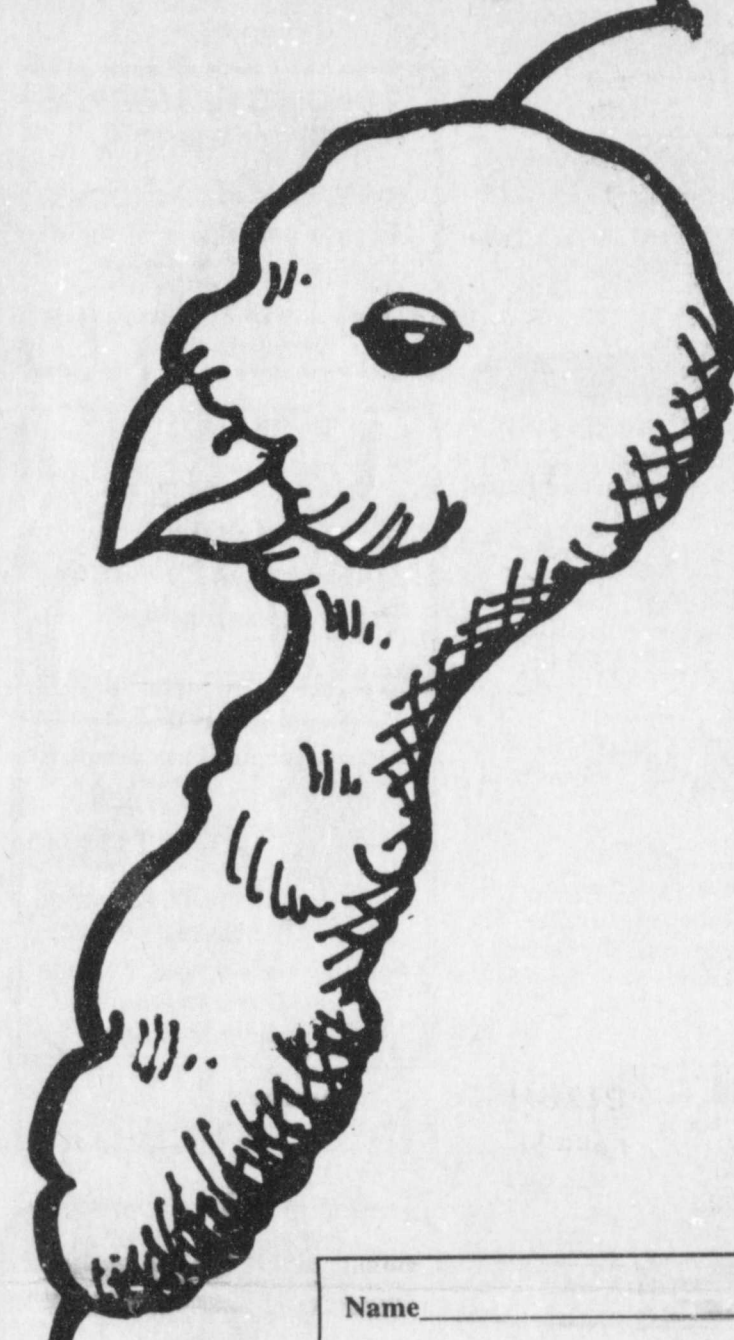
