Lockney honors citizens

LOCKNEY--Lockney citizens and supporters of the Chamber of Commerce gathered for the annual banquet Saturday, February 27 to recognize outstanding leaders in the community and enjoy entertainment by local youth.

Ginger Mathis was presented with the Citizen of the Year trophy and J.D. Copeland was recognized with the Citizen Through The Years award.

The late James Hill was presented with the Fireman of the Year award. Special Recognition went to Archie Jones as a "good Samaritan" for coming to the aid of a sick person in Hale County last year.

Last year's Citizen of the Year, Malcom Moerbe, made the presentation to this year's recipient, Ginger Mathis.

Moerbe said Ginger's accomplishments filled several pages, and he "would do his best to highlight her work in numerous organizations and civic activities".

Mathis is currently on the Board of Directors for the Floyd County Friends and also serves as that organization's secretary.

She has been very active in all areas of 4-H as a leader, skit writer, coach, advisor, and delegate.

She has also headed up banquets for 4-H and Floyd County Friends, and has been in charge of numerous concession stands and fundraisers.

She served as Band Booster treasurer and president, also making uniforms and working as a sponsor for contests and on trips.

Ginger was named Club Woman of the Year for the Il Pueroso Study

Club and worked on floats and booths for the Floyd County Fair.

Ginger was the secretary of the Floyd County Stock Show Association for 9 years, in charge of the livestock sale and organizing the buyer's luncheon.

She is also active in the West College and 3rd Church of Christ and PTA, Little Dribblers, and UIL.

Ginger and her husband, Mike, are the parents of three children, Kaci, a student at Texas Tech, Lindsey, a sophomore at Lockney High School and Garrett an eighth grader at Lockney Junior High.

Before presenting J.D. Copeland with the "Citizen Through The Years" award Chamber President Phil Cotham explained that this award is not given every year. Previous winners have been Kelton Shaw in 1996 and Chuck Wilson in 1997.

J.D. Copeland is a native of Lockney. He has been involved in all aspects of city, church and school activities throughout the years.

He served as Lockney's mayor from 1981-1987 and has been a councilman, off and on, for 37 years.

He is past president of the Lockney Cemetery Association and past director of the Floyd County Historical Museum. He has served on the Lockney School Board and is a charter member of the Lockney Rotary Club and the Lockney Chamber of Commerce. He currently holds the position of Historian of the chamber.

Copeland and his wife, Arla, have been members of the West College and Third Street Church of Christ for more than 60 years.

Drug dealer sentenced to 23 years

In the 110th District Court, February Feb. 26th, Rudy Castaneda, 33, of Floydada, was found guilty by Judge Randy Hollums, of two counts of Delivery of a Controlled Substance (cocaine).

Hollums also sentenced Castaneda to a total of 23 years in prison.

Castaneda, and five other people, had been arrested in Floydada, in April '98, as a result of a long undercover operation in Floydada involving the city police and a South Plains Narcotics Task Force.

Castaneda had been charged with a 1st degree Felony of Delivery of a Controlled Substance over 1 gram and under 4 grams. For this charge Hollums sentenced Castaneda to 16 years, a \$5,000 fine and restitution of \$240.00.

A person convicted of a first degree felony can receive a sentence of 10-99 years, or life, and up to a \$20,000.

Hollums also found Castaneda guilty of the 2nd charge of Delivery of a Controlled Substance less than 1 gram. This is normally a State Jail Felony but because Castaneda sold the drugs within 1,000 feet of a school zone the offense was raised to a 3rd degree felony with a possible sentence of 7-10 years and a \$20,000 fine.

Hollums sentenced Castaneda to 7 years and a \$1,000 fine, on the 3rd degree felony charge.

Both sentences will be served consecutively, as required by statute, making Castaneda's sentence 23 years.

Castaneda's attorney argued before Judge Hollums that the lesser charge should not be elevated to a 3rd degree felony because, Castaneda had sold the drugs out of his house and he couldn't help the fact that his house was located close to the school. The defense felt it went against the "spirit of the law" to prosecute for the crime of selling in a school zone since Castaneda was not "lurking around the school enticing minors".

Prosecutor Becky McPherson argued that the police did not choose the location to buy the drugs--Castaneda had chosen the location to sell. She asked the judge to consider "what was best for the community--and to send a message to other drug dealers that the community will not put up with this."

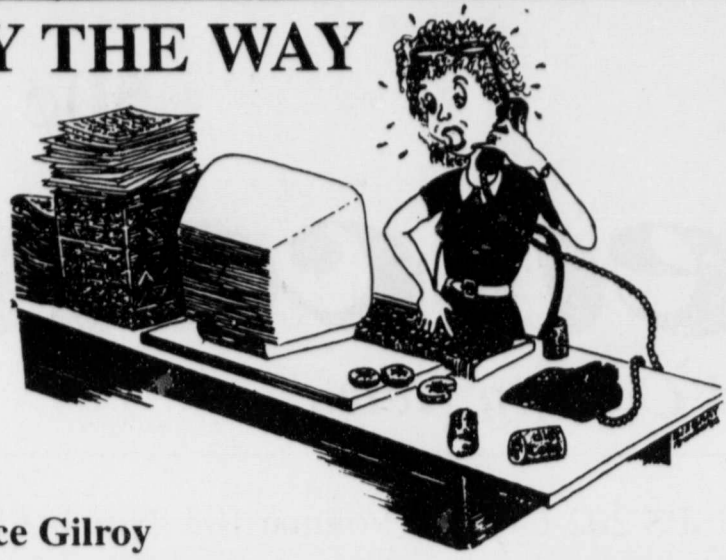

Sunday's Avalanche Journal had an interesting story from White Plains N.Y.

The AP writer called it an "extreme example of the backlash against a nationwide trend that has broadened course offerings away from the basics of reading and math."

Some "Catholic" parents got fed up with the Bedford School District and sued over curriculum. The parents complaints were "extreme", and the courses were simply "broadening the basics" according to the writer.

Some of the testimony coming before the courts, according to the story, were from a "physic who said she was also a telepath", and a "yogi who said he was a numerologist". I don't know who the physic and numerologist were testifying for.

According to this story, the dispute began in 1995 when kids in the Bedford Central School District began playing a strategy game call "Magic, The Gathering." The cards bore images ranging from fairies to a depiction of a woman about to be sacrificed.

The parents called for a halt to the game. The superintendent called in a "mental health expert". The expert said the game posed no danger.

The parents went to court, and added a few other complaints. They complained of students making models of Aztec gods, taking a field trip to a cemetery, celebrating Earth Day, and making 'worry dolls' to put under children's pillows to keep nightmares away.

The Earth Day complaint revolved around pledges being made to the Earth which the parents said were similar to praying.

Such activities they said amounted to the promotion of "Satanism, occultism, pagan religions, and New Age spirituality". The 'worry dolls', said one parent, was similar to "voodoo".

The AP writer said this particular parent was asked if she "found the tooth fairy objectionable." The parent replied--"It was not taught to my child in school."

The parents also argue that although the Bedford schools find nothing wrong with the expression of Eastern religion practices--Christianity is excluded.

The judge says the court is not the place to argue curriculum, but a settle-

ment can't be reached.

The American Catholic Lawyers Association has taken up the plaintiff's case, and the liberal People for the American Way is supporting the schools.

Cases like this usually do bring out the "extremes" on both sides, but I can't help but support the parents. Just when are you supposed to dig in your heels and say, "enough"! How much further does it have to go before parents finally put a spotlight on the issue itself?

Aren't you glad you live in Floyd County!!!! Thank your school boards and superintendent the next time you see them.

I received this "prayer" on my e-mail this week. I thought the timing was perfect.

That's great;*

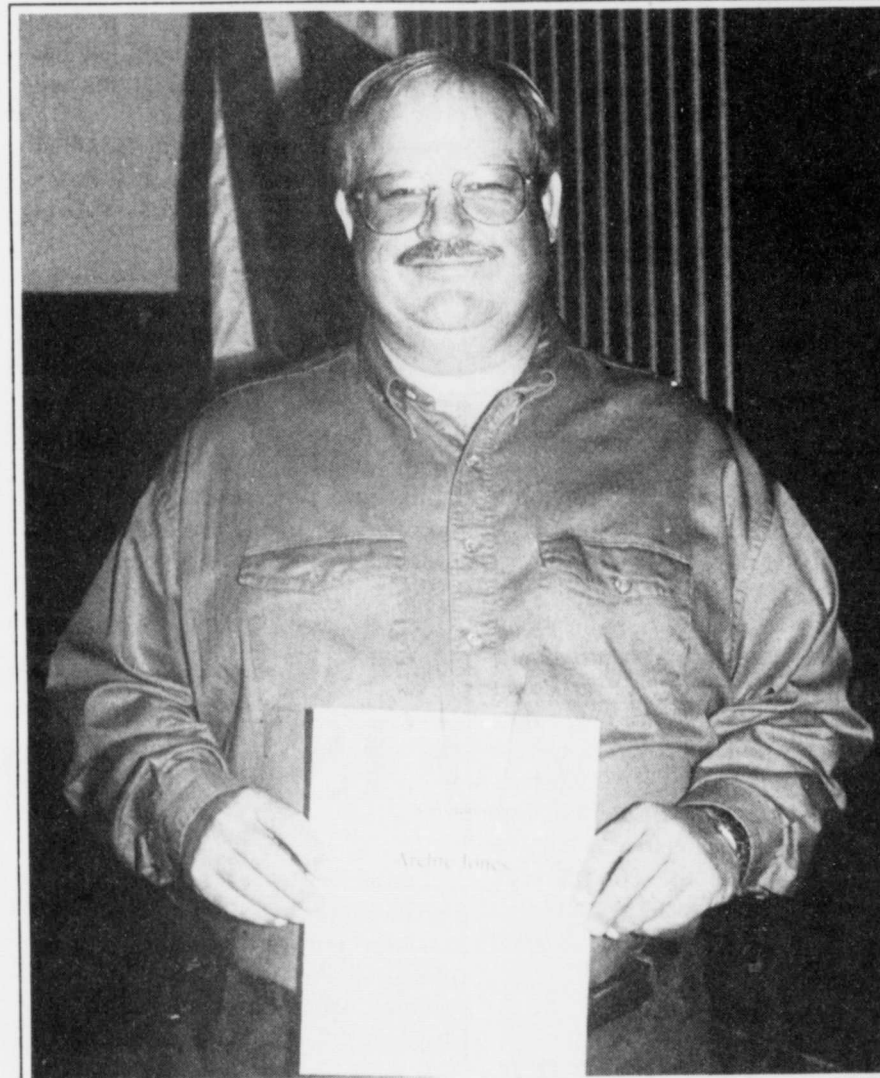
*This rule, however, has one gimmick

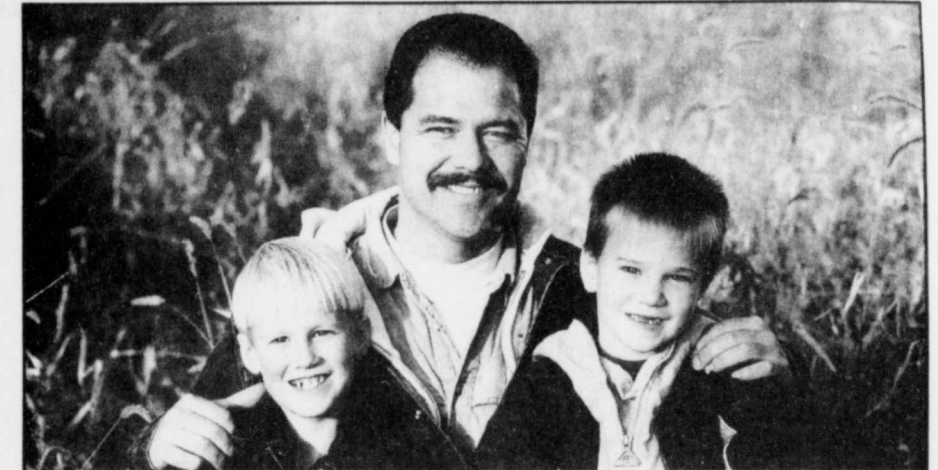

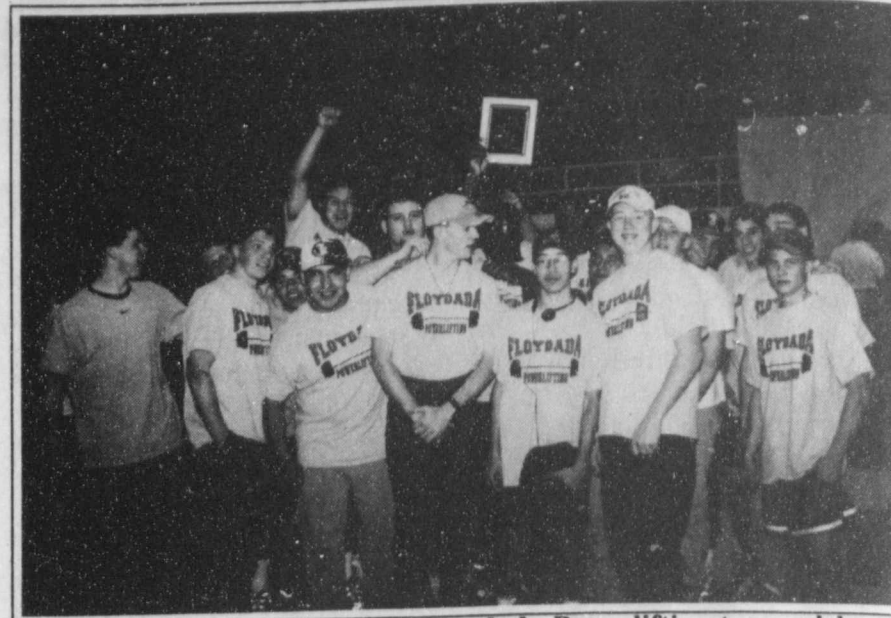

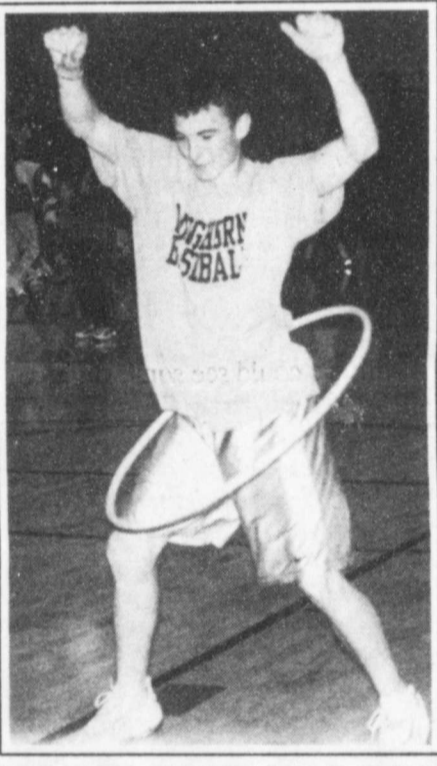

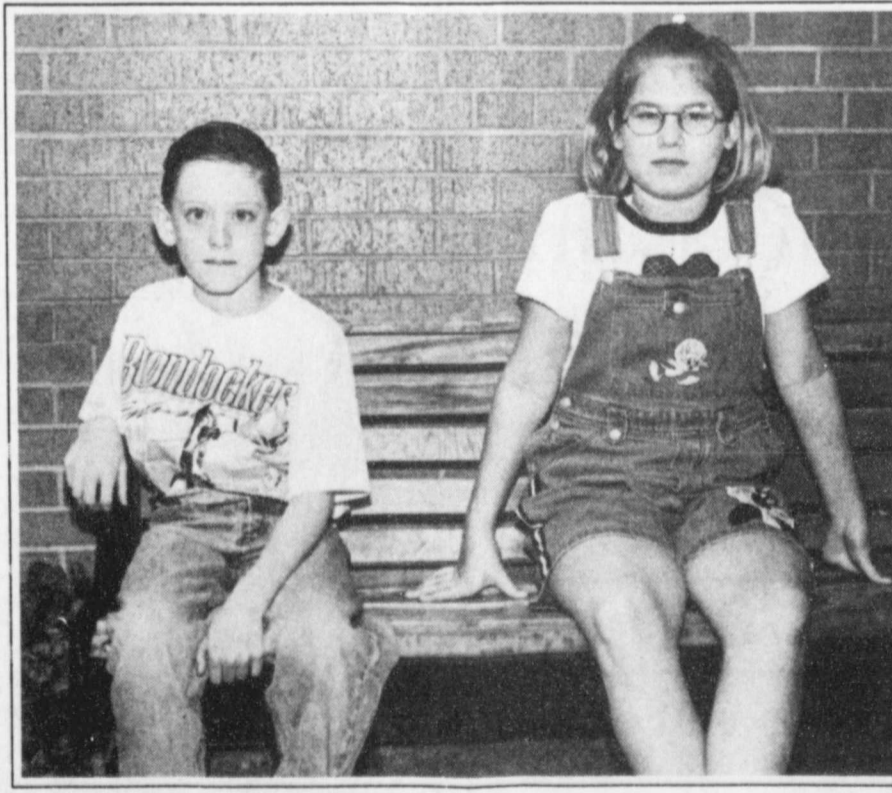
