

Another local danger in the area of the excavation is the threat of rattlesnakes. However, so far they have not seen any on this trip perhaps because week, "We have found some pottery they are still in winter hibernation.

A piece of a clay smoking pipe was found at one of the sites and Dr. Blakeslee said, "Remember those old clay pipes that were crafted into a mold, I think that is what this is. Whether it was Hank Smith's or Colonel Montgomery's, I can't tell yet."

Dr. Blakeslee stated, "Coronado had some 1500 soldiers on horseback and maybe another three to four hundred Spaniards and Indians as helpers. They probably had about 5,000 head of livestock with them.

"They stopped here in Blanco Canyon about a couple of weeks and didn't leave a huge amount behind," he said.

The teams will be heading back to Kansas this Saturday. Blakeslee wanted to thank all the

local businesses and families who have fed the teams. He expressed his appreciation to everyone for their kindness and cooperation.

During this trip the archeological team will be fed by the First National Bank of Floydada, the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, the Spanish Assembly of God, the Floydada Coop Gin and the O.D. Williams family.


