Construction bids being taken for Unity Center

The specifications for the construction bids for the new Unity Center should be ready by Monday, April 19th.

Gary Brown is the construction coordinator and will have bid specifications for concrete, metal, electrical, and plumbing.

"We hope local contractors will submit bids and go by and visit with Gary Brown," said Floyd County Friends President Nick Long. "We want to give locals a fair opportunity."

Phase One of the Unity Center will be the 20,000 square foot Mayer Arena and the 7,500 square foot FNB Lockney auxiliary building.

Phase One will include: bleachers, concession stand, large restrooms, portable stage and riser, sound system, concrete flooring, animal wash racks, insulation, and moderate heat and air.

"We've already received a \$25,000 Challenge Grant from the Swalm Foundation, of Houston, for Phase Two," said Long. "This phase will in-

clude the banquet room, kitchen, foyer, and small classroom."

Long said pledges are still coming in for Phase One and the Friends are hopeful construction could begin in September of 1999.

The most recent grant of \$126,000 from the Meadows Foundation, of Dallas, enabled the Floyd County Friends to meet their \$100,000 challenge grant from J.E. and L.E. Mabree Foundation, of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

A total of \$356,000 was raised through 7 grants. The rest of the needed \$600,000 was raised locally.

"We will be able to do the construction for less than 40¢ on the dollar of local money," said Long. "The rest was corporations and foundations."

Grants to the Floyd County Friends were received from: James & Eva Mayer, Plainview, for \$100,000; Helen Jones Foundation, Lubbock, for \$15,000; Zephyr Foundation, of Wellington, for \$10,000; Southwestern Bell Telephone, for \$10,000; and Pioneer Hi-Bred for \$5,000.

Hale home damaged by lightning and fire

A storm in Floydada, Wednesday night, April 7th, brought .55 inches of rain, severe lightning, and a house fire.

A lightning strike was the cause of a fire at the home of Sammy and Jean Hale, 809 W. Grover, in Floydada.

Although it is not known for sure, it appears the lightning traveled through the cable TV line into the attic of the home. "The fire came through the attic above the closets in the back of our house," said Sammy Hale. "The fire damage was contained to the attic, and roof, and the two closets that are joined back to back."

"There is smoke damage to the whole house and water damage to ceilings of the back three rooms."

According to Hale, he had just stepped out of a whirlpool bath when the lightning hit a little before 10:00 p.m.

"It was like an explosion," said

Hale, "there was the light and sound all at the same time."

"I appreciate the fire department," said Hale, "and our local service people who came quickly the next day and got our utilities back on."

To fight the fire volunteer firemen were forced to cut holes in the roof of the Hale's home.

"We have insulation in our attic and it helped keep the fire from moving through the ceiling, however the insulation caused more smoke and heat in the attic," said Hale.

Fireman Tracy Webb was transported to W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital for heat exhaustion. He was released the next day.

The Hales have not been able to reside in the home since the fire. "We have been humbled by the amount of people who have offered their homes to us," said Hale.

The May 1 election for the positions of mayor and councilmembers from Districts 4 and 5 has been cancelled. There was no opposition for the places open on the council. Gary Marr will return as mayor; Bill Anderson will continue to fill the position in District 4 and Rodger Stapp in District 5. The motion was made and seconded and all voted for.

Councilmember Rodger Stapp made the motion and Brotherton the second to appoint Robert McDonald to a two year term on the board of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

Joe Luis Guerrero made a request to keep horses in the city limits. He lives on NW Third Street. Councilmembers were in agreement that the ordinance passed several years

Scams and panic could cause most harm for Y2K

No matter what your view is on the potential problems of the Y2K, experts agree that panic is a true concern.

Those worried over the banking industry could withdraw all their money only to be faced with theft. Or, if enough people panic and withdraw huge amounts of money this in and of itself could create problems within the banking industry.

The worry for utility companies is more over "what people are going to do" than it is whether or not they can

handle any potential Y2K outages.

According to SPS spokesman, Gregg Boggs, "people not acting in a normal way could cause problems. Such as large industries, with 15 megawatts, kicking on generators all at once or turning them off all at once."

Sabotage and scams are also a major concern for banking and utilities.

"There are people who want something to happen," said Boggs, "so they might try and see to it that it does."

Paul Sharp, branch manager of West Texas National Bank, said, "We have

recently been notified of a bank scam. Customers are called and told by an individual that he works for their bank (without identifying the bank). He tells the customer the bank is transferring their accounts to a bond account specifically designed to protect their money until the bank can fully comply with Y2K requirements. To verify the transaction the customer is asked to confirm information about himself, including his account numbers, personal information, and then

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Commissioners hear ag outlook and discuss emergency planning

Floyd County Commissioners held their regular monthly business session Monday morning, April 12th, with Judge William D. Hardin presiding.

Four farm contracts were approved. Precinct 4 contracts called for reworking a ranch road for soil conservation, seven miles north of Dougherty; and digging a pit nine miles east and two miles south of Floydada.

Precinct 2 contract called for open-

ing a drainage ditch and one-half miles west of Lockney.

Precinct 3 called for filling a pit County agents J.D. Ragland, CEA-AG and Melissa Long, CEA-FCS each gave Agricultural reports to the commissioners.

County agent Ragland said, "We've had a real good year with our kids in the stock shows locally and all the major shows."

"Since then, we have been real busy with our Texas Community Future

Each year the South Plains Council has the opportunity to recognize a limited number of Scouters in the Council by awarding them the Silver Beaver.

Edwards has served as pack Committee Chairman, Scouting Coordinator, and Pack and Troop Committee.

He has served on staff for Cub Scout

and Boy Scout Leader training, as Pow Wow Chairman and as Cub Scout Day Camp Director.

He is a member of Woodbadge Course SC252 and Staff of Woodbadge SC295. He has put on several programs at area schools and regularly conducts hunter safety courses for youth and adults.

He is a member of Grace Fellowship Church and has been in Law Enforcement in Lockney since 1986.

This award is conferred by the national Council of the Boy Scouts of America on the recommendation of the local Council to those who have given "Distinguished Service to Boyhood."

Beginning in 1931, the South Plains Council has had the privilege of awarding 245 Silver Beavers and 3 Silver Fawns.

Thornberry serves on the Armed Services Committee, and was recently appointed Vice Chairman of the Committee's Military Procurement Subcommittee.

For people in this part of the world, there's good news and bad news.

Easter egg hunts have long been synonymous with the Easter holiday when we Christians celebrate Christ's resurrection, but the Easter egg actually predates the Christian holiday. Exchanging eggs during the springtime is a custom that was centuries old when Christians first celebrated Easter.

Before the egg became known in Christian Easter, it was honored during rite of Spring festivals when eggs were wrapped in gold leaf, or, if you were a peasant, colored brightly by boiling them with the leaves or petals of flowers. With the coming of Christianity, the egg came to represent, not nature's rebirth, but the rebirth of man through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Christians embraced the egg as a symbol of the tomb from which Christ rose, the shell seen as a nurturing, life giving tomb, the hatching chick representing Christ emerging from the tomb.

In the traditional hunt for Easter eggs, I fear society has lost the meaning for which we hunt those eggs. You could say that hunting Easter eggs has become synonymous with our own hunt for salvation. We scamper through the meadow we call life, searching behind stones and vegeta-

tion for love and acceptance, scooping up anything that appears to offer us instant gratification and/or social sanctification.

The story goes that a man who was still an unbeliever went to a huge party around Easter time where he was drinking and smoking pot. The party's host began distributing party favors which were plastic Easter eggs containing a condom, a piece of candy, and a page ripped from a Gideon Bible. It was intended to be a joke given out by non-Christians.

As the man opened his egg, though, he began reading a page of Acts which was found inside. Soon the man found that he couldn't stop reading. He had never read anything like it or heard any preacher speak so clearly. All he could see was the truth of the Bible and the grace and salvation it offered him.

He began scurrying around the room gathering up any of the eggs he could get his hands on. He had to read more. The eggs were like seeds looking for dirt to grow in. The man experienced a rebirth, just as the Easter eggs symbolized for those early Christians. And the man rose from his own tomb to experience the joy and salvation of Christ's crucifixion and ultimate resurrection. He became a believer.

What will you find in your Easter egg this year? Christ's salvation or another holiday treat?

"Then Peter said to them, 'Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is to you and to your children, and to all who are afar off, as many as the Lord our God will call.'"

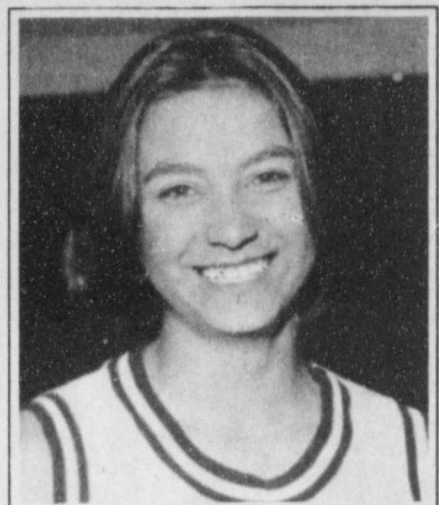

LOCKNEY--Although team championships for boys and girls will be at stake, the real prizes will be individual tickets to the regional meet as Lockney High School hosts the District 7-2A Girls and Boys Track and Field Championships Thursday and Friday afternoons. Teams from Lockney, Floydada, Abernathy, Idalou, New Deal and Ralls High Schools will be competing. The two top finishers in each individual event and the top two teams

in each of the relays advance to the Region I-AA championships at Abilene Christian University April 30 and May 1.

Thursday's competition begins with the field events followed by the preliminaries in all running events under 800 meters. Finals in the running event are set to begin at 4:00 p.m. Friday with the 400 meter relay. The field events begin at 1:00 p.m. Friday with the boys triple jump, girls high jump, and discus, and the junior varsity long jump and shot put. At

2:00 p.m. the boys shot put and long jump, the girls triple jump and the junior varsity discus, high jump, and pole vault begin. The 3:00 p.m. events include the boys discus, high jump and pole vault; the girls shot put and long jump; and the junior varsity triple jump.

The only running event final to be contested Thursday will be the 3,200 meter run in all three divisions. The girls run at 3:30 p.m. and are followed by the junior varsity and the varsity boys. Prelims will begin at about 4:15

Whirlwinds boys and Lady Winds girls both win third place at Mean Green Relays in New Deal

FLOYDADA--The Floydada High School boys' track team raced to a commanding lead in the morning field events and the Whirlwinds scored 130 points to successfully defend their title at New Deal's Mean Green Relays in the team's final tune-up before this week's District 7-2A title meet.

The team trophy was the third for the team in five meets this season. Sundown took second with 109 points and host New Deal finished third in the 10-team competition with 95 points.

Brandon Wickware pickup up a double win for the Whirlwinds with a 48-2 1/2 toss in the shot put and a 127-10 on his final throw in the discus. In the former, Paul Vallejo and Corey Clemons took fourth and fifth with throws of 42-0 and 38-6 1/2, respectively. In only his second competition of the year, Gabriel Rodriguez cleared 9-feet for fourth in the pole vault.

"Brandon continue to impress people with his throwing," said Coach Randall Lightfoot. "He was back in the pack in the discus until his last throw and all he was doing was just arming it out there. On his last throw, he went ahead and took a full spin and it pushed him into first by about five feet."

As usual, Justin McGuire and Darryl Henderson made the long and triple jumps their personal sandbox as the junior duo combined for 34 points in the two events. Henderson won the long jump with a 20-9 leap with McGuire fourth at 19-7. McGuire came back to lead his teammate to a 1-2 finish in the triple jump, 41-2 to 40-2. In the high jump, McGuire had his third clearance of 6-4 of the year for second place.

The duo also had a hand in Floydada's only win in the running events as they teamed with freshman Edward Porter and sophomore Tyrel

Fuller on the victorious 400-meter relay. The unit ran a 44.88 in a wire-to-wire victory that marked the first time the quartet had run together.

Porter added a pair of silver-medal performances in the dashes. He finished inches ahead of Fuller's third in the 100-meters. The race featured the closest finish of the day as the three medalists - Sundown's Lee was named the winner - crossed the line within 5 hundredths of a second of each other. Porter took second in the 200 in 23.01 and Fuller finished fifth in 23.29.

The FHS hurdles just missed out on the medal court. Henderson was fourth in the 110-meter high hurdles in 15.65 after running a 15.51 in the morning prelims, and David Lightfoot took sixth. Lightfoot came back in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles to finish fourth in 45.53.

Josh Caballero added to the final tally with a fifth in the 1,600 (5:31.1) while the 1,600-meter relay of Cody Stovall, Michael Black, T.J. Fuller and Jermaine Wickware took fifth in 3:37.9.

In the junior varsity division, Rocky Reyes picked up a pair of firsts in the 3,200 and 1,600 with times of 11:51.2 and 5:34.1. Frank Hernandez took second in the shot put with a throw of 35.7.

"It was a very windy day and I know some of our guys were hoping for better performances than what they got," said Coach Lightfoot. "With the district meet coming up, I was mainly interested in seeing how we would handle less-than-great conditions - if we would be tough enough to go ahead and compete even if we didn't have a good chance to put together very good performances. I think our guys showed that a bit of wind isn't going to stop the Whirlwinds this year."

"I was very encouraged by McGuire

and Henderson. Both of them have been limping around the last couple of weeks with some pretty bad aches and pains. Unfortunately, that's the price you pay from all the pounding you have to take in their events. We didn't run Darryl at last week's meet and kept Justin off the track this week. Fortunately, they are both very mentally tough and are working through their pains."

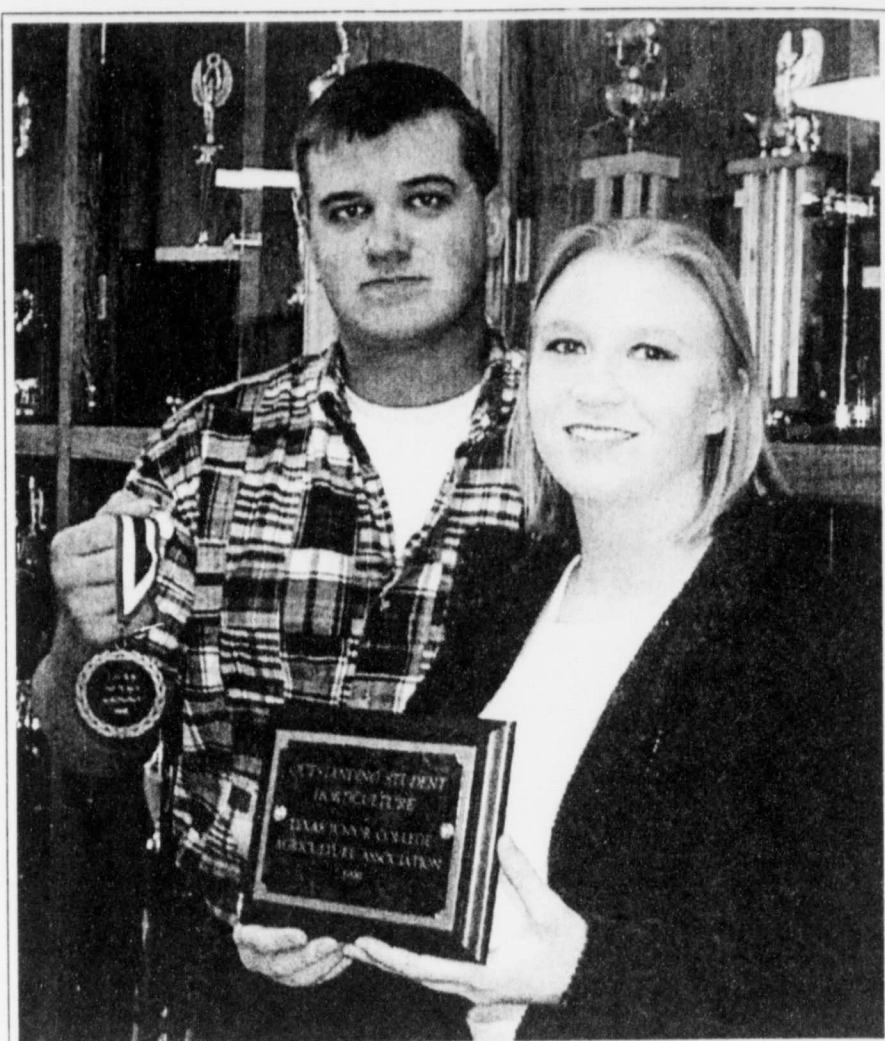
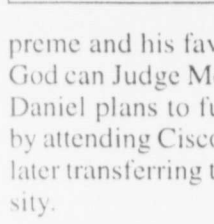

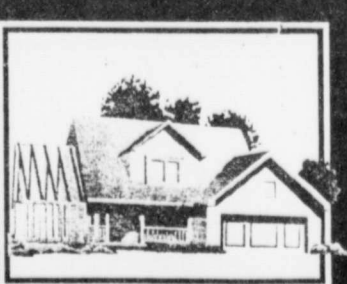

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Court discusses emergency planning

This is a five year plan. "We will have a Focus Forum meeting that is scheduled for April 26th. In this meeting, we will take those issues from the previous meeting and look for solutions and possible ways to achieve some of those goals.

"Agricultural wise, some of our wheat looks really good throughout the county. The recent rains have been good. Some of the farmers that I have visited have pulled some stocker cattle off early.

"Normally 75 percent of our wheat acres in the county go primarily for grazing purposes unless we do have some good rainfall. This year some of the farmers may harvest some grain. Prices will tell us if we can or not.

"Cotton wise, most producers are just now pre-watering and getting ready to put the cotton in the ground probably in the next three weeks.

"Hopefully we will have a good year for cotton. We do need some more beneficial rainfall. I attended the ginners convention last week in Lubbock. Billy Dunavant did not give a very good outlook on cotton for the coming year. Basically he went over a lot of figures and alluded to a carry over with a lot of bales throughout the world. Cotton supply certainly has an impact on the price.

"Dunavant said if we do receive Step 2 payment in August, it will have a very positive impact on the new crop. If it doesn't get passed, then prices for new crops doesn't look good this year. He said if you can get .64 cents for it, you better take it."

Concerning peanut production, Ragland said he attended a multi-county meeting in Lorenzo last month. There were about 40 producers from Lubbock and Floyd counties.

Ragland said, "Our peanut acreage will probably be down this year from 700 acres last year to maybe 500 acres this year."

County Agent Melissa Long told the commissioners, "We are real busy with Walk Across Texas right now. This is a state wide program and presently we have 17 community teams. Also, Andrews and Duncan elementary schools will be participating."

"The 4-H clubs will be having County Roundup this Monday and then District Roundup on May 1st. Right now we will have 69 participants. In our county, almost half of our kids participate in some kind of planned district project.

"We should be taking 24 kids to the

regional competition. We have two girls that have submitted scholarship applications. They will have the possibility of getting from \$500 to \$15,000. They are 274 applications state wide this year."

In other business, the commissioners opened and reviewed all open bids for buying and selling road graders for Precinct 1.

County Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden made the motion to sell a Precinct 1 used road grader and buy a new one with another trade in. Commissioner Gilroy seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

The used road grader was sold to Bee Equipment Sales, Inc. of Lubbock for \$50,120.00. The new road grader was bought from West Texas Equipment Company.

West Texas Equipment gave a trade-in value of \$10,500.00 for the used 1982 Galion motor grader, leaving a total to be paid to them for the new model 140H Caterpillar of \$136,465.00.

The new road grader has a guaranteed maximum maintenance warranty for a period of 60 months or 5,000 hours, whichever comes first. It also has a guaranteed minimum repurchase value of \$110,000.00 for 5 years or 5,000 hours.

Floydada Mayor Hulon Carthel and Floydada City Manager Gary Brown both spoke to the commissioners concerning the need for a Floyd County coordinator in case of an emergency.

Mayor Carthel said, "The city of Floydada has an Emergency Management Plan and it is for a major catastrophe in the city of Floydada. And I understand that Lockney also has a similar plan."

"The problem we see is, although we each have an individual plan, we need some coordinator to be responsible for conducting these (plans), if there were a major disaster.

"We (the city of Floydada) would like to see if we could appoint some county official by position, not by name. Maybe the county judge, the county sheriff or a county commissioner, or whoever, it doesn't matter.

"But they would have the responsibility and the ultimate authority to be the chief official, if there were a disaster.

County Judge Hardin stated, "Let me say this, I state by law, by statute, the county judge is the one for the county. The judge and the commissioners are responsible for this matter.

"I don't see that there is anything that we need to do. Neither the city of Floydada, nor the city of Lockney," he added.

At the request of Commissioner Gilroy, Judge Hardin read from the Texas Government Code manual one paragraph: "Further, in accordance with Section 418.102, 418.103, and 418.105 Texas Disaster Act of 1975, Texas Government Code, and published rules of the DIVISION OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, I hereby designate the Mayor of each municipal corporation and the County Judge of each county in the state as the Emergency Management Director for each such political subdivision. The county judge and Mayor shall serve as the Governor's designated agents in administration and supervision of the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, and may exercise the powers, on an appropriate local scale, granted the Governor therein. The Mayor and County Judge may each designate an Emergency Management Coordinator who shall serve as assistant to the presiding officer of the political subdivision for emergency management purposes when so designated."

City Manager Brown added, "I think what we want to see is if we could have one coordinator in charge of both municipalities and the county. Let that person be the first one to come to the judge and ask him to make the proper phone call (for emergency help)."

Concerning the possibility of a disaster in either city proper, Judge Hardin said, "I don't think that I, as the County Judge, can in this instance (in case of an emergency) go over the Mayor, who is the Director for the city of Floydada."

Judge Hardin indicated that Commissioner Gilroy had agreed to be the County's coordinator, but if both cities came up with another qualified person, then he could go along with that person.

In other matters, County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented the quarterly and the monthly financial reports to the commissioners.

The March 1 thru March 31, 1999 monthly financial report showed the county with a beginning balance of \$525,769.34. Receipts for the month were \$139,677.98.

Transfers in and out were \$72,106.44 for the month.

The total amount disbursed was \$179,476.70 leaving a balance of \$485,970.62.

1999 loan schedule reflects tough '98

First look at 1999 Loan differentials adds fuel to the fire underneath Plains Cotton Growers' (PCG) long standing opposition of the use of Spot Market Quotations to set new crop loan premiums and discounts.

PCG has been working to bring about a change in the methodology used by USDA to determine loan differentials for several years. PCG has advocated the use of real-world marketing data, instead of spot quotations to determine loan differentials. This effort has already led to significantly lower discounts for bark the past several seasons as a result of the analysis of real world sales figures instead of spot quotes.

PCG officials note that the biggest

change in the 1999 loan chart is the fact that there is no longer any provision for "Below Grade" cotton. Instead they will be assigned an initial value 4000 points less than the applicable loan rate for the growing region.

This means that all cotton produced, regardless of grade, will be eligible for the loan and subsequently Loan Deficiency Payments. This would of course provide some relief to producers unfortunate enough to have this type of low grade cotton.

Other than the elimination of the "Below Grade" moniker, there is really nothing about the new loan structure that will provide additional income protection to all producers.

In fact, discounts increased across the board, albeit more so for staple

lengths of 1 inch or less. Premiums actually increased slightly for the few grade/staple combinations that qualify for them.

By and large, however, the 1999 loan schedule will reflect the tough marketing year experienced in 1998 and producers will experience generally lower loan values for their crops in 1999.

Base loan rates in effect for the Lubbock area in 1999 will be 51.65 cents per pound. This is five points lower than the rate in effect in 1998.

Additional information and copies of loan premium and discount table as well as loan values calculated basis Lubbock will be available from PCG in the coming weeks.

TDA grants exemption of tebuconazole for leaf rust

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs has announced that the Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issue a Section 18 specific exemption to use tebuconazole (Folicur 3.6 Foliar Fungicide) to control leaf rust in wheat.

Folicur 3.6 Foliar Fungicide, manufactured by Bayer Corporation, may be applied following all applicable directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA registered product label, as well as these additional restrictions:

- Applications will be made only by certified applicators.

- One application may be made using either ground or aerial equipment at a rate of 1.8 oz. a.i. (4 fl. oz. product) per acre per year, in a minimum finish spray of five gallons of water

by aerial application, or in a minimum of 10 gallons of water by ground application.

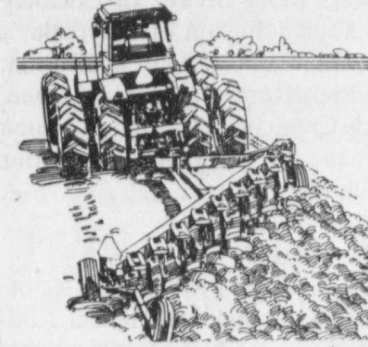
- A maximum of 500,000 acres of wheat in Texas may be treated for control of wheat leaf rust.

- Buffer zones of at least 100 feet for ground application or 300 feet for aerial application should be made between treatment sites and aquatic habitats.

- All applicators must have a copy of the EPA approval notice in their possession prior to any applications.

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Ag policy goal of legislature

The primary goal of the House Agriculture Committee during the current session of the 76th Texas Legislature is passage of a state agricultural policy.

"As a farmer/rancher in Floydada, Texas, I am pleased that lawmakers in Austin are looking towards the future of agriculture in this state in an attempt to assist producers whenever possible," said Floyd County Farm Bureau President Bart Greer.

The plan also calls for additional economic development for rural areas and tax credits for people engaged in value-added processing.

"Many rural areas of Texas are in dire need of more money to promote the products produced by farmers and ranchers," the Floyd County Farm Bureau leader said.

The House Ag Committee will be working very closely with the Texas Department of Agriculture on the statewide agricultural policy.

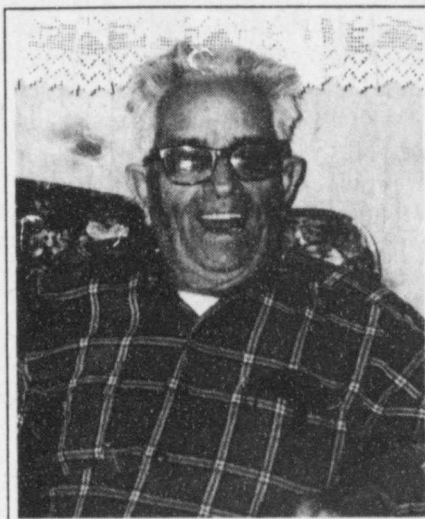

Panic and scams could cause Y2K problems

to give verbal authorization to transfer funds.

"We want everyone to understand their banks already know all that information. There is no way we will call you on the phone and ask you any of those kind of things. Do not give out any information on the phone. Call your bank immediately if anyone calls you for this type of information."

The banks in Floyd County assure this newspaper they feel very confident they have their computers Y2K compatible. However, anyone with concerns need only to keep bank statements to compare and cross check with bank records should any discrepancies arise.

Keeping hard copies (receipts) of any type of banking transaction, utility billing, or health care records, is always recommended.

Any business, or home, that depends on computers to handle records should have their programs checked to see if they are Y2K compatible. Test runs, using the suspected problem dates could be performed to see if the program is affected.

David McCulley of Computer Transition Services Inc., in Lubbock, said there are web sites available to help individuals.

"Microsoft has a web site with good information," said McCulley. "Other sites are Y2K.com; IBM.com; and Year2000.com. NSTL.com has a program you can download to check your computer."

The American Red Cross has their own plans for action and advises the public to take only the type of action that a prudent person takes to prepare for any type of service disruption in times of severe weather, etc.

For instance, stock disaster supplies to last several days to a week for you and your family. This includes perishable foods, stored water, an ample supply of prescription and nonprescription medicines, batteries, flashlights, battery operated radio, blankets, etc.

As you would in preparation for a winter storm, keep your automobile gas tank above half full, and in case the power fails, plan to use alterna-

tive cooking devices. Don't use open flames or charcoal grills indoors.

The Red Cross advises that if you plan to use a portable generator, connect what you want to power directly to the generator. Do not connect the generator to your home's electrical system.

Jerry Livingston, of Lighthouse Electric, said, "Electricians can install a device which is hooked up to your

generator and the power circuit that comes into the house. These have a "double pole switch" which completely disconnects you from the power supply company that you have and then allows the switch to be thrown to the other side to turn on your generator.

"Please disconnect yourself from the power company. People (working on lines) have been killed because they did not know there was still power coming from a generator in the house."

Most people anticipate Y2K problems may happen Dec. 31, 1999, at midnight. Many experts predict the problem is more likely to be a persistent one over a few years rather than a single "crash".

For example, there may be a computer based problem with other dates, such as April 9, 1999, which is the 99th day of the year, or on 9/9/99. In the past a series of nines was used to indicate termination of a computer program, and some experts believe that when all nines show up in a date sequence, some computer systems could read it as a program termination command. There is also concern regarding fiscal year 2000 dates in those organizations with fiscal years that start earlier than Dec. 31, 1999. Also, the year 2000 is a leap year, and the leap year date 02/29/00 may be a problem for some computer programs.

According to the Red Cross web site, the good news is "federal, state, and local governments; banks and other financial institutions; retail businesses, and every other group affected by this problem have been working to resolve it, and a great deal of progress has been made."
