Floyd County receives abundant rains

"It is a drought buster," were the words used by one T.V. newscaster in describing last weeks welcome rains to the South Plains.

Three-five inches of rain were received in different portions of Floyd County and other areas of the South Plains, over four days of rain. Although small twisters and hail were reported in areas, damage to property was minimal when compared to the benefits of the rain received.

Beginning on Wednesday, April 28th, the rain did not stop completely until Saturday night, May 1st.

Lake Mackenzie is reportedly up 8 1/2 feet and still rising. "This is the greatest increase in the lake since 1985," said General Manager Tom Davey.

The White River Lake Authority office gave their lake's level at 23.57 feet Monday morning. This is over 7 feet above the previous weeks level.

Although unconfirmed by the weather service, individuals in different areas of Floyd County reported damage from twisters.

Carl Lemons, of the Cedar Hill community, reported an "unconfirmed" twister hit their community Wednesday night.

"It picked up one tree out of the ground and set it aside," said Lemons. "Also one building was moved off its foundation and a nearby shed was destroyed."

"All the REA electric poles were flattened down to the ground for a mile south of town. Some fell to the east and some fell to the west."

"Three houses lost their roofs and there were tree branches scattered everywhere. It also hailed pretty hard," said Lemons.

Rainfall in Cedar Hill was reported at approximately 5 inches.

Randy Pernell, at Darty Gin, reported 4" of rainfall. "We lost one sprinkler system nearby due to the high winds Wednesday night, April 28th."

"Also, one of the large cross-country electric high line poles was toppled during the same storm."

"We had some roofs damaged in Dougherty and one resident lost their carport," said Pernell.

The Lone Star community received 4 inches of rain and Lone Star resident, Kay Beavers, related her family's experience with a twister.

"It was a little after 11 p.m. Saturday night. It had been raining and all of a sudden it got still. Then we heard

this very loud roar and the door started popping. We didn't have time to do anything."

Kay and her two children, 9 year old Brandon and 15 year old Cami huddled together until the twister was past.

"My fence and antennae were blown down and big green limbs were broken off my tree. Our trampoline had been picked up and came down in different pieces. Some of the springs were straightened."

"I never realized how unprepared I was for something like this. It is true-you have no time."

The Lockney area reported 4.4" of rain since Wednesday and Floydada Cable gave a total of 3.5 inches. Floydada airport reported 4.9" and a Floydada resident on South Third got a 5" total.

South Plains Gin received 3.7" and McCoy Gin reported 5.8". Barwise Elevator had 3.6" and Sandhill Elevator reported 4".

Sandfighting began in earnest Tuesday, May 4, when winds began whipping off the top soil and filling the air with dirt. At 4:00 p.m., Tuesday, the Floydada Airport reported a constant due west wind of 30-35 mph, gusting to 50 mph.

Ventura was also quick to thank Coach Hallmark and Coach Ventura



Lacy Austin elected FFA Plainview District President

Plainview District FFA delegates elected Lacy Austin of Lockney as the president at its annual banquet held here Friday.

The Plainview District FFA is an association of 15 local chapters in Hale, Castro, Swisher, Floyd and Lamb counties.

"It was really exciting, when they announced I was president I couldn't believe it," said Miss Austin who served as district treasurer last year.

The 16-year-old daughter of Ronnie and Elaine Austin of Lockney was the only incumbent district officer who was running for a slot on the seven-member officer team.

Miss Austin said she wasn't sure if running as an incumbent was an advantage and that some had even discouraged her from making a second run for office at the district level.

"They said I should just wait and run for area next year, but I ran because I really wanted to serve as president." She says. The first round of balloting held Tuesday at Abernathy narrowed the field of 13 candidates to the seven to serve as district officers along with three finalists for the presidency of the district. Miss Austin, Lacey Durham of Kress and Sage Annen from Nazareth, competed in the final rounds Friday. Friday's first ballot

Floydada council has new faces

Floydada residents elected a new mayor and two councilmen on Saturday, May 1.

Six hundred and forty-one total votes were cast in the city elections. Of that total, the newly elected mayor, Bobby Gilliland received 512 votes.

Other mayoral candidates, Albert Hill and Henry Bolton, received 111 and 9 votes respectively.

In the race for the District 2 council seat, Ruben Barrientos, received the majority votes of 83, compared to

challenger Rachael D. Castillo's total of 60.

In the District 3 race, Incumbent Councilman Sheldon Sue received 189 total votes, compared to Robert John Arneel's 25 votes.

Robert John Arneel III: Early votes, 5; District 3, 20.





A view from The Lamplighter

This will probably be another one of those long columns, which we sometimes get involved with when the spirit moves us and the editor can find room among her pages.

Mr. Milosovic freed the three American prisoners (of war) at the urging of the Rev. Jesse Jackson, NATO responded with some of the heaviest bombing of the war, and things are back to normal in the Balkans.

Anyway, our own thinking concerning the war in Kosovo and Serbia is evidently not too much out of line with the thinking of most people here on the South Plains. Southwest Research Associates in Lubbock recently released the results of its latest opinion survey of folks living in nine counties (including Floyd County) on the South Plains. The survey, taken during the middle of April, involved 400 completed interviews with people who agreed to answer questions. Potential "respondents" were selected at random by computer. That gave us a survey that can be considered to have a "confidence level" of 95 percent, with an accuracy of plus or minus 4.9 percent. In other words, answers to questions can vary as much as 4.9 percent in the overall survey. If an answer results in 48 percent "yes" and 52 percent "no", it can be considered a dead heat. Even though the poll may indicate that a bare majority said "no," the possible margin for error requires that, for statistical purposes, the issue should be judged as even.

Having said all that, we will take a look at the results. As one would expect, given its population, Lubbock County provided the largest number (256) and the largest percentage (64%). Floyd County contributed 1.5 percent, Hale county contributed 2.3 percent, Crosby had 2.3 percent. So it went, across the nine counties. Garza County, for instance, contributed 1.3 percent. That's not a whole lot, we will acknowledge, but it corresponds well with Garza County's overall comparison to the whole population in the nine county area.

So what did the people say? Well, not everyone said the same thing. But most of them, 61.5 percent said they preferred George W. Bush to be the next President. This was in an open-ended question asking people who they would prefer. No names were suggested. Respondents could volunteer any name they preferred. Al Gore, the Vice President, got 4.8 percent.

John McCain, a Republican, got 0.3 percent. Bill Bradley got 0.8 percent, a small fraction more than Al Gore. (If you want the complete results of all questions, and if you have a computer "on line" you may dial in www.southwestresearch.com and get it all, if you have the time and inclination. But for the moment we are concerned with questions involving the Balkan war.)

When asked "If the decision had been yours, would you have begun the bombing?", 53 percent of those who responded said "no." Those who said they would have begun the bombing, had the decision been theirs to make, amounted to 29 percent. So the vast majority said "no," they would not have started the bombing. A 29 percent minority said yes, they would have. The rest said they "didn't know".

When asked if they thought the President's stated objectives in this war were being met, 48.5 percent said "no," while 29 percent said "yes." The others said they "didn't know," or had no opinion.

When asked if they thought the bombing had made the situation better or worse, 56 percent said the bombing had made matters worse, while 24 percent said it had made matters better. When asked, "Do you believe the stated objectives of this mission can finally be achieved by air power alone, or do you believe NATO will have to introduce ground forces as well?" 67.3 percent said ground forces would be necessary, while 16 percent said the mission could be accomplished by air force alone.

When asked if they would then support the use of ground forces, 51 percent said they would, while 38.3 percent said they would not.

When asked if their "voting preference" was mostly Democrat, or mostly Republican, 44.3 percent said mostly Republican, while 24.3 percent said their preference was "mostly Democrat."

The "cross tabulations", or the computer print out of respondents, answers, indicated that those from Floyd County were split evenly between Democrats and Republicans. In the overall nine-county sample Democrats were about evenly divided on the

question of whether air power alone would be able to "achieve the stated objectives," while Republicans were overwhelmingly of the opinion that ground troops would be required to achieve the President's stated objectives. It must be noted, however, that approximately 31 percent of both Democrats and Republicans said they would not support the use of ground forces.

So what do we have? A rather sizeable majority of respondents in the nine counties polled said they would not have begun the bombing, a good majority said Mr. Clinton's stated objectives of stopping the "ethnic cleansing" in Kosovo had not been achieved, a majority said the President's stated objectives could not be achieved without the use of ground forces, and most said they would support the use of ground forces to win the war.

Without being too simplistic, that means, to us, that most people on the South Plains would not have begun the bombing, but now that we are in that mess we ought to win, and they would support those means necessary to win. It also means that Slick Willie has the country in the same position he had it in during his fling with Monica, and the lies he told to hold on to his job. It may be remembered that when Dick Morris told the President that the country would forgive his adultery, but not his perjury, he responded "Well, we'll just have to win this one." And, with the help of the Congressional Black Caucus and the Rev. Jesse Jackson, he did.

We should note that the survey was sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and Channel 11 television station in Lubbock. We should note also that the value of any survey depends in large measure on what questions are asked, how those questions are asked, in what sequence they are asked, plus the size and randomness of the sample. Obviously there is lots of room for error, if all factors are not handled carefully. This particular survey, in our view, took pains to provide honest answers to questions on the public mind at the time it was taken.

Serug, at the age of 30, was the father of Nahor. Noah was 793.


Terah was the father of Abram at the age of 780. Noah was 892.

Appraisal district sends out property value notices

State law requires that Texas property owners have the right to be informed of changes in their property's value by local appraisal districts. On May 6, 1999 Floyd County appraisal District mailed 10,000 property owners their notices showing the 1999 proposed value.

Shelia Faulkenberry, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay from this notice," Faulkenberry said.

Faulkenberry emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains for a property owner. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Floyd County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and ownership and other areas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called "ARB," is an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's values. The ARB also hears and settles protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Take special note of the proposed value for 1999," Faulkenberry said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted to the property. It provides last year's value, too.

Notices to property owners whose values went up or increased more than 1,000 will also include "estimated taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new value and estimated

tax rates if the taxing unit set tax rates for the same amount of operating dollars as last year. Generally, taxing units set final 1999 tax rates in August and September.

Faulkenberry asks that a property owner look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no errors. "If the notice contains an old address, please let the appraisal district know. Mail is only forwarded to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October," Faulkenberry added.

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely. A property owner is responsible for keeping the appraisal district informed of the correct mailing address.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Faulkenberry said,

"as long as it identifies the property owner and the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or spending and will not hear protests on those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled hearing date. The property owner will also receive a copy of the State Comptroller's pamphlet entitled Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies and Responsibilities and a copy of the ARB's procedures.

Faulkenberry said that protest hear-

ings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on June 17, 1999. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.

Property owners protesting their valuation should not attempt to contact ARB members outside the hearing, the chief appraiser stressed. Each ARB member must sign a affidavit stating that no such contact has occurred with a property owner or the appraisal office staff before the scheduled hearing.

Rural route and box addresses to receive new 911 physical addresses

Within the next year, each citizen will be receiving notification of their newly assigned 9-1-1 physical address as a result of the rural addressing projects implemented by each county throughout the region. The counties include: Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cochran, Hockley, Crosby, Dickens, King, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent and Stonewall. This process will convert route/box addresses over to the new physical address. Many citizens have questions about this address information prior to notification.

Until the notification process is complete in your county, a citizen may obtain address information by contacting Emergency Communications staff

for the South Plains Association of Governments at (806) 762-8721. When calling, please identify what county you reside in, and that you are requesting your 9-1-1 address. The only other agency that has the initial address assignment information is your county's designated addressing coordinator. No mailing address should be changed on any citizen's record or document unless the address has been verified by addressing personnel. This eliminates the possibility of citizens having to change an in-

correct address that may have been obtained from another source not utilizing the county's adopted addressing scheme.

The postal notification process will be completed in conjunction with your local Postmaster, Commissioner, and the SPAG 9-1-1 Director. In this process, citizens will be sent an official notification letter displaying their assigned address. Once this letter is received, citizens may change addresses on all their records and correspondence.

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



Annual Lighthouse Membership Meeting held

The largest crowd in several years attended the 60th installment of the annual membership meeting of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative on Thursday, April 29, at the Cooperative headquarters in Floydada.

Eighty-one members and guests took advantage of the Health Fair, which ran from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m., to get their blood pressure and cholesterol level checked, to be tested for glaucoma, screened for glucose, and gather information from the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, Dr. Stewart Webb, University Medical Center, Cogdell Clinic, Texas Migrant Council, and Calvert Home Health Service.

Approximately 570 members and guests attended to visit with friends and neighbors, enjoy the meal catered by Danny's Fins & Hens, listen to outstanding entertainment, and hear reports on how their Cooperative fared in 1998.

Prior to the business meeting, the crowd was entertained by 6 year old fiddler, Garrett Thornton, accompanied by Jacky Dewbre on the guitar, and by a group of Floyd County 4-Hers who performed a medley of patriotic songs. After the meal and musical entertainment, the youngsters present adjourned to the community room to be entertained by "Magic by Russell", a magician from Lubbock.

Louis Lloyd gave the Golden Spread Electric Cooperative report on the progress of Mustang Station, the 488 megawatt electric generating plant being built near Denver City by the Amarillo based cooperative, in partnership with Denver City Energy Associates. He reported that the plant, when completed, will be 30% more efficient than any plant currently operated in the area, and will be a significant asset to Lighthouse and the 10 other area electric cooperatives that make up the membership of Golden Spread.

"Phase 1, the two natural gas fired turbine generators, are complete and should be on line by June 1, in time for our peak irrigation season this year. Phase 2, which is the combined cycle generator operated on steam produced from the exhaust of the first two turbines, should be ready by January 1, 2000," said Lloyd.

Following Lloyd's report, Cooperative attorney Harry Jung conducted the election of directors. While the ballots were being counted, Darren

Patrick of the cooperative's auditing firm reported that Lighthouse had total assets as of December 31, 1998, of \$26,000,000, up from about \$24,000,000 in 1997. "One thing I might point out in your annual report is that the Cooperatives net income in

1998 was \$1.6 million, which was up from \$70,000 the previous year. It looks like everything is in good shape," he concluded.

General Manager Bill Harbin recognized the Lighthouse employees and their spouses, and introduced the board of directors and their wives. He then called eight employees and one director to the stage to be recognized for their years of service to Lighthouse. Awards for 25 years of service were presented to Nell Abram, Olivia Mercado, Billy Hunter, and Johnny Gourdon. Weldon Emert was recognized for 30 years of service, and employees Harvey Allen and Junior Martinez, and director Harold Burk were singled out for 35 year service awards. Harbin then called to the stage Line Superintendent Jackie Duke, who will have completed more than 47 years of service to the Cooperative when he retires on June 30 of this year.

In his business report, Harbin told the audience, "1998 was a very good year as far as margins are concerned, although that's sort of a good news-bad news situation. Those of you who are irrigators know why it was such a good year - we collected about \$10 million from you. That's a lot of money, but we hope you got good service and value for your money."

Harbin also reported that the Cooperative planned to retire \$250,000 in capital credits this year. "We had hoped to have a check for you here tonight, but problems with the printer prevented it. You will be receiving it within the next two weeks," he said.

He also reported that a new sign up for irrigation load control was planned, and he announced the elimination of the \$5.00 membership fee, with those who have already paid the fee receiving a \$5.00 credit on their next bill.

Harbin then talked about the pending legislation in Austin on restructuring the electric utility industry in Texas. He explained that in its current form, the deregulation would be similar to the way the telephone industry deregulation works in that service would be from the current service provider, with the retail customer being able to choose who they buy the electricity component from. Charges would then be added to the electricity cost for transmission, distribution, metering, and billing to get the electricity to the purchaser's point of service.

"In its current form, the legislation would leave the ultimate decision of whether or not to participate in retail competition up to the membership of the Cooperative through the Board of Directors. It is an enormous decision which could have grave consequences for your Cooperative, so we will keep you informed with the facts you will

need to help you make that decision," he said.

Harbin then reported on the status of the Cooperative's Y2K preparedness. "Lighthouse will be ready," he said, "and our wholesale power suppliers, Southwestern Public Service Company, West Texas Utilities Company, and Golden Spread, have all assured us that they are doing everything they can to assure you an uninterrupted flow of power."

He also told the audience that Lighthouse had joined an organization called Touchstone Energy, a nationwide partnership of electric cooperatives. "There are 1,000 electric cooperatives across the nation who serve over 80% of the land area of the U.S. Together, we are a large utility with many more miles of line than any other electric company," he said, "and in numbers, there is strength. We joined this organization to share marketing ideas, research ideas, to enhance our recognition, and also to remind ourselves, our members, and the public, that our business is service. Our power is not just in our electrical connections, but in our human connections."

Following the second round of prize drawing, Cooperative attorney Jung announced that incumbents J.W. Jackson, Don Bean, and Ronald Mullin had been re-elected to the board of directors.

Member Service Manager Larry Ogden introduced the Member Services Committee who helped plan and conduct the meeting. Members of the committee were Jimmy and Mary Parkhill of Crosbyton, Robert and Arlene Nixon of Floydada, Brian and Aimee Teeple of Floydada, Bryan and Shadi Buchanan of Turkey, Ty and Nikolyn Williams of Lockney, Rex and Becky Hegi of Petersburg, and Chad and Jamie Williams of Floydada.

The youngest and oldest members present were also recognized. The youngest member present was Ginger Pyle of Floydada, and the oldest member present was Charles Featherston, 90, of Petersburg.

Following this, the third prize drawing was held, and the final agenda item was the drawing for the grand prize, \$500, which was won by Don Warren of Floydada.

May 3-7 designated as "Water Week" by extension service

The serious drought situation that we have faced in the last few years has been disastrous in many ways, but there is one way that it may have even helped us. It prompted Texans to think about water and how we use it. In many areas, it showed the need for water conservation practices.

The Floyd County Extension Service is doing our part by educating county residence on water supply and conservation issues. Not only do we want to help people survive a short-

term crisis but also help them understand the bigger picture. Projections from the Texas Water Development Board indicate that by 2050, demand for water in the state will exceed supply. Almost 16 percent of our water requirements will have to be met through conservation and reuse programs.

The role that we in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve in educating citizens about water supply issues was recognized by the 75th state legislature's Senate Bill 1. Fund-

ing through Senate Bill 1 provided an opportunity to enhance our existing water conservation programs and focus on groundwater management issues. Our programs address both urban and rural audiences because water is needed by everyone, and the sharing of this resource will benefit all Texans in the future.



PUBLIC NOTICE

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your property
- The inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- The unequal appraisal of your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of the property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at:

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive ARB's order.

Tax Payment
If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*
Usual Deadline
On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal

because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

TRAITS OF A HEALTHY FAMILY

What constitutes a healthy family depends on your definition. What is healthy to one person, may not be healthy to another. I've listed some general things I've observed that have been helpful to families. By the way, a "family" may not be the standard mom, pop and so many kids. It may be one parent, grandparents, or so forth. A healthy family:

1. Communicates and listens. They exhibit intimacy and encourages individual feelings and independent thinking. They avoid put down phrases.
2. Affirms and supports one another.
3. Teaches respect for others. Individual differences within the family are respected and they show respect to others outside the family.
4. Develops a sense of trust. They do not break trust for the amusement of others. They realize that broken trust can not be mended.
5. Has sense of play and and humor. They do not necessarily equate play with spending money.
6. Exhibits a sense of share responsibility. They understand that responsibility means more than doing chores.

7. Teaches a sense of right and wrong.
8. Has a strong sense of family in which rituals and traditions abound.
9. Has a balance of interaction among members. It does not allow work and other activities to always infringe on family time. It avoids the forming of cliques within the family.
10. Has a shared religious core. Faith in God plays a foundational role in daily life.
11. Respects the privacy of others. It respects fads, friends, confidences, room privacy, and time to be alone.
12. Values service to others yet maintains a balance and keeps volunteerism under control.
13. Values table times and conversation.
14. Shares leisure time. Prioritizes it's activities. Seeks opportunities to spend time alone with individual members and controls television use.
15. Admits to and seeks help with problems. It considers problems to be a normal part of life.
