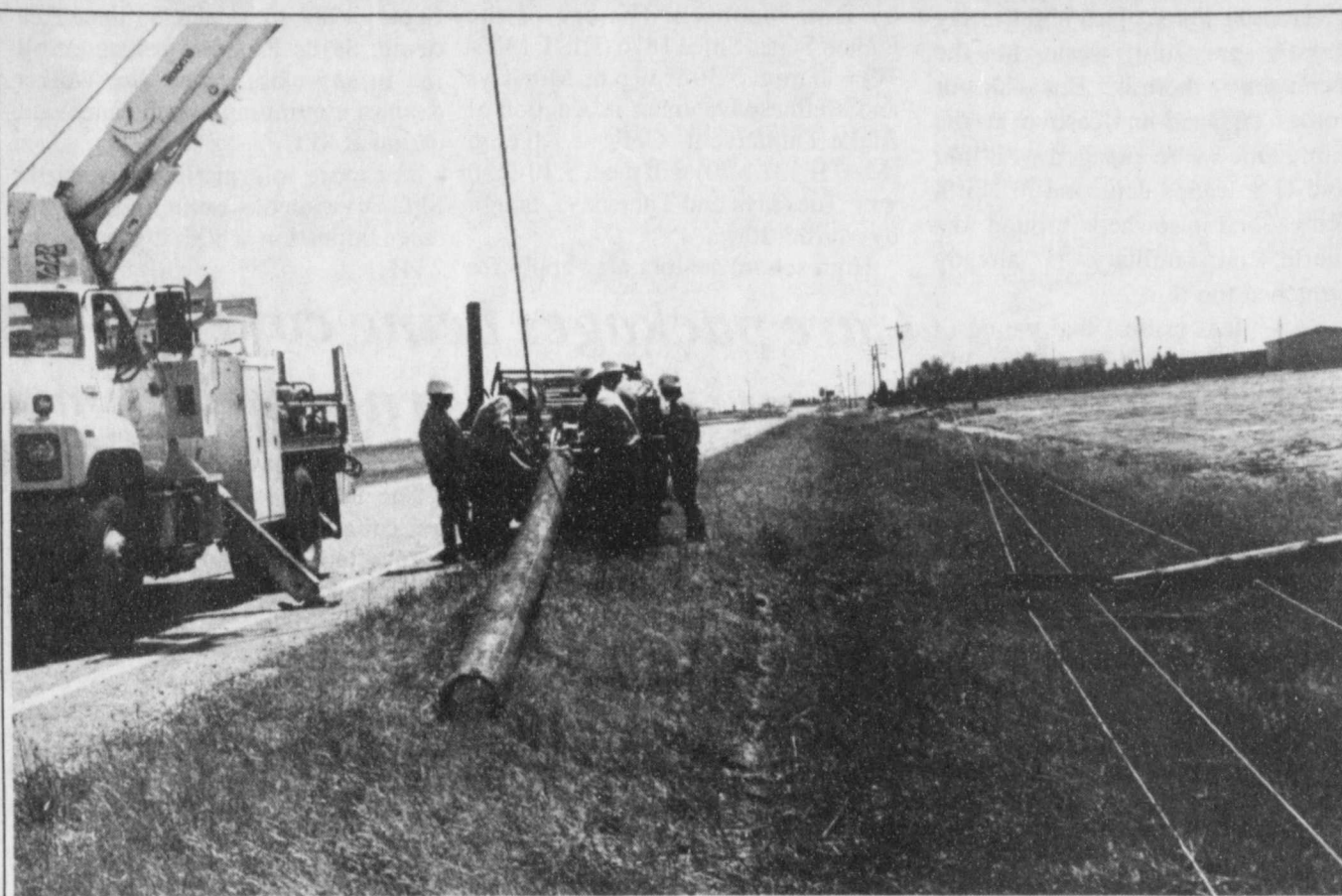

High winds topple telephone poles and send some to cellars

Hurricane force winds blasted through the northwest corner of Floyd County Sunday afternoon leaving the area's residents without electricity but grateful it wasn't worse.

The storm hit the Providence community Sunday afternoon shortly after 3:00 p.m., packing 97 m.p.h. winds which blew down electric poles, tore off barn roofs, and damaged circle irrigation systems.

Ray Macha, of Providence, said, "I spotted a couple of funnel clouds during the storm and we went to the cellar. My rain gauge measured 1 inch of rainfall, but I have heard some in the area received 3 inches. "We were without electricity until 10 p.m. Sunday night."

Bill Harbin, manager of Lighthouse Electric said, "We lost some 30 electric poles which were blown down by the high winds around 3:00 p.m.,

about 2 to 3 miles west of Providence."

Joe Nance, of Providence Elevator, said, "The wind was clocked at 82 m.p.h., but we were on the edge of the storm. The storm was probably over 2 miles wide. I heard Alex Ball, 1 mile west of the Providence intersection, clocked winds at 97 m.p.h."

Clar Schacht, of Windmark Insurance in Lockney, estimated 40-50 pivot systems were blown over or twisted.

At Crume Gin a module shed was blown away, and many lost roofs from their barns.

High School Science teacher, Mike Long, of Silverton, said, "The wind speed in Silverton was clocked at 89 m.p.h., but I know it was even stronger around us.

"Several chimneys were blown down in Silverton and sheds were de-

stroyed. We measured .45 inches of rainfall," he added.

Floydada Cable T.V. and Floydada airport registered .9 inches of rain. The City Airport also clocked winds at 60 m.p.h.

The State Highway Department stayed busy warning travelers of flooded streets. Crews put "high water" signs north of the airport on Hwy. 207, north of Lockney on FM 378 (near Sterley), south of Dougherty on FM 28, and S.W. of Floydada at FM 37 and FM 3111.

Lambert Spraying, 1 mile east of Lockney, clocked winds at 60 m.p.h. at 3:36 p.m. and a resident in Lockney reported 1 inch of rain.

"It rained more than that," said Lockney resident Lennie Gilroy. "It was all blowing sideways and not falling into my rain gauge."

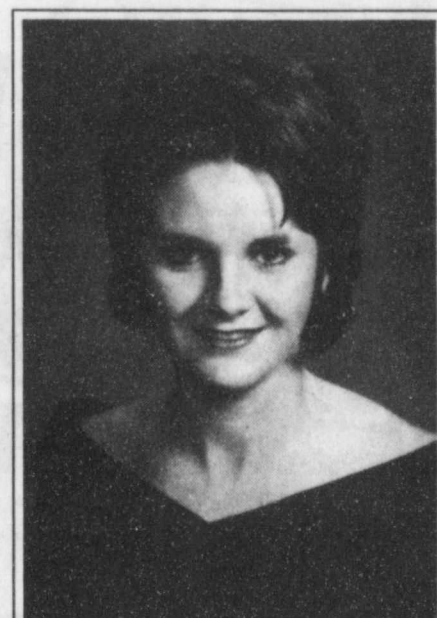

Commissioners Court gives "Friends" tax exempt status

The Floyd County Commissioners voted unanimously Monday morning to give the Floyd County Friends organization a tax exempt status on ten acres of land near Muncy.

The Unity Center building will be built near Muncy on the west side of Highway 70.

The community building will be operated by a nonprofit organization. The ground breaking is tentatively set for July, 1999.

Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden made the motion to grant the exemption and it was seconded by Commissioner Lennie Gilroy.

The commissioners tabled the request from Lubbock County asking Floyd County to cooperate in an inter-local agreement with the South

Plains "Heritage Tourism Trails" project.

It was noted that this agreement would cost Floyd County around \$800 if approved.

Commissioner Bearden made the motion to table the request and it was seconded by Commissioner Jon Jones.

Two Pct. 3 farm contracts were approved by the commissioners. One is to repair access roads and the other is to cut ditch between a fence line.

Commissioner George Taylor made the motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Jones.

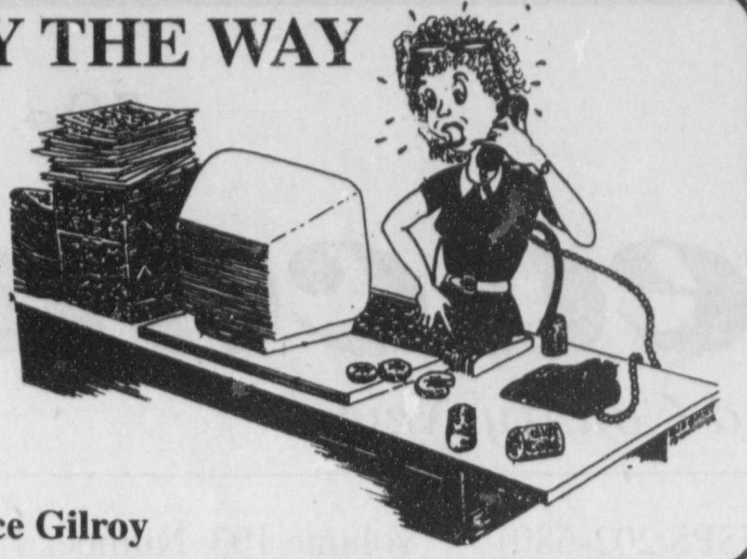
County Agent J.D. Ragland, CE-AG gave the commissioners an ag report for the past month and some future plans.

We Can't Let Kosovo Damage Our Ability to Respond to Other Threats Around the World

I opposed our military getting involved in Kosovo, and have real concerns now about how we're going to pick-up the cost.

According to the Congressional Budget Office, our military has spent around \$600 million on the operation so far and could end up spending over \$1 billion a month until it stops. That money has got to come from someplace. This week, Congress will debate where that someplace will be.

There are basically three options to choose from. One, we could take the money out of the budget surplus, which is expected to be around \$2.6 trillion over the next 10 years. Two, we could further gut our military and force them to just absorb the cost. Or three, we could take the money from other government programs.

This would be my preference. The federal government is

bigger now than at any other time in our history, and spent nearly \$300 billion more in 1998 than it did in 1992.

The defense budget, on the other hand, was cut in real terms for 13 straight years. That's not to say there's not any waste at the Pentagon -- there is. But with our forces engaged in Kosovo at the same time we're engaged with Iraq and U.S. troops deployed in North Korea and elsewhere around the world, our military is already stretched too thin.

It is critical that we don't further damage our ability to respond to other threats -- which is why, if we've got to pay for the situation in Kosovo, I think it makes more sense to cut the fat out of a federal bureaucracy that's too bloated to begin with than to carve muscle out of a military that has gotten way too lean.

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Lockney Council listens to cable service and departmental reports

LOCKNEY--During the May regular meeting of the Lockney City Council, Gary Marr, Mayor; and Councilmembers Bil Anderson, District 4, and Rodger Stapp, District 5, were sworn in. The incumbents had no opposition and the election was officially cancelled.

Marr appointed department heads J.D. Copeland, Streets; Rodger Stapp, Police Department; Bil Anderson, Water and Sewer; E.L. Brotherton, City Farm; and Tina Graves, Fire Department.

Members heard a report from Aaron Wilson Fire Chief for the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department, Mark Hamlin with Classic Cable, and Jimmy Graham, with Williams Heating and Cooling.

Wilson gave an update on the fire department. He related that members of the department are stationed on the outskirts of town during bad weather and one or two members stay at the fire station in order to sound the alarm in case of a confirmed tornado.

"We also monitor the watchers from Hale County and the sheriff's department so we can all work together. We are presently working on the sirens to be sure they will work if we should need them.

"Some of the members have recently attended training schools on house fires, arson, hazardous materials and spills. The school at Canyon has actual fires for hands-on training. We also have in-house training on a regular basis. Not long ago we had a practice run with the fire truck and went over all the controls and hoses."

Wilson stated a new motor and pump for the Jaws of Life had been purchased with a grant the fire department had received.

City Secretary Charlotte Hooten gave a report on the ambulance run collections. "The ambulance has received \$774 in payments since October. This is about a 40 percent payment rate."

When asked what the charge was for a call, Wilson replied \$75 here in town and an addition \$2.50 per mile for runs in the county."

Members of the council agreed the amount is insufficient and recommended the charges be increased to a level equal with other towns Lockney's size. Wilson said they had discussed it before and would discuss it again at the next fire department meeting.

Mark Hamlin is the new Area Manager for Classic Cable. He resides in Pampa and has his office in Shamrock. He told the council there are 78 communities in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma in his area. At present he is visiting the towns and getting an idea of problems, and work to be done.

"Lockney was mapped last summer for upgrades and line extensions. We have some lines that are too long and that cuts down on the reception. This needs to be corrected. I came to the

council meeting this morning to hear suggestions you may have to upgrade the system," he stated.

Other than the complaints citizens have made about the reception and changes they would like to see made in programming, councilmembers asked about a channel dedicated to the weather and that could possibly be used for local happenings and school activities.

"We are at the maximum number of channels here until we can upgrade the equipment and lines. The only channel that might be open would be channel 15, which is a channel out of Amarillo. The tower was moved closer to Tulia and was not replaced at the same height, so the reception is not good," he stated.

The council agreed to discuss the options they would like to see on the channel and get together with Hamlin at a later date.

Bil Anderson asked if there was a Neighborhood Watch group in Lockney at the present time. He was told there had been an active organization several years ago. He stated that he would like to see the organization start up again. All agreed that it was a worthwhile project that encouraged everyone to be on the lookout for strange occurrences. The city council would like to encourage an organization in Lockney to take this on as a project.

Jimmy Graham of Williams Heating and Cooling of Plainview gave the councilmembers an explanation of the heating and cooling system needed at City Hall. Anderson made the motion and J.D. Copeland the second to install a dual fuel unit with a 10 year warranty and an automatic timer for each day of the week. The unit will cost \$3,200.

Richard Zavala was awarded the lease to operate the swimming pool for this summer. The terms of the lease will be the same as they were last year.

The Hesperian-Beacon was selected as the newspaper the city will use to advertise City business and bids.

During department reports Lockney Chief of Police Jerry Edwards reported on the Lockney drug cases that have been prosecuted and those coming up. He told the council that Kevin Payne had gone to Levelland to participate in the Memorial Service for policemen slain while on duty in Texas.

Water Supervisor Dickie McCarty related the work done to the city sewer lift after rain water covered the motor and controls area. The motor had to be cleaned and the starter and new switches in the panel replaced. The total cost of the repair was \$5,300.00.

"We are getting the swimming pool ready. It will get a new coat of paint when the weather dries up. We also have a sewer line to replace that does not drain right," McCarty stated.

Arsenio Martinez, parks and building supervisor, stated he has been supervising the work done to the bathrooms at the Community Center and mowing city right of ways and parks.

Kenny Hooten, street supervisor is preparing for seal coating of several streets and working on drainage problems.

A honey(dew) of a solution for a sweeter more nutritious melon

Sweeter, more nutritious honeydew melons might be rolling onto grocery shelves soon—thanks to a simple process that allows them to stay on the vine to full maturity, while remaining firm enough to withstand cross-country shipment.

Two USDA scientists have found that cooling melons in a water bath containing a special calcium-amino acid solution right after harvest slows the natural aging process.

"Calcium, found in the green tissue under the rind, moves to the seeds as the melon ages, which softens the rind and eventually leads to spoilage. The calcium bath puts more of the mineral into the rind, keeping it firmer longer. This not only increases shelf life, but also fortifies the fruit's calcium content," said Dr. Michael A. Grusak, a plant physiologist at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Grusak and Dr. Gene Lester, an ARS Subtropical Agricultural Research Center scientist in Weslaco,

"Honeydew melons are very perishable, which has forced growers to pick them several days prior to full maturity to allow for shipment," Grusak said. While early harvesting has helped extend the melon's shelf life, it's also made their purchase a hit-or-miss situation for consumers.

"Once picked, honeydew melons don't develop any further sweetness," he said. A fully mature melon has a "soluble solids" content of 12 to 15 percent, mostly in the form of fruit sugar. But to allow for shipping, honeydews are currently harvested with levels as low as 9 percent. That's why some honeydews can lack flavor and sweetness.

Because the calcium-containing solution can be added to water baths used to cool melons at harvest, it is an easy and inexpensive process for growers to adapt, Grusak said. Several U.S. growers are considering testing the process during the May to June melon harvest season this year. Once perfected, this could make "vine-ripened" honeydews available to consumers.

Honeydew melon is rich in vitamin C and potassium and already provides a fair amount of calcium, for just 60 calories. It also provides fiber and smaller amounts of other important vitamins and minerals.

"It's exciting to develop a sweet and simple solution to a problem that can benefit everyone, from growers to consumers," Grusak said. Sweeter, more flavorful honeydews should make consuming the recommended five servings of fruits and vegetables each day much easier.

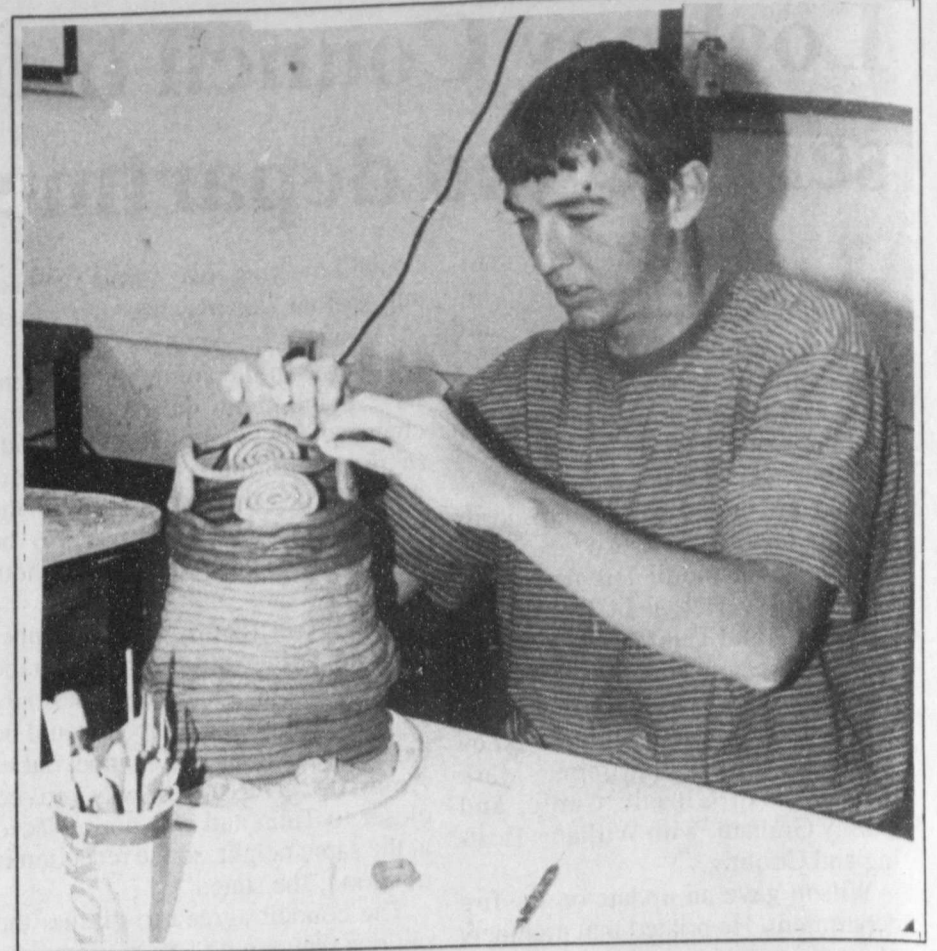

Child car seat program helps ensure safety on the road

Despite her own injuries, the frightened mother brought her car to a halt in a shower of broken glass and crunched metal, then turned to her child in the back seat. The wide-eyed toddler stared back, without even a scratch. Fortunately, just days earlier, staff from the Safe Riders Program had reinstalled his safety seat securely and correctly in the family auto.

"People hear about our check-up clinics and drive up to have us check their car safety seats," said Susan Warren, director of Safe Riders, a statewide traffic safety program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "Manufacturer instructions often are so difficult to understand that most people don't install child safety seats properly. It can take our trained staff-up to a half hour to wrestle them into place."

When correctly secured in the back seat, safety seats reduce the risk of death from traffic crashes by 71 percent for infants and by 54 percent for toddlers. "We know this program can protect children from serious injury or death," Warren said. "Many people tell us about children surviving car crashes just a few days after we install their seats correctly."

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children, taking more than 2,658 lives of children under age 15 nationally and seriously injuring another 300,000 children each year. In 1997 in Texas, 250 children under age 15 died in crashes. Warren said that research shows 87 percent of child safety seats in Texas are not installed correctly, placing children at risk in auto accidents.

"With some 300 different car models and at least 75 different styles of car safety seats, it's no wonder that so many are not installed as they should be," she said. From four to six Safe Riders car seat clinics are held each month around the state.

Here are some suggestions from Safe Riders for checking your child's safety seat:

Make sure the auto's safety belt holds the car seat securely. If you can rock the child's seat forward or from side to side more than 1 inch, the seat is not installed correctly.

Most seats need a harness clip, which should rest on the child's chest, even with his or her underarms. Make sure harness straps are not torn or frayed. The straps should fit snugly, allowing no more than one finger between the straps and the child's body.

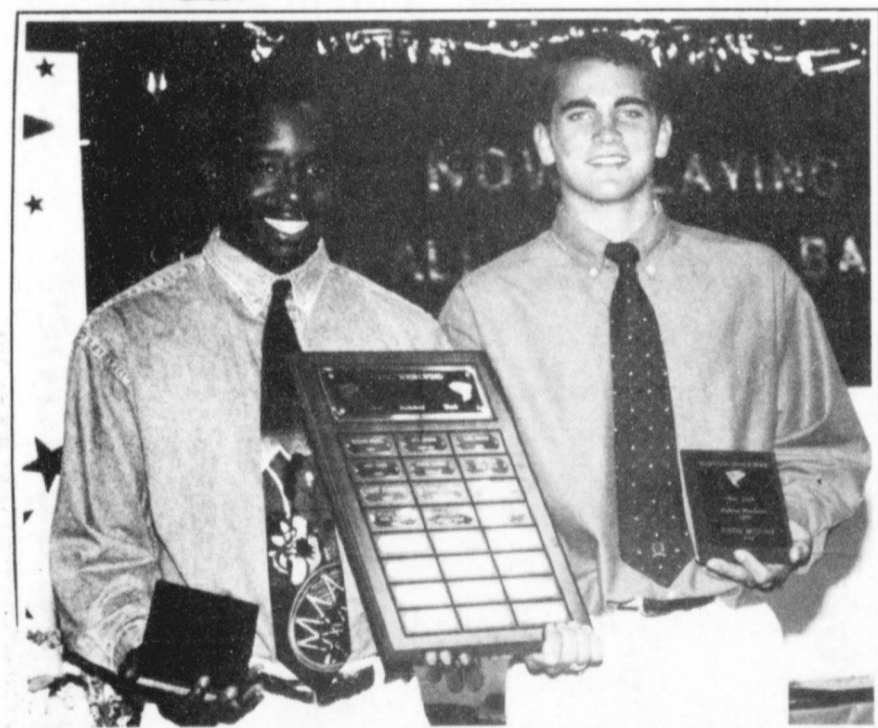

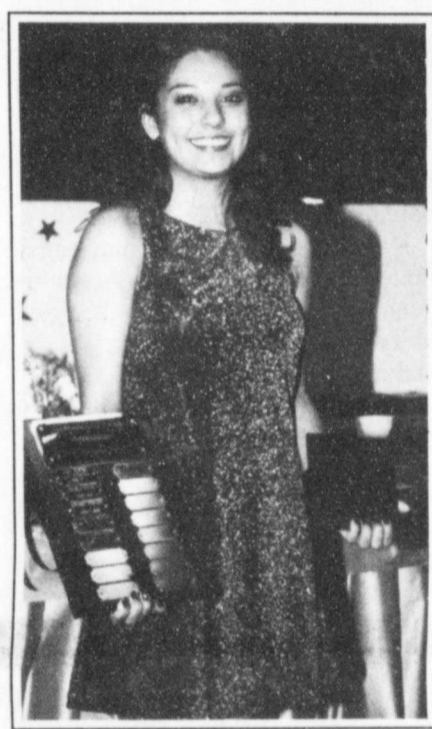

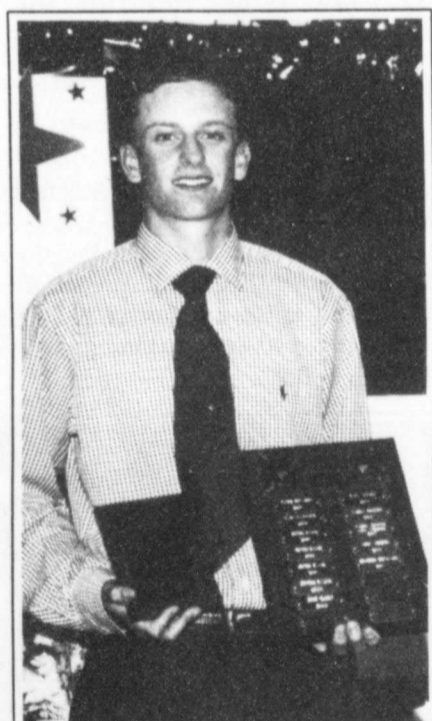

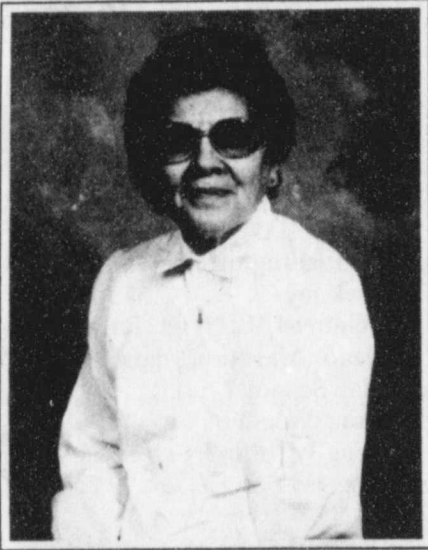
Burial will follow in the Abernathy Cemetery under the direction of Abell Funeral Home.

It is easy to have a positive attitude if you have no bad experiences. Most of us have not enjoyed that kind of life--one without bad experiences. Your life would have to be so sheltered that you did not come in contact with other humans and that is not likely to happen with most of us.

They keep people at a distance because they believe that "if you really knew me, you would not like me." Each of these types of people mentioned above, put up a type of wall between themselves and others--they appear plastic--not genuine. Being real means you have confidence in yourself. Overall, you like what and who you are.

2. Do nothing you have to hide. Do not lie, cheat, steal or falsify anything. When you do, you begin to believe everyone else is doing the same thing you are. You begin to believe that no one can be trusted and your attitude goes to pot.

3. Do not gossip. The definition I like about gossip is, "Sharing harmful information with someone who is

not a part of the problem or the solution." That does not mean I cannot talk about someone. I just cannot do it in a harmful way. Gossip is hard to combat because it can be fun to some extent. When you are the object of gossip, it hurts.

Gossip tears down relationships by promoting negative thinking about another person, or an organization. If you refuse to be a part of gossip, you will go a long way toward having a positive attitude.

4. Do not take up an offense. It can be tempting to get on someone else's band wagon, especially if it is a friend who has been hurt by someone. You can gather a lot of extra baggage that is not any of your business if you are not very careful. You will find yourself feeling negative about a situation that you do not have all the information about. Quite frankly, there is enough of our own junk (hurts) that contribute to negative attitudes that we do not need to borrow someone else's. It has been said that we have a circle of concern and a circle of influence. We need to spend more energy in our circle of influence. We can be concerned about many things that we cannot do anything about. However, we can easily waste our energy in that circle. Focus on what you can change or influence.

"We appreciated those who participated in these forums. What we are trying to do is to develop a five year long range plan. We are now in process of writing up the results of those meetings.

"We came up with the top five issues Floyd County residents are interested in. These are what we use here at the Floyd County Extension Office to plan our educational program for the next five years.

Ragland mentioned other meetings that are taking top priority this time of the year. Some mentioned were booster meetings, peanut meetings, boll weevil meetings and producer meetings.

Demonstration work and test plots were also mentioned to begin as soon as it gets dry enough.

"We are thankful for the rain we've received, but I think time is upon us. Many of our producers throughout the county are getting geared up to plant cotton," Ragland stated.

"It looks like again it will be a big year for cotton in the county. Last year in 1998, we grew 197,000 acres of cotton and this year it looks like it will be slightly up from that.

"We have somewhere around 60-

80,000 acres of wheat this year. The rainfall has been real beneficial for the wheat. Some producers are planning on harvesting grain with their wheat this year," Ragland added.

"Last year we planted about 20,000 acres of corn and this year it may be around 15,000 acres. Most of our county's corn is going over to the feedlot at Caprock.

"We anticipate somewhere around 1300 to 1400 acres of pumpkins again this year. Sunflowers look to be slightly up to around 1500 acres plus.

"We had somewhere around 800 acres of peanuts last year and this year we will probably be down to 500-700 acres," Ragland added.

Ragland told the commissioners that he has had a lot of inquiries concerning new alternate crops because of the low price of cotton last year.

County Agent Melissa Long, CEA-FCS also reported, "We have 18 teams on our 'Walk Across Texas' program, plus all the kids at Duncan Elementary. One group at Duncan already has made it to Padre Island.

"This program has really raised the awareness of the need for exercise," Long added.

Long told the commissioners, "71 out of over 200 Floyd County 4-H kids went to the district competition last month. Another 30 entered the rifle contest and out of 23 teams, 21 got first place.

"We will be taking 25 kids to the 4-H Roundup in June and this is our largest group ever," Long said.

The commissioners heard the monthly treasurer's report from County Treasurer Mary Shurbet.

The financial report from April 1 thru April 30, 1999 showed the county with a beginning balance of \$485,970.62. Receipts for the month were \$261,868.24.

Transfers in and out were \$187,341.25 for the month.

The total amount disbursed was \$200,627.41 leaving a balance of \$547,211.45.



Floyd County Farm News

16,420 center pivot sprinkler systems operating across the Llano Estacado region in West Texas

Approximately 16,420 center pivot sprinkler systems are currently in operation within the 21 county Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Area, according to a recent inventory by area underground water conservation districts and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This represents an additional 3,489 center pivot sprinklers installed since the 1995 inventory.

Given an average cost of \$35,000 per center pivot sprinkler system, the 16,420 pivots in operation within the water planning area represent a \$574 million investment in water conservation equipment by area agricultural producers.

Current center pivot sprinkler totals by county within the region are Bailey, 877; Briscoe, 92; Castro, 1,261; Cochran, 590; Crosby, 509; Dawson, 483; Deaf Smith, 781; Dickens, 39; Floyd, 385; Gaines, 2,107; Garza, 41; Hale, 1,298; Hockley, 884; Lamb, 1,709; Lubbock, 778; Lynn, 493; Motley, 45; Parmer, 1,719; Swisher, 301; Terry, 1,319; and Yoakum, 709.

Gaines County had the largest increase in center pivot sprinkler systems since the 1995 inventory with

447 pivots added. Other increases are as follows: Hale, 308; Castro, 258; Lamb, 250; Lubbock, 239; Swisher, 212; Lynn, 185; Terry, 181; Floyd, 175; Crosby, 173; Parmer, 163; Yoakum, 160; Deaf Smith, 157; Hockley, 153; Dawson, 116; Cochran, 97; Bailey, 83; Briscoe, 71; Dickens, 23; Motley, 18; and Garza, 17.

There were approximately 2,297,406 acres irrigated with center pivot systems within the 21 county Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Area in 1998. The Texas Water Development Board inventory of irrigated acres between 1985 and 1995 indicates an average of 3,031,293 acres were irrigated during the 10 year period in the 21 county area.

"This inventory shows that farmers are making huge investments to be more efficient in applying ground water for irrigation," said A. Wayne Wyatt, Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Group chairman. "The center pivot sprinkler systems provide more flexibility in irrigating and help maintain crop yields with less water."

Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler systems can achieve irrigation application ef-

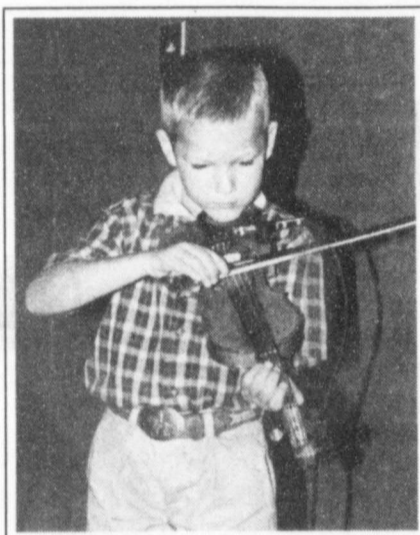
iciencies of up to 98 percent. Since the ground water is applied at low pressure directly to the furrow, water losses associated with evaporation and wind drift are almost eliminated.

LEPA center pivot sprinkler systems also help reduce labor and fuel costs and save 20 to 40 percent of the water pumped for irrigation as compared to conventional furrow irrigation.
