Mangold Memorial honored for service

LOCKNEY--The Texas Hospital Association recognized the W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital with an award for their fifty years of service to the Lockney community. The presentation was made at the hospital association convention in Austin, June 14-15.

Hospital Administrator, Sharon Hunt, accepted the plaque on behalf of the doctors, board of directors, and employees of the hospital.

Hunt related the surprise of those at the convention that the hospital was operating in a town the size of Lockney with four doctors and not under the wing of a larger organization.

She stated that several people asked how they were able to keep the doors open when the majority of hospitals in small towns had either closed or were kept open by larger hospitals.

"I was glad to tell them we have

four good doctors, a conservative, caring board of directors, and a great bunch of employees," she said.

Hunt also reported the hospital had gone through an inspection by the Texas Department of Health and a Medicare survey. "We were notified the hospital is in full compliance with all state licensing rules and Medicare provisions.

"We were pleased with the report. I have nothing but praise for our employees in all departments. They are a good group and we appreciate them for all the hard work they do," she stated.

Mangold Memorial has also been certified as a home health facility. "Connie Marion has been named the director and Susan Martin will be the L.V.N.

"We have seven patients at the current time and we are looking forward to caring for their needs.

City considers a six month 2-4D ban

Mike Bishop, owner of Bishop Pest Control spoke to the Floydada City Council, June 15th, concerning the damage done to trees and plants by commercial sprayers of 2-4D.

Bishop is an entomologist and a consultant for Caprock Ag.

He told the council, "We have commercial sprayers who come into our town during the summer and spray 2-4D chemicals. People call me and want to know what is wrong with their trees or flowers.

"Most counties have a cutoff date for commercial spraying with 2-4D. Our average normal last frost date is April 20th.

"I think that date is too late because most flowers and new growth on maple trees are extremely sensitive to 2-4D. These plants come out before the last frost," he said.

"The normal cutoff date for commercial spraying of 2-4D in most cities is April 1st. I suggest that we consider that date. "This would be for commercial spraying only. It would still leave the homeowner the option to spray his own yard with whatever he wants to use. Most of the time this will not affect his neighbor's yard," Bishop explained.

"The high pressure guns used by

commercial sprayers will drift far on a windy day and that is the problem.

"I would suggest that we strictly ban the commercial applications of 2-4D herbicides within the city limits after April 1st each year through October 31st.

"Winter applications of 2-4D does not hurt the plants and I think this will prevent a lot of these problems and complaints.

"In most cities the local police ask to see commercial sprayers' state license. I believe many that have been doing this spraying do not have a state license.

"I am not proposing anything outside the city limits and this ban would not affect the local farmers or the homeowner spraying their own yards," Bishop added.

City Manager Gary Brown told the council he would check on the wording of such an ordinance by other cities and make sure it would conform to the state law.

No action was taken on the matter by the council.

City Manager Brown brought to the attention of the council that the city is tax exempt from paying the 18.4 cents in federal taxes on fuel.

According to Brown, the city uses around 2,000 gallons of fuel each

More rain stalls replanting

Although they appreciate the rains, South Plains farmers are now eagerly waiting for a longer period of sunshine so they can replant crops destroyed by hail and too much rain.

Some fields replanted after recent hail storms will now have to be replanted again because of the heavy rains.

Local farmer, Steve Lloyd said, "We are getting ready to replant the third time on some of our acres. This time we will be putting in milo and guar.

"Our guar is already under contract with a processor in Vernon, but there is not much profit in this crop."

"You can't make any money when you have to plant three times, especially with milo," Lloyd added. Lloyd says it is important in this day and time to make a good crop every year in order to pay for equipment and production costs.

"The low cotton prices are just killing us right now," Lloyd said.

Rick Meyers, manager of the Floydada Coop Gin said, "We have lost at least 70% of our cotton ginning

territory this year due to hail." Rainfall totals varied throughout the county. The Lockney area received the

most on Sunday night at 2.2 inches and only .43 inches was recorded in Floydada.

Salas gets 15 years for selling drugs

District Judge Randy Hollums sentenced Romelo Salas, 48, of Lockney, to 15 years and 2 months in prison, on Friday, June 18, for selling cocaine at his place of business in Lockney.

Salas had pled guilty to the charge of Delivery of a Controlled Substance and chose to go before Judge Hollums for sentencing.

A 2nd degree felony, Salas could have received anywhere from 2-20 years and up to a \$10,000 fine.

According to District Attorney Becky McPherson the crime occurred on April 9, 1998 when Salas sold 2.28 grams of cocaine to an undercover officer from the South Plains Task Force. The sell took place at 111 E.

College in Lockney.

He was arrested in Lockney along with 11 other individuals, September 29, 1998 in a city wide arrest of drug offenders.

Testifying on Salas' behalf were: Pablo Nuncio, of Lockney; common-law wife Susie Nuncio, of Lockney; Mike Bueno, of Hale Cen-

ter; and Anna Dina Molina, of Lockney.

Pablo Nuncio testified that he and Salas were users of cocaine but did not sell the drug.

Salas was also fined \$3,000 by Judge Hollums.

According to McPherson, "Any

LISD hires new teachers and coaches

LOCKNEY--Members of the Lockney ISD Board met Tuesday and covered a long agenda. Approved were FNB, Lockney as the school depository, employment of teachers, T.I.F. grant application, and Drug Education and Deterrent Services.

Teachers and coaches hired for the 1999-2000 school year were Joe Don Elam, Coby Emery, and Kenneth Hines. Elam will be head girls basketball coach and 6th grade Science teacher. Emery will serve as an assistant football, basketball and baseball coach and will teach Texas History. Hines was named head track coach and will assist with football and basketball. He will also teach health classes.

Athletic Director Chad Terry stated that he feels those hired are quality people who will be an asset to the

school and to the community. "They all came from highly successful programs," he stated.

Resignations were approved from Heather Stowe, Science teacher at high school; and coaches David Sutterfield and Bobby Ventura.

Members of the board approved a contract for the coming school year with Southwest Drug Education and Deterrent Services.

High School Principal James Poole told the board, "The group furnishes drug dogs to patrol the school on a spot check basis. It has been a worthwhile program. We feel it has helped us overall with drugs and alcohol. We have taken knives out of cars, found drug residue and seeds along with alcoholic beverages.

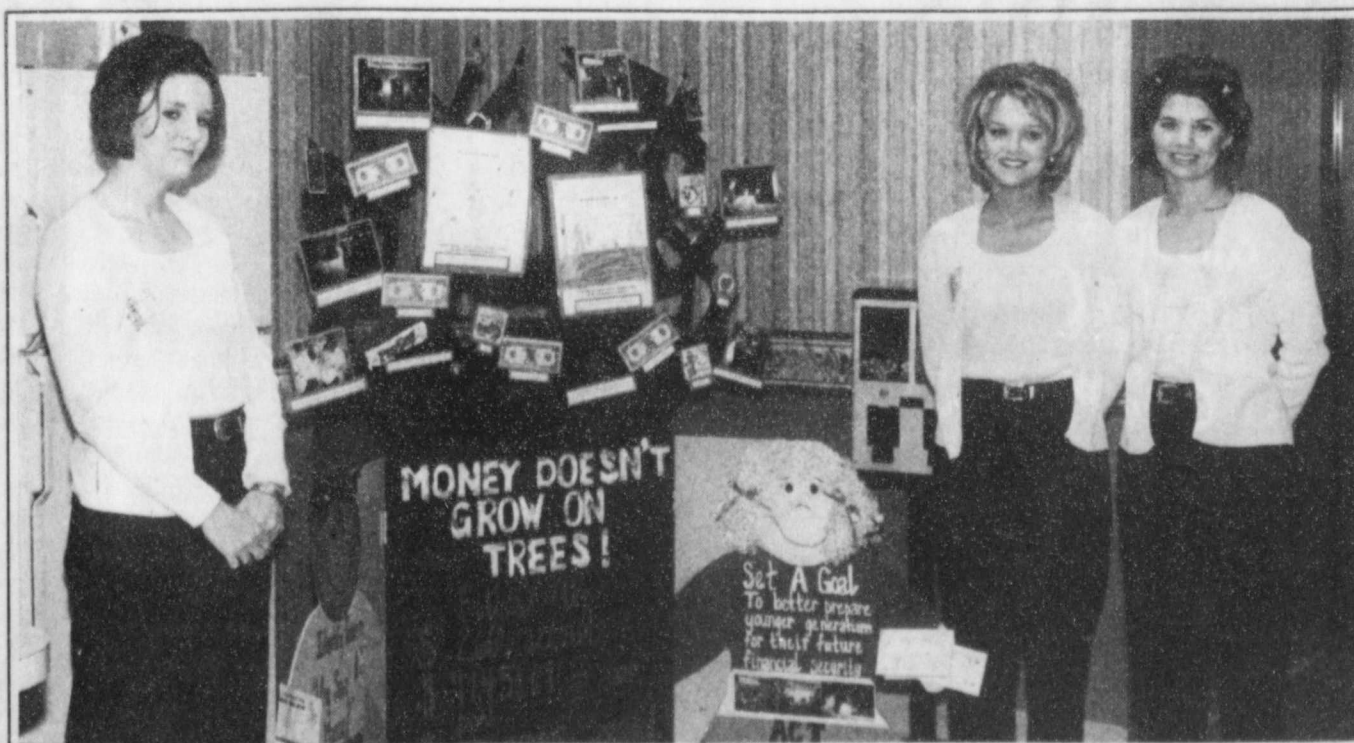
"The kids can't be searched indi-

vidually by the dogs, but we can pick classrooms at random and have the students go out into the hall, leaving their books, jackets and anything else at their desks, while the dogs check the room. If the dogs find any evidence of drugs the parents of that student are called and they are informed.

Poole reported in his opinion the dress code implemented last fall had gone fairly well. "The main change we will make will have to do with shirts worn by the girls. Last year the girls wore some of their shirts out that the boys had to tuck in. In order to be fair, the girls will also have to tuck their shirts in.

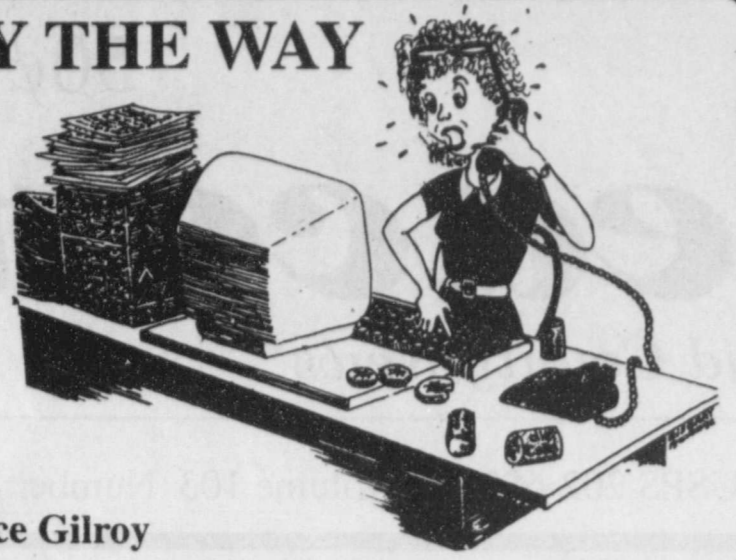
"We are also considering purchasing some coveralls to be worn by students who do not come to school in appropriate dress. It takes time to take

My son is excited about an upcoming Boy Scout week-long scout camp. This will be his first.

He would just get in the car and drive there with no concerns as to important stuff like soap and clean underwear. It is too weird that as soon as I heard about the camp I started thinking about what kind of showers they would have available and would he remember to brush his teeth.

Last week Chuck Aufill said something to me that made me realize I was not the only mom who thought about stuff like cleanliness. He said, "We have a blast at these things. We really don't need a lot of parents to help us get there and set up, but parents are nice to have around when we are gathering up stuff to leave. It's kind of a mess. We do make sure the boys take at least one shower the night before they go home to mom."

"I was reminded of that conversation when I read a "scout letter" from Lorene Newberry. She got this off of the internet. It is a letter sent home to mom from scout camp. It reminds me of the Camp Granada song--"Hello Mudder, Hello Fodder". Remember that song? You'll enjoy this.

"Dear Mom,
"Our scout master told us all to write our parents in case you saw the flood on TV and worried. We are OK. Only 1 of our tents and 2 sleeping bags got washed away. Luckily, none of us got drowned because we were all up on the mountain looking for Chad when it happened. Oh yes, please call Chad's mother and tell her he is OK. He can't write because of the cast. I got to ride in one of the search & rescue jeeps. It was neat. We never would have found him in the dark if it hadn't been for the lightning.

"Scoutmaster Webb got mad at Chad for going on a hike alone without telling anyone. Chad said he did tell him, but it was during the fire so he probably didn't hear him. Did you know that if you put gas on a fire, the gas can will blow up? The wet wood still didn't burn, but one of our tents did. Also some of our clothes. John is going to look weird until his hair

grows back.

"We will be home on Saturday if Scoutmaster Webb gets the car fixed. It wasn't his fault about the wreck. The brakes worked OK when we left. Scoutmaster Webb said that a car that old you have to expect something to break down; that's probably why he can't get insurance on it. We think it's a neat car. He doesn't care if we get it dirty, and if it's hot, sometimes he lets us ride on the tailgate. It gets pretty hot with 10 people in the car. He let us take turns riding in the trailer until the highway patrolman stopped and talked to us.

"Scoutmaster Webb is a neat guy. Don't worry, he is a good driver. In fact, he is teaching Terry how to drive. But he only lets him drive on the mountain roads where there isn't any traffic. All we ever see up there are logging trucks.

"This morning all of the guys were diving off the rocks and swimming out in the lake. Scoutmaster Webb wouldn't let me because I can't swim and Chad was afraid he would sink because of his cast, so he let us take the canoe across the lake. It was great. You can still see some of the trees under the water from the flood. Scoutmaster Webb isn't crabby like some scoutmasters. He didn't even get mad about the life jackets.

"He has to spend a lot of time working on the car so we are trying not to cause him any trouble. Guess what? We have all passed our first aid merit badges. When Dave dove in the lake and cut his arm, we got to see how a tourniquet works. Also Wade and I threw up. Scoutmaster Webb said it probably was just food poisoning from the leftover chicken. He said they got sick that way with the food they ate in prison. I'm so glad he got out and became our scoutmaster. He said he figured out how to get things done better while he was doing his time.

"I have to go now. We are going into town to mail our letters and buy bullets. Don't worry about anything. We are fine."

sentence over 15 years automatically sends someone to prison while they appeal their case (if they choose to do so). If it is under 15 years, the person can bond out while on appeal.

"Salas will probably serve about 6 years before he is paroled."

Also in District Court, on June 14th: Julian Hernandez, 21, of Floydada, pled guilty to aggravated sexual assault, which occurred on January 17, 1998. He was sentenced to 10 years in TDC and a \$2,000 fine. He was also sentenced to 2 years in the State Jail Facility, and a \$500 fine, for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

 them home and wait until they change. This way they could simply put the coveralls on over their clothes and when they go home at lunch they can change," he stated.
 Charles Keaton, technology supervisor for the school district, is working on an application for a T.I.F. grant. The grant has a maximum limit of \$45,000 and any amount received can be applied to improvements. The district received \$149,000 for the first T.I.F. grant they applied for. The motion to apply for the grant was made by Dan Smith and the second by Mike Mathis. All voted for.
 Danny Lambert met with the board and asked for the use of the gymnasium to house students attending the

Third and College Church of Christ youth meeting.
 He reported, "Last year we had nearly 300 kids. They came from all over the state and it was hard for the members of the church to house them all. They bring their sleeping bags and we need a large place where they can sleep and shower. All other activities will take place at the church."
 Board members were concerned with the floor in the gym and Lambert stated they would set out rules for shoes and do their best to see they were followed.
 The motion to let the church use the gym for a rental fee was made by Dan Smith and seconded by Louie Bybee. Mike Mathis, as a member of the church, abstained. All others voted for.
 Lusk reported damage to the building and buses due to inclement weather. Insurance adjusters have examined the buildings and vehicles and bids let for repairs.
 A report was made to the board on the Texas Primary Reading Inventory. The TPRI results indicate the strengths and weaknesses at the kindergarten and first grade levels.
 According to Charlotte Mitchell, Counselor at elementary school, "The Kindergarten tests showed an improvement in listening comprehension. The ability to answer an explicit question from a story was a strength. The students were able to memorize their sounds and letters fairly well, but the kindergarten teachers see a weakness in the ability to apply phonics to the tasks of reading and writing."
 "The first grade had strengths in the reading of isolated words and the ability to answer an explicit question about a story. There were a handful of students for whom reading the story

was at frustration level. Most of these students were candidates for retention in kindergarten. Retention in kindergarten is done only with parental permission, however, some parents opted to send their students on to the first grade. Now these students will be repeating first grade."
 A copy of the Dyslexia Policy and Procedures plan was presented to the school board. The written policy was approved. The motion was made by Mike Mathis and the second by Jim Bob Martin.
 Lusk reported that currently the school district has three teachers who are certified in the Scottish Rite method of teaching students with dyslexia and one certified in the Fast Forward program. The teachers are Karen Wilson, Tracy Long, Charlanne Burson and Lisa Collins.
 "Due to events that have happened all over the state we have decided we need to have a plan of action in place to provide for the safety and protection of all students, teachers and other campus personnel in the event of a life-threatening situation," he stated.
 Athletic Director Chad Terry asked the board to think about purchasing a new mower to use at the football and baseball fields. "The one we have cuts

unevenly. We can't use it at the baseball field at all. He stated he would call and get quotes on a 60 inch mower and present them at the next meeting.
 He also reported on plans for freshman football. "Always before the freshmen have come out with the varsity and junior varsity. This year we will have them in a group by themselves. They will have all the coaches to work with them during pre-season. It can be pretty intimidating for the young guys and this should work better."
 During the budget discussion Lusk reported on the pay raise given to the teachers by the Texas Legislature. He gave estimated figures on funding coming from the state and included estimates on salary increases for the auxiliary personnel and administration. He stated he would be going to Austin for meetings this month and hoped to have a better idea on how much the school system would have to spend on salaries when he returned. Work on the budget will continue at the next meeting.
 FNB, Lockney was approved as the school depository through August 31, 2001. Ronnie Hardin, FNB President met with the board and went over the bid presentation.

 month and every two months the city tries to rotate their purchases with different service stations around town.
 Brown said, "Everyone takes off the federal taxes except Babe's Service Center."
 Cornelius added, "The tax break amounts to about \$400.00 per month savings to the city."
 Nielson stated, "If Cornelius has to give the tax break, then everyone should have to do it."
 It was agreed in general by the council to send out notice letters to all fuel suppliers. If they do not participate in the federal tax break to the city, then their names would be dropped from the suppliers rotation list.

Floydada Mayor Bobby Gilliland gave a report to the council concerning the Emergency Management progress.

Gilliland said, "County Judge Hardin, Lockney Mayor Gary Marr and I met yesterday (June 14th). We decided to select one individual to be the Emergency Management Coordinator."

"We have several names of persons being considered for the job. Both Floydada and Lockney have agreed to compensate this person financially and the county commissioners will probably approve some amount, also," Gilliland stated.

The council approved, by a 3 to 2 vote, the \$450.00 bid by P.A. Kern for the purchase of the taxing entity property Lots 1-2, Block 82, Original Town, SE Corner of California and Wall Streets.

The motion to approve the sale was made by Councilman Albert Hill. It was seconded by Councilman Sheldon Sue. Councilmen Jon Nielson and Ruben Barrientoz voted against the motion.

The \$200.00 bid by Guillermo Galvan, III for the taxing entity property Lot 8, Block 120, Original Town, 501 E. Tennessee was unanimously rejected by the council.

The motion to reject the bid was made by Hill and seconded by Councilman Eric Cornelius.

The council approved a \$25.00 rental fee for two required portable restroom units at the Wayne Russell RV Park Pavilion for any activity lasting over two hours, including dances held at the park.

Cornelius made the motion. It was seconded by Sue. Barrientoz voted against the motion.

In other business, Brown informed the council the new track loader was delivered last week. He said, "The paper work was not finished yet concerning specific payments to be shown in the upcoming budget."

Brown said, "The track loader will be used on Wednesdays and Saturdays around town tearing down some old houses. Another six buildings have been or will be condemned with a sixty day notice before being demolished."

Brown gave the council an update report on legislation in Austin concerning our county cities.

"Cities did not fare well with legislation in lots of areas. Such as, city annexation without proper representation and impact fees for subdivision development now do not have to be paid up front by the developer," Brown said.

"A last minute telephone bill, ("The GTE bill"), was voted down. This bill would have allowed cities under 25,000 population to get into the telephone business, if they so desired."

"Two bills did pass concerning heights on commercial towers near larger cities of 400,000 and a freedom of religion act."

"The freedom of religion act restricts the planning, zoning, remodeling, and modernizing a church building in a city zoned Historical District."

"Also, the religious freedom of prisoners must be upheld according to this act. They must be supplied with whatever their particular religion calls for," Brown added.

Friday night storms wreak havoc on South Plains region

Howdy folks, Straight from downtown Punkin Capital, USA, Floyd County America. This is your friendly county agent "Hank Kimble" reporting live from Hooterville. No, not really, but since I've got your attention you'd think we was in Hooterville the way this years crops have been difficult to get started. "Man what-a-battle!" To have started with such a pretty crop, things can sure change in a hurry. I am constantly reminding myself, we can control a lot of things in life but not mother nature and what she brings our way. To date we have lost around 110,000 acres of cotton from the original 200,000 planted. And to add to it some 20,000 acres looks awfully sick.

The cotton has just simply taken a lot of punishment. Wind, heavy rains, hail, washed out and some blown out. And if that wasn't enough continual cloudy, cool, rainy weather and not enough sunshine or warm temperatures have contributed to much seedling disease and plant death. It appeared from the original 60,000

acres of wheat some 30- 40,000 acres was going to be harvested, but now maybe only about 8 - 10,000 could possibly be harvested. No doubt that yield will be down here as well. Sorghum losses are estimated at about 12-15,000 acres from an original 40,000. Bottom line is, it ain't been good!

However the moisture has been beneficial, well I guess it's how you look at it, but considering last years drought, it has helped in reestablishing our soil moisture profile. To date, Floyd County has received 17 inches of moisture for 1999. Well, what do we need and what are producers doing? What little bit of cotton we have it needs warm dry conditions, and as far as what our producers are doing. Everything across the board - most are replanting to milo, some soybeans, some sunflowers, some haygrazer and sudan, a little guar and some doing nothing, thinking about spending the rest of the summer in the mountains, coming back and planting some early wheat!

I know producers are frustrated and

I feel for them cause we had one of the prettiest crops started many had ever seen. I am only a county agent, and I don't have any real good answers for situations like this, it's definitely not something they teach ya in college.

On a much brighter note we just returned home from state 4-H Roundup. Floyd County was represented 25 4-H'ers strong. Highlight results include a 2nd place Share-The-Fun, 3rd place food show winner, 2nd place fashion show, 6th place Horse demonstration and 7th place Focus on Health demonstration. Also two Floyd County 4-H'ers received scholarships. Other 4-H summer events include Leader Lab, Electric Camp, County Camp, Achievement Banquet and working in a few jackpot shows.

Time to sign off. Remember keep smiling and have a positive attitude and don't forget to laugh, cause laughter doeth a heart good, just like medicine!

Sorghum growers join in lawsuit against United States Environmental Protection Agency

In an ongoing effort to provide to sorghum growers the tools critical to their profitability and survival while ensuring the future of the U.S. food supply, the National Grain Sorghum Producers (NGSP) and several other agricultural organizations are coplaintiffs in a lawsuit filed recently against the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

NGSP, American Farm Bureau Federation, National Association of Wheat Growers, United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association and other organizations are seeking to have EPA establish proper procedures and rules related to implementation of the Food Quality Protection Act (FQPA). At this point, only NGSP and one other organization in this effort are representing exclusively grain producers. Other commodity-specific producer-groups

represented thus far include those dedicated to fresh produce and peanuts.

"We have invested much time and energy to ensure proper implementation of FQPA as well as a clear, established set of rules related to FQPA that are based on reliable data found in sound science," said NGSP President Ken Tevis. "The lawsuit is meant to have EPA use sound science to achieve the fundamental goals of FQPA, which we support," added Tevis.

"Since the passage of FQPA, EPA has been implementing the complex requirements in the act without following the rulemaking process required by law to ensure full public participation," said Tevis. He added that EPA is instead using theoretical assumptions and worst case computer models to assess the risk of pesticides, rather than real-world, accurate data

from scientists.

The lawsuit stresses five major areas where action is needed. These include:

1. Use of pesticides under emergency conditions.
 2. Identification of the data needed in applications for tolerances and registrations.
 3. Getting additional data and information when needed to make informed, factbased decisions about specific tolerances.
 4. Use of proper rulemaking procedures to implement FQPA requirements.
 5. Keeping EPA's tolerance reassessment schedule up-to-date.
- Tevis noted that after a related piece of litigation was filed recently, EPA in fact published proposed rules related to use of pesticides under emergency conditions.

Worker Protection training at courthouse July 9th - 10:00 A.M.

The Floyd County Extension Service is sponsoring a *Worker Protection Handler Training* to be conducted at the Meeting Room of the Ag Annex Building in the Floyd County courthouse, on Friday, July 9 beginning at 10:00 a.m.

This training is required of anyone who will be handling open containers of any agricultural chemicals, and includes mixing, loading, flagging, making applications, or cleaning equipment.

Only those individuals who are not licensed with the Texas Department of Agriculture to purchase and use Restricted Use Pesticides, State Limited Use Pesticides, and Regulated Herbicides are required to be trained as an EPA Handler.

One hour of Laws & Regs. CEU's will be offered to all those attending who have a TDA Pesticide Applicator's license if they wish to attend with their non-licensed em-

ployee. This training is open to anyone at NO charge. We are requesting for participants to R.S.V.P. through the Extension Office at 983-4912 by noon, Thursday, July 8.

Mother Nature has a way of bringing all of us back to earth in the blink of an eye. Shortly after Plains Cotton Growers updated the status of the High Plains crop, early June 11, everything changed.

Before June 11, PCG estimated as many as 400,000 acres of cotton had been damaged by a series of storms that crossed the region. At mid-day Friday it was felt that all but 15-20 percent of that acreage had been or would be replanted to cotton.

Fast-forward 24 hours and the situation was drastically different. By early Saturday morning many of the previously affected acres had received another stunning blow from torrential rainfall, strong wind and hail.

The end result is that as many as 771,000 acres of cotton, some for the second and third times, were severely damaged and over half are expected to be diverted to crops other than cotton.

Producers considering replant options should be aware that at least some High Plains counties are approved for double-cropping Fruits and Vegetables such as Black-eyed peas or Green Beans with a contract commodity such as wheat, oats, or barley. Strict rules apply and anyone interested in this option should contact their County Farm Service Agency office for additional information and eligibility.

Also, growers who have applied Staple herbicide on cotton acreage won't be able to replant to grain sorghum. Sorghum's susceptibility to Staple's active ingredient prohibits this option and will require growers to find another alternative.

Preliminary reports from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in the most heavily impacted areas indicated almost 435,000 acres of cotton completely destroyed. Only about 30,000 acres is expected to be replanted to cotton.

Adding some 400,000 acres to an undetermined number of acres permanently lost to storms before June 11 will likely show overall 1999 losses totaling more than 500,000 acres to date.

Several hundred thousand additional cotton acres can also be classified as damaged or diseased as a result of the hail, heavy rains and wind that assaulted them over the past three to four weeks.

Unfortunately there is little that can be done to help the damaged acres recover. Producers will have to wait to see if the young plants can rebound with the return of 90-plus degree daytime temperatures over the next week to ten days. All things considered this is just what the doctor would order and offers the best chance to recovery.

With an estimated 3.7 million acres of cotton planted in 1999 this year's acreage losses, while definitely severe, will probably not drop the High Plains below 3 million acres of cotton production. The area still has the ability to produce a good crop although prospects for a bumper harvest have probably been diminished.

The table below indicates preliminary loss estimates as tabulated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) for some of the counties affected by the June 11 storms. TAEX District 2 counties reporting no significant damage from the June 11 weather include Hale, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Cochran and Gaines.

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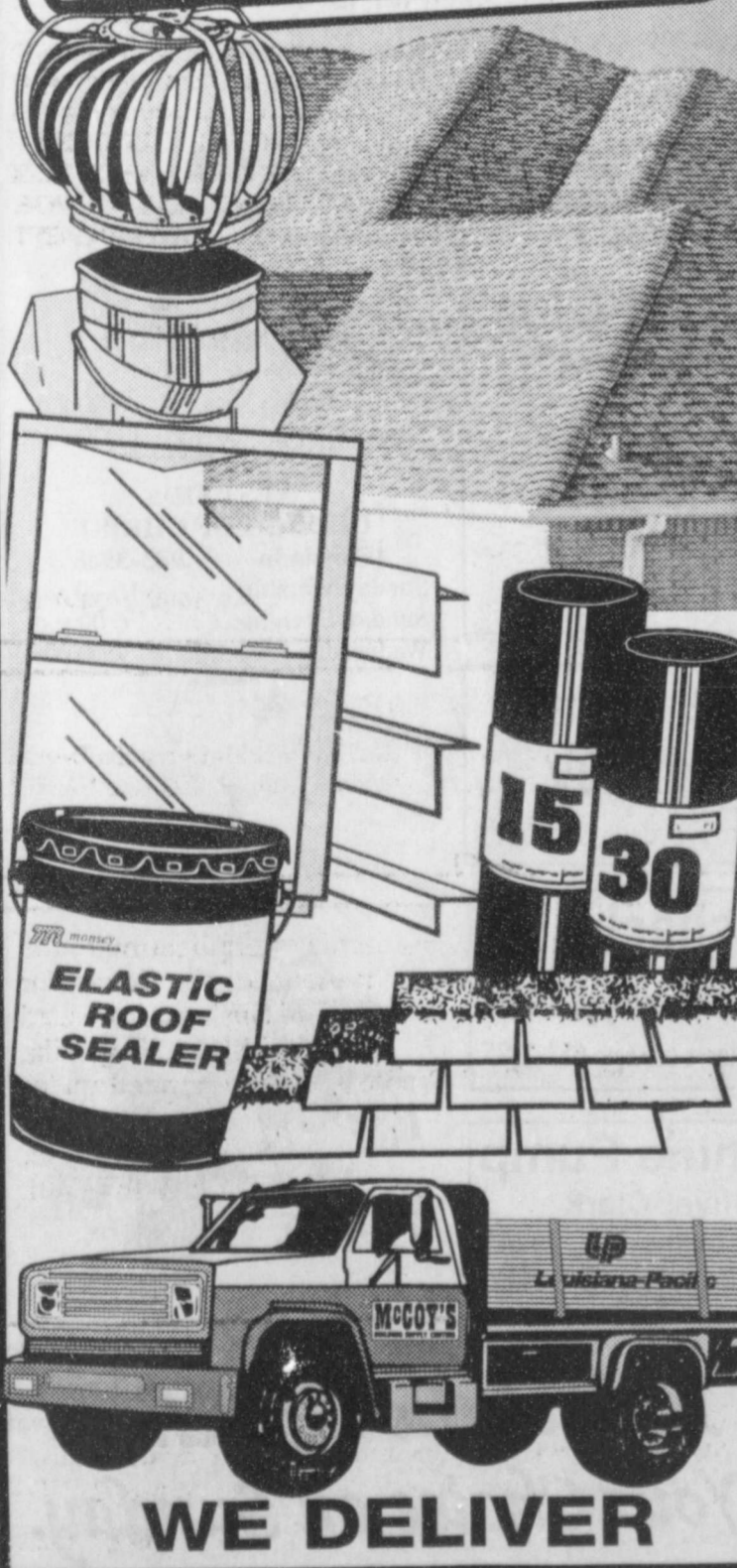
