only natural that he was asked to put his tractor driving skills to work on Monday, and plow the ground at the site for the Unity Center.


The son of Mike and Ginger Mathis, Garrett will add this job to his list of other 4-H projects.

## Holiday will give tax break

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has provided preliminary information to help retailers and consumers understand the sales tax holiday scheduled for August 6 to August 8.

The tax break, which is expected to save Texas consumers \$69.2 million in state sales taxes and up to another \$15.5 million in city and county sales taxes over the biennium, was approved by the 1999 Texas Legislature.

"Cutting taxes is one of the 10 priorities I laid out for Texas in the 21st century," Comptroller Rylander said. "The tax burden on working Texas families is too high. The typical American family pays more in total taxes than it spends on food, clothing, and shelter combined. The tax holiday will provide Texans with some much-needed relief."

\*Starting this year, the tax holiday will be held every year on the first Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of August. This year, both state and local sales taxes will be waived. In future years, however, while the state sales tax will continue to be waived, cities, counties and other local taxing entities will have the choice of participating in the holiday or continuing to impose tax.

\*Most clothing and footwear priced at less than \$100 will be exempt from sales taxes. Customers will receive the break on individual items, regardless of the amount they buy. For example, sales tax is not due if a customer buys six shirts, each priced at under \$100. But the full tax must be paid on a shirt if it is sold for \$110; the first \$99.99 cannot be exempted.

\*Items that are sold in pairs cannot be separated and sold individually. If a pair of shoes cost \$150, each shoe cannot be sold for \$75 in order to qualify for the sales tax exemption. However, components that are normally priced as separate articles may continue to be sold as separate articles and qualify for the exemption if the price of an article is less than \$100.

\*Clothing and footwear that are used primarily for athletic activities or for protective wear are not eligible for the exemption. Customers buying golf cleats and football pads, for instance, must pay sales taxes. But the tax will be waived on athletic wear that is commonly worn other than while participating in an athletic activity, such as tennis shoes, baseball caps, and jogging suits.

\*Also not included in the sales tax holiday are accessories, such as jewelry and watches; items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases, and wallets; and clothing that is rented, such as formal wear and costumes.

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## FISD Board hears Crisis Management Plan

The Floydada I.S.D. board heard a report from the Crisis Management Plan Director John Odom, July 13, at their regular monthly meeting.

Odom displayed a sample flip chart that will be put in all the classrooms and offices of the F.I.S.D. buildings before school starts on August 16.

"This different color flip chart will be available to every teacher. It will give immediate access to emergency phone numbers. This includes phone numbers of all the officers, all the administrators, utility services, fire department, sheriff's department, police, EMS and all the media contacts,"

Odom explained.

"The chart will give the exact procedure to follow in any emergency, such as: fire, bomb threats and explosions, tornado and severe thunderstorms, hazardous materials, utility emergency, crime reporting, unwanted intruder, student runaway or abduction, sexual assault or harassment on campus, student possession of weapons on campus, death or serious injury on campus by violence, campus lock down, hostage situation, communicable diseases, suicide or attempted suicide, accidents, serious injuries, after school emergencies and off campus emergencies," Odom said.

"For one example, Fire Procedure: (1) sound the fire alarm, (2) notify the Fire Department by calling 911, (3) notify the superintendent at 983-3498, (4) evacuate the building according to the following procedure: students are to walk out at designated exits in a quiet and orderly manner, the first one out will hold the door open for others, the last person out will close all doors and windows, a pre-designated person or persons will check adjacent restrooms and all storage areas, students must move away from the building and not stand in the driveways, teachers are responsible for the students under their supervision and must

keep account of each student and report any student missing to the principal or designated assistant.

"This fire drill plan to evacuate the building needs to be practiced throughout the year," Odom added.

Odom told the board, "Everyone's role will be defined for each emergency, including the principal, the secretaries, the staff and the custodians.

"In an emergency lock down, no one will be allowed on campus and no one will be allowed to leave campus. Parents must know that your child will not be dismissed until the school officials say it is safe for the student to leave," Odom said.

Odom further explained, "In an emergency situation, we are the qualified professionals and we know best how to take care of your child. We are being proactive for the protection of your children."

"Maybe later a supplemental pamphlet concerning these emergency procedures will be ready to hand out to the parents and community leaders around the start of this school year," Odom said.

In other business, Administrative Assistant Dick Van Hoose gave a brief tax collection report. He said, "We have collected around \$1,779,000.00"

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## Water revenue down for the City of Lockney

LOCKNEY--Lockney City Council met Monday, July 12 and covered a short agenda.

While reviewing the financial statement City Secretary Charlotte Hooten reported because of the recent rains citizens had not been watering their lawns and revenue from water was not coming in as usual this time of the year. "It will make the budget tight," she stated.

TNRCC has given the City a list of repairs that have to be made to the imoff tank. Councilmembers were told the tank will have to be replaced in the near future. City Engineer Jamie

Johnson said the cheapest and easiest way for the city to solve the problem would be to dig a sludge pit rather than installing a new tank. The item will be discussed at budget meetings and put on an upcoming council agenda. The repairs mandated by TNRCC will begin at once.

The council approved a resolution asking House Speaker Pete Laney to appoint Judge Bill Hollars of Hale County to the new 911 Commission. Mayor Gary Marr stated that he felt Hollars would support our area when issues came up pertaining to the commission. J.D. Copeland made the mo-

tion to support Hollars. The second was made by E.L. Brotherton Jr. All voted for.

Charlie Carthel met with the council and asked if his June water bill could be reduced. He reported that hail stones broke the float on a stock tank east of Lockney and the water ran for four days before it was discovered.

Councilmembers agreed to handle the situation as they have incidents in the past. Carthel will pay the city \$68.00. The amount will be more than his normal bill which usually runs about \$24.00. Carthel is outside the city lim-

its and pays a double water bill.

City Supervisor Dickie McCarty asked if a new phone line and internet could be installed on the computer at the city shop for purchasing items needed by the departments. He related that he hated to interrupt the girls in the office or the police department when he wanted to look up prices on items needed.

Councilmember Tina Graves stated since the city had two internet locations already and money is tight the purchase should not be made at this time. She made the motion to not pursue the request. The second was made

by Bil Anderson. Copeland voted for and Brotherton against. The motion carried.

The council discussed repairing curbs and sidewalks on Main Street and decided to table the issue until they could ask City Attorney Paul Lyle who was responsible for repairs, the city or the owners.

Supervisor Kenny Hooten reported that he replaced a speed sign at the high school that someone had taken. Everyone is reminded that it is illegal to take these signs and anyone caught with one will be subject to a fine.

## Daniels use old and new for quilting projects

Danny and Cheryl Daniel have turned their relaxing hobby of quilting, computers, and sewing machine collections into a family money making project.

"I hardly knew how to sew a few years ago," said Cheryl. "I was going to help my mother sew some straight seams and I happened to mention to Danny that I wish I had a decent sewing machine. I thought I would like to learn how to quilt too."

Being a "computer nerd", Danny went to the internet to do some research. "I started asking around to find out what kind of sewing machine women liked to use to quilt. I was told they like the Singer Featherweight (11 lbs.), but there was no way I was going to find one."

"I found it in the second pawn shop I walked into in Plainview."

The couple approached the project as a team--each one interested in a different aspect.

"Danny works with metal and he is real good at cutting and getting it all square," said Cheryl. "I would get the quilting magazines and he would read the directions with me. We just fol-

lowed instructions and taught ourselves."

Although Danny first entered the project because he was intrigued with the mechanics he soon found that he enjoyed working on the sewing machine.

"I also found that piecing the quilts was very relaxing," said Danny. Danny has also increased his collection of old Singer sewing machines. Now the Daniels have over 40 antique sewing machines in the home--most of them Singers.

They have also graduated to a commercial Gammill Quality Machine on a 12 foot table. This machine enables them to quilt for a profit--not just a hobby.

"We bought the commercial machine in Monroe, Louisiana in May, of 1998," said Cheryl. "By September we were ready to start to work for the public. Since September we have done over 90 quilts."

Because she has a 6 year old son, W.R., Cheryl tries to gear her quilting around her other duties at home.

"I do about 2-3 quilts a week," said

Cheryl. "I try to only work at it for 4 hours each day."

"We spend more time actually getting ready to quilt than we do quilting," said Danny.

Patterns customers can choose from include: puzzle pieces, clouds, roses, oakleaf and acorn, feather, cotton candy, raindrop, chantilly lace and blowing leaves.

"Everybody's quilt is different," said Danny. "It is very personal."

"Most of the time people bring me the quilt pieces sewn together," said Cheryl. "They also buy the batting and the backing. I do the quilting."

If any sewing needs to be done on the top, Danny can always piece the quilt tops with his 1949 or 1959 Singer.

"These older machines are still the best," said Danny.

The oldest machine in Danny's possession is a 1863 Singer with a base shaped like a fiddle.

He is also proud of his 1924 Singer Industrial which came out of Reece's Cleaners in Lockney.

His collection of the old machines

has also led him to learn how to repair them. "I just fix them for myself, but if someone needs help with repairing, I'd work on it," said Danny.

Keeping up with parts for his old machines is easier for Danny with his

knowledge of computers. (Not only does he make a living at welding, but he is also a computer consultant).

"I have been online for over 10 years--before the internet," said Danny. "I've been able to use the

internet to sell parts for these antique machines that I have collected through the years."

Danny suggests that anyone interested in antique sewing machines

Brandon took us on a grand tour of the whole area pointing out tourist sites like the chipmunks (or "mini-bears"), and our own personal Kibo (or outhouse). He said the visitors Kibo was nicer than the Scouts. (I decided to wait until I got back to the hotel room in Sipapu, six miles away.)

He showed me the small meadow where he worked on his merit badges. We could hear rifle shots in the distance of Scouts at the rifle range.

Brandon told me about the "musketts" they got to shoot, as well as all kinds of firearm safety they were taught.

He was also excited about the meals he cooked, although he did say the pancakes weren't near as good as mine.

He told me about the tricks they use to keep warm at night and said he slept great. The mountain streams on both sides of his tent lulled him to sleep, although he said the running water did make him have to go to the bathroom

more.

Anyway, it became very obvious that I should not have worried. Those Scout leaders were almost as good as "moms"--except they didn't step in and do everything for the kids.

Brandon was excited about taking a hot shower at our motel, and Justin Stoerner was excited about finding a flushing toilet in his parent's motel room.

It was a great experience for those boys. Brandon and Zane Montandon were the youngest in the group--so of course they were teased by the older boys. Brandon said he couldn't wait until next year so he could "pick on" the youngest on the trip.

On the last night there, the Scouts, leaders, friends, and family, gathered around a campfire. A walking stick was passed to each Scout and leader. When you got the stick you would relate your thoughts on your camping trip. Things such as what you liked most, etc.

All around the campfire the stick went. Almost every one of the older boys praised the two younger ones for "hanging in there", and for "working hard".

When Brandon got the stick, he said, "I had a great time. I want to come back next year". Then he paused and said, "Thanks for being so nice to me."

It's almost enough to make us yearn for the days of Monica. At least there, in that period, it was a "here and now" situation. The fate of the Presidency was in the balance. The country's immediate future would be affected, depending on the outcome of events then unfolding.

Now, in this particular period, the national media is seized by another of its mourning periods, mourning another death in the "only royal family America ever had," to quote one commentator in the endless procession of commentators trying to fill up their allotted moments on television as ships and planes searched for the missing John F. Kennedy, Jr., his wife and sister-in-law.

Make no mistake, we were saddened too by the loss of "John John."

He was, in our estimation, one of the better ones in that vast clan descended from Joseph and Rose Kennedy. One reason he was better was because he kept his distance from the rest of them. Here we had a private citizen, albeit the son of a former President, lost in an obvious plane crash, along with his wife and his wife's sister. That is a news story, and a news story of some significance. But, did it warrant the media's dredging up every conceivable item, every conceivable link concerning anything

that had ever affected the lives of any member of his grandfather's clan? Or, the thoughts of anyone who might have been acquainted with a member of the clan? We were even reminded that Hillary Clinton was "very close" to JFK, Jr., and that she, incidentally, is about to run for Senator in New York.

Oh, well. We suppose it is just another something we have to learn to live with in the age of 24-hour cable t. v., and competing t.v. networks.

And speaking of Hillary, and her expected run for the Senate in New York, where she has never lived, but where she has visited a lot since the Monica thing. We note that she recently went on a shopping tour at the Bruno Magli shoe manufacturing plant in Palermo, Italy. (That's the shoe made famous in O.J. 

in school taxes, which is a 97.12% collection ratio."  
Concerning the school budget Van Hoose said, "We still do not have an appraisal value or what taxes we will collect this next year. But if we collect the same amount next year as we did this year, then the budget should stay the same."  
The board unanimously approved the \$500.00 bid by P.A. Kern for the purchase of two Lots 3-4, Block 82, Original Town, at the corner of California and Wall Streets.  
Secretary Charlene Brown made the motion to approve the sale and it was seconded by Board Member Steve Lloyd.  
Board Member Amado Morales made the motion to approve the \$250.00 bid by Langston Williams, Jr. for the purchase of the North 1/2 of Lots 15 & 16, Block 55, Original Town. It was seconded by Brown and unanimously passed.  
Upon the recommendation of Superintendent Jimmie Collins the board unanimously approved the District

Salary Schedule as published by the state of Texas. Board Member Bill Dean made the motion and it was seconded by Board Member Billy Joe Villarreal.  
President Mitch Probasco made the motion to advertise and take bids on the selling of two used 1983 Chevrolet pickups and four used mini van buses. It was seconded by Villarreal and unanimously passed.  
The board accepted the resignations of two school teachers. They were math teacher Kathy Turner at the alternate school and kindergarten teacher Becky Sharp of Duncan Elementary.  
Collins assured the board, "Contrary to rumors, we will replace and hire another kindergarten teacher at Duncan Elementary."  
Collins and A. B. Duncan Elementary Principal Bob Campbell recommended the hiring of one teacher's aide and two new teachers at Duncan Elementary.  
"The two new teachers will be hired on a one year contract. These contracts will completely be funded by extra

federal money amounting to \$48,785.00. To qualify for this money, these teachers must help reduce the student-teacher ratio in the classroom," Collins told the board.  
Lloyd made the motion to hire Donna Webb as a Teacher's Aide, Reading Teacher Brandy Blanch, and Math Teacher Rebecca Kunkel, all at Duncan Elementary. Dean seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.  
Collins read a list of other new teachers already hired by the board for this new school year 1999-2000. They are: Elementary Counselor John Kay, Ag Teacher Kevin Kelley, Junior High Coach Gilbert Trevino, Science and Junior High Coach Olivia Tyson, Junior High Teacher's Aide Luis Ybarra.  
Collins also informed the board that the on going Lunsford lawsuit would be moved to Austin.  
This lawsuit involves a previous grievance by Fourth Grade Science Teacher Martha Lunsford against R.C. Andrews Principal David Hutton concerning her teacher appraisal report.


## County approves bids and gives raises

The County Commissioners met in two special sessions this month on July 15th and July 20th.  
In the July 15th meeting, Commissioner Jon Jones made the motion to accept the bid of \$276.76 by Texas Industries and Wholesalers of Early, Texas for the purchase of the county's used riding grass mower. Commissioner Lennie Gilroy seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.  
Gilroy made the motion to accept the bid of \$72,657.00 by Carbon Resources and Tractor Parts, Inc. of Norman, Oklahoma for the purchase of the county's 1986 used scrapper. Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden seconded the motion and it unanimously passed.  
In other business, Gilroy made the motion to leave the Texas County and

District Retirement System for county employees as is and not increase its benefits. The motion was seconded by Bearden and unanimously passed.  
The request from the Lockney Housing Development to waive its 1999 taxes was again tabled by the commissioners. Jones made the motion to table the request until a later date. It was seconded by Bearden and unanimously passed.  
The commissioners proposed a 5% increase for all county employees to be approved later at their yearly budget hearing. This increase does not include the County Judge, nor the

County Commissioners.  
In the July 20th meeting, Gilroy made the motion to advertise for the purchase of a new maintainer for Precinct No. 2. Bearden seconded it and it was unanimously approved.  
The commissioners adopted an Interlocal Agreement with the Floyd County Friends concerning a need for dirt work to be done by the county at the Multipurpose Building site at Muncy.  
In exchange, the commissioners will be given access to the building

Add 3 Tbsp. soy sauce and bell peppers; cook, stirring, 1 minute. Add raisins and remaining 1 Tbsp. soy sauce; cook 1 minute, or until peppers are tender, yet crisp, stirring constantly. 



## Floyd County Pest Management Report

Current Situation

Last weeks cool temperatures and high humidity were very favorable for increasing aphid populations. If you have treated cotton one or more times for overwintered boll weevils, monitor fields frequently. Aphids can increase rapidly in the absence of beneficials. As of Monday, July 19th, Furadan 4E is available under Section 18 exemption for the control of aphids in cotton on the High Plains. If you use this product, please read and follow all directions regarding handling, application, and proper posting of fields. Carelessness could result in losing future use of this product.

### Cotton

**Cotton Fleahoppers:** High numbers of cotton fleahoppers can be found in area cotton fields. Late planted cotton fields which have yet to reach bloom should be scouted thoroughly for this pest.

**Lygus:** Lygus bugs have been found in several program fields. Highest populations have been noted along highways, county roads, and areas neighboring suitable host plants. Lygus feed on squares and small bolls resulting in reduced square set and

small boll shed. Adult lygus are 2 to 3 times the size of adult fleahoppers and are more rounded in shape. They move very quickly when disturbed and can be difficult to detect when scouting. Suggested economic threshold would be 20 lygus per 100 plants combined with less than 80% square set.

**Cotton Aphids:** As mentioned in the opening remarks, the Section 18 requirements for the use of Furadan have been met. If you plan to use Furadan please obtain a copy of the current Section 18 ad label restrictions prior to use.

**Bollworms:** Cotton bollworms have been detected at low levels since July 1. At this time egg lays remain light in our area and mortality has been high. With a small plant canopy and high temperature larvae seldom reach 2 or 3 days in age. However, we may see a change in this trend over the next couple of weeks as plant growth and moth activity increases. Treatment may be justified when 3,000 or more small larvae per acre are present.

**Boll Weevils:** This time of year adult boll weevils can be very difficult to detect in traps or in the plant canopy. The best advice I can give it put your traps in the barn and scout your fields for damaged squares. Divide each farm into quadrants or areas and randomly collect 25 1/3 grown squares from each. Keep in mind that boll weevil populations are often clumped in pockets within a field. Failure to monitor all areas could result in not detecting an infestation or artificially increasing the percent damaged squares. Prior to peak bloom control is warranted when punctured square counts reach 15-20% or more. After peak bloom the treatment threshold is 25-30% punctured squares.

### Corn

Most corn ranges from tasseling to brown silk stage. Mite activity has been increasing in some fields inspected. We are also seeing a large number of Western Corn Rootworm beetles. This time of year feeding

damage to green silks can be a problem. The recommended threshold is 8 to 10 beetles per plant. Southwestern Corn Borer activity is increasing in corn fields. Moth traps in Floyd county ranged from 63 to 165 SWCB adults per trap over the past 7 days. We generally expect peak emergence around the first week of August.

### Sorghum

Sorghum fields range from 5 or 6 leaves to flower stage. We are seeing few greenbug colonies and some whorl feeding from fall armyworms.

### Peanuts

Most peanut fields are growing quite well. At this time I have not detected early leaf spot in our area. If you begin seeing circular lesions on the leaflets, look closely for sporulation or "Fuzz" (Crumley et al.) on the surface of the lesion. If you're not sure or have other concerns please feel free to contact the Extension Office.

### Peanut Field Day

The Lubbock, Floyd, Crosby, County Peanut Field Day is scheduled for Thursday, July 29th. The program will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the Bill Lyle farm approximately 3.0 miles north of Ralls on Hwy 62, or 5.0 miles south of Cone. Dr. Chip Lee, Extension-Plant Pathologist, and Dr. Robert Lemon, Extension-Agronomist are scheduled to speak at the field day. Research demonstration plots will be discussed and field tours as time allows. If you have peanut problems or concerns about your crop please bring fresh peanut or plant samples to the meeting.

### Sick Plant Clinic

To be conducted on Friday, July 30th, beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Crosby County Extension office. If you live in the county please bring plant samples to the office. If you live within Crosbyton, Ralls, or Lorenzo, please contact our office at 675-2347 to schedule an appointment.

### Ag assistance likely to wait until September

A representative of House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest reported that the crisis situation that exists in agriculture is well known in Washington and that Congressional action to try and relieve the situation will probably get started in earnest this September.

Combest aide Jimmy Clark told members of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Board of Directors that awareness of agriculture and its problems is at the highest point he had seen in many years and that Congressional action will be forthcoming later in the summer. He noted that a number of key items will very likely make their way into any future disaster or economic assistance package.

He noted that restoration of Step 2 funds, while not likely to improve farm level cotton prices more than a few cents, would be a key ingredient to the eventual solution since the programs main benefit was encouraging the marketing of cotton instead of forcing producers to hold the crop

waiting for a better price or forfeiting the cotton to the government loan program.

Another top priority of PCG is the removal of burdensome payment limitations on Loan Deficiency Payments and Marketing Loan Gains. Clark noted that changing the rules for LDP payment limitations would be important and that Chairman Combest was looking at several different ways to attack that particular problem.





The theme for the event was "God's Timeless Word." God's timeless word is the thread between the ages, from ancient manuscripts, to the traditional Bible, to the word on-line in the 21st Century.

"The Bible (Part II): Its Authority and Interpretations," the spiritual growth study, was taught by Reverend Barbara Ibarra, pastor of the

Ellenville United Methodist Church in Ellenville, New York; and Jeanne Gramstorff, Historian of the Northwest Texas Conference United Methodist Women.

"Humanity Comes of Age", a general issue, was led by Leta Gorham, pastor of Urban Park United Methodist Mission in Dallas. The geographic study "Mission in the 21st Century" was taught by Leora Hatch, member of the First United Church in New Braunfels, Texas, and Marisa Villarreal, Women's Division Executive Secretary for Leadership Education in New York. The children's event was once again taught by Esther Moses from Lubbock.

## Weigh Down Workshop will begin in Lockney August 2nd

The Weigh Down Workshop is now in all 50 states and still spreading quickly by word of mouth! Many people have lost and regained their weight on other programs, because these programs attack the wrong problem. Diet programs emphasize taking pills, counting fat grams, or changing the content of the food using exchange list--all of which suggest the basic problem is the food. That is not the case!

The basic problem is that the dieter is in love with food and eating and is not using his or her hunger mechanism. The dieter becomes enslaved, trying to make food behave, keeping the focus on food rather than attacking the real problem. Using the signals God created allows that focus and passion to be returned to Him.

Through a series of specially designed videos, audiotapes, workbooks, and Bible lessons, you will learn how to be delivered from the slavery of food (which is symbolic for Egypt). You will learn how to cross

the Jordan where you have guilt-free milk and honey, or any food, but not more than the body calls for.

This workshop teaches that head hunger (the urge to eat when the body is not calling for food) is not true physiological hunger, but rather is spiritual hunger. We learn to replace head hunger with the word of God so that we transfer the urge for a pan of brownies to hunger and thirst for righteousness.

Workshop participants attend the 12-week seminar and receive the 12 audiotapes and Student Guide. To repeat the course, the charge is reduced, and the participant receives four additional tapes. There is no charge after the second time through the program.
