

## Jeff Archer welcomed home from Macedonia

Jeff Archer was like any young man itching to get "away from home" when he joined the Army, but after many months in Macedonia Jeff was all too happy to be back home in Lockney.

"I listen to kids say, 'I can't wait to get out of here,'" said Archer. "I just smile to myself and think--try moving away where it takes 14 hours by plane to see your friends and family again. Try going somewhere where you might get killed--then see how bad you want to get away from home."

PFC Jeff Archer is the 19 year old son of Wilmer and Debbie Archer of Lockney. He joined the Army August 5, 1998 and within 3 months was sent to Macedonia--a bordering country of Kosovo.

Arriving before the bombing of Kosovo, Archer said things were pretty quiet at first.

The force in Macedonia used the station as a commuting center between Kosovo and Albania. "It was a military holding area," said Archer. "Soldiers were processed at this spot before they were sent out to different areas."

"We had several different missions while I was there," said Archer. "We were first sent by the United Nations on a 'peacekeeping mission'. Then our mission changed to riot control and then changed again to the screen line mission of observing and monitoring the crossing of Kosovos at the border. "In the beginning we traveled through the Macedonian villages and made our presence known. We kept on good terms with them."

According to Archer the Macedonian people were very friendly towards the soldiers while they were driving the "white

Humvees" (the color of the United Nations).

"After we changed over to Humvees to the camouflaged NATO colors then we could sense their hatred towards us.

"People you had traded with and eaten food with were trying to hit you with rocks and molotovs."

Archer said the Macedonians believed NATO brought war and now the soldiers were there to fight.

"It was about this time that the tide turned," said Archer. "People started rioting at the American Embassy in Scopje. We were called in to protect the Embassy, but by the time we got there the fence wall had been busted down. Four cars were blown up, the flag was burned, windows were broken out, and graffiti was painted on the walls. The doors were barricaded and the embassy staff was safe."

Now the people who had once welcomed Archer were throwing molotovs, rocks and beating him with sticks. The rioters, numbering between 1,000-1,500 were dispersed with tear gas.

"You could read in the embassy graffiti why the Macedonians were so angry with us," said Archer. "They said Macedonians and Serbians were 'brothers'. The Macedonians believed if you had a problem with Serbia you had a problem with them. The Macedonians considered themselves friends with the Serbs and the Albanians. They weren't enemies with anybody. They just didn't like us--as outsiders--being there."

When the bombing of Kosovo started, Archer and his unit, the 1st Infantry Division 4th Cavalry Regiment, or 1/4 CAV, were then given another mission.

"Four of us in NATO Humvees would set up OPT--observation points," said Archer. "We would monitor the crossings at the border and watch the towns. A lot of militias were being formed in each town.

"By this time they were bombing Kosovo and we could see and feel the bombs. We could see the anti-aircraft guns shooting at the planes. There was always that thought in the back of your mind that you might get hit."

Archer spent 31 days at this mission.

The tide had turned now and tensions were very high. American soldiers had been captured and now Archer's mission was to guard their camp perimeter.

"I knew the men that were captured," said Archer. "They were friends of mine. SSgt. Stone was my first line supervisor and Specialist Gonzales was a friend and 'my next door neighbor'."

It was about this time that Archer got what he considered a "rude awakening". "It appeared to me at this time that our government wasn't really supporting us. They were just trying to 'look good'."

The media's role in the coverage of the Kosovo war was particularly troubling to Archer. "They always tried to portray everything as fine, as far as the soldiers were concerned--and it wasn't fine," said Archer. "People were throwing molotovs at us.

"I know we are soldiers and we signed on the dotted line, but we were doing a lot of good things and no one knew it."

Archer may have doubted the support of the government as a whole, but he never doubted the support of his community.

"There was lots of local support," said Archer. "It was outstanding. I got so much mail from Lockney and Floydada. The support also came from Lubbock and Amarillo. I would receive stacks and stacks of letters from school kids. It was great. I was very thankful."

Archer's hometown not only was supportive of his role in Macedonia, but the community also tried to keep residents thinking of Archer and others like him, by putting yellow ribbons on business doors and neighborhood trees.

Three days after returning home, a big "welcome home" party was held and the community was invited.

"There were so many people there," said Archer. "It was good and bad at the same time. I saw a lot of people but I didn't get to talk to everyone."

Archer leaves Friday, August 6th for Frankfurt, Germany. He will then travel 2 1/2 hours to Schwienfurt, Germany where he will be stationed. In June he will return to Kosovo. "I don't know yet what I will have to do," Archer has two years left on his

enlistment. He has not decided if he will reenlist or not. "If I don't reenlist I would like to stay in Germany and work with the military as a civilian."

Archer says if he had been able to tell everyone what is on his mind he would have been sure to say, "Spend as much time with your family as you can. You never know when you'll see them again."

"This experience has opened my eyes, and made me enjoy what I've got. I appreciate my friends, my family, and loved ones."




Todd Hallmark will serve as assistant cross-country (boys and girls) and head girls track.

### Marketing issues very important to producers

As cotton producers tend their fields and look for a little additional help from the sky the marketing aspect of cotton production is taking on an entirely new face than has been seen in the past several years.

Producers looking at low prices across the board and the potential for reaching or exceeding their LDP/MLG payment limit are now looking at ways to protect their interests when they market their crops.

The crux of the issue for merchants looking to establish equity positions or entering into option to purchase contracts with producers is that they are only allowed to redeem cotton at the Adjusted World Price (AWP) so long as the seller can absorb the marketing loan gain incurred as a result of that redemption within their payment limitation.

The Farm Service Agency will be

monitoring redemptions made on behalf of producers throughout the marketing year to make sure payment limits are not exceeded. If a portion or a sale is redeemed at the AWP by mistake the merchant will be required to repay the difference to the CCC.

Under most option to purchase contracts it must be assumed that the merchant retains the ability to request repayment of this difference from the producer if they are forced to redeem a portion of the purchased cotton at the full loan rate.

If there is little or no room under a producers payment limit, the merchant will have to redeem all or some portion of the cotton they purchased at the full loan rate if they opt to complete the transaction.

Producers should consider including language that eliminates this "come back" scenario if at all possible.

### Educational high plains beef conference to be held

An educational conference to highlight the beef cattle industry will be held Aug. 18 and 19 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center at Amarillo, 6500 West Amarillo Blvd.

The conference will provide an opportunity for feedyard managers and employees, cattle feeders, stockers and consultants to meet university researchers, become familiar with current research projects, tour new research facilities and supply input to the research programs. This year's confer-

ence will also include the dedication of West Texas A&M University's Nance Ranch Feedlot and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station/USDA-ARS Research Feedlot and Laboratory at Bushland. The feedlot dedication will be at 4 p.m. Aug. 18, and conference registration will begin at 8 a.m. on Aug. 19. Cost is \$15 for feedlot dedication and dinner, \$25 for conference, or \$40 per person for both events if registration is received by Texas Cattle Feeders Assn., 5501 I-40 West, Amarillo, Texas 79106, by Aug. 12.

### The European Union disappoints ranchers

The recent failure by the European Union to meet a beef import deadline has disappointed ranchers across America as well as those in Texas who were hopeful that their product would once again be the main course at dinnertime throughout Europe.

"American-produced beef is the safest in the world. Our producers can compete in any market if given a fair shot," said Bart Greer president of Floyd County Farm Bureau.

That was the reaction following the EU's failure to comply with a World Trade Organization deadline to allow imports of American beef treated with hormones. European nations have banned hormone-treated beef for 10 years.

"The European ban on American beef is an underhanded move designed to shut our beef out of their markets. The consumers should be able to make the decision and not the

protectionism of European politics," local Farm Bureau leader said.

U.S. cattlemen and other beef experts maintain there is no difference between hormone-treated beef and beef not treated with the growth promotants.

"Independent examinations have found that hormone-treated beef is safe. Scientists have used sound, credible science to come to these conclusions," Greer said.

To counter the European Union's refusal to comply, the American Farm Bureau Federation, the largest farm organization in the United States, is calling on the U.S. Trade Representative to keep the pressure on the Europeans. That pressure would include retaliation of several EU-produced products. The American Farm Bureau is part of a coalition urging the U.S. government to ensure that the list of targeted products affects all EU member states.

## \*\*\*Floyd County Pest Management Report\*\*\*

Cooler temperatures aren't much for crop growth and development, but it sure makes it nice working in the field. As you all know, we could use a good rain. Cotton fields with limited irrigation or dryland are beginning to drop squares and small bolls. Program fields range from 3 to 7 nodes above white flower with an average around 5.

**Scout Safety:** If you choose to treat a program field for insect pests please contact me or leave a message at 806-657-7233. I need to know the insecticide used and time of application so that scouts are not exposed to insecticide.

**Aphids** continue to increase in many fields and could cause problems

over the next few weeks. The economic threshold is 50 aphid per leaf.

**Bollworm** activity is very apparent with moths fluttering about the canopy as you walk through the fields. However, egg lays have remained light and ranged from 1,000 to 12,000 per acre over the past 7 days. Larvae populations ranged from 500 to less than 6,000 per acre in program fields. Last weeks 100+ degree days attributed to increase mortality of eggs and small larvae. However, with this cool weather in place for several days, we should see increasing survival and possible economic populations toward the end of the week. Contact your extension agent for insecticides and formulated rate per acre.

**Boll Weevil** damage levels are slowly increasing in all program fields. I have received reports of treatable populations in fields near Caprock, Robertson, Lorenzo, Estacado, Barwise and Dougherty.

**Boll weevil management and decision making.** When square numbers are greater than the combined number of blooms and bolls, inspect fields at least weekly, by examining 100 squares that are at least 1/4 inch in size. Sample the entire field since weevil infestations are often clumped. If 20 percent of the squares examined are weevil damaged, treatment should be considered. After peak bloom, or when bloom and boll numbers exceed square counts, treatments should be

initiated when 25 to 30 percent of the squares examined are weevil damaged. Once plants approach cutout and square densities decrease significantly, small boll damage should be used as the criteria for further insecticide applications. Boll protection is often warranted when 15 percent of the small bolls present are weevil damaged and at least two to four vulnerable, undamaged, potentially harvestable bolls are counted per 10 row feet. Bolls that have sufficient time left to reach maturity should be protected until they are at least 15 days old or until they can no longer be cut with a knife.

Contact your extension agent for controlling in-season boll weevils.

### Combest is pushing for insurance reform package before the start of the year 2000 growing season

Activity in Washington is traveling down two equally important albeit not necessarily parallel tracks on issues that are important to agriculture in general and to cotton in particular.

Members of the House Agriculture Committee are concentrating their efforts on marking up a final version of Chairman Larry Combest's (R-TX) crop insurance reform plan for introduction and consideration by the House of Representatives prior to the end of Congressional break.

The Combest plan which primarily focuses on short-term reforms and how to apply some \$6 Billion additional funding for the Federal Crop Insurance Program is the top priority of the House Ag Committee. Combest wants to get his reforms in place in time for the 2000 crop year.

In the Senate efforts appear to be concentrated on issues or supplementary economic assistance and development of an agriculture assistance package to ease the current financial crunch within production agriculture.

Most of the Senate activity is proceeding despite the fact that Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Dick Lugar has shown no willingness to develop a package of his own. Lugar would prefer to hold hearings in order to determine if emergency aid is even warranted.

Ideas are flowing fast and furious in the Senate, however, with most thoughts coming from Senators Thad Cochran (R-Miss) and Tom Harkin (D-Iowa). As the scale of the crisis becomes clearer, the amount of the ante for assistance continues to grow. Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott

has apparently agreed to allow an amendment on emergency relief to be offered during discussion of the Senate agriculture appropriations bill the week of August 2.

Crop insurance reform is at the top of Chairman Larry Combest's agenda and his Agricultural Risk Protection Act (H.R. 2559) is in the final stages of development. Congressman Combest's plan is to bring the final bill to the full House before the August break begins.

Combest's overall goal is to get a significant insurance reform package in place before the start of the 2000 growing season.

Key provisions being debated at the time of publication include provisions which would allow producers to opt out of prevented planting coverage implement a revised premium subsidy

structure and revise rules for calculating Actual Productin History (APH) yields both in the future and retroactively.

One key provision in the bill as it currently stands would make prevented planting coverage optional.

This would allow a producer to opt out of this coverage and save as much as 8% on their insurance premium costs.

Overall the House Ag Committee is looking to fix some of the current program's flaws and to set the stage for even broader reforms in the years to come. A full accounting of the provisions included in the final version of H.R. 2559 should be available by the week of August 2.

### Environmental Protection Agency plans to eliminate the use of two more pest fighting crop protectants

If the Environmental Protection Agency's plans to eliminate two effective and commonly used pest-fighting crop protectants—organophosphates and carbamates—are carried out, a local Farm Bureau leader says it will bolster foreign food producers while hurting America's consumers and farmers.

"According to a study released May 11, which was compiled by Dr. Ron Knutson and Dr. Ed Smith of Texas A&M University, along with Auburn University staff, the overall impact of

the ban would mean a loss of \$17 billion to the U.S. economy. That doesn't sound too bad on a national scope, but when you look at it on a regional basis, Texas would be very hard hit," says Bart Greer, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

The proposed ban on the crop protection chemicals, as part of the implementation of the Food Quality Protection Act, (FQPA) would essentially take Texas out of the picture on cotton, corn, and sorghum production.

"Areas where boll weevil eradication programs are in place on cotton are at risk of reinfestation due to the loss of just one organophosphate," Greer notes.

Though the ban would stop domestic use of the chemicals, foreign producers will still be free to use them. And with no regulatory authority abroad restricting or specifying the manner of use, the health risks EPA seeks to reduce could actually increase, says Greer.

The study further suggests that the ban would cut 209,000 jobs and rob proprietors, employers, and employees of \$9 billion. Moreover, U.S. farmers would suffer through higher production costs and lower yields, exports would fall, and food imports will increase.

## Insects in the classroom gets 'Web Pick' from biological group

Insects in the Classroom might have students creeping and crawling to find a computer, but bug spray won't be necessary.

Insects in the classroom is a Web site featuring teacher-developed, kid-tested curriculum that uses bugs as teaching tools. The site has been designated "Favorite Web Site" by HMS Beagle, a biweekly Webzine for biological and medical researchers.

"They apparently saw our page and liked the content," said Dr. John Jackman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service entomologist and Webmaster. Jackman said Insects in the Classroom was created about a year ago as a spinoff booster course taught to teacher. "We'll soon be adding another block to our lesson plans that were written from a similar course just completed."

The site has links to a syllabus, course materials, course activities, lesson plans and the Buzz Page where participants can chat with others online. Various other links to insect-related Internet sites are also listed on the page.

In the activity section, for example, there is a link to guided imagery that describes a "mental journey from the vantage point of a butterfly." A video page has clips of a cockroach pulling a petri dish to demonstrate its strength and various clips of insect collecting methods.

The Web site is a collaborative effort of Texas A&M University, Blinn College and the Brazos Valley Museum of Natural History. It received funding from the Texas Statewide Systemic Initiative.

HMS Beagle has a daily digest of Web resources and published materials and recently was chosen as one of Yahoo's top 32 "incredibly useful" sites. Because Insects in the Classroom was named as an HMS Beagle "Web Pick of the Day," it will be listed as a favorite site for 30 days and will be permanently catalogued in BioMedLink, a comprehensive, evaluated database of biological and medical Web sites.


