## Prime International To Operate Plant In Friona

Prime International Corporation, the nation's largest liver processor and distributor, announced on Friday that it will establish its third processing plant in Friona, leasing 25,000 square feet in the new Millard Complex, which is under construction here.
The announcement by Prime International means that the Millard Corp. will be able to construct all three phases of its new plant at one time, according to company officials.
The Prime Corp. will employ 60 people to start with, adding 20 to 40 as expansion is completed. Prime International targets super markets and large food chains in preparing 170 different large food chains in preparing 170 different
varieties of liver-beef, kosher-beef, calf, pork varieties of liver
With the addition of the Friona plant, Prime will have a total of 250 to 300 employees in its will have a total of 250 to 300 employees in its
operation, with an annual payroll of $\$ 5,000,000$. The company was started in 1977, as Prime Meat Processors, Inc. Edward Ginsberg is president, and Dr. Benjamin Nachman is vice president. Dr. Nachman is a former dentist.
When the company began operations, they employed only seven people in a 5,000 squarefoot building. Today, the company produces around 100,000 pounds of liver products each week, and $5,000,000$ pounds annually
Prime International's accounting and administrative affairs are handled by senior vice president and general manager Sarah Wood. Ms. Wood joined the firm in 1978, and has 20 years of accounting and business experience.

Ms. Wood is also seated on the board of directors for Prime International as secretarytreasurer for the corporation.
The Friona plant will be the third in the company's chain. It's main office is in Omaha, Nebraska, and a second plant is located at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
Present on Friday for the formal announcement and press conference was Ginsberg, Dr. Nachman and Ms. Wood, the three top corporate executives, as well as the wives of Ginsberg and Nachman.
Also present were Larry Larsen, Tim Jackes, John McDaniel and Curt Baird, representing Millard Warehouse.

On March 15, Millard Warehouse, which has corporate headquarters in Omaha, Nebraska announced that it would build a plant which ultimately would contain 140,000 square feet, or $3,360,000$ cubic feet of cold storage.
Originally, it was planned to build the plant in stages, with about half of the total storage ( 70,000 square feet) being built, to be followed by "stages two and three," which would double the size.
The announcement this week of the addition of Prime International as a leasee at the Millard Complex will allow the total construction to be done in sequence, company officials say done in sequence, company officials say.
