Longhorns win County Championship



LOCKNEY LONGHORNS CELEBRATE THEIR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP WIN against Floydada Whirlwinds by raising the traveling trophy Friday night, November 5, at Mitchell Zimmerman Field in Lockney. The Longhorns and Whirlwinds were tied 14-14 until a last minute touchdown by the 'Horns.

Last Friday's 74th renewal of the annual Floyd County Championship was indeed a classic, if there ever was one, and will rank among the most exciting contests in the event's storied history. The outcome of the 20th Century's final meeting between Lockney and Floydada wasn't decided until Jordan Lambert connected with Mo Collins on a 66-yard touchdown toss with 70 seconds remaining, to guide the Longhorns to a 21-14 victory over the Whirlwinds at Lockney's Mitchell-Zimmerman Field.

The playoff-bound Longhorns improved their season record to 7-3 and 4-1 in District 7-2A action. Lockney will meet the Tuscola-Jim Ned Indians in a Bi-District clash at Lubbock's Lowry Field tomorrow night. Jim Ned, the Division I representative of District 8-2A, finished the season at 5-5 (3-2 in district play). The Division II playoff teams from District 7-2A are Abernathy and New Deal. The Antelopes (7-3, 4-1) will face Albany (6-4) at Colorado City, and the Lions (8-2, 4-1) travel to Big Spring for a Bi-District date with the Hamlin Pied Pipers (7-3 for the season). Following a fine 7-4 playoff campaign in 1998, the Whirlwinds closed 1999 at 4-6, with only a victory over Ralls in District 7-2A play.

The County Championship game was tight throughout, with the Whirlwinds answering each Lockney touch-

down before the Lambert-to-Collins game winner in the final moments. The Whirlwinds opened with a 10-play, 47-yard drive which ended with a missed 32-yard field goal attempt by Isabelo Irlas. The Longhorns' first drive produced only one first down before they were forced to punt. However a Floydada turnover on first down opened the door for the 'Horns. Lambert and tailback Josh Quebe picked up most of the 32 yards remaining to the Whirlwind end zone, and Lambert carried the final 2-yards to put Lockney on the scoreboard. Mo Collins' kick for conversion was perfect, giving the 'Horns a 7-0 lead at the end of the first 12 minutes.

Daryl Henderson electrified the Floydada fans with a 50-yard return of the ensuing kickoff, but the Whirlwinds turned over the ball for a second time in their next possession. However, the 'Horns were unable to capitalize on the miscue. Justin McGuire's 60-yard punt drove the Longhorns deep into their own territory and Lambert was again forced to punt. Finally winning the battle of field position, Floydada marched 58 yards in just 6 plays, with Justin McGuire carrying the final yard for the Whirlwinds' first score. Isabelo Irlas tied the game at 7-all with his extra-point kick, and the first half ended with Lambert firing blanks from near midfield. At this point, Floydada freshman defensive back

Dustin Covington was meeting severe tests in the secondary against Lockney's deep threats in the passing routes.

The Longhorns opened the third quarter with an 8-play drive, but turned over the ball on downs when Floydada prevented a 4th-down conversion at its 22 yard line with strong play by the defensive front. David Lightfoot carried for 14 yards on first down to get the Whirlwinds out of the hole, but Floydada was forced to punt back to the 'Horns just three plays later. At the end of Lockney's next possession, Lambert boomed a 49-yard punt which pinned the Whirlwinds back to their own 9.

Tough running by Lightfoot and Justin McGuire helped Floydada's field position, but the turnover bug again hit the Whirlwinds. On a play that saw Floydada quarterback Dusty Anderson carried from the field due to a game-ending knee injury, the Whirlwinds coughed up the ball for the third time. The Longhorns quickly converted Jessie Ledesma's fumble recovery into their shortest scoring drive of the evening. Lambert hit A.J. Thornton with a 29-yard pass to set up his own 2-yard TD plunge a play later. Mo Collins added the point-after to vault the Longhorns back on top, 14-7.

The Whirlwinds responded with a 67-yard drive which started in the fi-

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LISD approves drug testing

After discussion and a presentation from Caprock Medical Association, the trustees of LISD unanimously approved the implementation of drug testing in Lockney Junior High and High School.

Although the details of the drug testing policy have yet to be worked out, the trustees did appear to be in agreement that the future policy would include the requirement that all students—not just those involved in extra curricular activities—be random tested.

Board President Bernie Ford, sensitive to board members fears and complaints from some in the community, said, "I don't think it is the school's responsibility to check children for drugs, but it looks like society is forcing us into it."

Trustee Bybee said, "I have heard from some parents who feel it may be intimidating to kids who have never done drugs."

The trustees were in agreement that the drug testing would not be a quick fix to a child's drug problem. "I think we will see more results in the long term, than we will in the short term," said Trustee John Quebe.

High School Principal James Poole said, "If we can help one kid, I think that is progress."

James Hill and Jeff McCarty, of Caprock Medical Association, presented their proposal for drug testing

to the LISD Board. According to Hill the association has large accounts with the Department of Transportation, grocery store chains, and does school drug testing for Dimmitt and Sundown.

"Our lab is based in Midland," said Hill. "We operate under very strict government regulations. It is inspected to ensure the quality of testing."

According to Hill the test would be able to spot all "normal abused drugs", such as marijuana, cocaine, PCP, opiates, Darvon and Darveccette.

"We can add alcohol testing at no additional charge," said Hill. Hill told the trustees that an alcohol test at one school had alerted a student that he was in the early stages of diabetes.

"We will have two vials per student," said Hill. "If one vial test positive then the 2nd one could be tested if someone wants to contest the results or have it sent someplace else."

"Two doctors work in the clinic who are trained in drug screening and lab toxicology."

"There is a chain of custody that we follow closely. The vials do not leave our presence until they are sealed."

Hill said Caprock Medical Association has never been involved in any litigation and has completed "thousands and thousands of tests."

Hill said most schools have opted to do random testing once a month—at different times of the day and month.

Hill answered many questions posed to him by trustees on different ways they had heard you can beat the tests. He assured the members that tampering is easy to spot.

"There have been different methods tried," said Hill, "but it shows up as an invalid test and it also tells you why it is invalid. If something has been added to the urine or put in your system to try and fool the test—it will show up. Then you have to answer the question of why you are trying to invalidate the test."

After the vote to implement drug testing the trustees set about to immediately work on the new drug testing policy.

The policy will be checked over by legal counsel before being implemented.

Bids will be taken from drug testing providers, however the board estimates the initial cost for testing everyone will be \$10,000.

The cost will be then be approximately \$1,000 a month to random test 10% of the students.

The test will cover all students 6th through 12th grade and all employees. Bus drivers are already being tested as mandated by federal law.

McIntosh receives medals

Veterans honors are still obtainable

Like many young men who fought during WWII, Dr. O.R. McIntosh served his country not for acclaim, but for his sense of duty.

"And like many other veterans, Dr. McIntosh left the service without the recognition that was due him."

Now, after 54 years, Dr. McIntosh has been recognized for his service with medals presented to him by the U.S. Government and Philippine Government.

"Lots of soldiers weren't given the medals they deserved when they got out," said McIntosh. "Many of them don't even know there are medals out there that they earned, and that there are still ways to get them."

"I pursued it for my family. I wanted them for family history."

McIntosh was discharged from the Army, in December 1945. He was presented with a Purple Heart with a bronze oak leaf cluster, a Bronze Star, and a Good Conduct Medal.

McIntosh learned of a way to collect overdue medals and wrote to the U.S. Army Reserve Personnel Center.

This year he was presented with the Asiatic Pacific, World War II Victory Medal, Philippine Liberation Medal and Combat Medical Badge.

The Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal (APCM) is awarded to veterans with continuous service of at least 30 days in the Asia-Pacific theatre of operation from the period Dec. 7, 1941 to March 1946.

McIntosh's medal contains three stars and arrowhead. "They are for being in 3 battles in the Pacific--Guam, Leyte, and the Okinawa Campaign," said McIntosh. "The Bronze arrowhead is for participating in an amphibious landing."

The WWII Victory Medal is awarded to veterans who served at any time during the period Dec. 7, 1941 to December 1946.

The Philippine Liberation Medal (PLM) and the Philippine Republic Presidential Unit Citation Badge (PRPUCB) were sent to McIntosh by the Philippine Armed Forces Chief of Staff.

The PLM is given to soldiers that served in the Philippines for not less than 30 days from October 17, 1944 - September 3, 1945.

The PRPUCB is awarded to veterans who served during the time period of Dec. 7, 1941 to May 10, 1942 and during the campaigns for the period 1944 to 1945.

McIntosh was also recently presented with the Combat Medical Badge because he served in the Medi-

cal Detachment 305th Infantry, 77th Division.

"I started out as a litter bearer and was later promoted to company aid man--or medic," said McIntosh.

McIntosh enlisted in the Army Feb. 4, 1943 and served overseas from March 26, 1944 to September 25, 1945.

"I started out as a Buck Private," said McIntosh. "I came out as a Tech-

Reyes' run earns him trip to State


Floydada sophomore Rocky Reyes turned in his best performance of the year here at Mae Simmons Park on Saturday to earn a trip to the Texas Class 2A Cross-Country Championships.

Running at the Region I Championships, Reyes overcame a less-than-stellar start with a relentless push through the second mile of the 3-mile race to finish sixth in the 147-runner field and lead the Whirlwinds to an 11th place team finish. The top 10 individuals qualify for the state meet to

be held at Round Rock's Old Settler's Park this Saturday. He will run at 9:30 a.m.

Running side-by-side with teammate Josh Caballero - who was the number two FHS runner in 65th - Reyes got caught back in the pack and was close to 50th near the half-mile mark. Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

I want to make a public apology for my part in a misunderstanding of the KFLP Radio broadcast at the Floydada-Lockney football game on Nov. 5th. I wish I had the post-game comments back of the situation pertaining to the incident at Mitchell-Zimmerman Field.

My frustration was set off due to a couple of factors. I found out at 5:00 p.m., the day of the game, that we would not be in the pressbox.

I was fine until I arrived at the stadium and saw the pressbox, which I thought was adequate size.

I was just there to do my job and this was the first time, in my 26 year career, that I had not been able to work out of a pressbox. That career included 80 high school stadiums across the Texas Panhandle-South Plains, Oklahoma, and Kansas.

My second frustration was that I had been in the Lockney pressbox in excess of 10 times, and two years ago the same two radio stations covered the game simultaneously.

In 1997 the two stations worked it out amongst themselves, and I assumed this would be the situation again. There had been conversations between the radio announcers the week of October 11th about the possible arrangements and then again between station management on Nov. 3rd, and I wrongly assumed I would be in the pressbox at that time.

Also, in the meantime, LISD Superintendent Raymond Lusk had told KFLP personnel we would have to share space with the Floydada coaches or to sit out in the stands. This is where the communication breakdown took place. I felt there was not enough room to share with coaches and filming crew. Due to the magnitude of the game Mr. Lusk did not want any more people in the center booth, except for the score keeper and the PA announcer. That is how I ended up in the stands broadcasting the game.

Mr. Lusk apologized to me at the stadium numerous times explaining his decision, and we shook hands. I was still upset, but attempted to maintain a professional broadcast which did include many compliments of the Lockney players and coaches. Not once did I make any derogatory remarks about the people involved in the game. My frustration carried over to the post-game show where I made statements about the school's decision

and my observation of the winning touchdown pass. I reported what I saw.

Tony Ricketts and myself met with Mr. Lusk and James Poole on Monday at Mitchell-Zimmerman Field. They were gracious enough to let me explain why I thought different arrangements could be made, and they reiterated their decision. They assured me it was not a Floydada-Lockney decision, that a similar decision was made in the Tulia game.

To the people of Lockney, I am

sorry for my post game remarks. At the same time I hope you will understand why the people from Floydada were upset. In my 11 years of broadcasting Whirlwind games—they had never seen me in the stands. It was a very unfortunate incident.

Last, to all members of the Floyd County Friends, I am sorry as your president that this took place. I regret any blemish this may have caused for you and your beliefs of the Unity Center. This is probably the most painful


part of the incident.

I am proud to say I live in Floydada. It truly is a great community. I have always had a mutual respect for Lockney, and Lockney has treated me with friendship. I would like to continue that relationship with both towns.

I would like for Floydada to forgive Lockney I.S.D. and for Lockney citizens to forgive me.

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WWII medals awarded to Floydada veteran

McIntosh earned his Bronze Star for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy near Ormoc, Leyte, Philippine Island, from Dec. 7, 1944 - Dec. 30, 1944.

The citation read, "Private McIntosh, a litter bearer, with complete disregard for his own safety, went with the forward aid station to care for and evacuate the wounded men of his Battalion. Although he was a litter bearer, he willingly and ably assisted the technicians in caring for the wounded. Private McIntosh several times went forward of the front lines to evacuate his fallen comrades, disregarding the enemy fire. Private McIntosh's strong courage and devotion to duty were an inspiration to the men of the section."

The citation was signed by U.S. Army Major General A.D. Bruce.

McIntosh was wounded twice in combat, April 17, 1945 and April 21, 1945 at Ie Shima, Ryukyu Island. The 2nd injury sent him to the hospital ship "Mercy".

"The first injury came when I was standing next to a Japanese fox hole. The Jap came up out of the hole and fired. The bullet hit my carbine and fragmented.

"The second injury was when a mortar shell landed by a fox hole. Af-

ter this, I was gone from action for two months. The Okinawa Campaign was over when I got back."

McIntosh was then sent to Cebu, Philippine Islands. He was there when the atomic bomb was dropped.

Oct. 5, 1945 his division was sent as an occupation force to Hokkaido, Japan (the northern most island of Japan). "The Japanese people welcomed us," said McIntosh. We didn't even carry our guns."

McIntosh was discharged from the army Dec. 9, 1945 in El Paso. He enrolled in Optometry School in June 1946 and went to work for Dr. Kimball in 1949, and married LaVerne the same year.

For 4 1/2 years he was in practice with Kimball before opening his own office in Floydada in August 1953.

Dr. McIntosh retired in 1999.

"For years my medals have been stored in a shoe box at the house," said McIntosh. "My family has encouraged me to get this all together and I came up with the idea to display them in a frame. I have heard of other Veterans who didn't know they could write for these medals--or that they even had them coming to them."

McIntosh hopes the knowledge of his success in obtaining the medals will encourage other veterans to do the same.

Medals Awarded For Defense and Liberation of Phillipines

Philippine Liberation Medal (PLM)--Served in the Philippines for not less than 30 days from Oct. 17, 1944-September 3, 1945.

Philippine Defense Medal (PDM)--Served in the Philippines for not less than 30 days from Dec. 7, 1941 to June 15, 1942.

Philippine Independence Medal (PIM)--Awarded to recipients of both the Philippine Liberation Medal and the Philippine Defense Medal.

Philippine Republic Presidential Unit Citation Badge (PRPUCB)--Awarded to veterans who served during the period Dec. 7, 1941 to May 10, 1942 and during the campaigns for the period 1944 to 1945.



nal minute of the third period and carried into the first three minutes of the fourth quarter. McGuire picked up 48 yards on 6 carries during the drive to set up a 13-yard, play-action pass from Jeff Lyles to Clay Horn in the southeast corner of the Longhorn end zone. Irlas booted the extra point to tie the score once again at 14-all.

Following the ensuing kickoff, Josh Quebe carried six times for 22 yards and hauled in a 15-yard Lambert pass as the Longhorns ate up five minutes of the fourth-quarter clock. A fourth-down attempt at Floydada's 26 resulted in Lockney's only turnover of the game. Daryl Henderson recovered the loose ball to give the Whirlwinds the opportunity to pull out a victory in the final four minutes.

McGuire and Lightfoot were again called on to carry most of the load as the 'Winds attempted to position themselves for a game-winning drive. It was not to be. Lockney's stellar defensive lineman Jessie Ledesma broke through to spill Jeff Lyles in a 9-yard quarterback sack which, for all intents and purposes, thwarted Floydada's last chance. McGuire's punt appeared to travel about 42 yards, but it was ruled as having touched a Floydada player and was declared downed 17 yards up field in Lockney's favor.

The Longhorns took possession at their own 34 yard line with a minute and a half remaining. Lambert was forced out-of-bounds to stop the clock on first down. Looking for his favorite receiver, Mo Collins, Lambert found him streaking down the west sideline and lofted his longest pass of the game. Collins positioned himself against defender Jeff Lyles, hauled in the aerial at about the Floydada 15 and coasted into the Whirlwind end zone. Collins then kicked the extra point to put the finishing touch on Lockney's winning drive.

A razzle-dazzle return of the ensuing kickoff almost backfired for Floydada, but the 'Winds were able to maintain possession and set up shop at their own 17. Jeff Lyles' first-down pass was picked off by Longhorn line-backer Jamie Cerda, putting an end to the Whirlwinds' hopes of retaining the Floyd County Trophy. Two plays later, the Longhorns converged to the center of Mitchell-Zimmerman where the victory celebration started.

Floydada, out-gained Lockney on

the ground 208 yards to 168 yards, but the Longhorns' 137 passing yards was indicative of their balanced offense. Their swarming defense, coupled with their balanced offense, should carry the Longhorns into a couple of rounds in the Class 2A playoffs. The winner of tomorrow's Bi-District clash in Lubbock will meet the Canadian vs. Quanah winner in next week's Area round of the playoffs.

Coach Daughtrey's comments: About the game: "I was as proud of the way our guys played as I could be. They were playing with super intensity from the opening kickoff. It was just a great high school football game."

About the winning touchdown pass by Lockney with just over a minute left: "We hated that it ended the way it did (with the long touchdown pass). At the time we were looking for the game to come down to overtime. But things like that sometimes happen, and there's not anything that can be done about it except shake the other guys' hands and come back next year."

Coach Terry's comments: I was really proud of our kids, I thought they played hard and smart. Floydada played a good game, I think you have to give the kids from both schools a lot of credit. They all played their tails off.

The game helps keep us on a roll for the play-offs. The game also had a play-off atmosphere. I am so proud of our young men, they played great and they made this community very proud; not only winning the Floyd County Championship but winning a share of the District Championship; after all we were picked 5th in every pre-season poll.

Floydada's Junior Varsity seemed to take out all of its seasonlong frustrations in a wild 52-16 victory over Lockney's JV Longhorns last week. The JV Whirlwinds received a break early in the contest when the ball was snapped over the Lockney punter's head, giving them position deep in Lockney territory. Taking the pitch from Brandon Marler at the 13, Andrew Arvizo scored the first of three touchdowns from 13 yards out. Brandon Marler hit Sean Holster with a 30-yard TD toss in the final minute and Arvizo added the two-pointer as Floydada enjoyed a 24-8 lead at intermission.







New overall view into wells by Poole Well Cam of Floydada

Poole Well Cam of Floydada now uses a new color camera on most all its well service jobs. The new dual camera simply takes the guess work out of what is wrong at the bottom of the hole.

Raymond Poole, owner and operator of Poole Well Cam located at 704 Matador Highway, said, "Before we had this camera, we did everything by guess work. We thought we were pretty good guessers."

"After we got this camera, I have found out there are a lot of things we were way out of the ball park on just guessing," Poole added.

The BT 9480 Dual Color Camera provides a side view as well as down-hole view. The submersible camera rotates 360 degrees for a thorough inspection of the pipe and hole down to 1,000 feet.

The camera works on a 4 inch hole or up to 30 inches. It is adaptable to most existing Single Conductor Systems.

It can take single still color photos of the trouble spot or send back a color video to be viewed later.


Pool Well Cam is the only well service business in the area that offers this kind of up-to-date camera techniques for the customer.

Poole said, "There are not a lot of these cameras available in this area. There is one in Hereford and one in Clovis, New Mexico."

Emergency aid helps Ag weather tough year 1999

Further analysis of the effects of the recently implemented Emergency / Disaster Assistance Program shows agriculture getting a much needed short-term boost.

The relief package, delivered mainly in the form of a supplemental 1999 Ag Market transition Payment (AMTA), will significantly improve the economic situation of most farmers. Many producers were projected to have difficulty making their operations cash flow in 1999 as a result of the ongoing slump in commodity prices.

The research, done by economists with the Texas A&M University Ag-

ricultural and Food Policy Center (AFPC), shows that the relief package will indeed help producers get through the 1999 crop year but does nothing to alleviate the long-term pressure on agriculture's weakened economic situation.

The AFPC analysis also shows that, despite short-term economic benefits for producers, farmers and ranchers will still be hard-pressed to cash flow their operations through 2002 unless the commodity price situation drastically improves.

The AFPC analysis concludes that unless a significant reversal in commodity prices ensues additional aid will be needed for agriculture.




The table below summarizes the latest effective payment rates for Step 2 Certificates and the currently calculated LDP payment rate/marketing loan gain effective the week starting November 5, 1999. Also included is the Adjusted World Price calculated for the week ending Nov. 4, 1999.

Boll Weevil Assessment collections reflect good support for the program

Assessment collections for boll weevil eradication programs in the three High Plains zones- Northwest Plains (NWP), Western High Plains (WHP) and Permian Basin (PB) - are reflecting strong support from cotton growers across the area.

Eighty-three percent of assessments have already been paid in the PB zone with the NWP showing 75.2 percent paid and the WHP 73.2 percent.

Growers who have not, as yet, paid up their account will be reminded of their outstanding debt if they are unable to present a compliance certificate when they sell their cotton. Under state law, any first buyer of cotton is required to honor a lien in favor of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) placed on this

year's production from farms subject to the boll weevil assessment.

Without a compliance certificate, a buyer must obtain confirmation from TBWEF as to whether or not an assessment is outstanding. This is being provided through a secured Internet file that is updated daily.

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
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Commissioners get report on crop conditions from Extension Agent

The Floyd County Commissioners Court met Monday morning, November 8th, and heard an update on the county's harvest now in full swing. Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland told the commissioners, "The harvest is in full swing. We had good weather last week and it is expected to be good again this week. The combines and the cotton strippers are all going around the county."
"Some farmers are still waiting for a killing freeze, but those that are stripping are getting pretty decent yields. With approximately 40 per cent harvested, the dryland is averaging around 200 to 300 pounds per acre and the irrigated is running between 1 to 1 1/2 bales per acre."
"Our grain acres are way up this year from the 40,000 acres normally to around 110,000 acres. This is due to our hauled out cotton early in the season being replanted in sorghum."
"Sorghum yields are really fluctuating this year from 2,000 pounds per acre to 8,000 pounds," Ragland stated.
Ragland added, "Our wheat is doing nothing right now. It needs rain. Even wheat under pivots are not developing a good root system. It is not even good enough for pasture."
Also reporting to the commissioners was Melissa Long with the Floyd County Extension Agency of Family and Consumer Services. Long said, "We had a good Halloween Food Show with 62 kids participating. Most of these will be going on to the district show."
"We also had a good Extension Homemakers meeting at Harmony this past month."
"We are conducting BLT ("Better

Living for Texans") exercise classes with the theme being "Bridge to Good Health," Long added. Long is the Program Director for these programs and Josie Martinez is the Assistant Program Director.
The commissioners canvassed and approved the November 2, 1999 election returns.
Commissioner Jon Jones made the motion to advertise for sale or trade two used motor graders from Precinct No. 4. Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made the second and it was unanimously approved.
Gilroy made the motion to transfer \$15,000.00 to each of the precincts from the road and bridge account into CDs. It was seconded by Commissioner Craig Gilly and unanimously approved.
In other business, the commissioners audited the County Sheriff's Criminal Asset Forfeiture report. It involved the verification of one vehicle.
Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden made the motion to approve the County Treasurer's report as given by Mary Shurbet. It was seconded by Gilroy and unanimously approved.
The October financial report showed the county with a beginning balance of \$608,280.16; receipts of \$273,947.97; transfer in and out of \$117,259.07; and disbursements of \$499,602.13; leaving a balance of \$382,626.00.
Certificates of Deposits at the First National Bank in the General Fund totaled \$300,000.00. CD totals by precincts are: Pct. No. 1, \$10,000.00; Pct. No. 2, \$50,000.00; Pct. No. 3, \$215,000.00; Pct. No. 4, \$60,000.00.
Interest earned for the month on CDs and checking accounts amounted to \$41.09.

APPLICATION: City of Floydada, 114 W. Virginia Street, Floydada, Texas 79235, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for a renewal of Permit No. 10170-001, which authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 500,000 gallons per day via irrigation on 128 acres of non-public access agricultural land. This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into waters in the State.

The wastewater treatment facilities and disposal area are located 0.5 mile south of U.S. Highway 70 and approximately 1.5 miles east of Farm-to-Market Road 1958 in Floyd County, Texas. The plant size and disposal area are located in the drainage basin of White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. Written public comments and requests for public meetings may be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address provided in the information section below within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. A public meeting is intended for the taking of public comment and is not a contested case hearing. A public meeting will be held if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application.

CONTESTED CASE HEARING. The TNRCC may grant a contested case hearing on this application if a written hearing request is filed within 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice. The Executive Director may approve the application unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice.

To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "(I/We) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a brief and specific description of how you would be affected by the application in a way not common to the general public; and (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the proposed activity. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address provided in the information section below.

If a hearing request is filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application and hearing request to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a contested case hearing is held, it will be a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

The City Council further found that the structure located at the above stated address is dilapidated, substandard, unfit for human habitation, and a hazard to the public health, safety and welfare. Correction of the violation is hereby ORDERED.

- 1.) The structure is to be secured by the owner within 10 days and kept secured.
- 2.) The structure is to be repaired, or demolished and the property completely cleaned including the removal of trash, debris, or any other forms of material, and the storm cellar filled in within 30 days of the date of this order.
- 3.) It is specifically ORDERED that prior to the owner causing repair, demolition, or removal procedures to be begun, that any and all permits for such activities required by the City be obtained.

In the event that the order has not been complied with by the above stated date, the City Manager is hereby authorized, at his Discretion, to perform the above stated actions and assess the expenses thereof against the property upon which the actions were performed.

It is further ORDERED that a true and correct copy of the Order of the City Council be forwarded postage prepaid, certified mail, return receipt requested to Respondents and that such action be taken immediately after entry of this Order.

Notice is hereby given that Respondents have the right to file an appeal of this Order in a court of competent jurisdiction within thirty (30) days of the date of this Order.
