Teuton reflects on WWII

Paul Teuton, of Lockney, remembers exactly where he was the day Pearl Harbor was bombed. Like many of other Americans, Teuton remembers, "I wanted to go down there--and whoop em all."

Teuton enlisted in the Horse Cavalry at Ft. Bliss in El Paso, January

"I had a good job in the oil field at Houma, Louisiana," said Teuton. "The war in Europe was spreading toward France and England.

"The U.S. Military offered a plan to give some young men some military training. If you enlisted in the military service for one year, you could go back to your old job.

"My boss man said if I wanted to enlist, my job would be waiting when was discharged."

After enlisting, Teuton was sent to Ft. Brown in Brownsville.

"We were sitting in our barracks in Ft. Brown, getting ready to go to church that Sunday morning," said Teuton, "when the news came over the radio. The Japanese were bombing Pearl Harbor. We were mad. We wanted to go down there and 'whoop

"I'm glad the government didn't let us go, or I would not be there today." According to Teuton the horse cavalry was disbanded and "totally mechanized".


Teuton graduated from the Cavalry Officer Candidate School at Ft. Riley, Kansas as a 2nd Lt. Mechanized Cav-

"We were given tanks and armored cars instead of horses," said Teuton. "I volunteered to go overseas as a

replacement officer. We were sent to North Africa and I was later assigned to the 34th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop, 34th Infantry Division in Italy.

"I remember sitting with about 18 'Yankee' soldiers eating our "C" rations. They asked me what happened to all those horses that we used to ride. I told them--'you're eating them'. They seemed to lose their appetite after

For the next two years Teuton and the Infantry fought their way up the Italian "boot". "We were at the border

of Switzerland when the war ended," said Teuton.

"That one year enlistment turned out to be 5 1/2 years of service. I was discharged with the rank of Captain

of the Mechanized Cavalry.' Teuton has kept an old "press release" from the headquarters of the 5th Army Public Relations Section which details the work of the 34th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop.

Released Dec. 9, 1944, the news article stated:

"Climaxing its 375 days of outpost missions and contact patrols in this theater, the 34th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop, 34th Infantry Division, recently turned in a gallant seventeenday performance as infantry riflemen in Lieutenant General Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army hot-box north of

Livergnano...

'Recently the entrenched recon men firmly held their sector despite a series of vicious German counterattacks and a 400-round enemy concentration from rockets, self-propelled guns and mortars. Each counter-blow aimed across their sector was repulsed. When a patrol of Krauts sneaked too close one night, the cavalrymen hit them with everything available, including fists. Caught unawares, remnants of the Kraut patrol fled through the stormy night and didn't return for a

long time... "Previously regarded by some as a 'fifth wheel' outfit, the 34th Reconnaissance received favorable attention for its efficient patrolling on the Anzio Beachhead. A few weeks later it won

For some reason, however, the "Day Harbor, where thousands were killed of infamy" still resonates with many Americans. It changed so many lives. In fact, it cut short the lives of some 20 million people worldwide. The got richer. Some got poorer. Some ended up in wheel chairs. Some on crutches. Some without arms. Or legs. Or both. So it went.

At any rate, most people who were around at the time can still remember the answer to the question: "Where were you when the Japs hit Pearl Har-

In my own case I was in a hospital on Corregidor, having been put there as a result of trying to lift a too-heavy case of anti-aircraft ammunition while preparing our guns for the war we

were told was imminent. It was some thing like 4 o'clock in the morning of December 8 (in the Philippines it is December 8 when it is December 7 in America.)

We were awakened by an orderly with news of the attack, and also with news that all hospitalized patients were being transferred to an underground hospital in Malinta tunnel. I told the orderly that if I had a choice in the matter, I would rather rejoin my fellows on the guns. So I did. The Japanese hit the Philippines as soon as light came, and our own little phase of the great war began.

Those of us on the guns were not told, at the time, of the devastation at Pearl Harbor. We were told only that we "suffered damages." Nor were we told, at the time, of the devastation at Clark Field, only a hundred miles or so to our north, and other installations in the Philippines. (Corregidor, the most heavily fortified part of our defensive forces in the Philippines, was not hit until a few days later. In those few days the Japanese laid waste to Clark Field and our bomber fleet, to the Cavite naval base, and made landings of troops on Luzon.)

As a small side bar to the story, I would have to say I could never understand how or why we were hit so hard so "unexpectedly" when we were also told war was imminent. Then, when doing research on a book, I ran across a cable from Washington to Generals Short in Hawaii and MacArthur in the Philippines. It said negotiations with the Japanese in Washington were going nowhere, that we should expect war with Japan, but that if hostilities broke out, it would be better if Japan struck first.

They did. And the rest is history. So, on a personal basis, we remember Pearl Harbor and pay tribute to

those who died there. And we remember the Philippines and Corregidor, and those who, in ever decreasing numbers, sought to keep the flag flying a little longer. And all those who came later and raised the flag again.

Americans remember 58th anniversary of Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor

2,403 Americans were killed when Japanese carrier based planes attacked, without warning, the bulk of the U.S. Pacific fleet, moored in Pearl Harbor. Another 1,178 Americans were wounded.

The Japanese attack force under the command of Admiral Nagumo, consisted of six carriers with 423 planes.

At 6 a.m., the first attack wave of 183 Japanese planes took off from the carriers, located 230 miles north of ger! Tiger! Tiger!). Oahu and headed for the U.S. Pacific Fleet at Pearl Harbor.

At 7:02 a.m., two Army operators at Oahu's northern shore radar station detect the Japanese air attack approaching and contact a junior officer who disregards their reports, thinking they are American B-17 planes which are expected in from the U.S. west

At 7:15 a.m., a second attack wave of 167 planes takes off from the Japanese carriers and heads for Pearl Har-

Pearl Harbor is not on a state of high alert. Aircraft are therefore left parked aircraft guns are unmanned with many were not in the port.

Fifty eight years ago, Dec. 7, 1941, ammunition boxes kept locked. There are also no torpedo nets protecting the fleet anchorage, and since it is Sunday morning, many officers and crewmen are leisurely ashore.

> At 7:53 a.m., the first Japanese assault wave, with 51 Val dive bombers, 40 kate torpedo bombers, 50 high level bombers, and 43 Zero fighters, commenced the attack with flight commander, Mitso Fuchida, sounding the battle cry "Tora! Tora! Tora!" (Ti-

> The Americans were taken completely by surprise. The first attack wave targets airfields and battleships. The second wave targets other ships and shipyard facilities. The air raid lasts until 9:45 a.m. Eight battleships are damaged, with five sunk. Three light cruisers, three destroyers and three smaller vessels are lost along with 188 aircraft. The Japanese lost 27 planes and five midget submarines which attempted to penetrate the inner harbor and launch torpedoes.

Escaping damage from the attack are the prime targets, the three U.S. Pacific Fleet aircraft carriers, Lexingwingtip to wingtip on airfields, anti- ton, Enterprise and Saratoga which

The first torpedo in the assault on Pearl Harbor hit the USS Raleigh at about 7:55 a.m., Sunday morning. Battleship Row was then hit at 7:57 a.m. by a torpedo.

At 8:10 a.m., a Japanese Type 97 Attack Bomber dropped a bomb that struck the Arizona between the No. 1 and No. 2 turret. This bomb was an armor piercing artillery shell that ignited the Arizona's forward magazine. The battleship exploded violently, sinking to the bottom of the harbor.

One thousand, one hundred and seventy-seven men rest at the bottom of the harbor, entombed in the Arizona's rusty hull.

In the Navy's known history, there has never been a ship that has taken so many of its crew down with her.

The next day, December 8th, the United States and Britain declared war on Japan. December 11, Germany and Italy declared war on the United States. The European and Southeast Asian wars have now become a global conflict with the Axis powers, Japan, Germany, and Italy, united against America, Britain, France, and their Allies.

A: Several new laws and an important appropriation designed to improve the performance of the Child Support Division were passed during the 76th session of the Texas Legislature and took effect September 1,

Answering the phone is the most crucial aspect of customer service, particularly for the children and parents in need of help. To address the large number of unanswered phone calls to child support offices, I requested and received resources from the Legislature to establish regional call centers in Houston Dallas-Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio.

The new funding enables the Office of the Attorney General to hire 114 customer service representatives to work in the call centers to help answer the 1.3 million telephone calls re-

At this time Collins introduced predators into the habitat to reduce the wildlife population. This portion of the program revealed the importance of predators, including, man, to reduce animal populations so habitat can support wildlife populations.
