



SOME OF THE larger cities in the Panhandle area were voting on some interesting and controversial issues this past Saturday during the community elections, and the results of these elections were also somewhat interesting. One of the issues receiving considerable publicity was the collective bargaining which was sought by policemen and firemen in the city of Amarillo. Although representatives from both the Amarillo Police Department and Fire Department had assured taxpayers that if the issue had been approved, the taxpayers would not have to worry about a strike, the voters decided not to take any chances. Probably thinking about what would happen if a fire alarm were turned in while a drive for better pay was in progress, the voters in Amarillo turned down the collective bargaining by these two groups by more than two to one. Early returns were 8,288 against the proposal, and 3,644 in favor. Voters in the City of Hereford had an interesting proposal, a wet-dry election with more involved than the usual right to open package stores. Art Reinauer, who has achieved a measure of success with the farming of grapes just north of Parmer County on his Deaf Smith County farm, is wanting to build a winery in Deaf Smith County. As expected, the "pros" and "cons" in the wet-dry issue had quite a campaign. An interesting sidelight during this campaign was the statement by Reinauer that if Deaf Smith County voters turned the proposal down he would offer to build his winery in Castro County, followed by a statement from the Castro County Chamber of Commerce that it would be more than happy to have this industry in their county. This development may or may not have affected the final outcome of the election, but at any rate, a record number of voters gave their approval to make Deaf Smith County's Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 a "wet" precinct, by a final tally of 2,659 in favor and 2,441 against. * * * *



The Parmer County Commissioners held further discussion this week regarding the Bravo Pipeline Co., which had requested an easement to cross county roads. The court had asked a fee of \$500 each for crossing the nine roads proposed on the project.

A motion was passed to advertise for the purchase of a new pickup for Precinct 2. Bids for the vehicle are to be opened on April 23. Soil work requests were approved for five county farmers, subject to availability of machinery. Cost of such work is to be re-imbursed the county.

Monroe was re-elected as mayor. A total of 387 city voters cast ballots in the election.

White, who was appointed to the council last year to replace Monroe when he moved into the mayor's seat, led the four-man slate with 247 votes. Bill Denney received 224 votes. Lonnie Phillips came in third with 173 votes, and Rex Williams received 107 votes.

Monroe received 324 votes, being unopposed on the ballot.

The election returns were canvassed at the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night. White and Denney were sworn in as council members.

City's Sales Tax Shows Nice Gain

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$46.3 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one per cent city sales tax.


"These receipts are up more than 16 per cent over last year," Bullock said. "This is just exactly where I estimated they would be when I gave the Legislature its estimate of revenues last year. Texas is in the thick of the national economic recovery. Let's just hope we stay there."

ANOTHER "DIFFERENT" angle for voters occurred at Borger, a community which has had considerable debate over the offering on that city's cable television system of the Playboy channel.

It became such a heated issue that the city officials placed a referendum on the city ballot, asking voters if they favored passing a city ordinance which would make it unlawful for the cable company to offer the Playboy channel to its customers.

Another near-record turnout of voters--more than 2,500--went to the polls in that Panhandle city, and overwhelmingly sided with the cable TV company.

The main issue in the Borger vote seemed to be a fear that the city could more or less serve as a censor, and not allow the citizens to make their own choices of what they want to see on TV, as well as allowing the company the freedom to choose what it makes available to its customers. There were many who felt that the proposed city ordinance at Borger would have been unconstitutional, even if it had been passed. The interesting thing was, there are only a few more than 400 subscribers to the Playboy channel. Yet, they were joined by several hundred other voters who felt they should be able to choose for themselves, rather than have a "Big Brother" committee.

Rabies Clinic Date Is Set

The annual rabies vaccination clinic for dogs will be held by the City of Friona on Saturday, April 14, from 1-5 p.m. at the Friona Fire Station.

Cost of the rabies vaccination and city tags is \$5 per animal.

City ordinance requires that all dogs kept within the city limits receive a rabies vaccination yearly, and also to have their tags.



Friona's check was for \$5,764.66, an increase of 34.8 per cent over the payment of \$4,275.91 for the same period in 1983. For the year, the city now has received \$30,373.12, up 19.9 per cent over the total of \$25,333.73 at the same point a year ago.

The county's total check (three cities) for the current period was \$8,591.54, up from \$6,495.75 in 1983, and the yearly total stands at \$44,703.74, compared to \$38,731.55, an increase of 15.4 per cent overall.

April checks reflect sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller in late March.



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



Helmets Can Reduce Bike Deaths, Injuries

Bicycle accidents result in 1,100 fatalities, 50,000 disabling injuries, and over 500,000 assorted minor injuries annually across the nation, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of Texas Safety Association.

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Last year in Texas pedalcyclist/ motor vehicle accidents alone resulted in 48 fatalities and 2,978 injuries, according to Department of Public Safety records.



"Bicycle education for both children and adults and alertness on the part of all Texas motor-vehicle drivers can help prevent these tragedies," Gustafson said.

Recent estimates gathered by Texas Safety Association show that 300 deaths and 3,000 hospitalizations would be prevented yearly if the nation's 105 million bicyclists would wear the helmets while riding.

Gustafson reminds parents that a child riding along on a baby seat attached to the bicycle should also be equipped with a helmet. Texas Safety Association suggests that bicycle baby seats have a high back to help offer support to the baby, a seat pad for comfort, straps and/or belts to secure the child, and a shield



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Jones Seeking Post In U.S. Legislature



In 1971 Jones was chosen by the Progressive Farmer Board of Editors as Texas Agriculture's Man of the Year. He has been cited by the Texas Water Rights Commission for "interest and dedication in improving the Texas Law of Water Rights."









The leaders will be recognized in a variety of ways--some with surprise parties, dinners or luncheons, others in an aerobics dance routine.



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
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Candlelight Service Unites Kristi White, Mike Martin




