Martin Parr, 40, was found fatally wounded today in the nearly barren townhouse following an all-night letter writing session and an unsuccessful attempt to contact her estranged husband, Duval County Judge Archer

Police said she died in a hospital at 7:40 a.m. of an apparent selfinflicted gunshot wound.

She was discovered by her sister, Mrs. Betty White, at 7:15 a.m. Mrs. Parr was lying on a metal cot, the only piece of furniture left in the sunroom of her home.

TRIED TO CALL A .25-caliber pistol was in her right hand, resting on her stomach.

"She tried to call Archer." Mrs. White said of her sister. She said Mrs. Parr had stayed up all night writing letters to friends and "people who had helped her."

Mrs. White said she did not know what her sister intended to say to Archer Parr and did not know what was in a stack of letters which was taker by police.

Her sister was awake in another room when she heard the shot and jushed into the room. Police said Mrs. White at first called them, thinking Mrs. Parr was already dead. Then she saw that her sister was still breathing and called a city am.bulance.

The ambulance picked her up at 7:35 a.m. and she was dead at the hospital at 7:40 a.m.

The room in which she was found was bare except for the cot. All the other downstairs rooms in the twostory apartment house also were empty except for one bedroom containing a bed and the kitchen which had some chairs, a table and two portable television sets.

Mrs. Parr had been released recently from the county jail where she had been placed on a contempt of court charge. She was released on an order of the Texas Supreme

Last week, Texas Rangers attempted to serve a bench warrant on Mrs. Parr, who said she would not let officers in her home. That warrant was on a contempt charge for failing to appear at a hearing in Duval County.

CONTINUAL ABUSE She was arrested later in Austin and returned to Corpus Christi and then to the Duval County jail. She was released again, however, and returned to her home in Corpus

Jack Pope Jr., one of her lawyers, characterized his client's legal and financial problems as "official op-

pression. "She was subjected to continual abuse by the court," said Pope today. "It was a criminal conspiracy."

Archer Parr was sentenced to 10 years in prison May 20 after being convicted of lying to a federal grand

His uncle, Duval County political boss George Parr, was convicted a few weeks earlier on a federal income tax evasion charge.

Both convictions followed investigations into the financial operations of Duval County.

Jody Martin Parr Arab Guerrillas Kill Victim Of Bullet Three Fem Hostages

Arab guerrillas today who had murdered three women hostages taken in an attack on a tiny farm settlement below the Golan Heights, the Israeli state radio reported.

The terrorists apparently slipped across the Lebanese border to attack Shamir. The raid obviously was intended to cast a cloud over President Nixon's tour of the Middle East, which the Palestine guerrillas oppose. The President, now in Egypt, is due in Israel on Sunday after visits to Saudi Arabia and Syria.

KILL 31 CHILDREN Terrorists now have killed 49 persons in Israel, including 31 children, in the past two

The Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command announced in Beirut that the Shamir raiders were its men. It demanded the release of 100 Palestinians from

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli prisons within six hours, Security forces killed three but shortly after the demand but shortly after the demand was delivered to newsmen the guerrilla squad was reported wiped out.

> Three guerrillas from the same terrorist organization raided the Israeli town of Qiryat Shmonah, several miles west of Shamir, on April 11 and killed 18 Israelis and themselves when the government refused their demand for the release of Palestinian prisoners.

Armed residents of Shamir opened fire on the raiders after they were spotted near a swimming pool, the Israeli radio said in a broadcast from the kibbutz. The Arabs returned the fire, wounding one man.

Residents of the kibbutz said the terrorists apparently were trying to attack the communal dining hall where many of the 470 residents of the settlement were having breakfast. Instead the Arabs seized a honey processing plant on the outskirts of the settlement, capturing three women in the building. RUSHED TO SCENE

Odessa Sustains Damage From Storm Wednesday

Odessa sustained the most damage in a series of storms which struck West Texas communities Wednesday. Clouds moved over the Big Spring area but dropped no rain. Winds here gusted hard at times but no damage was reported.

San Angelo had a tornado alert but funnel clouds sighted in that area apparently never touched the ground.

In Odessa, flash floods sent rivers of water rushing down major streets. A 60-foot section of a wall at Montgomery Ward's in Winwood Mall collapsed. causing damage that could not be estimated late last night.

Three mobile houses were overturned in the Odessa area, according to police there. Another mobile house between Odessa and the Midland Air Terminal flipped over on its

Some golf ball size hail accompanied a rain that dumped .41 of an inch of moisture on the air terminal. Midland, however, reported only a

Funnel clouds were reported near Sterling City, Carlsbad and Kermit were sighted but damage was minimal. Crane's power was abruptly shut off during a wild electrical storm, when thunderclouds from several directions approached the community.

Both Merkel and Pecos reported some hail. At Robert Lee, a half-inch of moisture fell. Sterling City's report was even better - .75 of an inch.

Some risk of showers in the Howard County area was predicted by the U.S. Weather

Service for this evening. Rains in the area successfully skipped the Colorado River Municipal Water District watersheds Wednesday evening. The Martin County pump

A Melon 'Boater'

One of the nicest ways to start a meal, whether indoors or out of doors, is with an assortment of sweet summer melon pieces that are taken from honeydew, cantaloupe or watermelon.

To make a melon 'boat' or container, slice off the top third of the melon and cut a thin slice from the bottom to make it flat and to keep it from rolling.

If using a honeydew, scoop out the meat after removing the seeds, dice and replace in melon shell. If using a cantaloupe, remove seeds then, using a grapefruit cutter, carefully remove the large pieces and cut them into long wedges and replace in melon shell.

Meat from the watermelon should be scooped out using a melon baller. Remove the seeds and serve cold from shell.





New Breed: Happy, Healthy Single Women Increasing

Norma Bauer, 83 years old and never married, would never call herself a spinster. She is a voice teacher in Springfield, Ohioa lively, gregarious woman who lives alone and is single by choice.

Over the years, Miss Bauer has turned down marriage proposals from as she lists them - "a minister, two attorneys, a music teacher, and most recently, a manufacturing man.

"Men were fun to be with.

I liked having them as escorts, but not for the rest of my life," she says.

When people ask a 68year-old Margaret Kuhn how she escaped marriage, she usually replies, "Sheer luck."

"My goals in life and the men who interested me simply did not coincide. I could not have done all I have done in my life if I had been married," said Miss Kuhn, activist for rights of old people through an organization she founded called the Grey Panthers.

"Miss Bauer and Miss Kuhn are among more than two million never-married women over the age of 45 in the United States today. They make up a silent, unorganized minority group stereotyped — not always kindly — as the maiden aunts, prim retired school teachers, little old ladies living in the cottage down the road.

Sterotypes aside, the women are of special interest today as a growing number of young women declare that they never want to marry. And the unmarried single woman is beginning to be studied by sociologists psychiatrists.

Jesse Bernard in her book, "The Future of Marriage," quotes from several studies showing that the unmarried women are less depressed, less passive less phobic, less neurotic, and in all-around better physical and mental health than their married counterparts. Research also shows that unmarried women are better off than old bachelors who succumb

more readily to certain diseases and more likely to commit suicide

"Women adjust better than men to the single state because over the years it has been a more acceptable role for them," said Dr. Norman Bradburn of the University of Chicago. "Affectional ties in those later years that are a source of comfort are easier

for women to achieve."

Interviews with more than
a dozen single women over

the age of 50 confirmed some of the general theories. But few of those interviewed ever made a conscious decision in their youth never to marry.

For some, the great love of their life was taken away by tragedy or because he somehow never met with an authoritarian father's approval. For others, there were sick and aging parents who had to be taken care of. Some women admitted to a fear of sex or lifetime

commitment to a man. Some dedicated themselves to a cause of a career that did not leave time for marriage.

marriage.

The women say they are generally content with their single state — it has given them the freecom to pursue any and all interests. But some regret not having had the depth of intimacy with one man that comes from years of living together. Another regret is not having children.

Reluctant To Nix 'Front Door' Profit

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Over the past three years more than half of Texas' commerical disposal sites for industry's unwanted sludges, acids and poisons have been trouble spots at least once.

These records are subject of some interest in view of the controversies over two proposals to bury industrial wastes in landfills near Groesbeck and Three Rivers.

Eleven sites, including some of the most elaborate, have occasionally been problems. There have been lawsuits, court judgments, citizen complaints and criticism by board technicians.

MEDDLING

In addition to the commercial sites, about 140 industries dispose of their own wastes on their own property with a minimum of regulation. Yantis said the board requires this to be done "in a workmanlike, neat manner and not grossly offensive." In exempting such sites from the commericialregistration requirements, the legislature "went to great lengths to avoid-'meddling,' lets call it," Yantis said.

BACKLOG One commerical site is operated south of Corpus Christi by International Pollution Control IPCI, a subsidiary of the Petrolite Corp. of St. Louis. IPCI has both a sanitary landfill and a disposal well and

handles oily wastes and solids. IPCI's backlog of wastes attracted

notice from the board staff in December. It's file includes a memorandum from L. B. Griffith of the field support staff.

"Our experience in other districts also indicates that in this type of business, the operators are very reluctant to turn down a 'front door' profit and therefore accept more than they can handle. It sounds like it will catch up on the surplus they have already accumulated and for which they have already been paid," Griffith wrote.

Bio Ecology Systems of Grand Prairie, which specializes in treating or incinerating wastes before buying them, has emerged as a major critics of landfill operations.

J. P. Lurcott, the company's vice president, contends the board will take a step backward if it approves the landfill proposals before it. RETURN TO NATURE

"The technology is there and the economics are feasible to actually detoxify this stuff and return it to nature in basic form," Lurcott said. His own firm has been in trouble with the board, and paid a \$1,000 civil penalty in June 1973 after an oil spill polluted over a mile of Mountain Creek, which borders the plant on three sides.

Yantis calls Bio Ecology's plant "probably the poorest located. They have had flooding. We told them to dike and dike . . . I wonder if we should have let them build

time financially. They have a poor record of compliance." PAINT SLUDGES

Bio Ecology bitterly opposes a permit application by another Dallasarea firm, Metroplex Sanitation, to use part of the Cleburne city dump for burial of paint sludges, solvents and resins and threatened to shut its own gates if the permit were approved.

Metroplex, owned by former Water Board lawyer Stephen Rosenthal, mixed its operations with Cleburne's municipal trash. But the State Health Department ended that arrangement after fires and explosions occured at the dump in October. It said the industrial wastes, apparent source of the fires, should be buried in a landfill approved by the board.

Metropler obtained a temporary permit and dug its own trench at the dump site.

On one occasion: Bio Ecology reported to the board, Metroplex violated its temporary permit by dumping several drums of cyanide in the trench. Board files contain no further evidence of this, however. VERY SELECTIVE

Five days before a scheduled May 21 hearing on a permanent certificate for Metroplex, the firm withdrew its application and Cleburne took it over. Board files indicate the city has not yet decided whether to pursue

A firm that Yantis call "highly sophisticated and very selective,"
Rollins Environmental Services of Deer Park, was assessed \$24,000 in civil penalties by a judge in March. The attorney general had filed suit at the request of Yantis, who said the firm had dug disposal pits without board approval and had allowed barrels of waste material to accumulate.

Another court order, this one obtained by the Texas Air Control Board in December, assessed \$50,000 in penalties against Renner Inc., a Jefferson County operation owned by Browning-Ferris Industries.

CLEAN FILE The district court in Beaumont also ordered Renner not to accept any inorganic materials unless they could be deodorized. It also instructed the company to remove oily material from a pond at its site.

SOLID SITES

State Water Quality Board records show 21 permits have been granted to operate solid and liquid disposal sites. These range from pits to injection wells to sophisticated salvage and treatment facilities.

"The industrial solid waste sites you now have are well designed, well located and supervised by relatively competent people," said Hugh Yantis, the Water Quality Board's executive

hearts was led and West

shifted to the ten of clubs.

The other declarer covered

with dummy's jack and cap-

king. He drew three rounds of trumps, ending in dummy, and ruffed a heart. A club to the ace provided the entry for a second heart ruff. Since West had to have the king of diamonds for his opening bid, declarer tried now for an endplay by leading his last club. Unfortunately East won the trick by overtaking his partner's eight, and shifted to the jack of diamonds. Declarer had to lose two diamond tricks for down one.

Jais found a far superior line of play. He allowed West's ten of clubs to hold the second trick! West continued the suit to the jack, queen and king. Trumps were drawn in three rounds, also ending in dummy, and a heart was ruffed. Declarer returned to dummy with a club to the ace and led the queen of hearts. On this trick Jais discarded his low diamond!

This loser-on-loser play cinched the contract. The defenders had three tricks in. but here was no way they could score another trick, for West was endplayed when he won the ace of hearts. He was left with a choice of unpleasant alternatives: if he returned a heart, declarer would ruff in dummy while discarding the queen of diamonds; a diamond lead would be into declarer's ace-queen

LONG TAIL "I saw one panther in late summer crossing a little road not far from the house," recalled the trapper. "He was a sort of gray-tan and his tail was as long as his body." Ed Parsons, who lives nearer

the river, also spotted a pan-ther late last year. It was al-Carpenter uses No. 4 and No. 14 steel traps with 15 to 20 foot drags. He frowns on cyanide traps which now are outlawed by the government. He says they're too dangerous and not

all that effective Sometimes he baits his traps with carrion from animals the wolves already have killed. Most of the time, though, he uses a blind set, seeking out a

well-used wolf trail. For the set, he finds a clear spot in a small clearing, ties the bait in a small hole, then covers it with leaves and sticks. Then he digs in four traps, one on each side of the bait, and spreads wolf urine lib-

erally on the bait and traps. "Nine out of 10 times," penter figures, "the wolf will go after the bait and stick his foot in one of the traps. Some-

times two of them Carpenter keeps 16 to 20 wolf taps set the year around. During winter, he lines them with wax paper to keep them from freezing. He generally checks

the traps daily A trapped wolf can be pretty unsavory company but Carpenter dispatches them on the spot. He has never been bitten although there have been some

near misses. MELON EXPERT The start of it all, his watermelons, are faring a lot better than the wolves. His big yellowmeats are aimost legendary among Paris area melon con-

noisseurs. "I didn't lose a melon to the wolves last year," Carpenter said. "I think they're beginning to get the idea.



Some congressmen, however, feel that little if any progress is being made by the committee, and have called on the Democratic leadership to put more pressure on Hays to speed up action. Republicans have been particularly critical of the slow-motion pace of the committee. In the 17-month interval the Senate has passed three reform

Much of the concern for more speed is the desire of many congressmen to have a reform measure passed in time for the fall general election. Hays says a bill could be ready by then, but several members of his committee have expressed doubts that action will be completed by that time.

There seems to be general agreement both in and out of Congress that campaign reform is a

must in view of the disclosures made to date in the Watergate and allied investigations. At the same time caution has been the watchword in the framing of a reform measure. Those working on the measure don't want to come up with a bad piece of legislation which might make the cure worse than the disease.

Caution certainly should be observed by those writing the legislation. The House Administration Committee should move ahead with deliberate speed, coupled with thorough study of the ramifications of all proposals for campaign reform. Campaign reform has become a necessity, but must be written to preserve and protect the rights of both the voters and the candidates.

The pressures of Watergate should insure that the fall general election will be relatively free of questionable tactics. A fall deadline on the reform legislation is a good target, but not as vital to the future as a well-written, workable and equitable law.

Ill-Timed Issue

The furore concerning whether Secretary of State Henry Kissinger did or did not authorize wire taps in the days when he was heading the National Security Council is ill timed.

This is not to say that monumental achievements on the diplomatic front grants immunity to anyone from consequences of conflicting testimony, if, indeed, that were to be proven. To press the point at this particular moment (on what so far seems to be hearsay) when the Secretary is seeking to undergird the President in attempts to advance the cause of peace in the Middle East, is to capitalize on the events of the moment for maximum publicity.

It has not to be established that there is sufficient evidence to press the questioning with the Secretary, but should this be the case, then there is ample time when he is past this crucial mission

Soviet Un-Detente

Vinyl Chloride Report



WASHINGTON - Contradicting Nixon administration claims that detente is relaxing repression in the Soviet Union, the American ambassador in Moscow has privately cabled Washington that the KGB secret police has intensified harrassment of Soviet citizens trying to contact the U.S. embassy.

IN A MAY 22 "confidential" telegram to the State Department, Ambassador Walter Stoessel revealed the new "pattern of intensifying monitoring and harassment of Soviet citizens" attempting to enter the embassy, "Judging from several recent incidents, Soviet security has recently become less tolerant of such contacts," Stoessel said.

Although recent embassy protests to the Soviet Foreign Affairs Ministry have proven fruitless, the State Department is avoiding for now highlevel pre-summit protests that might endanger detente. This attitude further angers critics of the Nixon-Kissinger foreign policy who hold that while detente is desirable, it should not be purchased at the price of

WITHOUT PRESSURE from the West, the growing Soviet civil rights movement would not have been possible and well-known dissidents such as Andrei Sakharov would be silenced. Nevertheless, the clampdown on contacts with the U.S. embassy is the worst ever.

Stoessel's telegram points to "intensified Soviet security monitoring of American citizen-Soviet citizen contacts"; to "Overt KGB harrassment of Soviets seeking (U.S.) consular advice or assistance"; and to American travelers being "The target of closer surveillance." His conclusion; "In all cases, there seem to be complications in recent months which were not in evidence as recently as three months ago."

UNTIL THEN, U.S. embassy protests kept Soviet militiamen from blocking access to the embassy of Soviet citizens with written invitations from consular officials to discuss problems such as reunification with families in the United States. "Beginning in early March, however, the militia began once again to deny entry even to persons with such invitations in hand," Stoessel reported.

These citizens are now routinely taken to a large militia shack to prevent them from entering the embassy, according to Stoessel. His April 1 protest to the Soviet government accomplished nothing.

ON THE morning of May 29, seven days after Stoessel's telegram to Washington, a 30-year-old medical laboratory technician named Mikhail Ilyitch Parkansky approached the embassy with an invitation from consular officials. In March, a request for him and his family to emigrate to Dallas, Texas, (home of his brother) had been denied and he lost his job. Now he was intercepted outside the embassy by militiamen and taken to their booth. Protests were to no avail. The Parkansky Case is duplicated daily. Soviets frustrate attempts of marriage by Soviet and American citizens. Visiting American Jews have been harrassed.



On June 6, the thirtieth anniversary of D Day came and went. Could you believe it was 30 years ago?

Some things were so important that you can remember where you were when you heard the news. I can remember where I was when I heard about Pearl Harbor, D Day, the day Roosevelt died, the day the atom bomb fell and the day Kennedy was assissinated. Other days do not remain that sharp in my memory.

BUT D DAY became much sharper to me after the war. Because I married a guy that had been in the combat engineers on D Day. He used to watch that picture show "The Longest Day" and claim that was a perfect name for the day.

He's now dead, but his recollections of the day went something like this.

'We were plenty scared when we realized as we boarded the Susan B. Anthony in England that this was really it. We were given instructions after we got on the ship as to where we would all try to get back together after 16 hours. They were starting to issue the rifles and the hand grenades when our ship was hit.

'Rumors flew around that we would be put on smaller ships and taken back to England. How lucky could we get? Only one sailor was killed when the ship was hit. We were all safe. We were going back.

"We weren't going back. We had already come too far. We were to be put into landing boats and landed on the beach "But we didn't have rifles. We

didn't get any rifles. We didn't even get any knives. Somebody tell that dumb sergeant that we didn't get any "What do you mean get in the landing boats? We don't have any

"Where are the life preservers? What do you mean, there aren't any? Where are our rifles? Why aren't we going back to England? Get in the

boat . . "There's only ten boats left. They don't care if we don't have rifles. Get in the boat. Hurry up, and get

in the 'deleted expletive' boat . . . "WHERE ARE we going to get rifles? My gosh, they're shooting at us. Duck. When did they say we met the rest of them? What do we do in the mean time? Does anybody have

Impeaching Congress

WASHINGTON - "Congressman Cheesedip, how do you feel about the Watergate affair?" "I am shocked, appalled and horrified that such a thing could

happen in this great land of ours." "WHAT IS CONGRESS doing to prevent future Watergates from

taking place?" "We are studying the matter very closely.

"Do you believe there is any possibility that the House will pass serious election-reform legislation this year?" "I didn't understand the question."

"CONGRESSMAN CHEESEDIP, what I meant was that although most members of the House are very critical of every aspect of the Watergate they seem to be dragging their feet when it comes to making the elections in this country less corrupt.

"I will not accept that. We have been thinking about election reform for some time now. We have been talking about it for more than a year. How can you say we're dragging our

"MAINLY BECAUSE you haven't

"Well, I would like to say this. Reforming election campaigns is a very serious matter. We have to look at it from all sides. It's true that there have been abuses, particularly in the area of financing political candidates, and we're very concerned about this. At the same time it would be a mistake if we abolished these abuses and made it more difficult

for men of high principle to run.'

"THEN, CONGRESSMAN Cheesedip, could I say that you are against election reforms this year?"

"I am not against election reforms. take the position — and I have said this publicly many times - that we must have reforms in our political process. But I believe it would be a very dangerous thing to pass any laws that would make it more difficult for well-meaning people to contribute to a political campaign. Their voices should be heard, and if they want to do it by financing a particular candidate then I say God bless them. That's the American way of doing

"BUT ISN'T that the very thing that got the Committee for the Re-Election of the President in all its trouble?

"I don't think we should be tarred by what the Committee for the Re-Election of the President did. I am proud to say that, although I have received contributions from the milk producers, the oil companies and the construction industries, I have never permitted this to interfere in how I would vote on any particular bill."

"AREN'T YOU afraid Congressman Cheesedip, that if you don't pass some reform legislation you will be impeached?"

"What are you talking about?" "The Constitution provides that every two years the American people can impeach a congressman by voting him out of office."

"That's outrageous."

Ignoring Is Dangerous

Two workmen digging at a construction site were buried to the waist by a sudden cave-in. A doctor, passing nearby, rushed to the scene and gave lifesaving first aid until they could be rescued by other workmen.

But the doctor himself suffered painful injuries. Was he entitled to collect damages from the construction company, on the ground that its negligance had caused the cave-in? In a court test, the company said it was not liable.

"We admire his courage," said the company, "but anyone who ventures voluntarily into danger does so at his own risk.

However, the court said the doctor was indeed entitled to a damage award. The court said the company should have foreseen not only that workmen might be trapped but also that rescuers might rush in and get hurt too. As one judge put it:

"Danger invites rescue. The cry of distress is the summons to relief. The wrong that imperils life is a wrong to the imperilled victim; it is a wrong also to his rescuer."

Generally speaking, the law pays due respect to the heroic impulse. In fact, most courst will favor a rescuer even when the danger is merely to property, not human life.

Thus, a man injured while trying to stop a rolling automobile was awarded damages later from the car owner, who had failed to set his brakes. The court said saving property, although less urgent than saving life, is nevertheless a laudable course of action. Still, the law does not condone

outright recklessness. Another case involved a woman who was killed by a freight train while trying to pull her dog off the tracks. She had leaned over even though the train was in plain sight, bearing down fast. .Under these circumstances, a court

ruled, her family could not hold the railroad responsible for the tragedy. "A person is not excused from the consequences of his own acts in exposing himself to danger," said the court, "where the peril is so obvious." 'HIGH AUTHORITY' Haig told Sullivan he was requesting wiretaps on behalf of 'high authority' in the White House. The source said Haig never identified the high authority or mentioned Kissinger's name. Neither mentioned the Hoover-Kissinger telephone

From time to time, Haig would call Sullivan and request that another individual be placed under surveillance or he would order that an existing wiretap be discontinued.

The summaries delivered to the White House were in the form of letters signed by Hoover, the late FBI director. Kissinger told the Foreign

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department will use sex traps again this year to help map the progress of de-structive gypsy moths and to control their numbers in infested regions.

About 60,000 traps baited with an irresistable scent-irresistable to male moths, anywaycalled disparlure will be dis-

tributed in a nationwide pro-gram by mid-June.

The traps will be collected in September and the insects examined and identified by USDA entomologists.

Disparlure was developed several years ago. A synthetic, it is said to be capable of sending male gypsy moths into sex-

ual frenzies, attracting them from a distance of several miles into traps. In announcing the 1974 program, officials said USDA and state agencies currently are distributing the traps

and are being aided by the National Campers and Hikers Association. The butterfly-like adult stage

is when male gypsy moths are lured into traps. The insects do their damage to trees and shrubs when they are larvae, stripping foliage and killing the

In a story by columnist Maxine Cheshire, the newspaper also said an expensive jewelry set crafted out of emeralds and diamonds had been presented by an Arab oil minister to the wife of J. William Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Under the 1966 law, all foreign gifts to federal officials and their families valued at more than \$50 are legally the property of the U.S. government and must be turned over to the State Department Protocol Office for cataloguing and disposition.

The story said the jewelry sets, including diamonds and pearls to Judy Agnew, rubies and diamonds to Adele Rogers, and the emerald-diamond set to Elizabeth Fulbright, consisted of

a necklace, bracelet, earrings and ring.

Last month, Miss Cheshire disclosed that a diamond bracelet and two jeweled brooches given to First Lady Pat Nixon and her daughters by a Saudian Arabian prince on July 1, 1972, were not received in the White House Gifts Unit for processing until last March 28, 1974.






