Football Contest To Begin Next Week

IT'S TIME FOR football season, along with all of the joys and pain that the season brings.

Last year's team was a senior-dominated team, and we know after graduation that Moss and his staff had their work cut out for them.

However, some of the other teams on Friona's schedule are faced with similar problems, so Coach Moss and his troops are hoping for at least a 5-5 season and maybe better.

The team kicks off its season by visiting River Road next Friday.

The parade will be telecast on KVII-TV, Channel 7, beginning at 10 a.m. Those watching the parade are reminded to watch for Kriste.

The always-popular football contest, sponsored by the Friona Star for the past 25 years, is being announced in this week's issue of the Star. The Star will once again sponsor the contest, along with 24 sports-minded area businesses.

Continuing the format of recent years, weekly prizes totalling \$20.00 will be offered, with \$10.00 awarded to the first place winner each week, \$6.00 given to the second place contestant, and \$4.00 awarded to the third place entry.

In addition to the \$20.00 in weekly prizes, contestants will be shooting for the grand prize of \$100.00 cash to be awarded to the leading contestant at the conclusion of the contest.

Contestants will once again be asked to pick a total of 24 games per week in the contest, which will include the top high school games from this area, as well as the top college games and professional games each week.

The contest follows the same pattern that it has throughout its history. The games to be picked by contestants are listed in the advertisements of the contest sponsors. Each sponsor's ad contains a game to be considered in that week's contest.

First place winner at the close of the 13-week contest period will receive \$100.00 cash.

Entries may be brought by or mailed to the Friona Star, Box 789, by 6 p.m. each Friday. They also may be left at Bi-Wize Drug. If mailed, the entry must bear a

postmark by Friday "P.M." and should be marked "Football Contest."

Over 400 fans enter the contest each year, as individual rivalries usually develop among contestants.

Contestants must be 12 years of age or older to be eligible to enter the contest. In order that scores count for grand prizes, entries must be on an official entry blank, printed in the Star each week.

A tie-breaker game, usually the Friona Chieftain game, will be used to break weekly ties as well as those that might develop in the race for grand prizes.

Enrollment Down Some From 1983

Enrollment in the Friona school system was down slightly from the first week of 1983, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Figures released by the superintendent's office showed that enrollment in Friona schools as of Thursday stood at 1253, which was down by 28 students, or 2.2 per cent, from the fourth-day total of 1,281 of the previous year.

However, the enrollment total was within six students of the 1,259 total for the fourth day of the 1982-83 school year.

Current enrollment figures show an increase in high school, where there were 353 students, compared to 341 a year ago. This is an increase of 3.5 per cent.

Junior high enrollment was

within four students, 300, to 304 last year. The drop occurred in elementary school, where 600 students enrolled, 36 fewer than did during the first four days of the 1983-84 term.

Current enrollment, by schools, with the 1983-84 figures in parenthesis, are as follows:

ECU and special education 14 (11); kindergarten 93 (97); first grade 100 (114); second grade 100 (103); third grade 89 (95); fourth grade 89 (106); fifth grade 105 (110). Elementary total: 600 (636).

Sixth grade: 101 (109); seventh grade 101 (100); eighth grade 98 (95). Junior high total: 300 (304).

Ninth grade: 96 (98); tenth grade 92 (98); eleventh grade 89 (85); 12th grade 76 (59). High school totals: 353 (341). Grand total: 1253 (1281).

Chiefs, Wildcats To Meet September 7

The River Road Wildcats will provide the opposition for the Friona Chieftains in their 1984 football season opener next Friday, September 7 in Amarillo. Game time is 8 p.m.

Friona has been on the Wildcat schedule every year since River Road began playing football, and in recent years the games have been exciting matches.

In 1982, the two schools met in their season openers, and then again in November in the playoffs. River Road won both games that year, 21-6 and 26-17, in their best season from a won-loss standpoint.

Friona bounced back for a 13-6 win in last year's season opener, when Eloy Caballero caught a deflected pass with 40 seconds left

in the game, to crack a 6-6 tie and give Friona the win.

The relatively short series finds the Amarillo school with a 4-3 edge in games played. However, Chieftain Coach Tommy Moss' personal record is 2-2 against the Wildcats, and he would like to take a 3-2 edge.

The Wildcats have prevailed in two of the three games played on their home turf. In fact, Friona has not won a game in Amarillo since the first official varsity meeting in 1978, when the Chieftains took a 40-6 win.

Like Friona, River Road saw its team decimated by graduation after the 1983 season, losing 21 seniors. Four starters are back from last year's team.

The 'Cats are having to replace all starters at the skill positions on offense. They have a big, 6-4 boy at quarterback, according to Moss.

In their first scrimmage, the Wildcats outscored Panhandle, two to one, so they may be better than folks were thinking. They were up against Stratford in this week's scrimmage.

Another thing the two schools have in common is membership in tough districts. River Road's mates

in District 1-AAA are always-tough Perryton, Dalhart and Childress, with Canadian and Boys Ranch rounding out the lineup.

With both schools trying to re-establish themselves, it ought to be a good game, each hoping to get off to a good start for the season.

55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 30, 1929

10 YEARS AGO--AUG. 25, 1974

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Court Awards Bids For Two Machines

Awarding of contracts for two new motor graders highlighted the Parmer County Commissioners' Court meeting on August 13.

Bids for the two machines had been received from Peek Industrial Equipment, Deckard Equipment, Plains Machinery and West Texas Equipment Company.

After considering the bids, a motion was passed to award the bid for the grader for Precinct 1 to Plains Machinery Company, on a trade difference of \$62,500.

The Precinct 2 bid was awarded to West Texas Equipment

Company, with a trade difference of \$73,010.

Chuck Addy, John McDaniel and B.K. Buske of the Parmer County Industrial Development Board met with the court. They asked approval of a resolution for the sale of industrial bonds. A motion was approved adopting a resolution approving the issuance and sale of \$3,000,000 in Industrial Development Revenue Bonds for the Millard Warehouse project.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony, who chaired the meeting in the

absence of Judge Porter Roberts, was authorized to sign the resolution.

In other business, a motion was passed to pay the care expenses for foster children in the amount of \$2,139. This amount will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

A motion was approved designating the month of August as "Child Support Month."

Ann Norton, deputy in the license tag office, met with the court and explained the duties she and the other deputy, Bernice Pennington, have been doing during the absence of County Tax Assessor Hugh Moseley. A motion was passed to reimburse both ladies for travel expenses incurred in fulfilling the duties of their office.

Sheriff Bill Morgan and dispatcher Murlene Smith met with the court to discuss the teletype machine in the sheriff's office. It was pointed out that the machine has some problems, as well as limitations. Sheriff Morgan explained that a new machine, with improved functions, can be leased at approximately the same cost as the lease on the present machine.

Motion was passed to allow the sheriff to trade in the old teletype machine for the newer model.

Morgan also told the court about damage to the ceiling in his department due to water leaks. The court decided to wait until the roof has been replaced before making the inside repairs.

A motion was passed to authorize Commissioner Anthony to cash certificates of deposit in the Available School Fund maturing August 15, 1984, and issue checks to divide the money between the four schools in the county.

A motion was passed to order a set of books on county government, requested by the County Clerk.

Appointment of election judges for the general election was tabled so that the County Clerk could contact more of the workers.

At 3 p.m., a hearing on use of revenue sharing was held. Members of the Bovina and Friona Senior Citizens appeared, asking for funds to defray expenses with their respective meeting places. The court assured each group that they would consider their requests.

Commissioner Anthony was authorized to sign the lateral road fund report.

Pallbearers were James Scott, Johnny Scott, Billy Scott, David Scott, Kraig Shields, Dexter Allen and Bobby Chesher.



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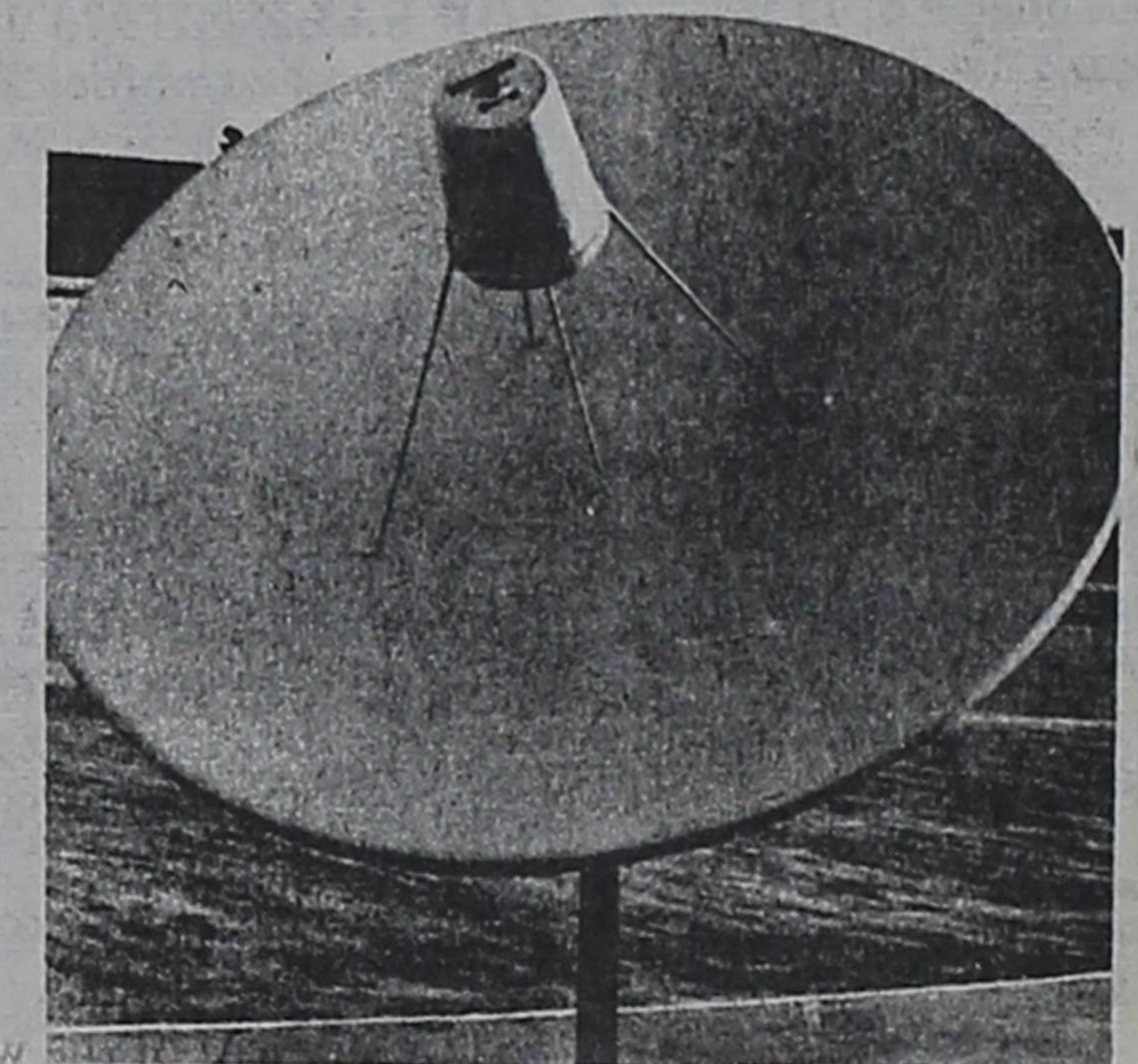

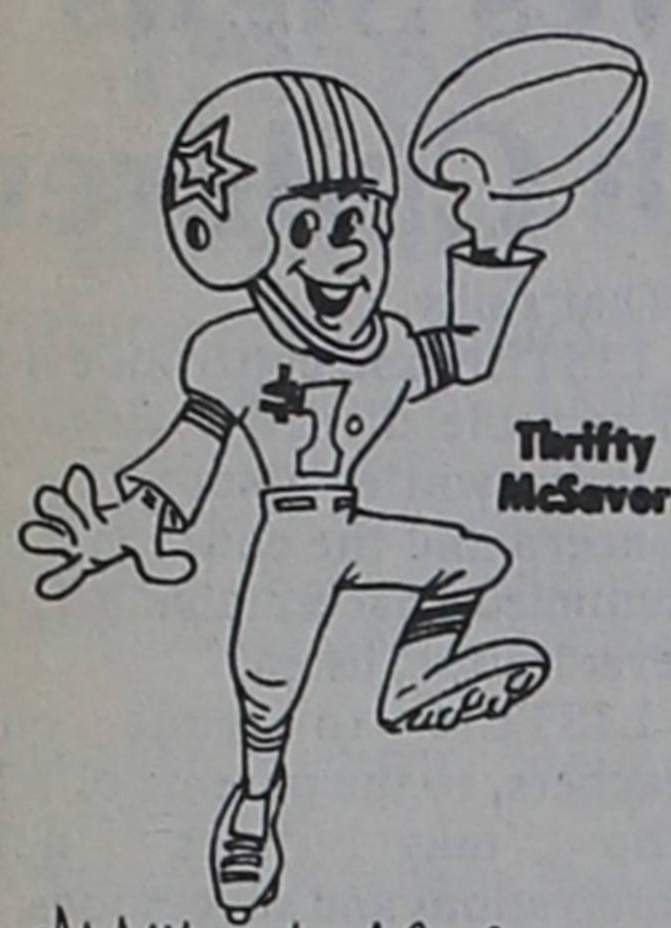

DPS Asks Public To Be 'On Guard'

The Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 54 deaths will result from traffic accidents during the Labor Day holiday. DPS Director Jim Adams said the estimate is based upon previous holiday experience.

"During the last Labor Day period, we had 52 deaths reported in both urban and rural accidents. The inclusion of subsequent deaths due to traffic-related injuries which occurred during the period brought the final count to 55," Adams said.

"Obviously, we would be pleased to have no fatal accidents during this 78-hour holiday, but our statistics show that it is not probable. We know that some

drivers will insist upon driving while intoxicated, others will deliberately exceed the speed limits and still others will drive in a careless or reckless manner," he said. "Unfortunately, fatal accidents can be expected."

"DWI and speeding are always the biggest contributing factors to our traffic deaths, but the failure to use seat belts is another reason we have so many fatalities. If more drivers would simply stay sober, drive within the speed limits and wear seat belts, fatalities would decline still further," said Adams.

DPS statistics for the year to date reveal a two per cent decrease in fatalities statewide. Adams says the decrease in total deaths may indicate more people are using seat belts.

"While the decline in fatalities is not as substantial as we'd like to see, we do feel that seat belt use is increasing and may be a factor in this decrease. It is an obvious lifesaving device that is available in the vast majority of our vehicles," noted Adams.

DPS will conduct two major programs during the Labor Day period. Operation Motorcade will provide updated numbers of traffic deaths to the news media as the accidents occur. Operation Holiday stations troopers at locations where high volumes of traffic are anticipated or where violations are expected.

Specialist Gives Signs To Heed With Children

If you feel your child is troubled or in trouble it pays to contact a professional social worker, or Mental Health worker, your family doctor or a minister for help. But often you can help your children avoid trouble simply by listening. Children often feel no one is willing to slow down and listen to how they feel, believe them or take them seriously.

You can help protect your child if you will...LISTEN to your child with full attention, on a regular basis.

LISTEN with a non-judgmental attitude (listening and talking about problems such as sex, alcohol or drug abuse does not mean you condone the activity.)

LISTEN when your child asks directly for help and make your responsiveness a top priority.

LISTEN and take seriously your child's concerns, never dismissing them with a "Don't worry" or

"That's silly." LISTEN and confront evidence of trouble directly, firmly and calmly while discussing your concern and the consequences of continued unacceptable behavior--never lecture, listen.

LISTEN to your child's teachers, to the parents of friends who may have helpful observations and suggestions.

LISTEN and give honest answers about your own use of alcohol, tobacco or drugs, realizing that a child's accusations and excuses may simply be an attempt to divert attention from themselves.

LISTEN to the professionals you consult, value their advice and follow it rather than retreating into a defensive shell.

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CATARACTS--How They Develop

Even though all persons with cataracts do not require surgical treatment, cataracts remain the leading cause of hospital admissions for eye operations in the United States. Approximately 15 per cent of all individuals in the United States who are considered legally blind have cataracts as the underlying cause. There is no approved treatment for cataracts other than surgical removal at the right stage of their development. Many important advances in the surgical management of cataracts have been made and the usual results of surgery are excellent.

As stated in the previous article, cataracts are NOT the result of a growth over the outside of the eye nor are they tumors. When the crystalline lens becomes cloudy or opaque and does not transmit light as easily as it used to, then it is called a "cataract."

From early childhood until about the age of 40 years, the crystalline lens is a flexible, soft, high powered lens that changes focus from distance vision to near vision rapidly. With age, this lens begins to lose some of its elasticity and focusing at near becomes more and more difficult. When this happens, and it is considered normal between the ages of 35 and 45, a person begins to need extra help to read. This condition is called "presbyopia" and is a normal part of the aging process, just like graying hair or wrinkling skin. At least some degree of lens opacities are found in 95 per cent of persons over the age of 65. There are, however, many exceptions to the rule. Not everyone over the age of 65 has cataracts. In myopic patients it is less apparent because the nearsightedness provides good near vision. Cataracts can usually only be seen with an optical instrument used by your optometrist.

Finding Solutions to Our Water Problem

Sometimes it seems like our water problem is like our weather: Everyone talks about it but no one does anything. However, the truth is there are many fine people working on the problem; they just need more help.

People are finding solutions at the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, the U.S.D.A. Department of Soil Conservation, the Plant and Water Stress Center and the Water Research Center at Texas Tech University, just to name a few. This week I'd like to share with you some of the things they're working on.

Much of the research involves finding ways to increase the recharge of the Ogallala Aquifer. Most of our rainfall evaporates before it ever reaches the aquifer, so experiments have been conducted to route rainfall directly to the aquifer through a series of holes drilled in the surface. Unfortunately, in the past, these holes soon became clogged with debris. Recently, new filters have been developed that can eliminate this problem. It is esti-

ated that this technology could extend the life of the aquifer by ten percent.

A large amount of the recharge is through the many playas that lie over the Ogallala. And there's a new development that could increase this flow. Experiments are being done with knot grass, a species that can grow on the bottom of the playas. Its roots make an excellent conduit for recharge. These experiments have also led to what could be a significant side benefit. Knot grass has a high enough protein content to support one and a half animals per acre. With 17,000 playas averaging 22 acres each, this means over a half a million more animals could be supported on the High Plains.

Since almost half our rainfall is in small increments (less than 25/100 inch) which evaporates quickly, any method that can reduce evaporation will have a great impact on our water supply. An interesting experiment uses discarded rubber tires. Research has shown that if these

tires are broken into small chips and properly distributed, evaporation is greatly reduced. This method also increases soil temperature providing a longer growing season and, for example, longer staple cotton for a more profitable crop.

Research is also being carried out on drought resistant crops, more effective brush control and many other ways to conserve our water.

No single solution will solve the problem and no one has all the answers. We must constantly try new methods. And if something works, keep it; if it doesn't, try something new. To do this we rely on the people whose job it is to search for answers. And they rely on our government's support. But far too often their work is forgotten, neglected or tied up in bureaucratic red tape. That's why we must have a Representative in Washington who will continually apply the pressure needed to maintain, and increase, government support for their work which is so critical to our survival.
