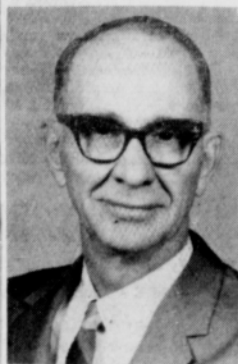

## DR. EVANS, LONGTIME CLYDE DOCTOR SUCCEUMS AT HOME

CLYDE — Dr. Robert W. Evans, 63, died Wednesday at 2 a. m. in his home south of Clyde from an apparent heart attack, following an accident which occurred April 9, when he fell and broke his hip.

Funeral was held Thursday at 2 p. m. in the First Baptist

Church in Clyde, with Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery under direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Dr. Evans was born Sept. 12, 1907 in Farmington, Ky., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Herman Evans. He married Alethea Turner on Dec. 3, 1941 in Fort Worth.

He was a graduate of Texas State University and of Baylor Medical School in Dallas. After serving in the South Pacific during World War II and attaining the rank of Major, he came to Clyde from Fort Worth in 1945.

He was a member of the American Medical Association, Texas Medical Association and Taylor-Jones Medical Association. He was a charter member of the Clyde Lions Club and a charter member of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse. He was a member of the National Brangus Breeders Association, Texas Brangus Breeders Association and American Quarter Horse Association. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Robert H. of the home; three daughters, Janice of Abilene, Mrs. Linda Seelig of Baird and Lisa of the home; one granddaughter, Sandra Steel of Baird; two sisters, Mrs. Louise Elliott of Weslaco and Mrs. Clara Buckingham of Brownsville; two brothers, Jack of Manila, Philippine Islands and Herschel of Mayfield, Ky.; several nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one brother, and one grandson.

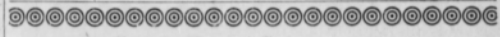

AUSTIN — State Representative Joe C. Hanna is one of five legislators named to go to Washington Monday to seek long term loans for drought-stricken farmers and ranchers, Speaker Gus Mutscher said Friday.

Mutscher said Senator Lloyd Bentsen was coordinating the trip.

"The Texas farmers and ranchers have appealed for tangible help - not a whirlwind tour by Secretary of Agriculture Hardin which did not fully cover the drought stricken area," Mutscher said.

Rep. Oscar Carrillo Sr. of Benavides will head the group, which besides Hanna also includes Reps. John Poerner of Hondo, Honore Ligarde of Laredo and Tom Holmes of Granbury.

Mutscher said the group would urge modification of a "pauper's oath" which he said the government requires before it will provide livestock feed at reduced costs.

Hanna said the group will meet with the Texas delegation in Washington and try to work out some sort of relief program for hard hit farmers and ranchers in all parts of the state affected by the drought.

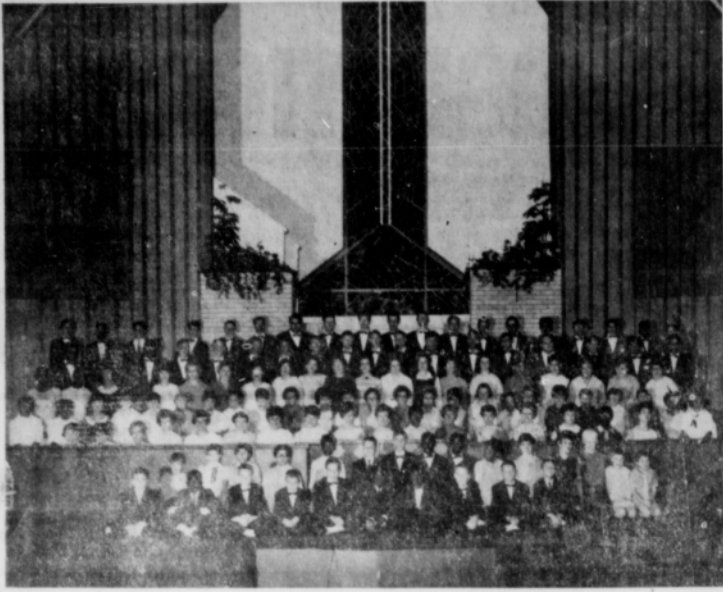


